CONFERENCE MINUTES

First Sitting

The Fifty-third Annual Conference of the Kentucky District convened on August 6, 1962 at 9:00 A. M. The meeting was opened by the District Superintendent, Rev. Ralph Tromble. The group was led in singing by Rev. Clarence Hamm. They joined in singing, "Stepping in the Light." The time of prayer was led by Rev. J. D. Webb.

The District Superintendent introduced Rev. R. A. Beltz as the presiding officer of the Conference. He spoke words of greeting and explanation as to his being assigned to this Conference.

He spoke to the Conference on the theme, "Worth of the Individual", giving emphasis to the worth of the individual member of the church. His scripture was chosen from the Gospel of John, chapter four, beginning with verse six. Emphasis was laid on the attitude and words of the disciples when they returned to the well. The question was brought forcefully to us, "What value do we place on the individual?"

The following thoughts were taken from his message:

"Our culture and belief is based on the theory that each individual is important."

"Each individual is important because he was created in the image of God. The imprint of the coin makes it of value. The image may be marred but the value of the coin is still there."

"The minister does not preach to the crowd. His message must be directed to the individual."

HOW MUCH IS THE MEMBER OF THE PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH WORTH?

To bring out the best that is in a person, we must visualize their potential worth. We need to look at a person as to what they can be, not what they are now.

His physical worth.

1. His presence at church is worth something.

- A. If he is there, truth has an opportunity.

- B. Four groups of attendants.

Those who are regular.

Those who are spasmodic.

Those who seldom attend.

Those who never come.

For this reason, the service should be interesting and all done that is possible to bring them in.

His financial worth.

1. Those who tithe.
2. Those who seldom give.
3. Those who never give.

His spiritual worth.

1. You can not always know their faith, or what talent that may lie dormant that will be brought to use.

His soul worth.

1. What will a man give in exchange for his soul?
2. All members, including those who are neurotic, wayward, worldly, troublesome, all have a soul worth.

The business session was opened by Rev. Beltz.

The roll call was given by the Secretary.

The conference bar was set, and time of conference sessions set as 9:00-11:30 A. M., 1:30-4:00 P. M., 7:00-9:00 P. M.

The report of the District Superintendent, Rev. Ralph Tromble, was given. The motion carried to accept the report.

In the absence of the Assistant Superintendent, his report was read by the Secretary. A motion carried that it be accepted.

The auditor's report was read by the Secretary and accepted.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT TO THE CONFERENCE

Greetings to the Fifty-Third Conference of the Kentucky District. We are glad to have Rev. R. A. Beltz with us to preside over this Conference. We are sure God will bless him as he directs us. We greet each of the ministers and delegates of the Conference. God has permitted us to meet together this another year. May He continue to lead us.

I often think of the church as a great vessel that sails the ocean. There are times when the waves are quiet, and times when they are violent, some days the sun shines, and some days are cloudy. We are lashed by the wind and drenched by the rain, but still the ship moves on. We cannot stop. Just as surely as we keep moving in the right direction, we will reach the harbor. How wonderful that we have Jesus as our Captain, the Holy Spirit as our guide, and God our Heavenly Father to strengthen us and encourage us. "Lo I am with you always".

It looks like we will show a good gain in church membership and I hope in Sunday School attendance. Last year I reported that the Erlanger church were starting a new building. They finished the new church building and moved into it. God gave a wonderful service the day it was dedicated. It is in a new community, and they have changed the name to Hopeful Heights. God has been blessing them. Rev. Curtis Underwood just recently started a new work a few miles out from Lexington. He tells me that he is encouraged with the services, and feels that God will give us a work there. I have preached there and was encouraged with the prospects. The church at McAndrews has bought a parsonage. It is a nice building and we are happy for them. For several years we have prayed and planned for a new dining room on the camp ground. A few years ago we were almost ready to build it but it seemed advisable to build a dormitory first, so our new dormitory was built. This year the Council decided it was time to rise up and build. We had hoped to have more done on it by camp time but the plans were delayed on us. We have started as you can see, and it is our plan to go on with it and have it ready for use by next camp. We praise God for all who helped on this, and are praying that others will help. It will be a lovely dining room and kitchen. Another great improvement for our camp ground is the water and gas line that is now laid on our property. For years the water situation has been a problem. It was almost beyond our hopes that we would ever have a water line here, but it is here and for good measure a gas line. We praise the Lord.

Some of our number have gone from us as our report from the memorials committee will show; among these was our beloved brother Rev. S. M. Stikeleather. We feel they have only gone to a better land. May their lives inspire us to live for the Master.

As a personal testimony, I wish to praise the Lord for His goodness to me, and for His hand of protection that has been over me the many miles I have traveled. I wish to praise God for the Kentucky District. I think our people want to please the Lord. I have appreciated working among them. I wish to thank God for the men of our district council. I have found them to be men of God who are seeking first the Kingdom of God, men of vision, and men with a burden. There has been good fellowship in our meetings. May the Spirit of the Lord continue to guide all of us.

The following is a report of the improvements in the churches:

Ashland I—Painted the inside of the parsonage. Bought new hymnals for the church, also made a Prophets Chamber in the church.

Ashland II (Fairview)—Put in a septic tank and also new storm doors and windows for the parsonage. A public address system in the church, and also banisters on the steps of the church.

Carlisle—Painted kitchen in parsonage; re-wired the Sunday School rooms, church, and parsonage; painted Sunday School room floors.

Carrollton—Three rooms and a hallway have been redecorated and new fiberglass curtains and shades have been purchased for the parsonage. The auditorium of church has been painted and wall to wall carpet laid on the platform.

Clay—Has painted the interior of the church.

Cloverport—Purchased a new piano for the church. Parsonage was papered and painted inside, also installed a kitchen door and a storm door, and new roof on the parsonage.

Covington—Repaired roof of parsonage.

Cynthiana—Papered and painted inside of church, also put rod supports in the church and erected a road sign. They are now in the process of building and installing a bathroom in parsonage.

Eastview—Built a new chimney in the parsonage.

Erlanger—Built and moved into a lovely new church. The new name is Hopeful Heights.

Falmouth—Redecorated interior of parsonage.

Frankfort—Painted the outside of the parsonage and put a new door on the garage. Painted the inside of the church, and put new carpet in the aisle, on the platform, and in the back and front of church, also purchased new hymnals.

Fullerton—Painted outside of church; put in a new floor, and a new ceiling, a new rug on the platform, new panel around the bottom of the wall and a new cross on the front wall.

Hitchins—Did some repairs on the Sunday School rooms and the roof of the church.

Junction City—Built four new Sunday School rooms, put new gas furnace in the S.S. rooms, put storm windows in church and graded the church lot.

Kingswood—Painted church roof, redecorated church inside, and installed gas heating system in church.

Lancaster—Installed rest room in basement, made some seats for the S.S. Classes, installed two gas heaters and at the present time are building some nice Sunday School rooms in the basement. Paid a nice amount on their debt.

Lewisport—Has put banisters in front of their church, finished their S.S. rooms, installed space heaters. Paid \$135.00 on S.S. rooms.

Lexington—Painted interior of church, painted the basement and put new carpet on basement stairs, and papered the living room in the parsonage.

Louisville II—Painted the church inside and out.

McAndrews—Did some work on the Sunday School rooms in the basement and are planning to erect a sign in front of the church.

Morgantown—Painted church inside and out.

Olive Hill—Did some remodeling on the parsonage, put a new window and a new sink in the kitchen and did some papering.

Owensboro—Did some remodeling on the church, installed a new heating plant, and built a nursery in the church, and are going to reroof the Sunday School rooms.

Pikeville—Painted one Sunday School room and paid \$50.00 on debt.

Pleasureville—Refinished the floors in the living room and dining room. Redecorated kitchen and installed wall cabinet.

Salem—Piped oil into church and house.

Shelbyville—Painted inside and outside of the church.

Shepherdsville—Installed two forced air furnaces, and flood lights for parking lot, also regravelled parking lot and driveways, painted outside of church and poured cement walks.

Soldier—Painted church roof, and are repairing the parsonage.

Somerset—Painted church pews and built an altar across front of church.

Trace—Poured cement walk in front of church, rocked the driveway, and installed a street light.

Tram—Put new shingles on the roof, a new door hood over the front and side doors and a new sign in front of the church.

Wheelwright—Paid the last of the church debt and bought a bus to bring people to church.

Willard—Made concrete steps in front and back of the parsonage, and painted the woodwork including the belfry on the church.

I have tried to be faithful to the Lord.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

To the 1932 Annual Conference of the Kentucky District
of the Pilgrim Holiness Church:

There are two times in the year that I look forward to with both anticipation and dread. One is January 1st, and the other is July 1st. I look to these dates with some dismay knowing that what has been done in the way of successes, gains, failures, and losses has been done and the record is made. However, I also look to these dates with anticipation knowing that a new record can be started, and with an urgent desire that the old record be improved. I start this new record with Paul's admonition in Phil. 3:13, "Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended: but this one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." So the personal record of each of us, and the Sunday School record of our churches is made.

In the matter of reporting, there has been quite an improvement this year. 22 schools reported 12 times; 12 reported 11 times; 6 reported 10 times, and 6 reported less than 10 times. We appreciate this improvement in reporting. However, I wish all of us had had more to report but we are glad to report that 18 churches show a gain.

In giving this report, it is next to impossible to have it fully correct, as averages have to be based on what is reported, even though incomplete. There is also sometimes a discrepancy in what is reported, but as a general guide, I will give what has been reported.

Kentucky Sunday Schools show a slight gain of 10 per Sunday which is about three-tenths of one percent. An average of 2,969 was reported for last year, and 2,976 for this year.

Lancaster reports the highest numerical gain with 35 gain; Winchester second with 19 gain; Aspen Grove third with 17 gain.

Lancaster is also first in the percentage gain with a 95% gain; Morgantown is second with a 64% gain; Aspen Grove is again third with a 61% gain. Congratulations to these schools.

We present the Conference award "Certificate of Achievement" to Lancaster for both the highest numerical and percentage gain for the year.

REV. S. M. STIKELEATHER

Rev. S. M. Stikeleather of Kingswood, Ky., departed this life for his heavenly home, June 13, 1962, in the Brandon Hospital, Brandon, Miss., of a heart coronary at the age of 83. He had been in failing health for the past year. He was born July 20, 1878, in Turnersburg, North Carolina, one of eight children. Brother Stikeleather was saved as a young man, and received the blessed experience of sanctification. He attended God's Bible School in Cincinnati, Ohio, from 1902-1905, where he met his wife, the former Phoebe Gregory of Sidney, Iowa, who survives him. He is also survived by two sons, Clyde P. Stikeleather of Leitchfield, Ky., and Donald T. Stikeleather of Cincinnati, Ohio; two daughters, Mrs. Edgar M. Wachtel of Massapequa Park, L. I., New York, and Mrs. Charles F. Mitchell of Brandon, Miss.; two sisters, Mrs. Charles E. Entemann, Sr., of Newark, N. J., and Mrs. W. C. Carmichael of East Point, Ga.; twelve grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

Brother Stikeleather was a charter member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church when it was organized in 1902 in Cincinnati, Ohio, and ordained a minister in 1904, fifty-eight years ago. He served three pastorates in the states of Kansas and North Carolina from 1905 to 1917. In the years which followed, he served the Church faithfully in many capacities, which included District Superintendent in North Carolina for sixteen years; General Secretary-Treasurer of Foreign Missions; member of the Board of Directors of the Kingswood

Holiness College and Bethel Orphan Home; General Secretary of the Pilgrim Church for twenty years, and on the General Board for thirty-eight years.

Funeral services were conducted in the Pilgrim Holiness Church in Kingswood, Ky., by Rev. Walter Surbrook, General Superintendent Emeritus, assisted by Rev. Ralph Tromble, District Superintendent, Rev. A. E. Wachtel, a former President of Kingswood College, and Rev. Paul Ebright, pastor, at 2:00 P. M., Monday, June 18th. Many minister friends were present, including three former Kingswood pastors, Rev. H. D. Wright, Rev. Floyd Singleton and Rev. Thomas Shirk, in addition to all the members of the immediate family and a host of friends. He will be keenly missed, but we know that our loss is heaven's gain.

Mr. Daniel Mosser, of Kingswood, Ky., a church friend of long-standing, directed the music for the service. One of Brother Stikeleather's favorites, "Amazing Grace" was sung by the congregation. Brother Shirk sang—"Beyond the Sunset", and a trio—Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Mosser and Mrs. Harry Jarboe sang "When They Ring Those Golden Bells." The spirit of God prevailed as Brother Surbrook spoke of our dear Brother Stikeleather's joining "God's Hall of Fame" with the saints of the ages.

Brother Stikeleather will be loved and remembered for the Scriptures he quoted, especially one of his favorites over the years, "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to His purpose." Rom. 8:28. His last two quotations before God called him home, were: "Trust in the Lord and do good." * * * Ps. 37:3, and "I am the resurrection and the life." * * * St. John 11:25.

Interment was made in the Kingswood Cemetery, Kingswood, Kentucky.

Rev. S. M. Stikeleather was a man held in high esteem by the members of the Executive Council and the General Board. He served the General Church on these boards for many years. There has never been a man more loyal to the Pilgrim Holiness Church than he.

He was a man of deep convictions and could always be counted on to take his stand on the side of truth and righteousness.

While Brother Stikeleather was a member of the Kentucky district he belonged to all of us, the entire Church. He supported every part of the Church. He was a valuable counsellor, a man of wisdom, a Christian gentleman. May God bless his memory. It can well be said of him as was said of Abel, "He being dead yet speaketh." Heb. 11:4.—Rev. R. A. “MAKING YOUR MINISTRY EFFECTIVE”

THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT SPEAKS TO THE MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

These thoughts and suggestions have come to me over the past years and I give them to you with the hope that they will help you to be a better worker in the church. Some things will not apply to you. Please do not take something that is not yours. I only ask you to take that which does belong to you. Some will apply to you as I have been impressed with them as I have lived among you. I started putting them down some months ago, and they are now presented to you:

1. You must be spiritual. You should never attempt to be a minister unless you have the Spirit of Christ. How shall the blind lead the blind?
2. Preach on the “Fruits of the Spirit.” Tell what Grace can do.
3. Be sure you know what you believe, and why you believe it. Someone has said “Never preach on a text that you do not understand” or “Are not living up to.”
4. You must preach till people will know that you are a part of your message. (Illustration: the preacher’s house on fire.)
5. Be well balanced in your life and preaching. Some are very strong on some lines but weak on other important things. Give proper emphasis to all lines.
6. Don’t preach while you are making your announcements. It is good to write out your announcements. This is not the time to preach, especially if you have a visiting minister.
7. Speak clearly. Hold your head up. Speak in a clear voice. If people can’t understand you, then why are you preaching?
8. When you are preaching be sure YOU know what time it is, but don’t make your people too aware of it.
9. Do not compel your people to say “Amen.” You may think you are preaching good but don’t force them to say “Amen.” Preach good enough and they will want to say it.
10. Be careful of repetition. It is all right to repeat. A good speaker will do so, but not too much.
11. Do your best to stop when you are through. Do not preach for ten minutes after you are through. A painter can put too much paint on a picture.
12. Some pastors preach good, in the pulpit they are a blessing. Out of the pulpit they talk too much and hurt their ministry. Some pastors are not too good at preaching, but in their personal contact with people they are a great blessing. Try to be a blessing both places.

13. When you are preaching be careful where you say "Amen" or "Praise the Lord." When you have just made some statement about the blackness of sin, or that men are lost, that is no place to say "Praise the Lord."
14. Never be contentious. You may be right but contend with the wrong spirit. You will never calm the anger of a fierce dog by aggravating him. Remember what the Scripture says about a "Soft answer."
15. Be sure you have a charitable spirit. You must not compromise but you must be charitable. Kindness will help a lot.
16. Preach hard against sin but do not preach like you were mad at the sinner. Show him the terribleness of sin, but that there is one who loves him.
17. Your appearance is very important. It can ruin a good message. People will judge you by what you appear to be. We do not believe that "Clothes make the man" but we do believe that your appearance helps to make you a success.
18. The responsibility of the entire church is yours. You are not just a separate part. You should help with the entire program. It is yours as far as your responsibility goes.
19. Be careful of exaggeration. In the excitement of the moment it is easy to exaggerate. You are preaching to intelligent people and they will know if you are stretching the truth.
20. Never tell your congregation you are going to do something and then fail to do it. For instance: "I'll not preach very long" and then preach a long time, or "This will be the last thing" and tell several more, or perhaps in an altar call you may say "We will only sing one more stanza." Be truthful in all things.
21. When you take in members from another church, be honorable about it. Treat the other pastor like you would like to have him treat you.
22. In all things and at all times, manifest the Spirit of Christ.

May God bless you and make your ministry effective. I feel sure you want to be a blessing, and if you will observe these things they will help you. A District Superintendent in speaking of his pastors and their work, one time said to me, "A pastor must create a demand for his ministry." I think he was right. It may be crowded at the bottom, but there is room at the top for many more.

REPORT OF THE 1962 CONFERENCE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

1. Resolved: That the Conference delegate authority to the Council to construct buildings for the District, appointing and directing a committee to carry out its plan, to make rules and by-laws regulating the sale of lots, the building of cottages, and to govern the Camp grounds; the same to be printed in the Minutes. Adopted.

2. Resolved: That resolution #46, page 32, be changed to read as follows: That each minister give three days labor each year in developing the Camp grounds, or in camp preparation, when called upon by the District Superintendent, or pay the sum of \$15.00. Adopted.

3. Resolved: That resolution #7 be deleted. Adopted.

4. Resolved: That resolution #64 be deleted. Adopted.

5. Resolved: That any pastor who cannot be present for the Conference shall forward his pastor's report to the District Secretary to be read at the Conference. Adopted.

6. Resolved: That the annual report of the Sunday School average attendance be figured on the basis of the 50 highest Sundays as set in the Sunday School Standard of Excellence #4D. Adopted.

7. Resolved: That resolution #33 be deleted. Adopted.

8. Resolved: That the words "and the District Superintendent" in resolution #26, page 30, be deleted. Adopted.

9. Resolved: That the following be added to Resolution #51, page 32, "And that the Secretary inform all workers when calling them of the standards that the Conference requires." Adopted.

10. Be it Resolved: That the Conference hereby gives a vote of appreciation to the Presiding Officer, Rev. R. A. Beltz; our Camp Evangelists, Rev. Ermal Wilson, and Rev. James Hertel; Camp Singers, Rev. and Mrs. James Butler; Foreign Missions Representative, Rev. Ermal Wilson; Church Extension Representative, Rev. Arnold Peck; Southern Pilgrim College Representatives, Rev. and Mrs. R. E. Strickland; Rev. and Mrs. Ralph Tromble; the District Officials; the Department Heads; the Camp Nurse; the cooks, and all others who served untiringly to make this Camp and Conference a blessing to others.

REPORT OF WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE, 1962 DISTRICT CONFERENCE

1. We recommend that #14, page 35, be changed to read as follows: "That in compliance with the action of the 1962 General Conference, our United Stewardship Fund be \$8.00 per member, to be divided as follows: Administration 38%; General Church Extension 30%; Liberal Arts College 22%; Sunday School and Youth 6%; Church Extension Loan Fund 2%; and Contingent Fund 2%. This amount is to be sent to the District Treasurer in a lump sum as United Stewardship Fund. Adopted.

2. We recommend: That inasmuch as Foreign Missions has been taken out of the United Stewardship Fund, and inasmuch as the Church Extension Department will not be raising money by deputational work except just preceding Easter, that we delete the second sentence of Recommendation #15. Adopted.

3. We recommend: That the District Secretary be authorized to edit Recommendation #22, relating to the Pension Plan, to comply with the action of the 1962 General Conference. Adopted.

4. We recommend that the following replace #1, page 34. "That each Sunday School pay two dollars (\$2.00) per month into a Building Fund, for the purpose of construction or maintenance of buildings on the Camp Ground. We further recommend that the money in the present Tabernacle Fund be transferred to said Building Fund. Adopted.

5. We recommend: That each Sunday School adopt the birthday offering plan, said offering to go for District Home Missions. Adopted.

RESOLUTIONS

District Superintendent

1. Resolved: That the District Superintendent make two trips over the District during the year, and to give more time to the smaller churches as needed.

Council

2. Resolved: That the Conference delegate authority to the Council to construct buildings for the District, appointing and directing a committee to carry out its plan, to make rules and by-laws regulating the sale of lots, the building of cottages, and to govern the Camp grounds; the same to be printed in the Minutes.

3. Resolved: That the District Council set the date for the Ministerial Institute and that said date be recorded in the minutes.

4. Resolved: That the District Council appoint all pastors for new missions for the first five years, or until said Council decides to do otherwise.

5. Resolved: That the District Council be given power to rezone the churches of the District when necessary.

Churches

6. Resolved: That each church close their books on the last day of each month, and the monthly budgets be sent to the District Treasurer immediately. Be it also resolved: That the District Treasurer's books be closed for the year, at noon, on the 10th day of July.

7. Resolved: That each church, minister, and deaconess mail a copy of its annual report to the District Statistician by the 15th of July each year, and Be it further resolved: That persons failing to comply with this ruling be reported to the District Council and Examining Committee.

8. Resolved: That whereas many of our pastors do not receive sufficient financial support, Be it resolved: That each local church appoint one prayer meeting night each month as "donation night" at which time food and provisions shall be brought together for the pastor. Be it also resolved: That the District Superintendent shall appoint "an agitator" at the annual business meeting, whose duty is to announce donation night in advance.

9. Resolved: That since it is a matter of great importance for the pastors of the District to attend the Camp and Conference, Be it resolved: That the pastor's support at the church where he is assigned as pastor shall continue over the two Sundays he attends Camp and Conference and the first Sunday following.

10. Resolved: That each church and mission install and practice the envelope system of collecting tithes and offerings.

11. Resolved: That pastors and church boards urge the calling of evangelists for our revivals from among our own Pilgrim ministers, and that the District Superintendent be consulted before we call other ministers.

12. Resolved: That we strive for at least two new churches in the District each year.

Sunday School

13. Resolved: That we provide for a Sunday School Convention, and that this be the order of the first day of the Ministerial Institute. Be it further resolved: That the superintendent or a representative from each Sunday School attend said Convention, taking notes to be used in the Sunday School meetings in the local Church.

14. Resolved: That each Sunday School endeavor to establish another Sunday School each year.

15. Resolved: That each Sunday School be given credit for the number of scholars from their church attending Sunday School at our Camp.

16. Resolved: That the annual report of the Sunday School average attendance be figured on the basis of the 50 highest Sundays as set in the Sunday School Standard of Excellence, #4D.

Zones

17. Resolved: That the District Zones be recorded in the Minutes.

District Home Missions

18. Resolved: That a District Home Missionary Committee be formed, said Committee to consist of the District Superintendent and the District Treasurer by virtue of office, and two Advisory members who are to be chosen from the Ordained ministers by the Council. Be it further resolved that their duties are:

a. To keep a constant lookout for new areas in which to locate new Pilgrim Holiness churches.

b. To be responsible for selecting an appropriate location and the general oversight of the same.

Credentials

19. Resolved: That all persons applying for license appear in person before the Examining Board, unless the applicant is sick or otherwise unable to appear; in which case some member of the Conference is to certify as to his or her character and location.

Pastor

20. Resolved: That each pastor read all resolutions of this Conference to his congregation at the earliest possible date.

21. Resolved: That each pastor make a special effort to place a current Manual in the home of each member of the church.

22. Resolved: That each pastor list in a book the name and address of each Advocate Subscriber, with the expiration date; said book is to be transferred to his successor, and that each pastor endeavor to keep a subscription list equal to his membership.

23. Resolved: That no pastor hold revivals off his charge without making satisfactory arrangements with his church. Be it further resolved: That no pastor hold a revival away from his church within 30 days after a revival in his own church, nor more than two revivals during the Conference year, providing said church is supporting him.

24. Resolved: That any pastor who cannot be present for the Conference shall forward his pastor's report to the District Secretary to be read at the Conference.

25. Resolved: That each pastor send the obituary of deceased members of his church to the Chairman of the Memorials Committee immediately following the funeral.

26. Resolved: That each active pastor be given two weeks vacation with pay.

27. Resolved: That each minister submit his name, address, and telephone number to the District Secretary immediately upon arrival at his new address; the same to be included in the Ministerial Directory. Each minister shall notify the District Secretary of any changes occurring thereafter.

Ministers

28. Resolved: That each minister support financially the church of which he is a member.

29. Resolved: That each minister attend the Camp and Conference in full or present a written explanation of non-attendance to the District Council.

30. Resolved: That whereas ministers are interested in the welfare of other ministers and their families, and, whereas, there is a Ministerial Benefit Association established for the purpose of protecting the family of the deceased minister, we therefore recommend: That the local church assume payment of the assessment when called for by the Association. Be it also resolved: That the District pay the assessment of the District Superintendent and all those under the jurisdiction of the District Home Missionary Committee.

31. Resolved: That no minister or church shall conduct a radio broadcast without permission of the District Council.

32. Resolved: That upon the death of a minister or his wife the Superintendent be notified, and that he notify the District Secretary, who in turn will notify the Zone Chairmen, and they are to notify the pastors in their zone by phone or card.

Conference

33. Resolved: That no one leave the Conference without permission.

34. Resolved: That no church send a delegate to Conference who will not agree to stay throughout the entire Conference. See Manual, Sec. 82, Paragraph 2.

35. Resolved: That our churches send qualified delegates, who know the problems of the church and district.

36. Resolved: Whereas much valuable time is sometimes taken by resolutions which may not deserve such time, and whereas, the Resolution Committee often feels reluctant to ignore any resolution even if it seems of small importance; Be it therefore resolved: That this Conference invest the Resolution Committee with the power to reject any resolution that is not written out and signed by the person who offers it for consideration to the committee and, or, Conference.

Camp

37. Resolved: That our Camp shall begin on the last Friday before the last Sunday in July.

38. Resolved: That we register all who come to camp, assigning work to each one as equally as possible. A meal ticket will be given all who register, the same to be presented at the dining room door.

39. Resolved: That the District Superintendent, his wife, and the Camp nurse, be registered free for the Camp and Conference. Be it further resolved: That the District Superintendent, his wife, the

nurse, and the called workers for the Camp and Conference be entertained free at the lunch stand.

40. Resolved: That we give space in the book room for a table and some one to take subscriptions to the Advocate, Pilgrim Youth News, and the Missionary Bulletin.

41. Resolved: That all who disregard the following rules be answerable to the District Council.

a. All pastors shall instruct their churches and young people that all who come to Camp shall abide by the rules.

b. There shall be a retiring bell at 10:30 P. M., and another at 11:00 P. M. after which everyone must be quiet.

c. A dean shall be appointed over each dormitory.

d. Single young people shall not be allowed off the Camp grounds after 7:00 P. M.

e. No articles shall be taken from the kitchen or dining room without permission from the one in charge; any article taken shall be returned in good condition.

f. No food shall be taken from the kitchen without permission.

g. Parents shall supervise the conduct of their children while on the Camp ground.

42. Resolved: That we have the registration of dormitory rooms to begin at noon Friday, and that only those workers active in Camp preparation shall have priority to dormitory rooms. Others who come and eat in the dining room before Friday noon shall be charged the regular price for each meal, unless called by the District Superintendent.

43. Resolved: That each minister give three days labor in developing the Camp grounds, or in Camp preparation, when called upon by the District Superintendent, or pay \$15.00.

44. Resolved: That whereas we have a large number of children on our Camp ground during Camp. Be it therefore resolved: That a fund be established to provide the necessary equipment for a supervised playground, using the offerings from the Children's services to apply on the equipment. Be it further resolved: That the District Council appoint a committee to take the necessary steps to provide said playground.

45. Resolved: That all cabin owners furnish their own mattresses for their cabins.

46. Resolved: That the Camp Meeting Committee meet at the Ministerial Institute and plan for the preparing of the Camp ground and buildings for Camp and appoint capable persons to carry out the work of the Camp.

47. Resolved: That the District Superintendent appoint a special committee to stay after Camp to clean up the Camp grounds.

48. Resolved: That since it is so important that the Camp set the proper example and standards for others to follow, therefore, be it resolved: That the District Council see that all workers, such as speakers, singers, pianists, and musicians used in any service on the Camp meeting platform, be required to dress as "becometh holiness," including the wearing of hose and sleeves of below elbow length, and that the Secretary inform all workers when calling them of the standards that the Conference requires.

49. Resolved: That in order to provide facilities for visitors eating outside the dining room; Be it resolved: That the District Council arrange for the making and placing of at least six tables on the Camp ground.

50. Resolved: That the District Council appoint some one each year to be in charge of each of the prayer rooms and to arrange for prayer groups and other special prayer effort all through the Camp.

51. Whereas: There is a pressing need for many items for the Camp kitchen and dining room,

Be It Resolved: That we ask the District Council to appoint a chairman to organize, list, and assign the needed articles to various churches. These items to be supplied by the ladies of the churches so designated and to be brought in from year to year as needed. This is to be known as "The Ladies Camp Meeting Auxiliary."

Miscellaneous

52. Resolved: That no one person serve on more than one committee where competent persons are available.

53. Resolved: That each church plan for a Daily Vacation Bible School.

54. Resolved: That we establish an honor system and that the Gold Star Churches be those that have paid their district and general budgets in full, and sent to the Treasurer by the 10th of each month. Be it further resolved: That all churches reporting each month be designated as Silver Star Churches. This chart is to be compiled by the District Treasurer and put on display at the District Camp.

55. Resolved: That resolutions which are of a temporary nature shall become void upon their completion and shall automatically be deleted from our Minutes.

56. Resolved: That a Conference paper be published monthly, the same to be edited by one appointed by the District Council. The various departments of our district program shall consider this as our official organ. The heads of these departments shall be considered as contributing editors. It is further recommended that this paper be devoted to information and promotion rather than a compilation of sermons.

57. Resolved: That the host church, with the District Superintendent, decide as to the mode of entertaining the Ministerial Institute.

58. Resolved: Whereas, the attendance to the Youth Conference is very low, especially of the Pastors and Youth delegates; Be it therefore resolved that the Youth Conference be held on Wednesday morning before the District Conference.

59. Resolved: Whereas, we feel that television is detrimental to deep spirituality and the teaching of the Pilgrim Holiness Church; Be it resolved that the Kentucky Conference go on record as opposed to members and ministers having television sets.

60. Resolved: That each year a picture be taken of the candidates for ordination, together with the Presiding Officer and the District Council; the same to be placed in the District Minutes.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1. We recommend: That each Sunday School pay two dollars (\$2.00) per month into a Building Fund, for the purpose of construction or maintenance of buildings on the Camp Ground. We further recommend that the money in the present Tabernacle Fund be transferred to said Building Fund.

2. We recommend: That each church take a free will offering for the District Superintendent on all his visits, the same to be sent in by the local treasurer and applied on the Superintendent's traveling expense.

3. We recommend: That whereas, there is a pressing need for buildings to house our people, that each church or individual buying a lot be asked to build a cabin on said lot within three years, and if they fail to so do, to put the lot up for resale. Furthermore, we recommend: That those who purchased lots prior to this date be contacted by the District Superintendent urging them to build a cabin within two years or give the District the privilege of reselling their lot.

4. We recommend: That whereas our District Home Missions and Church Extension Loan Fund is being supervised by the District Council, and they are placing all designated funds in this department, that the rate of interest be four percent (4%) on all loans.

5. We recommend: That the District Council appoint a committee of three members of which the District Treasurer shall be one and the Chairman, to investigate the District Home Missions and Church Extension Loan Fund and shall be empowered to bring all business up to date including all payments and interest.

6. We recommend: That each church pay the registration fee of their pastor and wife and church delegate to the District Conference; this amount to be raised by the District Superintendent at the annual meeting; and also an offering for their traveling expense.

7. We recommend: That the District Treasurer be paid two hundred fifty (\$250.00) dollars per year, and the District Secretary one hundred (\$100.00) dollars per year; the same to be paid in equal monthly payments; and that the District Statistician be paid sixty (\$60.00) dollars per year.

8. We recommend: That each church have a monthly Missionary service on the Lord's day, at which time an offering be taken for foreign missions; also a monthly missionary prayer meeting.

9. We recommend: That each church send ten percent (10%) of their regular offerings to the District Treasurer, designated as District Budget. This does not include special offerings, such as building fund, evangelists, General Church obligations.

10. We recommend: That the District keep a complete set of the Ministerial Course of study books.

11. We recommend: That the District Superintendent's salary shall be set by the District Council.

12. We recommend: That any minister traveling under the direction of the District Superintendent, the Board or Committee of which he is a part, be paid five (5¢) cents per mile traveling expense plus one (\$1.00) dollar per meal bought while in District work.

13. We recommend: That the churches pay their pastor a salary at least equal to the average wages of the working people of the church, and that the matter of the pastor's salary be taken care of by the District Superintendent or his assistant at the time of the annual meeting.

14. We recommend: That in compliance with the action of the 1962 General Conference, our United Stewardship Fund be \$8.00 per member, to be divided as follows: Administration 38%; General Church Extension 30%; Liberal Arts College 22%; Sunday School and Youth 6%; Church Extension Loan Fund 2%; and Contingent Fund 2%. This amount is to be sent to the District Treasurer in a lump sum as United Stewardship Fund.

15. We recommend: That each pastor and church board make plans immediately for raising their portion of the United Stewardship Fund for the year.

16. We recommend: That the District Budget be divided as follows: Superintendent's expense 53%; Sinking Fund 30%; District parsonage 10%; Zone Bible School 4%; General Conference expense 3%.

17. We recommend: That the District raise one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) per year to assist on the Camp meeting; the same to be raised by each local church giving the sum equivalent to one dollar (\$1.00) per member, the sum to be sent to the District Treasurer.

18. We recommend: That all money be turned over to the local church treasurer from the different departments of the church at the end of each month; and that the local church treasurer pay all the bills as directed by the Church Board.

19. We recommend: That each church take steps to raise their revival offering at least thirty days before the revival starts.

20. We recommend: That when a mission is organized into a church it shall not be asked to pay district budget for one year from the following Conference; and that the church shall pay fifty percent for the two following years.

21. We recommend: That each church send \$1.00 per month for our district youth work, same to be sent to the District Treasurer and forwarded to the District Youth Treasurer.

22. Whereas: The 1946 General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church adopted the Pension Plan to aid retired and disabled ministers, and Whereas: In accordance with action of the 1962 General Conference each District Conference is asked to contribute an amount equal to 5% of the pastor's salary, lay worker's salary, evangelist's offerings, etc., to said Pension Fund. This amount is to be paid until March 31, 1963, when it shall be raised to 6% for the next year with a subsequent increase each year of 1% until the amount of 8% is reached. Whereas, this Conference has voted to fully cooperate with the General Board of Pensions in this matter.

We recommend: That we adopt this plan of financing it, namely: That each local church may pay the equivalent of 50% of the evangelist's tithe, who are members of said church, with subsequent 10% increases each year in accordance with the above figures, and 5% increasing to 8% of the pastor's salary. This is to be sent monthly to the District Treasurer. All members of the Pension Fund Plan should pay 2% of salary and offerings as reported to the Conference.

23. We recommend: That each Sunday School set aside one Sunday each month and 50% of said Sunday's offering be given for District Home Missions.

24. We recommend: That each Sunday School adopt the birthday offering plan, said offerings to go for District Home Missions.

25. We recommend: That in order to encourage our local churches to observe sound and acceptable business practices in the handling of local church funds, that therefore, be it resolved: That two local church board members, other than the treasurer, count and make a record of the offerings as received, and then immediately turn over to the local church treasurer these funds and their records for further check and bank deposit. Be it further resolved: That when the local church treasurer's reports are made to the local church, that the bank statements be made available and balance be shown to check with the treasurer's record.

26. We recommend: That each church give the minimum of five dollars (\$5.00) to support the District Ministerial Institute each year.

27. We recommend: That each church subscribe for the number of Kentucky Pilgrims they desire per month and that they pay 7¢ per copy for same.

28. We recommend: Whereas, the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized the Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc., to make loans of Pension Funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches under such conditions as required active participation on the part of the Pilgrim Holiness District. Therefore, be it resolved by the Annual Conference of this district that the District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials be, and they are hereby authorizing, to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness churches of this district, subject, however, to limitations and conditions set out in said Resolutions of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loan.

RULES GOVERNING SALE OF LOTS AND BUILDING COTTAGES

Price of lots, \$20.00 each. Terms: \$5.00 down payment when purchased, balance to be paid in monthly payments of \$3.00 each. Six per cent on unpaid balance at maturity. All lots are to be paid for in six months or contract is void.

All outside lots in the old plot shall be of this dimension, 20 feet in width and 30 feet in length. Inside lots shall be 20x20. All lots in the new plot shall be 20x30 feet. All cottages are to be uniform in size and placements on lots in accordance with the row or street on which they may be placed. The dimensions of the cottages are to be 10x12 feet, with an 8-foot eave, six concrete piers, one door and two windows, a screen door, and either a metal or asphalt roof. The building is to be made of dressed lumber, either boxed or framed, and to have two coats of white paint. An extension of nine feet may be built on any of the cabins on an outside lot of the old plot, such additions to be of the same dimensions as that of the cabin with a window on each side. A porch may be built on the front of any and all cottages. Cabins on the new plot may be either single or double.

The District Council holds the right to paint or repair in any way necessary, unless the owner does the work himself, and the owner is to pay the expense of same. Aluminum paint only is to be used on the metal roof. The District Council is to keep all buildings insured and the owner of each cottage is to pay his part of the premium.

RATES FOR THE CAMP

Registration fees: \$5.00 and work assigned; \$10.00 and no work assigned. This rate is to include all persons over 12 years of age. Those from 6 through 12 years will be registered for \$2.50 and those under 6 will be registered free. All meals will be fifty cents.

A flat rate of \$1.00 shall be charged for electricity used in cabins and house trailers on the ground, the same to be paid by those using said trailers and cabins when registering.

Registration shall begin at noon Friday.

It was carried unanimously. The cost of the flag and flagpole will be taken from the District Youth Funds.

A motion was made that the information contained in the new resolutions concerning the financial duties be put in the next issue of the Kentucky Pilgrim, on the youth page, as a reminder to the pastors. It was carried.

A motion was made and carried that it go on record that the entire Conference give a standing vote of appreciation for the splendid work Bro. Ebright has done as Youth President.

A motion was made and carried that the District Youth Council read the Minutes of the Youth Conference before they are published in the District Minutes.

Rev. Tromble asked that the District Youth Officers stand in front of the altar and he challenged them to do their best during the coming year.

A motion was made and carried that we adjourn. Bro. Peck gave the benediction.

DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

As my sixth year in this office comes to a close, I do want to thank God for His marvelous presence. Truly it is good to be a Christian.

I have traveled 2,094 miles. I presided over one Youth Council Meeting, and spoke at one Zone Rally.

Our District Superintendent, Vice President and I conducted a Youth Leader's Institute in each zone. Workshops were held, society programs and promotion were emphasized, projects and activities were highlighted, Youth camp pictures were shown, and Bro. Tromble concluded with "Our Challenge: 1. "We have done it for the Lord." 2. "If you would live on after you are dead, inspire some young person. They will carry the torch on!" The response to these institutes was gratifying.

For me, at least, the outstanding event of the year took place in July. Monday morning, July 9, at the District Camp Grounds, dawned bright and clear. An air of anticipation prevailed. The time for another youth camp had arrived. What would the results be?

We didn't have to wonder long. By mid-morning the boys and girls began to arrive. Some even came the night before. All day

they continued to "pour in," and when the records were complete, the registration stood at an all time high of 197!

The story of the Kentucky Youth Camp is one of phenomenal growth. The attendance for the eight years the camp has been in progress runs as follows: 34, 15, 96, 114, 164, 160, 154, and 197.

The number of churches represented is also increasing. We have no record for the years 1955 and '56. In the years 1957 and '58, sixteen churches were represented; 1959, twenty churches; 1960, twenty-five churches; 1961, twenty-two churches; and this year, 1962, thirty-two churches! Youth Camp has "caught fire" in Kentucky!

Elizabethtown won the attendance trophy for the first time. Frankfort was "runner-up" and Lewisport came in third!

An interesting side-light concerns the fine group from the Western Zone, which was the largest yet, from that part of the state. The bus on which they were traveling had a breakdown and the 36 on board were 16 hours coming 185 miles. The eight-hour layover was at Shelbyville. The Covington church bus was dispatched to help them complete the trip. They arrived at 1:00 A. M., tired but happy. Some of the youngsters said, "this was the best trip yet!"

Our evangelist and teachers were at their best, and the Lord honored their efforts. Our counsellors and kitchen help worked long and hard hours to supply the material needs. The evangelistic services were crowned with many at the altar.

We were crowded to capacity. All available space was used. We are faced with a challenge. As we see it from here, there are four alternatives possible:

1. We can restrict the registration to a limited number, but this stops all growth.

2. We can divide and have Junior and Senior youth camps.

3. We can find another location, more centrally located, with better facilities and continue with the same age groups as now.

4. We can find another location in another part of the state, and have two camps in progress at the same time.

All these present problems; but we must go forward! We cannot afford a stalemate. What a challenge! Kentucky Pilgrim Youth are depending upon us. May the Lord help us to find the right answer.

I would like to extend my sincere thanks and appreciation to the following:

To my District Superintendent, Bro. Tromble, for his valuable counsel and assistance.

To my Vice Presidents of past years, Bro. King, Bro. Wilson, Bro. Buckles, Bro. Mitchell, and this last year, Bro. Richardson, who has cooperated one hundred percent, even to the extent of sleeping over the dining room, with the boys during Youth Camp, which hardly anyone else will do!

To my Youth Council—the officers and zone chairmen, for every effort they have put forth.

And to all those many, many people—preachers and laymen—who worked untiringly to make each Youth Camp a success.

May the Lord bless each one, is my earnest prayer. To Him be all the glory.

May Kentucky Youth continue to go "forward with Christ."

1. 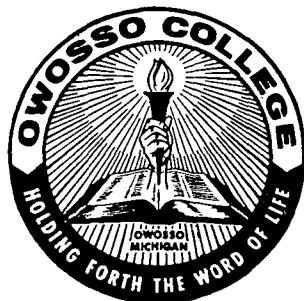
