



- 3. The District Conference shall convene on Thursday, 9:00 A. M.





#### CONFERENCE MINUTES

#### FIRST SITTING

The Forty-Seventh Annual Conference of the Kentucky District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at the Tabernacle on August 2, 1956, at 9:00 A. M. with our District Superintendent, Rev. Ralph Tromble, in charge.

Rev. Paul Ebright led the Conference in singing, "We'll Work Till

Jesus Comes." Rev. F. M. Singleton led in prayer.

The District Superintendent presented Rev. R. C. Hawkins, our General Church Extension Secretary, to the Conference. Rev. Hawkins addressed the Conference on the subject: "The Forward Movement" using Acts 16:5, "And so were the churches established in the faith, and increased in numbers daily." He emphasized:

- 1. The Forward Movement was born by the Holy Ghost in one of the church leaders' meetings in Indianapolis, Indiana.
- 2. The need for the Forward Movement is that first we save ourselves from destroying ourselves.
- 3. To save our rich spiritual inheritance.
- 4. The world needs the ministry of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- 5. Emphasis must be replaced on soul winning and world evangelism, to make the Forward Movement motto "Lighting the Way for a Brighter Day" a living reality.

Rev. R. C. Hawkins took the Chair to preside over the Conference. The roll call of the ministers and delegates was made.

The Chair suggested that we invite Rev. S. M. Stikeleather, a veteran and honored minister in our denomination, to be seated on the platform. Carried.

The motion was made and carried that we retain the same Con-

ference hours as of last year.

The District Superintendent appointed Rev. R. D. Brown and Rev.

D. D. Fortner to serve on the Reception Committee.

The District Superintendent's report was read and accepted with a rising vote of thanks in appreciation for His untiring labors and the good progress of the District this past year.

The Auditor's report was read and accepted.

The District Treasurer's report was read and accepted. Rev. R. C. Hawkins expressed appreciation for the competent work and good report.

The Camp Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The Resolution which was presented as No. 8 was lost for lack of support.

The Ordination Service opened at 1:30 P. M., August 3, 1956. Rev. S. R. Wilcox led in singing, "A Charge to Keep I Have." Rev. C. W. Keyes led in prayer. Rev. Ralph Tromble, Rev. F. M. Singleton, and Rev. R. L. Goodman read passages of Scripture.
Rev. R. C. Hawkins then addressed the candidates for ordination:

The 1956 Conference adjourned at 3:30 P. M. with Rev. S. M.

Stikeleather praying the dismissal prayer.

#### DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Greetings to the forty-seventh annual conference. Through the good providence of God we have been permitted to live another year for the Lord. It has been a gracious time in His service. We count it a privilege to do His will. The Scripture says "Look on the fields that are ripe," and we have been busy in the work of the District. The Lord has given us some precious times of fellowship as we have visited the churches. We appreciate our pastors and churches, and the good cooperation of the District Council. May God bless us as a District, and help us to all work in the interests of the Forward Movement of our church. I am in full support of this and trust that we as a District will take definite action on this. Let us work while it is day.

The following improvements have been made in our churches:

- Ashland I—Purchased property with house on it with room on lot to build a new church; also improved their parking lot.
- **Ashland II**—They have built a new church building 40 x 80 feet. This is a beautiful building which has on the main floor, the auditorium, church office, pastor's study, choir loft, and nursery. The church contains a full basement with class rooms and young people's auditorium. They also purchased a new furnace for the parsonage. The parsonage was also redecorated inside and outside.
- Aspen Grove—Did some work on the parsonage and bought a bus for the Sunday School.
- Augusta—Have done considerable improving on the church, such as painting, buying new windows, also thirty-five nice seats were given to the Sunday School.
- Carlisle—Installed gas in the church and parsonage with a floor furnace in the church and stove in the Sunday School rooms.
- Carrollton-Bought twenty-five steel folding chairs, paid off debt on the new church pews, also did improving for Sunday School class rooms and church.

#### Catlettsburg-

- **Central City**—Improvements were made on the Sunday School rooms and also some painting was done.
- Clay—Improved the stairway to the basement and also painted the church.
- Cloverport—Bought used pews for the church; also remodeled some on the interior of the church and built Sunday School rooms in the basement and put new roof on the parsonage and bought the lot next to the church.
- **Confluence**—Considerable improvement has been made on the parsonage such as: new floors and papering. Also built a new garage.
- Covington I—Sold parsonage and purchased new property with a nice house and room to build a new church building. Remodeled the upstairs of the parsonage into three nice bedrooms. Work on their new church to be started soon.

#### Cynthiana-

Dalesburg—Put a new floor in the Church.

East View—Bought parsonage with several acres of land, also did some improving on Sunday School rooms.

Elizabethtown—Remodeled, painted and decorated basement Sunday School department. Erected fifteen road signs, bought a building lot with the thought of building a new church.

**Erlanger**—Did some improving on church, also on the parsonage. Also liquidated street paving debt.

Falmouth—Purchased new rugs for the platform and aisles of the church.

Flint Road-Repaired the church roof.

**Frankfort**—Sold the apartment building which decreased the church debt to a very small amount. Five road signs were purchased by the Young People.

**Fullerton**—Decorated anew, the church, and purchased new pews for the church auditorium.

#### Garvin Hill-

#### Greenup-

Hitchins—Repaired the roof of the church, varnished the floor of the church, bought a tent to be used in tent meetings. Redecorated the parsonage and remodeled it.

#### Hopewell—

Junction City—Painted floor of the church, also installed church pews.

Kingswood—Did some remodeling on parsonage, including papering and building a new bathroom. Also did some improving on the kitchen. They have material for building Sunday School rooms and they have painted the interior of the church. Also, they have repaired the roof.

#### Latonia-

#### Lewisport-

Lexington—Decorated interior of church and parsonage. Sanded church and parsonage floors, laid new floor covering on kitchen and dining area. Painted basement, purchased seventy folding chairs and new song books.

#### Livermore-

Louisville I—Installed a new 30 gallon water heater. Two floors sanded and finished, three rooms redecorated. New roof on front

porch. Changed heating system from gravity heat to forced air heat in the parsonage. Purchased a new Hammond organ for the church. And made some other minor improvements.

Wheelwright—Purchased seats and two road signs.

In the office of Executive Secretary of Kentucky Pilgrim Youth, I have traveled 1450 miles. Kentucky Pilgrim pastors will have to evaluate this Youth Camp project. It is my candid opinion that it will be a setback to Kentucky's Forward Movement if you should decide to discontinue it, but if it fails to have your active approval, it would be a financial failure to try to continue it.

While there have been few achievements in this department for the year God would like to make this one of the strong areas of the district. It shall be if we all strengthen the hands of our new secretary, Paul Ebright.

#### RESOLUTIONS

#### District Superintendent

- 1. Resolved: That the District Superintendent make two trips over the District during the year, and to give more time to the smaller churches as needed.
- 2. Resolved: That the District Superintendent be consulted and present, if possible, when drawing up all deeds in the district, and that he see that all deeds are abstracted and properly conveyed and recorded.

#### Council

- 3. Resolved: That the District Council be vested with full power to construct buildings for the District when necessary, appointing and directing a committee to carry out its plan.
- 4. Resolved: That the District Council set the date for the Ministerial Convention and that said date be recorded in the minutes.

- 5. Resolved: That the District Council appoint all pastors for new missions for the first five years, or until said Council decides to do otherwise.
- 6. Resolved: That the Conference delegate to the Council power to make rules and by-laws regulating the sale of lots, the building of cottages, and to govern the Camp grounds; the same to be printed in the Minutes.
- 7. Resolved: That the District Council be given power to rezone the churches of the District when necessary.

#### Churches

- 8. Resolved: That each church supply the Camp with one blanket and two sheets.
- 9. Resolved: That each church close their books on the last day of each month, and the monthly budgets be sent to the District Treasurer immediately. Be it also resolved: That the District Treasurer's books be closed for the year, at noon, on the 10th day of July.
- 10. Resolved: That each church, minister, and deaconess mail a copy of its annual report to the District Statistician by the 15th of July each year and Be it further resolved: That persons failing to comply with this ruling be reported to the District Council and Examining Committee.
- 11. Resolved: That whereas many of our pastors do not receive sufficient financial support, Be it resolved: That each local church appoint one prayer meeting night each month as "donation night" at which time food stuff and provisions shall be brought together for the pastor. Be it also resolved: That the District Superintendent shall appoint "an agitator" at the annual business meeting, whose duty is to announce donation night in advance.
- 12. Resolved: That since it is a matter of great importance for the pastors of the District to attend the Camp and Conference, Be it Resolved: That the pastor's support at the church where he is assigned as pastor shall continue over the two Sundays he attends Camp and Conference and the first Sunday following.
- 13. Resolved: That each church and mission install and practice the envelope system of collecting tithes and offerings.
- 14. Resolved: That we, as pastors and church boards, urge the calling of evangelists for our revivals from among our own Pilgrim ministers, and that the District Superintendent be consulted before we call other ministers.
- 15. Resolved: That we strive for at least two new churches in the Kentucky District this year.

#### Sunday School

- 16. Resolved: That each Sunday School correctly enroll each class, said enrollment to be revised quarterly.
- 17. Resolved: That each zone have a Sunday School Attendance Banner to be given quarterly to the Sunday School having the largest attendance; also, an offering banner for the Sunday School giving the largest offerings.
- 18. Resolved: That we provide for a Sunday School Convention, and that this be the order of the first day of the Ministerial Convention. Be it further resolved: That the superintendent or a representative from each Sunday School attend said Convention, taking notes to be used in the Sunday School meetings in the local Church.

- 19. Resolved: That each Sunday School endeavor to establish another Sunday School this year.
- 20. Resolved: That each Sunday School be given credit for the number of scholars from their church attending Sunday School at our Camp.
- 21. Resolved: That the Sunday School service at Camp be under the supervision of the District Sunday School Board.

#### Young People

- 22. Resolved: That we have a District Youth Convention which shall convene the first Saturday of Camp through the day services of the same.
- 23. Resolved: That the Executive Secretary recommend to the District Council the Zone Youth Chairmen. The Council shall act on these recommendations and the names of these appointees shall be forwarded to the Executive Secretary by the termination of Conference. The Zone Youth Chairmen shall direct the zone Youth program under the supervision of the Executive Secretary.
- 24. Resolved: That we have a Young People's Official Directory posted in the front of the Minutes.
- 25. Resolved: That a Committee to be known as the Youth Executive Committee, shall be provided, said members to be, the Executive Secretary, Assistant Secretary, Secretary and Treasurer and three advisory members to be appointed by the initial members of the committee within 5 days after the District Youth Convention. The duties of this committee shall be to outline and guide our youth program under the supervision of the District Superintendent.
  - 26. Resolved: That we have a Youth Camp each year.

#### Zones

- 27. Resolved: That each zone elect their zone officers at the last zone meeting prior to Camp, so the names of the Chairmen can be listed in the Minutes.
- 28. Resolved: That the District Zones be recorded in the Minutes.
- 29. Resolved: That in addition to the Zone Chairman, Young People's Chairman, and Secretary-Treasurer, that each zone have a Sunday School Representative, Missionary Chairman, and a Junior Missionary Chairman, all of these to be under the supervision of the District Superintendent.

#### District Home Missions

- 30. Resolved: That a District Home Missionary Committee be formed, said Committee to consist of the District Superintendent and the District Treasurer by virtue of office, and two Advisory members who are to be chosen from the Ordained ministers by the Council. Be it further resolved that their duties are:
- a. To keep a constant lookout for new areas in which to locate new Pilgrim Holiness churches.
- b. To be responsible for selecting an appropriate location and the general oversight of the same.

#### Credentials

- 31. Resolved: That all persons applying for license appear in person before the Examining Board, unless the applicant is sick or otherwise unable to appear; in which case some member of the Conference is to certify as to his or her character and location.
- 32. Resolved: That those pursuing the Study Course send for their Home Study Course early in the year, forwarding, with their request, \$1.00 to cover the cost of questions and postage for each subject.

#### Pastor

- 33. Resolved: That each pastor read all resolutions of this Conference to his congregation at the earliest possible date.
- 34. Resolved: That each pastor make a special effort to place a current Manual in the home of each member of our church.
- 35. Resolved: That each pastor list in a book the name and address of each Advocate Subscriber, with the expiration date; said book is to be transferred to his successor, and that each pastor endeavor to keep a subscription list equal to his membership.
- 36. Resolved: That no pastor hold revivals off his charge without making satisfactory arrangements with his church and the District Superintendent. Be it further resolved: That no pastor hold a revival away from his church within 30 days after a revival in his own church, no more than two revivals during the Conference year, providing said church is supporting him.
- 37. Resolved: That each pastor send the obituary of deceased members of his church to the Chairman of the Memorials Committee immediately following the funeral.
- 38. Resolved: That each active pastor be given two weeks vacation with pay.
- 39. Resolved: That each minister submit his name, address, and telephone number to the District Secretary immediately upon arrival at his new address; the same to be included in the Ministerial Directory. Each minister shall notify the District Secretary of any changes occurring thereafter.

#### Ministers

- 40. Resolved: That each minister support financially the church of which he is a member.
- 41. Resolved: That each minister attend the Camp and Conference in full or present a written explanation of non-attendance to the District Council.
- 42. Resolved: That whereas ministers are interested in the welfare of other ministers and their families, and, whereas, there is a Ministerial Benefit Association established for the purpose of protecting the family of the deceased minister, we therefore recommend: That the local church assume payment of the assessment when called for by the Association. Be it also resolved: That the District pay the assessment of the District Superintendent and all those under the jurisdiction of the District Home Missionary Committee.
- 43. Resolved: That an information blank be filled out by ministers that cannot attend the Conference; said blank to be furnished by the District.
- 44. Resolved: That no minister or church shall conduct a radio broadcast without permission of the District Council.

#### Conference

- 45. Resolved: That no one leave the Conference without permission.
- 46. Resolved: That no church send a delegate to Conference who will not agree to stay throughout the entire Conference. See Manual, Sec. 82, Paragraph 2.
- 47. Resolved: That the Conference shall convene on Thursday 9:00 A. M., last week of the Camp.
- 48. Resolved: That our churches send qualified delegates, who know the problems of the church and district; also, that we send someone other than the pastor's wife as delegate when possible.

#### Camp

- 49. Resolved: That our Camp shall begin on the last Friday in July.
- 50. Resolved: That we register all who come to camp, assigning work to each one as equally as possible. A meal ticket will be given all who register, the same to be presented at the dining room door.
- 51. Resolved: That the District Superintendent, his wife, and the Camp nurse, be registered free for the Camp and Conference. Be it further resolved: That the District Superintendent, his wife, the nurse, and the called workers for the Camp and Conference be entertained free at the lunch stand.
- Resolved: That we give space in the book room for a table and some one to take subscriptions to the Advocate, Pilgrim Youth News, and the Missionary Bulletin.
- 53. Resolved: That all who disregard the following rules be answerable to the District Council:
- a. All pastors shall instruct their churches and young people that all who come to Camp shall abide by the rules.
- b. Everyone shall retire, or be quiet, after 11:00 P. M.
  c. A dean shall be appointed over each dormitory.
  d. Single young people shall not be allowed off the Camp grounds after 7:00 P. M.
- e. No articles shall be taken from the kitchen or dining room without permission from the one in charge; any article taken shall be returned in good condition.
  - f. No food shall be taken from the kitchen without permission.
- Parents shall supervise the conduct of their children while on the Camp ground.
- h. A supervisor shall be appointed for the dining room and kitchen, the parking of cars, the care of the Tabernacle, the lunch and book rooms, the Registration office, and care of the grounds; the same to be appointed by the Camp meeting committee.
- 54. Resolved: That we have the registration of dormitory rooms to begin at noon Friday, and that the District Council work out a system for renting the rooms.
- Resolved: That each minister give three days labor, or pay the equivalent, in developing the Camp grounds, or in Camp preparation, when called upon by the District Superintendent.
- 56. Resolved: That whereas we have a large number of children on our Camp ground during Camp; Be it therefore resolved: That a fund be established to provide the necessary equipment for a supervised playground, using the offerings from the Children's services to apply on the equipment. Be it further resolved: That the District

Council appoint a committee to take the necessary steps to provide said playground.

- 57. Resolved: That all cabin owners furnish their own mattresses for their cabins.
- 58. Resolved: That the Camp Meeting committee meet at the Ministerial Convention and plan for the preparing of the Camp ground and buildings for Camp and appoint capable persons to carry out the work of the Camp.
- 59. Resolved: That the District Superintendent appoint a special committee to stay after Camp to clean up the Camp grounds.
- 60. Resolved: Since it is so important that the Camp set the proper example and standards for others to follow; Therefore, be it resolved: That the District Council see that all workers, such as speakers, singers, pianists, and musicians used in any service on the Camp meeting platform, be required to dress as "becometh holiness," including the wearing of hose and sleeves of below elbow length.
- 61. Resolved: That in order to provide facilities for visitors eating outside the dining room; Be it resolved: That the District Council arrange for the making and placing of at least six tables on the Camp ground.

#### Miscellaneous

- 62. Resolved: That no one person serve on more than one committee where competent persons are available.
- 63. Resolved: That each church plan for a Daily Vacation Bible School.
- 64. Resolved: That the Camp meeting committee shall be enlarged to twelve to take care of Camp preparation. Be it further resolved: That only these workers have priority to dormitory rooms. Others who come and eat in the dining room before Friday noon shall be charged the regular price for each meal, unless called by the District Superintendent.
- 65. Resolved: That, whereas, there is a need for stimulation of interest in the Home Missionary work of the District; and whereas, reports on the Sunday School attendance would be a help and of interest to the district; Be it therefore resolved: That we have a District Bulletin mimeographed each month and distributed to our churches giving Sunday School attendance and averages, and reports from our district Home Missionaries.
- 66. Resolved: Whereas much valuable time is sometimes taken by resolutions which may not deserve such time, and whereas, the Resolution Committee often feels reluctant to ignore any resolution even if it seems of small importance; Be it therefore resolved: That this Conference invest the Resolution Committee with the power to reject any resolution that is not written out and signed by the person who offers it for consideration to the committee and, or, Conference.
- 67. Resolved: That we establish an honor system and that the Gold Star Churches be those that have paid their district and general budgets in full, and sent to the Treasurer by the 10th of each month. Be it further resolved: That all churches reporting each month be designated as Silver Star Churches. This chart is to be compiled by the District Treasurer and put on display at the District Camp.
- 68. Resolved: That resolutions which are of a temporary nature shall become void upon their completion and shall automatically be deleted from our minutes.

#### Minutes

69. That we have 700 copies of the District Minutes printed to sell for  $25\phi$  per copy.

#### Special

70. Resolved: That this Conference give a rising vote of thanks to our Conference Chairman, Rev. R. C. Hawkins, the General Secretary of Church Extension, our Camp evangelist, Rev. J. W. Adcock, our Camp singers, Wesley and Virginia Chatfield, the Children's worker, Mrs. W. W. Tromble, the Foreign Missionary Representative, Rev. R. G. Strickland, the Home Missionary Representative, Rev. K. W. Phipps and Rev. Milford Burcham, the Frankfort Bible School representatives, Rev. Tommy Holhouser, Rev. and Mrs. Ralph Tromble, the District officials, the Department heads, the cooks, and all others who served untiringly to make the Camp a blessing to others.

## RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

- 1. We recommend: That each Sunday School pay one dollar per month into the portable tabernacle fund. We further recommend: That each Sunday School adopt the birthday offering plan, said offering to go toward the portable tabernacle and home missionary funds.
- 2. We recommend: That each church take a free will offering for the District Superintendent on all his visits, the same to be sent in by the local treasurer and applied on the Superintendent's traveling expense.
- 3. We recommend: That whereas, there is a pressing need for buildings to house our people, that each church or individual buying a lot be asked to build a cabin on said lot within three years, and if they fail to so do, to put the lot up for resale. Furthermore, we recommend: That those who purchased lots prior to this date be contacted by the District Superintendent urging them to build a cabin within two years or give the District the privilege of reselling their lot.
- 4. We recommend: That whereas our District Home Missions and Church Extension Loan Fund is being supervised by the District Council, and they are placing all designated funds in this department, that the rate of interest be two percent (2%) on all loans.
- 5. We recommend: That when the Executive Young People's Secretary conducts a Rally in the zone meetings, that an offering be taken in the service for his traveling expenses.
- 6. We recommend: That each church pay the registration fee of their pastor and wife and church delegate to the District Conference; this amount to be raised by the District Superintendent at the annual meeting; and also an offering for their traveling expense.
- 7. We recommend: That the District Treasurer be paid two hundred fifty (\$250.00) dollars per year, and the District Secretary one hundred (\$100.00) dollars per year; the same to be paid in equal monthly payments; and that the District Statistician be paid forty (\$40.00) dollars per year.
- 8. We recommend: That each church have a monthly Missionary service on the Lord's day, at which time an offering be taken for foreign missions; also a monthly missionary prayer meeting.

- 9. We recommend: That each church and Sunday School send ten per cent (10%) of their regular offerings to the District Treasurer, designated as District Budget. This does not include special offerings, such as building fund, evangelists, general obligations.
- 10. We recommend: That the District Treasurer send to each local church a quarterly statement showing amounts due in each department.
- 11. We recommend: That the District keep a complete set of the Ministerial Course of study books.
- 12. We recommend: That the District Superintendent's salary be three thousand one hundred and twenty (\$3,120.00) dollars per year; seven ( $7\phi$ ) cents per mile for traveling expense; all utilities paid; and that he be granted a two weeks vacation.
- 13. We recommend: That any minister traveling under the direction of the District Superintendent, the Board or Committee of which he is a part, be paid five  $(5\phi)$  cents per mile traveling expense plus one (\$1.00) dollar per meal bought while in District work.
- 14. We recommend: That the churches pay their pastor a salary at least equal to the average wages of the working people of the church, and that the matter of the pastor's salary be taken care of by the District Superintendent or his assistant at the time of the annual meeting.
- 15. We recommend: That in compliance with the action of the General Conference, our General Budget be \$6.00 per member, to be divided as follows: Foreign Missions 35%; General Church Extension 25%; General Administrative Expense 20%; Senior Church School 10%; General Church Extension Loan Fund 6%; General Sunday School 4%. This amount is to be sent to the District Treasurer in a lump sum each month as General Budget.
- 16. We recommend: That the District Budget be divided as follows: Superintendent's expense 53%; Sinking fund 30%; District parsonage 10%; Zone Bible School 4%; General Conference expense 3%.
- 17. We recommend: That the District raise one thousand dollars (\$1000.00) per year to assist on the Camp meeting; the same to be raised by each local church giving the sum equivalent to one dollar (\$1.00) per member, the sum to be sent to the District Treasurer.
- 18. We recommend: That whereas a Camp Meeting Association has been formed for the purpose of the promotion of the Camp, that each member continue to pay at least one dollar (\$1.00) per year. This is to be a standing pledge.
- 19. We recommend: That all money be turned over to the local church treasurer from the different departments of the church at the end of each month; and that the local church treasurer pay all the bills as directed by the Church Board.
- 20. We recommend: That each church take steps to raise their revival offering at least thirty days before the revival starts.
- 21. We recommend: That when a mission is organized into a church it shall not be asked to pay district budget for one year from the following Conference; and that the church shall pay fifty per cent for the two following years.
- 22. We recommend: That an offering be taken in each zone meeting for the expense of the promotion of the Sunday School work in the District.
- 23. We recommend: That whereas the 1946 General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church adopted the "Pension Plan" to aid re-

tired and disabled ministers, and whereas each District Conference is asked to contribute 4% of the pastor's salary, lay worker's salary, evangelist's offerings, etc., to said Pension Fund, and whereas, this Conference has voted to fully cooperate with the General Board of Pensions in this matter, We recommend: That we adopt this plan of financing it, namely: That each local church may pay the equivalent of 40% of the evangelist's tithe, who are members of said church, and 4% of the pastor's salary. This to be sent monthly to the District Treasurer. All members of the "Pension Fund Plan" should pay 2% of salary and offering as reported to the Conference.

- 24. We recommend: That each Sunday School set aside one Sunday each month and 50% of said Sunday's offering be given for District Home Missions.
- 25. We recommend: That in order to encourage our local churches to observe sound and acceptable business practices in the handling of local church funds, that therefore, be it resolved; that two local church board members, other than the treasurer, count and make a record of the offerings as received, and then immediately turn over to the local church treasurer these funds and their records for further check and bank deposit. Be it further resolved: That when the local church treasurer's reports are made to the local church, that the bank statements be made available and balance be shown to check with the treasurer's record.
- 26. We recommend: That whereas we have no means of promoting the youth work of our District, that each church send one dollar (\$1.00) per month; and each Zone Youth Rally send one half of each Rally offering for Youth Camp; said monies to be sent to the District Treasurer, same to be forwarded to the District Youth Treasurer at the end of each month.
- 27. We recommend: That each church give the minimum of five dollars (\$5.00) to support the District Ministerial Convention each year.

#### REPORT OF

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

To the Forty-Seventh Annual Conference of the Kentucky District now in session:

With this report we bring to a close our labors for the year as your Sunday School Promotional Secretary. It has been a good year for Sunday Schools in our District. The cooperation of the pastors has been good and the spirit of aggressiveness has characterized the major number of our schools.

This fact has been clearly revealed by the wonderful gains made in this phase of our district work. For this year we have 36 schools reporting gains, 11 reporting loss, 6 reports are incomplete and one new school. We have a total average attendance of 3237 for this year against 2844 for 1955. This gives us a gain of 393 or 14%.

The Wheelwright Church under the leadership of Rev. Mrs. Vera Hysel received both certificates of Conference Award for the largest numerical and percentage gain of the year. Certificates were awarded to 22 of our churches for their gains with 12 receiving the blue ribbon for over 10% gain, 5 received the red ribbon for over 25% gain, and 5 received the gold ribbon for over 50% gain.

Through the year there has been an increased interest in the Sunday School bulletin, "The Kentucky Pilgrim." Each month we have published about 750 copies and sent out to the churches. We have also published a supplementary song sheet for use in the Sunday Schools and instituted a permanent record system, covering a ten year period.

It was our privilege to conduct a tour of our district with Rev. P. F. Elliott, our General Secretary of Sunday Schools and Youth. These services were well attended and the messages well received. We also were privileged to attend the meeting of the District Promotional Secretaries in Indianapolis in September of last year. At this meeting we were elected to serve on the General Advisory Sunday School Committee and in this capacity attended another meeting at Headquarters in Indianapolis.

It has been a pleasure to serve you for this past year. Your splendid cooperation has been deeply appreciated. The new year is bright with the prospects for the Kentucky Sunday Schools. Let's join together to make sure that Kentucky Sunday Schools continue to go forward.

#### RULES GOVERNING SALE OF LOTS AND BUILDING COTTAGES

Price of lots, \$20.00 each. Terms: \$5.00 down payment when purchased, balance to be paid in monthly payments of \$3.00 each. Six per cent on unpaid balance at maturity. All lots are to be paid for in six months or contract is void.

All outside lots in the old plot shall be of this dimension, 20 feet in width and 30 feet in length. Inside lots shall be 20x20. All lots in the new plot shall be 20x30 feet. All cottages are to be uniform in size and placements on lots in accordance with the row or street on which they may be placed. The dimensions of the cottages are to be 10x12 feet, with an 8-foot eave, six concrete piers, one door and two windows, a screen door, and either a metal or asphalt roof. The building is to be made of dressed lumber, either boxed or framed, and to have two coats of white paint. An extension of nine feet may be built on any of the cabins on an outside lot of the old plot, such additions to be of the same dimensions as that of the cabin with a window on each side. A porch may be built on the front of any and all cottages. Cabins on the new plot may be either single or double.

The District Council holds the right to paint or repair in any way necessary, unless the owner does the work himself, and the owner is to pay the expense of same. Aluminum paint only is to be used on the metal roof. The District Council is to keep all buildings insured and the owner of each cottage is to pay his part of the premium.

#### RATES FOR THE CAMP

Registration fees: \$5.00 and work assigned: \$10.00 and no work assigned. This rate is to include all persons from 12 years of age and over. Those from 6 through 12 years will be registered for \$2.50 and those under 6 shall be registered free. All meals will be fifty cents. Dormitory rooms and cabins \$10.00 each.

Dormitory rooms and cabins \$10.00 each.

A flat rate of \$1.00 shall be charged for electricity used in cabins and house trailers on the ground, the same to be paid by those using

said trailers and cabins when registering. Registration shall begin at noon Friday.
