The Forty-Fourth Annual Conference of the Kentucky District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at the Tabernacle on August 6, 1953, at 7:15 A. M. with our District Superintendent, Rev. L. S. Houston, in charge.

The members of the Conference met at the altar for special prayer. Rev. C. L. Oden led in singing "In the Sweet By and By." Rev. S. M. Stikeleather, our General Secretary, brought to us a helpful message on I Cor. 12:1, using "Loyalty" as his subject. He emphasized that our best is what God requires.

Moved and carried that we reconvene at 9:30 A. M.

Conference reconvened at 9:30 A. M. by singing "Beulah Land.", We were led in prayer by Rev. H. H. Bolender.

The reception committee presented Dr. Andrew Johnson, Rev. Tommy Holshouser, Rev. James Scalf, Rev. J. H. Philpot, Rev. Mark Waddell, Rev. Clyde Dupin, Rev. Hamsley, Rev. Carter, and Rev. Harvard Warren to the Conference. They were welcomed and given honorary seats within the Conference bar.

The following transfers were accepted—Rev. Harvard Warren, a licensed minister from the Michigan District; Rev. E. E. Leading-ham, an ordained minister from the Idaho-Washington District; and Rev. Eldred Basham, a licensed minister from the California District.

The District Superintendent presented three new churches to the Conference, namely: Shelbyville, Waco, and Confluence. It was moved and carried that we receive these new churches into the Conference.

The District Superintendent read his splendid report which was received with a hearty Amen.

The Assistant Superintendent's report was read and accepted.

The Auditing Committee's report was read and accepted. The District Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The Gamp Meeting Treasurer's report was read and accepted. The General Secretary, Rev. S. M. Stikeleather, was seated upon the platform.

The Conference adjourned until 1:30 P. M. We were dismissed by Bro. Carter.

THIRD SITTING

Conference reconvened at 1:30 P. M. Dr. Andrew Johnson, a Methodist evangelist, spoke to the Conference on the evils of the liquor traffic. His message was heartily received and endorsed by the Conference. It was a privilege to have Dr. Johnson address the Conference.

The minutes of the preceding sitting were read and approved.

The statistician's report was read and accepted.

Motion made and seconded that the District Superintendent check with each church regarding the revaluation of all church property. Carried.

The Resolution Committee presented its report.

- Resolved: That the District Superintendent appoint a special 1. committee to stay after Camp for the purpose of cleaning up the Camp Ground. Carried. Resolved: That in addition to the present zone officers, name-ly Zone Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer, and Young Peo-
- $\mathbf{2}$. ple's Chairman, that we also have a Sunday School representative, Missionary Chairman, and a Junior Missionary Chairman, all to be under the leadership of the District Superintendent. Carried.
- Was tabled because the Manual, page 49, section 65, contains 3. similar admonition on worldliness.

The Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee presented the following:

1. We recommend: That the rates for the Camp be changed to read as follows: That the registration fees be \$5.00 and work assigned, \$10.00 and no work assigned. This rate is to include all persons from the age of 12 years and older. From 6 to 12 years of age, the rate is to be \$2.50 and those under 6 shall be registered free. Sunday breakfast and supper will be 25c and all other meals will be 50c. Dormitory rooms and cabins will be \$10.00.

This was amended to read as follows: That all meals be 50c. Carried.

- 2. We recommend: That a flat rate of \$1.00 be charged for electricity used in cabins and house trailers on the grounds, the same to be paid by those using said trailers and cabins when registering. Carried.
- 3. We recommend: That whereas No. 27 in the Resolution Committee's report provides that the Young People's Executive Secretary conduct a rally in each zone each year, therefore, we recommend that an offering be taken in the afternoon service for his traveling expenses. This recommendation is to be a substitute for No. 5.
- 4. We recommend: That Recommendation No. 12 be changed to read from 4c per mile to 5c per mile. Carried.
- 5. We recommend: That Recommendation No. 13 be changed to read from 4c per mile to 5c per mile. Carried.
- 6. We recommend: That as a Substitute for No. 14 that the matter of the pastor's salary be taken care of by the District Superintendent or his Assistant at the time of the Annual Meeting. Carried.

A motion was made and carried that the District Council be given authority to set the amount for the District Superintendent's salary; a pay raise to be granted if possible.

The District Secretary read the following Memorials to General Conference:

- 1. Whereas, our pastors are called for 1 to 3 years, therefore, be it resolved that the District Superintendent shall be elected for a 2 year term, after serving the first year. Carried.
- 2. Be it resolved that there be some provision made for the aid of weak, organized districts. Carried.

We adjourned by the expiration of time.

FOURTH SITTING

The Conference met at 7:15 A. M. The Conference joined in singing "What A Friend We Have in Jesus." We were led in prayer by Bro. Terry Ragland.

Rev. L. W. Sturk then spoke briefly to the Conference on the subject of "Misunderstandings." He stated that most of the heartaches that come to God's people come through misunderstandings. He emphasized that every man stands or falls before his own Master. That there is coming a Day of Judgment, and That we do not know the motives of others.

We were adjourned until the next sitting.

Conference reconvened at 9:00 A. M. by singing "Draw Me Nearer" led by Rev. C. L. Oden. We were led in prayer by Rev. S. M. Stikeleather.

The report of the Educational Board was read and accepted.

We were refreshed by Bro. Sturk singing "I Won't Have to Cross Jordan Alone.'

Rev. J. H. Philpot was given an honorary seat upon the platform. Moved and carried that we have the election of officers.

Moved and carried that the District Superintendent appoint tellers.

The District Superintendent appointed Terry P. Ragland, Har-vard Warren, W. K. George, J. W. James, C. W. Keyes, Ralph Oden, Paul_Ebright, and James Buckles.

Ballots were cast for District Superintendent. Rev. L. S. Houston was overwhelmingly elected on the first ballot. A rising vote of thanks was given Bro. Houston for his untiring efforts during the past vear.

Ballots were cast for Assistant Superintendent. Rev. C. L. Oden was elected as Assistant Superintendent.

Ballots were cast for District Secretary. Rev. R. L. Goodman was elected.

The District Council recommended Rev. Ralph Tromble as Treasurer. He was re-elected by acclamation.

Ballots were cast for the three Advisory Members of the District Council.

Ballots were cast for one member of the Examining Board.

Ballots were cast for one member of the Educational Board.

Ballots were cast for the Ministerial Delegates to the General Conference. Motion made and carried that we write six names on each ballot, and the six receiving highest number of votes to be delegates to the General Conference and the next six highest to be the alternates.

We were recessed for 15 minutes to permit the tellers to complete the count of the ballots.

After reconvening, the tellers made their report. Rev. R. E. Bell, Rev. F. M. Singleton, and Rev. H. H. Barber were elected as Advisory members of the District Council.

Rev. F. M. Singleton was elected on the Examining Board. Rev. Terry Ragland was elected on the Educational Board.

The reception committee presented Rev. R. L. Hill, Bro. and Sister Todd, Rev. Locker, Rev. James Buckles, Rev. W. W. Tromble, and Rev. Ralph Oden to the Conference.

Moved and carried that we adjourn until 2:00 P. M.

The members of the Conference stood and sang "Blessed Assurance." We were dismissed with prayer by Bro. Ragland.

SIXTH SITTING

The Conference reconvened at 2:00 P. M. with a short devotional service.

A report was given on the election of Ministerial Delegates and Alternates to the General Conference. Rev. R. E. Bell, Rev. Terry P. Ragland, Rev. H. H. Bolender, Rev. Neal Horton, Rev. F. M. Single-ton, and Rev. H. H. Barber were elected Delegates. Rev. C. W. Keyes, Rev. C. C. Mayle, Rev. P. O. Carpenter, Rev. E. E. Leadingham, Rev. Commodore Manning, and Rev. Virgil Green were elected alternates.

Moved and carried that we permit each pastor to submit a name

of one of his laymen to be a nominee for lay delegate to General Conference and that the four receiving highest number of votes to be lay delegates and the next four highest to be alternates.

Ballots were cast for the Lay Delegates to the General Conference.

The reception committee presented Rev. C. E. Johnson from the Alabama District to the Conference. Bro. Johnson was given an honorary seat within the Conference bar.

The tellers made their report on the ballots cast for Lay Delegates. Mrs. P. O. Carpenter, Robert White, A. C. Thum, and Mary Cunningham were elected delegates. Mrs. Katharine Acree, Dorman Castle, Mrs. S. R. Wiley, and Mrs. S. M. Stikeleather were elected alternates.

The Condolence Committee's report was read and accepted as submitted.

The Chair had the promise of 400 new Advocate subscriptions for the coming year.

Rev. W. K. George, Sunday School Promotional Secretary, gave his report and it was accepted. He also presented the Sunday School awards to Falmouth church for largest numerical gain and to Willard church for highest percentage gain.

It was moved and carried that we accept the invitation of the Paris church to entertain the Ministerial Convention.

The District Superintendent appointed his committees.

The following Memorials to General Conference were presented and accepted.

- 3. Whereas, the District Superintendent recommends pastors for the local churches to vote on; therefore, be it resolved, that the Presiding Officer in the District Conference present names of competent men for the Conference to vote on for District Superintendent. These men are to be recommended by the Executive Council of the church and each name is to be voted on separately by a "Yes" or "No" vote in order as recommended by the Executive Council.
- 4. Whereas, the present trend toward worldliness in dress is very evident and increasing rapidly in our ranks, and whereas, so much depends upon the leaders and the standards they carry; therefore, be it resolved that more specific and definite statements be incorporated in the "Special Rules" in our Manual, in order to check this worldly trend and to make more clear the standards of our church along these lines.
- 5. Whereas, it is the practice of local churches when renewing pastoral relations to simplify procedure by first casting a "yes" or "no" ballot, confined to the minister currently serving; therefore, be it resolved that we memorialize the General Conference that the same procedure be used in voting for a District Superintendent who is being considered to succeed himself in office.
- 6. Whereas, the General Officials, as well as certain District Officers, are elected on a two-thirds vote and in voting for these officers many ballots may be cast until an election is made; therefore, be it resolved, that in the recall of a pastor the church shall be permitted, in cases where the pastor is not recalled on the first ballot, to vote as many as three times on said recall.

We were adjourned until the ordination service at 6:00 P. M.

The Ordination Service was opened at 6:00 P. M. Friday, with Rev. C. L. Oden leading in singing "A Charge to Keep I Have," and "Must Jesus Bear the Cross Alone." Rev. F. M. Singleton read I Timothy 3:1-8, and Rev. Ralph Tromble read II Timothy 4:1-8. Rev. L. S. Houston led in prayer. Rev. L. W. Sturk then spoke to the candidates for ordination on

District Superintendent

1. Resolved: That the District Superintendent make two trips over the District during the year, and give more time to the smaller churches as needed.

2. Resolved: That the District Superintendent be consulted and present if possible, when drawing up all deeds in the district, and see that all deeds be abstracted.

3. Resolved: That the Assistant Superintendent be a member of our Zone Bible School Board.

Council

5. Resolved: That the District Council be vested with full power to construct buildings for the District when necessary, appointing and directing a committee to carry out its plan.

6. Resolved: That the District Council set the date for the Ministerial Convention and said date to be recorded in the minutes.

Resolved: That the District Council appoint all pastors for 7. new missions for the first five years of their existence, or until said Council decides to do otherwise.

Resolved: That we, as a Conference, delegate to the Council, power to make rules and by-laws regulating the sale of lots, and the building of cottages, and to govern the Camp grounds; same to be printed in the minutes.

Resolved. That the District Council make provision for the planting of more shade trees on the Camp grounds.

10. Resolved: That a Missionary Committee of three be appointed by the District Council. The duty of this committee shall be to encourage the organization and development of local missionary societies, and help to direct their activities in the interest of Foreign, General, and District Home Missions.

Resolved: That the District Council be given power to re-11. zone the churches of the district when necessary.

Churches

12. Resolved: That each church supply the Camp with two each of the following: Cups, plates, glasses, large spoons, sheets, straw ticks, cereal dishes and one pitcher.

13. Resolved: That each church close its books on the last day of each month, and the reports be sent to the District Treasurer immediately.

14. Resolved: That each preacher and deaconess send a copy of their reports to the Statistician, not later than 10 days after the Con-ference year closes, which is the 30th day of June; and that the Statistician disregard any and all reports received thereafter. Be it also resolved: that the District Treasurer's books close at noon on the tenth day of July.

15. Resolved: That whereas many of our pastors have not received sufficient financial support, be it resolved that each local church appoint one prayer-meeting night each month as "Donation Night," at which time food stuff and provisions shall be brought together for the pastor. Be it also resolved: that an agitator be appointed for the coming year by the Superintendent at the Annual Business Meeting.

16. Resolved: That since it is a matter of great importance for the Pastors of the District to attend the Camp and Conference, be it therefore resolved; that the pastor's support at the church where he is assigned as pastor, shall continue over the two Sundays he attends said Camp and Conference and the first Sunday following.

We further recommend that the Superintendent or representative from each Sunday School attend said Convention, taking notes to be used in Sunday School meetings in the local church.

24. Resolved: That each Sunday School endeavor to establish another Sunday School other than their own this year.

25. Resolved: That each Sunday School be given credit for the number of scholars from their church attending Sunday School at our Camp.

26. Resolved: That the Sunday School Service at camp be under the supervision of the District Sunday School Board.

Young People

51. Resolved: That we register all who come to camp, assigning work to each one as equally as possible. A meal ticket will be given all who register, same to be presented at the dining room door.

52.Resolved: That the District Superintendent, his wife and our registered nurse, be registered free for the Camp and Conference. Be it further resolved: that the District Superintendent, his wife, the nurse, and called workers for the Camp and Conference be entertained free at the lunch stand.

Resolved: That we give space in the book room for a table 53 and some one to take subscriptions to the Advocate, Youth News, and our Missionary Bulletins.

Resolved: That all who disregard the following rules be 54 answerable to the District Council:

A. All pastors shall instruct their churches and young people that all who come to Camp shall abide by its every rule.

Everyone shall retire, or be quiet, after 11 p. m. B.

C. A Dean shall be appointed over each Dormitory.

D. No single young person shall be allowed off the grounds after 7 p. m.

E. No articles shall be taken from the kitchen or dining room without permission from the one in charge, and any article taken shall be returned in good condition.

F. No food shall be taken from the kitchen without permission.

G. Parents shall supervise the conduct of their children while on the camp ground.

H. A Supervisor shall be appointed for the dining room and kitchen; parking of cars and care of the tabernacle; for the lunch and book room; for registration and cleaning of the grounds. These to be appointed by the Camp Meeting committee.

55. Resolved: That we have the registration for the Dormitory Rooms to begin at Thursday noon before Camp, using the "first come, first serve" method. Workers for camp preparation be given priority to rooms in Dormitory.

56. Resolved: That all preachers give three days labor, or pay the equivalent, in developing the Camp grounds, or in preparation for the District Camp and Conference when called upon by the District Superintendent.

57. Resolved: That whereas we have a large number of children on our camp ground during camp meeting. Be it resolved that a fund be established to provide the necessary equipment for the supervised playground on said camp ground, using the offering from the chil-dren's service to apply on the equipment. 58. Resolved: That all cabin owners furnish their own mat-

tresses for their cabin.

59. Resolved: That the Camp Meeting Committee meet at the Ministerial Convention and plan for the preparing of the Camp

60. Resolved: That the District Superintendent appoint a special committee to stay after camp for the purpose of cleaning up the Camp Ground.

Miscellaneous

61. Resolved: That no one person serve on more than one committee where competent persons are available.

62. Resolved: That each church plan for a Daily Vacation Bible School.

63. Resolved: Whereas there is a dissatisfaction in regard to workers for Camp preparation; Be it resolved the camp meeting committee be enlarged to twelve to take care of this work and any others who come and eat in the dining room before Thursday that they be charged the regular price for each meal until Thursday noon, unless called by the District Superintendent. Furthermore, only these workers have priority to Dormitory rooms.

64. Resolved: That whereas there is a need for stimulation of interest in the Home Missionary work of the District, also reports on the Sunday School attendance would be a help and of interest to the District; therefore, be it resolved that we have a District Bulletin mimeographed each month and distributed to our churches giving Sunday School attendance, also reports from our District Home Missionaries.

65. Resolved: That we have 700 copies of the District Minutes printed to sell for 25c per copy.

66. Resolved: That this Conference give a rising vote of thanks to our Presiding Officer, the General Superintendent, Rev. L. W. Sturk; our Camp Evangelist, Rev. J. H. Philpot; our singers, Rev. and Mrs. Mark Waddell; our Children's Worker, Mrs. Louise Lynn; Young People's Evangelist, Rev. Terry P. Ragland; Foreign Missionary Representative, Rev. N. N. Bonner; Home Missionary Representative, Rev. J. A. Simmons; Frankfort Pilgrim College representative, Rev. Tommy Holshouser; our beloved District Superintendent and wife, Rev. and Mrs. L. S. Houston; our District officials; our Young People's Executive Secretary, Rev. H. C. Beavers; the heads of each department; Dining room, Rev. and Mrs. H. H. Bolender; Registration Office, Rev. and Mrs. F. M. McNurlin; Lunch Room, Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Rouse; Book Room, Rev. and Mrs. Terry P. Ragland; Camp Chairman, Rev. Virgil Green; Police, Rev. RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

We recommend: That each Sunday School of our district pay one dollar per month for a portable tabernacle fund. We further recommend that each Sunday School adopt the birthday offering plan, said offering to go toward the tabernacle and Home Missionary funds.

We recommend: That each Church take a free will offering for the District Superintendent on all his visits, and the same to be sent in by the local treasurer and applied on the Superintendent's traveling expense.

We recommend: That whereas there is a pressing need for buildings to house our people, that each church or individual buying a lot be asked to build a cabin on said lot within five years, and in case they fail to do so, the lot to be put up for resale. Furthermore, we recommend that hose who purchased lots prior to this date, be contacted by our District Superintendent, urging them to build a cabin within three years or give the District the privilege of reselling their lot.

We recommend that whereas our district home missions and 4 church extension loan fund is being supervised by our district council, and they are placing all designated funds in this department, that the amount of interest be 2% on all loans.

We further recommend that our pastors urge their people to contribute to this fund by means of wills, legacies, gifts, etc.

5. We recommend: That when the Executive Young People's Secretary conducts a rally in the zone meetings, that an offering be taken in the afternoon service for his traveling expenses.

6. We recommend: That each church pay the registration fee of their pastor and wife; also the church delegate to the District Con-ference; this to be raised by the District Superintendent at the annual business meeting, and also an offering be taken for their traveling

7. We recommend that the District Treasurer be paid one 7. We recommend that the District Secretary be paid seventy-five (\$75.00) dollars per year; the same to be paid in equal monthly payments, and that the statistician be paid twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars per year.

8. We recommend: That each church have a missionary prayer service each month; and also a monthly missionary service on the Lord's Day, and an offering be taken at this service for Foreign Missions.

We recommend: That each church and Sunday School send 9. 10 per cent of their regular offerings to the District Treasurer exception being made to the Building Fund, Evangelist, General Obliga-tions, and Special Offerings. 10. We recommend: That the District Treasurer send out to

each local church quarterly statements showing amounts due in each department.

11. We recommend that the District buy the extra books to complete those needed for the ministerial course of study.

12. We recommend: That the District Superintendent's salary be twenty-five hundred and twenty dollars (\$2520.00) per year, and that the District pay his utility bills, and that he be granted two weeks' vacation with pay; also, that he be paid seven cents per mile for traveling expenses.

13. We recommend that the Assistant Superintendent be allowed expense for meals bought while working in District work, and that he be given 5c cents per mile for traveling expenses.

14. We recommend: That the churches pay their pastor a salary at least equal to the average wages of the working people of the church, and that the matter of the pastor's salary be taken care of by the District Superintendent or his Assistant at the time of the annual meeting.

15. We recommend: That in compliance with the action of the General Conference, our General Budget be \$5.50 per member, to be divided as follows: Foreign Missions \$2.00; General Church Extension, \$1.00; General Administrative Expense, \$1.00; General Church Extension Loan Fund, \$.50; Senior Church School, \$.75; and the General Sunday School, \$.25.

16. We recommend: That the district budget be divided as follows: Superintendent's expense, 50 per cent; Sinking fund, 30 per cent; District parsonage, 10 per cent; Camp budget, 5 per cent; General Conference expense, 3 per cent; Bible School, 2 per cent.

17. We recommend: That each local church send to the District Treasurer the sum equivalent to 20c per member for the Camp Evangelist offering.

18. We recommend: That whereas a Camp Meeting Association has been formed for the purpose of the promotion of the Camp, that each member continue to pay at least \$1.00 per year. This is to be a standing pledge.

19. We recommend: That all moneys be turned over to the local church treasurer from the different departments of the church at the end of each month; and that the local church treasurer pay all the bills.

20. We recommend: That each Church take steps to raise their offerings for revivals at least 30 days before the revival begins.

21. We recommend: That when a mission is organized into a church it shall not be asked to pay District Budget for one year from the following Conference, and 50 per cent for the two following years.

22. We recommend: That an offering be taken in each zone meeting for the expense of the promotion of the Sunday School work in the District.

23. We recommend: That whereas the 1946 General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church adopted the "Pension Plan" to aid retired and disabled ministers, and whereas each District Conference is asked to contribute 4 per cent of the Pastor's salary, lay worker's salary, Evangelist's offerings, etc., to said Pension Fund, whereas this Conference has voted to fully cooperate with the General Board of Pensions in this matter. We recommend: That we adopt this plan of financing it, namely: That each local church may pay the equivalent of 49 per cent of the Evangelist's tithe who are members of said church, and 4 per cent of the pastor's salary. This to be sent monthly to the District Treasurer. All members of the Pension Fund Plan should pay 2 per cent of salary and offerings as reported to the conference.

24. We recommend: That each Sunday School set aside one Sunday each month and that 50 per cent of said Sunday's offering be given for District Home Missions.

RULES GOVERNING SALE OF LOTS AND BUILDING COTTAGES

Price of lots, \$20.00 each. Terms: \$5.00 down payment when purchased, balance to be paid in monthly payments of \$3.00 each. Six per cent on unpaid balance at maturity. All lots are to be paid for in six months or contract is void.

All outside lots in the old plot shall be of this dimension, 20 feet in width and 30 feet in length. Inside lots shall be 20x20. All lots in the new plot shall be 20x30 feet. All cottages are to be uniform in size and placements on lots in accordance with the row or street on which they may be placed. The dimensions of the cottages are to be 10x12 feet, with an 8-foot eave, six concrete piers, one door and two windows, a screen door, and either a metal or asphalt roof. The building is to be made of dressed lumber, either boxed or framed, and to have two coats of white paint. An extension of nine feet may be built on any of the cabins on an outside lot of the old plot, such additions to be of the same dimensions as that of the cabin with a window on each side. A porch may be built on the front of any and all cottages. Cabins on the new plot may be either single or double.

The District Council holds the right to paint or repair in any way necessary, unless the owner does the work himself, and the owner is to pay the expense of same. Aluminum paint only is to be used on the metal roof. The District Council is to keep all buildings insured and the owner of each cottage is to pay his part of the premium.

RATES FOR THE CAMP

Registration fees: \$5.00 and work assigned; \$10.00 and no work assigned. This rate is to include all persons from 12 years of age and over. Those from 6 through 12 years will be registered for \$2.50 and those under 6 shall be registered free. All meals will be fifty cents. Dormitory rooms and cabins \$10.00 each.

NOTE: Registration for the "Dormitory Rooms" to begin at Thursday noon, before camp, using the "first come, first served" method; workers for camp preparation to be given priority to rooms in dormitory.

A flat rate of \$1.00 shall be charged for electricity used in cabins and house trailers on the ground, the same to be paid by those using said trailers and cabins when registering.
