Ballots were cast for District Treasurer. Rev. C. W. Keyes was elected.

Ballots were cast for District Secretary. Rev. R. L. Goodman was elected.

Ballots were cast for the three advisory members of the District Council. Rev. L. S. Houston, Rev. H. H. Barber, and Rev. R. E. Bell were elected.

Ballots were cast for the vacancy on the Examining Board. Rev. H. H. Barber was elected.

Ballots were cast for the vacancy on the Educational Board. Rev. S. M. Stikeleather was elected.

Rev. C. W. Keyes was nominated as a trustee to succeed Rev. W. K. George. Carried.

It was moved and carried that Rev. Ralph Tromble and Rev. L. S. Houston be retained as District trustees.

The members of the Conference stood and sang, "I'll Praise Him."

"We recommend that this Kentucky Conference express by a rising vote to our General Superintendent, Bro. Neff, our confidence and pledge of support in his great task of leading our church on to greater days." Carried.

It was moved and carried that we accept the invitation of the Owensboro Church to entertain the Ministerial Convention.

The Conference recessed at 12:00 noon.

FOURTH SITTING

The Conference reconvened at 1:30 P. M. by singing "We'll Work Till Jesus Comes." We were led in prayer by Rev. W. K. George.

It was moved and carried that each church give the minimum of \$5.00 to support the District Ministerial Convention each year.

The report of the Sunday School Promotional Secretary was read and accepted.

Rev. Ralph Tromble exhorted the Conference to promote the work of our Sunday Schools this coming year.

It was moved and carried that we delete Resolution No. 3 from the Minutes and to grant the Council authority to appoint the Zone Bible School board members.

The Conference adjourned at 2:20 P. M.

ORDINATION SERVICE

The Ordination Service was Friday, August 5th, at 2:30 P. M. with Rev. W. W. Tromble leading in singing "A Charge to Keep I Have." Rev. L. S. Houston and Rev. C. W. Keyes read passages of Scripture.

The Rev. William Neff, General Superintendent, addressed the candidates for ordination on the subject:

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Forty-Sixth Annual Conference, Greetings:

It is with a feeling of gratitude to God that we present this report. Through one more year God has extended His mercy, and we are permitted to gather on this camp ground in the capacity of a Conference to take care of the great work of God. During the past year there have been some battles, but thank God, there have been some victories. We have appreciated our pastors and our laymen in the churches, also our fine District Council. May God bless each one of these. It is our desire to be a blessing to all. Jesus said, "Lo, I am with you alway." Surely we need His presence and hand to guide us, and if He goes with us we will be safe.

There have been some improvements in the churches of the District, and I hereby make notice of them:

Ashland I—Installed a new heating system.

Aspen Grove—Purchased a lot next to the church, built a parsonage, added one Sunday school room, and repaired their furnace.

Augustia—Papered and painted the interior of the church, also painted the benches.

Carlisle—Erected an altar in the church, and redecorated the basement.

Carrollton—The church has ordered new pews, which are being expected to arrive any day, also redecorated the interior of the church.

Catlettsburg—Moved to a new location.

Central City—Installed new lights in the church.

Clay—Have remodeled the parsonage, painted the church within and without, and finished one Sunday school room.

Cloverport—Installed two new floor furnaces.

Confluence—Painted the outside of the church, finished wiring of the church, erected two floodlights, and built a new parsonage. The parsonage is not entirely finished.

Cynthiana—Some remodeling on parsonage.

Dalesburg—Did some painting on building.

Eastview—Plastered church, sanded floor, built two tables for Sunday school rooms, and purchased twelve chairs.

Elizabethtown—Built a Sunday school room, installed an absentee board, and lowered the platform in the church.

Erlanger—Remodeling done on both church and parsonage.

Falmouth—Refinished the floor of the church, also did some painting.

Frankfort—Did considerable redecorating of church and parsonage, installed four air-conditioning units, and made other improvements on property.

Fullerton—Finished Sunday school rooms, and painted inside of church.

Gravin Hill—Painted outside of church and parsonage.

Hitchins—Installed floor furnace and new lights in the church. Also did redecorating of parsonage.

Hopewell—Did some remodeling on church building.

Junction City—Finished interior of church with knotty pine finish.

Kingswood—Paid balance of bank debt.

Latonia—Remodeled inside of church.

Lewisport—Church almost completed.

Maysville—Redecorated interior of church, and one room in parsonage.

MacIntosh—Painted part of parsonage.

New Haven (Somerset)—Erected new auditorium which is almost completed.

Newport—Bought piano and songbooks for church.

Owensboro—Fixed two Sunday school rooms, bought a Sunday school bus, and 48 metal chairs.

Paris—New fluorescent lights, pulpit, interior decorating.

Pleasureville—Did some repair work, sanded and varnished floors, painted interior of church and Sunday school rooms.

Preston—Repairs made on church and parsonage.

Shelbyville—Laid hardwood floor in church auditorium.

Soldier—Bought 30 folding chairs, rug for platform and rug for in front of platform. Painted interior of church.

Willard—Completely remodeled parsonage within and without.

Camp Improvement—My personal report is as follows: Preached 146 times; had 61 church meetings; 94 Board meetings; 16 Communion services; prayed in 160 homes; attended committee meetings; conducted 10 prayer meetings; 3 funerals; organized two churches that were new—**Eastview** and **Louisville, II**; another new church was organized at Morgantown, also one church that was disorganized and revived, and desired to be reorganized; 11 saved and 3 sanctified; one parsonage dedicated; 2 children dedicated; prayed with and anointed for healing, 10; attended one church leaders' meeting, one Sunday School Institute (leaders); presided over two council meetings and one Ministerial convention; spent 12 days on camp ground in preparation for Camp; traveled 19,430 miles since the 1st of September, 1954; received salary in full. We installed also a hot water system in the kitchen with

electric pump and pressure tank, also built an extension on the Evangelist's cabin, fixed roof of ladies' dormitory, and other repairs.

I appreciate all that has been done for me, and I trust that in a measure I have been a blessing in His kingdom. With gratitude and praise to God, we press on in His service.

YOUTH REPORT

In the office of Youth Executive Secretary of this Kentucky Conference, I have traveled 2033 miles which has included one trip to Indianapolis where the Executive Secretaries met with the Pilgrim Youth Director, Rev. P. F. Elliott. Twice I drove to Lexington to meet with the District Superintendent and once to Shelbyville where I held a meeting with several zone youth leaders.

In addition to these I have held a zone rally in the following zones: Elizabethtown, Louisville, Lexington, Olive Hill, Ashland, and the Mountain zones. Our Assistant Secretary, Rev. Paul Ebright, conducted rallies in the Elizabethtown, Western and Louisville zones. The Covington zone was not reached by your officers but only because a suitable date could not be arranged.

Some significant gains have been made in the Youth Department. First and foremost, is the growing knowledge and conviction that we have an existence or being. We have felt our pulse and have decided that there is life within us. We have not fully decided what to do about it but we have determined to do something. Who would deny the importance of this? We want all to know that we have decided to live.

Another major gain was the successful operation of a Youth Camp. A condensed report on this venture would be: God was with us.

During this past year we initiated a youth paper which we called the BEACON. It began on a bi-monthly basis. Your Executive Secretary was of the opinion that it should be presented by the youth and for the youth. I do not believe it should be otherwise.

We attempted to observe Pilgrim Youth Week. Bro. Ebright and I held services in seven zones which required traveling 1,350 miles. It at least served notice on Satan and some skeptics that as long as it is day, we shall work for our Youth.

I appreciate every cooperative individual, especially that of my assistant. Without it, little could have been done. To all I would say, "Lift up your eyes unto the field, for it is ready for harvest." To ignore this great field of youth that God has given us will be sheer district, yea denominational suicide. Let us give this department our interest, prayers, and support and they will return to you youth who will be saved and sanctified and supporters of our church.

RESOLUTIONS

District Superintendent

1. Resolved: That the District Superintendent make two trips over the District during the year, and give more time to the smaller churches as needed.

2. Resolved: That the District Superintendent be consulted and present if possible, when drawing up all deeds in the district, and see that all deeds be abstracted and properly conveyed and recorded.

Council

3. Resolved: That the District Council be vested with full power to construct buildings for the District when necessary, appointing and directing a committee to carry out its plan.

4. Resolved: That the District Council set the date for the Ministerial Convention and said date to be recorded in the minutes.

5. Resolved: That the District Council appoint all pastors for new missions for the first five years of their existence, or until said Council decides to do otherwise.

6. Resolved: That we, as a Conference, delegate to the Council, power to make rules and by-laws regulating the sale of lots, and the building of cottages, and to govern the Camp grounds; same to be printed in the minutes.

7. Resolved. That the District Council make provision for the planting of more shade trees on the Camp grounds.

8. Resolved: That a Missionary Committee of three be appointed by the District Council. The duty of this committee shall be to encourage the organization and development of local missionary societies, and help to direct their activities in the interest of Foreign, General, and District Home Missions.

9. Resolved: That the District Council be given power to re-zone the churches of the district when necessary.

Churches

10. Resolved: That each church supply the Camp with two each of the following: Cups, plates, glasses, large spoons, sheets, straw ticks, cereal dishes and one pitcher.

11. Resolved: That each church close its books on the last day of each month, and the reports be sent to the District Treasurer immediately.

12. Resolved: That each preacher and deaconess send a copy of their reports to the Statistician, not later than 15 days after the Conference year closes, which is the 30th day of June; and that the Statistician disregard any and all reports received thereafter. Be it also resolved: that the District Treasurer's books close at noon on the tenth day of July.

13. Resolved: That whereas many of our pastors have not received sufficient financial support, be it resolved that each local church appoint one prayer-meeting night each month as "Donation Night," at which time food stuff and provisions shall be brought together for the pastor. Be it also resolved: that an agitator be appointed for the coming year by the Superintendent at the Annual Business Meeting.

14. Resolved: That since it is a matter of great importance for the Pastors of the District to attend the Camp and Conference, be it

therefore resolved; that the pastor's support at the church where he is assigned as pastor, shall continue over the two Sundays he attends said Camp and Conference and the first Sunday following.

15. Resolved: That each church and mission install and practice the envelope system of collecting tithes and offerings.

16. Resolved: That we, as pastors and church boards, urge the calling of our Evangelist, for our revivals, from among our own Pilgrim ministers, and when other ministers are called we consult the District Superintendent.

17. Resolved: That we immediately strive for at least four new churches in the Kentucky District this year.

Sunday School

18. Resolved: That each Sunday School correctly enroll each class, said enrollment to be revised quarterly.

19. Resolved: That each zone have a Sunday School Attendance Banner to be given quarterly to the Sunday School having the largest attendance; also an offering banner given to the Sunday School having the largest offerings.

20. Resolved: That we provide for a Sunday School Convention, and that this be the order of the first day of the Ministerial Convention. We further recommend that the Superintendent or representative from each Sunday School attend said Convention, taking notes to be used in Sunday School meetings in the local church.

21. Resolved: That each Sunday School endeavor to establish another Sunday School other than their own this year.

22. Resolved: That each Sunday School be given credit for the number of scholars from their church attending Sunday School at our Camp.

23. Resolved: That the Sunday School Service at camp be under the supervision of the District Sunday School Board.

Young People

24. Resolved: That we have a District Young People's Convention beginning on Thursday before Camp, at 7:30 P. M. and continuing through the day services on Saturday. Be it further resolved that the District Council appoint a president in each zone who shall create interest among the young people, conduct quarterly zone rallies, and work directly under the supervision of the District Superintendent and the Young People's Executive Secretary. And be it further resolved that the Executive Secretary visit and conduct at least one Rally a year in each zone, and said Secretary make a report to the Conference and said report to be printed in the district minutes.

25. Resolved: That we have a Young People's Official Directory posted in front of our minutes.

26. Resolved: That a committee to be known as the Youth Executive Committee, shall be provided, consisting of the Young People's Executive Secretary, Assistant Secretary, and Secretary-Treasurer. In addition to these officers, three advisory members shall be appointed by the initial members of the committee within five days after our district youth convention. Their duties shall be to outline and guide our youth program under the supervision of the District Superintendent.

27. Resolved: That we have a Youth Camp each year.

Zones

28. Resolved: That each zone have the election of their zone officers at the last zone meeting prior to Camp, so the officer's name can be listed in the minutes.

29. Resolved: That the District Zones be recorded in the minutes.

30. Resolved: That in addition to the present zone officers, viz.: Zone Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer, and Young People's Chairman, that we also have a Sunday School Representative, Missionary Chairman, and a Junior Missionary Chairman, all to be under the leadership of the District Superintendent.

District Home Missions

31. Resolved: That a District Home Missionary Committee be formed, said Committee to consist of the District Superintendent and the District Treasurer by virtue of office, and two Advisory Members to be chosen from the Ordained Ministers by the Council. Be it further resolved that their duties shall consist of the following:

1. They are to keep a constant lookout for new areas in which to locate new Pilgrim Holiness Churches.

2. They shall be responsible for selecting an appropriate location and the general oversight of the same.

Credentials

32. Resolved: That all persons applying for license appear in person before the Examining Board, unless the applicant is sick or otherwise unable to appear; and in that case some member of the Conference is to certify as to his or her character and location.

33. Resolved: That those pursuing the Study Course send for their home study course early in the year, forwarding with their request \$1.00 to cover the cost of questions and postage for each subject.

Pastor

34. Resolved: That each pastor read all resolutions of this Conference to his congregation at the earliest possible convenience.

35. Resolved: That each pastor of our District make a special effort to place a current manual in the home of each member of our church.

36. Resolved: That each pastor list in a book name and address of each "Advocate Subscriber," with the date of expiration, said book to be transferred to the following pastor, and that he endeavor to keep a subscription list equal his membership.

37. Resolved: That no pastor hold revivals off his charge without making satisfactory arrangements with his church and the District Superintendent and that no pastor hold a revival away from his church within thirty days after a revival in his own church; then not more than two revivals during the Conference year, providing said church is supporting him.

38. Resolved: That each pastor send the obituary of deceased members of his church to the Chairman of the Condolence Committee immediately following the funeral.

39. Resolved: That every active pastor be given two weeks vacation with pay.

40. Resolved: That each minister submit his name, address, and telephone number to the District Secretary immediately upon arrival at his new address; same to be included in the Ministerial Directory. Each minister will notify the District Secretary of any changes occurring thereafter.

Ministers

41. Resolved: That each Minister who has not been supporting financially that church of which he is a member, do so this year.

42. Resolved: That each Minister attend the Camp and Conference in full or present a written explanation of non-attendance, to the District Council.

43. Resolved: That whereas Ministers are interested in the welfare of other ministers and their families and whereas there is a Ministerial Benefit Association established for the purpose of protecting the family of the deceased minister, we therefore recommend: That the local church assume payment of the assessment when called for by the Association. Be it also resolved: that the District pay the assessment of the District Superintendent and all those under the jurisdiction of the District Home Missionary Committee.

44. Resolved: That an information blank be filled out by ministers that cannot attend the Conference, said blank to be furnished by the District.

Conference

45. Resolved: That no one leaves the Conference without its permission.

46. Resolved: That no church elect a Delegate to our District Conference who will not agree to stay throughout the entire Conference. Manual, Sec. 82, Paragraph 2.

47. Resolved: That the Conference convene on Thursday morning, last week of the Camp.

48. Resolved: That our churches send qualified delegates, who know the problems of the Church and District, also that we send someone other than the pastor's wife as delegate to Conference when possible.

Camp

49. Resolved: That the date of our Camp be set for the last Thursday in July, this to be a permanent date.

50. Resolved: That we register all who come to camp, assigning work to each one as equally as possible. A meal ticket will be given all who register, same to be presented at the dining room door.

51. Resolved: That the District Superintendent, his wife and our registered nurse, be registered free for the Camp and Conference. Be it further resolved: that the District Superintendent, his wife, the nurse, and called workers for the Camp and Conference be entertained free at the lunch stand.

52. Resolved: That we give space in the book room for a table and some one to take subscriptions to the Advocate, Youth News, and our Missionary Bulletins.

53. Resolved: That all who disregard the following rules be answerable to the District Council:

A. All pastors shall instruct their churches and young people that all who come to Camp shall abide by its every rule.

B. Everyone shall retire, or be quiet, after 11 p. m.

C. A Dean shall be appointed over each Dormitory.

D. No single young person shall be allowed off the grounds after 7 p. m.

E. No articles shall be taken from the kitchen or dining room without permission from the one in charge, and any article taken shall be returned in good condition.

F. No food shall be taken from the kitchen without permission.

G. Parents shall supervise the conduct of their children while on the camp ground.

H. A Supervisor shall be appointed for the dining room and kitchen; parking of cars and care of the tabernacle; for the lunch and book room; for registration and cleaning of the grounds. These to be appointed by the Camp Meeting committee.

54. Resolved: That we have the registration of the dormitory rooms to begin at Thursday noon, and that the District Council work out a system for renting the rooms.

55. Resolved: That all preachers give three days labor, or pay the equivalent, in developing the Camp grounds, or in preparation for the District Camp and Conference when called upon by the District Superintendent.

56. Resolved: That whereas we have a large number of children on our Camp ground during camp meeting. Be it resolved that a fund be established to provide the necessary equipment for the supervised playground on said camp ground, using the offering from the children's services to apply on the equipment. Be it further resolved, that the District Council appoint a committee to take the necessary steps to provide said playground.

57. Resolved: That all cabin owners furnish their own mattresses for their cabin.

58. Resolved: That the Camp Meeting Committee meet at the Ministerial Convention and plan for the preparing of the Camp ground for Camp and appoint capable persons to carry out the work of the Camp.

59. Resolved: That the District Superintendent appoint a special committee to stay after camp for the purpose of cleaning up the Camp Ground.

60. Resolved: Since it is so important that the Camp set the proper example and standards for others to follow. Therefore, be it resolved that the District Council see that all workers such as speakers, singers, pianists, and other musicians used in any service on the Camp meeting platform, be required to dress as "becometh holiness" including the wearing of hose and sleeves of below elbow length.

Miscellaneous

61. Resolved: That no one person serve on more than one committee where competent persons are available.

62. Resolved: That each church plan for a Daily Vacation Bible School.

63. Resolved: Whereas there is a dissatisfaction in regard to workers for Camp preparation; Be it resolved the camp meeting com-

mittee be enlarged to twelve to take care of this work and any others who come and eat in the dining room before Thursday that they be charged the regular price for each meal until Thursday noon, unless called by the District Superintendent. Furthermore, only these workers have priority to Dormitory rooms.

64. Resolved: That whereas there is a need for stimulation of interest in the Home Missionary work of the District, also reports on the Sunday School attendance would be a help and of interest to the District; therefore, be it resolved that we have a District Bulletin mimeographed each month and distributed to our churches giving Sunday School attendance, also reports from our District Home Missionaries.

65. Resolved: Whereas much valuable time is sometimes taken by Resolutions which may not deserve such time and whereas the Resolution Committee often feels reluctant to ignore any Resolution even if it seems of small importance; Therefore, be it resolved that this Conference invest the Resolution Committee with the power to reject any resolution that is not written out and signed by the person who offers it for consideration to the committee and, or Conference.

66. Resolved: That we establish an honor system and give each church a gold star that sends in a report to the District Treasurer by the 10th of each month. This chart is to be compiled by the District Treasurer and put on display at the Ministerial Convention and District Camp.

Minutes

67. Resolved: That we have 700 copies of the District Minutes printed to sell for 25c per copy.

Special

68. Resolved: That this Conference give a rising vote of thanks to our Presiding Officer, the General Superintendent, Rev. W. H. Neff; our Camp evangelist, Rev. A. S. Joppie; our singers and children's workers, Rev. and Mrs. W. W. Tromble; the Foreign Missionary representatives, Rev. and Mrs. R. R. Hughes and family, and Miss Annie Eubanks; the Home Missionary representative, Rev. R. C. Hawkins; Frankfort Bible School representatives; Dr. Andrew Johnson; Rev. and Mrs. Ralph Tromble; the District officials; the heads of department; the Cooks; and all others who served untiringly to make the Camp a blessing to others.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1. We recommend: That each Sunday School of our district pay one dollar per month for a portable tabernacle fund. We further recommend that each Sunday School adopt the birthday offering plan, said offering to go toward the tabernacle and Home Missionary funds.

2. We recommend: That each Church take a free will offering for the District Superintendent on all his visits, and the same to be sent in by the local treasurer and applied on the Superintendent's traveling expense.

3. We recommend: That whereas there is a pressing need for buildings to house our people, that each church or individual buying a lot to be asked to build a cabin on said lot within three years, and in case they fail to do so, the lot to be put up for resale. Furthermore, we recommend that those who purchased lots prior to this date, be contacted by our District Superintendent, urging them to build a cabin within two years or give the District the privilege of reselling their lot.

4. We recommend that whereas our district home missions and church extension loan fund is being supervised by our district council, and they are placing all designated funds in this Department, that the amount of interest be 2% on all loans.

We further recommend that our pastors urge their people to contribute to this fund by means of wills, legacies, gifts, etc.

5. We recommend: That when the Executive Young People's Secretary conducts a rally in the zone meetings, that an offering be taken in the afternoon service for his traveling expenses.

6. We recommend: That each church pay the registration fee of their pastor and wife; also the church delegate to the District Conference; this to be raised by the District Superintendent at the annual business meeting, and also an offering be taken for their traveling expense.

7. We recommend that the District Treasurer be paid one hundred fifty (\$150.00) dollars per year, and the District Secretary be paid seventy-five (\$75.00) dollars per year; the same to be paid in equal monthly payments, and that the statistician be paid twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars per year.

8. We recommend: That each church have a missionary prayer service each month; and also a monthly missionary service on the Lord's Day, and an offering be taken at this service for Foreign Missions.

9. We recommend: That each church and Sunday School send 10 per cent of their regular offerings to the District Treasurer exception being made to the Building Fund, Evangelist, General Obligations, and Special Offerings.

10. We recommend: That the District Treasurer send out to each local church quarterly statements showing amounts due in each department.

11. We recommend that the District buy the extra books to complete those needed for the ministerial course of study.

12. We recommend: That the District Superintendent's salary be thirty-one hundred and twenty dollars (\$3120.00) per year, and that the District pay his utility bills, and that he be granted two weeks' vacation with pay; also, that he be paid seven cents per mile for

traveling expenses; Said recommendation to become effective as of August 1, 1955.

13. We recommend that the Assistant Superintendent be allowed expense for meals bought while working in District work, and that he be given 5c cents per mile for traveling expenses.

14. We recommend: That the churches pay their pastor a salary at least equal to the average wages of the working people of the church, and that the matter of the pastor's salary be taken care of by the District Superintendent or his Assistant at the time of the annual meeting.

15. We recommend: That in compliance with the action of the General Conference, our General Budget be \$6.00 per member, to be divided as follows: Foreign Missions 35%; General Church Extension 25%; General Administrative Expense 20%; Senior Church School 10%; General Church Extension Loan Fund 6%; and the General Sunday School 4%. This amount is to be sent to the District Treasurer in a lump sum each month as General Budget.

16. We recommend: That the district budget be divided as follows: Superintendent's expense, 53 percent; Sinking fund, 30 percent; District parsonage, 10 percent; Bible school, 4 percent; and General Conference expense, 3 percent.

17. We recommend: That the District raise one thousand dollars per year to assist on the Camp meeting; the same to be raised by each local church giving the sum equivalent to one dollar per member, the sum to be sent to the District Treasurer.

18. We recommend: That whereas a Camp Meeting Association has been formed for the purpose of the promotion of the Camp, that each member continue to pay at least \$1.00 per year. This is to be a standing pledge.

19. We recommend: That all moneys be turned over to the local church treasurer from the different departments of the church at the end of each month; and that the local church treasurer pay all the bills as directed by the Church Board.

20. We recommend: That each Church take steps to raise their offerings for revivals at least 30 days before the revival begins.

21. We recommend: That when a mission is organized into a church it shall not be asked to pay District Budget for one year from the following Conference, and 50 percent for the two following years.

22. We recommend: That an offering be taken in each zone meeting for the expense of the promotion of the Sunday School work in the District.

23. We recommend: That whereas the 1946 General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church adopted the "Pension Plan" to aid retired and disabled ministers, and whereas each District Conference is asked to contribute 4 percent of the Pastor's salary, lay worker's salary, Evangelist's offerings, etc., to said Pension Fund, whereas this Conference has voted to fully cooperate with the General Board of Pensions in this matter. We recommend: That we adopt this plan of financing it, namely: That each local church may pay the equivalent of 40 per cent of the Evangelist's tithe, who are members of said church, and 4 percent of the pastor's salary. This to be sent monthly to the District Treasurer. All members of the Pension Fund Plan should pay 2 percent of salary and offerings as reported to the conference.

24. We recommend: That each Sunday School set aside one Sunday each month and that 50 percent of said Sunday's offering be given for District Home Missions.

25. We recommend: That in order to encourage our local churches to observe sound and acceptable business practices in the handling of local church funds, that therefore, be it resolved that two local church board members, other than the treasurer, count and make a record of the offerings as received, and then turn over immediately to the local church treasurer these funds and their records for further check and bank deposit. Be it further resolved that when the local church treasurer's reports are made to the local church, that the bank statements be made available and balance be shown to check with the treasurer's record.

26. We recommend: That whereas we have no means for promoting the youth work of our District, that each church send \$1.00 per month to the District Treasurer; same to be forwarded to the District Youth Treasurer at the end of each month.

RULES GOVERNING SALE OF LOTS AND BUILDING COTTAGES

Price of lots, \$20.00 each. Terms: \$5.00 down payment when purchased, balance to be paid in monthly payments of \$3.00 each. Six per cent on unpaid balance at maturity. All lots are to be paid for in six months or contract is void.

All outside lots in the old plot shall be of this dimension, 20 feet in width and 30 feet in length. Inside lots shall be 20x20. All lots in the new plot shall be 20x30 feet. All cottages are to be uniform in size and placements on lots in accordance with the row or street on which they may be placed. The dimensions of the cottages are to be 10x12 feet, with an 8-foot eave, six concrete piers, one door and two windows, a screen door, and either a metal or asphalt roof. The building is to be made of dressed lumber, either boxed or framed, and to have two coats of white paint. An extension of nine feet may be built on any of the cabins on an outside lot of the old plot, such additions to be of the same dimensions as that of the cabin with a window on each side. A porch may be built on the front of any and all cottages. Cabins on the new plot may be either single or double.

The District Council holds the right to paint or repair in any way necessary, unless the owner does the work himself, and the owner is to pay the expense of same. Aluminum paint only is to be used on the metal roof. The District Council is to keep all buildings insured and the owner of each cottage is to pay his part of the premium.

RATES FOR THE CAMP

Registration fees: \$5.00 and work assigned: \$10.00 and no work assigned. This rate is to include all persons from 12 years of age and over. Those from 6 through 12 years will be registered for \$2.50 and those under 6 shall be registered free. All meals will be fifty cents. Dormitory rooms and cabins \$10.00 each.

A flat rate of \$1.00 shall be charged for electricity used in cabins and house trailers on the ground, the same to be paid by those using said trailers and cabins when registering.
