DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

General Superintendent Snyder, fellow ministers of the Kentucky District, delegates to the 1967 District Conference, and friends - greetings in the Name of the Lord. I'm sure we all recognize that it is the good providence of God that we are permitted to assemble once again.

This year we have attempted to take some steps forward, we have suffered some disappointments, and we continue to be handicapped by some faults.

The launching of the work in Paducah has been a major endeavor. Here we have had mingled success and disappointment. The details will not be given here since they will be included in the forthcoming report from the District Home Missions Board.

The "District Prayer Vigil", a program of organized prayer was presented to you several weeks ago. This was presented because the need is so evident, and after sincerely seeking God's will for a plan. It is extremely simple - simply assigning each church a special day of prayer from one period to another. The method of promoting this day of prayer is left to each pastor and church, although some suggestions were given. The "prayer vigil" is working where it is conscientiously promoted. Some churches are giving it special attention and it has paid dividends for them. I have several letters in my files to this effect. Permit this one excerpt from the latest letter: "The last district day of prayer was a real blessing. We had an extra prayer meeting. Some came who generally were not attending. Had prayer around the altar. They prayed for the district needs. Everyone led, one at a time. Hearts were melted, etc." Pastors, I hope for your sake and the sake of your church and our district that if you have not been participating, you will begin right away. Posters are being sent out for your bulletin board. Laymen, if you don't see the posters and your church has not been participating, ask your pastor about it. He may have forgotten!

A United Pilgrim Holiness - Wesleyan Methodist Ministerial Institute was conducted in April of this year. This historical occasion was characterized throughout by a good spirit and blessed of the Lord. All the comments I have heard regarding this Institute have been favorable. In view of the inevitable, eventual merging of our two districts, I feel a continuation of a United Institute is a "must" because it will be practical and profitable as we approach the time of final union, and I sincerely believe it will be pleasing to the Lord. I hope you will strengthen our hand in this matter by giving us Conference legislation to continue such Institutes.

The Area Leaders Conference held at Indianapolis, under the direction of General Superintendent Snyder, was indeed a highlight. Rev. B. F. Durham and I were privileged to attend this gathering. The theme was: "The Time Is Now!" There were three thoughts in relation to this theme: 1. The Time is Now to Develop a District Program for Renewal; 2. The Time is Now to Develop a District Program of Deeper Loyalty; and 3. The Time is Now to Develop a District Program for Effective Outreach. "Renewal, Loyalty, Outreach," - these surely sum up the needs of our District.

<u>First, Renewal</u>. Renewed study of the Word of God, renewed prayer life, and a renewed emphasis on witnessing. This is basic; this is the foundation; this is the starting point if we expect to go forward. May I remind you, this is a personal matter. The superintendent and preachers of this district are going to have to experience personal renewal, (a deeper spirituality), before we can expect our people to be renewed.

Second, Loyalty. This is one of our great lacks - lack of loyalty. Here again, we as preachers must take the lead. We need a marked increase in loyalty - loyalty to the

Ministerial Institutes, loyalty to "work week", loyalty to Camp Meeting, loyalty to District Conference, loyalty to the entire program of the district - the spiritual program, the financial program, The Sunday School program, the youth program - ALL of it. This matter of loyalty is a relative thing. I cannot expect you pastors to be loyal to me if I am not loyal to my responsibilities. Neither can you pastors expect your local people to be loyal to your church services, or loyal to the program that you present to them, if you are not loyal to the district. And if you are not loyal, don't be surprised if they are not loyal. Example means a lot more than a sermon.

Third, Outreach. Here permit me to give just a few statistics. In checking back over our district minutes I found some startling facts. Sixteen years ago, we had 51 churches and missions; Last year's minutes lists 49. Sixteen years ago the average Sunday School attendance was 2759; last year's minutes shows an average of 2949. Sixteen years ago we had 1282 members; last year's minutes lists 1265 members! Do you realize the significance of these figures? Taking in consideration the tremendous rate of population increase over the past sixteen years, we have not even been "holding our own!" We have lost ground! A more effective outreach is our only hope if we are to survive. We will have to launch out in branch Sunday Schools and prayer meetings in other communities, towns and cities. Before this is done we're going to have to experience "renewal". Renewal will result in greater "loyalty". Renewal and loyalty together will result in a greater "outreach".

Words of appreciation are in order regarding our retiring District Youth Society President, Rev. W. H. Richardson. After five years as District Youth President, he has felt led to step out of this position. I have appreciated working with Brother Richardson and I'm sure we all appreciate the excellent work he has done while in this office. The Youth Society is a major part of our district and he has certainly given it effective leadership. No one knows the time, effort, problems, and heartaches, as well as joys, that go with this office, except those who have held this office. Thank you, Brother Richardson, for a job well done!

I do not wish to be overly sentimental, but I would remind you that this will be the last Kentucky District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church! If Jesus tarries, we will have other conferences but not as Pilgrims! In the light of this fact, God grant that this conference will go down in our church history as one that was characterized by: A realistic facing of facts, consecration in an hour of crisis, brotherly love in a time of differences, vision of the needs and possibilities, enthusiastic planning for the future, and mature thinking and attitudes and actions, in the raidst of sentimentalism. This time of transition need not mean stalemate. Stalemate will be caused by only one thing - our attitude. It's up to us! Let's pray earnestly for revival this year. The new church can go forward to victory.

I have appreciated the wonderful privilege of working with our Assistant District Superintendent, Rev. H. H. Barber, the other men on the Council, the various Committees, and each one of you. I want to personally thank God for His many blessings to us this past year - protection in hours of danger, the solutions to some problems, strength in times of weakness and His leadership in general.

I want to personally thank each of you for your prayers. A letter came dated just a few days ago saying: "We have had a special urge to pray for you and Sister Ebright." Friends, the prayers of God's people mean more than anything else.

Thanks for all your kind courtesies to Mrs. Ebright and me. We appreciate you more than words can tell.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

Greetings to you in behalf of Kentucky Pilgrim Sunday Schools.

This year we report an average attendance of 2911. Last year the attendance was 2,549.

I have appreciated the co-operation of the pastors in reporting each month. Several months we had 100% reporting. Thirty-one pastors reported every month, four reported eleven times and four others ten times.

The award for the highest numerical gain goes to Cloverport with a gain of 35. This includes their branch SundaySchool at Glen Dean. Other churches with high gains are Pikeville with 20, Carrollton with 16, Shelbyville with 14, and Falmouth and Rush with a gain of 11.

The award for the highest percentage gain will go to Newport with a gain of 46%. Cloverport follows with 37%, Pikeville 33%, Shelbyville 26%, Morgantown 25%, Livermore 25%, Falmouth 15% Hitchins 15%, Rush 13%, Olive Hill 12%, Greenup 8%.

The Decade of Progress award goes to the Ashland, Fairview Church. Rev. Lon Helms is the pastor.

Elizabethtown won 3rd place in the second division of the March To Sunday School In March Contest .

During the year Sunday School clinics were conducted at Owensboro, Elizabethtown, Ashland I, Lexington, and Hopeful Heights. Those who attended these clinics found them to be very helpful.

REPORT OF DISTRICT HOME MISSION BOARD

Greetings to the members of the 1967 District Conference of the Kentucky District Pilgrim Holiness Church. The following is a report of the activities of the District Home Missions Board and Home Missions work for the past year.

On September 24, 1966, Rev. A. L. Sypolt and I made a trip to Paducah to look at a six room frame house that was called to our attention by Brother Abernathy. The other two members of the board could not go because of other engagements.

On October 18, I made another trip and we purchased the property at 2728 Ohio Street, for the sum of \$5500.00, with \$3000.00 down and the balance to be paid in two years. On the same date, we met in the lobby of the Central Baptist Hospital and organized the Wesleyan Mission of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, with three members.

After some remodeling, the first service was held on November 13.

A revival was conducted November 27-December 11. I spent two days there during that time, preached over the radio once and twice at the Mission. On January 14, 1967, the District Home Missions Board met at Owensboro to lay some plans for the work.

On Easter Sunday, March 26, I was also at Paducah and preached twice.

June 11-25 of this year, a revival and V.B.S. was conducted. My wife and Sister Vincent assisted in this endeavor. There was an average attendance of 24, not counting workers.

The board has met during this camp and laid further plans for the continuation of the work, but that will be included in next year's report.

We request your earnest prayers and financial support for the work at Paducah.

MEMOIRS COMMITTEE REPORT

"DEAD? Oh, no! Just borne beyond the shadows into the pure, clear light; Forever done with pain and cloud and sorrow, where all is calm and bright. Oh NO, not dead; But past all fear of dying, and with all suffering o'er; THEY ARE NOT DEAD, but with Christ, to LIVE FOREVERMORE."

Rev. George Wellman departed this life Feb. 10, 1967, at the age of 86. Brother Wellman was a faithful member of the Louisville First Church, an ordained minister and a charter member of the Pilgrim Holiness denomination. His home going was keen-

ly felt by his church, who looked to him as an earthly spiritual father. He is greatly missed by his family and a multitude of friends, by whom he was deeply loved and respected. He was a faithful stéward, liberally supporting the church in every department.

William Carey Miller, born December 25, 1888, departed this life February 16, 1967, at the age of 78. He was converted in 1916 in the mountains of Pike County, Kentucky.  Be it resolved: That resolution number 28 on page 32 be deleted. (This is no longer required by Manual)

7. Be it resolved: That in resolution number 8 on page 30, the words: "prayer meeting" be deleted.

8. Be it resolved: That in resolution number 35 on page 32, in the part that begins; "That the local church....," be made to read as follows: "That the local church assume payment of the assessment for pastor and wife, when called for, by the Association."

9. Be it resolved: That in resolution number 16 on page 31, the words: "within 30 days following conference," be replaced with the words, "by September 30."

10. In as much that there is no uniform time to stop countingSunday Schoolattendance,

Be it resolved: That the half way point in the Sunday School session be the deadline for counting attendance.

11. In as much that the first United Pilgrim Holiness-Wesleyan Methodist Ministerial Institute was characterized by a good spirit and blessed of the Lord.

And in as much that eventually the two districts will be merged.

And in as much that a United Institute will be practical and profitable as we approach the time of final union.

Therefore, Be it resolved: That we continue to have United Ministerial Institutes, unless unforeseen circumstances arise, and that the District Council negotiate the date, place and program for such Institutes.

12. Be it resolved: That permission to locate a trailer on the camp ground during camp meeting, shall be obtained from the Camp Meeting Board.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1. Due to the remaining debt on the dining room,

We recommend: That Recommendation #28, Page 37, be changed as follows: The words "Camp Fund Sunday" be changed to read, "Dining Room Sunday", and the words "Camp Building Debt" be changed to read "Dining Room Debt."

2. Whereas the pastor's attendance at the Ministerial Institute benefits the church as much as the pastor:

We recommend: That each church pay it's pastor's travel expense to the Institute at the rate of 7 cents per mile, and \$1.00 per meal.

3. We recommend: That number 22, page 37 be deleted from the minutes.

4. We are requested, for the sake of emphasis to read recommendation #3, Page 35.

5. We recommend: That the local church pay 50% of their pastor's Social Security. We further recommend that the District pay 50% of the District Superintendent's Social Security.

RESOLUTIONS

District Superintendent

1. Resolved: That the District Superintendent make two trips over the District during the year, and to give more time to the smaller churches as needed.

Council

2. Resolved: That the Conference delegate authority to the Council to construct buildings for the District, appointing and directing a committee to carry out its plan, to make rules and by-laws regulating the sale of lots, the building of cottages, and to govern the Camp grounds; the same to be printed in the Minutes.

3. In as much that the first United Pilgrim Holiness - Wesleyan Methodist Ministerial Institute was characterized by a good spirit and blessed of the Lord.

And in as much that eventually the two districts will be merged.

And in as much that a United Institute will be practical and profitable as we app-

roach the time of final union.

Therefore, Be it resolved: That we continue to have United Ministerial Institutes, unless unforeseen circumstances arise, and that the District Council negotiate the date, place and program for such Institutes.

4. Resolved: That the District Council be given power to rezone the churches of the District when necessary.

Churches

5. Resolved: That each church close their books on the last day of each month, and the monthly budgets be sent to the District Treasurer immediately. Be it also resolved: That the District Treasurer's books be closed for the year, at noon, on the 10th day of July.

6. Resolved: That each church, minister, and deaconess mail a copy of its annual report to the District Statistician by the 15th of July each year, and

Be it further resolved: That persons failing to comply with this ruling be reported to the District Council and Examining Committee.

7. Resolved: That whereas many of our pastors do not receive sufficient financial support, Be it resolved: That each local church appoint one night each month as "do-nation night" at which time food and provisions shall be brought together for the pastor.

Be it also resolved: That the District Superintendent shall appoint "an agitator" at the annual business meeting, whose duty it is to announce donation night in advance.

8. Resolved: That since it is a matter of great importance for the pastors of the District to attend the Camp and Conference, Be it resolved: That the pastor's support at the church where he is assigned as pastor shall continue over the two Sundays he attends Camp and Conference and the first Sunday following.

9. Resolved: That pastors and church boards urge the calling of evangelists for our revivals from among our own Pilgrim ministers, and that the District Superintendent be consulted before we call other ministers.

10. Resolved: That churches do not slate revivals during the Ministerial Institute or Camp and Conference.

11. In as much as the Manual does not state who determines the size of the local church board, simply stating, "The annual church meeting shall elect a Sunday School Superintendent, Church Treasurer, Church Secretary, and not more than five elders and five deacons or deaconesses." Be it resolved that the size of the church board be determined by conforming to the restrictions of the Manual concerning the election of the board.

12. Resolved: That the pastors of churches paying full support be asked to hold a revival of at least a week in length for smaller churches of the district, if requested to do so. The church benefiting by said revival is to do its best financially for the pastor holding the revival. The church sending its pastor shall assume financial responsibility for its pulpit during the absent Sunday or Sundays. The District Superintendent shall serve as clearing agent for such revival.

13. Realizing that these are the last days and our time is short to build the Kingdom of God, and

In as much that a new church is in the making, and we need to unite in strength, and

Confessing our definite shortcomings in some areas, therefore, Be it further resolved: That our District adopt the theme "THE TIME IS NOW" as our motto for the year 1967-68.

In as much as objectives, plans, and goals are necessary in order to carry out the program of the district, and these must be in the hands of the pastors early in the year in order for the program to be effective therefore: Be it resolved that objectives, plans, and goals of all district departments (Sunday School, Youth, District Home Missions, and the District Missionary Society), be in the hands of all ministers by September 30.

Sunday School

15. Resolved: That the Tuesday morning service of the District Ministerial Convention shall be under the direction of the Sunday School Department for a Sunday School Institute.

16. In as much that there is no uniform time to stop counting Sunday School attendance, Be it resolved: That the half way point in the Sunday School session be the deadline for counting attendance.

17. Resolved: That each Sunday School be given credit for the number of scholars from their church attending Sunday School at our camp.

18. Resolved: That the annual report of the Sunday School average attendance be figured on the basis of the 50 highest Sundays as set in the Sunday School Standard of Excellence, #4D.

19. Resolved: That the Promotional Secretary shall make a tour of the District in the fall months, presenting the plans and program of the District Sunday School Board and those of the General Sunday School Department. Be it further resolved: That a time shall be given during camp meeting, when detailed study can be given for teachers and workers for the betterment of our local Sunday Schools. This is not to be at the time of any of the main services.

District Home Missions

20. Resolved: That a District Home Missions Board be formed, consisting of the District Superintendent as chairman, and one member appointed by the Council from the Council, plus two additional members elected by the Conference as follows: The first one elected shall serve for two years, the second one elected shall serve one year. Thereafter, each one elected shall be for a term of two years. The two members elected by the Conference shall be other than those on the District Council.

Their duties shall be as follows:

- a. To keep a constant lookout for new areas in which to locate new Pilgrim Holiness Churches.
- b. To have supervision of District Home Missions Projects including location,

financing, and placing of pastors for a minimum of the first five years and said details to be subject to approval by the District Council.

- c. To sponsor and promote an annual District Home Missions service in the camp meeting.
- d. To report annually to the District Conference.

Be it further resolved: That district ministers be urged to give a week or two of revival, or other effort, on a District Home Missions Project, if called upon by the District Superintendent or District Home Missions Board.

Credentials

21. Resolved: That all persons applying for license appear in person before the Examining Board, unless the applicant is sick or otherwise unable to appear; in which case some member of the Conference is to certify as to his or her character and location.

Pastor

22. Resolved: That each pastor read all resolutions of this Conference to his congregation at the earliest possible date.

23. Resolved: That each pastor make a special effort to place a current Manual in the home of each member of the church.

24. Resolved: That each pastor list in a book the name and address of each Advocate Subscriber, with the expiration date; said book is to be transferred to his successor, and that each pastor endeavor to keep a subscription list equal to his membership.

25. Resolved: That no pastor hold revivals off his charge without making satisfactory arrangements with his church. Be it further resolved: That no pastor hold a revival away from his church within 30 days after a revival in his own church, nor more than two revivals during the Conference year, providing said church is supporting him.

26. Resolved: That each pastor send the obituary of deceased members of his church to the Chairman of the Memorials Committee immediately following the funeral.

27. Resolved: That each active pastor be given two weeks vacation with pay.

Be it further resolved, if the pastor does not take a vacation, he be paid one or two weeks extra salary, as the case may be.

28. Resolved: That each minister submit his name, address, and telephone number to the District Secretary immediately upon arrival at his new address; the same to be included in the Ministerial Directory. Each minister shall notify the District Secretary of any changes occurring thereafter.

29. Resolved: That any pastor failing to get a call or recall on the first ballot, shall not be considered for that church in that specific conference year, without consent of the District Council.

Ministers

30. Resolved: That each minister support financially the church of which he is a member.

31. Resolved: That each minister attend the Camp and Conference in full or present a written explanation of non-attendance to the District Council.

32. Resolved: That whereas ministers are interested in the welfare of other ministers and their families, and, whereas, there is a Ministerial Benefit Association established for the purpose of protecting the family of the deceased minister, we therefore recommend: That the local church assume payment of the assessment for pastor and wife when called for by the Association. Be it also resolved: That the District pay the assessment of the District Superintendent and all those under the jurisdiction of the District Home Missionary Committee.

33. Resolved: That no minister or church shall conduct a radio broadcast without permission of the District Council.

34. Resolved: That upon the death of a minister or his wife the Superintendent be notified, and that he notify the District Secretary, who in turn will notify the Zone Chairmen, and they are to notify the pastors in their zone by phone or card.

Conference

35. Resolved: That no one leave the Conference without permission.

36. Resolved: That no church send a delegate to Conference who will not agree to stay throughout the entire Conference. See Manual, Sec. 82, Paragraph 2.

37. Resolved: That our churches send qualified delegates, who know the problems of the church and district.

38. Resolved: Whereas much valuable time is sometimes taken by resolutions which may not deserve much time, and whereas, the Resolutions Committee often feels reluctant to ignore any resolution even if it seems of small importance: Be it therefore resolved: That this Conference invest the Resolutions Committee with the power to reject any resolution that is not written out and signed by the person who offers it for consideration to the committee and, or, Conference.

39. Be it resolved: That all resolutions must be in the hands of the Resolutions Committee at least three days before the District Conference.

Camp

40. Resolved: That our Camp shall begin on the last Friday before the last Sunday in July.

41. Resolved: That there be a Camp Meeting Board consisting of five members. The District Treasurer shall serve on this Board, and one other Council member shall be appointed each year by the Council. The other three members shall be elected by the Conference on the one year revolving plan. The last one elected shall serve one year, the second shall serve two years, and the first one elected shall serve three years. After the first election they shall be elected for a three year term. This Board shall meet immediately after Conference and elect their officers. This Board shall have the supervision of all the physical operation of the Camp Meeting, excluding the calling of the workers and spiritual supervision of the camp.

42. Resolved: That all who attend camp meeting must register. Work will be assigned as nearly equally as possible to all those working during the camp.

43. Resolved: That the District Superintendent, his wife, and the Camp nurse, be registered free for the Camp and Conference. Be it further resolved, that the District Superintendent, his wife, the nurse, and the called workers for the Camp and Conference be entertained free at the lunch stand.

44. Resolved: That we give space in the book room for a table and someone to take subscriptions to the Advocate, Pilgrim Youth News, and the Missionary Bulletin.

45. Resolved: That each church in the conference of less than 20 members give 2 days labor or \$10.00; 20 to 50 members, 4 days labor or \$20.00; above 50 members, 6 days labor or \$30.00, for help in camp ground maintenance or camp preparation. This call for help shall be issued by the District Council or Camp Board.

46. Be it resolved: That permission to locate a trailer on the camp ground during camp meeting shall be obtained from the Camp Meeting Board, and steps be taken immediately to provide a trailer park.

47. Resolved: That all cabin owners furnish their own cabins.

48. Resolved: That whereas we have a large number of children on our Camp ground during Camp. Be it therefore resolved: That a fund be established to provide the necessary equipment for a supervised playground, using the offerings from the Children's services to apply on the equipment. Be it further resolved: That the District Council appoint a committee to take the necessary steps to provide said playground.

49. Resolved: That since it is so important that the Camp set the proper example and standards for others to follow, therefore, be it resolved: That the District Council see that all workers, such as speakers, singers, pianists, and musicians used in any service on the Camp meeting platform, be required to dress as "becometh holiness," including the wearing of hose and sleeves of below elbow length, and that the Secretary inform all workers when calling them of the standards that the Conference requires.

50. Resolved: That the District Council appoint someone each year to be in charge of each of the prayer rooms and to arrange for prayer groups and other special prayer effort all through the Camp.

51. Whereas: There is a pressing need for many items for the continuing operation of the Camp: Be it resolved: That we ask the District Council to appoint a Chairman and a three member committee to organize, list, and assign the needed items to the various churches. This is to be known as the Ladies Camp Meeting Auxiliary.

Miscellaneous

52. Resolved: That the following District officers shall serve as Trustees of the Kentucky District, viz. - The District Superintendent, District Secretary, and District Treasurer.

53. Resolved: That no one person serve on more than one committee where competent persons are available.

54. Resolved: That each church plan for a Daily Vacation Bible School.

55. Resolved: That resolutions which are of a temporary nature shall become void upon their completion and shall automatically be deleted from our Minutes.

56. Resolved: That a Conference paper be published monthly, the same to be edited by one appointed by the District Council. The various departments of our district program shall consider this as our official organ. The heads of these departments shall be considered as contributing editors. It is further recommended that this paper be devoted to information and promotion rather than a compilation of sermons.

57. Resolved: That the host church, with the District Superintendent, decide as to the mode of entertaining the Ministerial Institute.

58. Be it resolved: That a District Comity Committee of five be established to meet with a like committee from the Kentucky Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, for the purpose of discussion and exchange of ideas relative to the merger. Be it further resolved: That said committee be chosen by the following method: Two members appointed from the Council by the Council, and three additional members elected by the Conference.

Be it further resolved: That their findings be reported at the 1968 Ministerial Institute.

59. Resolved: That the following point system be adopted as a standard for the judging of missionary displays from year to year:

- a. Clarity of theme 10 points.
- b. Illustration of theme 25 points.
- c. Quality 25 points.
- d. Originality 25 points.
- e. Neatness 15 points.

Be it further resolved that no display be considered in judging if it has been previously displayed.

60. Resolved: Whereas, we feel that television is detrimental to deep spirituality and the teaching of the Pilgrim Holiness Church: Be it resolved that the Kentucky Conference go on record as opposed to members and ministers having television sets.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1. We recommend: That each Sunday School pay two dollars (\$2.00) per month into a Building Fund, for the purpose of construction or maintenance of buildings on the Camp Ground.

2. We recommend: That each church take a free will offering for the District Superintendent on all the visits, the same to be sent in by the local treasurer and applied on the Superintendent's traveling expense.

3. We recommend: That whereas, there is a pressing need for buildings to house our people, that each church or individual buying a lot be asked to build a cabin on said lot within three years, and if they fail to do so, to put the lot up for resale. Furthermore, we recommend: That those who purchased lots prior to this date be contacted by the District Superintendent urging them to build a cabin within two years or give the District the privilege of reselling their lot. 4. We recommend: That whereas our District Home Missions and Church Extension Loan Fund is being supervised by the District Council and they are placing all designated funds in this department, that the rate of interest be four per cent (4%) on all loans.

5. We recommend: That each church pay the registration fee of their pastor and wife and church delegate to the District Conference; this amount to be raised by the District Superintendent at the annual meeting; and also an offering for their traveling expense.

6. We recommend: That the District Treasurer be paid two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00)per year, and the District Secretary one hundred eighty dollars (\$180.00) per year; the same to be paid in equal monthly payments; and that the District Statistician be paid sixty dollars (\$60.00) per year.

7. We recommend: That each church have a monthly missionary service, at which time an offering shall be taken for World Missions.

8. We recommend: That each church send ten percent (10%) of their regular offerings to the District Treasurer, designated as District Budget. This does not include special offerings, such as building fund, evangelists, General Church obligations.

9. We recommend: That the District Superintendent's salary shall be set by the District Council.

10. We recommend: That any minister traveling under the direction of the District Superintendent, the Board or Committee of which he is a part, be paid seven cents (7ϕ) per mile traveling expense plus one dollar (\$1.00) per meal bought while in District work.

11. We recommend: That all those who come in to work on the called work week be paid at the rate of seven cents (7ϕ) per mile. Where possible those coming from one area shall group together. They shall stay the minimum of days as required by the Minutes.

12. We recommend: That the churches pay their pastor a salary at least equal to the average wages of the working people of the church, and that the matter of the pastor's salary be taken care of by the District Superintendent or his assistant at the time of the annual meeting.

13. We recommend: That the local church pay 50% of the Social Security payment on his salary from the church. We further recommend that the District pay 50% of the District Superintendent's Social Security.

14. Whereas: the pastors attendance at the Ministerial Institute benefits the church as much as the pastor:

We recommend: That each church pay it's pastor's travel expense to the Institute at the rate of 7 cents per mile, and \$1.00 per meal.

15. We recommend: That in compliance with the action of the 1962 General Conference, our United Stewardship Fund be \$9.50 per member, to be divided as follows: Administration 38%; General Church Extension 30%; Liberal Arts College 22%; Sunday School and Youth 6%; Church Extension Loan Fund 2%; and Contingent Fund 2%. This amount is to be sent to the District Treasurer in a lump sum as United Stewardship Fund. 16. We recommend: That the District Budget shall be divided as follows: Zone Bible School 4%, General Conference Expense 3%, Sunday School Promotion 2%, and the balance placed in the Sinking Fund.

17. We recommend: That the District raise one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) per year to assist on the Camp meeting; the same to be raised by each local church giving the sum equivalent to one dollar (\$1.00) per member, the sum to be sent to the District Treasurer.

18. We recommend: That each church take steps to raise their revival offering at least thirty days before the revival starts.

19. We recommend: That when a mission is organized into a church it shall not be asked to pay district budget for one year from the following Conference; and that the church shall pay fifty percent for the two following years.

20. We recommend: That each church send \$2.00 per month for our district youth work, same to be sent to the District Treas.and forwarded to the District Youth Treas.

21. We recommend: Whereas, the 1946 General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church adopted the Pension Plan to aid retired and disabled ministers, we recommend that we adopt this plan of financing it, namely: That each local church pay the equivalent of 80% of the evangelists tithe, who are members of said church; and that the church pay 8% of the pastor's salary. This is to be sent monthly to the District Treasurer. All members of the Pension Plan are to pay 2% of salary and offerings as reported to the conference.

22. We recommend: That each Sunday School set aside one Sunday each month and 50% of said Sunday's offering be given for District Home Missions.

23. We recommend: That each Sunday School adopt the birthday offering plan, said offerings to go for District Home Missions.

24. We recommend: That each church give the minimum of five dollars (\$5.00) to support the District Ministerial Institute each year.

25. We recommend: That each church subscribe for the number of Kentucky Pilgrims they desire per month and that they pay 7ϕ per copy for the same.

26. We recommend: Whereas, the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized the Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc., to make loans of Pension Funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches under such conditions as required active participation on the part of the Pilgrim Holiness District. Therefore, be it resolved by the Annual Conference of this district that the District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials be, and they are hereby authorizing, to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness churches of this district, subject, however, to limitations and conditions set out in said Resolutions of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loan.

27. We recommend: That due to the heavy financial burden at camp time, an organization shall be formed called the Kentucky Pilgrim Camp Association. The purpose of the association shall be to relieve that financial burden. Each member of said organization would contribute the sum of 50 cents per month for 10 months, with the total amount to be sent to the District Treasurer on or before June 30.

28. We recommend: That, whereas World Missions has been withdrawn from the

United Stewardship Fund, making their only support to come from free will offerings, our camp permit pledges to be taken at the annual camp World Missions service.

29. We recommend: That the last Sunday in August be designated as "Dining Room Sunday." A special offering to be raised by each local church and sent to the District Treasurer to be applied on the dining room debt. We further recommend: That the amount be equal to \$1.00 per member. If it be found impossible to receive this a-mount on the above date, another date as near to this date as possible, is acceptable.

30. We recommend: That each local Missionary Society pay the sum of fifty cents (50¢) per month, to be used for miscellaneous expenses of the District Missionary Society. It shall be known as the Missionary Society Expense Fund. Said money is to be sent directly to the District Missionary Treasurer.

RULES GOVERNING SALE OF LOTS AND BUILDING COTTAGES

Price of lots, \$20.00 each. Terms: \$5.00 down payment when purchased, balance to be paid in monthly payments of \$3.00 each. Six percent on unpaid balance at maturity. All lots are to be paid for in six months or contract is void.

All outside lots in the old plot shall be of this dimension, 20 feet in width and 30 feet in length. Inside lots shall be 20x20. All lots in the new plot shall be 20x30 feet. All cottages are to be uniform in size and placements on lots in accordance with the row or street on which they may be placed. The dimensions of the cottages are to be 10x12 feet, with an 8 foot eave, six concrete piers, one door and two windows, a screen door, and either a metal or asphalt roof. The building is to be made of dressed lumber, either boxed or framed, and to have two coats of white paint. An extension of nine feet may be built on any of the cabins on an outside lot of the old plot, such additions, to be of the same dimensions as that of the cabin with a window on each side. A porch may be built on the front of any and all cottages. Cabins on the new plot may be either single or double.

The District Council holds the right to paint or repair in any way necessary, unless the owner does the work himself, and the owner is to pay the expense of same. Aluminum paint only is to be used on the metal roof.

RATES FOR THE CAMP

Camp Rates:

- 1. Season mealticket for camp and conference: \$7.50 and work assigned; or \$15.00.
- 2. Children from six through twelve shall be charged at the rate of \$3.00.
- 3. Children under six years of age, shall be entertained without charge.
- 4. Individual meals shall be 75 cents per meal.
- 5. Delegates and all others who attend Conference, and who have not paid the season ticket rate, shall be charged the rates for individual meals.
- 6. The children of actively engaged district pastors, aged 16 and under, shall be entertained without charge, but shall be subject to assigned work.
- 7. Cabin owners shall pay a \$2.00 registration fee, this to include electricity.
- 8. Rent for rooms shall be charged as follows:
- Old dorm. for camp season \$10.00 New Dorm. for camp season \$12.00 Nightly rates in Old Dorm. 1.00 Nightly rates in New Dorm. 1.50
- 9. Meals & bed shall be gratis to visiting ministers of other districts and denominations for a period of not exceeding 3 days. Any exception to this rule shall be left to the discretion of the Camp Meeting Board.

Other:

- 1. The "Reserved Table" in the Dining Room shall be limited to the seating of the District Supt., Ass't Dist. Supt., and wives, called workers, and special guests.
- All youth who register for the Camp Meeting, must participate in the Youth Program.
- 3. All single youth shall be housed in barracks type rooms, place to be designated by Camp Meeting Board.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

Mr. Chairman, members of this conference, and Pilgrim Youth, greetings.

I consider it a real joy and pleasure to be honored with this opportunity, as your District Youth President, to present my report covering the preceding year. A wonderful group of church leaders, pastors, and youth leaders have made my work one of joy and delight with their loyal support and fine co-operation.

As we go forth in the direction of saving our youth, I am convinced as never before of the great harvest that awaits our church. Indeed, this is a most fertile field for gospel seed planting. The more we can do in saving our youth and establishing them in the doctrines of Christ and the Church, the more assured we are of a bright future for the Kingdom and the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

C.Y.C. DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Mr. Chairman, Brother Richardson, our Youth President, the pastors of the district, and members of the 1967 Kentucky Youth Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church....greetings.

Since this time last year, God has, by divine providence, brought us literally millions of miles that we might share this time of fellowship and blessings together in, not just another, but perhaps our last Youth Conference in what is now known as the Pilgrim Holiness Church of America. May He direct every word, thought, and action that takes place today.

One year ago the responsibility of District CYC Director was placed upon my shoulders. Throughout the year the Lord has seen fit to bless this program in different churches within the District. I am thinking especially of the churches at Morgantown, Kentucky and Kingswood, Kentucky.

Throughout the year, it was my privilege to visit several of our zones and present CYC to them. I have contacted every pastor in the district one or more times by letter; I have assisted the local chapter whenever I could, by contacting the local CYC director. It was my privilege to award three of our CYC'ers with top awards. Also, I spoke at our Ministerial Institute at Louisville, Kentucky.

On May 6, 1967, with the help of my good assistant CYC director, Donald Mavis, we had a District CYC Round-Up at the Owensboro Church, with several of our CYC chapters attending. The activities of the day consisted of a CYC work-shop, crafts, dinner at the park, and a field trip to the Science Museum.

The total attendance for the Round-Up, including CYC'ers and adults was 85.

This year the Ashland First Church presented three 'Paul F. Elliott' awards and one 'Seth Rees' award. Our Kingswood Church presented two 'Paul F. Elliott' awards, the Owensboro Church presented three 'Paul F. Elliott' awards and the Highland Avenue Church in Covington presented one 'Paul F. Elliott' award. This makes a total of thirteen top awards given in the past three years. Ten were given this year.

We have within the district six registered CYC chapters. Within these we have:

- 38 Crusaders
- 61 Cadets
- 59 Heralds

A total of 158 CYC'ers altogether.

We have at least two chapters that are not registered and others that have inquir-

ed about starting a CYC program in their church.

As this conference year comes to a close, I would like to express my personal appreciation to Rev. Donald Mavis, my faithful assistant, for helping to promote the CYC program in the Kentucky District.

As we stand on the threshold of another conference year, I am reminded that we are living in the very last days of this wonderful dispensation of grace. I feel perhaps, the coming of the Lord will take place before another twelve months slips by. If so, I trust my labors have not been in vain, that I, by the grace of God, will have a few trophies to lay at His feet when I stand before Him on that wonderful day when He is crowned King of Kings, and Lord of Lords.

YOUTH CONFERENCE STANDING RESOLUTIONS

1. Resolved: That the District Youth Conference shall be held during our District Camp. The time to be set by the executive officers of the Youth Council.

2. Resolved: The first ten rows of the tabernacle and the platform area shall constitute the conference bar. The hours for conference sittings shall be from 9 a.m. to 11:45 a.m. and 1:15 p.m. until finished.

3. Whereas the District Council presents three or more names per zone for the election of Zone Chairman at the Youth Conference, and whereas the District Youth President is in close touch with the zones; therefore, be it resolved that we request the District Youth President be allowed to meet with the District Council when making these nominations.

4. Resolved: That space be given in the Conference Minutes for a Youth Section, consisting of directory of officers, committees, resolutions, ways and means recommendations and minutes of Youth Conference.

5. Resolved: That our Youth Department shall honor the High School and College Seniors of the District with a banquet or banquets. The times and places to be set by the Youth Society officers.

6. Resolved: That the District Youth Council have authority to set the time and arrange other details of the Youth Camp.

7. Resolved: That the District Youth Council appoint a Youth Camp Committee of three, who with the Youth President shall have authority to arrange the details of the Youth Camp.

8. Resolved: That the District Youth President be authorized to meet with the District Council to confer on any construction on the Camp ground relating to youth activities.

9. Be It Resolved: That all Youth Conference Committees for the new year shall be appointed by the Youth Executive Council and published in the Minutes.

10. Inasmuch as there is a need of uniformity as to the number of zone rallies held each year, therefore, be it resolved that the minimum number of rallies per zone be set at four per year.

11. Inasmuchas there has been a lack of uniformity in the composition of the Zone Rallies; therefore, be it resolved that all of the eight zones have the same point system in awarding the zone banner. The following points will determine the winner of a zone banner:

- 1. One zone attendance banner in each zone.
- 2. One point per church per mile to rally (mileage as set by AAA)
- 3. Three points per person attending the zone rally.
- 4. Host church entitled the liberty of winning the banner if they have 51% of the attendance.

12. DUTIES OF ZONE OFFICERS

The duties of the zone officers shall be as listed below:

CHAIRMAN

- 1. Meet with zone committee and plan dates in advance for zone rallies.
- 2. Send dates of zone rallies to the District Youth President and to all pastors in the zone.
- 3. Plan and promote all zone rallies.
- 4. Preside at all zone rallies.
- 5. Give attention to financial matters of the zone.
- 6. Serve on the district youth council.
- 7. Co-operate in promoting the district and national youth program.
- 8. Keep an up-to-date mailing list of all local officers in the zone.
- 9. Give a report to the annual district youth conference.

VICE CHAIRMAN

- 1. Shall co-operate with and assist, the chairman as requested by the chairman.
- 2. Serve on the zone committee.

SECRETARY

- 1. Keep minutes of all zone committee meetings.
- 2. Help the zone chairman with zone correspondence.
- 3. Keep an up-to-date mailing list of all local officers in the zone.
- 4. Report each zone rally to the District Youth President as soon as possible after each rally.

TREASURER

- 1. Receive and disburse funds as directed by the zone committee.
- 2. Keep accurate records of receipts and disbursements and bank all monies immediately upon receiving.
- 3. Serve on zone committee.

13. The officers of the zone shall be Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary, and Treasurer. Each one must be a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

14. Be It Resolved: That the Zone Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary, and Treasurer and the Zone Pastors constitute a zone planning committee. They shall plan the programs, set the dates, and choose the places of the zone meetings. They shall raise funds in the zone meetings and disburse the same.

15. Resolved: That all zone chairmen prepare a report of the activities and finances of the zone to be read at the Youth Conference by the Zone Chairman, or Vice Chairman, or by another, if these cannot be present. The same report shall be inserted into the District Youth Minutes.

16. Resolved: That officers to be elected by the zone must be elected within sixty days after youth conference. The District Youth President, or his appointee, shall preside at this meeting.

17. Resolved: That each church send a delegation of at least one or more young people to represent said church to each zone rally, regardless of Revival or other special meeting going on in their church at the time of Rally.

18. Resolved: That a copy of all resolutions be placed in the hands of the zone chairmen within thirty days after Youth Conference.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. We recommend: That when the District Youth President conducts a Rally in the zone meetings, that an offering be taken in the service for his traveling expenses.

2. We recommend: That each church send 2.00 per month for our district youth work, same to be sent to the District Treasurer and forwarded to the District Youth Treasurer.

3. We recommend: That in compliance with the action of the 1962 General Conference that each local youth society contribute an amount equal to 5% of their total receipts, for the operation of the Department of Sunday Schools and Youth. Said money is to be sent to the District Youth Treasurer, who will forward same to the National Youth Office.

4. We recommend: That Zone Rally offerings be divided as follows: 25% for Youth Camp to be sent to the District Youth Treasurer; 25% for Sunday School Promotion to be sent to the District Treasurer; 50% to be used at the discretion of the Zone.

5. We recommend: That each local youth group send \$1.00 per month to the District Youth Treasurer for the Youth Building on the Camp ground.

6. We recommend: That any district youth officer traveling on official business, be paid the sum of 5ϕ per mile and meals while traveling.
