

FIRST SITTING

The Forty-Fifth Annual Conference of the Kentucky District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at the Tabernacle on August 5, 1954, at 7:15 A. M. with our District Superintendent, Rev. L. S. Houston, in charge.

The members of the Conference joined together in singing "Amazing Grace" and then met at the altar for a season of special prayer.

Rev. L. W. Sturk, General Superintendent, was then presented to the Conference. He briefly gave the outline for his message to us and we were dismissed until the 9:00 A. M. sitting.

SECOND SITTING

Conference reconvened at 9:10 A. M. by singing "Glory to His Name." We were led in prayer by Rev. S. M. Stikeleather.
Rev. L. W. Sturk, General Superintendent, took the chair. He

BASIC QUALIFICATION

The basic qualification for the minister is a heart experience of grace.

Brother Sturk then led the congregation in singing "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms.'

The roll call of the ministers and delegates was made.

Moved and carried that the first ten (10) seats across the Tabernacle including the platform, serve as the Conference bar.

The Reception Committee presented Rev. and Mrs. Denver Mus-

ser, Rev. W. E. Honeycutt, Rev. Lynden Haynes, and Rev. and Mrs. Wilmer King to the Conference. They were granted honorary seats within the Conference bar.

Moved and carried that we have the same sittings as last year—: 7:15-8:00 A. M. 9:00-11:45 A. M., and 1:30-4:45 P. M.

Moved and carried that we proceed with the election of District Officials immediately after all reports have been read.

The District Superintendent read his splendid report which was received with a rising vote of appreciation.

The Assistant District Superintendent's report was read and accepted with a hearty Amen.

The Auditing report was read and accepted.

The District Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The Camp Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The following transfers were accepted: Rev. Denver Musser, ordained minister from the West Virginia District; Rev. John Stewart, licensed minister from the Northern Indiana District; Rev. Robert Grandstaff, licensed minister from the Free Methodist Church; Rev. Lynden Haynes, licensed minister from the West Virginia District; and Rev. and Mrs. Jason H. Sherwood, ordained ministers from the Ohio District.

Moved and carried that Rev. W. J. Mercer, local minister, be granted a seat within the Conference bar as he is serving as a pastor.

As the major reports were in, the General Superintendent instructed the Conference to prepare for the election of officers and Rev. L. S. Houston, District Superintendent, appointed the tellers.

Ballots were cast for District Superintendent. Rev. Ralph Tromble was elected as District Superintendent.

The Conference was dismissed until the afternoon sitting.

THIRD SITTING

The Conference reconvened at 1:30 P. M. by singing "Give Me Oil in My Lamp." Rev. Denver Musser led in prayer.

Ballots were cast for the two vacancies on the Educational Board. Rev. R. D. Christman, and Rev. S. M. Stikeleather were elected to fill the vacancies.

Invitations were received for the Spring Ministerial Convention. The Conference voted to accept the invitation of the Frankfort Church.

We adjourned at 4:55 P. M.

Substitute for No. 15 was accepted.

The following new recommendations were presented.

Be it further resolved that when the local church treasurer's reports are made to the local church, that the bank statements be made available and balance be shown to check with the treasurer's record. Carried.

Moved and carried that a letter be sent to each local church by the District Secretary concerning the new recommendation, also that each church be notified of the change in the General Budget.

The following were recommended by the District Council for ordination: Rev. Paul Ebright, Rev. Charles Lowry, Rev. F. M. McNurlin, and Rev. Harvard Warren. They were accepted.

The Conference recessed at 10:45 A. M. to prepare for the Ordination Service at 11:00 A. M.

It was moved and carried that the council be delegated authority to work out a system of renting dormitory rooms, and to correct any resolution in the Minutes that conflicts.

The Ways and Means Committee presented a Substitute for No.

17 which was accepted.

The report of the Educational Board was read and accepted.

The District Superintendent, Rev. Ralph Tromble, read his list

of committees for the coming year.

The Report of the Memorials Committee was read and accepted. The report of the Sunday School Promotional Secretary was read and accepted. Rev. C. W. Keyes then presented a certificate to Rev. R. L. Aspen Grove—Painted exterior of church and built chimney with other improvements and now beginning new parsonage.

Augusta—Paid a considerable amount on indebtedness and gained 100 percent in membership.

Carlisle-Papered and painted parsonage; also painted interior and exterior of church.

Carrollton—Redecorated S. S. rooms, installed sewerage for church, parsonage, and house trailer parking installed, rest rooms in basement of Church.

Central City—Papared and painted part of parsonage.

Clay-Installed furnace, bath room fixtures, sanded floors in Auditorium with other improvements.

Garvin Hill—Built annex to Church, painted and ceiled with knotty pine, painted parsonage.

Greenup—Painted exterior of Church, also interior of Church and parsonage, purchased three lovely pulpit chairs.

Hitchins—Papered and painted three rooms in parsonage, sheet rocked two rooms, installed rollaway doors in garage, installed Venetian shades in parsonage, underpinned and painted Church, built belfry, installed art glass windows, rewired church completely, and installed new light fixtures, ceiled Church and built concrete Stairway to Memorial S. S. Building with other improvements.

Hopewell—Installed furnace, redecorated interior of Church and building S. S. rooms under Church.

The duty of this committee shall be to encourage the organization and development of local missionary societies, and help to direct their activities in the interest of Foreign, General, and District Home Missions.

11. Resolved: That the District Council be given power to re-

39. Resolved: That each pastor send the obituary of deceased members of his church to the Chairman of the Condolence Committee immediately following the funeral.

40. Resolved: That every active pastor be given two weeks va-

Richard Hawkins; Frankfort Pilgrim College Representatives; District Superintendent and Wife; our District Officials; the heads of each department; the cooks, and all others who served untiringly to make the Camp a blessing to others.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

- 1. We recommend: That each Sunday School of our district pay one dollar per month for a portable tabernacle fund. We further recommend that each Sunday School adopt the birthday offering plan, said offering to go toward the tabernacle and Home Missionary funds.
- 2. We recommend: That each Church take a free will offering for the District Superintendent on all his visits, and the same to be sent in by the local treasurer and applied on the Superintendent's traveling expense.
- 3. We recommend: That whereas there is a pressing need for buildings to house our people, that each church or individual buying a lot be asked to build a cabin on said lot within three years, and in case they fail to do so, the lot to be put up for resale. Furthermore, we recommend that those who purchased lots prior to this date, be contacted by our District Superintendent, urging them to build a cabin within two years or give the District the privilege of reselling their lot.
- 4. We recommend that whereas our district home missions and church extension loan fund is being supervised by our district council, and they are placing all designated funds in this department, that the amount of interest be 2% on all loans.

We further recommend that our pastors urge their people to con-

tribute to this fund by means of wills, legacies, gifts, etc.

- 5. We recommend: That when the Executive Young People's Secretary conducts a rally in the zone meetings, that an offering be taken in the afternoon service for his traveling expenses.
- 6. We recommend: That each church pay the registration fee of their pastor and wife; also the church delegate to the District Conference; this to be raised by the District Superintendent at the annual business meeting, and also an offering be taken for their traveling expense.
- 7. We recommend that the District Treasurer be paid one hundred fifty (\$150.00) dollars per year, and the District Secretary be paid seventy-five (\$75.00) dollars per year; the same to be paid in equal monthly payments, and that the statistician be paid twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars per year.
- 8. We recommend: That each church have a missionary prayer service each month; and also a monthly missionary service on the Lord's Day, and an offering be taken at this service for Foreign Missions.
- 9. We recommend: That each church and Sunday School send 10 per cent of their regular offerings to the District Treasurer exception being made to the Building Fund, Evangelist, General Obligations, and Special Offerings.
- 10. We recommend: That the District Treasurer send out to each local church quarterly statements showing amounts due in each department.
- 11. We recommend that the District buy the extra books to complete those needed for the ministerial course of study.
- 12. We recommend: That the District Superintendent's salary be twenty-five hundred and twenty dollars (\$2520.00) per year, and that the District pay his utility bills, and that he be granted two weeks' vacation with pay; also, that he be paid seven cents per mile for traveling expenses.

13. We recommend that the Assistant Superintendent be allowed expense for meals bought while working in District work, and that

he be given 5c cents per mile for traveling expenses.

14. We recommend: That the churches pay their pastor a salary at least equal to the average wages of the working people of the church, and that the matter of the pastor's salary be taken care of by the District Superintendent or his Assistant at the time of the annual

We recommend: That in compliance with the action of the General Conference, our General Budget be \$6.00 per member, to be divided as follows: Foreign Missions 35%; General Church Extension 25%; General Administrative Expense 20%; Senior Church School 10%; General Church Extension Loan Fund 6%; and the General Sunday School 4%. This amount is to be sent to the Dis-

trict Treasurer in a lump sum each month as General Budget.
16. We recommend: That the district budget be divided as fol-

lows: Superintendent's expense, 50 per cent; Sinking fund, 30 per cent; District parsonage, 10 per cent; Camp budget, 5 per cent; General Conference expense, 3 per cent; Bible School, 2 per cent.

17. We recommend: That the District raise one thousand dollars per year to assist on the Camp meeting; the same to be raised by each local church giving the sum equivalent to one dollar per member, the sum to be sent to the District Treasurer.

18. We recommend: That whereas a Camp Meeting Association has been formed for the purpose of the promotion of the Camp, that each member continue to pay at least \$1.00 per year. This is to be a

standing pledge.
19. We recommend: That all moneys be turned over to the local church treasurer from the different departments of the church at the end of each month; and that the local church treasurer pay all the bills as directed by the Church Board.

20. We recommend: That each Church take steps to raise their

offerings for revivals at least 30 days before the revival begins.

- 21. We recommend: That when a mission is organized into a church it shall not be asked to pay District Budget for one year from the following Conference, and 50 per cent for the two following years.
- 22. We recommend: That an offering be taken in each zone meeting for the expense of the promotion of the Sunday School work in the District.
- We recommend: That whereas the 1946 General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church adopted the "Pension Plan" to aid retired and disabled ministers, and whereas each District Conference is asked to contribute 4 per cent of the Pastor's salary, lay worker's salary, Evangelist's offerings, etc., to said Pension Fund, whereas this Conference has voted to fully cooperate with the General Board of Pensions in this matter. We recommend: That we adopt this plan of financing it, namely: That each local church may pay the equivalent of 40 per cent of the Evangelist's tithe, who are members of said church, and 4 per cent of the pastor's salary. This to be sent monthly to the District Treasurer. All members of the Pension Fund Plan should pay 2 per cent of salary and offerings as reported to the conference.
- 24. We recommend: That each Sunday School set aside one Sunday each month and that 50 per cent of said Sunday's offering be given for District Home Missions.
- 25. We recommend: That in order to encourage our local churches to observe sound and acceptable business practices in the handling of local church funds, that therefore, be it resolved that two

local church board members, other than the treasurer, count and make a record of the offerings as received, and then turn over immediately to the local church treasurer these funds and their records for further check and bank deposit. Be it further resolved that when the local church treasurer's reports are made to the local church, that the bank statements be made available and balance be shown to check with the treasurer's record.

Twenty-six of our Sunday Schools of Kentucky show a gain, and nineteen show a loss. Four remain the same as last year.

Our average attendance for 1953 was 2,983. Our average attend-

ance for this year is 3,187. A gain of 204.

I attended the Sunday School Leaders Institute at Frankfort, Indiana in March of this year.

I traveled over a thousand miles in the district in the interest of our Sunday Schools, spoke in three zone meetings, secured the services of Brother and Sister Robbins of Hamilton, Ohio, for a one day Sunday School convention in the Lexington zone.

We also printed a monthly Sunday School bulletin the past year, and mailed a copy to each of our pastors monthly. Ninety-five percent of our pastors co-operated by sending their monthly reports promptly. We rather enjoyed the experience.

Sad to say some of our Sunday Schools are smaller than they were fifteen years ago, and some are smaller than they were when

they were started.

I believe if we work at the job, our Sunday Schools will grow. Our goal for next year is 10% increase, will we make it?

RULES GOVERNING SALE OF LOTS AND BUILDING COTTAGES

Price of lots, \$20.00 each. Terms: \$5.00 down payment when purchased, balance to be paid in monthly payments of \$3.00 each. Six per cent on unpaid balance at maturity. All lots are to be paid for in six months or contract is void.

All outside lots in the old plot shall be of this dimension, 20 feet in width and 30 feet in length. Inside lots shall be 20x20. All lots in the new plot shall be 20x30 feet. All cottages are to be uniform in size and placements on lots in accordance with the row or street on which they may be placed. The dimensions of the cottages are to be 10x12 feet, with an 8-foot eave, six concrete piers, one door and two windows, a screen door, and either a metal or asphalt roof. The building is to be made of dressed lumber, either boxed or framed, and to have two coats of white paint. An extension of nine feet may be built on any of the cabins on an outside lot of the old plot, such additions to be of the same dimensions as that of the cabin with a window on each side. A porch may be built on the front of any and all cottages. Cabins on the new plot may be either single or double.

The District Council holds the right to paint or repair in any way necessary, unless the owner does the work himself, and the owner is to pay the expense of same. Aluminum paint only is to be used on the metal roof. The District Council is to keep all buildings insured and the owner of each cottage is to pay his part of the premium.

RATES FOR THE CAMP

Registration fees: \$5.00 and work assigned; \$10.00 and no work assigned. This rate is to include all persons from 12 years of age and over. Those from 6 through 12 years will be registered for \$2.50 and those under 6 shall be registered free. All meals will be fifty cents. Dormitory rooms and cabins \$10.00 each.

A flat rate of \$1.00 shall be charged for electricity used in cabins and house trailers on the ground, the same to be paid by those using said trailers and cabins when registering.
