The twenty-ninth session of the Annual Assembly of the Pilgrim Holiness Churches of the Michigan District convened in the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Owosso, Michigan, April 9th to 14th, 1929.

FIRST SITTING

Wednesday Morning, April 10th, 1929, at 8:30 o'clock

The first sitting opened with appropriate songs, and prayer by Rev. E. E. Wood, after which Rev. Seth C. Rees, the General Superintend-ent, addresed the Assembly on the subject: "The Necessity of Revival work in the midst of the years, in wrath remember mercy."

Rev. Rees took the chair and the Assembly immediately proceeded to business.

The roll was called as listed with the District Secretary.

By motion the Assembly bar was fixed to include the first five pews in the front of the church.

It was moved and supported that the morning business sessions convene at 8:30 A. M. Motion carried.

It was moved and supported that we have two sessions each day until the business of the Assembly be finished. Motion carried.

It was moved and supported that the afternoon session convene at 2:30. Motion carried.

It was moved and supported that the District Council appoint the various committees. Motion carried.

In the absence of the regular secretary, B. E. Manker was elected

to act as secretary pro tem. Brother Brillhart favored the Assembly with a special song by request.

Motion was made and supported that Rev. Earl Davis of the Indiana District be recognized by the Assembly, and asked to give a speech. Motion carried.

Brother Davis spoke briefly to the edification of all.

It was moved and supported that Rev. E. E. Wood, a visiting min-ister, be granted a place within the Conference bar. Motion carried.

It was moved and supported that Rev. Calbert Holstein be brought forward and introduced to the Assembly and granted a place within the Conference bar. Motion carried.

SECOND SITTING

Wednesday Afternoon, April 10th, 1929, at 2:30 o'clock

The second sitting opened with special singing, and praver by Rev. George B. Kulp.

Rev. Seth C. Rees took the chair and the roll was called as listed with the secretary.

It was moved and supported that hereafter the calling of the roll be dispensed with. Motion carried.

The minutes of the previous sitting were read and approved.

Rev. B. O. Shattuck, District Superintendent, gave his report and annual message.

It was moved and supported that District Superintendent's report

Be accepted and spread on the minutes. Motion carried. Rev. A. M. Frink, Chairman of Committee on Ministerial Conven-tion, presented the following recommendation: "Inasmuch as the District Assembly passed a resolution last year

to the effect that a Ministerial Convention be held at least once a year in the district, the time and place to be determined by the Assembly, we do therefore recommend that the same course be adopted for the coming year."

The above recommendation was considered at length and adopted by the Assembly.

Invitations were extended to the brethren to hold their Ministerial Convention at the following places: Port Huron, Dorr, Ellsworth.

It was moved and supported that the place for our next Ministerial Convention be determined by secret ballot. The Assembly proceeded to vote on this matter, and the place for

said convention was determined to be Port Huron.

It was moved and supported that the Ministerial Convention be held June 18th, 19th and 20th. Motion carried. This date was later changed to June 25th, 26th and 27th.

Rev. Geo. Lounds, pastor of the Port Huron church, reported.

Brother Dagg, delegate from Port Huron church, reported. Reports accented.

Brother Boone favored the Assembly with a special song at this time.

Rev. James Thompson, pastor of Merrill church, reported. Report accepted.

There was a motion made and supported that the Assembly adjourn in order that the committees might meet.

Sitting adjourned at 11:30.

THIRD SITTING

Thursday Morning, April 11th, 1929, at 8:30 o'clock

The third sitting opened with singing and prayer by Brother C. E. Cliff, after which Rev. Seth C. Rees gave an appropriate brief message on "The Importance and Necessity of Keeping Blessed." The time having arrived for the election of officers the Assembly proceeded to the order of the day.

The District Superintendent appointed the following men as tellers: Brothers Thompson, Bassett, Van Sickle and Emery.

The Assembly proceeded to elect the District Superintendent, the balloting resulting in the election of B. O. Shattuck.

The balloting for Assistant Superintendent resulted in the election of C. E. Cliff.

There was a motion made and supported that all of the officers of the district be elected by secret ballot. Motion carried.

The balloting for District Secretary resulted in the election of L. W. Sturk.

The election of District Treasurer was deferred until after the auditing of books of same.

It was moved and supported that District Treasurer be instructed to send remainder of funds in hand for General Superintendent to the General Treasurer. Motion carried.

There was a motion made and supported that hereafter we pay the General Superintendent the amount due him from our district as directed by the General Council, and that, should our General Superintendent be employed as evangelist by any of our churches in the district, his remuneration for said service be considered as a matter entirely separate from his regular support. Motion carried.

There was a motion made and supported that the Auditing Committee be excused at this time to audit the books of the District Treasurer. Motion carried.

The Assembly then proceeded to elect three advisory members of the District Council. The balloting resulted as follows: A. M. Frink, P. F. Elliott and S. I. Emery.

Brother Brillhart, pastor of our church at Battle Creek, was brought forward and introduced to the Assembly.

Brother Rittenburg, Home Missionary, was also brought forward and introduced to the Assembly.

It was moved and supported that the Statistician be appointed by the District Council. Motion carried.

The Assembly proceeded to elect one District Trustee to take the place left vacant by the expiration of term of office of R. Woodcock. The balloting resulted in the re-election of R. Woodcock. (Term 1929-1934).

It was moved and supported that the Conference bar be extended to include the first seven seats in the front of the church. Motion carried.

The Assembly proceeded to elect three members of the Board of Trustees of Bible Holiness Seminary from the following six men nominated by the District Council: Geo. B. Kulp, S. I. Emery, B. O.

Shattuck, B. E. Manker, A. C. Doehring and T. H. Hoos. Theballoting resulted in the election of Brothers Shattuck, Kulp, and Emery. (Term of office 1929-1932).

The Assembly proceeded to elect one member of the Board of Ex-aminers, the balloting resulting in the election of E. F. Ewers. (Term of office 1929-1934).

Sitting adjourned by expiration of time.

FOURTH SITTING

Thursday Afternoon, April 11th, 1929, at 2:30 o'clock

The fourth sitting opened with song service led by Brother Boone. Brother Ewers led in prayer. An appropriate brief message was brought by our General Superintendent on "The Importance of our Ministers Preaching the Doctrine of Tithing."

Sitting adjourned by expiration of time.

FIFTH SITTING

Friday Morning, April 12th, 1929, at 9:30 o'clock

The Friday morning sitting opened with song service led by Brother Boone, prayer by Brother Woodcock, and with Brother Rees in the chair.

The minutes of the previous sitting were read and approved with one correction.

The Assembly proceeded to business. It was moved and supported that the action of the Assembly regarding the demanding of a report from the Auditing Committee on the District Treasurer's books be rescinded. Motion carried.

There was a motion made and supported that Brother Harris, District Treasurer, be instructed to get his books in shape so as to report to the District Council satisfactorily regarding same.

The Committee on Home and Foreign Missions and the Committee on Resolutions presented several recommendations which were considered at length and acted upon. (See page 12 for recommendations passed).

It was moved and supported that Brother Stone be given twenty minutes to represent the interests of the Advocate. Motion carried.

There was a motion made and supported that we endeavor to raise the sum of ten cents per member over the district for the support of our Editor. Motion carried.

Brother Kulp took thirty minutes to impress on the minds of our people the value and needs of Bible Holiness Seminary.

An offering amounting to over \$3,000.00 was pledged by the pastors for their churches.

The period closed with a splendid interest in the school. Many of the brethren promising to stand by Bible Holiness Seminary as never before.

Duke, Mrs. Memro, Mrs. Lewis Freudenthal, Mrs. Anna C. Heins and Mrs. Parker be licensed to do deaconess work. We do further recommend that Merrill Bassett be ordained." It was moved and supported that time be extended fifteen minutes.

Motion carried.

It was moved and supported that we charge twenty cents per copy for the Assembly minutes. Motion carried.

The District Statistician reported. Report accepted.

Moved and supported that the reports of preachers and deaconesses that have not been given be spread on the minutes. Motion carried. Assembly adjourned.

THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

Of District Superintendent Rev. B. O. Shattuck

To the Annual Assembly:

The Church

Matthew 16:18: "Upon this rock (the divine Christ) I will build my Church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it.'

Jesus asked his disciples the question, "Whom do men say that I, the Son of Man, am?" Then he went a step farther and asked, "But whom say ye that I am?" Peter answered, saying, "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the Living God."

Peter's true confession of the divine Messiahship of Jesus, is the Rock of Ages upon which the Church of the Living God is builded. This is the Rock, the Headstone of the Corner, that Jesus himself de-clared in both the Old and New Testaments, had been rejected by the (Psalm 118:22, Matthew 21:12). builders.

The Church of the living and true God is the whole company of Christians wherever found on the face of the earth, who by the voice of God have been called out of the spirit of the world, and are serving the Lord in humble obedience, living according to his precepts and worship him in the beauty of holines. Wesley says that the church is the whole body of true believers,

whether on earth or in Paradise.

No single ecclesiastical body or denomination constitutes the church. Each denominational body is but a branch of the church, therefore, the Pilgrim Holiness church is but one branch of the imperishable church of the living God. The gates of hell shall not prevail against it (the church).

Adam Clarke says that "Our Lord's expression here means that neither the plots, stratagems, nor strength of Satan and his angels, should ever so far prevail as to destroy the sacred truths in the above confession. We may firmly believe that though hell should open her gates and vomit out her devil and all his angels, (add to these forces the federated forces of carnal and wicked) to fight against Christ and his saints (or his church), ruin and discomfiture must be the consequence on their part." Christ must and will triumph. We are fighting a winning battle under a leader who never knew defeat.

The Church, Her Mission and Field

Matthew 28:19-20: "Go ye therefore, and teach (or make Chris-tians) in all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost; teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you."

The church is commissioned with one great commission from her divine Head, Christ, who has commanded her to evangelize all nations with the Gospel, both Jew and Gentile.

The religion of Christ is a universal religion, and the only religion that meets the universal need of the human heart; it is the only religion in all the world by which fallen man can be saved; therefore the urgency of the command and commission of our Lord to go with this essenetial message.

If we as a church are to continue to feel the inspiring heart throbs of the Master we of necessity must stay close to the task of helping to evangelize the nations with the Gospel of Christ, or die spiritually. Shall we live or die?

In our general statement of belief as a church and article 10, we make the following statement concerning the activity of the church, "Her mission is the proclamation of a full gospel at home and abroad, including salvation from all sin, divine healing, and the pre-millenial coming of Jesus Christ. Her field is the world." A spiritual church is intensely missionary in its activity. Paul says, "If any man have not the Spirit of Christ, he is none of his."

No church can be indwelt by the personal Holy Spirit and not be missionary in her activities.

If the hour ever arrives when the Pilgrim Holiness church no longer has a vital interest in world-wide evangelism, in that hour she as a fruitless branch of thee church of the living God will be cut off from the true vine. "Every branch in me that beareth not (spiritual) fruit (in missionary activity) he (my Father) taketh (or cuts) away (from the true vine which is Christ)."-Jesus.

The Church Is Militant and Aggressive

Solomon's Songs 6:1-10: "Thou art beautiful, O my love, (my spiritual, my pentecostal church) as Tirzah, comely as Jerusalem, (pleas-ant and beautiful in situation, the royal habitation of the King of Kings on earth during the dispensation of the Holy Ghost). Who is she that looketh forth as the morning, fair as the moon, clear as the sun, and terrible as an army with banners?" It is the militant, aggressive, pentecostal church of God, marching under divine orders, to execute the last great commission, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

It has been said, and truly said, that "Pentecost was the greatest missionary convention ever held up to that time and from that gathering went out streams of holy fire in every direction, until they reached all of the then known world." Pentecost makes missionaries out of the last one of us. If we have the spirit of Christ, which is the spirit of Pentecost, we as members of the Pilgrim Holiness church, embrace in the seat of our sanctified affections the entire human family, black or white, Jew or Gentile, at home or abroad, and have an ardent desire for the salvation of all men, and an anxious concern about extending the borders of the work of the Pilgrim Holiness church and her institutions through the agency of genuine revival work under the leadership of the Holy Spirit.

Acts 2:46-47: "They, continuing daily with one accord in the temple, and breaking bread from house to house, did eat their meat with gladness and singleness of heart, praising God, and having favor with all the people; and the Lord added to the church, (to the congregation that was saved) daily such as should be (or those who were being) saved."

Clarke says, "God permitted none to be added to the church but those who were saved from their sins and prejudices. The church of Christ was made up of saints; sinners were not permitted to incorporate themselves with it."

Whenever and wherever the church maintains a militant and ag-gressive attitude; going out into the highways and hedges (of the nations) compelling them (those who will be saved) to come in, the Lord is still adding to the church those who are being saved, and our borders are being extended.

Opening New Fields

The task of opening new fields is not an easy one; it means strenuous work; it takes time, strength, patience, perseverance and finances. Ten day meetings are of little value in the opening of new fields. In the opening of new fields means the investing of from \$200.00 to \$500.00 in cash as a rule; however, after our work as a church has

been established on a new field, it will return to our various institutions many times over the amount invested.

For the task of establishing Pilgrim Holiness churches in new communities, we must have workers who are well saved and possessed with a good degree of that commodity known as good common sense; workers who love God and the souls of lost men (more than a well rounded out offering) with all of their redeemed powers, and long to see revivals where men and women are born of the Holy Spirit and sanctified wholly, who believe the Bible and have no time or disposition to apologize for any doctrine or truth which the grand old Book contains.

Workers who are willing to make any sacrifice necessary for the cause of God in the spreading of Scriptural holiness, who are ready to enter new fields and stay one month, six months, one year or five years if providential necessity demands it. Such workers will succeed. Because of the pressing financial needs of our district institutions, especially Bible Holiness Seminary, the flow of finances into the district treasury for home missions has been limited; however, some advancement has been made in the helping of young and struggling churches and the opening of new fields.

During the past year one new church has been organized in Detroit and the work of our church opened in Grand Rapids under the efficient leadership of Rev. Edward Boone, and will be ready to organize in the near future. An independent holiness mission at the Canadian Soo will soon be ready to organize.

A Systematic Financial Plan Should Be Adopted by Our Churches

Malachi 3:10, "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse (the church treasury) that there may be meat (funds) in mine house (to take care of the local church, send the gospel of Christ to the regions beyond, open new fields in the home land and take care of the various institutions of the church) and prove me now herewith (by this act) saith the Lord of Hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven and pour you out a blessing that there shall not be room enough to receive it."

He, our living Lord who is the Head of the Church, is the author of system, revealed to us through his written law, also by the laws of nature of which He is also the author. If the great commercial world endeavored to carry on business without a system, or the great railway systems should try to run their trains without a schedule, there would be confusion, wreck and ruin everywhere. One of the first laws of God, in the church and in nature, is order and system.

Every church in our connection, whether large or small, ought to adopt a systematic financial system; either the system of tithing directly into the church treasury; or a voluntarmy subscription of a stated amount weekly, by every paying member of the church. In event that the voluntary subscription system should be adopted, I would recommend that the envelope system be used.

In the adoption of a financial system—it will provide for the equal distribution of the financial burden of the church over the entire membership of the church, also provide for a stipulated weekly amount for the pastor, and take care of the other financial needs of the church. The adoption of a systematic plan does not forbid the taking and reception of free-will offerings.

Proverbs 3:9-10: "Honor the Lord with thy substance (thy money) and with the first fruits of all thine increase; so shall thy barns be filled with plenty, and thy presses shall burst out with new wine."

"If we only had the money that belongeth to our King, If the reapers of God's bounties all their tithes would only bring, Then the windows of the heavens would fly wide at his command, And he'd pour us out a blessing that would overflow the land. "If we only had the money, it would give Redemption's song To the weary hearts now crying out, 'How long, O Lord, how long?' And the thirsty land would blossom and the waiting isles would sing, If we only had the money that belongeth to our King!

"It would gild those saddened faces with the beams of Bethlehem; And the solitary places would rejoice and shout for them; Oh, ye stewards, get ye ready! Swiftly comes the reckoning, When we'll answer for the money that belongeth to our King."

I would earnestly urge that this Assembly readopt the resolution adopted by the Assembly last year, found on page 15, paragraph 1 of last year's minutes. Isaiah 32:8: "The liberal deviseth liberal things; and by liberal

Our District Institutions

Bible Holiness Seminary is a district institution needing no introduction to our people on this district. The school is owned and controlled by our Michigan District.

Bible Holiness Seminary is doing good work under the efficient leadership of Rev. Mrs. A. D. Luke, assisted by and able and spiritual faculty.

The Bible and thealogical department, constantly pressing upon the mind of the student the necessity of deep spirituality in every walk of life, are outstanding features of this school.

Bible Holiness Seminary is worthy of the confidence and liberal support of every member of the Pilgrim Holiness church on the Michigan District and throughout our entire connection. Our people, though it should mean profound sacrifice, should rise up together at once and strike off the shackle of debt (totalling \$25,000.00) from this worthy institution and free it for larger fields of usefulness in the training of our young people for the various walks of life.

training of our young people for the various walks of life. It now takes \$1500.00 annually to pay the interest on this burdensome debt that hangs heavy over our school. During the past five years we have paid out for interest enough to have lifted at least onefourth of this heavy debt.

Shall we continue the policy of pouring this stream of \$1500.00 yearly into a channel that is ever crying for more? Or shall we rise up as a District and dry up this treacherous swamp-hole of debt before we are forced onto the destructive rocks of bankruptcy?

After prayerful consideration I urge upon this Assembly the necessity of the adoption of some constructive policy that will relieve this embarassing situation.

Rest Cottage is a District institution that has been a blessing to hundreds of erring girls and women who drifted from the path of virtue and purity out into the wild wastes of sin and impurity. These under the direction of Godly workers have been directed back to lives of purity through the love of a pardoning Christ. The greater per centage of these come back to lives of purity and go out to live righteously.

"Jesus said unto her, (the woman who had lost her way), neither do I condemn thee; go, and sin no more."

During the past year the balance of the debt on Rest Cottage has been lifted, for which we praise the Lord. Rest Cottage needs, and must have, your continued prayers and liberal financial support.

Our Pastors and People

As District Superintendent during the year I have enjoyed the loyal and congenial spirit of fellowship of our pastors and people. I have every reason to believe that they have done their best to help make my task of supervising the district work as easy for me as possible.

I have done my best with my ministry to help our churches along

spiritual lines; I have also with my limited ability and understanding done my best to help our pastors and people with their business and financial problems.

I feel that the advanced ground taken by our church during the past year on the district is not due to my imperfect leadership but is largely due to the wisdom of our pastors and the loyalty of our people. During the past year two of our church buildings on the district have been remodeled—one at Muskegon and one at Applegate; also one new building at Port Huron has been erected and one new basement at Flint has been built. The architecture and workmanship of these buildings are a credit to our pastors and people and also to the district. It has been my privilege to officiate in the dedication of three of these buildings.

Conclusion

I am concerned for the best interests of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, both at home and abroad, and also for the welfare of our pastors, missionaries, evangelists, teachers and people.

I am pleased to note the gifts of our pastors, missionaries, evangelists, teachers and the loyalty of our people, the growth of our congregations, the increase of our membership, and the general prosperity of our church; however, if our general prosperity is going to bank our spiritual fires, the cry of my heart is, less of the earthly and more of the heavenly. The future success of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, at home or abroad, depends upon the intensity of deep spirituality.

Culture, eloquence, oratory, beautiful voices, splendid singing, good music, the multiplying of machinery by way of intense organization within the church, fine church buildings, the maintaining of schools, the gathering of a great membership, and of great wealth, or the building up of a great reputation among men—none of these, or the entire group united, can ever take the place of the Holy Ghost within the church, or a close walk with the Lord, which means deep spirituality, revealed to the world through holy and pious character.

If we as a church lose our spirituality, we will lose our identity and become like the nations around us.

> "When we walk with the Lord, In the light of His Word, What a glory He sheds on our way! While we do His good will, He abides with us still, And with all who will trust and obey."

RESOLUTIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS ADOPTED BY THE ASSEMBLY

1. We, the Committee on Home and Foreign Missions, recommend that the major portion of all moneys raised in the District for Home Missions be expended in a more permanent manner than hitherto; such as the placing of pastors on new fields and aiding same until such a time when their work shall be self-supporting. We do further recommend that all Home Mission money be disbursed by the District Council.

2. We do further recommend that there be a fund created by the assessment of \$1.50 of all assessable members of the District and that out of this fund a sum equal to \$1.00 per member be paid for Home Missions, the sum of twenty-five cents per member shall be used to pay the District Secretary and District Treasurer \$50.00 each for their services; and twenty-five cents per member shall be paid for the General Superintendent. All overage is to be used under the direction of the District Council.

3. We do further recommend that, inasmuch as the work and needs of Home Missions are so important to the growth of the District work, each pastor, where it is possible, shall donate ten days of his time this year to revival effort in a new place, with the view of opening up new work; and the church which he serves shall donate the support he would have received toward the same cause.

4. We, the Committee on Resolutions, do hereby recommend that our next Assembly be held the third full week in April. Such change seems necessary in order that our local church officers and District Statistician may have ample time after the close of the Conference year to prepare their reports. We do further recommend that at the close of the Conference year, each local church shall forward its report to the District Statistician.

5. We do hereby recommend that our District Superintendent be paid the sum of thirty-five dollars per week, and that he be allowed twenty-five dollars per month for traveling expenses. We further recommend that the District Superintendent turn in all offerings to the District Treasurer to apply on his salary, the balance of salary to . be raised as follows:

Each pastor is to subscribe, at this time, the amount for which his church shall be responsible, the same to be paid in quarterly installments. We further recommend that the chairman take these subscriptions immediately, and that the District Secretary take the matter up with the churches not represend here.

ter up with the churches not represented here. 6. We furher recommend that our District Superintendent visit the churches of the district at least three times during the year for the purpose of holding quarterly meetings.

7. We recommend that our District Council be empowered to act, when in their judgment the local situation becomes such that the life of a local church demands their intervention.

8. Inasmuch as there has been a noticeable tendency upon the part of the ministers and delegates to the District to leave before the Assembly is concluded, and this same widespread tendency has caused noticeable trouble and inconvenience in the making of reports and the transaction of business incident to the work of the District, be it resolved that hereafter all of the ministers and delegates to our Annual Assembly be required to stay during the entire course of said Assembly unless they are able to present a valid excuse for their leaving which shall be accepted by the Conference as a whole.
