# HISTORY OF THE KENTUCKY DISTRICT, PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH, 1909-1959

"In the beginning God." Genesis 1:1. "Out of Zion, the perfection of beauty, God hath shined." Psalm 50:2. Surely God "shined" on the fair state of Kentucky, when fifty years ago a Holiness denomination was organized therein.

Back of the beginning, or what we know as a beginning, of any spiritual movement, there is and always has been, the Hand of God working out His purpose. To look back over the past and trace these events is a source of awe and inspiration to our hearts. The Bible story of Abraham being led out to become the father of Israel's mighty nation, is one of these pictures. Then a glance at one of the beginnings of the Salvation Army—there is the story of Charles G. Finney praying with a great burden for the lost; finally after a day of prayer, assurance came that God would carry on the work. He went to New York, published "Revival Kindlings," many hearts were stirred by reading it. Eventually the book fell into the hands of Mrs. Evangeline Booth, she was so mightily stirred that the Salvation Army, at least in part, has resulted from that.

Back of our beginnings as a district—who prayed? I have heard that many, many years ago there was a Godly woman who prayed, her head covered with a shawl. Some of her posterity were leaders in the beginning of the organization in Kentucky. Did her prayers have a part? I believe they did.

Then, before a Pilgrim Holiness church in Kentucky was even thought of, God spoke to a preacher, a missionary in Africa, and made it plain to him that he should go back to his home community in Kentucky for a revival. That man was W. W. Hankes. He obeyed God. A revival broke out, John and Bona Fleming and others of the first Holiness preachers in Kentucky were saved and sanctified, went out to spread holy fire. Camp meetings followed, with workers from God's Bible School, where a few years before, M. W. Knapp had launched what is now known as the Pilgrim Holiness Church, and soon the Kentucky District was in the making.

Today, at the 1959 Camp, we are commemorating the fiftieth anniversary of the Kentucky District Pilgrim Holiness Church. We are unable to give many details of the organization but we do know that Rev. W. W. Hankes was appointed the first district superintendent by Rev. George B. Kulp. The first churches to be started were Willard, Ashland First, Rush and Maysville. Fairview or Ashland Second also had its beginning as early as 1908, in a schoolhouse revival and cottage services. From a 1910 Manual of the International Apostolic Holiness Union (our church name at that time) we find the following ordained ministers listed as from Kentucky: R. B. Connelly, Smokey Valley; W. B. Dunkum, Kingswood; Beatrice and Nannie Finney, Kavanaugh; John and Bona Fleming, Willard; Wm. Godbey, Perryville; W. W. and Sallie Hankes, Ashland; L. W. Hollingsworth, Wilmore; Chas. H. Saunders, Catlettsburg; E. L. Sanford, Olive Hill; Jonah L. Shelton, Jacksboro; Allen Wells, Olive Hill. Ten licensed ministers: Thomas Bishop, Newport; Lewis Brown, Kingswood; William Deal, Ashland; E. C. Garrison, Covington; John Maddox, Newcombe; R. and Sarah Saunders, Newport; May and Madge Savage, Anglin; Wm. Wilcox, Rosedale. Evidently this was the Ministerial Directory in 1910, the year after organization. May and Madge Savage are also listed as deaconesses. The superintendents for the fifty year period are as follows: W. W. Hankes, Bona Fleming, Warren

Posey, R. W. Chatfield, William Duncan, William Beirnes, J. T. Johnson, Raymond Simpson, R. W. Wolfe, E. E. Leadingham, L. S. Houston, Ralph Tromble. Five of these are deceased.

Some of the earlier conferences were held at Ashland, Covington and Maysville. In October 1923, one was held at Soldier. This was the fourteenth annual conference when Rev. J. T. Johnson was elected to the superintendency, succeeding Rev. Wm. Beirnes. We quote a few statements from a report made by the General Superintendent of Foreign Missions: "It seemed to me there was more business transacted in the few pleasant days at Soldier, in face of the fact that we never knew when a motion would be passed to have a song from some of the song evangelists. Time was taken for worship. In fact, it was like a revival in Ezra's time every time the Assembly went to her knees. It seemed like everyone made a bee line for God's heart. No time was wasted in getting started. At times the praying, singing, shouting and jumping made the more timid feel a bit like hunting a safe place; however, no one was even bumped or scratched that we knew of, but surely fire flew, and joy both speakable and unspeakable, filled the place." In the report of the district superintendent, at this conference, he mentions a new church organized by Rev. John McNurlin at Bells Trace, near Rush; also two missions, one at Carrollton, the other started with \$100.00 of the district funds, at Louisville.

For a few years the Kentucky District was favored by having the General Church Headquarters at Kingswood, Ky., with a college, foreign missionary office, orphanage, etc. This brought many of our general church leaders into the district. One of these, our Bro. Stikeleather, is still an active and much appreciated member of this district. For some years the camp and conference convened at Kingswood, and it could be designated as the first Camp ground. The second was at Aspen Grove, and the third, our lovely Camp ground here, at Springdale.

Attention is now called to a journal entitled The Kentucky Pilgrim's Progress. This was an enlargement of the Minutes of the 1927 or eighteenth conference edited by Rev. J. T. Johnson and Rev. J. O. Keller. It lists about one hundred and twenty in attendance at the conference at Kingswood, gives a more complete directory, tabulated reports, pictures and write-ups of properties recently acquired. A total of five parsonages were then in the district, so we grew.

It should be mentioned that for a period of time, when the Tennessee work was begun, the Kentucky and Tennessee Pilgrims functioned together as a district until 1933 when the Tennessee district was organized separately.

The full history of the prayer, toil, sacrifice and devotion that has gone into the making of our district what it is today, cannot be written here, but God has the record and in that great day to come, all will be rewarded as their work has been.

Kentucky District, in the past, has been especially noted for hewing to the "old paths," and for fiery, fervent, old-fashioned preachers (may we always be worthy of such a reputation). The future lies before us. If Jesus tarries, we too, will be making history as those gone before us have done. It will be what we make it, under God. Let us write carefully and well, that those who follow will not miss the way, but may follow us as we follow Christ.

# DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

In the office of District Youth President, I have traveled 1136 miles.

I attended the Youth Leader's Conference at Indianapolis, for a time of fellowship with our General youth officers, and other district presidents, where plans were made for youth week and other youth activities.

Our vice president, James Buckles, and myself conducted zone rallies in behalf of our general, district and local youth work. I visited the Mountain, Ashland and Covington zones; Bro. Buckles visited the Lexington, Louisville, and Western zones. The Olive Hill zone was not visited because of conflicting dates. The best representation was in the Mountain zone where four of the five churches were represented and all youth presidents were present.

Just a word in regard to our youth societies. According to reports received, very few have re-organized according to the new manual regulations. We trust others will do so and notify your district youth president.

The National Pilgrim Youth Quiz Contest was enthusiastically received in the beginning, but for some reason was not carried on that way. There was very little competition on the zone level and will be little on the district level.

The youth camp picture is bright. We watched the registration rise to an all time high of 164. There were 21 churches represented. There were two youths here from other states. Covington won the attendance trophy with 23 present; Frankfort was "runner up" with 17 present. With only 21 churches represented and over 50 churches in our district, the ceiling is unlimited. Generally speaking, the young folk were well behaved and cooperative. Our fine staff of 31 persons including teachers, assistants, evangelist, counsellors and cooks, performed their duties in an excellent manner and cooperated to the fullest extent.

Our hearts were warmed as we watched the young folk in the dining room, at work, on the playground, in their classes, meeting

with their counsellors, and gathered here in the tabernacle, singing, praying, giving, testifying, listening to the inspired messages, praying and rejoicing around the altar.

The outstanding growth is presenting problems, but we feel like saying with the Apostle Paul, "We are perplexed but not in despair." Let's say with the Psalmist, "I will lift up my eyes unto the hills from whence cometh my help. My help cometh from the Lord which made heaven and earth." Let's face our problems, and pray for divine guidance in working them out, so that Kentucky Youth may continue to go "FORWARD WITH CHRIST."

# CONFERENCE MINUTES

# FIRST SITTING

The Fiftieth Annual Conference of the Kentucky District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened in the Tabernacle, August 6, 1959 at 9:00 A. M. with the District Superintendent, Rev. Ralph Tromble, in charge.

Let us each look forward to victory with Him.

The following report will show some of the material progress that our churches have made:

# Improvements In Our Churches

Ashland I—Has redecorated the parsonage inside and out.

**Aspen Grove**—Has painted and repaired the church building, put a runner down the aisle, purchased two platform chairs; did some work on the yard. They also made some improvements on the parsonage.

**Carlisle**—Has done some interior decorating in the parsonage. They plan to buy other seats for the church.

**Carrollton**—Has done some interior decorating.

**Central City**—Has done quite a lot more on their new church. There is more to be done by way of finishing work. It is a nice church.

**Clay**—Has purchased a heater and done some painting.

**Cloverport**—Has painted and fixed some lovely classrooms in the basement; also put front door in parsonage.

**Cynthiana**—Has put white shingles on the outside of the church, and built a new fence along the side, which has greatly improved the appearance.

**Eastview**—Has built a back porch on the parsonage.

**Elizabethtown**—Has erected a lovely new church which is nearly completed. They plan to move in the first of September and have their dedication service the 6th of September. This is another lovely church in our district.

**Erlanger**—Built a Sunday School room, made some repairs on the church, did some major repairs on the parsonage, such as hardwood floors, new gutters, clothes dryer, hot water heater, and redecorating.

**Falmouth**—Has redecorated the interior of the parsonage, paid off the debt on the bus, and built seven nice Sunday School rooms under the church.

**Frankfort**—Has installed a floodlight in the bulletin board, purchased blackboards for Sunday School and youth work, and are raising money to buy new pews. They plan to have them installed in the month of August.

**Hitchins**—Has bought Sunday School bus, built a stairway over the Sunday School rooms, made some improvements on the furnace and set out shrubs in front of church and parsonage.

Junction City—Has done some improvements on the church.

**Kingswood**—Painted church and parsonage outside, built a new front porch to the parsonage, built a garage, and built tables for the Sunday School rooms. Bought two dozen chairs.

Lancaster—Built new pews and a pulpit desk, steps and a porch on the front of the church, poured a walk, also the cement floor in the basement.

Latonia—Made some repairs on the parsonage and did some papering and painting. Purchased a new piano for the church, and painted some Sunday School rooms.

**Lexington**—Laid carpet on the platform and down the aisle and put tile in the vestibule, built a back porch, and put awnings over the front porch. Decorated rooms in the basement, and papered two in the parsonage.

Lewisport—Is finishing their four new Sunday School rooms.

Livermore—Has made some improvements and repairs.

**Louisville I**—Planning to build their new church.

Louisville II—Has put a new gas furnace in the church, and built four new Sunday School rooms, and have done some work on their parking lot.

McAndrews—Built awning over church door. Painted outside of church.

Morgantown—Fixed the steps to the church.

**Olive Hill**—Has bought a parsonage, and built four Sunday School rooms and a youth auditorium in the church basement.

Owensboro—Has done the usual amount of improvements.

**Pikeville**—Has made some improvements on the Sunday School rooms, and bought a new sign for the front of the church.

Pleasureville—Bought a new gas furnace for the parsonage.

**Rush**—Made some improvements on the church building, and did some painting.

**Salem**—Has done some painting on the church and parsonage, also built a new fence in front of the property.

**Shelbyville**—Has finished paying off the debt on the Sunday School rooms, and insulated the ceiling of the church.

**Shepherdsville**—Has built a new basement and moved into it. It is a nice basement and some day we hope to have a good church here.

Soldier-Has made some repairs on the church building.

**Somerset**—Has built three Sunday School rooms in the basement, purchased a church bus and new hymnals.

**Trace**—Made some repairs on the church, and built a foundation for a new parsonage.

**Tram**—Has completely remodeled the interior of the church, such as acoustic ceiling, knotty pine walls, hardwood floors, five new windows, two new doors, and a cement block protecting wall in the back of the church.

Wheelwright—Suffered the loss of their church by fire, and had no insurance. They are in the process of building back.

Willard—Has installed bottled gas and two stoves.

Winchester—Painted the outside of the church, and done some remodeling on the inside.

The following is my personal report for the year:

I have preached 148 times, conducted 90 church board meetings and 50 church meetings, prayed in 92 homes, had one communion service, dedicated four children, anointed 30 for healing, had the oversight of one camp meeting and one Ministerial Institute, conducted six council meetings, attended one school board meeting, officiated at one wedding, preached at one cornerstone laying service, organized one church, attended 7 zone rallies, preached one funeral, took 4 members into the church, worked 18 days on the camp ground, have seen some saved and sanctified. I have traveled 20,404 miles. To God we give all the praise for the victories, and for any good that we may have done. We are workers together with Him.

# RESOLUTIONS

#### District Superintendent

1. Resolved: That the District Superintendent make two trips over the District during the year, and to give more time to the smaller churches as needed.

## Council

2. Resolved: That the District Council be vested with full power to construct buildings for the District when necessary, appointing and directing a committee to carry out its plan.

3. Resolved: That the District Council set the date for the Ministerial Institute and that said date be recorded in the minutes.

4. Resolved: That the District Council appoint all pastors for new missions for the first five years, or until said Council decides to do otherwise.

5. Resolved: That the Conference delegate to the Council power to make rules and by-laws regulating the sale of lots, the building of cottages, and to govern the Camp grounds; the same to be printed in the Minutes.

6. Resolved: That the District Council be given power to rezone the churches of the District when necessary.

#### Churches

7. Resolved: That each church supply the Camp with one blanket and two sheets.

8. Resolved: That each church close their books on the last day of each month, and the monthly budgets be sent to the District Treasurer immediately. Be it also resolved: That the District Treasurer's books be closed for the year, at noon, on the 10th day of July.

9. Resolved: That each church, minister, and deaconess mail a copy of its annual report to the District Statistician by the 15th of July each year, and Be it further resolved: That persons failing to comply with this ruling be reported to the District Council and Examining Committee.

10. Resolved: That whereas many of our pastors do not receive sufficient financial support, Be it resolved: That each local church appoint one prayer meeting night each month as "donation night" at which time food and provisions shall be brought together for the pastor. Be it also resolved: That the District Superintendent shall appoint "an agitator" at the annual business meeting, whose duty is to announce donation night in advance.

11. Resolved: That since it is a matter of great importance for the pastors of the District to attend the Camp and Conference, Be it resolved: That the pastor's support at the church where he is assigned as pastor shall continue over the two Sundays he attends Camp and Conference and the first Sunday following.

12. Resolved: That each church and mission install and practice the envelope system of collecting tithes and offerings.

13. Resolved: That pastors and church boards urge the calling of evangelists for our revivals from among our own Pilgrim ministers, and that the District Superintendent be consulted before we call other ministers.

14. Resolved: That we strive for at least two new churches in the District each year.

# Sunday School

15. Resolved: That each zone have a Sunday School Attendance Banner to be given quarterly to the Sunday School having the largest attendance; also, an offering banner for the Sunday School giving the largest offerings.

16. Resolved: That we provide for a Sunday School Convention, and that this be the order of the first day of the Ministerial Institute. Be it further resolved: That the superintendent or a representative from each Sunday School attend said Convention, taking notes to be used in the Sunday School meetings in the local Church.

17. Resolved: That each Sunday School endeavor to establish another Sunday School each year.

18. Resolved: That each Sunday School be given credit for the number of scholars from their church attending Sunday School at our Camp.

19. Resolved: That the Sunday School service at Camp be under the supervision of the District Sunday School Board.

#### Zones

20. Resolved: That each zone elect their zone officers at the last zone meeting prior to Camp, so the names of the Chairmen can be listed in the Minutes.

21. Resolved: That the District Zones be recorded in the Minutes.

22. Resolved: That in addition to the Zone Chairman, Young People's Chairman, and Secretary-Treasurer, that each zone have a Sunday School Representative, Missionary Chairman, and a Junior Missionary Chairman, all of these to be under the supervision of the District Superintendent.

# **District Home Missions**

23. Resolved: That a District Home Missionary Committee be formed, said Committee to consist of the District Superintendent and the District Treasurer by virtue of office, and two Advisory members who are to be chosen from the Ordained ministers by the Council. Be it further resolved that their duties are:

a. To keep a constant lookout for new areas in which to locate new Pilgrim Holiness churches.

b. To be responsible for selecting an appropriate location and the general oversight of the same.

#### Credentials

24. Resolved: That all persons applying for license appear in person before the Examining Board, unless the applicant is sick or otherwise unable to appear; in which case some member of the Conference is to certify as to his or her character and location.

#### Pastor

25. Resolved: That each pastor read all resolutions of this Conference to his congregation at the earliest possible date.

26. Resolved: That each pastor make a special effort to place a current Manual in the home of each member of the church.

27. Resolved: That each pastor list in a book the name and address of each Advocate Subscriber, with the expiration date; said book is to be transferred to his successor, and that each pastor endeavor to keep a subscription list equal to his membership.

28. Resolved: That no pastor hold revivals off his charge without making satisfactory arrangements with his church and the District

Superintendent. Be it further resolved: That no pastor hold a revival away from his church within 30 days after a revival in his own church, no more than two revivals during the Conference year, providing said church is supporting him.

29. Resolved: That each pastor send the obituary of deceased members of his church to the Chairman of the Memorials Committee immediately following the funeral.

30. Resolved: That each active pastor be given two weeks vacation with pay.

31. Resolved: That each minister submit his name, address, and telephone number to the District Secretary immediately upon arrival at his new address; the same to be included in the Ministerial Directory. Each minister shall notify the District Secretary of any changes occurring thereafter.

# Ministers

32. Resolved: That each minister support financially the church of which he is a member.

33. Resolved: That each minister attend the Camp and Conference in full or present a written explanation of non-attendance to the District Council.

34. Resolved: That whereas ministers are interested in the welfare of other ministers and their families, and, whereas, there is a Ministerial Benefit Association established for the purpose of protecting the family of the deceased minister, we therefore recommend: That the local church assume payment of the assessment when called for by the Association. Be it also resolved: That the District pay the assessment of the District Superintendent and all those under the jurisdiction of the District Home Missionary Committee.

35. Resolved: That an information blank be filled out by ministers that cannot attend the Conference; said blank to be furnished by the District.

36. Resolved: That no minister or church shall conduct a radio broadcast without permission of the District Council.

37. Resolved: That upon the death of a minister or his wife the Superintendent be notified, and that he notify the District Secretary, who in turn will notify the Zone Chairmen, and they are to notify the pastors in their zone by phone or card.

# Conference

 $\ensuremath{\texttt{38.}}$  Resolved: That no one leave the Conference without permission.

39. Resolved: That no church send a delegate to Conference who will not agree to stay throughout the entire Conference. See Manual, Sec. 82, Paragraph 2.

40. Resolved: That the Conference shall convene on Thursday 9:00 A. M., last week of the Camp.

41. Resolved: That our churches send qualified delegates, who know the problems of the church and district.

#### Camp

42. Resolved: That our Camp shall begin on the last Friday before the last Sunday in July.

43. Resolved: That we register all who come to camp, assigning work to each one as equally as possible. A meal ticket will be given all who register, the same to be presented at the dining room door.

44. Resolved: That the District Superintendent, his wife, and the Camp nurse, be registered free for the Camp and Conference. Be it further resolved: That the District Superintendent, his wife, the nurse, and the called workers for the Camp and Conference be enter-tained free at the lunch stand.

45. Resolved: That we give space in the book room for a table and some one to take subscriptions to the Advocate, Pilgrim Youth News, and the Missionary Bulletin.

46. Resolved: That all who disregard the following rules be answerable to the District Council:

a. All pastors shall instruct their churches and young people that all who come to Camp shall abide by the rules.

b. Everyone shall retire, or be quiet, after 11:00 P. M.

c. A dean shall be appointed over each dormitory.

d. Single young people shall not be allowed off the Camp grounds after 7:00 P. M.

e. No articles shall be taken from the kitchen or dining room without permission from the one in charge; any article taken shall be returned in good condition.

f. No food shall be taken from the kitchen without permission.

g. Parents shall supervise the conduct of their children while on the Camp ground.

h. A supervisor shall be appointed for the dining room and kitchen, the parking of cars, the care of the Tabernacle, the lunch and book rooms, the Registration office, and care of the grounds; the same to be appointed by the District Council.

47. Resolved: That we have the registration of dormitory rooms to begin at noon Friday, and that the District Council work out a system for renting the rooms.

48. Resolved: That each minister give three days labor, or pay the equivalent, in developing the Camp grounds, or in Camp preparation, when called upon by the District Superintendent.

49. Resolved: That whereas we have a large number of children on our Camp ground during Camp, Be it therefore resolved: That a fund be established to provide the necessary equipment for a supervised playground, using the offerings from the Children's services to apply on the equipment. Be it further resolved: That the District Council appoint a committee to take the necessary steps to provide said playground.

50. Resolved: That all cabin owners furnish their own mattresses for their cabins.

51. Resolved: That the Camp Meeting committee meet at the Ministerial Institute and plan for the preparing of the Camp ground and buildings for Camp and appoint capable persons to carry out the work of the Camp.

52. Resolved: That the District Superintendent appoint a special committee to stay after Camp to clean up the Camp grounds.

53. Resolved: Since it is so important that the Camp set the proper example and standards for others to follow; Therefore, be it resolved: That the District Council see that all workers, such as speakers, singers, pianists, and musicians used in any service on the Camp meeting platform, be required to dress as "becometh holiness," including the wearing of hose and sleeves of below elbow length.

54. Resolved: That in order to provide facilities for visitors eating outside the dining room; Be it resolved: That the District Coun-

cil arrange for the making and placing of at least six tables on the Camp ground.

55. Resolved: That the District Council appoint some one each year to be in charge of each of the prayer rooms and to arrange for prayer groups and other special prayer effort all through the Camp.

#### Miscellaneous

56. Resolved: That no one person serve on more than one committee where competent persons are available.

57. Resolved: That each church plan for a Daily Vacation Bible School.

58. Resolved: That the Camp meeting committee shall be enlarged to twelve to take care of Camp preparation. Be it further resolved: That only these workers have priority to dormitory rooms. Others who come and eat in the dining room before Friday noon shall be charged the regular price for each meal, unless called by the District Superintendent.

59. Resolved: Whereas much valuable time is sometimes taken by resolutions which may not deserve such time, and whereas, the Resolution Committee often feels reluctant to ignore any resolution even if it seems of small importance; Be it therefore resolved: That this Conference invest the Resolution Committee with the power to reject any resolution that is not written out and signed by the person who offers it for consideration to the committee and, or, Conference.

60. Resolved: That we establish an honor system and that the Gold Star Churches be those that have paid their district and general budgets in full, and sent to the Treasurer by the 10th of each month. Be it further resolved: That all churches reporting each month be designated as Silver Star Churches. This chart is to be compiled by the District Treasurer and put on display at the District Camp.

61. Resolved: That resolutions which are of a temporary nature shall become void upon their completion and shall automatically be deleted from our minutes.

62. Resolved: That a Conference paper be published monthly, the same to be edited by one appointed by the District Council. The various departments of our district program shall consider this as our official organ. The heads of these departments shall be considered as contributing editors. It is further recommended that this paper be devoted to information and promotion rather than a compilation of sermons.

63. Resolved: That the host church, with the District Superintendent, decide as to the mode of entertaining the Ministerial Institute.

#### Minutes

64. That we have 700 copies of the District Minutes printed.

#### Special

65. Resolved: That this Conference give a rising vote of thanks to the Presiding Officer of this Conference, Dr. R. G. Flexon; Camp evangelist, M. C. Kittle; Camp singers and children's workers, Elwood and Joan Stuart; Foreign Missionary Representative, Rev. and Mrs. David Keith; Church Extension Representative, Rev. and Mrs. J. M. Burcham; the Quartette from Kernersville Bible College; Rev. and Mrs. Ralph Tromble, the District Officials; the Department Heads; the Cooks; and all others who served untiringly to make the Camp a blessing to others.

## RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1. We recommend: That each Sunday School pay one dollar per month into the portable tabernacle fund. We further recommend: That each Sunday School adopt the birthday offering plan, said offering to go toward the portable tabernacle and home missionary funds.

2. We recommend: That each church take a free will offering for the District Superintendent on all his visits, the same to be sent in by the local treasurer and applied on the Superintendent's traveling expense.

3. We recommend: That whereas, there is a pressing need for buildings to house our people, that each church or individual buying a lot be asked to build a cabin on said lot within three years, and if they fail to so do, to put the lot up for resale. Furthermore, we recommend: That those who purchased lots prior to this date be contacted by the District Superintendent urging them to build a cabin within two years or give the District the privilege of reselling their lot.

4. We recommend: That whereas our District Home Missions and Church Extension Loan Fund is being supervised by the District Council, and they are placing all designated funds in this department, that the rate of interest be four percent (4%) on all loans.

5. We recommend: That the District Council appoint a committee of three members of which the District Treasurer shall be one and the Chairman, to investigate the District Home Missions and Church Extension Loan Fund and shall be empowered to bring all business up to date including all payments and interest.

6. We recommend: That each church pay the registration fee of their pastor and wife and church delegate to the District Conference; this amount to be raised by the District Superintendent at the annual meeting; and also an offering for their traveling expense.

7. We recommend: That the District Treasurer be paid two hundred fifty (\$250.00) dollars per year, and the District Secretary one hundred (\$100.00) dollars per year; the same to be paid in equal monthly payments; and that the District Statistician be paid sixty (\$60.00) dollars per year.

8. We recommend: That each church have a monthly Missionary service on the Lord's day, at which time an offering be taken for foreign missions; also a monthly missionary prayer meeting.

9. We recommend: That each church and Sunday School send ten per cent (10%) of their regular offerings to the District Treasurer, designated as District Budget. This does not include special offerings, such as building fund, evangelists, General Church Obligations.

10. We recommend: That the District keep a complete set of the Ministerial Course of study books.

11. We recommend: That the District Superintendent's salary be three thousand one hundred and twenty (\$3,120.00) dollars per year; seven  $(7\epsilon)$  cents per mile for traveling expense; all utilities paid; and that he be granted a two weeks vacation.

12. We recommend: That any minister traveling under the direction of the District Superintendent, the Board or Committee of which he is a part, be paid five  $(5\phi)$  cents per mile traveling expense plus one (\$1.00) dollar per meal bought while in District work.

13. We recommend: That the churches pay their pastor a salary at least equal to the average wages of the working people of the church, and that the matter of the pastor's salary be taken care of by the District Superintendent or his assistant at the time of the annual meeting.

14. We recommend: That in compliance with the action of the 1958 General Conference, our United Stewardship Fund be \$8.00 per member, to be divided as follows: Foreign Missions 20%; General Church Extension 14%; Administrative Expense 36%; Sunday School and Youth 2.6%; Senior College 21.4%; Church Extension Loan Fund 3%; Contingent Fund 3%. This amount is to be sent to the District Treasurer in a lump sum each month as United Stewardship Fund.

15. We recommend: That each pastor and church board make plans immediately for raising their portion of the United Stewardship Fund for the year. We further recommend: That inasmuch as in the division of the United Stewardship Fund 20% goes to Foreign Missions and 14% to Church Extension that we instruct our District Treasurer to take from money sent to him for Foreign Missions and Church Extension, but not specified for any special project, an amount not to exceed the above percentages and apply it on the United Stewardship Fund for our District.

16. We recommend: That the District Budget be divided as follows: Superintendent's expense 53%; Sinking fund 30%; District parsonage 10%; Zone Bible School 4%; General Conference expense 3%.

17. We recommend: That the District raise one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) per year to assist on the Camp meeting; the same to be raised by each local church giving the sum equivalent to one dollar (\$1.00) per member, the sum to be sent to the District Treasurer.

18. We recommend: That all money be turned over to the local church treasurer from the different departments of the church at the end of each month; and that the local church treasurer pay all the bills as directed by the Church Board.

19. We recommend: That each church take steps to raise their revival offering at least thirty days before the revival starts.

20. We recommend: That when a mission is organized into a church it shall not be asked to pay district budget for one year from the following Conference; and that the church shall pay fifty per cent for the two following years.

21. We recommend: That an offering be taken in each zone meeting for the expense of the promotion of the Sunday School work in the District.

22. We recommend: That whereas the 1946 General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church adopted the "Pension Plan" to aid retired and disabled ministers, and whereas each District Conference is asked to contribute 4% of the pastor's salary, lay worker's salary, evangelist's offerings, etc., to said Pension Fund, and whereas, this Conference has voted to fully cooperate with the General Board of Pensions in this matter, We recommend: That we adopt this plan of financing it, namely: That each local church may pay the equivalent of 40% of the evangelist's tithe, who are members of said church, and 4% of the pastor's salary. This to be sent monthly to the District Treasurer. All members of the Pension Fund Plan should pay 2% of salary and offering as reported to the Conference.

23. We recommend: That each Sunday School set aside one Sunday each month and 50% of said Sunday's offering be given for District Home Missions.

24. We recommend: That in order to encourage our local churches to observe sound and acceptable business practices in the handling of local church funds, that therefore, be it resolved; that two local church board members, other than the treasurer, count and make a record of the offerings as received, and then immediately turn over to the local church treasurer these funds and their records for further check and bank deposit. Be it further resolved: That when the local church treasurer's reports are made to the local church, that the bank statements be made available and balance be shown to check with the treasurer's record.

25. We recommend: That each church give the minimum of five dollars (\$5.00) to support the District Ministerial Institute each year.

26. We recommend: That the Registrar, Camp manager, Dining room manager, and the Buyer be paid \$35.00; and that the Lunch Room Operator be paid \$50.00.

27. We recommend: That each church subscribe for the number of Kentucky Pilgrims they desire per month and that they pay  $7\phi$  per copy for same.

28. We recommend: Whereas, the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized the Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc., to make loans of Pension Funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches under such conditions as required active participation on the part of the Pilgrim Holiness District. Therefore, be it resolved by the Annual Conference of this district that the District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials be, and they are hereby authorizing, to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness churches of this district, subject, however, to limitations and conditions set out in said Resolutions of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loan.

## MEMOIRS

#### **REV. NEAL HORTON**

Rev. Neal Horton, a member of the Kentucky Conference, went to be with Jesus on April 4, 1959 at the age of 58. He was born in southern Indiana but moved to the hills of Tennessee early in life. He liked to call himself the mountaineer evangelist. He was saved when a young man and has often said he was so glad that he found the holiness people, or that they found him. He was a man of kindly, humble spirit and was loved by all who knew him. He really lived what he professed at home and abroad. He spent about 20 years in the evangelistic work, and has held meetings all over the United States. He was pastor of the Maysville church at the time of his death, which followed a long illness. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Roberta Enlow Horton and three sons, Paul and John in the United States Navy and Joe of Terre Haute, Indiana. Funeral services were conducted in the Maysville church by Rev. Ralph Tromble, assisted by Revs. Floyd Goins, Russell Enlow and R. L. Goodman. He was laid to rest in the Maysville cemetery to await the glorious resurrection morning.

## REV. G. J. TACKETT

Rev. G. J. Tackett was born February 26, 1901 and passed to his heavenly home on October 14, 1958 at the age of 57. He had been in ill health for four years. ## REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

To the 50th Annual Conference of the Kentucky District:

With this report we bring to a close our labors for the year as your Sunday School Promotional Secretary. This has been a good year for our Sunday Schools in the Kentucky District. I would like to commend all the pastors that have shown excellent cooperation in getting their reports in. To some of our schools this has been a good year in Sunday School work, due to a greater vision of men, women, boys and girls that are perishing in sin. To others it has been a year of loss, but it should be a greater determining factor to work harder this coming year.

A final report for the year reveals that against the record of last year we have a gain for this year of 154 or 5%. For this year we have a total 2963 average attendance with last year reported at 2809. We have 17 schools showing a loss for the year, 25 schools show a gain, 1 school the same, 1 new school.

As to the reports of the various schools, we have 23 schools reporting fully, 11 reporting eleven times, 6 reporting 10 times, 2 reporting 9 times, 6 reporting less than 9 times, 2 that failed to report.

The conference award for this year will go to the Carlisle church, pastor, Rev. Curtis Underwood, with the largest numerical gain, a gain of 23. The Cynthiana church, pastor, Rev. Cora Collins, is awarded the percentage gain, with a gain of 72%.

The churches that have a 10% gain or better for this Conference year are: Lexington 14%, Livermore 38%, Louisville 27%, Pleasure-ville 52%, Shelbyville 21%, Soldier 27%, Willard 21%, Winchester 12%, Aspen Grove 58%, Carlisle 34%, Carrollton 17%, Central City 53%, Clay 16%, and Eastview 13%.

It has been a pleasure to serve you for this year. Your cooperation has been deeply appreciated. The new year is bright with the prospects for the Kentucky Sunday Schools. Let's join together to make sure that Kentucky Sunday Schools continue to go forward.

## RULES GOVERNING SALE OF LOTS AND BUILDING COTTAGES

Price of lots, \$20.00 each. Terms: \$5.00 down payment when purchased, balance to be paid in monthly payments of \$3.00 each. Six per cent on unpaid balance at maturity. All lots are to be paid for in six months or contract is void.

All outside lots in the old plot shall be of this dimension, 20 feet in width and 30 feet in length. Inside lots shall be 20x20. All lots in the new plot shall be 20x30 feet. All cottages are to be uniform in size and placements on lots in accordance with the row or street on which they may be placed. The dimensions of the cottages are to be 10x12feet, with an 8-foot eave, six concrete piers, one door and two windows, a screen door, and either a metal or asphalt roof. The building is to be made of dressed lumber, either boxed or framed, and to have two coats of white paint. An extension of nine feet may be built on any of the cabins on an outside lot of the old plot, such additions to be of the same dimensions as that of the cabin with a window on each side. A porch may be built on the front of any and all cottages. Cabins on the new plot may be either single or double.

The District Council holds the right to paint or repair in any way necessary, unless the owner does the work himself, and the owner is to pay the expense of same. Aluminum paint only is to be used on the metal roof. The District Council is to keep all buildings insured and the owner of each cottage is to pay his part of the premium.

## RATES FOR THE CAMP

Registration fees: \$5.00 and work assigned; \$10.00 and no work assigned. This rate is to include all persons over 12 years of age. Those from 6 through 12 years will be registered for \$2.50 and those under 6 will be registered free. All meals will be fifty cents.

A flat rate of \$1.00 shall be charged for electricity used in cabins and house trailers on the ground, the same to be paid by those using said trailers and cabins when registering.

Registration shall begin at noon Friday.
