

## CONFERENCE MINUTES

### FIRST SITTING

The Fifty-fourth Annual Conference of the Kentucky District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened on August 1, 1963 at 9:00 a.m. The meeting was opened by Rev. Ralph Tromble, District Superintendent. The group was led in singing, "Take the Name of Jesus with You," by Rev. B. F. Durham. The time of prayer was led by Rev. F. M. Singleton.

The District Superintendent introduced Dr. W. H. Neff, General Superintendent and presiding officer of the Conference.

Dr. Neff greeted the Conference with an emphasis on the Scriptural phrase "In His Name." He brought to us the necessity of recognizing:

1. The Presence of God.
2. The Grace of God.
3. The Love of God.
  - a. Love to unite us.
  - b. Love to cover a multitude of sins and mistakes.
4. The Providence of God.

We need:

1. Minds to think.
2. Hearts to love.
3. Spirit of Christ to live.
4. Spirit of God to empower us.

We were reminded of our responsibility to the Conference and were urged to a spiritual program to carry out a New Testament ministry.

The Conference was called to order by the Presiding Officer. First order of business was the reading of the roll call.

The names of those transferring to our District were read. They are as follows: Ordained Ministers—B. F. Durham, A. L. Sypolt, James McLaren. Licensed Minister—Chester Todd. Ordained Deaconess—Mrs. B. F. Durham. A motion was made to accept them. Carried.

The Reception Committee presented the following to the Conference: Rev. L. E. Galyon, District Superintendent of the Tennessee District and one of the Evangelists for our Camp; Rev. J. D. Abbott, General Secretary-Treasurer of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and one of the Evangelists of our Camp; Rev. Crum, Bible Missionary Church, Chillicothe, Ohio; Rev. and Mrs. B. H. Lucas from Detroit, Michigan. These were granted honorary seats in the conference bar. Rev. Abbott was asked to sit on the platform as a General Officer of our Church.

The Conference Bar was cleared.

The time of the Conference was set at 9:00-11:45 a.m. and 1:30-4:30 p.m.

The next order of business was the reading of the reports.

The District Superintendent's report was read. A motion carried that the report be accepted with a standing vote of thanks.

The Assistant Superintendent's report was read and accepted.

The District Superintendent presented the Lexington, Todds Road Church to the Conference. Rev. Underwood, the pastor, reported on the beginning of the Church. A motion was made and carried that this church be accepted into the District with a standing vote of appreciation.

The Auditor's report was read and accepted.

The District Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The Camp Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The General Superintendent spoke to the Conference regarding the low standing of the District in United Stewardship Fund giving. He stated that our payment was only 21% of the required amount. He urged us to better action for the next year.

The Sunday School Promotional Secretary reported, and his report was accepted. Award ribbons were given for the following percentage gains: Latonia and Maysville, 20% or more; Livermore, 15% or more; Winchester, Eastview, Trace, Willard, Pleasureville, 10% or more; Lexington and Ashland II, 5% or more. The Decade of Progress Ship Award was presented to the Highland Avenue Church in Covington. The highest numerical and percentage awards both went to the Latonia Church.

The General Superintendent exhorted the ministers regarding the importance of reporting.

The report of the Ladies' Camp Auxiliary was read and accepted.

The statistical report was read by the Statistician. It was accepted by a standing vote of appreciation.

The Missionary President's report was read and accepted. Qualifications for the judging of the missionary displays were read and awards were made to the Owensboro Church, 1st prize, and Elizabethtown Church, 2nd prize.

The report of the Memorials Committee was read and the Conference stood and sang, "In the Sweet By and By."

Following announcements, we were dismissed with prayer by Rev. Ralph Tromble.

## SECOND SITTING

The Second Sitting of the Conference opened with the congregation singing, "We'll Work Till Jesus Comes." Rev. H. H. Bolender led in prayer. The minutes of the first sitting were read and approved.

The Reception Committee introduced Rev. James Estes, Rev. Brewer, Rev. Barrage, and Rev. Ted Wilson, all of the Western Ohio Conference, to the Conference. They were granted honorary seats in the conference bar.

The Pastors' reports were given as the next order of business.

Following the reading of these reports we were recessed for 10 minutes.

The District Treasurer was granted permission to read and highlight the financial obligations as listed in the minutes.

A motion was made that the first order of business on Friday shall be the election of officers.

The value of organization was emphasized by the General Superintendent.

We were adjourned by expiration of time.

### **THIRD SITTING**

The third sitting of the conference opened with singing led by Rev. Kenneth Fleming. Prayer was offered by Rev. M. F. Leadingham.

The Conference bar was cleared.

The District Superintendent was asked to appoint tellers for the election. The appointment was as follows: Rev. A. L. Sypolt, Chairman; Rev. H. H. Barber, Rev. F. M. McNurlin, Rev. H. D. Wright, Rev. Virgil Greene, Rev. M. F. Leadingham, Rev. Roy Green, Rev. Charles Campbell.

The Presiding Officer called the Conference to prayer before the election began.

Ballots were first cast for the District Superintendent. In the course of the balloting, Rev. P. O. Carpenter withdrew his name and later called the Conference to a season of prayer for divine guidance. Rev. E. R. Mitchell later withdrew his name and the balloting resulted in the election of Rev. Ralph Tromble as District Superintendent on the 13th ballot.

Ballots were cast for Assistant Superintendent resulting in the election of Rev. P. O. Carpenter on the 3rd ballot.

Nominations were read from the District Council for District Treasurer. The following had been nominated: Paul Ebright, B. F. Durham, A. L. Sypolt. Ballots were cast resulting in the election of Paul Ebright.

Ballots were cast for the additional members of the District Council. While these were being counted the District Superintendent read the Committee appointments for the coming year.

A motion carried to adjourn.

### **FOURTH SITTING**

The Fourth Sitting of the Conference opened with singing the chorus, "He Is So Precious to Me." Prayer was offered by Rev. Roy Green.

The report was made on the vote for additional members of the District Council. The vote resulted in the election of Rev. H. H. Barber, Rev. J. A. Thomas, and Rev. R. D. Christman on the first ballot.

A motion carried that the present Board of Trustees be declared re-elected.

The Resolutions Committee continued its report.

Resolution #3 was adopted.

Resolution #4 was adopted.

Resolution #5 was adopted.

The Ways and Means Committee continued its report.

Recommendation #3 was adopted.

The report of the Educational and Examining Boards was given and ratified by the Conference.

The election continued with the reading of nominations for the vacancy on the Examining Board. Those nominated were Rev. A. L. Sypolt and Rev. H. H. Bolender.

Rev. A. L. Sypolt was elected on the first ballot.

Nominations were read for the Educational Board. They were Rev. R. D. Christman, Rev. F. M. McNurlin, and Rev. B. F. Durham.

There was no election on the first ballot.

A motion carried to vote on the two highest. This resulted in the election of Rev. R. D. Christman.

Nominations were read for Representative to the School Board of Southern Pilgrim College. Harry McNurlin and Merlin Enlow were nominated.

Mr. Harry McNurlin was elected.

Nominations were read for President of the Missionary Society. They were Jenny V. Vincent, Mrs. H. H. Bolender, Mrs. Ralph Tromble.

The election resulted in the re-election of Jenny V. Vincent.

Invitations were extended for the Ministerial Convention from the Olive Hill and Ashland I Churches.

Ashland I was chosen in the voting.

The District Superintendent spoke concerning the debt on the Dining Room and the Council's plan for the coming year. Each church was asked to take coin cards for each of their Sunday School classes to be filled before the first of March. The entire number of cards was handed out.

An appeal was made from the floor for the Hitchins Church which was destroyed by fire this past year. A fine response was given by churches and individuals in pledges for this project. Rev. F. M. McNurlin, pastor at the Hitchins church, spoke words of appreciation to the Conference for their response to the need.

The Ordination service was next order of business, at which time Rev. J. W. Tomlin was ordained to the Ministry by the General Superintendent, Dr. William H. Neff. He was assisted by Rev. Ralph Tromble, District Superintendent; Rev. E. R. Mitchell, Rev. Paul Ebright, Rev. R. D. Christman, and Rev. J. A. Thomas.

The 54th District Conference closed with the singing of the song, "Power in the Blood," and prayer by Dr. W. H. Neff.

The building itself was contracted, but much other work has been done by several of the men who came in and helped, and we wish to thank each one who helped to get it in readiness for the camp meeting. We want to make special mention of Bro. Mitchell who has helped much on this, also Bro. Dunn who helped many days on it. Without the help of these men I could never have had it ready for camp. It is ready, a very beautiful, efficient building. It has only a reasonable debt on it, and we look forward to paying it off, so we can start other buildings.

I should mention that the Falmouth Church sold their old parsonage and bought a much nicer one. Our church at Hitchins suffered a great loss this year when fire destroyed their church and parsonage. The pastors, Bro. and Sr. McNurlin, have bravely carried on, having their services in another building. They have built back part of their building, reconstructing what were the Sunday School rooms, and finishing them up so they can be used for a parsonage. They have worked very hard and are to be commended for their accomplishment.

As we look forward to the future I would like to urge each of us to be spiritual, and live where we will have the blessings of the Lord upon us. As churches, let us try to reach other places with the Gospel. Let us have a growing Sunday School and Church, a place where those who need the Lord can find him. Let us not be satisfied to stand by while souls are perishing. I am urging each church to pay their budgets. This is a part of the work of the Lord. Let us do our best for the Master.

The following is a report of improvements made in the churches:

*Ashland I*—Built cupboards in parsonage, and made some repairs to the parsonage.

*Ashland II*—Made some major repairs on parsonage, also re-decorated inside of the church.

*Aspen Grove*—Made repairs on church and parsonage.

*Carlisle*—Rewired the church and parsonage, also painted inside of parsonage.

*Clay*—Have made considerable improvement on the church and parsonage, such as painting, papering, laid linoleum in three rooms of the parsonage, installed venetian blind and a door.

*Cloverport*—Have made considerable improvement by painting and also built new steps to the back porch.

*Covington I*—Enlarged their parking lot.

*Cynthiana*—Built on a room and installed bath.

*Eastview*—Purchased oak pews, built Sunday School rooms on back of church, built a large cistern, installed sink and cabinets in parsonage.

*Falmouth*—Bought a new parsonage, redecorated interior, and built a new bathroom.

*Frankfort*—Bought a new rug for platform, in front, rear, and both aisles of the church; painted outside of church; bought new shrubbery for front lawn, and purchased a new organ for the church.

*Fullerton*—Bought two new 20-inch fans, songbooks, heaters for church and class rooms, redecorated three class rooms, repaired the roof.

*Hitchins*—Built rooms for a parsonage.

*Hopeful Heights*—Bought new organ and church signs.

*Junction City*—Purchased chairs for Sunday School rooms, and bought new songbooks; painted Sunday School rooms.

*Kingswood*—Purchased new piano, new church sign, and made minor repairs on parsonage and church.

*Lewisport*—New forced air furnace; finished Sunday School rooms; bought thirty new chairs. Reduced debt on Sunday School rooms to \$425.00.

*Louisville I*—Purchased new bulletin board, coat and hat racks for the church; improved parking area with gravel; papered and painted interior of parsonage.

*Maysville*—Painted interior, also extensive repair, including roof of the church; purchased Hammond organ; sanded floors and painted two rooms in parsonage.

*McAndrews*—Bought six room parsonage and painted exterior; also living room, dining room, kitchen and bathroom; refinished floors.

*Pikeville*—Paid \$150.00 on church debt; put new vent pipe in furnace; painted one classroom; obtained new chairs for class room; painted interior of the church, installed a rest room, and improved the lighting.

*Rush*—Sold parsonage and put money in the bank.

*Shepherdsville*—Put guttering on church; sealed Sunday School rooms and painted them; filled in and enlarged the parking lot; purchased electric heaters for the Sunday School rooms, also a new church sign; a church library was started; purchased blackboards for the Sunday School rooms, and liquidated the indebtedness on the church.

*Soldier*—Remodeled the parsonage, which made a wonderful improvement.

*Somerset*—Painted parsonage and are in the process of building two rooms on the parsonage.

*Trace*—Purchased three chairs for the platform, cleaned and repaired church.

*Willard*—Painted exterior of parsonage and part of interior.

*Winchester*—New windows installed in rear of church, also Sunday School rooms redecorated.

The following is my personal report for the year August 1, 1962 to July 31, 1963. Sermons, 143; Board meetings, 96; Church meetings, 52; Homes prayed in, 75; School Board meetings, 2; Revivals, 1; some have been saved and sanctified; Council meetings, 12; Church leaders meeting, 1; Missionary Convention, 1; Ministerial Convention, 1; zone meetings, 3; anointed, 10; children dedicated, 1; committee meetings, 2; spent 27 days on the camp ground; presided over one camp meeting and conference; helped in one wedding; taught 4 V.B.S. classes; attended one youth council meeting; organized one church, Todds Road with 17 adult members and one junior; took 31 members into the church; traveled 18,157 miles; and my salary is paid in full. We only want to do His will.

## REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

To the 1963 Annual Conference of the  
Kentucky District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church:

Another time of reckoning has come for the Sunday School Department of our District. It might be interesting to note that this is a reckoning of the local church and its officers, the pastor, and then a district. These accountings again will have their effects upon the Pilgrim Church and all others that may be watching her. For truly, as the Scriptures say, "No man liveth or dieth to himself."

Now to some definite reporting for this year. Sixteen churches reported 12 times; eleven reported 11 times; six reported 10 times; five reported 9 times; three reported 8 times; five reported 7 times; one reported below 6 times; two did not report at all. This shows some decrease from last year in reporting.

There is no way possible to give you an accurate report on the averages and etc., nevertheless, I am reporting to you what has come to me. No doubt, there will be some discrepancies between this report and the statistician's report.

Our Sunday Schools, district-wise, show a small gain for the year. Last year we had an average attendance per Sunday of 3126 in Sunday School and this year an average of 3146. This figures to a gain of 20 numerically for the year.

Latonia reports the highest numerical gain with 16; Maysville second with a gain of 11; Lexington third with a gain of 10.

Latonia also is first in percentage gain with a 24% gain; Maysville second with a 20% gain. Livermore is third with a 17% gain. Congratulations to these fine churches.

We, at the appropriate time, will present to the Latonia church the Conference award "Certificate of Achievement" for both the numerical and percentage gains for the year.

The work started at Todds Road and the work revived at Augusta is greatly appreciated by the Kentucky District Pilgrims.

On the Decade of Progress we present the following points:

We also present the following ribbons for attendance percentage gains to all the churches who have had a 5% gain or more.

4. Resolved: That Resolution #41-c, page 35, be changed to read: "Two deans shall be appointed over each dormitory."
5. Resolved: That the following point system be adopted as a standard for the judging of missionary displays from year to year:

Clarity of Theme.....	10 points
Illustration of Theme.....	25 points
Quality . . . . .	25 points
Originality . . . . .	25 points
Neatness . . . . .	15 points

Be it further resolved that no display be considered in judging if it has been previously displayed. Adopted.

## **REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE, 1963 DISTRICT CONFERENCE**

1. We recommend: That recommendation #8, page 37, be changed to read: "That each church have a monthly missionary service, at which time an offering shall be taken for World Missions."

2. We recommend: That whereas we are not asking for any new assessments, nor increasing any present assessment, that each church consistently and prayerfully strive to fulfill all obligations as presently listed in the Minutes.

3. With the confidence that the Pilgrims of the Kentucky District are vitally interested in all of the work of the Lord everywhere, and that they are willing to support the cause of Christ according to their ability and as it is represented on all levels of the Church's operation, and

Whereas it is believed that they will gladly respond to the entire program of the church when they are fully informed and challenged to do so, therefore,

We recommend that the 1963 Kentucky District Conference go on record as favoring the promotion of the financial program this year by the following means:

1. Our people be urged to conscientiously and religiously practice tithing into the church as taught in the Scriptures and by the Manual. They must be reminded that this is an act of devotion and is attended with blessings and rewards.

2. Our people be fully informed of the financial plans of the General, District, and Local Organizations. The responsibility for dispensing this information shall rest as follows:

a. Each pastor shall advise with his local church board immediately to inform them of the total financial program of the church and devise plans for raising it and remitting it monthly to the District Treasurer.

b. The District Superintendent, upon visiting the local church, shall hear a report from the local board as to the progress it is making in these obligations and counsel with them as the need may require.

c. Time shall be given at the Ministerial Institute for the promotion of the total financial program of the church.

d. The District Treasurer be instructed to prepare and make available to our people, printed material, setting forth the General and District financial plans, so that all may have knowledge of the facts.

e. Each church be strongly urged to install and practice the envelope system for collecting the finances of the church.

f. The District Council is urged to further study means by which the financial interests of the church may be further and more fully promoted among us, that we may share in the gospel enterprise as carried on by the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Adopted.

## **RESOLUTIONS**

### **District Superintendent**

1. Resolved: That the District Superintendent make two trips over the District during the year, and to give more time to the smaller churches as needed.

### **Council**

2. Resolved: That the Conference delegate authority to the Council to construct buildings for the District, appointing and directing a committee to carry out its plan, to make rules and by-laws regulating the sale of lots, the building of cottages, and to govern the Camp grounds; the same to be printed in the Minutes.

3. Resolved: That the District Council set the date for the Ministerial Institute and that said date be recorded in the minutes.

4. Resolved: That the District Council appoint all pastors for new missions for the first five years, or until said Council decides to do otherwise.

5. Resolved: That the District Council be given power to rezone the churches of the District when necessary.

### **Churches**

6. Resolved: That each church close their books on the last day of each month, and the monthly budgets be sent to the District Treasurer immediately. Be it also resolved: That the District Treasurer's books be closed for the year, at noon, on the 10th day of July.

7. Resolved: That each church, minister, and deaconess mail a copy of its annual report to the District Statistician by the 15th of July each year, and Be it further resolved: That persons failing to comply with this ruling be reported to the District Council and Examining Committee.

8. Resolved: That whereas many of our pastors do not receive sufficient financial support, Be it resolved: That each local church appoint one prayer meeting night each month as "donation night" at which time food and provisions shall be brought together for the pastor. Be it also resolved: That the District Superintendent shall appoint "an agitator" at the annual business meeting, whose duty is to announce donation night in advance.

9. Resolved: That since it is a matter of great importance for the pastors of the District to attend the Camp and Conference, Be it resolved: That the pastor's support at the church where he is assigned as pastor shall continue over the two Sundays he attends Camp and Conference and the first Sunday following.

10. Resolved: That pastors and church boards urge the calling of evangelists for our revivals from among our own Pilgrim ministers, and that the District Superintendent be consulted before we call other ministers.

11. Resolved: That we strive for at least two new churches in the District each year.

### **Sunday School**

12. Resolved: That we provide for a Sunday School Convention, and that this be the order of the first day of the Ministerial Institute. Be it further resolved: That the superintendent or a representative from each Sunday School attend said Convention, taking notes to be used in the Sunday School meetings in the local Church.

13. Resolved: That each Sunday School endeavor to establish another Sunday School each year.

14. Resolved: That each Sunday School be given credit for the number of scholars from their church attending Sunday School at our Camp.

15. Resolved: That the annual report of the Sunday School average attendance be figured on the basis of the 50 highest Sundays as set in the Sunday School Standard of Excellence, #4D.

### **District Home Missions**

16. Resolved: That a District Home Missionary Committee be formed, said Committee to consist of the District Superintendent and the District Treasurer by virtue of office, and two Advisory members who are to be chosen from the Ordained ministers by the Council. 31. Resolved: That no one leave the Conference without permission.

32. Resolved: That no church send a delegate to Conference who will not agree to stay throughout the entire Conference. See Manual, Sec. 82, Paragraph 2.

33. Resolved: That our churches send qualified delegates, who know the problems of the church and district.

34. Resolved: Whereas much valuable time is sometimes taken by resolutions which may not deserve such time, and whereas, the Resolution Committee often feels reluctant to ignore any resolution even if it seems of small importance; Be it therefore resolved: That this Conference invest the Resolution Committee with the power to reject any resolution that is not written out and signed by the person who offers it for consideration to the committee and, or, Conference.

35. Resolved: That our Camp shall begin on the last Friday before the last Sunday in July.

46. Resolved: That since it is so important that the Camp set the proper example and standards for others to follow, therefore, be it resolved: That the District Council see that all workers, such as speakers, singers, pianists, and musicians used in any service on the Camp meeting platform, be required to dress as "becometh holiness," including the wearing of hose and sleeves of below elbow length, and that the Secretary inform all workers when calling them of the standards that the Conference requires.

47. Resolved: That in order to provide facilities for visitors eating outside the dining room; Be it resolved: That the District Council arrange for the making and placing of at least six tables on the Camp ground.

48. Resolved: That the District Council appoint some one each year to be in charge of each of the prayer rooms and to arrange for prayer groups and other special prayer effort all through the Camp.

49. Whereas: There is a pressing need for many items for the Camp kitchen and dining room,

Whereas: The 1946 General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church adopted the Pension Plan to aid retired and disabled ministers, and Whereas: In accordance with action of the 1962 General Conference each District Conference is asked to contribute an amount equal to 5% of the pastor's salary, lay worker's salary, evangelist's offerings, etc., to said Pension Fund. This amount is to be paid until March 31, 1963, when it shall be raised to 6% for the next year with a subsequent increase each year of 1% until the amount of 8% is reached. Whereas, this Conference has voted to fully cooperate with the General Board of Pensions in this matter. We recommend: That we adopt this plan of financing it, namely: That each local church may pay the equivalent of 50% of the evangelist's tithe, who are members of said church, with subsequent 10% increases each year in accordance with the above figures, and 5% increasing to 8% of the pastor's salary. This is to be sent monthly to the District Treasurer. All members of the Pension Fund Plan should pay 2% of salary and offerings as reported to the Conference.

24. We recommend: That each Sunday School set aside one Sunday each month and 50% of said Sunday's offering be given for District Home Missions.

25. We recommend: That each Sunday School adopt the birthday offering plan, said offerings to go for District Home Missions.

26. We recommend: That in order to encourage our local churches to observe sound and acceptable business practices in the handling of local church funds, that therefore, be it resolved: That two local church board members, other than the treasurer, count and make a record of the offerings as received, and then immediately

turn over to the local church treasurer these funds and their records for further check and bank deposit. Be it further resolved: That when the local church treasurer's reports are made to the local church, that the bank statements be made available and balance be shown to check with the treasurer's record.

27. We recommend: That each church give the minimum of five dollars (\$5.00) to support the District Ministerial Institute each year.

28. We recommend: That each church subscribe for the number of Kentucky Pilgrims they desire per month and that they pay 7¢ per copy for same.

29. We recommend: Whereas, the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized the Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc., to make loans of Pension Funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches under such conditions as required active participation on the part of the Pilgrim Holiness District. Therefore, be it resolved by the Annual Conference of this district that the District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials be, and they are hereby authorizing, to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness churches of this district, subject, however, to limitations and conditions set out in said Resolutions of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loan.

## **RULES GOVERNING SALE OF LOTS AND BUILDING COTTAGES**

Price of lots, \$20.00 each. Terms: \$5.00 down payment when purchased, balance to be paid in monthly payments of \$3.00 each. Six per cent on unpaid balance at maturity. All lots are to be paid for in six months or contract is void.

All outside lots in the old plot shall be of this dimension, 20 feet in width and 30 feet in length. Inside lots shall be 20x20. All lots in the new plot shall be 20x30 feet. All cottages are to be uniform in size and placements on lots in accordance with the row or street on which they may be placed. The dimensions of the cottages are to be 10x12 feet, with an 8-foot eave, six concrete piers, one door and two windows, a screen door, and either a metal or asphalt roof. The building is to be made of dressed lumber, either boxed or framed, and to have two coats of white paint. An extension of nine feet may be built on any of the cabins on an outside lot of the old plot, such additions to be of the same dimensions as that of the cabin with a window on each side. A porch may be built on the front of any and all cottages. Cabins on the new plot may be either single or double.

The District Council holds the right to paint or repair in any way necessary, unless the owner does the work himself, and the owner is to pay the expense of same. Aluminum paint only is to be used on the metal roof. The District Council is to keep all buildings insured and the owner of each cottage is to pay his part of the premium.

## **RATES FOR THE CAMP**

Registration fees: \$5.00 and work assigned; \$10.00 and no work assigned. This rate is to include all persons over 12 years of age. Those from 6 through 12 years will be registered for \$2.50 and those under 6 will be registered free. All meals will be fifty cents.

A flat rate of \$1.00 shall be charged for electricity used in cabins and house trailers on the ground, the same to be paid by those using said trailers and cabins when registering.

Registration shall begin at noon Friday.

## **DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT**

Mr. Chairman, it is with a feeling of gratitude to God that we present this report. Once again we are privileged to assemble for another youth conference to hear reports of the activities of the past year and to seek guidance to the new year we are now entering.

In the office of District Youth President, I have traveled 2,340 miles.

I attended the Youth Leaders Conference at Indianapolis, for a time of fellowship with our General youth officers, and other district presidents, where plans were made for the Youth Department of our church.

### **Zone Rallies**

This has been a wonderful year in attendance for our zone rallies. We have had a total of 30 zone rallies across the district. We have a total attendance for all zone rallies of 3,725. The following reveals the attendance in each zone: Covington Zone 1,096, Lexington Zone 650, Elizabethtown Zone 637, Olive Hill Zone 404, Louisville Zone 344, Western Zone 225, Mountain Zone 268 and Ashland 150.

### **New Zone**

This year the Western Zone voted to divide. We now have a new zone. This is called the Elizabethtown Zone. Mrs. H. H. Bolen-der was elected to serve as Chairman and has done a wonderful job. The zone has four churches and they are, Elizabethtown, Eastview, Kingswood and Cloverport.

### **Chartered Societies**

We have added three new chartered societies to our district. They are Lexington, Shepherdsville, and Winchester. This gives a total of eighteen chartered societies in the Kentucky Conference. The chartered societies are, Ashland First, Aspen Grove, Carlisle, Covington, Elizabethtown, Hopeful Heights, Frankfort, Junction City, Kingswood, Louisville First, Louisville Second, Owensboro, Pikeville, Wheelwright, and Shelbyville.

### **Youth News Contest**

For the first time this year we launched in the month of February a district-wide "Pilgrim Youth News Contest." The first prize was \$25.00, the second \$10.00, and the third \$5.00. The contest brought the largest number of subscriptions to our youth of Kentucky. The Lexington church won the first prize with 55 subscriptions. The Kingswood church won the second with 25 subscriptions and the Pikeville church the third with 19. The total subscriptions of all churches reporting were 146.

### **Youth Building**

The youth department purchased from the district the old dining room. We have divided it into three nice class rooms and a youth office. The building was used during the youth camp and proved to be a blessing. We are planning that one of the large class rooms will be used in a future day as a chapel during camp meeting.

### **Improvements on Camp Grounds**

There are two new improvements on our camp grounds that were sponsored by the youth. One is the flag pole. We had flag ceremonies every day during the youth camp. The second improvement is the three nice picnic tables. We offered a class for the older boys in Woodworking during youth camp. This class under the direction of Rev. Lon Helms made these tables.

### **Youth Camp**

One of the highlights of the year was our ninth annual Youth Camp. The registration reached the largest yet. We were privileged to have 210 youth in our camp. In addition to those registered, we had a fine corps of workers which brought the total attendance up to 257. We were blessed to have five speakers to speak each evening during the camp. They are Rev. Ralph Tromble, Rev. Lon Helms, Rev. Thomas Hanks, Rev. A. L. Sypolt, and Rev. Paul Ebright. The efforts of these men were crowned with youth seeking Christ. We added to our camp program some five new features which added a spiritual emphasis to our camp. Twenty-five churches were represented and a number of visitors. The attendance trophy went to the Elizabethtown church with 22 present or 77 points. The Covington church came in second with 27 present or 47 points. The Frankfort church third with 24 present or 46 points, and the Lexington church fourth with 21 present or 40 points.

### **Appreciation**

I would like to pause to express my appreciation. There have been many that have assisted me in the department. I appreciate my leader, Rev. Ralph Tromble, who has backed us in every way and has always been right here on the job for counsel and to help in many ways. To my vice president, Rev. Lon Helms, for the many hours he has given in preparation on the youth building. To the youth camp planning committee and all the teachers, supervisors, counsellors and all assistants that made youth camp possible.

### **Goals for the Future**

As we hear this report, we need to remind ourselves that the youth department is on the forward movement. To continue this progress we must make goals to work for to accomplish the challenge of our day.

1. We need to charter our youth societies.
2. We must encourage our youth to pray and be spiritual. In these days we are now living, our churches cry for youth that are giving their lives to God.
3. We must encourage our youth to subscribe to the Pilgrim Youth News.
4. We must take advantage of Youth Week.
5. We need your youth at the Youth Camp.
6. We need your cooperation in attending all zone rallies.
7. We need your financial support to continue to promote the youth of our church so that they may meet the challenge of the day.

### **Conclusion**

We are aware of new and perplexing problems in our work, but God, who has led us in battle to date, will lead on. We surely give God all the glory for what has been accomplished, and we look forward with faith and hope that he will give wisdom and guidance in the course of an expanding program for the future of Kentucky Pilgrim Youth. All in all, I have enjoyed and am happy for the privilege of sharing in the great work of Kingdom Building.

## **YOUTH CONFERENCE**

### **RESOLUTIONS**

1. Resolved: That the District Youth Conference be held on Wednesday morning before Conference.
2. Resolved: That each Zone have at least one Zone Rally per quarter. Each Zone Chairman shall report to the District President immediately following each Zone Youth Rally stating attendance, offering, special features, and other appropriate information. Be it further resolved: That we adopt the present zone system which is now in effect.
3. Resolved: That space be given in the Conference Minutes for a Youth Section, consisting of directory of officers, committees, resolutions, ways and means recommendations and minutes of Youth Conference.
4. Resolved: That we have a Youth Camp each year.
5. Resolved: That the District Youth Council have authority to set the time and arrange other details of the Youth Camp.
6. Resolved: That the District Youth Council appoint a Youth Camp Committee of three, who with the Youth President shall have authority to arrange the details of the Youth Camp.
7. Resolved: That the District Youth President be authorized to meet with the District Council to confer on any construction on the Camp ground relating to youth activities.
8. Be It Resolved: That each Zone Youth Leader visit each church in his zone for a youth rally at least once during the year, and that each church visited take an offering for his travel expense.
9. Be It Resolved: That all Youth Conference Committees for the new year shall be appointed by the Youth Executive Council and published in the Minutes.

### **RECOMMENDATIONS**

1. We recommend: That when the District Youth President conducts a Rally in the zone meetings, that an offering be taken in the service for his traveling expenses.
2. We recommend: That each church send \$1.00 per month for our district youth work, same to be sent to the District Treasurer and forwarded to the District Youth Treasurer.
3. We recommend: That in compliance with the action of the 1962 General Conference that each local youth society contribute an amount equal to 5% of their total receipts, for the operation of the Department of Sunday Schools and Youth. Said money is

to be sent to the District Youth Treasurer, who will forward same to the National Youth Office.

4. We recommend: That Zone Rally offerings be divided as follows: 25% for Youth Camp to be sent to the District Youth Treasurer; 25% for Sunday School Promotion to be sent to the District Treasurer; 50% to be used at the discretion of the Zone.
5. We recommend: That each local youth group send \$1.00 per month to the District Youth Treasurer for the Youth Building on the Camp ground.
6. We recommend: That any district youth officer traveling on official business, be paid the sum of 5¢ per mile, and \$1.00 per meal while traveling.


