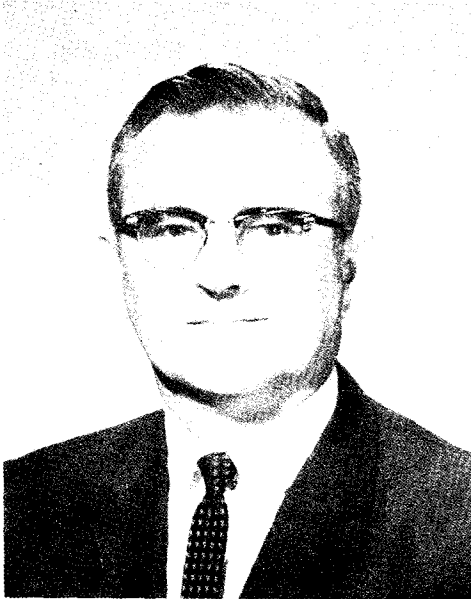

MINUTES OF THE CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

FIRST SITTING

The Fifty-Seventh Annual Conference of the Kentucky District, Pilgrim Holiness Church, convened August 8, 1966, 9:00 a.m. at the call of the District Superintendent, Rev. Paul Ebright. The congregation was led in singing, "Redeemed", by Rev. Lon Helms. Prayer was offered by Rev. Virgil Greene. The District Superintendent presented Dr. Melvin Snyder, General Superintendent of the Central Region, as presiding officer of the Conference.

He brought words of encouragement, emphasizing the goodness of God to His children. He spoke of the gracious presence of God at the International Conference just passed. The two main thrusts of the message from the Board of General Superintendents were emphasized.

First, the call for every pastor to deepen the spiritual life of his people. No program in itself can truly build the church. The only way to have a spiritual growth is to have a spiritual people. The pastor was asked to lead the way. The deeper spiritual life of the pastor will build a deeper spiritual life of the people.

Second, every church is asked to set a goal to search out a spiritual needy community and begin a branch Sunday School.

His message to the Conference was based on I Timothy 4:16.

He emphasized the fact that a man's first responsibility is to his own soul. He must save himself before he can save others.

To be saved has its relation to the past, as in our personal experience of saving grace. It has a present conotation as a present salvation. In its future conotation, there is a sense in which we are not yet saved completely, and will not be until Christ comes and calls us home to Heaven.

Our responsibility is to save ourselves.

By merit and power it is all God's Grace.

We can save ourselves by:

1. Meeting the conditions to receive this Salvation.
2. In doing all we can to retain this Salvation.

We are asking each pastor to deepen the spiritual life of the people by:

1. Spending more time with the Word with open minded study.
2. Leading into a deeper and significant prayer life.
3. Leading in having homes that are spiritual and where family worship is regular.
4. Leading in daily witnessing, each one of us to be a daily living witness in all our actions. The church will grow when we go out with that daily witness of the love of Christ. We will witness because, "The love of Christ constraineth us."

The Conference joined in singing, "I'll live for Him who died for me."

The Conference was called to order by the General Superintendent.

The roll call was called for and given by the Secretary.

The conference bar was cleared for business.

A motion was made that the time of the Conference shall be set as 9:00 - 11:45 a.m., 1:30 - 4:30 p.m., and 6:30 - 9:00 p.m., Carried.

The report of the District Superintendent was given by Rev. Paul Ebright.
A motion was made to receive it by a standing vote of appreciation. Motion Carried. The Conference stood in appreciation of the fine work done by the Superintendent, Rev. Paul Ebright, during his first year in office.

The report of the Assistant Superintendent was given by Rev. H. H. Barber.
A motion was made to receive the report. Carried.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

General Superintendent, Dr. Melvin Snyder; Ministers; Delegates to the Fifty-Seventh Annual Conference of the Kentucky District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church; and Friends - Greetings!

In the good providence of God, we are gathered at another annual conference. This means that we are one year closer to the coming of Christ, one year closer to the end of this world order as we know it, and one less year to work for God and the church for truly "the night cometh when no man can work." I would like to take this opportunity to testify to present saving, sanctifying and keeping grace.

One year ago, you handed to me a great responsibility. At the same time you presented to me some wonderful opportunities and privileges. It has indeed been a privilege to travel over this great state, visit every one of our churches, make many new friends, share your problems and victories, and enjoy the hospitality of your homes.

I am deeply in debt today. I owe a great debt of appreciation.

First, I thank God for His hand upon our lives as we have traveled the highways, and for His numerous other physical and spiritual blessings. Without Him, I never would have attempted this job.

Then I appreciate our Assistant Superintendent, Rev. H. H. Barber. While we were in the process of moving to Lexington, Brother and Sister Barber opened their home to us, and greatly helped in other ways. Brother Barber's counsel and assistance have been of great value to me, many times. I never called on him for help but what he graciously responded.

It has been a pleasure to work with the men of the District Council, both in routine matters and vital issues. Many hours have been spent in serious deliberations. Several times we have sat with bowed heads, silently praying as we earnestly sought the will of God. Unity has prevailed among us.

The various departments and committees have willingly cooperated and performed their jobs well, for which I am thankful.

One of the things that has impressed me the most has been the gracious way I have been received as I visited you. It has been my happy privilege to have my wife along to share these visits, and I thank you for the way you have received her. Our hearts were thrilled as you spoke such kind words, and assured us of your prayers and support. Your words have been a source of great encouragement.

There have been some victories this year. I have rejoiced with several who have written or spoken of good revivals, souls saved and sanctified, some who united with the church, and material accomplishments.

There have been some problems. We have taken them to heart and prayed about them.

I'm sure I have made some mistakes. For these I am sorry and ask for your charity and prayers.

There are several things about which I am concerned and these I call to your-attention.

High on the list stands our District Home Missions Program. Preachers, laymen, we must launch out. We cannot be content with just "holding our own", either on the local level or district level. If we don't succeed in establishing some strong new churches, as a district we are doomed. A few of our older churches are struggling between life and death, and if things continue as they are, some will die completely. Somebody will say, "Let us put some district finance into these works and revive them, instead of starting something new." Beloved, money will never save them! This is not pessimism, but rather an attempt to face the facts. Oh! for Jesus sake and the sake of our beloved District, let us back the Paducah project with our prayers and finance. We are planning to make a conservative beginning - with extensive, continuous visitation, endeavoring to get in homes with prayer meetings, until the time seems right to acquire a building and open a Sunday School and begin regular services. Our goal is that this may come to pass by Thanksgiving! It can be done! Will you pray and give to that end? You will be kept informed of the progress step by step. Paducah need only be the first one. There are other cities waiting, in addition to some cities that need 2nd and 3rd Pilgrim Holiness Churches. Let us ask God for a greater vision.

Another item of concern is the way our churches are meeting their District and General financial obligations. Pilgrims, when we joined and became a part of this church, we agreed to support every department! Some churches consistently back the entire program; others just as consistently back only a part of it, or none of it. In a few instances (a very few) there may be good reason. In most cases much, improvement can be made. There has been some improvement in the giving for district interests, for which we are most thankful.

I call to your attention, our official paper, The Pilgrim Holiness Advocate. I recently received a letter from Rev. Armor Peisker, editor of the paper, pointing out the low percentage of our subscriptions in relation to our District membership. It's hard to imagine any one who is a Pilgrim at heart not wanting to know what is going on. The best way to be informed is to take The Advocate. Let us as leaders do everything we can to increase the subscriptions from our District.

The shortage of pastors is of vital concern. There are several of our churches without pastors as yet. The reason for that shortage, I do not fully know. Is it an unwillingness, on the part of some who are called, to launch out in the work? Is it because too few are being called into the ministry? I know that some of these churches that are open are very small and the support is very, very small; but, I am persuaded that if it is God's will for a church to exist, that God has a man to fill that pulpit. Where is that man?

I would like to see a greater emphasis on Evangelism this year - especially Sunday night evangelism. I don't believe we have over emphasized the Sunday School and Sunday morning; but I do feel we have under emphasized the Sunday night service. Many of our Sunday Schools seem to have reached a stalemate. We have tried almost everything and nothing seems to work anymore. Why not put the emphasis on the Sunday night service. Make it alive! Make it evangelistic! We might be surprised how much our Sunday Schools would grow using this method.

Another thing that concerns me is this spirit of materialism that has gripped our nation. This same spirit has invaded our churches, affecting both laymen and preachers. The question used to be when facing great decisions: "What is best for the Kingdom of God? What is God's will for me?" Now the question seems to be: "How will it affect me? What am I going to get out of it?" Brethren, I still believe that God's promise to "supply all our needs," holds good, when we really seek first the Kingdom of God." This has proven to be true in my life, as it has in some of yours. Let's not allow ourselves to be drawn into this current of materialism that is everywhere around us.

Permit me to call attention to something that especially burdens me. When I first came to this District several years ago, and came on this camp ground, there is one outstanding thing I remember - there was a spirit of togetherness; everyone seemed a part of one big family. There were no little cliques. I still appreciate the good fellowship among us, but in recent years, there seems to be a tendency to form little societies under the banners of "radicals" and "liberals." Perhaps this has been done unconsciously; but it has left its mark and is still doing so. This condition will help neither group; rather, it will hinder us all. I am thinking of one young preacher who is not with us now. Our paths crossed several weeks ago, and in our conversation, he confessed to me. He said something like this: "Brother Ebright, I've ruined myself. I got in with the wrong crowd. We talked and criticized those who didn't share our particular views. One of the pastors was criticized and accused of compromising so much, that I began to shun him, although I hardly knew him. I would see him coming across the camp meeting grounds and would go out of my way to avoid meeting him. Since then, I have gotten to know that pastor and he's a fine man. I had the wrong spirit and I know it." Friends, this is the sort of thing that cliques lead to - misunderstandings and wrong spirits. The fault is not limited to one group. Either group can become wrong in spirit and practice. How can we be so hard on each other, as Christians? The world makes it hard enough on us, without us adding to one another's burdens. There should not be a "wrong" crowd; there should be only "one" crowd. That young preacher hasn't let down in any of his convictions; but he had realized he has to fellowship every one of his brethren, and keep a good spirit toward all. May we all realize this before it's too late!

Kentucky is a great district. It can be greater. This is our day. I'm glad I'm living today! I doubt that any age has afforded greater opportunities for Christian service and presented a greater challenge than this age.

The nation of Israel stood on the banks of the Red Sea. Mountains were on both sides; the enemy was behind them. It seemed there was no way out, but God said "go forward." They did, and they were victorious. It may seem like we're hemmed in on all sides as we look at circumstances, but I believe God is saying to the Kentucky District: "Go Forward!" Let us go forward in our local churches! Let us go forward as a District. Let us go into other towns and cities. You may be able to do this as an individual church, or as a group of churches. By all means let us do it as a District. May God grant that our vision will increase as we look upon the whitened harvest fields in Kentucky!

I am submitting some resolutions through the resolution committee that I trust you will prayerfully consider at the proper time in this conference.

May God bless every one of you.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

To the 1966 Annual Conference of the Kentucky District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church:

Greetings in the interest of Pilgrim Sunday Schools!

We submit the following report, not only as a review, but as a challenge for improvement.

I am sorry to report that only 24 churches reported 12 times, 7 churches reported 11 times, 4 churches reported 10 times.

This year we report to you an average monthly attendance of 2,549. Last year, 3,155.

The certificate for the highest numerical gain will go to the Ashland Fairview Church, Rev. Lon Helms, Pastor, with a gain of 28. Other churches with high numerical gains are Garvin Ridge with 20, Rev. Walter Duncan, Pastor; Rush with 20, Rev. Roy Barber, Pastor; Soldier church with 12, Rev. Roy Green, Pastor.

The Certificate for the highest percentage gain will go to the Livermore Church, Rev. Elliott Kuehne, Pastor, with a Percentage gain of 120%.

We present the following ribbons for Attendance Percentage gains to all churches who have has a 5% gain or more. Livermore, 120%; Lewisport, 50%; Ashland Fairview, 25%; Garvin Ridge, 25%; Rush, 15%; Lancaster, 15%; Greenup, 15%; Soldier, 10%; Hit-chins, 10%; Paris, 10%; Trace, 10%; Cynthiana, 5%; Eastview, 5%; Pleasureville, 5%.

Four churches participated in the standard excellence. Also four participated in the Decade of Progress, with the Ashland Fairview winning the award with 11,215 points. Covington had 8,675 points. Soldier had 7,240 points.

The following churches are to be awarded the District Sunday School award: Ashland Farview and Covington.

Early last year the Sunday School Board felt we should do something about getting a Sunday School message to the laymen of our churches. Men were chosen and sent to a number of our churches with the special emphasis on the subject - "Enlarging Our Outreach." We feel that many of our Sunday Schools were helped by this effort.

Thanks, to the men of the District that participated and brought messages that warmed our hearts. We have endeavored to promote the entire program of our District and General Church.

In conclusion, I express my appreciation to the Rev. Paul Ebright, and to the wonderful men on the Sunday School Board for their assistance and help in the efforts of Sunday School on the District.

To the many Pastors and laity who have been faithful in sending in reports, and cooperating with the Sunday School program, I express my appreciation.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

1. In as much as Miss Lela Newkirk has served the district camp faithfully as camp nurse for a period of 24 years and, as of this year, has retired from active service: Be it resolved that this Conference give her a standing vote of thanks for the many years of service.

2. In as much as this is the first camp and conference that Mrs. L. S. Houston has missed:

Be it resolved that a letter be sent from the Conference expressing our appreciation for the many years of service to the Kentucky District, and assuring her of our prayers.

3. Be it resolved that there be a Camp Meeting Board consisting of five members. The Dist. Treasurer shall serve on this Board, and one other Council member shall be appointed each year by the Council. The other three members shall be elected by the Conference on the one year revolving plan. The last one elected shall serve one year, the second shall serve for two years, and the first one elected shall serve three years. After the first election, they shall be elected for a three year term. This Board shall meet immediately after Conference and elect their officers. This Board shall have the supervision of all the physical operation of the Camp Meeting, excluding the calling of the workers and spiritual supervision of the camp.

4. Be it resolved that resolution #37 be changed to read--All who attend camp meeting must register. Work will be assigned as nearly equally as possible to all those working during the camp.

5. Be it resolved that we delete resolutions #41, #45, and #46.

6. Be it resolved that resolution #48 be changed to read: In order to provide facilities for visitors eating outside the dining room; Be it resolved that the Camp Meeting Board be responsible for the making and placing at least three tables on the camp ground by next year, 1967.

7. Be it resolved that resolution #44 be changed to read: All cabin owners shall equip their own cabins.

8. Be it resolved that we delete paragraph #1 from rules of the Camp.

9. Be it resolved that any pastor failing to get a call or recall on the first ballot, shall not be considered for that church in that specific conference year, without consent of the District Council.

10. Be it resolved that churches do not slate revivals during the Ministerial Institute or Camp and Conference.

11. The following to replace #42 on page 33.

Be it resolved that each church in the conference of less than 20 members give 2 days labor or \$10.00; 20 to 50 members, 4 days labor or \$20.00; above 50 members, 6 days labor or \$30.00, for help in camp ground maintenance or camp preparation. This call for help shall be issued by the District Council or Camp Board.

12. The following to replace #17 on page 30.

Be it resolved that a District Home Missions Board be formed, consisting of the District Superintendent as chairman, and one member appointed by the Council from the Council, plus two additional members elected by the Conference as follows: the first one elected shall serve for two years, the second one elected shall serve one year. Thereafter, each one elected shall be for a term of two years. The two members elected by the Conference shall be other than those on the District Council.

Their duties shall be as follows:

- a. To keep a constant lookout for new areas in which to locate new Pilgrim Holiness Churches.
- b. To have supervision of District Home Missions Projects, including location, financing, and placing of pastors, subject to approval by the District Council.
- c. To sponsor and promote an annual District Home Missions service in the camp meeting.
- d. To report annually to the District Conference.

13. In as much as the Manual does not state who determines the size of the local church board, simply stating, "The annual church meeting shall elect a Sunday School Superintendent, Church Treasurer, Church Secretary, and not more than five elders and five deacons or deaconesses." Be it resolved that the size of the church board be determined by conforming to the restrictions of the manual concerning the election of the board.

The church sending its pastor shall assume financial responsibility for its pulpit during the absent Sunday or Sundays. The District Superintendent shall serve as clearing agent for such revival.

In as much as our Pilgrim Holiness Church as a denomination, and no doubt each local church as well, came into existence as a result of evangelistic fervor, and in as much as future growth depends upon continued evangelistic fervor, and in as much as many churches seem to be losing this evangelistic fervor. Be it resolved that the year 1966-1967 be designated as "YEAR OF EVANGELISM". Be it further resolved that this YEAR OF EVANGELISM be implemented in the following ways:

- a. That evangelism be stressed in all departments of the church, namely, Sunday School, Youth, and Children's Work.
- b. That the Sunday night service receive greater emphasis, realizing that even the Sunday School can be built up in this manner.
- c. That evangelism be promoted through the Kentucky Pilgrim paper and every other possible way.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1. We further recommend that the amount be equal to \$1.00 per member. If it be found impossible to receive this amount on the above date, another date as near to this date as possible, is acceptable.

4. We recommend that all those who come in to work on the called work week be paid mileage at the rate of 3¢ per mile. Where possible those coming from one area shall group together. They shall stay the minimum of days as required by the Minutes.

5. We recommend that recommendation #17 on page 36 be changed to read \$2.00 instead of \$1.00.

RESOLUTIONS

District Superintendent

Council

Be it further resolved: That no pastor hold a revival away from his church within 30 days after a revival in his own church, nor more than two revivals during the Conference year, providing said church is supporting him.

28. Resolved: That any pastor who cannot be present for the Conference shall forward his pastor's report to the District Secretary to be read at the Conference.

29. Resolved: That each pastor send the obituary of deceased members of his church to the Chairman of the Memorials Committee immediately following the funeral.

30. Resolved: That each active pastor be given two weeks vacation with pay.

31. Resolved: That each minister submit his name, address, and telephone number to the District Secretary immediately upon arrival at his new address; the same to be included in the Ministerial Directory. Each minister shall notify the District Secretary of any changes occurring thereafter.

32. Resolved: That any pastor failing to get a call or recall on the first ballot, shall not be considered for that church in that specific conference year, without consent of the District Council.

Ministers

33. Resolved: That each minister support financially the church of which he is a member.

34. Resolved: That each minister attend the Camp and Conference in full or present a written explanation of non-attendance to the District Council

35. Resolved: That whereas ministers are interested in the welfare of other ministers and their families, and, whereas, there is a Ministerial Benefit Association established for the purpose of protecting the family of the deceased minister, we therefore recommend: That the local church assume payment of the assessment when called for

by the Association. Be it also resolved: That the District pay the assessment of the District Superintendent and all those under the jurisdiction of the District Home Missionary Committee.

36. Resolved: That no minister or church shall conduct a radio broadcast without permission of the District Council.

37. Resolved: That upon the death of a minister or his wife the Superintendent be notified, and that he notify the District Secretary, who in turn will notify the Zone Chairmen, and they are to notify the pastors in their zone by phone or card.

Conference

38. Resolved: That no one leave the Conference without permission.

49. Resolved: That all cabin owners furnish their own cabins.

50. Resolved: That whereas we have a large number of children on our Camp ground during Camp. Be it therefore resolved: That a fund be established to provide the necessary equipment for a supervised playground, using the offerings from the Children's services to apply on the equipment. Be it further resolved: That the District Council appoint a committee to take the necessary steps to provide said playground.

51. Resolved: That since it is so important that the Camp set the proper example and standards for others to follow, therefore, be it resolved: That the District Council see that all workers, such as speakers, singers, pianists, and musicians used in any service on the Camp meeting platform, be required to dress as "becometh holiness," including the wearing of hose and sleeves of below elbow length, and that the Secretary inform all workers when calling them of the standards that the Conference requires.

It is further recommended that this paper be devoted to information and promotion rather than a compilation of sermons.

59. Resolved: That the host church, with the District Superintendent, decide as to the mode of entertaining the Ministerial Institute.

60. Resolved: That the following point system be adopted as a standard for the judging of missionary displays from year to year:

- a. Clarity of theme - 10 points.
- b. Illustration of theme - 25 points.
- c. Quality - 25 points.
- d. Originality - 25 points.
- e. Neatness - 15 points.

Be it further resolved that no display be considered in judging if it has been previously displayed.

61. Resolved: Whereas, we feel that television is detrimental to deep spirituality and the teaching of the Pilgrim Holiness Church: Be it resolved that the Kentucky Conference go on record as opposed to members and ministers having television sets.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1. We recommend: That each Sunday School pay two dollars (\$2.00) per month into a Building Fund, for the purpose of construction or maintenance of buildings on the Camp Ground.

2. We recommend: That each church take a free will offering for the District Superintendent on all the visits, the same to be sent in by the local treasurer and applied on the Superintendent's traveling expense.

3. We recommend: That whereas, there is a pressing need for buildings to house our people, that each church or individual buying a lot be asked to build a cabin on said lot within three years, and if they fail to so do, to put the lot up for resale. Furthermore, we recommend: That those who purchased lots prior to this date be contacted by the District Superintendent urging them to build a cabin within two years or give the District the privilege of reselling their lot.

4. We recommend: That whereas our District Home Missions and Church Extension Loan Fund is being supervised by the District Council and they are placing all designated funds in this department, that the rate of interest be four percent (4%) on all loans.

5. We recommend: That each church pay the registration fee of their pastor and wife and church delegate to the District Conference; this amount to be raised by the District Superintendent at the annual meeting; and also an offering for their traveling expense.

6. We recommend: That the District Treasurer be paid two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) per year, and the District Secretary one hundred eighty dollars (\$180.00) per year; the same to be paid in equal monthly payments; and that the District Statistician be paid sixty dollars (\$60.00) per year.

7. We recommend: That each church have a monthly missionary service, at which time an offering shall be taken for World Missions.

8. We recommend: That each church send ten percent (10%) of their regular offerings to the District Treasurer, designated as District Budget. This does not include special offerings, such as building fund, evangelists, General Church obligations.

9. We recommend: That the District Superintendent's salary shall be set by the District Council.

10. We recommend: That any minister traveling under the direction of the District Superintendent, the Board or Committee of which he is a part, be paid seven cents (7¢) per mile traveling expense plus one dollar (\$1.00) per meal bought while in District work.

11. We recommend: That all those who come in to work on the called work week be paid at the rate of seven cents (7¢) per mile. Where possible those coming from one area shall group together. They shall stay the minimum of days as required by the Minutes.

12. We recommend: That the churches pay their pastor a salary at least equal to the average wages of the working people of the church, and that the matter of the pastor's salary be taken care of by the District Superintendent or his assistant at the time of the annual meeting.

13. We recommend: That in compliance with the action of the 1962 General Conference, our United Stewardship Fund be \$9.50 per member, to be divided as follows: Administration 38%; General Church Extension 30%; Liberal Arts College 22%; Sunday School and Youth 6%; Church Extension Loan Fund 2%; and Contingent Fund 2%. This amount is to be sent to the District Treasurer in a lump sum as United Stewardship Fund.

14. We recommend: That the District Budget shall be divided as follows: Zone Bible School 4%, General Conference Expense 3%, Sunday School Promotion 2%, and the balance placed in the Sinking Fund.

15. We recommend: That the District raise one thousand dollars (\$1,000,000) per year to assist on the Camp meeting; the same to be raised by each local church giving the sum equivalent to one dollar (\$1.00) per member, the sum to be sent to the District Treasurer.

16. We recommend: That each church take steps to raise their revival offering at least thirty days before the revival starts.

17. We recommend: That when a mission is organized into a church it shall not be asked to pay district budget for one year from the following Conference; and that the church shall pay fifty percent for the two following years.

18. We recommend: That each church send \$2.00 per month for our district youth work, same to be sent to the District Treas. and forwarded to the District Youth Treas.

19. We recommend: Whereas, the 1946 General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church adopted the Pension Plan to aid retired and disabled ministers, we recommend that we adopt this plan of financing it, namely: That each local church pay the equivalent of 80% of the evangelists tithe, who are members of said church; and that the church pay 8% of the pastor's salary. This is to be sent monthly to the District Treasurer. All members of the Pension Plan are to pay 2% of salary and offerings as reported to the conference.

Treasurer. All members of the Pension Plan are to pay 2% of salary and offerings as reported to the conference.

20. We recommend: That each Sunday School set aside one Sunday each month and 50% of said Sunday's offering be given for District Home Missions.

21. We recommend: That each Sunday School adopt the birthday offering plan, said offerings to go for District Home Missions.

22. We recommend: That in order to encourage our local churches to observe sound and acceptable business practices in the handling of local church funds, that therefore, be it resolved: That two local church board members, other than the treasurer, count and make a record of the offerings as received, and then immediately turn over to the local church treasurer these funds and their records for further check and bank deposit. Be it further resolved: That when the local church treasurer's reports are made to the local church, that the bank statements be made available and balance be shown to check with the treasurer's record.

23. We recommend: That each church give the minimum of five dollars (\$5.00) to support the District Ministerial Institute each year.

24. We recommend: That each church subscribe for the number of Kentucky Pilgrims they desire per month and that they pay 7¢ per copy for the same.

25. We recommend: Whereas, the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized the Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc., to make loans of Pension Funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches under such conditions as required active participation on the part of the Pilgrim Holiness District. Therefore, be it resolved by the Annual Conference of this district that the District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials be, and they are hereby authorizing, to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness churches of this district, subject, however, to limitations and conditions set out in said Resolutions of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loan.

26. We recommend: That due to the heavy financial burden at camp time, an organization shall be formed called the Kentucky Pilgrim Camp Association. The purpose of the association shall be to relieve that financial burden. Each member of said organization would contribute the sum of 50 cents per month for 10 months, with the total amount to be sent to the District Treasurer on or before June 30.

27. We recommend: That, whereas World Missions has been withdrawn from the United Stewardship Fund, making their only support to come from free will offerings, our camp permit pledges to be taken at the annual camp World Missions service.

28. We recommend: That the last Sunday in August be designated as "Camp Fund Sunday." A special offering to be raised by each local church and sent to the District Treasurer to be applied on the camp building debt. We further recommend: That the amount be equal to \$1.00 per member. If it be found impossible to receive this amount on the above date, another date as near to this date as possible, is acceptable.

29. We recommend: That each local Missionary Society pay the sum of fifty cents (50¢) per month, to be used for miscellaneous expenses of the District Missionary Society. It shall be known as the Missionary Society Expense Fund. Said money is to be sent directly to the District Missionary Treasurer.

RULES GOVERNING SALE OF LOTS AND BUILDING COTTAGES

Price of lots, \$20.00 each. Terms: \$5.00 down payment when purchased, balance to be paid in monthly payments of \$3.00 each. Six per cent on unpaid balance at maturity. All lots are to be paid for in six months or contract is void.

All outside lots in the old plot shall be of this dimension, 20 feet in width and 30 feet in length. Inside lots shall be 20x20. All lots in the new plot shall be 20x30 feet. All cottages are to be uniform in size and placements on lots in accordance with the row or street on which they may be placed. The dimensions of the cottages are to be 10x12 feet, with an 8-foot eave, six concrete piers, one door and two windows, a screen door, and either a metal or asphalt roof. The building is to be made of dressed lumber, either boxed or framed, and to have two coats of white paint. An extension of nine feet may be built on any of the cabins on an outside lot of the old plot, such additions, to be of the same dimensions as that of the cabin with a window on each side. A porch may be built on the front of any and all cottages. Cabins on the new plot may be either single or double.

The District Council holds the right to paint or repair in any way necessary, unless the owner does the work himself, and the owner is to pay the expense of same. Aluminum paint only is to be used on the metal roof. The District Council is to keep all buildings insured and the owner of each cottage is to pay his part of the premium.

RATES FOR THE CAMP

Registration fees: \$5.00 and work assigned; \$10.00 and no work assigned. This rate is to include all persons over 12 years of age. Those from 6 through 12 years will be registered for \$2.50 and those under 6 will be registered free. All meals will be fifty cents.

A flat rate of \$1.00 shall be charged for electricity used in cabins and house trailers on the ground, the same to be paid by those using said trailers and cabins when registering.

Registration shall begin at noon Friday.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

To our beloved and esteemed District Superintendent, Rev. Paul Ebright, pastors, youth presidents, and delegates of this annual youth conference of the Kentucky District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, greetings in the name of our wonderful Lord and Savior.

I consider it a real joy and pleasure to be honored with this opportunity, as your District Youth President, to present the youth department progress of this past year. Also, to share with you some of the burdens of my heart for youth. For the last three years, I have served my church in this capacity. The victories of the yesterdays are forever past, they are history and soon will be forgotten. New plans and goals must be set today that we may take hold of the challenges that face us as a church in the tomorrow.

As this meeting moves along, there will come through the agenda proposals for decisive changes and positive expansion. These will call for your thoughtful and prayerful consideration. As we proceed, I hope the meeting will be lifted out of flatness and sluggishness to heights of holy vision and enthusiasm, that the Spirit will lay hold upon this conference, calling us to renewal in holy endeavors.

Statistics are revealing facts that we wish we could close our eyes and not believe. While we are here to try to find a solution to our problems, some 4,500 boys and girls between the ages of 12-17 will take up the smoking habit. This is a grand total of 1,642,500 precious youth that may miss heaven, in one years time. In the religious world we are losing 51% of our girls and 49% of our boys. Seven out of eight teen-agers between the ages of 13-18 drop out of church and Sunday School.

PERSONAL REPORT

In the office of District Youth President of this Kentucky Conference, I have traveled 3,440 miles.

In addition, I have attended two camp meeting planning committees as youth consultant, have made two trips to the camp grounds in interest of the recreational area, attended five zone rallies, made a trip to Lexington to present the goals of the youth department to the district council, presided over two youth council meetings, served as director of the Senior Youth Camp, assisted Rev. Lon Helms in the Junior Youth Camp, served as evangelist in the Junior Camp. I have given the department 1,272 hours or 53 days this year. Promotional work has been done through many pieces of mail.

ZONE ATTENDANCE

The zone attendance hasn't been up to our goal. We are appreciative for the good work many of our zones have done. We appreciate how each zone contributed toward the youth project of making the recreational area possible.

RECREATIONAL AREA

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS AND WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEES

1. Inasmuch as there is a need of uniformity as to the number of zone rallies held each year, therefore, be it resolved that the minimum number of rallies per zone be set at four per year.

2. Resolved: The first ten rows of the tabernacle and the platform area shall constitute the conference bar. The hours for conference sittings shall be from 9 a.m. to 11:45 a.m. and 1:15 p.m. until finished.

3. Whereas the District Council presents three or more names per zone for the election of Zone Chairman at the Youth Conference, and whereas the District Youth President is in close touch with the zones; therefore, be it resolved that we request the District Youth President be allowed to meet with the District Council when making these nominations.

4. Inasmuch as there has been a lack of uniformity in the composition of the Zone Rallies; therefore, be it resolved that all of the eight zones have the same point system in awarding the zone banner. The following points will determine the winner of a zone banner:

1. One zone attendance banner in each zone.
2. One point per church per mile to rally (mileage as set by AAA).
3. Three points per person under 35 attending the zone rally.
4. One point per person over 35.
5. Host church entitled the liberty of winning the banner if they have 51% of the attendance.

5. DUTIES OF ZONE OFFICERS

The duties of the zone officers shall be as listed below:

CHAIRMAN

1. Meet with zone committee and plan dates in advance for zone rallies.
2. Send dates of zone rallies to the District Youth President and to all pastors in the zone.
3. Plan and promote all zone rallies.
4. Preside at all zone rallies.
5. Give attention to financial matters of the zone.
6. Serve on the district youth council.
7. Cooperate in promoting the district and national youth program.
8. Keep an up-to-date mailing list of all local officers in the zone.
9. Give a report to the annual district youth conference.

VICE CHAIRMAN

1. Shall cooperate with and assist the chairman as requested by the chairman.
2. Serve on the zone committee.

SECRETARY

1. Keep minutes of all zone committee meetings.
2. Help the zone chairman with zone correspondence.
3. Keep an up-to-date mailing list of all local officers in the zone.
4. Report each zone rally to the District Youth President as soon as possible after each rally.

TREASURER

1. Receive and disburse funds as directed by the zone committee.
2. Keep accurate records of receipts and disbursements and bank all monies immediately upon receiving.
3. Serve on zone committee.

6. The officers of the zone shall be Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary, and Treasurer. Each one must be a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

7. Be it resolved that the Zone Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary, and Treasurer and the Zone Pastors constitute a zone planning committee. They shall plan the programs, set the dates, and choose the places of the zone meetings. They shall raise funds in the zone meetings and disburse the same.

8. Resolved that all zone chairmen prepare a report of the activities and finances of the zone to be read at the Youth Conference by the zone Chairman, or Vice Chairman, or by another, if these cannot be present. The same report shall be inserted into the District Youth Minutes.

9. Resolved that officers to be elected by the zone must be elected within sixty days after youth conference. The District Youth President, or his appointee, shall preside at this meeting.

10. Resolved that each church send a delegation of at least one or more young people to represent said church to each zone rally, regardless of Revival or other special meeting going on in their church at the time of Rally.

11. Resolved that a copy of all resolutions be placed in the hands of the zone chairmen within thirty days after Youth Conference.

12. We recommend that recommendation #17 page 36 be changed to read \$2.00 instead of \$1.00.

YOUTH CONFERENCE STANDING RESOLUTIONS

1. Resolved: That the District Youth Conference shall be held during our District Camp. The time to be set by the executive officers of the Youth Council.

2. Resolved: The first ten rows of the tabernacle and the platform area shall constitute the conference bar. The hours for conference sittings shall be from 9 a.m. to 11:45 a.m. and 1:15 p.m. until finished.

3. RECOMMENDATIONS

2. We recommend: That each church send \$2.00 per month for our district youth work, same to be sent to the District Treasurer and forwarded to the District Youth Treasurer.

3. We recommend: That in compliance with the action of the 1962 General Conference that each local youth society contribute an amount equal to 5% of their total receipts, for the operation of the Department of Sunday Schools and Youth. Said money is to be sent to the District Youth Treasurer, who will forward same to the National Youth Office.

4. We recommend: That Zone Rally offerings be divided as follows: 25% for Youth Camp to be sent to the District Youth Treasurer; 25% for Sunday School Promotion to be sent to the District Treasurer; 50% to be used at the discretion of the Zone.

5. We recommend: That each local youth group send \$1.00 per month to the District Youth Treasurer for the Youth Building on the Camp ground.

6. We recommend: That any district youth officer traveling on official business, be paid the sum of 5¢ per mile and meals while traveling.
