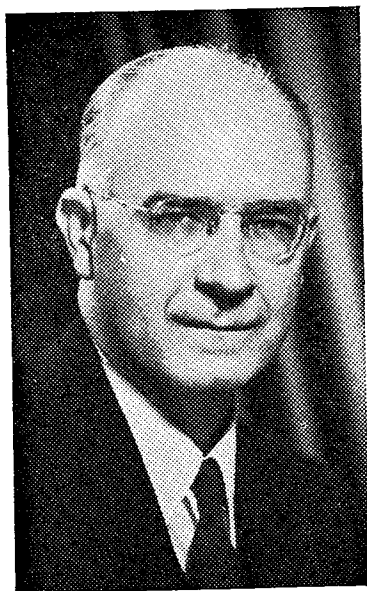

CONFERENCE MINUTES

FIRST SITTING

The Fifty-second Annual Conference of the Kentucky District convened on August 7, 1961 at 9:00 A.M. The meeting was opened by the District Superintendent, Rev. Ralph Tromble. The group was led in singing "Higher Ground" by Rev. Frank Jarboe. We were led in prayer by Rev. P. O. Carpenter. The District Superintendent introduced our General Superintendent and presiding officer, Dr. Melvin Snyder, who addressed the conference.

He spoke briefly on the duties and responsibilities of the Conference. Special attention was focused on Section 93, Paragraphs 1 and 3 of the Manual.

His message to the Conference was based on the scripture, Matthew 8:5-13.

THE MIRACLE OF THE CENTURION

Our attention was drawn to the proper attitude in coming to Christ. Two statements were made concerning the Centurion. First, Christ marveled at the Centurion's faith. Secondly, the Master said of him, "I have not seen so great faith, no, not in Israel." He had more faith than Mary, an Israelite. He had more faith than John, the Beloved.

- I. He had a faith that worked in humility.
A. I am not worthy.
- II. He had a faith that worked in love.
A. He had a servant that he loved.
- III. He had a faith that discerned his times.
A. He recognized Jesus as the Christ.
- IV. He had a faith that recognized constituted authority.
- V. He had a faith that exercised authority.

The Superintendent's closing remarks impressed upon us the urgency of the hour.

The roll of ministers and delegates was called.

A motion was made to seat Jolene Miller as delegate from the Owensboro church. Carried.

The Conference Bar was set and cleared.

A motion was made that the time of the sessions shall be 9:00-11:30 A.M., 1:30-4:00 P.M., and 7:00-9:00 P.M. Carried.

The Reception Committee introduced Rev. C. E. Posey, Mrs. Melvin Snyder, Rev. and Mrs. H. H. Bolender, Rev. J. D. Webb, Rev. R. R. Hughes, Rev. Tommy Hanks, Rev. Clarence Hamm, Rev. Wallace Richardson. Each gave a word of testimony.

A motion was made to grant them an honorary seat within the Conference Bar. Carried.

A motion was made to extend the time to hear the District Superintendent's report and to receive a new church into the District. Carried.

The District Superintendent, Rev. Ralph Tromble, read his report.

A motion was made that it be accepted with a rising vote of thanks. Carried.

The Superintendent presented the new church at Lewisport to the Conference. Rev. and Mrs. W. J. Mercer and members of the church came to the front and were greeted by the General Superintendent.

A motion was made to accept this new church. The Conference stood in acceptance and sang the "Doxology."

The session adjourned.

SECOND SITTING

The second session of the Conference convened at 1:30 P. M. Rev. W. H. Richardson led the Conference in singing, "At the Cross."

We were led in a good season of prayer by Rev. H. D. Wright.

The minutes of the previous sitting were read and approved.

The Assistant Superintendent, Rev. P. O. Carpenter, read his report. It was accepted.

The District Statistician's report was read and accepted.

In the absence of the Auditors, their report was read by the Secretary. A motion was made to accept it. Carried.

The District Treasurer's report was read by Rev. Paul Ebright. A motion was made to accept it with deep appreciation. Carried.

The Camp Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The Sunday School Promotional Secretary's report was read. The annual award for the "Decade of Progress" was presented to the Covington church. The Secretary's report was accepted.

The Missionary Society Secretary read her report. A motion was made to accept the report. Carried.

The Visitation and Evangelism Secretary gave a verbal report. A motion was made to accept his report. Carried.

The reading of the pastors' reports was started.

A motion was made to extend time to 4:30. Carried.

During an interlude in the reading of these reports, time was taken to present floral gifts to two of our retiring ministers and their wives, who have devoted many years of service to the Kingdom of God. They are Rev. and Mrs. Denver Musser, who have given 39 years to our church, and Rev. and Mrs. L. S. Houston who have given 33½ years to our District and Church. Bro. Houston served 15 years as our District Superintendent and 16 years on the General Board. A tribute was given by the District Superintendent on behalf of the District. Dr. Melvin Snyder spoke words of appreciation to them on behalf of the General Church. The Conference joined in singing "Blest Be the Tie that Binds."

The reading of Pastors' reports was continued.

The session adjourned.

THIRD SITTING

The third session of the Conference convened at 7:00 P. M. We were led in singing "The Cleansing Stream" by Rev. W. H. Richardson. Prayer was offered by Rev. H. H. Barber.

A motion was made that the Secretary write to Bro. Keyes and Bro. Underwood expressing our prayers for them in their illness. Carried.

The reading of the Pastors' reports was continued.

The Evangelists were called upon to give verbal reports.

The report of the Resolutions Committee was read.

A motion was made to extend the time to 9:30. Carried.

The Ways and Means Committee reported.

Resolution #1:

An amendment was offered to the resolution, adding the words at the beginning, "unless a better plan develops."

The amendment was carried.

The Resolution was carried as amended.

The report of the Committee on Memoirs was read and accepted. The Conference stood in silent prayer in sacred memory of those who departed our ranks. Dr. Snyder then led us in prayer.

A motion carried that we have the election immediately after the report of the Committee on Memorials to General Conference.

Conference adjourned by the expiration of time.

R. L. Goodman dismissed with prayer.

FOURTH SITTING

The fourth sitting of the District Conference opened with singing "Love Lifted Me," led by Rev. R. L. Goodman. Prayer was offered by Rev. H. H. Bolender.

For the devotional period, five individuals were asked to stand and give a verse of Scripture that had been of particular blessing to them. The General Superintendent then gave an exhortation on "The Living Word."

The Reception Committee introduced Rev. and Mrs. James Buckles, of Bedford, Ind.; Rev. Sharp, an evangelist from Indiana; and Rev. Newton from Cincinnati. Each gave their testimony.

A motion was made to grant them an honorary seat within the conference bar. Carried.

A motion was made that the Roll Call be dispensed with. Carried.

Greetings to all of you. We are happy to have our General Superintendent, Rev. Melvin Snyder, with us for this conference. May God bless each of you as members and friends of this conference.

How many times this year have you heard that we are living in perilous times, and who knows what a day will bring forth, will we have a depression, will we be able to survive? These fears and misgivings have filled the hearts of men, and are having their effect on the church, but it is encouraging to know that we have One to help us in these times. The Master said, "Lo I am with you always." We will trust in Him.

This has been a year of battles but without them there could be no victories. In the good providence of God He has spared us. Many of our comrades have fallen in the battle; they laid down the sword to take up the crown. Others fell mortally wounded, but still God's army marches on. Wellman, with the help of some of the pastors around there, has rented a building and has started to have services. There are other improvements in our churches which I will give in my report on the improvements in the churches.

I wish to praise the Lord for our District. Our people are near to my heart, and I am grateful to God for our pastors and people. I have urged them to make every church a soul saving station, a place where people will be saved and sanctified. As your leader I have tried to lift high the banner of the Cross. Covington I—Erected a lovely new sign in front of the church and purchased new choir pews.

Eastview—Painted the church inside.

Erlanger—Did some painting and bought a piano; also bought a lot and are planning on a new church building.

Frankfort—Put a new floor in the porch at the parsonage, did some painting at the church, and purchased new chairs for the youth auditorium.

Greenup—Finished their new church.

Hitchins—Built a retaining wall behind the church, installed a water filter and did some painting and papering on the parsonage.

Junction City—Are planning on new Sunday School rooms.

Lancaster—Bought a new clock for the church.

Lexington—Painted two rooms in the parsonage, a Sunday School room, and the outside of the church.

Lewisport—Finished two Sunday School rooms, put a new gas furnace and new light fixtures in the church and built a fence in front of the church.

Louisville I—Completed and moved into their new basement.

McAndrews—Sanded and painted the floor of the church.

Newport—Repaired and painted the interior of the church.

Olive Hill—Put a new roof on the church, purchased a piano, song books, and a book case; also installed a hot water system in the parsonage.

Pikeville—Painted the interior of the church.

Pleasureville—Installed a storm door and relined the furnace.

Rush—Built new steps to the church.

Salem Ridge—Replaced some windows and did some painting.

We give praise to God for His many blessings and the privilege of working for Him. For all the victories we give Him praise and for all the failures we are sorry and pray that God will help us to profit by them. Let us keep our face toward the sunrise, and be faithful till He comes.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

To the 1961 Annual Conference of the Kentucky District:

Through the mercy and good providence of our great heavenly parent we are permitted to meet in another Annual Conference and report on the activities of the past year. We do give thanks to God for His blessings and loving care to all of us. We feel like the Psalmist that if it had not been for the Lord the enemy would have swallowed us up all together, but with Paul we say, "Thanks be unto God who always causeth us to triumph in Christ."

Our Sunday Schools have been coming to grips with the enemy and God has helped some of them to make gains, while others have had to show a loss. We are happy to report that as a district we show a gain of 195 over last year or just under 7%. Our total average attendance for 1959-60 was 2960. For the year 1960-61 it was 3155. Of forty-eight schools, 18 showed gains, 28 showed a loss, one the same as last year, and one did not report at all. Twenty schools reported twelve times; six, eleven times; three, ten times; six, nine times; two, eight times; three, seven times; two, six times; one, four times; one, three times; two reported twice; one reported once; and one did not report at all.

Elizabethtown reports a numerical gain of 43 for the highest numerical gain. Others showing a gain were: Lewisport, 30; Winchester, 18; Junction City, 16; Hitchins and Lancaster, 12; Ashland Fairview, 11; Louisville I and Willard, 9; Erlanger, 7; Tram, 6; Covington I, 5; Falmouth, Greenup, and Soldier, 4; Eastview and Rush, 2; and Olive Hill, 1.

Lewisport reported a gain of 111% for the highest percentage gain. This was a fine gain. Congratulations to Bro. Mercer and his good people. Winchester had 49% gain; Lancaster, 48%; Elizabethtown, 29%; Willard, 28%; Junction City, 24%; Hitchins, 14%; Erlanger, 13%; Tram, 12%; Ashland Second and Greenup, both 10%.

On the DECADE OF PROGRESS, only five schools sent in their scoring sheet. They were: Carrollton, 55 points; Covington I, 87 points; Owensboro, 71 points; Shelbyville, 58 points, and Willard, 47 points.

Only two annual reports came in: Covington and Willard. Covington had 21,335 and Willard had 5,935. This means that Covington gets the annual trophy for the year 1960-61. Congratulations to Bro. Mitchell and his Sunday School.

I do appreciate the cooperation that has been given me in the past year by the pastors and Sunday School secretaries. May the next year be one of victory. May God make us fully adequate for these challenging times.

MEMORIALS TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE

Memorial #1.

Whereas, good communication is one of the most vital factors in good organization, and,

Whereas, the District Superintendent is the most vital officer in communicating the plans and programs of the church to the pastors and local churches, and

Whereas, the District Superintendent is the most vital officer in communicating the current situation of his district to the General Board, and,

Whereas, the present plan for the composition of the General Board makes it possible for men who are no longer in such vital relationship to the church, or, are in retirement to serve on the General Board, and

Further, since the College Presidents are of most vital importance in shaping the future of our church through their influence on our young people in general and our young preachers in particular,

Therefore, be it resolved that Section 142 of the Manual be amended to read,

"There shall be a body known as the General Board, which shall consist of the three General Superintendents, General Secretary-Treasurer, Secretary of Foreign Missions, Secretary of Church Extension, Secretary of General Sunday Schools and Youth, Publishing Agent, Editor, all District Superintendents of fully organized Districts, and all College Presidents."

Memorial #2.

Whereas, our present system allows for a long period of time between the pastoral vote and the time for the change of pastors,

Therefore, be it resolved that in Section 53, Paragraph 1, of the Manual, the words "first Sunday following the District Conference," be amended to read "first Sunday following the close of the conference year."

Memorial #3.

Whereas, the District Council is charged with the jurisdiction and administration of the total district program within the bounds of the Manual and the actions of the District Conference, and

Whereas, it is increasingly evident that the youth and Sunday school work in the denomination demand the best planning, guidance, and promotion possible, and

Since the district leaders in both of these responsible and important areas are nominated or appointed by the District Council,

Therefore, Be it resolved that upon the nomination of the District Council, and election at the Youth Conference, the District Youth President, and District Sunday School Promotional Secretary, upon the nomination by the District Council and election by the Conference, by virtue of their offices, shall be members of the District Council.

Memorial #4.

Whereas, there has been no central authority to pass on local church building projects, and,

Whereas, it has resulted in some unwise decisions being made,

Therefore, be it resolved that a building committee of three members be appointed by the District Council, whose duties shall be:

1. To investigate all plans for relocation of an existing church or parsonage.
2. To investigate all property under consideration for purchase for the erecting of church or parsonage.
3. To investigate plans for purchase of existing property.
4. To check all plans and blueprints for the erection of a new church or parsonage.
5. To investigate all plans for a major remodeling of existing property.
6. To check the financial plan for financing the project.

This committee shall make recommendation to the District Council who must make final approval before purchase can be made or erection started. No pastor or church shall enter into contract for purchase of property or proceed with construction without the written consent of the District Council.

RESOLUTIONS

District Superintendent

1. Resolved: That the District Superintendent make two trips over the District during the year, and to give more time to the smaller churches as needed.

Council

2. Resolved: That the District Council be vested with full power to construct buildings for the District when necessary, appointing and directing a committee to carry out its plan.

3. Resolved: That the District Council set the date for the Ministerial Institute and that said date be recorded in the minutes.

4. Resolved: That the District Council appoint all pastors for new missions for the first five years, or until said Council decides to do otherwise.

5. Resolved: That the Conference delegate to the Council power to make rules and by-laws regulating the sale of lots, the building of cottages, and to govern the Camp grounds; the same to be printed in the Minutes.

6. Resolved: That the District Council be given power to rezone the churches of the District when necessary.

Churches

7. Resolved: That each church supply the Camp with one blanket and two sheets.

8. Resolved: That each church close their books on the last day of each month, and the monthly budgets be sent to the District Treasurer immediately. Be it also resolved: That the District Treasurer's books be closed for the year, at noon, on the 10th day of July.

9. Resolved, That each church, minister, and deaconess mail a copy of its annual report to the District Statistician by the 15th of July each year, and Be it further resolved: That persons failing to comply with this ruling be reported to the District Council and Examining Committee.

10. Resolved: That whereas many of our pastors do not receive sufficient financial support, Be it resolved: That each local church appoint one prayer meeting night each month as "donation night" at which time food and provisions shall be brought together for the pastor. Be it also resolved: That the District Superintendent shall appoint "an agitator" at the annual business meeting, whose duty is to announce donation night in advance.

11. Resolved: That since it is a matter of great importance for the pastors of the District to attend the Camp and Conference, Be it resolved: That the pastor's support at the church where he is assigned as pastor shall continue over the two Sundays he attends Camp and Conference and the first Sunday following.

12. Resolved: That each church and mission install and practice the envelope system of collecting tithes and offerings.

13. Resolved: That pastors and church boards urge the calling of evangelists for our revivals from among our own Pilgrim ministers, and that the District Superintendent be consulted before we call other ministers.

14. Resolved: That we strive for at least two new churches in the District each year.

15. Resolved: That we provide for a Sunday School Convention, and that this be the order of the first day of the Ministerial Institute. Be it further resolved: That the superintendent or a representative from each Sunday School attend said Convention, taking notes to be used in the Sunday School meetings in the local Church.

16. Resolved: That each Sunday School endeavor to establish another Sunday School each year.

17. Resolved: That each Sunday School be given credit for the number of scholars from their church attending Sunday School at our Camp.

18. Resolved: That the Sunday School service at Camp be under the supervision of the District Sunday School Board.

Zones

19. Resolved: That the District Zones be recorded in the Minutes.

District Home Missions

20. Resolved: That a District Home Missionary Committee be formed, said Committee to consist of the District Superintendent and the District Treasurer by virtue of office, and two Advisory members who are to be chosen from the Ordained ministers by the Council. Be it further resolved that their duties are:

a. To keep a constant lookout for new areas in which to locate new Pilgrim Holiness churches.

b. To be responsible for selecting an appropriate location and the general oversight of the same.

Missionary Societies

21. Resolved: That there shall be a Missionary Secretary appointed by the District Council whose duties shall be: 1. To promote and coordinate the work of Missionary Societies in our district churches; 2. To work in full cooperation with our General Missionary Department program for Missionary Societies; 3. To report to the District Conference on their activities for the year.

Credentials

22. Resolved: That all persons applying for license appear in person before the Examining Board, unless the applicant is sick or otherwise unable to appear; in which case some member of the Conference is to certify as to his or her character and location.

Pastor

23. Resolved: That each pastor read all resolutions of this Conference to his congregation at the earliest possible date.

24. Resolved: That each pastor make a special effort to place a current Manual in the home of each member of the church.

25. Resolved: That each pastor list in a book the name and address of each Advocate Subscriber, with the expiration date; said book is to be transferred to his successor, and that each pastor endeavor to keep a subscription list equal to his membership.

26. Resolved: That no pastor hold revivals off his charge without making satisfactory arrangements with his church and the District Superintendent. Be it further resolved: That no pastor hold a revival away from his church within 30 days after a revival in his own church, no more than two revivals during the Conference year, providing said church is supporting him.

27. Resolved: That each pastor send the obituary of deceased members of his church to the Chairman of the Memorials Committee immediately following the funeral.

28. Resolved: That each active pastor be given two weeks vacation with pay.

29. Resolved: That each minister submit his name, address, and telephone number to the District Secretary immediately upon arrival at his new address; the same to be included in the Ministerial Directory. Each minister shall notify the District Secretary of any changes occurring thereafter.

Ministers

30. Resolved: That each minister support financially the church of which he is a member.

31. Resolved: That each minister attend the Camp and Conference in full or present a written explanation of non-attendance to the District Council.

32. Resolved: That whereas ministers are interested in the welfare of other ministers and their families, and, whereas, there is a Ministerial Benefit Association established for the purpose of protecting the family of the deceased minister, we therefore recommend: That the local church assume payment of the assessment when called for by the Association. Be it also resolved: That the District pay the assessment of the District Superintendent and all those under the jurisdiction of the District Home Missionary Committee.

33. Resolved: That an information blank be filled out by ministers that cannot attend the Conference; said blank to be furnished by the District.

34. Resolved: That no minister or church shall conduct a radio broadcast without permission of the District Council.

35. Resolved: That upon the death of a minister or his wife the Superintendent be notified, and that he notify the District Secretary, who in turn will notify the Zone Chairmen, and they are to notify the pastors in their zone by phone or card.

Conference

36. Resolved: That no one leave the Conference without permission.

37. Resolved: That no church send a delegate to Conference who will not agree to stay throughout the entire Conference. See Manual, Sec. 82, Paragraph 2.

38. Resolved: That our churches send qualified delegates, who know the problems of the church and district.

39. Resolved: Whereas much valuable time is sometimes taken by resolutions which may not deserve such time, and whereas, the Resolution Committee often feels reluctant to ignore any resolution even if it seems of small importance; Be it therefore resolved: That this Conference invest the Resolution Committee with the power to reject any resolution that is not written out and signed by the person who offers it for consideration to the committee and, or, Conference.

Camp

40. Resolved: That our Camp shall begin on the last Friday before the last Sunday in July.

41. Resolved: That we register all who come to camp, assigning work to each one as equally as possible. A meal ticket will be given all who register, the same to be presented at the dining room door.

42. Resolved: That the District Superintendent, his wife, and the Camp nurse, be registered free for the Camp and Conference. Be it further resolved: That the District Superintendent, his wife, the nurse, and the called workers for the Camp and Conference be entertained free at the lunch stand.

43. Resolved: That we give space in the book room for a table and some one to take subscriptions to the Advocate, Pilgrim Youth News, and the Missionary Bulletin.

44. Resolved: That all who disregard the following rules be answerable to the District Council:

a. All pastors shall instruct their churches and young people that all who come to Camp shall abide by the rules.

b. There shall be a retiring bell at 10:30 P. M., and another at 11:00 P. M. after which everyone must be quiet.

c. A dean shall be appointed over each dormitory.

d. Single young people shall not be allowed off the Camp grounds after 7:00 P. M.

e. No articles shall be taken from the kitchen or dining room without permission from the one in charge; any article taken shall be returned in good condition.

f. No food shall be taken from the kitchen without permission.

g. Parents shall supervise the conduct of their children while on the Camp ground.

45. Resolved: That we have the registration of dormitory rooms to begin at noon Friday, and that only those workers active in Camp preparation shall have priority to dormitory rooms. Others who come and eat in the dining room before Friday noon shall be charged the regular price for each meal, unless called by the District Superintendent.

46. Resolved: That each minister give three days labor, or pay the equivalent, in developing the Camp grounds, or in Camp preparation, when called upon by the District Superintendent.

47. Resolved: That whereas we have a large number of children on our Camp ground during Camp, Be it therefore resolved: That a fund be established to provide the necessary equipment for a supervised playground, using the offerings from the Children's services to apply on the equipment. Be it further resolved: That the District Council appoint a committee to take the necessary steps to provide said playground.

48. Resolved: That all cabin owners furnish their own mattresses for their cabins.

49. Resolved: That the Camp Meeting Committee meet at the Ministerial Institute and plan for the preparing of the Camp ground and buildings for Camp and appoint capable persons to carry out the work of the Camp.

50. Resolved: That the District Superintendent appoint a special committee to stay after Camp to clean up the Camp grounds.

51. Resolved: Since it is so important that the Camp set the proper example and standards for others to follow; Therefore, be it resolved: That the District Council see that all workers, such as speakers, singers, pianists, and musicians used in any service on the Camp meeting platform, be required to dress as "becometh holiness," including the wearing of hose and sleeves of below elbow length.

52. Resolved: That in order to provide facilities for visitors eating outside the dining room; Be it resolved: That the District Council arrange for the making and placing of at least six tables on the Camp ground.

53. Resolved: That the District Council appoint some one each year to be in charge of each of the prayer rooms and to arrange for prayer groups and other special prayer effort all through the Camp.

54. Whereas: There is a pressing need for many items for the camp kitchen and dining room,

Be It Resolved: that we ask the District Council to appoint a chairman to organize, list, and assign the needed articles to various churches. These items to be supplied by the ladies of the churches so designated and to be brought in from year to year as needed. This is to be known as "The Ladies Camp Meeting Auxiliary."

Miscellaneous

55. Resolved: That no one person serve on more than one committee where competent persons are available.

56. Resolved: That each church plan for a Daily Vacation Bible School.

57. Resolved: That we establish an honor system and that the Gold Star Churches be those that have paid their district and general budgets in full, and sent to the Treasurer by the 10th of each month. Be it further resolved: That all churches reporting each month be designated as Silver Star Churches. This chart is to be compiled by the District Treasurer and put on display at the District Camp.

58. Resolved: That resolutions which are of a temporary nature shall become void upon their completion and shall automatically be deleted from our minutes.

59. Resolved: That a Conference paper be published monthly, the same to be edited by one appointed by the District Council. The various departments of our district program shall consider this as our official organ. The heads of these departments shall be considered as contributing editors. It is further recommended that this paper be devoted to information and promotion rather than a compilation of sermons.

60. Resolved: That the host church, with the District Superintendent, decide as to the mode of entertaining the Ministerial Institute.

61. Resolved: Whereas, the attendance to the Youth Conference is very low, especially of the Pastors and Youth delegates; Be it therefore resolved that the Youth Conference be held on Wednesday morning before the District Conference.

62. Resolved: Whereas, we feel that television is detrimental to deep spirituality and the teaching of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Be it resolved that the Kentucky Conference go on record as opposed to members and ministers having television sets.

63. Resolved: That each year a picture be taken of the candidates for ordination, together with the Presiding Officer and the District Council; the same to be placed in the District Minutes.

Minutes

64. That we have 700 copies of the District Minutes printed.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1. We recommend: That each Sunday School pay one dollar per month into the portable tabernacle fund. We further recommend: That each Sunday School adopt the birthday offering plan, said offering to go toward the portable tabernacle and home missionary funds.

2. We recommend: That each church take a free will offering for the District Superintendent on all his visits, the same to be sent in by the local treasurer and applied on the Superintendent's traveling expense.

3. We recommend: That whereas, there is a pressing need for buildings to house our people, that each church or individual buying a lot be asked to build a cabin on said lot within three years, and if they fail to so do, to put the lot up for resale. Furthermore, we recommend: That those who purchased lots prior to this date be contacted by the District Superintendent urging them to build a cabin within two years or give the District the privilege of reselling their lot.

4. We recommend: That whereas our District Home Missions and Church Extension Loan Fund is being supervised by the District Council, and they are placing all designated funds in this department, that the rate of interest be four percent (4%) on all loans.

5. We recommend: That the District Council appoint a committee of three members of which the District Treasurer shall be one and the Chairman, to investigate the District Home Missions and Church Extension Loan Fund and shall be empowered to bring all business up to date including all payments and interest.

6. We recommend: That each church pay the registration fee of their pastor and wife and church delegate to the District Conference; this amount to be raised by the District Superintendent at the annual meeting; and also an offering for their traveling expense.

7. We recommend: That the District Treasurer be paid two hundred fifty (\$250.00) dollars per year, and the District Secretary one hundred (\$100.00) dollars per year; the same to be paid in equal monthly payments; and that the District Statistician be paid sixty (\$60.00) dollars per year.

8. We recommend: That each church have a monthly Missionary service on the Lord's day, at which time an offering be taken for foreign missions; also a monthly missionary prayer meeting.

9. We recommend: That each church and Sunday School send ten per cent (10%) of their regular offerings to the District Treasurer, designated as District Budget. This does not include special offerings, such as building fund, evangelists, General Church Obligations.

10. We recommend: That the District keep a complete set of the Ministerial Course of study books.

11. We recommend: That the District Superintendent's salary shall be set by the District Council.

12. We recommend: That any minister traveling under the direction of the District Superintendent, the Board or Committee of which

he is a part, be paid five (5¢) cents per mile traveling expense plus one (\$1.00) dollar per meal bought while in District work.

13. We recommend: That the churches pay their pastor a salary at least equal to the average wages of the working people of the church, and that the matter of the pastor's salary be taken care of by the District Superintendent or his assistant at the time of the annual meeting.

14. We recommend: That in compliance with the action of the 1958 General Conference, our United Stewardship Fund be \$8.00 per member, to be divided as follows: Foreign Missions 20%; General Church Extension 14%; Administrative Expense 36%; Sunday School and Youth 2.6%; Senior College, 21.4%; Church Extension Loan Fund 3%; Contingent Fund 3%. This amount is to be sent to the District Treasurer in a lump sum each month as United Stewardship Fund.

15. We recommend: That each pastor and church board make plans immediately for raising their portion of the United Stewardship Fund for the year. We further recommend: That inasmuch as in the division of the United Stewardship Fund 20% goes to Foreign Missions and 14% to Church Extension that we instruct our District Treasurer to take from money sent to him for Foreign Missions and Church Extension, but not specified for any special project, an amount not to exceed the above percentages and apply it on the United Stewardship Fund for our District.

16. We recommend: That the District Budget be divided as follows: Superintendent's expense 53%; Sinking fund 30%; District parsonage 10%; Zone Bible School 4%; General Conference expense 3%.

17. We recommend: That the District raise one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) per year to assist on the Camp meeting; the same to be raised by each local church giving the sum equivalent to one dollar (\$1.00) per member, the sum to be sent to the District Treasurer.

18. We recommend: That all money be turned over to the local church treasurer from the different departments of the church at the end of each month; and that the local church treasurer pay all the bills as directed by the Church Board.

19. We recommend: That each church take steps to raise their revival offering at least thirty days before the revival starts.

20. We recommend: That when a mission is organized into a church it shall not be asked to pay district budget for one year from the following Conference; and that the church shall pay fifty per cent for the two following years.

21. We recommend: That each church send \$1.00 per month for our district youth work, same to be sent to the District Treasurer and forwarded to the District Youth Treasurer.

22. We recommend: That whereas the 1946 General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church adopted the "Pension Plan" to aid retired and disabled ministers, and whereas each District Conference is asked to contribute 4% of the pastor's salary, lay worker's salary, evangelist's offerings, etc., to said Pension Fund, and whereas, this Conference has voted to fully cooperate with the General Board of Pensions in this matter, We recommend: That we adopt this plan of financing it, namely: That each local church may pay the equivalent of 40% of the evangelist's tithe, who are members of said church,

and 4% of the pastor's salary. This to be sent monthly to the District Treasurer. All members of the Pension Fund Plan should pay 2% of salary and offering as reported to the Conference.

23. We recommend: That each Sunday School set aside one Sunday each month and 50% of said Sunday's offering be given for District Home Missions.

24. We recommend: That in order to encourage our local churches to observe sound and acceptable business practices in the handling of local church funds, that therefore, be it resolved: that two local church board members, other than the treasurer, count and make a record of the offerings as received, and then immediately turn over to the local church treasurer these funds and their records for further check and bank deposit. Be it further resolved: That when the local church treasurer's reports are made to the local church, that the bank statements be made available and balance be shown to check with the treasurer's record.

25. We recommend: That each church give the minimum of five dollars (\$5.00) to support the District Ministerial Institute each year.

26. We recommend: That each church subscribe for the number of Kentucky Pilgrims they desire per month and that they pay 7¢ per copy for same.

27. We recommend: Whereas, the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized the Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc., to make loans of Pension Funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches under such conditions as required active participation on the part of the Pilgrim Holiness District. Therefore, be it resolved by the Annual Conference of this district that the District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials be, and they are hereby authorizing, to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness churches of this district, subject, however, to limitations and conditions set out in said Resolutions of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loan.

28. We recommend: That, unless a better plan develops, we ask all of the delegates to the General Conference to pay the expense of their board and room.

RULES GOVERNING SALE OF LOTS AND BUILDING COTTAGES

Price of lots, \$20.00 each. Terms: \$5.00 down payment when purchased, balance to be paid in monthly payments of \$3.00 each. Six per cent on unpaid balance at maturity. All lots are to be paid for in six months or contract is void.

All outside lots in the old plot shall be of this dimension, 20 feet in width and 30 feet in length. Inside lots shall be 20x20. All lots in the new plot shall be 20x30 feet. All cottages are to be uniform in size and placements on lots in accordance with the row or street on which they may be placed. The dimensions of the cottages are to be 10x12 feet, with an 8-foot eave, six concrete piers, one door and two windows, a screen door, and either a metal or asphalt roof. The building is to be made of dressed lumber, either boxed or framed, and to have two coats of white paint. An extension of nine feet may be built on any of the cabins on an outside lot of the old plot, such additions to be of the same dimensions as that of the cabin with a window on each side. A porch may be built on the front of any and all cottages. Cabins on the new plot may be either single or double.

The District Council holds the right to paint or repair in any way necessary, unless the owner does the work himself, and the owner is to pay the expense of same. Aluminum paint only is to be used on the metal roof. The District Council is to keep all buildings insured and the owner of each cottage is to pay his part of the premium.

RATES FOR THE CAMP

Registration fees: \$5.00 and work assigned; \$10.00 and no work assigned. This rate is to include all persons over 12 years of age. Those from 6 through 12 years will be registered for \$2.50 and those under 6 will be registered free. All meals will be fifty cents.

A flat rate of \$1.00 shall be charged for electricity used in cabins and house trailers on the ground, the same to be paid by those using said trailers and cabins when registering.

Registration shall begin, at noon Friday.

DISTRICT YOUTH CONFERENCE MINUTES

The District Youth Conference convened in the tabernacle Wednesday, August 2, 1961 at 9:00 o'clock A. M., with Rev. J. D. Abbott, General Secretary of Sunday Schools and Youth presiding.

Rev. W. H. Richardson led in singing, "He Abides." Bro. Tromble led in prayer.

The District Youth President, Bro. Paul Ebright, introduced Rev. Abbott. He gave us a brief report on National Youth and announced the National Sunday School Convention which is to be held at Allentown, Pennsylvania.

Bro. Abbott's message to the Youth Conference was taken from Luke 9.

- I. We must *defend* our church against the snare of worldliness and complacency. There are 18 million young people in the United States who have never been inside a church.
- II. We must *attend* our church. It is our church. These days call for faithfulness on our part. The Lord is soon coming. We are nearer to His coming than we've ever been before. We can't keep spiritual without attending Sunday School, Church, and Prayer Meeting.

- III. We must *expend* our church. There are 43,800,000 perishing without God every year.
- IV. We must *commend* our church by our loves, by what we say, how we say it, and what we do.
- V. We must *extend* our church. "For whosoever shall save his life shall lose it, but whosoever shall lose his life for my sake shall find it."

The conference bar was formed.

Rev. Abbott asked that the District Youth Officers stand in front of the altar and he challenged them to do their best during the coming year. The entire audience stood, signifying their support to these new officers.

DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

As this, my fifth year in this capacity comes to a close, I want to thank God for His marvelous help. It has been good to be a laborer with Him!

In this office I have traveled 1100 miles.

I attended the annual youth leader's conference at Indianapolis, where various phases of the youth work were discussed, and plans made for youth week.

One of the highlights of the year was having our National Youth Director, Rev. J. D. Abbott with us for three regional youth rallies. In these rallies, Bro. Mitchell and I emphasized the youth camp. Bro. Abbott presented the general youth program. He then concluded with an enlightening and challenging message, in which he presented some startling statistics relative to conditions existing among the youth of America. Our hearts were stirred. His closing thoughts were: "What can we do about it? We must arise and accept the challenge of this crisis hour!"

The other highlight of the year was our seventh annual Youth Camp. Again the registration was right at the saturation point, with 154 youth registered. It surely is a thrilling sight to see that many boys and girls worshipping here in the tabernacle, eating in the dining room, playing together, and meeting with their counsellors for devotions and guidance. In addition to those registered, we had a fine corps of workers, which brought the total attendance up to approximately 200. Our evangelist, teachers, counsellors, kitchen and dining room help went "all out" to make this youth camp a success. Everyone cooperated to the fullest, even though it meant long and hard hours. Our efforts were well rewarded as we saw many boys and girls line the altar each night. The new attendance trophy was taken by the Frankfort church with a total of 51 points. Shelbyville was runner-up with 45 points. There were 22 churches represented, and four visitors. With the saturation point already reached, and less than half of our churches represented, it seems that the time has come to make some new plans—if we continue to make progress.

I would like to add, that we appreciate our District Superintendent, who has backed us in every way, and has always been right here on the job for counsel and to help in numerous ways.

May we all continue to unite our efforts, in work and prayer, in order that Kentucky Youth may continue to go "Forward with Christ!"

Adopted.

2. Be It Resolved: that each Zone Youth Leader visit each church in his zone for a youth rally at least once during the year, and that each church visited take an offering for his travel expense. Adopted.
3. Be It Resolved: that the Youth Council conduct a Youth Society Officers Training Program in each zone during the coming year. Adopted.
4. Be It Resolved: that all Youth Conference Committees for the new year shall be appointed by the Youth Executive Council and published in the minutes. Adopted.
5. Whereas, the Manual makes provision for the division of the District into Zones for the election of Youth Zone Leaders, and
Whereas, there seems to be a conflict of interests in our District setup:
Be It Resolved: that we recommend to the District Conference that the position of Zone Chairman be eliminated. Adopted.
6. Be It Resolved: that we express our appreciation to our General Secretary of Sunday Schools and Youth, Rev. J. D. Abbott, for his presence at our Conference and pledge our support to him for the coming year of activity in the work of winning our youth for Christ. Adopted.

RESOLUTIONS
