

Second Sitting

Resolutions of Ways and Means was presented by James Buckles:

Be it resolved: That we adopt the present zone system which is now in effect. Carried.

Be it resolved: That each zone have at least one zone rally per quarter. Carried.

Be it resolved: That space be given in the Conference Minutes for a Youth Section, consisting of directory of officers, committees, resolutions, ways and means recommendations and minutes of Youth Conference. Carried.

Bro. Ebright brought to the attention of the conference a youth project for the coming year. Motion made that we plan for a youth tabernacle for the Camp grounds. Carried.

Motion made and carried that we give Bro. Ebright a rising vote of confidence for his splendid work as District Youth President.

Rev. E. R. Mitchell was guest speaker for the service. His subject was "Life." He read from James 4:14 and Matthew 6:25 and 30.

The Conference sang "We'll Work Till Jesus Comes" and Rev. H. H. Barber pronounced the benediction.

RESOLUTIONS

1. Resolved: That the District Youth Conference be held on Tuesday and Wednesday of Camp Meeting at 6:00 P. M. each evening.

2. Resolved: That the District Youth President recommend to the District Council the Zone Youth Chairmen. The Council shall act on these recommendations and the names of these appointees shall be forwarded to the President by the termination of Conference. The Zone Youth Chairmen shall direct the Zone Youth Program under the supervision of the District Youth President.

3. Resolved: That each zone have at least one zone rally per quarter. Each zone chairman shall report to the District President immediately following each zone youth rally stating attendance, offering, special features and other appropriate information. Be it further resolved: That we adopt the present zone system which is now in effect.

4. Resolved: That space be given in the Conference Minutes for a Youth Section, consisting of directory of officers, committees, resolutions, ways and means recommendations and minutes of Youth Conference.

5. Resolved: That a Committee, to be known as the Youth Executive Committee, shall be provided. The members to be the District President, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer, and three advisory members to be appointed by the initial members of the committee within five days after the District Youth Conference. The duties of this committee shall be to outline and guide our youth program under the supervision of the District Superintendent.

6. Resolved: That we have a Youth Camp each year.

7. Resolved: That we plan to build a Youth Tabernacle on the Camp grounds.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. We recommend: That when the District Youth President conducts a Rally in the zone meetings, that an offering be taken in the service for his traveling expenses.

2. We recommend: That whereas we have no means of promoting the youth work of our District, that each church send one dollar (\$1.00) per month; and each zone shall be responsible for taking one special offering for Youth Camp to be sent to the District Treasurer, same to be forwarded to the District Youth Treasurer.

CONFERENCE MINUTES

FIRST SITTING

The Forty-Ninth Annual Conference of the Kentucky District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened in the Tabernacle, August 7, 1958 at 9:00 A. M. with the District Superintendent, Rev. Ralph Tromble, in charge.

Rev. Paul Ebright led the Conference in singing "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms." Rev. S. S. Hulett led in prayer.

The District Superintendent presented Rev. R. A. Beltz, General Secretary-Treasurer, as the presiding officer for the Conference.

Bro. Beltz read from I Corinthians 9:7-27. He then addressed the Conference on the subject: "Claiming the Narrow Margin." We should claim the narrow margin in:

1. Our Personal Devotions

2. Our Study

3. Our Appearance

4. Our Time

5. Operation of the Church Program

Claiming the narrow margin determines success or failure.

Motion was made and carried that the hours for Conference be 9:00-12:00 A. M. and 1:30-4:00 P. M.

Rev. Neal Horton expressed his appreciation for the earnest prayers of this Conference on his behalf when he was very ill at last Conference time.

The District Superintendent's good report was read and heartily accepted.

Two new churches were presented to the Conference: Lancaster, C. H. Hildreth, pastor, with eleven members; Shepherdsville, Dan Garrett, pastor, with ten members. These churches were accepted. Motion made and carried that Rev. Dan Garrett be seated within

the Conference bar.

No. 5. Carried. This changed the word "this" to "each" in Res. No. 19.

No. 6. Carried. This is Res. No. 44 in the present Minutes.

This deleted Res. No. 67. No. 7. Carried.

No. 8. Carried. The words "commercial printers" were deleted from No. 65.

No. 9. Carried. This deleted Res. No. 71.

The Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee reported:

Recommendation No. 1. Carried. This made a change in Rec. No. 14.

Recommendation No. 2. Carried. This is No. 15 in present Minutes.

Recommendation No. 3. Carried. This is No. 28 in present Minutes.

The second sitting was adjourned by expiration of time. Rev. H. H. Barber dismissed with prayer.

THIRD SITTING

Conference reconvened at 9:00 A.M., August 8, 1959. Rev. R. V. Gibbs led in singing "I Love to Tell the Story." Rev. R. E. Bell led in prayer.

Rev. R. A. Beltz, Presiding Officer, brought a devotional from Acts 11:19-27.

The Reception Committee introduced Rev. J. L. Estes of Springfield, Ohio, and Rev. William Barton of Williamsburg, Tenn., to the Conference.

The Statistician's report was read and accepted with the understanding that the reports of churches not reporting be secured if possible.

Moved and carried that the recommendations of the Educational and Examining Boards be approved.

Special prayer was requested for Rev. Clyde Dupin who is ill.

Moved and carried that the Conference Secretary send a letter of greetings to Rev. S. M. Stikeleather, Rev. G. J. Tackett, and Rev. Člyde Dupin.

Motion made and carried that the election of officers be the next business of the day. The District Superintendent appointed the tellers.

Ballots were cast for Assistant District Superintendent. Rev. F. M. Singleton was elected.

Ballots were cast for District Secretary. Rev. R. L. Goodman was elected.

Ballots were cast for District Treasurer. Rev. C. W. Keyes was elected.

Ballots were cast for Advisory Members of the Council. Rev. H. H. Barber was elected on first ballot.

The second ballot was cast for the remaining members of the Council, with voting limited to the four highest.

The Conference adjourned by expiration of time.

FOURTH SITTING

Ballots were cast for the two vacancies on the Examining Board. H. H. Barber and E. R. Mitchell were elected.

Ballots were cast for the vacancy on the Educational Board. William Daniels was elected.

Motion made and carried that we retain the same trustees as of last year.

A motion concerning the General Loan Fund was carried. This is Recommendation No. 29.

A motion carried that the "Kentucky Pilgrim," official organ of the District, be printed for the price of 7e per copy.

The Chairman of the Condolence Committee reported. The Conference stood in prayer in memory of those who have gone to their reward.

The invitation to have the Ministerial Institute at the Covington I Church was accepted.

The District Superintendent appointed the committees.

Motion made and carried that the price of the District Minutes be thirty-five cents per copy.

All unfinished business was left in the hands of the District Council.

Rev. R. A. Beltz dismissed the 1958 Conference with prayer.

ORDINATION SERVICE

The Ordination Service was at 1:30 P. M., August 8, 1958. Rev. C. W. Keyes led in singing "A Charge to Keep I Have." Rev. Ralph Tromble led in prayer. The Brecheisens sang "Let Me Lose Myself and Find It Lord in Thee." Rev. F. M. Singleton read I Tim. 3, Rev. R. L. Goodman read II Tim. 4:1-8, and Rev. L. S. Houston read Titus 3:1-11.

Rev. R. A. Beltz spoke on the subject: "Bible Standard for the Ministry." He read J. B. Phillips' translation of I Tim. 3:1-7 and Titus 1:5-9.

1. The ministry of the Word will stimulate faith.

2. The ministry of the Word will refute opposition.

3. A minister should be of good reputation.

4. A minister should have a stable home life.

5. A minister must have mastery over himself.

6. A minister must have a proper motive in the ministry.

The candidates for Ordination, Thelma Bartley, Roy Green, John Stewart, Flora Weedman, and Mrs. Ted Wilson knelt at the altar and after giving the charge, the Ordination Council laid their hands upon them and ordained them to the ministry.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Greetings! to the Forty-ninth Annual District Conference, our presiding officer, Rev. R. A. Beltz, the members of my council, and all of my ministers and friends. God has been giving us a gracious camp meeting, and I trust His blessings will be upon this Conference. This has been a busy year as you will see by my personal report, but it is all for Jesus. There have been some battles which have been almost hand to hand conflicts with the enemy, but God still answers prayer. We praise Him for victory.

What God Has Done

God has given a good year on the district. There has been a gain in Sunday School attendance and in church membership. He has given some very gracious revivals; there have been four new churches built, namely Ashland I, Covington I, Central City, and Lancaster. The last named is a new church and congregation, all since last conference. The other three places were where we had a church, but the people built a new building. Then, another that will be reported next year, is Winchester, where we are in the process of buying a church building for our new work there.

Our newest work is in Shepherdsville, where only a few months ago, a young man, Dan Garrett, felt the burden on his heart and went there and started to have services. God began to bless them and they have had as high as 61 in Sunday School, souls have been saved, and the District Superintendent was called to come for a service, and he found a group of people who were ready to be organized, so a church was organized with ten members. They are having to rent their building, but want to build.

A number of our churches have made improvements on their property. The Elizabethtown church has purchased a three acre plot and are in the process of building, and the Louisville church has bought a lot and will be building. Both of these will be reported later.

The Scripture says: "We are workers together with God." I appreciate my good council and the ministers of our District. May God bless each of you.

The following are some of the improvements that have been made—Churches and Their Improvements:

Ashland I—Built a lovely new church. The front lawn has been landscaped, and parking lot fixed with rock.

Augusta—Did some remodeling on the inside of the church.

Carlisle—They laid tile floor in the church; did some decorating in the church and Sunday School rooms; also did some decorating in the parsonage, and purchased a Sunday School bus.

Carrollton—Finished Sunday School rooms in the basement, and laid carpet.

Central City—In the process of building a new church.

Clay—Bought house and lot next to the church which will be used as a parsonage.

Cloverport—Painted and papered the interior of the parsonage, laid hardwood floor, which greatly improved its appearance.

Covington I—Completed their lovely new church.

Cynthiana—Installed natural gas, did remodeling on the parsonage, purchased pews for the church, painted floors and woodwork.

Eastview—Redecorated inside of parsonage and planted shrubbery around the church.

Elizabethtown—Did some work on the Sunday School rooms, purchased a piano, did some decorating on inside of parsonage, purchased a 3 acre building lot, and are in the process of building a lovely new church.

Erlanger—Installed new doors in church, constructed new Sunday School rooms in the basement, repaired and painted the outside of the church.

Falmouth—Bought a church bus, redecorated the parsonage and church.

Frankfort—Painted inside of church, laid tile floor in basement, bought folding chairs for some class rooms, purchased new coat and hat rack, paved the church parking lot, installed new clock and Sunday School register, also a ventilating system. The young people's society provided a bulletin for the outside of the church, and also a lovely picture of Christ for the auditorium, also did some painting in the parsonage.

Fullerton—Bought four dozen folding chairs, painted the church, put shingles on the Sunday School rooms, built vestibule in front of the church.

Garvin Hill—Put in two new furnaces, and refinished church floor. **Greenup**—Tile floor in the church, new lights, also decorated interior of church, parsonage, and installed gas heaters.

Hitchins—Installed gas heating in both church and parsonage, also did some decorating.

Junction City—Put screens on windows, and painted one Sunday School room in the church.

Kingswood—Finished lovely Sunday School rooms, 8 rooms and the pastor's study.

Lancaster—Built a new church. This is a new church and new congregation.

Latonia—Painted Sunday School rooms in basement of church, planted shrubbery in the front of church, and did redecorating and remodeling on the parsonage.

Lexington—Youth society installed a new altar in the church, put partitions in basement to provide more Sunday School rooms.

Lewisport—Building 4 new Sunday School rooms on the rear of the church. Nice 8 room parsonage was given to the church.

Louisville I—Redecorated church and parsonage throughout, Sunday School rooms and basement.

Louisville II—Added rest rooms to church, and improved parking lot.

Maysville—Redecorated interior of the parsonage, installed new bathroom fixtures, did some remodeling on the parsonage.

McAndrews—Purchased curtains, song books and chairs for classrooms. Also finished partitions for classrooms in basement.

Morgantown—Purchased new seats for church.

Olive Hill—Rewired the church, did some work on classrooms.

Owensboro—Bought 24 pews for the Sunday School rooms, also redecorated some Sunday School rooms, did some work on church and parsonage.

Paris—Painted interior of church, poured a floor in the carport.

Pikeville—Sanded and refinished floors of the church, also purchased runner for aisle, and new songbooks, also paid off debt for piano.

Rush—Did some repair work on the church.

Salem—They have papered and painted, bought two new windows, and nice seats for the church.

Shelbyville—Erected a church sign, decorated the church auditorium, and put tile floors in Sunday School rooms.

Soldier—Installed new forced air furnace in church.

Somerset—Finished the floor and built a vestibule in the church.

Trace—Put a new roof on the church, and starting to build a parsonage.

Tram—Painted the interior of the church and purchased a new piano, runners for the aisle, did some repairs and painting on the parsonage.

Tyrone—Did painting and repairs on the church.

Wheelwright—Did some fixing on the church and purchased some furnishings for the parsonage.

MY PERSONAL REPORT

Sermons preached, 146; Church meetings, 62; Board meetings, 98; homes prayed in, 84; Communion services, 9; Attended one church leaders' conference, one Sunday School conference; conducted one camp and conference; presided over seven council meetings and five committee meetings; attended one School board meeting; three zone meetings; organized two churches, Lancaster and Shepherdsville; dedicated 8 fine Sunday School rooms and a pastor's study in Kingswood; dedicated four children; took eight members into the church besides the ones where the two churches were organized; preached at the service for the laying of the cornerstone, and was at the dedication service at the Covington I church; anointed 10 for healing; presided over one Ministerial convention and attended one General Conference. I have traveled 20,440 miles. These things have been done besides those things that come upon me daily, the care of all the churches. I praise God for the privilege of working for Him. RESOLUTIONS

District Superintendent

1. Resolved: That the District Superintendent make two trips over the District during the year, and to give more time to the smaller churches as needed.

2. Resolved: That the District Superintendent be consulted and present, if possible, when drawing up all deeds in the district, and that he see that all deeds are abstracted and properly conveyed and recorded.

Council

3. Resolved: That the District Council be vested with full power to construct buildings for the District when necessary, appointing and directing a committee to carry out its plan.

4. Resolved: That the District Council set the date for the Ministerial Institute and that said date be recorded in the minutes.

5. Resolved: That the District Council appoint all pastors for new missions for the first five years, or until said Council decides to do otherwise.

6. Resolved: That the Conference delegate to the Council power to make rules and by-laws regulating the sale of lots, the building of

cottages, and to govern the Camp grounds; the same to be printed in the Minutes.

7. Resolved: That the District Council be given power to rezone the churches of the District when necessary.

Churches

8. Resolved: That each church supply the Camp with one blanket and two sheets.

9. Resolved: That each church close their books on the last day of each month, and the monthly budgets be sent to the District Treasurer immediately. Be it also resolved: That the District Treasurer's books be closed for the year, at noon, on the 10th day of July.

10. Resolved: That each church, minister, and deaconess mail a copy of its annual report to the District Statistician by the 15th of July each year and Be it further resolved: That persons failing to comply with this ruling be reported to the District Council and Examining Committee.

11. Resolved: That whereas many of our pastors do not receive sufficient financial support, Be it resolved: That each local church appoint one prayer meeting night each month as "donation night" at which time food stuff and provisions shall be brought together for the pastor. Be it also resolved: That the District Superintendent shall appoint "an agitator" at the annual business meeting, whose duty is to announce donation night in advance.

12. Resolved: That since it is a matter of great importance for the pastors of the District to attend the Camp and Conference, Be it Resolved: That the pastor's support at the church where he is assigned as pastor shall continue over the two Sundays he attends Camp and Conference and the first Sunday following.

13. Resolved: That each church and mission install and practice the envelope system of collecting tithes and offerings.

14. Resolved: That pastors and church boards urge the calling of evangelists for our revivals from among our own Pilgrim ministers, and that the District Superintendent be consulted before we call other ministers.

15. Resolved: That we strive for at least two new churches in the District each year.

Sunday School

16. Resolved: That each Sunday School correctly enroll each class, said enrollment to be revised quarterly.

17. Resolved: That each zone have a Sunday School Attendance Banner to be given quarterly to the Sunday School having the largest attendance; also, an offering banner for the Sunday School giving the largest offerings.

18. Resolved: That we provide for a Sunday School Convention, and that this be the order of the first day of the Ministerial Convention. Be it further resolved: That the superintendent or a representative from each Sunday School attend said Convention, taking notes to be used in the Sunday School meetings in the local Church.

19. Resolved: That each Sunday School endeavor to establish another Sunday School each year.

20. Resolved: That each Sunday School be given credit for the number of scholars from their church attending Sunday School at our Camp.

21. Resolved: That the Sunday School service at Camp be under the supervision of the District Sunday School Board.

Zones

22. Resolved: That each zone elect their zone officers at the last zone meeting prior to Camp, so the names of the Chairmen can be listed in the Minutes.

23. Resolved: That the District Zones be recorded in the Minutes.

24. Resolved: That in addition to the Zone Chairman, Young People's Chairman, and Secretary-Treasurer, that each zone have a Sunday School Representative, Missionary Chairman, and a Junior Missionary Chairman, all of these to be under the supervision of the District Superintendent.

District Home Missions

25. Resolved: That a District Home Missionary Committee be formed, said Committee to consist of the District Superintendent and the District Treasurer by virtue of office, and two Advisory members who are to be chosen from the Ordained ministers by the Council. Be it further resolved that their duties are:

a. To keep a constant lookout for new areas in which to locate new Pilgrim Holiness churches.

b. To be responsible for selecting an appropriate location and the general oversight of the same.

Credentials

26. Resolved: That all persons applying for license appear in person before the Examining Board, unless the applicant is sick or otherwise unable to appear; in which case some member of the Conference is to certify as to his or her character and location.

27. Resolved: That those pursuing the Study Course send for their Home Study Course early in the year, forwarding, with their request, \$1.00 to cover the cost of questions and postage for each subject.

Pastor

28. Resolved: That each pastor read all resolutions of this Conference to his congregation at the earliest possible date.

29. Resolved: That each pastor make a special effort to place a current Manual in the home of each member of our church.

30. Resolved: That each pastor list in a book the name and address of each Advocate Subscriber, with the expiration date; said book is to be transferred to his successor, and that each pastor endeavor to keep a subscription list equal to his membership.

31. Resolved: That no pastor hold revivals off his charge without making satisfactory arrangements with his church and the District Superintendent. Be it further resolved: That no pastor hold a revival away from his church within 30 days after a revival in his own church, no more than two revivals during the Conference year, providing said church is supporting him.

32. Resolved: That each pastor send the obituary of deceased members of his church to the Chairman of the Memorials Committee immediately following the funeral.

33. Resolved: That each active pastor be given two weeks vacation with pay.

34. Resolved: That each minister submit his name, address, and telephone number to the District Secretary immediately upon arrival at his new address; the same to be included in the Ministerial Directory. Each minister shall notify the District Secretary of any changes occurring thereafter.

Ministers

35. Resolved: That each minister support financially the church of which he is a member.

36. Resolved: That each minister attend the Camp and Conference in full or present a written explanation of non-attendance to the District Council.

37. Resolved: That whereas ministers are interested in the welfare of other ministers and their families, and, whereas, there is a Ministerial Benefit Association established for the purpose of protecting the family of the deceased minister, we therefore recommend: That the local church assume payment of the assessment when called for by the Association. Be it also resolved: That the District pay the assessment of the District Superintendent and all those under the jurisdiction of the District Home Missionary Committee.

38. Resolved: That an information blank be filled out by ministers that cannot attend the Conference; said blank to be furnished by the District.

39. Resolved: That no minister or church shall conduct a radio broadcast without permission of the District Council.

40. Resolved: That upon the death of a minister or his wife the Superintendent be notified, and that he notify the District Secretary, who in turn will notify the Zone Chairmen, and they are to notify the pastors in their zone by phone or card.

Conference

41. Resolved: That no one leave the Conference without permission.

42. Resolved: That no church send a delegate to Conference who will not agree to stay throughout the entire Conference. See Manual, Sec. 82, Paragraph 2.

43. Resolved: That the Conference shall convene on Thursday 9:00 A. M., last week of the Camp.

44. Resolved: That our churches send qualified delegates, who know the problems of the church and district.

Camp

45. Resolved: That our Camp shall begin on the last Friday in July.

46. Resolved: That we register all who come to camp, assigning work to each one as equally as possible. A meal ticket will be given all who register, the same to be presented at the dining room door.

47. Resolved: That the District Superintendent, his wife, and the Camp nurse, be registered free for the Camp and Conference. Be it further resolved: That the District Superintendent, his wife, the nurse, and the called workers for the Camp and Conference be enter-tained free at the lunch stand.

48. Resolved: That we give space in the book room for a table and some one to take subscriptions to the Advocate, Pilgrim Youth News, and the Missionary Bulletin.

49. Resolved: That all who disregard the following rules be answerable to the District Council:

a. All pastors shall instruct their churches and young people that all who come to Camp shall abide by the rules.

b. Everyone shall retire, or be quiet, after 11:00 P. M.

c. A dean shall be appointed over each dormitory.

d. Single young people shall not be allowed off the Camp grounds after 7:00 P. M.

e. No articles shall be taken from the kitchen or dining room without permission from the one in charge; any article taken shall be returned in good condition.

f. No food shall be taken from the kitchen without permission.

g. Parents shall supervise the conduct of their children while on the Camp ground.

h. A supervisor shall be appointed for the dining room and kitchen, the parking of cars, the care of the Tabernacle, the lunch and book rooms, the Registration office, and care of the grounds; the same to be appointed by the District Council.

50. Resolved: That we have the registration of dormitory rooms to begin at noon Friday, and that the District Council work out a system for renting the rooms.

51. Resolved: That each minister give three days labor, or pay the equivalent, in developing the Camp grounds, or in Camp preparation, when called upon by the District Superintendent.

52. Resolved: That whereas we have a large number of children on our Camp ground during Camp; Be it therefore resolved: That a fund be established to provide the necessary equipment for a supervised playground, using the offerings from the Children's services to apply on the equipment. Be it further resolved: That the District Council appoint a committee to take the necessary steps to provide said playground.

53. Resolved: That all cabin owners furnish their own mattresses for their cabins.

54. Resolved: That the Camp Meeting committee meet at the Ministerial Institute and plan for the preparing of the Camp ground and buildings for Camp and appoint capable persons to carry out the work of the Camp.

55. Resolved: That the District Superintendent appoint a special committee to stay after Camp to clean up the Camp grounds.

56. Resolved: Since it is so important that the Camp set the proper example and standards for others to follow; Therefore, be it resolved: That the District Council see that all workers, such as speakers, singers, pianists, and musicians used in any service on the Camp meeting platform, be required to dress as "becometh holiness," including the wearing of hose and sleeves of below elbow length.

57. Resolved: That in order to provide facilities for visitors eating outside the dining room; Be it resolved: That the District Council arrange for the making and placing of at least six tables on the Camp ground.

58. Resolved: That the District Council appoint some one each year to be in charge of each of the prayer rooms and to arrange for prayer groups and other special prayer effort all through the Camp.

Miscellaneous

59. Resolved: That no one person serve on more than one committee where competent persons are available.

60. Resolved: That each church plan for a Daily Vacation Bible School.

61. Resolved: That the Camp meeting committee shall be enlarged to twelve to take care of Camp preparation. Be it further resolved: That only these workers have priority to dormitory rooms. Others who come and eat in the dining room before Friday noon shall be charged the regular price for each meal, unless called by the District Superintendent.

62. Resolved: Whereas much valuable time is sometimes taken by resolutions which may not deserve such time, and whereas, the Resolution Committee often feels reluctant to ignore any resolution even if it seems of small importance; Be it therefore resolved: That this Conference invest the Resolution Committee with the power to reject any resolution that is not written out and signed by the person who offers it for consideration to the committee and, or, Conference.

63. Resolved: That we establish an honor system and that the Gold Star Churches be those that have paid their district and general budgets in full, and sent to the Treasurer by the 10th of each month. Be it further resolved: That all churches reporting each month be designated as Silver Star Churches. This chart is to be compiled by the District Treasurer and put on display at the District Camp.

64. Resolved: That resolutions which are of a temporary nature shall become void upon their completion and shall automatically be deleted from our minutes.

65. Resolved: That a Conference paper be published monthly, the same to be edited by one appointed by the District Council. The various departments of our district program shall consider this as our official organ. The heads of these departments shall be considered as contributing editors. It is further recommended that this paper be devoted to information and promotion rather than a compilation of sermons.

66. Resolved: Inasmuch as next year will be the 50th Anniversary of our Conference, be it resolved that a committee be formed to prepare a special anniversary service at next Camp and that proper advertisement be made of same.

Minutes

67. That we have 700 copies of the District Minutes printed to sell for 35ϕ per copy.

Special

68. Resolved: That this Conference give a rising vote of thanks to our Conference Chairman, Rev. R. A. Beltz, General Secretary-Treasurer, Camp Evangelist, Dr. D. E. Wilson, Camp Singers, The Brecheisen Family, Children's Worker, Mrs. F. M. Singleton, Foreign Missionary Representatives, Rev. Ermal Wilson and Miss Annie Eubanks, Church Extension Representative, Rev. and Mrs. M. T. Cockman, the Quartette from Owosso College, Rev. and Mrs. Ralph Tromble, the District Officials, the Department Heads, the Cooks, and all others who served untiringly to make the Camp a blessing to others.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1. We recommend: That each Sunday School pay one dollar per month into the portable tabernacle fund. We further recommend: That each Sunday School adopt the birthday offering plan, said offering to go toward the portable tabernacle and home missionary funds.

2. We recommend: That each church take a free will offering for the District Superintendent on all his visits, the same to be sent in by the local treasurer and applied on the Superintendent's traveling expense.

3. We recommend: That whereas, there is a pressing need for buildings to house our people, that each church or individual buying a lot be asked to build a cabin on said lot within three years, and if they fail to so do, to put the lot up for resale. Furthermore, we recommend: That those who purchased lots prior to this date be contacted by the District Superintendent urging them to build a cabin within two years or give the District the privilege of reselling their lot.

4. We recommend: That whereas our District Home Missions and Church Extension Loan Fund is being supervised by the District Council, and they are placing all designated funds in this department, that the rate of interest be two percent (2%) on all loans.

5. We recommend: That when the Executive Young People's Secretary conducts a Rally in the zone meetings, that an offering be taken in the service for his traveling expenses.

6. We recommend: That each church pay the registration fee of their pastor and wife and church delegate to the District Conference; this amount to be raised by the District Superintendent at the annual meeting; and also an offering for their traveling expense.

7. We recommend: That the District Treasurer be paid two hundred fifty (\$250.00) dollars per year, and the District Secretary one hundred (\$100.00) dollars per year; the same to be paid in equal monthly payments; and that the District Statistician be paid forty (\$40.00) dollars per year.

8. We recommend: That each church have a monthly Missionary service on the Lord's day, at which time an offering be taken for foreign missions; also a monthly missionary prayer meeting.

9. We recommend: That each church and Sunday School send ten per cent (10%) of their regular offerings to the District Treasurer, designated as District Budget. This does not include special offerings, such as building fund, evangelists, General Church Obligations.

10. We recommend: That the District keep a complete set of the Ministerial Course of study books.

11. We recommend: That the District Superintendent's salary be three thousand one hundred and twenty (\$3,120.00) dollars per year; seven (7ϕ) cents per mile for traveling expense; all utilities paid; and that he be granted a two weeks vacation.

12. We recommend: That any minister traveling under the direction of the District Superintendent, the Board or Committee of which he is a part, be paid five (5ϕ) cents per mile traveling expense plus one (\$1.00) dollar per meal bought while in District work.

13. We recommend: That the churches pay their pastor a salary at least equal to the average wages of the working people of the

church, and that the matter of the pastor's salary be taken care of by the District Superintendent or his assistant at the time of the annual meeting.

14. We recommend: That in compliance with the action of the 1958 General Conference, our United Stewardship Fund be \$8.00 per member, to be divided as follows: Foreign Missions 20%; General Church Extension 14%; Administrative Expense 36%; Sunday School and Youth 2.6%; Senior College 21.4%; Church Extension Loan Fund 3%; Contingent Fund 3%. This amount is to be sent to the District Treasurer in a lump sum each month as United Stewardship Fund.

15. We recommend: That each pastor and church board make plans immediately for raising their portion of the United Stewardship Fund for the year. We further recommend: That inasmuch as in the division of the United Stewardship Fund 20% goes to Foreign Missions and 14% to Church Extension that we instruct our District Treasurer to take from money sent to him for Foreign Missions and Church Extension, but not specified for any special project, an amount not to exceed the above percentages and apply it on the United Stewardship Fund for our District.

16. We recommend: That the District Budget be divided as follows: Superintendent's expense 53%; Sinking fund 30%; District parsonage 10%; Zone Bible School 4%; General Conference expense 3%.

17. We recommend: That the District raise one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) per year to assist on the Camp meeting; the same to be raised by each local church giving the sum equivalent to one dollar (\$1.00) per member, the sum to be sent to the District Treasurer.

18. We recommend: That all money be turned over to the local church treasurer from the different departments of the church at the end of each month; and that the local church treasurer pay all the bills as directed by the Church Board.

19. We recommend: That each church take steps to raise their revival offering at least thirty days before the revival starts.

20. We recommend: That when a mission is organized into a church it shall not be asked to pay district budget for one year from the following Conference; and that the church shall pay fifty per cent for the two following years.

21. We recommend: That an offering be taken in each zone meeting for the expense of the promotion of the Sunday School work in the District.

22. We recommend: That whereas the 1946 General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church adopted the "Pension Plan" to aid retired and disabled ministers, and whereas each District Conference is asked to contribute 4% of the pastor's salary, lay worker's salary, evangelist's offerings, etc., to said Pension Fund, and whereas, this Conference has voted to fully cooperate with the General Board of Pensions in this matter, We recommend: That we adopt this plan of financing it, namely: That each local church may pay the equivalent of 40% of the evangelist's tithe, who are members of said church, and 4% of the pastor's salary. This to be sent monthly to the District Treasurer. All members of the Pension Fund Plan should pay 2% of salary and offering as reported to the Conference.

23. We recommend: That each Sunday School set aside one Sunday each month and 50% of said Sunday's offering be given for District Home Missions.

24. We recommend: That in order to encourage our local churches to observe sound and acceptable business practices in the handling of local church funds, that therefore, be it resolved; that two local church board members, other than the treasurer, count and make a record of the offerings as received, and then immediately turn over to the local church treasurer these funds and their records for further check and bank deposit. Be it further resolved: That when the local church treasurer's reports are made to the local church, that the bank statements be made available and balance be shown to check with the treasurer's record.

25. We recommend: That whereas we have no means of promoting the youth work of our District, that each church send one dollar (\$1.00) per month; and each zone shall be responsible for taking one special offering for Youth Camp to be sent to the District Treasurer, same to be sent to the District Youth Treasurer.

26. We recommend: That each church give the minimum of five dollars (\$5.00) to support the District Ministerial Institute each year.

27. We recommend: That the Dining room manager be paid \$35.00 for his services.

28. We recommend: That each church subscribe for the number of Kentucky Pilgrims they desire per month and that they pay 7ϕ per copy for same.

29. We recommend: Whereas, the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized the Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc., to make loans of Pension Funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches under such conditions as required active participation on the part of the Pilgrim Holiness District. Therefore, be it resolved by the Annual Conference of this district that the District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials be, and they are hereby authorizing, to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness churches of this district, subject, however, to limitations and conditions set out in said Resolutions of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loan.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

To the Annual Conference of the Kentucky District:

We have come to the close of another year and with this closing, another set of records in the history of Kentucky Sunday Schools has come to a close. To some these figures mean very little; however, to this conference we can only arrive at a conclusion as to our achievements as we look at figures, for figures talk. To some of our schools this has been a good year in Sunday Schools, with enlarged gains along with an enlarged vision of the purpose of the great Sunday School movement; to others it has been a year of loss. We do trust, however, it is but temporary.

As we look at the report for the year in greater detail we are grateful to report an over-all gain for the district. However we wish to stress that for the lack of reports we are unable to give as good a report as planned. For the previous year we had a total of 2654 monthly average and for this year 2792 monthly average, with a net gain average of 138 monthly. We have 24 schools showing a loss for the year, 19 schools showing a gain, 1 school the same, 2 new schools, and 5 too incomplete to report.

As to the reports of the various schools, we have 18 schools reporting fully, nine reporting eleven times, seven reporting ten times, six reporting nine times, four reporting eight times, thirteen reporting less than eight times.

The Conference awards for this year will go to McAndrews church with the largest numerical gain, a gain of 24. The Tram church is awarded the percentage gain with a gain of 76%. Also, the winning churches for the gain from the past quadrennium was Mc-Andrews with 46 gain, A. L. Sypolt pastor; Ashland Fairview with 43 gain, C. W. Keyes pastor; Elizabethtown with 38 gain, R. L. Goodman pastor; Fullerton with 33 gain, William Daniels pastor; Junction City with 20 gain, L. P. Chapin pastor. There were a total of 13 churches with a 10% gain or better for the year. Also, for special attention, two churches were given awards at the general conference for their achievements in the Enlargement program, namely Fullerton and Tram.

To our God be all the praise for the successes and to man for the recognition for all the failures, for He truly is sufficient for all things. Work for a greater year next year in the interest of Kentucky Sunday Schools as an arm to feed God's kingdom with precious boys and girls.

RULES GOVERNING SALE OF LOTS AND BUILDING COTTAGES

Price of lots, \$20.00 each. Terms: \$5.00 down payment when purchased, balance to be paid in monthly payments of \$3.00 each. Six per cent on unpaid balance at maturity. All lots are to be paid for in six months or contract is void.

All outside lots in the old plot shall be of this dimension, 20 feet in width and 30 feet in length. Inside lots shall be 20x20. All lots in the new plot shall be 20x30 feet. All cottages are to be uniform in size and placements on lots in accordance with the row or street on which they may be placed. The dimensions of the cottages are to be 10x12 feet, with an 8-foot eave, six concrete piers, one door and two windows, a screen door, and either a metal or asphalt roof. The building is to be made of dressed lumber, either boxed or framed, and to have two coats of white paint. An extension of nine feet may be built on any of the cabins on an outside lot of the old plot, such additions to be of the same dimensions as that of the cabin with a window on each side. A porch may be built on the front of any and all cottages. Cabins on the new plot may be either single or double.

The District Council holds the right to paint or repair in any way necessary, unless the owner does the work himself, and the owner is to pay the expense of same. Aluminum paint only is to be used on the metal roof. The District Council is to keep all buildings insured and the owner of each cottage is to pay his part of the premium.

RATES FOR THE CAMP

Registration fees: \$5.00 and work assigned; \$10.00 and no work assigned. This rate is to include all persons over 12 years of age. Those from 6 through 12 years will be registered for \$2.50 and those under 6 will be registered free. All meals will be fifty cents. Dormitory rooms and cabins \$10.00 each.

A flat rate of \$1.00 shall be charged for electricity used in cabins and house trailers on the ground, the same to be paid by those using said trailers and cabins when registering.

Registration shall begin at noon Friday.
