Journal of Proceedings Hopkins, Michigan August 2-4, 1962

The first sitting of the 62nd Annual Michigan Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 9:00 A.M., August 2, 1962, at the District Camp Grounds, Hopkins, Michigan.

Rev. A. C. Doehring, District Superintendent, called the Conference to

order with a moment of silent prayer.

Rev. Philip Mitchell opened the song service with the singing of, "I Know Whom I Have Believed". Mrs. Philip Mitchell was at the piano. The Conference continued with the singing of "Hiding in Thee" and "Love Divine".

Rev. J. H. Koteskey, Assistant Conference Superintendent, led in prayer.

A copy of the Conference Treasurer's Annual Report was given to each

delegate and pastor.

Rev. Doehring then presented General Superintendent and Presiding Officer, Dr. M. H. Snyder. Dr. Snyder addressed the Conference from the Scripture, Matthew 8:5-13, using as his theme "The Miracle of the Centurion". He stressed the thought of faith and read from Hebrews 11:1,2. He introduced the subject by referring to the fact that we should have a good report of faith and that our work takes on another dimension, namely, the spiritual. Brother Snyder stressed that faith should be exercised in profound humility, that faith should be exercised in profound love, that faith recognized constituted authority, that faith exercised constituted authority, and in conclusion he stressed that Jesus said to the Centurion, "Go thy way; and as thou hast believed, so be it done unto thee. And his servant was healed the selfsame hour."

The roll was called and approved.

The Conference bar was set as the first eight rows of the three center sections and the platform.

The General Superintendent spoke briefly concerning churches which have not paid their United Stewardship Fund and informed the Conference that the Manual requires each pastor to give an abbreviated report to the District Conference, and that this will be put into effect next year.

Rev. Edwin Woirol and delegate Mrs. Shaw from the newly organized church in Ithaca were presented to Dr. Snyder by Rev. Doehring. A motion was made to receive this new church into the Conference. The Conference approved by a rising vote of appreciation.

A recommendation from the District Council brought the following ordained ministerial transfers:

Rev. Theodore Neely, from East Michigan

Rev. Fred W. Gibbs, from Northern Indiana

Rev. G. E. Stace, from Western Ohio

Rev. Walter Thomas, from Oklahoma

It was moved and carried to receive these brethren into our Conference and fellowship. It was suggested that they come forward and be introcuced to our Conference. Each gave his testimony.

A motion was carried to accept this report.

Rev. A. C. Doehring, District Superintendent, presented his report. This splendid report was accepted with a standing vote of appreciation.

Rev .J. H. Koteskey, Assistant Conference Superintendent, gave a brief verbal report. It was received by the Conference.

Rev. C. M. Marshall read a report by Paul J. Brower, Certified Public Accountant, covering the financial report of the Michigan Conference, the Michigan Conference Sunday School and the Michigan Conference Missionary Department. It was moved and carried to accept this report.

Rev. C. E. Messer, Conference Treasurer, gave a report on the Conference finances. A motion was carried to give Brother Messer a rising vote

of thanks for this good report.

Rev. K. P. Boileau, District Statistician, presented part of his report covering: Church Treasurer's report, Sunday School Statistical, Pastor's report. Church Statistical, Youth Society Statistical, and Youth Society Financial, but was interrupted due to the expiration of time.

SECOND SITTING

The Conference reconvened for its second sitting at 1:30 P.M. with Rev. Burdette Price leading in the singing of "I Will Sing The Wondrous Story". Mrs. Vaughn Drummond accompanied at the piano.

Rev. M. L. Goodman led in prayer.

Dr. M. H. Snyder introduced Rev. R. A. Beltz, Director of the Pilgrim Pension Plan, who spoke to the Conference about the history and particulars of the Plan. He also spoke briefly regarding the Ministerial Benefit Association.

The minutes of the First Sitting were read by the Conference Secretary, Rev. C. M. Marshall. It was suggested that "Certified Public Accountant" be

placed after the name of Paul J. Brower, Auditor. The minutes were then approved.

The Chairman suggested we dispense with the roll call.

Rev. K. P. Boileau, Conference Statistician, continued with the Statistical Report. The report was accepted by the Conference.

Following Rev. Boileau's report, Dr. Snyder admonished the pastors and delegates to compensate their evangelists adequately for their service.

Mrs. C. E. Messer, Conference Missionary Treasurer, gave the financial report of the work of the Missionary Department. The report was accepted.

Rev. V. L. Draggoo, Conference Sunday School Treasurer, presented

his report. A motion was made and carried to receive this report.

Rev. C. L. Walker, Conference Sunday School Secretary, reported. He presented ribbons to the churches that made at least a 10% gain in attendance this year. They are as follows: Almira, 69%; Muskegon, Memorial, 64%; Ithaca 56%; Midland First, 10%; Lansing Grace 10%. His report was accepted by the Conference.

The Conference recessed for ten minutes.

The Conference reconvened at the call of the chair.

The Reception Committee presented Dr. P. F. Elliott, President of Owosso College, to the Conference. Dr. Elliott spoke briefly with reference to the expansion program at the College.

Rev. J. D. Witmer reported for the Resolutions Committee.

Resolution No. 1, regarding Standing Rule 16 on Page 33 being deleted from the Standing Rules. Carried.

Resolution No. 2, regarding election of officers being held on Friday morning of Conference. Carried.

Resolution No. 3 Ruled out of order.

Resolution No. 4, regarding the Resolution Committee, The Ways and Means Committee, the Camp Planning Committee and all other committees appointed by the Conference to make plans for the next year, to meet sixty days before Conference to prepare material. Carried.

Resolution No. 5. It was moved and carried to refer this resolution to the Ways and Means Committee.

Resolution No. 6, regarding defining of pastoral calls, moved and carried that this be referred to the General Board for clarification.

Rev. M. E. DePeal reported for the Ways and Means Committee. As copy of the resolutions was given to each member of the Conference.

Resolution No. 1, regarding a minimum salary program for ministers was brought to the floor.

Due to expiration of time, the Conference adjourned with prayer by Dr. P. F. Elliott.

THIRD SITTING

The third sitting of the Michigan Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church reconvened at $7:00\ P.M.$

Rev. Vaughn Drummond led the congregation in the singing of "A Change to Keep". Mrs. Drummond was at the piano.

Rev. J. H. Koteskey led in prayer, after which the congregation sang, "Rock of Ages".

Rev. Doehring then presented the ordination candidates, Burdette Price, Philip Mitchell and David Leamon to Dr. M. H. Snyder, Presiding Officer.

Appropriate Scriptures were read by Rev. C. M. Marshall, Rev. M. L. Goodman and Rev. D. F. Price.

Dr. M. H. Snyder read 1 Timothy 4, and used as his text, 1 Timothy 4:16. He emphasized that ministers are to "Give heed to their spiritual life, give heed to their intellectual life, and give heed to their physical life". He stressed that they are called to give warnings, not only to the sinner, but also to the saints. He further admonished the candidates to discipline themselves in the work of the Lord. If they have a right relationship with God, their major problems are solved.

The ordination charge was read to the candidates after which they, with their wives, knelt at the altar for prayer and the laying on of hands by the ordination committee. Dr. Snyder then presented the certificates to the newly ordained ministers. The congregation sang, "Blest Be the Tie" and "I'll Live for Him" while appreciation was offered to the newly ordained ministers and their wives.

Dr. Snyder then called the Conference to order.

The Conference Secretary read the minutes of the second sitting. They were approved as read.

Rev. M. E. DePeal continued recommendations from the Ways and Means Committee.

The Chair suggested that Resolutions No. 1 and 2 be considered at the same time in that they are greatly related.

Resolution No. 1. It was moved and carried to substitute the following motion for Resolution No. 1. "Be it resolved that the month of September be designated for the promotion and receiving of a special offering for ministeral assistance. This money shall be placed in the Ministerial Relief Fund, and shall be used to assist underpaid ministers. This fund shall be administered by the District Council". The substitute motion was adopted.

Resolution No. 2. A motion was made to refer Resolution No. 2 back to the Committee. This motion of referral was lost. The original motion, Resolution No. 2, was then voted upon and lost.

Resolution No. 3, regarding licensed and ordained ministers and deaconesses was amended to read, "Shall pay ten dollars annually to the Conference Administration Fund". This amendment was lost. The Presiding offcier then ruled that Standing Rule No. 25, Page 35, would remain as it is in the Journal.

Resolution No. 4 was ruled out of order by the chair.

Resolution No. 5, regarding the District Superintendent meeting with each local church board to discuss the United Stewardship Fund, the District Budget, and other pertinent needs of the church and pastor. Carried.

After announcements, the Conference was adjourned due to the expiration of time. Rev. G. E. Stace dismissed with prayer.

FOURTH SITTING

- Rev. A. C. Doehring called to order the fourth sitting of the Pilgrim Holiness Church Conference at 9:00 A. M. August 3, 1962.
- Rev. J. D. Witmer led in the singing of "Near the Cross". Mrs. Ruth Keesor was at the piano.
- Dr. C. W. Thomas led in prayer, after which the district superintendent presented the Presiding officer.

Dr. Snyder read as a Scripture lesson, Romans 12, admonishing Christians not to avenge themselves, but leave this to the Lord. We should have transparent lives—be to a person's face what we are to his back. He talked at some length on hypocrisy in a believer's life.

At the close of his reading, Dr. Snyder read an announcement regarding the Pilgrim Pension Plan. He urged all ministers to participate in this

plan.

A motion was made that we dispense with roll call. Carried.

The minutes of the third sitting were read by the Conference Secretary. They were approved as read.

Due to the absence of two delegates from Owosso, Rev. M. L. Goodman made a motion that Mrs. Lloyd Thompson and Mrs. H. T. Mills be seated as delegates from the Owosso Church. The motion carried.

Prior to the election of officers, Dr. Snyder admonished the Conference to be very conscientious in their voting, and to try to discern the will of the Lord in voting for the officers. Then he led in prayer for God's guidance.

District Superintendent, A. C. Doehring, appointed the following tellers: Rev. L. L. Keesor, recording secretary; Rev. Philip Mitchell, foreman; Rev. Carroll Johnson, Rev. Theodore Neely, Rev. Burdette Price, Rev. Clifford Dean, Rev. David Leamon, Rev. Edwin Woirol and Rev. Alvin Ransom. In the absense of Burdette Price, Rev. Doehring appointed Rev. Dale Brugger as teller.

Ballots were cast for district superintendent. In the course of the voting Rev. Doehring withdrew his name and Rev. Clyde Marshall was elected.

The Reception Committee presented to the Conference: Rev. C. V. Holstein, evangelist in the Church of the Nazarene, Rev. Harold Rickner and Rev. L. N. Nelson, ministers in the East Michigan District. Each gave a testimony.

Motion was carried to give these brethren honorary seats within the bar.

Between balloting, Dr. Snyder informed the conference of actions of the last International Conference.

Ballots were cast for conference secretary. Rev. M. L. Goodman was elected.

The Reception Committee presented Rev. Gerald Beckwith, of the Salvation Army in Iowa. Rev. Beckwith gave his testimony. A motion carried that he be granted an honorary seat in the bar.

Rev. Wesley Manker paid homage to his mother, Mrs. Lila Manker, who is retiring after 45 years in the ministry. He stated she became a pastor's wife in 1916, ordained to the ministry in 1940, and has completed 23 years of service at Hastings. The Conference stood in appreciation of her labors.

The Conference Secretary, Rev. C. M. Marshall, read a recommendation from the District Council, regarding the good work Rev. C. E. Messer has done as Conference Treasurer for the past five years. The Conference stood as a token of appreciation to Brother Messer.

The following nominations were read for conference treasurer: Rev. K. P. Boileau, Rev. W. L. Silvers and Rev. C. F. Barrett. Rev. Silvers withdrew his name from the nominees. Rev. K. P. Boileau was elected as conference treasurer.

The Ministerial Music Makers favored the Conference with the song, "When I Said 'Yes' to Jesus". This was in honor of Mrs. Lila Manker.

A motion was made and carried that the election for conference trustee be put on a plurality basis.

Ballots were cast for three advisory members of the District Council. Due to expiration of time, the Conference was adjourned. Rev. V. L. Draggoo dismissed with prayer.

FIFTH SITTING

The fifth sitting of the Michigan Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church reconvened at 1:30 P.M., with Rev. Bernard Churchill leading in the singing of "What a Friend". Mrs. Ruth Keesor presided at the piano.

The Conference secretary read the minutes of the fourth sitting. They

were approved as read.

The Recording Secretary, Rev. L. Keesor, reported on the results of the balloting for a Conference Trustee. Rev. C. E. Messer was elected.

The results of the balloting for three advisory members of the District Council were reported. Rev. V. L. Draggoo, Rev. C. E. Messer and Rev. A. C. Doehring were elected.

Ballots were cast for conference missionary president. Mrs. Clarissa Penny was elected.

Ballots were cast for the revolving vacancy of the Educational Board. Rev. William Osborne was elected.

The conference then elected Rev. D. F. Price as a member of the Ex-

amining Board.

At this time the Reception Committee presented to the Conference Rev. William Lyons and Rev. William Doe from the East Michigan Conference. Dr. Snyder welcomed them to our conference, and asked that each of them give a word of testimony. It was moved and carried that we extend to them an honorary seat within the bar.

Rev. W. L. Silvers was elected to the Church Extension Board.

A motion carried that the members of the Camp Board be elected on a plurality basis. The following three brethren were elected to the Camp Board for a period of three years: Rev. E. L. Downey, Rev. Ted Neely and Rev. Fred Gibbs.

Ballots were cast for the Camp Planning and Promotion Committee. Rev. V. L. Draggoo and Rev. Herbert Diller were elected.

Rev. E. L. Downey was reelected as editor of THE MICHIGAN PILGRIM. The Reception Committee presented Rev. D. W. Brown from the East Michigan Conference. He was asked to give his testimony, after which the Conference voted to give him an honorary seat within the bar.

The Conference recessed for ten minutes.

The Conference reconvened with the singing of "Amazing Grace", with Rev. J. D. Witmer at the piano.

Rev. M. E. DePeal reported again for the Ways and Means Committee. Resolution No. 6, regarding taking care of the deficits in the Camp and

Conference Fund and General Conference Delegate Fund, carried.

Resolution No. 7, regarding hospitalization plan for pastors and families was amended to read, "A letter should be sent to the pastor before the insurance expires". The motion carried as amended.

Resolution No. 8, regarding taking offerings in churches and camps by the World Missions Department, and Educational and Sunday School Departments, was amended to read "And whereas the Church Extension Department can come to a church upon invitation". This amendment carried. A motion prevailed that we amend the last paragraph of the resolution to

read as follows: "The manner of receiving this offering shall be left to the discretion of the church board". The amendment was carried. Resolution No. 8 was carried as amended.

Resolution No. 9, regarding the Sunday following Mother's Day being designated as College Sunday, carried.

Resolution No. 10, regarding the pastor's car expense, carried.

Resolution No. 11, regarding deleting the last two paragraphs in Standing Rule 25 on Page 35, carried.

Rev. J. D. Witmer reported for the Resolutions Committee.

Resolution No. 7, regarding deleting Standing Rule No. 38, carried.

Resolution No. 8, regarding the Ministerial Convention date was lost.

A motion was made that the District Council proceed at once to study with the Owosso College as to the date of their lecture series with the thought of setting our Ministerial Convention in April, so as not to conflict. An amendment was made to give this Committee permission to work with the East Michigan Ministerial Convention Committee and arrange a combined Ministerial meeting. The motion to amend was carried.

District Superintendent's Report to the Michigan Conference

To Dr. Melvin Snyder, General Superintendent, co-ministers and laborers of the Michigan District, delegates and friends, greetings.

I wish first of all to give due recognition and praise to the God of all grace, and our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, for His love and providential care he has had over us throughout another year, thus enabling us to gather together in this Sixty-Second Conference of the Michigan District.

Statistics show that the moral and spiritual ebb of the nation were never at a lower tide than now. According to the Word of God this reveals that the Rapture is near at hand. It is also a voice crying unto us and telling us that, "What we do we must do quickly", and urging us to go all out for God and the salvation of souls.

When we read the great and urgent commission Christ gave us, yea gave you and me, individually as well as collectively, to go and make disciples, it brings a certain fear to our hearts, and we wonder if we are fulfilling our mission as sincerely and wholeheartedly as we ought.

In the midst of the fulfillment of the latter day prophecy, when wicked men and seducers are waxing worse, and men are lovers of pleasure more than lovers of God, and in the midst of the lukewarm, unconcerned spiritual atmosphere we are encountering, our concern must be for the needs of humanity. We must be concerned primarily with their spiritual needs, but we must not forget their physical needs. If the Gospel we are commissioned to carry and preach is accepted, it not only presents an antidote for the creeping paralysis of spiritual indifference, but it also provides for the mental, physical and spiritual needs of man. It is not enough for us as a church to try to bring the derelict, the great sinner, or the outcast from society to Christ, we must get the Gospel to them before they become great sinners and outcasts. This must be our prime concern. To this we must expend our greatest effort.

I have been praying, and I trust you have too, that back of every resolution that will be presented to this conference, there was a heartcry, a passion for souls, to help us find better ways and means to extend our efforts more successfully in spreading the Gospel and bringing men to Christ. Methods and techniques will amount to but little unless this is true. If every pastor and delegate can go home from this conference with a greater VI-SION, a greater PASSION, and a greater PRAYER for souls, this conference will go down in history as a great conference. If this does not take place, we will go home to read the minutes, and then wonder why we passed some legislation.

May the presence of the Holy Spirit fill us with a new vision of our responsibility to this generation. And as we go to our fields of labor we will work twice as hard for souls, and half as much for self.

THE DISTRICT AT A GLANCE

As in previous years the district has been making progress. Alma, Battle Creek North Side, Lansing Emmanuel, and Jackson built new churches this year. Wyoming City built a Church-Parsonage, a church that will be converted into a parsonage when they build their church building. Burnips and Hastings finished their churches this year with wall-to-wall carpet and new furniture. Burnips also finished the upper floor of their educational unit. Alma, Burnips, Lansing Emmanuel and Hastings were dedicated within the conference year. Battle Creek North Side and Wyoming City were dedicated in July. Scottville purchased a different church building, giving them the room they needed so badly, and placing them in a much better location in the city. Midland Grace is in the process of building the upper structure on their basement church. Ithaca, our newly organized church, purchased grounds for a new church. They will build as soon as possible. Coleman purchased a different parsonage. The old one will be used for Sunday School rooms. Traverse City Heights remodeled their parsonage and basement. The basement will be used for fellowship gatherings. Houghton Lake refaced their parsonage with a brick effect. Chesaning bought different pews and put stained-glass windows in the church. Newberry improved their heating system in the parsonage. Ashley also remodeled the basement of their church. I sincerely trust I have not overlooked any church that has made material progress or improvements.

The International Conference revealed that the Michigan District made a 28.8% gain in Sunday School attendance during the past quadrennium, placing first among organized districts. Ontario and Arizona were the two unorganized districts with greater gains. We need to give due credit for this to our District Sunday School Committee for their splended programs they presented to us.

The membership gain for the past year is small. These gains reveal what can be done. Our afforts in this field must be increased.

OUR CHURCH EXTENSION AND BRANCH SUNDAY SCHOOLS

During the past year several Branch Sunday Schools were promoted by our District Sunday School Committee, but because of lack of local interests some of these were discontinued. Nevertheless, the work started at Gaylord is making progress. Rev. Silvers, who has been taking the responsibility of this work reports. "We are making progress, and there is a good opportunity for a Pilgrim Church at Gaylord." They need to change their time for services, and have them in the morning and evening. This presents a problem. I would suggest that the Church Extension Board give this their serious consideration as soon as possible after this conference and camp. Muskegon North Side is also making a splendid gain. They need a new building and a full time pastor. This, too, will be work for the Church Extension Committee in helping to plan for their future.

YOUTH AND MISSIONARY SOCIETIES

As we all know, the youth, in their conference last year, voted to have their District Youth Camp here. They had their first youth camp here in July, and what a wonderful camp they had. I wish everyone could have been here to see the youth and their wonderful response to the altar call. I am greatly encouraged with their spritual vision and how they stand ready to further the Kingtom through the avenues of the church and district. They have sold their Higgins Lake property and are using the money to enlarge their facilities here. A full report of their activities will be given to the youth conference by the Youth President.

We wish to say "Thank you" to the Missionary Society for the splendid work they have done. The project they have undertaken and the aid they have given the camp by purchasing the needed articles, will be appreciated for years to come. Mrs. Penny has been doing a splendid job in outlining and presenting projects to the local societies.

OUR CAMP

To see the four new squad units on the hill is indeed encouraging. This is the result of the youth moving their District Youth Camp to these grounds. Willing hands from throughout the district donated their labor to make this possible. These units will help alleviate the room shortage during camp. The leasing of most of the available lots to individuals for cottages is also encouraging. Some planned on having their cottage built by this camp time. No doubt by next camp you will see several up and in use. The special offering taken by the churches throughout the district to build the conference approved project this past year fell far short of its goal. So you will find the project only partly finished. I hope the Resolutions Committee will present something to this conference that will meet the financial needs, so conference approved projects, when started, can be finished by the next conference time.

PASTORAL CHANGES

Rev. Marshall is going to Lansing Emmanuel, Rev. Petterson to Rockford, Rev. Rummage to Coleman, Rev. Dean to Luther, Rev. Draggoo to Hastings, Rev. Downey to Eaton Rapids, Rev. Silvers to Muskegon, Rev. Manker to Traverse City Heights, Rev. Gibbs to Ellsworth, Rev. Johnson to Chesaning, and Rev. Brugger to Crystal.

A WORD OF APPRECIATION

I would be unfair if I would not let you know how much I appreciated the willing help given me by our good assistant district superintendent and the help received from the entire District Council. Their kind consideration and counsel will not soon be forgotten. I also wish to say "Thank you" to all the pastors and churches for their willing co-operation in all the district projects. With co-operation like this you are certain to make progress this coming year.

Report of the District Sunday School Secretary

To the 62nd Annual District Conference of the Michigan District, to our honored General Superintendent, Dr. Melvin H. Snyder, District Superintendent Rev. A. C. Doehring, and to all pastors, Sunday School Superintendents, delegates, and visitors.

Greetings, in the name of Jesus, our Chief Corner Stone, and the foundation upon which the True Church school is built.

I am happy to testify that my lot has fallen in pleasant places by having the privilege of serving as the District Sunday School Secretary. I can say this work has been a source of great enjoyment. I have performed these duties to the best of my ability. It has been a pleasure to work with the fine Sunday School Committee. We have tried to encourage the Sunday Schools of the District to continue in the work of increasing their attendance through a district-wide contest such as "Gushers for God," Sunday School workshops, and institutes. Yet, with all of the encouragement and the work performed the district shows a loss of 53 (1.2%) each Sunday.

This has been a busy year for me. I have traveled many miles and mailed over 2,000 pieces of mail. One branch Sunday School has been started at Gaylord, Michigan. W. L. Silvers, zone chairman and pastor at Ellsworth, and Dean Fiedler, Sunday School Superintendent, have been the leaders of this work. They have had an average attendance of 12 each Sunday for the last six months. I feel quite sure we are developing a good work at Gaylord. Let us make Gaylord a subject of prayer.

The International Conference report of the last quadrennium declares the Michigan District Sunday Schools to have had the highest numerical gain (996) of all the districts in the Pilgrim Holiness denomination and the highest percentage gain (28.8%) of all organized districts in the Pilgrim Holiness denomination. This speaks well for our district. This gives our report a positive note.

I have been your Sunday School Secretary for the past five years. These have been some of the best years of my life. The ministers and laymen are of the very highest caliber and finest spirit that you could ever find with whom to work. I have always been interested in this district since they adopted me as one of their sons. I have endeavored to be faithful in whatsoever capacity I was placed. While I have not seen the progress that I would like to have seen, yet, I am deeply grateful to God and to all of you who have co-operated with me so faithfully. I want to say a big thank you from the depths of my heart. I have requested of my district superintendent and the District Council that my name should not be considered for this office this year. I have had a feeling this past year, that there is a need for a new personality with new ideas and methods, and a deep and abiding love for this work, to be placed in this office. I feel sure that God has great things ahead for the Pilgrim Holiness Sunday Schools in the Michigan District. I am not making any recommendations for the coming year, but I pledge my prayers and co-operation to the new Sunday School Secretary and to the great work of Sunday Schools in the Michigan District.

Therefore be it resolved that hereafter the Resolutions Committee, the Ways and Means Committee, the Camp Planning Committee, and all other committees appointed by the Conference for the purpose of presenting a resolution to the next Conference meet at least sixty days before Conference time for the purpose of preparing resolutions for the annual district conference.

Be it therefore resolved:

That the District Superintendent shall meet with each local board at least once annually, to discuss specifically the importance of the United Stewardship Fund and the District Budget. He also shall discuss the needs of the Pastor, relative to salary, along with the provisions specified in our Manual

and District Conference Minutes concerning Parsonage and Utilities, Hospitalization, Pension Plan and Car Allowance.

This meeting shall be arranged only with the knowledge of and full concurrance of the Pastor.

Be it Further Resolved:

That the District Treasurer write two letters annually, one in the first quarter of the year and one in the fourth, to the Secretary of each local church, relative to the payment of the United Stewardship Fund and Conference Budget and indicating the status of that Church.

6. Inasmuch as the annual financial report indicates deficits in two Conference funds, namely Camp and Conference Fund and General Conference Fund, and,

Inasmuch as the reports for the past several years show need in both of these funds,

Be it therefore resolved; that the following action be taken by this Conference:

In order to take care of the dificit in the Camp and Conference Fund, which, including specified funds, amounts to approximately \$3,000, a Camp and Conference deficit fund shall be included in the Conference Budget. The amount shall be \$.50 per member. This fund shall continue until the deficit is eliminated.

The General Conference portion of the budget shall be increased to \$.40 per member.

7. Be it resolved; that Standing Rule No. 37 on Page 37 of the Conference Minutes be amended to read as follows:

The Pilgrim Holiness Churches of the Michigan District shall enroll their pastors and families in the group hospitalization plan that is in effect in the Michigan Conference.

Failure to pay premiums for a period of two months shall cancel Insurance Coverage. A letter shall be sent to the pastor before the insurance expires.

8. Whereas the last General Conference has removed the world Mission Department from participation in the United Stewardship Fund, and as a consequence a more extensive program of deputational work and soliciation will be inaugurated,

And whereas the Manual provides for the departments, namely World Missions, Educational and Sunday Schools to come annually to our camp and churches to represent their interests, and whereas the Church Extension Department can come to a chuch upon invitation,

And whereas we as a Conference have no stated policy as to how these funds shall be raised in our Camp and Churches,

Therefore be it resolved that the manner of receiving this offering shall be left to the discretion of the Church Board.

9. Whereas the month of May has been set aside throughout the Pilgrim Holiness Church as Education Month with a special educational issue of the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate and additional publicity and promotion by our Pilgrim Colleges designating a certain Sunday in May as College Sunday, and.

Whereas in the state of Michigan many of our Pilgrim Holiness Churches did not contribute in an offering for Owosso College during the past year, therefore, be it resolved, that the Sunday following Mother's Day in the Michigan District be designated as Owosso College Day, and on this day a special offering will be taken for the College with a goal set for a dollar a member.

10. Whereas a pastor's car expense constitutes one of his major financial burdens, and is often not provided for in his regular salary, and, Whereas a pastor's car is a necessity to the efficiency of his ministry,

Be it resolved: that this Conference recommend to the Churches of our District that each Church provide a car allowance for its Pastor.

11. Inasmuch as the Conference adopted Resolution No. 5 of the Ways and Means Committee, which will result in a large percentage of the Budget and Administrative Fund being paid, if its purpose is realized, and,

Inasmuch as the payment of the present Conference Budget as given in Standing Rule No. 23, and the Administrative Fund as given in Paragraph 1 of Standing Rule No. 25, would provide adequate finances for the Administration Fund, and,

Whereas payment of the tithes of all ministers, licensed and ordained, into their own local church treasuries would aid the local churches in paying their budgets and Administrative Fund, and would also help the ministers to be a good example in obeying the Biblical instruction in Malachi 3:10 to "Bring ye all the tithes into the store-house,"

Therefore be it resolved: that Paragraph No. 2 and No. 3 of Standing Rule No. 25 on Page 35 of the Conference Minutes be deleted.

STANDING RULES Camp

No. 1 — CAMP MEETING FUNDS

The conference treasurer shall submit an itemized report of camp meeting funds.

No. 2 — CAMP MEETING SUNDAY SCHOOL SESSION

On the two Sundays during camp meeting there shall be a Sunday School session from 9:30 a.m. until 10:15 a.m. The session shall be arranged and supervised by the Sunday School Committee.

A credit card shall be given to all in attendance. Each card shall be signed and returned by the pupil to his local Sunday School Secretary for the attendance record and reports to the conference.

No. 3 — CAMP BOARD

The camp board shall consist of nine members. Three members shall be elected annually for three-year terms. The District Council shall provide nominations from which board members shall be elected. Any member of the camp board who has served for a period of three years shall not be re-elected to the board until at least three years have expired.

Incumbents, though not re-elected, shall serve until the close of camp. Newly elected members shall begin to serve immediately upon their election.

The board shall secure all manual workers for the camp and conference, supervise grounds and buildings, and purchase good and necessary equipment for camp and conference.

No. 4 — CAMP MAINTENANCE

Each church shall be responsible for five days work per year to the conference at the call of the District Council for camp maintenance. Be it further resolved that any work that is not taken care of during work week be taken care of by help hired by the Camp Board at \$1.25 an hour.

No. 5 — CAMP PLANNING AND PROMOTION

The camp planning and promotion committee shall consist of six members. Two members shall be elected annually for three-year terms. Four nominations shall be made by the District Council. Not more than one of the individuals nominatted annually for this committee shall be a member of the District Council.

No. 6 — CAMP DEVELOPMENT

The Hopkins Camp grounds shall be developed according to the following plan:

The map presented to the 1961 conference shall be the master plan for camp development.

Lots shall be made available immediately to persons and churches for the purpose of building cottages. Lots in the trailer area shall be available for lease as soon as developed. A lease agreement formulated by the planning committee and approved by the District Council shall be used in leasing lots. Lots shall be leased at \$25.00 each.

Each annual conference shall decide the development project for the ensuing year. Recommendations shall be made to the conference annually by the planning committee.

No. 7 — MINISTER'S EXPENSES

Recognized actively engaged and retired ministers of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, their wives, and their children 11 years old and under shall be entertained free for camp and conference. Trailer courts and tent facilities are included in this free entertainment. All minister's children 12 years to 20 years old shall be charged the same registration fee for camp and youth convention as the laymen's children of these ages.

Church Extension

No. 8 — CHURCH EXTENSION FELLOWSHIP

The Church Extension Fellowship shall be presented at least once a year to all local churches by the district superintendent or some other District official. If the district superintendent or one of his council members cannot be present the pastor will be expected to present this proposition.

When and if no call is made to the fellowship within any six months period, the district superintendent shall have the authority to send a letter to each member asking for the call which shall be used in aiding struggling churches as specified by the district council.

Members are to be instructed that their original pledge does not bind them to this payment, but that it shall be on a voluntary basis of giving.

The following pledge form is to be used.

Holding the conviction that God would have us further the cause of Christ by establishing new churches within our conference borders, I subscribe to the following:

- (c) I recognize that the first financial obligations in the opening of a new work are the most difficult to meet, and will therefore be responsible for two units, (\$5. per unit), to total \$10.00 for the Church Extension Fellowship.
- (d) I assume this obligation for not more than two new works in any one conference year. Said works to be approved by the Church Extension Board.
 - (e) I will try to secure members for the Fellowship.
- (f) I understand this agreement may be terminated any time I deem it necessary by notifying the Church Extension Board.

No. 9 — CHURCH EXTENSION COMMITTEE

The church extension committee, as soon as possible every year following camp, shall study and survey any or all areas where a new church may be started. After careful examination of the various possibilities the committee shall forward its information on to the district council with its recommendations. The most promising and assuring project shall be recognized as a district project and finances, attention, interests, and prayers shall be focused on this project.

Annual Conference

No. 10 — CONFERENCE YEAR.

The conference year shall close June 30.

Complete annual reports must be reviewed by the local church boards and forwarded directly to the conference statistician, Rev. W. L. Silvers, 228 Washington Ave., Muskegon, Michigan, by July 15. All reports received after July 15 shall be omitted from the statistician's report.

No. 11 — DATE OF CONFERENCE AND CAMP MEETING

Conference shall be held Thursday and Friday preceding camp meeting. Camp meeting shall start Friday preceding the first week in August.

No. 12 — RESOLUTIONS

The Resolutions Committee, the Ways and Means Committee, the Camp Planning Committee, and all other committiees appointed by the conference for the purpose of presenting resolutions to the next conference shall meet at least sixty days before conference time for the purpose of preparing resolutions for the annual conference.

All resolutions shall be in the hands of the respective committee by May 15. Any resolutions received after this date shall not be considered by the committees. All resolutions shall be typewritten and signed.

The committees shall mail copies of the resolutions as they are to be presented to the conference to the ministers and lay delegates by July 1.

The secretaries of the committees shall provide the conference chairman, conference secretary, and district superintendent with copies of the resolutions before reading them to the conference.

No. 13 — CONFERENCE SESSIONS

The first eight rows in the three center sections shall constitute the conference bar. The hours of conference sittings shall be from 9:00 a.m. to 12 noon, 1:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.

No delegates shall be seated in the conference unless they are elected by their respective churches.

Elections

No. 14 — ELECTION OF OFFICERS

The election of officers shall be the first item of buiness on Friday morning of conference.

No. 15 — OPEN BALLOT

All district officers shall be elected by open ballot, except those nominated by the district council.

No. 16 — ORDINATION SERVICE

The order of business on the first night of the conference shall be the ordination service.

The companion of each candidate shall be given an honorary seat with him (or her) during the service.

Church Organization

No. 17 — ORGANIZATIONAL AND PLANNING COMMITTEE

The council shall be authorized to set up a Church Organizational Planning Committee of three, the purpose of which is to assist smaller churches with such organizational plans as would tend to encourage more rapid growth. The services of this committee shall be available at the call of the pastors.

College

No. 18 — COLLEGE VISITS

The Bible Department of Owosso College shall be given the privilege of visiting annually the churches at which time an offering shall be received.

Credentials

No. 19 — LICENTIATES

The conference superintendent shall have read Section 104 and 105, of the Manual instructing all conference licentiates that hereafter they shall appear before the conference examining board at conference time before the credentials shall be granted.

No. 20 — COURSE OF STUDY REQUIREMENTS FOR ORDINATION

Those persons desiring to be ordained in the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the Michigan District may meet the educational requirements in any of the following ways:

- I. Successful completion of the courses of study as outlined in the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- II. Successful completion of the following three-year Ministerial Course at Owosso College.
 - 1. 94 semester hours, including at least 60 hours from the Division of Religion.
 - 2. Completion of the reading course or its equivalent as prescribed by the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
 - 3. Completion of the following semester hours:

This standard will be required of all candidates graduating during 1962 and thereafter. Those graduating prior to 1962 with the Bible College degree of either Bachelor of Theology or Bachelor of Arts in Bible will be considered to have met the educational requirement for ordination. Those graduating prior to 1962 with liberal arts degrees will be required to meet this standard or a minimum of 60 semester hours in the field of religion and Bible.

*Courses that can be counted in the field of religion or liberal arts.
**14 hours in Bible and or religion (including a minimum of 6 hours in Bible) may be substituted for the Greek requirement. This standard provides for 69 hours in the field of religion.

IV. Successful completion of a combination of the above programs, said combination to be determined by the Educational Examining Board of the respective District Conference.

V. Candidates providing evidence of equivalent educational preparation from our other colleges or similar institutions or like home study courses shall have their work evaluated according to the programs outlined above.

Finance

No. 21 — CHURCH BUDGET

Each church shall raise for the United Stewardship Fund the equivalent of \$8.00 per member, and for the Conference Budget the equivalent of \$9.15 per member.

The Conference Budget shall be divided as follows: Administrative Fund, \$2.25; Church Extension, \$1.75; Church Extension Loan Fund, \$1.00; Camp and Conference Deficit Fund, \$0.50; Camp Meeting Expense, \$0.50; Ministerial Relief, \$0.75; Youth Department, \$0.50; Branch Sunday School Fund, \$0.50; Bible Department of Owosso College, \$1.00; International Conference Fund, \$0.40.

Each church shall pay its budget monthly from the local church treasury.

No. 22 — ADMINISTRATIVE FUND

The local church treasurer shall send to the conference treasurer along with the monthly budget the equivalent of 10 per cent of the pastor's salary for the Administrative Fund.

No. 23 — DISTRICT AND GENERAL FUNDS

All monies raised in the local church for conference and general church work shall be sent to the conference treasurer, who shall forward the general church funds to the general church treasurer.

Conference treasurer: Rev. Kenneth P. Boileau, 765 Kimball St., Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan.

No. 24 — BUDGET NOTICES

The District Treasurer shall write two letters annually, one in the first quarter of the year and one in the fourth, to the secretary of each local church relative to the payment of the United Stewardship Fund and Conference Budget, indicating the status of that church.

No. 25. — RECOGNIZED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

All treasurer's books of the conference shall be audited annually by a recognized public accountant so that a report from the auditor can be given to the conference when called for.

No. 26 — SALARIES

The Conference Superintendent's salary shall be set at \$4,5000.00 per year, the equivalent of his social security, full 6 percent pension plan, family plan hospital insurance, and 7c a mile traveling expenses. Conference Treasurer, \$375 per year, Conference Secretary, \$175 per year; Conference Sunday School Secretary, \$75 per year; Conference Statistician, \$75 per year; Editor of the Michigan Pilgrim, \$50 per year; District Youth President, \$75 per year. All conference officials shall receive six cents per mile for miles traveled in the interest of the conference except for transportation to and from any meeting (business or otherwise) when said transportation serves the purpose of attendance at the annual conference, camp meeting, work week, and annual ministerial convention. Additional secretarial or clerical help by any or all conference officials shall be provided by the district council.

No. 27 — SUNDAY SCHOOL & YOUTH DEPARTMENT SALARIES

The Sunday School and the youth department shall be responsible for the salaries of said department heads.

No. 28 — BURIAL BENEFITS

All actively engaged pastors, evangelists and ministers of the conference, and their wives, shall be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association. Cost of membership and calls shall be paid from the treasuries of the departments that employ them.

Each local church shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Association and pay the expenses of their membership and each call that comes thereafter from the church treasury.

All general full-time evangelists and their wives, receiving their principal support from their meetings, shall be enrolled in the Association. Cost of

membership and each call that comes thereafter shall be paid by the church of which he is a member.

Membership expense for the District Superintendent and his wife shall be paid from the Conference Administrative Fund.

Membership expense for ministers, and their wives, employed at Owosso College shall be paid from the Owosso College treasury.

Membership expense for home missionary pastors shall be paid from the Conference Church Extension Fund.

Membership expense for retired elderly ministers and their wives shall be paid from the Ministerial Relief Fund.

No. 29 — PILGRIM PENSION LOAN PLAN

The District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials are hereby authorized, to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in the Resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.

Ministerial Convention

No. 30 — MINISTERIAL CONVENTION COMMITTEE

The ministerial convention committee shall consist of six members. Two members shall be appointed annually by the conference superintendent for three-year terms.

No. 31 — TIME AND ORDER OF SERVICE

The ministerial convention shall begin on the fourth Tuesday evening of April. The morning service of the last day shall be the concluding service.

All morning and afternoon sessions shall be closed to the public and open only to the ministerial family. All evening services shall be open to the public.

Missionary

No. 32 — REPORTS

A yearly report of each missionary society shall be printed in the Conference Journal.

Pastors

No. 33 — PASTORS AT CAMP MEETING

Inasmuch as our pastors are expected to support and attend annual camp meeting each church shall provide the equivalent of the pastor's offering or salary for the two Sundays of the camp and the pastor shall be privileged to attend the entire camp meeting.

No. 34 — PARSONAGE UTILITIES

The local church shall provide good, modern heating and cooking facilities for the parsonage, the type to be suitable to the locality where the parsonage is situated. All churches in the Michigan Conference are to provide the utilities for the parsonages. The Conference shall provide the same for the Conference parsonage.

No. 35 — VACATIONS

It is recommended that our churches grant their pastors a two weeks vacation with pay. The conference superintendent shall be given a two weeks vacation with pay.

No. 36 — RECALL OF PASTORS

The second week of May shall be designated as the time for the churches of our conference to vote on the recall of the pastor.

No. 37 — HOSPITALIZATION PLAN

The Pilgrim Holiness Churches of the Michigan District shall enroll their pastors and families in the group hospitalization plan that is in effect in the Michigan Conference.

Failure to pay premiums for a period of two months shall cancel insurance coverage. A letter shall be sent to the pastor before the insurance expires.

No. 38 — PASTOR'S MOVING DATE

Pastoral changes and moves shall be made according to the Manual, Section 53, Paragraph 1 (1958 Manual):

"The minister's term of office as pastor shall continue until and including the first Sunday following the district conference."

No. 39 — CONFERENCE LICENSED MINISTERS

When a district licensed minister shall serve a church as pastor or assistant pastor he shall have the same privileges and rights as an ordained minister in fulfillment of his pastoral duties.

Sunday Schools

No. 40 — DISTRICT EXPENSE

To provide finances for District Sunday school work, each Sunday school shall send annually to the Conference Sunday school treasurer the amount shown for its category.

No. 42 — APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEES

The conference superintendent shall appoint all committees. The standing committees are to be appointed to include new members where possible and to avoid the duplication of men on several committees.

No. 43 — MEETINGS WITH LOCAL BOARDS

The District Superintendent shall meet with each local board at least once annually to discuss specifically the importance of the United Stewardship Fund and the District Budget.

He shall also discuss with the board the needs of the pastor relative to salary and the provisions specified in the Manual and Conference Journal concerning parsonage, utilities, life insurance, pension plan and car allowance.

This meeting shall be arranged only with the knowledge and full concurrence of the pastor.

No. 44 — RETIRING SUPERINTENDENT

Whenever there shall be elected another conference superintendent, the conference shall take steps to fill the pastorate left vacant by recommending the retiring superintendent to the church as a pastor. The conference council may also recommend him to the field of evangelism.

No. 45 — REVIVALS

Our conference superintendent shall be allowed to hold two two-Sunday meetings per year, either on or off the District, other than his regular work.

Assistant District Superintendent

No. 46 — TRUSTEE CHAIRMANSHIP

The district assistant superintendent shall be the chairman of the district board of trustees which shall be composed of three other elected members.

Youth

No. 47 — YOUTH EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE BUSINESS MEETING The Conference Youth Executive Council shall hold quarterly meetings.

No. 48 — YOUTH CONVENTION PROGRAM

The youth convention shall consist of four services: a Friday evening evangelistic service, Saturday morning business session, Saturday afternoon service, and a great rally Saturday evening.

A youth program under the direction of the youth council shall be correlated with the regular camp session, consisting of a youth service each week-day morning, and a recreational period each afternoon.

No. 49 — DISTRICT CAMP YOUTH PLAN

- I. A youth director shall be hired to organize, plan, and direct all activities of the youth (recreational, spiritual, and social). This director should be contacted and appointed at least $\sin(3)$ months prior to the Conference.
 - 1. His duties shall be as follows:
 - a. Responsible for the registration of all youth.
 - b. Assignment of sleeping quarters, squads and work details.
 - c. To plan and organize all recreational activities.
 - d. To make available a list of all games and sheets to be signed by the youth for the area in which he wishes to participate.

- e. He shall appoint a counselor to oversee and direct each area of recreational activity.
- f. He shall be responsibile to see that all youth participate in the required "spritual activities."
- g. He must collect a health form from each young person and see that the forms are filed with the camp nurse.
- h. Shall handle all matters requiring discipline along with the head counselor and, if need be, the District Youth President.
- II. Two (2) head counselors shall be hired; one for boys and one for the girls. These counselors shall be under the direct supervision of the youth director and shall give him complete co-operation.
 - 1. The duties of the head counselors shall be:
 - a. Responsible for the execution of all rules and regulations.
 - b. Responsible for morning and evening devotions.
 - c. Supervision of the squad counselors in the execution of their duties and responsibilities.
 - d. Shall see that all youth are in service with the squad counselors during required periods.
 - e. Shall check all sleeping quarters for lights out and quietness
 - f. Shall periodically check with squad counselors during recreational activities.
 - g. Shall be authorized to excuse any young person from an activity who is ill or has a good reason.
 - h. Shall inspect sleeping quarters at designated time each day.
- III. That a counselor shall be hired for each squad. These counselors shall be under the direct supervision of the head counselor and the youth director.
 - 1. The duties of the squad counselors shall be:
 - a. Shall be responsible for his or her squad at all times except during organized recreational periods.
 - b. Shall see that all work is done properly during work periods.
 - c. Shall not leave the grounds without first notifying the head counselor and another person placed in charge of the squad.
 - .d Shall sit in all required services in the area reserved for the youth.
 - e. Shall check roll at all activities and see that every squad member is accounted for.
 - f. Shall see that sleeping quarters are kept clean, beds made, and ready for inspection at the designated time.
 - g. Shall take bed check and see that every one is in his bed and lights out and maintain quietness. Any person missing or violating the rules shall be reported to the head counselor.
 - IV. The squads shall be no larger than fifteen (15) persons.
- V. The camp fee for the youth staying through the entire camp shall be as follows: \$15.00 and no work; \$7.50 and work. The registration fee is to be included in this amount. \$1.00 of the above amounts go to the youth treasurer.
- VI. The Camp Board shall submit a list of the work details expected to be done by the youth to the youth director and/or the youth council four (4) weeks prior to the Conference.

VII. Camp staff applications, with evaluation form and the camper evaluation form, shall be used.

No. 50 — INCUMBENTS OF COUNCIL TO SERVE THROUGH CAMP

Incumbents of the district youth council, though not re-elected, shall serve until the close of camp. Newly elected members shall begin to serve immediately upon their election.

No. 51 — NOMINATIONS OF ZONE OFFICERS

The zone officers and zone pastors shall present nominations for the offices of zone secretary and zone treasurer.

No. 52 — JOINT COUNCIL MEETINGS

There shall be two combined meetings of the District Council and the Youth Council each year. The first meetings shall be in the first six months of the church fiscal year and the second meeting shall be in the second six months of the church year. These meetings shall be called expressly for the purpose of joint business.

Youth Conference Resolutions

1. Because of the obvious need for an age division in our Youth Camp, be it resolved that one Youth Camp be held each year with the two age groupings as follows:

Group No. 1 11 through Jr. High School. Group No. 2 Senior High School through 20.

Be it further resolved that the facilities at the Hopkins Camp Grounds be used

Be it further resolved that this be placed in the Standing Rules.

- 2. Be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 19, Page 57 be deleted from the Conference Minutes.
- 3. Inasmuch as there is a need for more extensive promotion of our Youth Activities, BE IT RESOLVED that a Committee, Hereafter called "Youth Promotion Committee" be appointed by the Youth Council, and that they will be responsible for the origination and distribution of materials for promotion of all future Youth Activities.
- 4. BE IT RESOLVED that we give our new Superintendent, The Reverend Clyde Marshall, a rising vote of thanks for his efficient leadership over this Conference.
- 5. BE IT RESOLVED that a vote of thanks be given Mrs. Evan Downey for for her efficient secretarial help for this Conference.

Ways and Means Resolution

- 1. Be it resolved that each zone leader write a letter to pastors and youth presidents concerning their district financial obligations as follows:
 - 1. District Youth Project
 - 2. Administrative Fund
 - 3. National Project
- 2. Be it resolved that standing rule No. 11 on page 56 of the Conference Journal be changed to read: The district youth treasurer shall send a quarterly financial report to the district youth president and the district supt.

Standing Rules

Conference

- (1) The song "Forward Ever" shall be adopted as the theme song of the Pilgrim Youth of the Michigan Conference.
- (2) The district youth conference shall be held on Saturday morning of the youth convention and shall convene at 9:00 a.m.
- (3) Whereas there is a need of a complete mailing list as an aid in sending out district material, be it resolved that each local society send the name of its local youth leader to the district youth president. Where there is no organized society, the pastor shall see that the name of any local youth leader and their address, be sent to the district youth president.

- (4) Be it resolved that a complete mailing list of the names and addresses of the local youth society presidents be published in the youth section of the Conference Journal. Be it further resolved that where there is no organized or chartered society the pastor submit the name and address of a local leader.
- (5) Because the Youth Conference is a very important part of the district youth program and because it is becoming more detailed; therefore be it resolved that the district conference youth minutes be edited by the youth. Be it further resolved that the Youth Conference Secretary serve as chairman of an editing committee composed of three or more additional members to be appointed by the district president. Be it further resolved that the Youth Conference minutes be placed in the Conference Journal in a portion set aside for this purpose.

Convention

- (6) Each zone president shall give an annual report to the business meeting of the youth convention.
- (7) A district treasurer's report shall be given at the business meeting of the youth convention.
- (8) The youth president shall give an annual report to the business meeting of the youth convention.

Finance

- (9) The local youth society treasurer shall send 25% of the total offerings to the zone youth treasurer the week following the last Sunday of each month. One-half of the zone rally offerings shall be sent to the district youth treasurer to be used for district youth expense. The zone youth treasurer shall send monthly 60% of regular offerings received from the local youth treasurer to the district youth treasurer. The district youth treasurer shall send 10% of the regular receipts to the general church.
- (10) The members of the Executive Committee shall receive six cents per mile for traveling expense incurred for district business.
- (11) The district youth treasurer shall send a quarterly financial report to the district youth president and the district superintendent.
- (12) The zone shall pay one-half of the mileage traveled by zone president to all district youth council business meetings.
- (13) The district youth treasurer shall receive \$50 in salary per conference year.
- (14) Be it resolved that the zone president be paid a minimum of three cents per mile, for travel to and from zone rallies.
- (15) "Each local society sending a president and a duly appointed delegate
 (s) to the youth conference and convention be required to pay the
 \$2.00 fee for each one sent.
 All youth, ages 12 through 20 shall be entertained free Friday through
 - All youth, ages 12 through 20 shall be entertained free Friday through Sunday during youth convention, upon payment of a \$2.00 registration fee.
- (16) Be it resolved that our district youth secretary receive a salary of \$25.00 per conference year.

Youth Camp

- (17) There shall be an annual camp with date and the program of the camp to be set by the youth council as soon as possible after youth conference.
- (18) A one dollar registration fee shall be sent with youth camp registration card by each applicant to the district youth treasurer fifteen days prior to youth camp. The remainder of the fee will be paid on the day of registration.
- (19) Because of the obvious need for an age division in our Youth Camp, be it resolved that one Youth Camp be held each year with the two age groupings as follows:

Group No. 1 11 through Jr. High School.
Group No. 2 Senior High School through 20.

Be it further resolved that the facilities at the Hopkins Camp Grounds be used.

Zone

- (20) There shall be at least six (6) youth rallies held in each zone during the conference year.
- (21) The election of zone officers and the annual zone business meeting shall be held at the first rally of the conference year.
- (22) The officers of the zone shall consist of President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer. The pastor and youth president shall be active voting members of the business session.
- (23) There shall be a report by each zone president to the district youth president within two weeks following a zone rally on report blanks supplied by the district youth president.

District Activities

- (24) A district youth rally shall be held annually under the supervision of the Youth Council. The time, date, and place are to be determined by the Youth Council.
- (25) Inasmuch as the Youth Council is desirous to uphold the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church we therefore recommend that action be taken not to allow any person to work during camp or conference wearing make-up,immodest forms of dress, or anything contrary to church standards as stated in the Manual.
