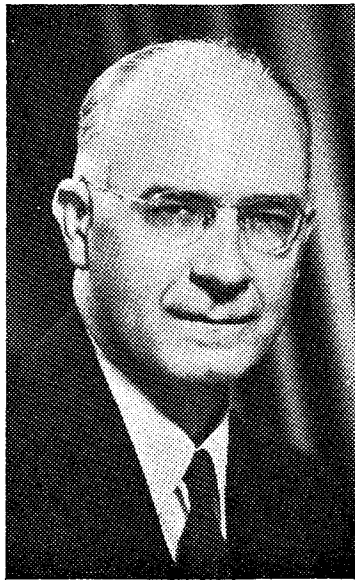

4. A burden for souls will bring results at our altars

#### III. BASIC QUALIFICATION

1. The basic qualification for the minister is a heart experience of grace.

Moved and carried that we proceed with the election of District Officials immediately after all reports have been read.

The District Superintendent read his splendid report which was received with a rising vote of appreciation.

The Assistant District Superintendent's report was read and accepted with a hearty Amen.

The Auditing report was read and accepted.

The District Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The Camp Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

Ballots were cast for District Superintendent. Rev. Ralph Tromble was elected as District Superintendent.

The Conference was dismissed until the afternoon sitting.

Ballots were cast for the three Advisory members of the Council. Rev. R. E. Bell, Rev. C. W. Keyes, and Rev. L. S. Houston were elected.

Ballots were cast for the vacancy on the Examining Board. Rev. E. E. Leadingham was elected.

The Conference was refreshed by Bro. Sturk singing our favorite, "I Won't Have to Cross Jordan Alone."

Ballots were cast for the two vacancies on the Educational Board. Rev. R. D. Christman, and Rev. S. M. Stikeleather were elected to fill the vacancies.

Invitations were received for the Spring Ministerial Convention. The Conference voted to accept the invitation of the Frankfort Church.

We adjourned at 4:55 P. M.

### FOURTH SITTING

The Conference reconvened at 7:15 A. M. Friday, August 6th, 1954. We enjoyed some stirring testimonies, after which Rev. Ralph Tromble, newly elected District Superintendent, led in prayer.

Rev. L. W. Sturk, General Superintendent, spoke to us from the subject:

2. Letting Down in Little Things.
3. The Danger of Losing the Glory.

We recessed until the 9:00 A. M. Sitting.

## FIFTH SITTING

Conference reconvened at 9:00 A. M. by singing "Hallelujah, What A Savior." Rev. L. W. Sturk spoke to us briefly on the necessity of Unity.

The Reception Committee presented Rev. and Mrs. Jason Sherwood to the Conference. They gave their testimony and were received with a hearty welcome.

The Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee presented its report:

Substitute for No. 3 was accepted.

Substitute for No. 19 was accepted.

Substitute for No. 15 was accepted.

Substitute for No. 23 was accepted.

The following new recommendations were presented.

We Recommend: That our churches pay all their bills by check which is to be countersigned by the pastor. This recommendation was referred back to the Committee.

We Recommend: That in order to encourage our local churches to observe sound and acceptable business practices in the handling of local church funds, that, be it resolved that two local church board members, other than the treasurer, count and make a record of the offerings as received, then turn over immediately to the local church treasurer these funds and their record for further check and bank deposit. Be it further resolved that when the local church treasurer's reports are made to the local church, that the bank statements be made available and balance be shown to check with the treasurer's record. Carried.

Moved and carried that a letter be sent to each local church by the District Secretary concerning the new recommendation, also that each church be notified of the change in the General Budget.

The following were recommended by the District Council for ordination: Rev. Paul Ebright, Rev. Charles Lowry, Rev. F. M. McNurlin, and Rev. Harvard Warren. They were accepted.

The Conference recessed at 10:45 A. M. to prepare for the Ordination Service at 11:00 A. M.

## ORDINATION SERVICE

The Ordination Service began at 11:00 A. M. with Rev. C. W. Keyes, leading in singing "Blessed Assurance" and "A Charge to Keep I Have." Rev. C. L. Oden read II Timothy 4:1-8 and Rev. Ralph Tromble read I Timothy 3:1-9. Rev. L. S. Houston led in prayer.

Rev. L. W. Sturk, General Superintendent, brought a very inspirational charge to the candidates for ordination. He spoke on the subject:

## THE CHARACTER OF PAUL—HIS CALL AND HIS COMMISSION

1. He enjoyed a genuine experience of grace.
  - a. A preacher must have a heart experience of grace or he will not be successful.
  - b. The laborer must first be partaker of his fruits.
  - c. Make sure there is nothing between him and God.
2. The Apostle received a definite call. "I have appointed unto thee to make thee an apostle."
  - a. A Call may be instantaneous.
  - b. A Call may be a growing concern until one has to go.
  - c. We need God's mantle of authority, as Elijah and Elisha.
3. He had an unquestionably clear testimony.
  - a. You may never learn the art of being a great preacher but can have a clear testimony.
  - b. Preach to be understood.
  - c. Preach two definite works of grace.
  - d. The minister must ever live with a clear conscience.
  - e. Paul climaxed his ministry with these words, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith."

Bro. Sturk concluded his message with the words of the song "Bringing in the Sheaves."

The second Resolution was accepted which is Resolution No. 66 in the present Minutes.

An addition to Resolution No. 57 was accepted.

A substitute for No. 41 was accepted.

An addition to No. 32 was accepted.

The Resolution concerning the renting of the dormitory rooms was lost as it was felt it did not answer the need.

The Resolution concerning Pilgrim ministers entering new fields was lost as the Manual, page 114, Section 163, already carries such instructions.

It was moved and carried that the council be delegated authority to work out a system of renting dormitory rooms, and to correct any resolution in the Minutes that conflicts.

The Ways and Means Committee presented a Substitute for No. 17 which was accepted.

The report of the Educational Board was read and accepted.

The District Superintendent, Rev. Ralph Tromble, read his list of committees for the coming year.

The Report of the Memorials Committee was read and accepted.

The report of the Sunday School Promotional Secretary was read and accepted. Rev. C. W. Keyes then presented a certificate to Rev. R. L. Goodman, pastor of the Paris church for having the highest percentage gain during the past Quadrennial. Rev. J. D. Trimble, pastor of the Somerset church, received two certificates for having the largest percentage and the largest numerical gains during the past year.

Moved and carried that the District Superintendent's picture be put in the New Minutes.

Moved and carried that the District Council be delegated authority to take care of all unfinished business.

The Conference expressed to our outgoing Superintendent and wife, who have resigned after fifteen years continuous service as District Superintendent, their appreciation by giving them a love offering.

Moved and carried that we give Rev. and Mrs. C. L. Oden a rising vote of appreciation for their many years of faithful labors among us, as they leave our District to take a pastorate at Decatur, Illinois.

Moved and carried that the District Secretary send Rev. and Mrs. H. H. Bolender a letter expressing our appreciation of their work with us and adding our prayers for God's blessings upon them in their new field at Clinton, Tennessee.

The evangelists of the District were presented to the Conference.

Moved and carried that the Secretary arrange page 25, Resolution No. 68 for the New Minutes.

The District Conference adjourned for the year 1954 at 4:25 P. M. Rev. C. L. Oden dismissed with prayer.

## CHURCHES ORGANIZED

We have organized the Tyrone work with nine members.

## NEW CHURCH BUILDINGS

We have built a beautiful church at Lewisport, and one at Morgantown which will shortly be occupied. An addition 16x54 to the Paris Church; also a lovely parsonage, five rooms and bath. At this time we are going up with the Church proper, at Somerset.

We have purchased large lot and starting new parsonage at Aspen Grove.

## CAMP IMPROVEMENTS

We have concreted Large Tabernacle, and built one new cabin, with some painting and cabin improvements. Built fence in rear of grounds.

## PROPERTY IMPROVEMENTS

**Ashland I**—Church built garage.

**Ashland II**—Installed large attic fan in church, painted basement, S. S. rooms, sanded floors, and painted interior of parsonage, bought two pulpit chairs and Christian and American flags, and fenced church lot.

**Aspen Grove**—Painted exterior of church and built chimney with other improvements and now beginning new parsonage.

**Augusta**—Paid a considerable amount on indebtedness and gained 100 percent in membership.

**Carlisle**—Papered and painted parsonage; also painted interior and exterior of church.

**Carrollton**—Redecorated S. S. rooms, installed sewerage for church, parsonage, and house trailer parking installed, rest rooms in basement of Church.

**Central City**—Papered and painted part of parsonage.

**Clay**—Installed furnace, bath room fixtures, sanded floors in Auditorium with other improvements.

**Cloverport**—Papered two rooms in parsonage and purchased a lot near Church.

**Confluence**—Laid top floor in new Church, painted exterior of Church.

**Covington I**—Class rooms upstairs all redecorated, one more classroom made in the basement, a ventilating fan for the Church, a P. A. System bought to use in street meetings.

**Cynthiana**—Installed new pews.

**Dalesburg**—Painted interior and exterior of Church and is going forward under the leadership of their new pastor, Bro. Robert Grandstaff.

**Elizabethtown**—Built large parking lot in rear of Church, installed two large window fans, and painted interior of parsonage, and at this time starting to build a large addition to their S. S. building.

**Flint Road**—Painted interior of Church.

- Frankfort**—Redecorated interior of parsonage, built front porch to apartment house, and decorated several rooms in apartments and made substantial payments on indebtedness.
- Fullerton**—Liquidated balance of indebtedness on Church and now starting to build S. S. rooms in rear of Church.
- Falmouth**—Decorated interior of parsonage. Paid debt on Church bus. Started decorating interior and exterior of Church.
- Garvin Hill**—Built annex to Church, painted and ceiled with knotty pine, painted parsonage.
- Greenup**—Painted exterior of Church, also interior of Church and parsonage, purchased three lovely pulpit chairs.
- Hitchins**—Papered and painted three rooms in parsonage, sheet rocked two rooms, installed rollaway doors in garage, installed Venetian shades in parsonage, underpinned and painted Church, built belfry, installed art glass windows, rewired church completely, and installed new light fixtures, ceiled Church and built concrete Stairway to Memorial S. S. Building with other improvements.
- Hopewell**—Installed furnace, redecorated interior of Church and building S. S. rooms under Church.
- Junction City**—Weatherboarded Church and ceiled and finished interior of Church and installed new lights and built concrete steps.
- Kingswood**—Reduced their indebtedness to a minimum.
- Latonia**—Did some redecorating in parsonage and are in the midst of a general remodeling and redecorating program for Church and is hardly complete.

2. Resolved: That the District Superintendent be consulted and present if possible, when drawing up all deeds in the district, and see that all deeds be abstracted.
3. Resolved: That the Assistant Superintendent be a member of our Zone Bible School Board.

### **Council**

5. Resolved: That the District Council be vested with full power to construct buildings for the District when necessary, appointing and directing a committee to carry out its plan.
6. Resolved: That the District Council set the date for the Ministerial Convention and said date to be recorded in the minutes.
7. Resolved: That the District Council appoint all pastors for new missions for the first five years of their existence, or until said Council decides to do otherwise.
8. Resolved: That we, as a Conference, delegate to the Council, power to make rules and by-laws regulating the sale of lots, and the building of cottages, and to govern the Camp grounds; same to be printed in the minutes.
9. Resolved. That the District Council make provision for the planting of more shade trees on the Camp grounds.
10. Resolved: That a Missionary Committee of three be appointed by the District Council. The duty of this committee shall be to encourage the organization and development of local missionary societies, and help to direct their activities in the interest of Foreign, General, and District Home Missions.
11. Resolved: That the District Council be given power to re-zone the churches of the district when necessary.

### **Churches**

12. Resolved: That each church supply the Camp with two each of the following: Cups, plates, glasses, large spoons, sheets, straw ticks, cereal dishes and one pitcher.
13. Resolved: That each church close its books on the last day of each month, and the reports be sent to the District Treasurer immediately.
14. Resolved: That each preacher and deaconess send a copy of their reports to the Statistician, not later than 10 days after the Conference year closes, which is the 30th day of June; and that the Statistician disregard any and all reports received thereafter. Be it also resolved: that the District Treasurer's books close at noon on the tenth day of July.
15. Resolved: That whereas many of our pastors have not received sufficient financial support, be it resolved that each local church appoint one prayer-meeting night each month as "Donation Night," at which time food stuff and provisions shall be brought together for the pastor. Be it also resolved: that an agitator be appointed for the coming year by the Superintendent at the Annual Business Meeting.
16. Resolved: That since it is a matter of great importance for the Pastors of the District to attend the Camp and Conference, be it

therefore resolved; that the pastor's support at the church where he is assigned as pastor, shall continue over the two Sundays he attends said Camp and Conference and the first Sunday following.

17. Resolved: That each church and mission install and practice the envelope system of collecting tithes and offerings.

19. Resolved: That we, as pastors and church boards, urge the calling of our Evangelist, for our revivals, from among our own Pilgrim ministers, and when other ministers are called we consult the District Superintendent.

20. Resolved: That we immediately strive for at least four new churches in the Kentucky District this year.

### **Sunday School**

21. Resolved: That each Sunday School correctly enroll each class, said enrollment to be revised quarterly.

22. Resolved: That each zone have a Sunday School Attendance Banner to be given quarterly to the Sunday School having the largest attendance; also an offering banner given to the Sunday School having the largest offerings.

23. Resolved: That we provide for a Sunday School Convention, and that this be the order of the first day of the Ministerial Convention. We further recommend that the Superintendent or representative from each Sunday School attend said Convention, taking notes to be used in Sunday School meetings in the local church.

24. Resolved: That each Sunday School endeavor to establish another Sunday School other than their own this year.

25. Resolved: That each Sunday School be given credit for the number of scholars from their church attending Sunday School at our Camp.

26. Resolved: That the Sunday School Service at camp be under the supervision of the District Sunday School Board.

### **Young People**

27. Resolved: That we have a District Young People's Convention beginning on Thursday before Camp, at 7:30 P. M. and continuing through the day services on Saturday. Be it further resolved that the District Council appoint a president in each zone who shall create interest among the young people, conduct quarterly zone rallies, and work directly under the supervision of the District Superintendent and the Young People's Executive Secretary. And be it further resolved that the Executive Secretary visit and conduct at least one Rally a year in each zone, and said Secretary make a report to the Conference and said report to be printed in the district minutes.

28. Resolved: That we have a Young People's Official Directory posted in front of our minutes.

### **Zones**

29. Resolved: That each zone have the election of their zone officers at the last zone meeting prior to Camp, so the officer's name can be listed in the minutes.

30. Resolved: That the District Zones be recorded in the minutes.

31. Resolved: That in addition to the present zone officers, viz.: Zone Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer, and Young People's Chairman, that we also have a Sunday School Representative, Missionary Chairman, and a Junior Missionary Chairman, all to be under the leadership of the District Superintendent.

### **District Home Missions**

32. Resolved: That a District Home Missionary Committee be formed, said Committee to consist of the District Superintendent and the District Treasurer by virtue of office, and two Advisory Members to be chosen from the Ordained Ministers by the Council. Be it further resolved that their duties shall consist of the following:

1. They are to keep a constant lookout for new areas in which to locate new Pilgrim Holiness Churches.

2. They shall be responsible for selecting an appropriate location and the general oversight of the same.

### **Credentials**

33. Resolved: That all persons applying for license appear in person before the Examining Board, unless the applicant is sick or otherwise unable to appear; and in that case some member of the Conference is to certify as to his or her character and location.

34. Resolved: That those pursuing the Study Course send for their home study course early in the year, forwarding with their request \$1.00 to cover the cost of questions and postage for each subject.

### **Pastor**

35. Resolved: That each pastor read all resolutions of this Conference to his congregation at the earliest possible convenience.

36. Resolved: That each pastor of our District make a special effort to place a current manual in the home of each member of our church.

37. Resolved: That each pastor list in a book name and address of each "Advocate Subscriber," with the date of expiration, said book to be transferred to the following pastor, and that he endeavor to keep a subscription list equal his membership.

38. Resolved: That no pastor hold revivals off his charge without making satisfactory arrangements with his church and the District Superintendent and that no pastor hold a revival away from his church within thirty days after a revival in his own church; then not more than two revivals during the Conference year, providing said church is supporting him.

39. Resolved: That each pastor send the obituary of deceased members of his church to the Chairman of the Condolence Committee immediately following the funeral.

40. Resolved: That every active pastor be given two weeks vacation with pay.

41. Resolved: That each minister submit his name, address, and telephone number to the District Secretary immediately upon arrival at his new address; same to be included in the Ministerial Directory. Each minister will notify the District Secretary of any changes occurring thereafter.

### **Ministers**

42. Resolved: That each Minister who has not been supporting financially that church of which he is a member, do so this year.

43. Resolved: That each Minister attend the Camp and Conference in full or present a written explanation of non-attendance, to the District Council.

44. Resolved: That whereas Ministers are interested in the welfare of other ministers and their families and whereas there is a Ministerial Benefit Association established for the purpose of protecting

the family of the deceased minister, we therefore recommend: That the local church assume payment of the assessment when called for by the Association. Be it also resolved: that the District pay the assessment of the District Superintendent and all those under the jurisdiction of the District Home Missionary Committee.

45. Resolved: That an information blank be filled out by ministers that cannot attend the Conference, said blank to be furnished by the District.

### Conference

46. Resolved: That no one leaves the Conference without its permission.

47. Resolved: That no church elect a Delegate to our District Conference who will not agree to stay throughout the entire Conference. Manual, Sec. 82, Paragraph 2.

48. Resolved: That the Conference convene on Thursday morning, last week of the Camp.

49. Resolved: That our churches send qualified delegates, who know the problems of the Church and District, also that we send someone other than the pastor's wife as delegate to Conference when possible.

### Camp

50. Resolved: That the date of our Camp be set for the last Thursday in July, this to be a permanent date.

51. Resolved: That we register all who come to camp, assigning work to each one as equally as possible. A meal ticket will be given all who register, same to be presented at the dining room door.

52. Resolved: That the District Superintendent, his wife and our registered nurse, be registered free for the Camp and Conference. Be it further resolved: that the District Superintendent, his wife, the nurse, and called workers for the Camp and Conference be entertained free at the lunch stand.

53. Resolved: That we give space in the book room for a table and some one to take subscriptions to the Advocate, Youth News, and our Missionary Bulletins.

54. Resolved: That all who disregard the following rules be answerable to the District Council:

A. All pastors shall instruct their churches and young people that all who come to Camp shall abide by its every rule.

B. Everyone shall retire, or be quiet, after 11 p. m.

C. A Dean shall be appointed over each Dormitory.

D. No single young person shall be allowed off the grounds after 7 p. m.

E. No articles shall be taken from the kitchen or dining room without permission from the one in charge, and any article taken shall be returned in good condition.

F. No food shall be taken from the kitchen without permission.

G. Parents shall supervise the conduct of their children while on the camp ground.

H. A Supervisor shall be appointed for the dining room and kitchen; parking of cars and care of the tabernacle; for the lunch and book room; for registration and cleaning of the grounds. These to be appointed by the Camp Meeting committee.

55. Resolved: That we have the registration of the dormitory rooms to begin at Thursday noon, and that the District Council work out a system for renting the rooms.

56. Resolved: That all preachers give three days labor, or pay the equivalent, in developing the Camp grounds, or in preparation for the District Camp and Conference when called upon by the District Superintendent.

57. Resolved: That whereas we have a large number of children on our Camp ground during camp meeting, Be it resolved that a fund be established to provide the necessary equipment for the supervised playground on said camp ground, using the offering from the children's services to apply on the equipment. Be it further resolved, that the District Council appoint a committee to take the necessary steps to provide said playground.

58. Resolved: That all cabin owners furnish their own mattresses for their cabin.

59. Resolved: That the Camp Meeting Committee meet at the Ministerial Convention and plan for the preparing of the Camp ground for Camp and appoint capable persons to carry out the work of the Camp.

60. Resolved: That the District Superintendent appoint a special committee to stay after camp for the purpose of cleaning up the Camp Ground.

61. Resolved: Since it is so important that the Camp set the proper example and standards for others to follow, Therefore, be it resolved that the District Council see that all workers such as speakers, singers, pianists, and other musicians used in any service on the Camp meeting platform, be required to dress as "becometh holiness" including the wearing of hose and sleeves of below elbow length.

#### **Miscellaneous**

62. Resolved: That no one person serve on more than one committee where competent persons are available.

63. Resolved: That each church plan for a Daily Vacation Bible School.

64. Resolved: Whereas there is a dissatisfaction in regard to workers for Camp preparation; Be it resolved the camp meeting committee be enlarged to twelve to take care of this work and any others who come and eat in the dining room before Thursday that they be charged the regular price for each meal until Thursday noon, unless called by the District Superintendent. Furthermore, only these workers have priority to Dormitory rooms.

65. Resolved: That whereas there is a need for stimulation of interest in the Home Missionary work of the District, also reports on the Sunday School attendance would be a help and of interest to the District; therefore, be it resolved that we have a District Bulletin mimeographed each month and distributed to our churches giving Sunday School attendance, also reports from our District Home Missionaries.

66. Resolved: Whereas much valuable time is sometimes taken by Resolutions which may not deserve such time and whereas the Resolution Committee often feels reluctant to ignore any Resolution even if it seems of small importance; Therefore, be it resolved that this Conference invest the Resolution Committee with the power to reject any resolution that is not written out and signed by the person who offers it for consideration to the committee and, or Conference.



### **Minutes**

67. Resolved: That we have 700 copies of the District Minutes printed to sell for 25c per copy.

### **Special**

68. Resolved: That this Conference give a rising vote of thanks to our Presiding Officer, the General Superintendent, Rev. L. W. Sturk; our Camp Evangelists, Rev. P. O. Carpenter, and Rev. G. S. Castevens; our Singer, J. L. Schell; our Foreign Missionary Representative, Miss Dorothy Abel; our Home Missionary Representative, Rev. Richard Hawkins; Frankfort Pilgrim College Representatives; District Superintendent and Wife; our District Officials; the heads of each department; the cooks, and all others who served untiringly to make the Camp a blessing to others.

## RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1. We recommend: That each Sunday School of our district pay one dollar per month for a portable tabernacle fund. We further recommend that each Sunday School adopt the birthday offering plan, said offering to go toward the tabernacle and Home Missionary funds.

2. We recommend: That each Church take a free will offering for the District Superintendent on all his visits, and the same to be sent in by the local treasurer and applied on the Superintendent's traveling expense.

3. We recommend: That whereas there is a pressing need for buildings to house our people, that each church or individual buying a lot be asked to build a cabin on said lot within three years, and in case they fail to do so, the lot to be put up for resale. Furthermore, we recommend that those who purchased lots prior to this date, be contacted by our District Superintendent, urging them to build a cabin within two years or give the District the privilege of reselling their lot.

4. We recommend that whereas our district home missions and church extension loan fund is being supervised by our district council, and they are placing all designated funds in this department, that the amount of interest be 2% on all loans.

We further recommend that our pastors urge their people to contribute to this fund by means of wills, legacies, gifts, etc.

5. We recommend: That when the Executive Young People's Secretary conducts a rally in the zone meetings, that an offering be taken in the afternoon service for his traveling expenses.

6. We recommend: That each church pay the registration fee of their pastor and wife; also the church delegate to the District Conference; this to be raised by the District Superintendent at the annual business meeting, and also an offering be taken for their traveling expense.

7. We recommend that the District Treasurer be paid one hundred fifty (\$150.00) dollars per year, and the District Secretary be paid seventy-five (\$75.00) dollars per year; the same to be paid in equal monthly payments, and that the statistician be paid twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars per year.

8. We recommend: That each church have a missionary prayer service each month; and also a monthly missionary service on the Lord's Day, and an offering be taken at this service for Foreign Missions.

9. We recommend: That each church and Sunday School send 10 per cent of their regular offerings to the District Treasurer exception being made to the Building Fund, Evangelist, General Obligations, and Special Offerings.

10. We recommend: That the District Treasurer send out to each local church quarterly statements showing amounts due in each department.

11. We recommend that the District buy the extra books to complete those needed for the ministerial course of study.

12. We recommend: That the District Superintendent's salary be twenty-five hundred and twenty dollars (\$2520.00) per year, and that the District pay his utility bills, and that he be granted two weeks' vacation with pay; also, that he be paid seven cents per mile for traveling expenses.

13. We recommend that the Assistant Superintendent be allowed expense for meals bought while working in District work, and that he be given 5c cents per mile for traveling expenses.

14. We recommend: That the churches pay their pastor a salary at least equal to the average wages of the working people of the church, and that the matter of the pastor's salary be taken care of by the District Superintendent or his Assistant at the time of the annual meeting.

15. We recommend: That in compliance with the action of the General Conference, our General Budget be \$6.00 per member, to be divided as follows: Foreign Missions 35%; General Church Extension 25%; General Administrative Expense 20%; Senior Church School 10%; General Church Extension Loan Fund 6%; and the General Sunday School 4%. This amount is to be sent to the District Treasurer in a lump sum each month as General Budget.

16. We recommend: That the district budget be divided as follows: Superintendent's expense, 50 per cent; Sinking fund, 30 per cent; District parsonage, 10 per cent; Camp budget, 5 per cent; General Conference expense, 3 per cent; Bible School, 2 per cent.

17. We recommend: That the District raise one thousand dollars per year to assist on the Camp meeting; the same to be raised by each local church giving the sum equivalent to one dollar per member, the sum to be sent to the District Treasurer.

18. We recommend: That whereas a Camp Meeting Association has been formed for the purpose of the promotion of the Camp, that each member continue to pay at least \$1.00 per year. This is to be a standing pledge.

19. We recommend: That all moneys be turned over to the local church treasurer from the different departments of the church at the end of each month; and that the local church treasurer pay all the bills as directed by the Church Board.

20. We recommend: That each Church take steps to raise their offerings for revivals at least 30 days before the revival begins.

21. We recommend: That when a mission is organized into a church it shall not be asked to pay District Budget for one year from the following Conference, and 50 per cent for the two following years.

22. We recommend: That an offering be taken in each zone meeting for the expense of the promotion of the Sunday School work in the District.

23. We recommend: That whereas the 1946 General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church adopted the "Pension Plan" to aid retired and disabled ministers, and whereas each District Conference is asked to contribute 4 per cent of the Pastor's salary, lay worker's salary, Evangelist's offerings, etc., to said Pension Fund, whereas this Conference has voted to fully cooperate with the General Board of Pensions in this matter. We recommend: That we adopt this plan of financing it, namely: That each local church may pay the equivalent of 40 per cent of the Evangelist's tithe, who are members of said church, and 4 per cent of the pastor's salary. This to be sent monthly to the District Treasurer. All members of the Pension Fund Plan should pay 2 per cent of salary and offerings as reported to the conference.

24. We recommend: That each Sunday School set aside one Sunday each month and that 50 per cent of said Sunday's offering be given for District Home Missions.

25. We recommend: That in order to encourage our local churches to observe sound and acceptable business practices in the handling of local church funds, that therefore, be it resolved that two

local church board members, other than the treasurer, count and make a record of the offerings as received, and then turn over immediately to the local church treasurer these funds and their records for further check and bank deposit. Be it further resolved that when the local church treasurer's reports are made to the local church, that the bank statements be made available and balance be shown to check with the treasurer's record.

## **REPORT OF THE PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY**

To the Forty-Fifth Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Kentucky District, now in session, we would like to report:

Twenty-six of our Sunday Schools of Kentucky show a gain, and nineteen show a loss. Four remain the same as last year.

Our average attendance for 1953 was 2,983. Our average attendance for this year is 3,187. A gain of 204.

I attended the Sunday School Leaders Institute at Frankfort, Indiana in March of this year.

I traveled over a thousand miles in the district in the interest of our Sunday Schools, spoke in three zone meetings, secured the services of Brother and Sister Robbins of Hamilton, Ohio, for a one day Sunday School convention in the Lexington zone.

We also printed a monthly Sunday School bulletin the past year, and mailed a copy to each of our pastors monthly. Ninety-five percent of our pastors co-operated by sending their monthly reports promptly. We rather enjoyed the experience.

Sad to say some of our Sunday Schools are smaller than they were fifteen years ago, and some are smaller than they were when they were started.

I believe if we work at the job, our Sunday Schools will grow. Our goal for next year is 10% increase, will we make it?

## **RULES GOVERNING SALE OF LOTS AND BUILDING COTTAGES**

Price of lots, \$20.00 each. Terms: \$5.00 down payment when purchased, balance to be paid in monthly payments of \$3.00 each. Six per cent on unpaid balance at maturity. All lots are to be paid for in six months or contract is void.

All outside lots in the old plot shall be of this dimension, 20 feet in width and 30 feet in length. Inside lots shall be 20x20. All lots in the new plot shall be 20x30 feet. All cottages are to be uniform in size and placements on lots in accordance with the row or street on which they may be placed. The dimensions of the cottages are to be 10x12 feet, with an 8-foot eave, six concrete piers, one door and two windows, a screen door, and either a metal or asphalt roof. The building is to be made of dressed lumber, either boxed or framed, and to have two coats of white paint. An extension of nine feet may be built on any of the cabins on an outside lot of the old plot, such additions to be of the same dimensions as that of the cabin with a window on each side. A porch may be built on the front of any and all cottages. Cabins on the new plot may be either single or double.

The District Council holds the right to paint or repair in any way necessary, unless the owner does the work himself, and the owner is to pay the expense of same. Aluminum paint only is to be used on the metal roof. The District Council is to keep all buildings insured and the owner of each cottage is to pay his part of the premium.

## **RATES FOR THE CAMP**

Registration fees: \$5.00 and work assigned; \$10.00 and no work assigned. This rate is to include all persons from 12 years of age and over. Those from 6 through 12 years will be registered for \$2.50 and those under 6 shall be registered free. All meals will be fifty cents. Dormitory rooms and cabins \$10.00 each.

A flat rate of \$1.00 shall be charged for electricity used in cabins and house trailers on the ground, the same to be paid by those using said trailers and cabins when registering.
