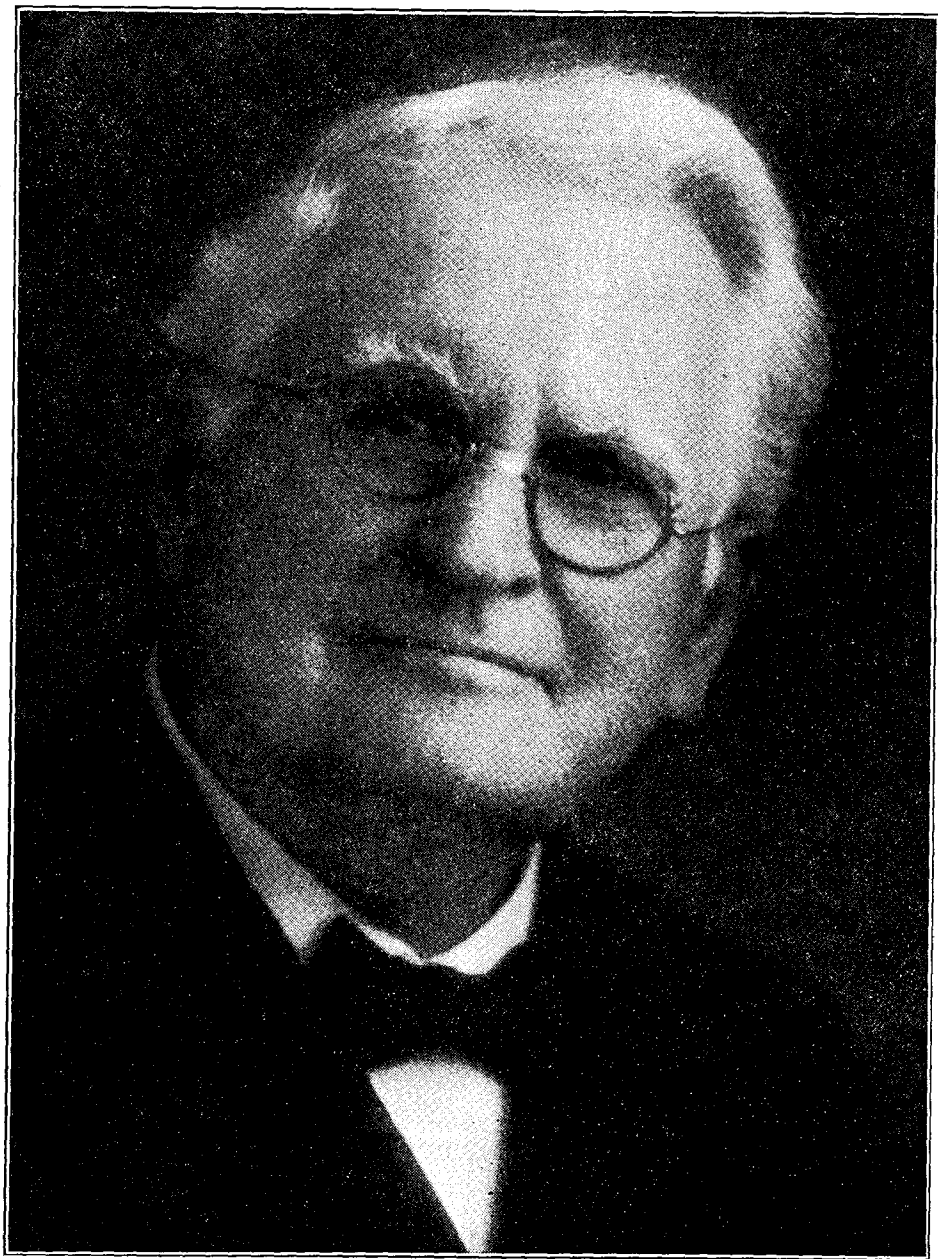

# JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

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## FIRST SITTING

Wednesday Morning, April 20, 9:00 O'Clock.

The first sitting opened with devotional service led by Sister E. F. Ewers. Rev. Seth C. Rees, general superintendent, took the chair. Roll call was given.

By motion, the bar of the assembly was fixed to include the first eight seats in the front of the church.

Moved and supported that the morning sessions convene at nine and adjourn at eleven-thirty, and that the afternoon session convene at two-thirty and adjourn at five. Carried.

Moved and supported that the district superintendent appoint the various committees. Committees were appointed.

Reports were then given by the pastors and delegates from the following churches: Battle Creek, Grand Rapids, Detroit First, Bellaire, Ellsworth Circuit, Detroit Second, Lansing, Port Huron, and Merrill.

By motion the reports of pastors were limited to three minutes and delegates, six minutes. Sitting adjourned by expiration of time.

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## SECOND SITTING

Wednesday Afternoon, Two-Thirty

Devotionals led by M. G. Bassett and E. F. Ewers. Rev. C. E. Cliff, district superintendent, took the chair. Minutes of the previous sitting read and approved. The roll was called, as listed with the secretary.

Rev. M. G. Bassett, J. F. Woods, Ira Akers, C. P. Pridgen, C. M. Brown and wife, and Lawrence Hoffman, visiting ministers were brought forward and introduced to the assembly. By motion these people were given a place in the conference bar.

Reports were given by the pastors and delegates from the following churches: Muskegon, Owosso, Pigeon, Flint Second, Flint Third, Applegate, and Flint First.

Rev. Lash, visiting minister was brought forward and introduced to the assembly.

By motion the time for election of district officers was set for Friday morning at 9 o'clock.

By motion, Rev. J. C. Brillhart favored the assembly with a special song.

Sitting adjourned by expiration of time.

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### THIRD SITTING

#### Thursday Morning at 9 O'Clock

Devotional service led by Rev. A. M. Frink. Rev. Rees in the chair.

Brother Rees addressed the assembly on "True Holiness". After the calling of the roll, the minutes of the previous sitting were read and approved.

Rev. Cross and Rev. Fairburn, visiting ministers of the Free Methodist Church were introduced to the assembly and given a place on the floor.

Rev. Fortress, of Jackson, was also introduced and given privileges of the floor.

The auditing committee reported that the books of the district treasurer were found to be O. K.

The books of Bible Holiness Seminary showed a surplus of thirty-three cents, and the Assistant Treasurer of Bible Holiness Seminary a surplus of twelve cents. The report adopted.

Reports were given by A. M. Frink, treasurer of Bible Holiness Seminary; and Emma E. Brown, matron of Rest Cottage. Reports accepted.

Rev. P. W. Thomas, general secretary, addressed the assembly for one-and-a-half hours on the matter of the General Budget and other matters of vital interest to our people.

Adjourned by expiration of time.

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### FOURTH SITTING

#### Thursday Afternoon at 2:30

Devotions led by C. B. Greenman and C. E. Cliff. Rev. Rees in the chair.

Minutes of previous session read and approved.

The Committee on Resolutions presented resolution No. 1 with reference to designation territory for evangelists adopted.

Resolution No. 2 concerning Young Peoples Society referred for re-drafting.

Resolution No. 3 regarding reports accepted.

Resolution No. 4 regarding Memorial service accepted.

The committee on Ministerial Convention made a recommendation concerning the time and place of the next ministerial meeting. This recommendation lost.

The committee on resolutions presented the recommendation concerning stationing committee. Recommendation rejected.

It was moved and supported that our next annual assembly be held at Owosso. Motion carried.

It was moved and supported that the general superintendent fix the date of our next assembly. The superintendent set the first Tuesday in April as the date for the beginning of our next assembly.

It was moved and supported that the general superintendent be given fifteen minutes at this time to present matters which he had upon his heart. Brother Rees addressed the assembly on the work of the Pilgrim Holiness Church in South America and the West Indies.

It was moved and supported that we have five hundred copies of the minutes printed; that Brother Rees cut be placed on the front cover and that the pictures of Sister Churchford, Brother Strong, and Brother Woodcock be placed on the Memorial page.

It was moved and supported that the Young People's committee be given one hour Saturday afternoon to present the interests of the young people.

The matter of the deficit in last year's minutes fund was presented and an offering of \$52.00 was raised in cash and pledges to apply on same.

Rev. E. Boone presented the matter of application blank and covenant for membership applicants. This proposition was accepted by the assembly.

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## FIFTH SITTING

Friday Forenoon at 9 O'Clock

Devotions led by Rev. Geo. Lounds. The general superintendent in the chair. Minutes of the previous sitting read and approved.

The election of district officers was the order of the day, and was immediately taken up. Tellers were appointed by the district superintendent as follows:

Goy Miller, H. Dafoe, Hugh Miller, H. D. Clements, A. Osborn.

The elections resulted in the following:

For district superintendent on fourth ballot, A. M. Frink.

S. I. Emery on fourth ballot, assistant superintendent.

L. W. Sturk on first ballot, district secretary.

B. E. Manker on first ballot, for treasurer.

On Board of Trustees of Bible Holiness Seminary for three-year period:

S. I. Emery, Carl Hightower, H. J. Boone.

Advisory members of the council:

C. E. Cliff, J. C. Brillhart, and James Thompson.

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## SIXTH SITTING

Friday P. M. at 2:30 O'Clock

At two-thirty, Rev. Cliff took the chair. Minutes of the previous sitting were read and approved and the assembly proceeded with the election. Rev. C. E. Cliff was elected to serve on the board of examiners, term 1932 to 1937.

A motion was made and supported that the district superintendent and secretary should nominate candidates for the office of district trustee. Geo. Dafoe, Low Grumbly, and Dan Loew were nominated. Geo. Dafoe was elected to fill the place left vacant by the death of Bro. Strong. Term 1929 to 1934.

J. R. Walker and G. E. Webster were nominated for district trustee, regular term, 1932 to 1937. The balloting resulted in the election of Bro. Webster.

The balloting for trustee of Rest Cottage resulted in the election of P. F. Elliott. J. S. Hayton was elected on the board of Rest Cottage to take the place left vacant by the resignation of S. I. Emery.

By a standing vote, Sister Strong's appointment to Rest Cottage was verified.

It was moved and supported that the district council appoint an auditing committee for next year.

It was moved and supported that the district superintendent appoint a statistical committee in the first sitting of next year's assembly. Carried.

The resolution presented by the committee on resolutions regarding young people's organizations, and referred back to the committee for redrafting presented and carried.

The auditing committee reported to have found the books of Rest Cottage O. K. Report accepted.

The committee on Home Missions presented three recommendations. (Found elsewhere.) These were all accepted by the assembly.

Sitting adjourned at 5 o'clock.

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## SEVENTH SITTING

Saturday Morning at 9 o'clock

Devotions were led by Brother Hoos. C. E. Cliff took the chair. Minutes of previous sitting read and approved.

The district council presented the names of candidates for license. Recommendation was accepted.

S. I. Emery and E. Boone were elected out of four nominees presented by the district council, to serve on the Young Peoples' Council.

Brother Hoffman favored the assembly with a special song.

The committee on resolutions presented recommendation having to do with the discouraging of licensing men and women to preach the gospel who are not ready to enter active work of the ministry.

It was moved and supported that from three to four be given to the interest of Bible Holiness Seminary.

A. T. Harris gave the statistical report which was accepted.

Sitting adjourned by expiration of time.

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## EIGHTH SITTING

Saturday Afternoon at 3 O'Clock.

The first hour of the afternoon session was given to the organization of the young people of the district. Rev. C. E. Cliff was asked to take the chair and the young people proceeded to elect out of the six names presented by the district council three persons to serve as president, vice-president, and secretary-treasurer. The balloting resulting in the election of: Morton Goodman, president, Loren Swanson, vice-president, and Ila Bruce, secretary-treasurer.

A splendid interest was taken in this service, there being about fifty present and voting.

Rev. Cliff in the chair. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

According to previous action the representatives of Bible Holiness Seminary were given one hour to present the interests of the school.

The matter of school representatives of Bible Holiness Seminary were given one hour to present the interests of the school.

Nearly all the pastors agreed to push the love-offering chart proposition.

It was moved and supported that we take an offering for our retiring district superintendent. This was followed by an affectionate expression of appreciation for the offering and the cooperation of the brethren of the district by the district superintendent.

It was moved and supported that the assembly give a rising vote of thanks to Brother Cliff, in appreciation of his faithful services during the past years.

Bro. Houston favored the assembly with a special song.

It was moved and supported that we adopt the Budget for our district for the coming year. Same to be set by the Budget committee.

By motion, the same men who served last year on the budget committee were named to succeed themselves for the coming year.



Moved and supported that an explanation of the Budget plan be inserted in the minutes. Carried.

The district council recommended that the following persons be ordained: Morton Goodman, William P. Arnold, Lillian Lash, Lester Nelsen, Jess Sandberg, and H. D. Clements. This recommendation accepted.

It was moved and supported that H. Boone and E. A. Haskins be appointed to re-arrange the reports for publishing in the minutes.

It was moved and supported that the deficit of \$88.00 in the district funds be pro-rated to the churches of the district and brought before the people by the district superintendent. Motion carried.

The assembly adjourned with benediction by Rev. J. S. Hayton.

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### RESOLUTIONS

1. We recommend that this Assembly authorize the district council to place its approval on such as have Evangelistic gifts; and be authorized to designate time and territory involved, relative to their labors.

2. We hereby recommend that hereafter, we dispense with the reading of all reports, with the exception of the Ministerial, Official, and Institutional Reports, providing the omitted reports are spread on the minutes.

3. We recommend that this Assembly have a Memorial Service in behalf of those ministers of the District who passed away during the past year. Said service to be in charge of the district superintendent.

4. We recommend that the district superintendent hold two quarterly meetings in each church each year, and that he devote the remainder of his time to Home Missionary and Church Extension work. In event that any church should desire a third or fourth meeting, he may engage either the assistant superintendent or a nearby pastor to hold such meeting, and he who holds said meeting shall take an offering for the district superintendent out of which his traveling expenses are to be paid and the balance to be forwarded to the district treasurer.

5. We recommend that each church in the Michigan district raise fifty per cent of their district budget quota for Home Missions within sixty days, the same to be forwarded to the district treasurer, and that this money be used exclusively for church extension work in new territory.

6. We recommend that this Assembly elect a committee of three on Church extension, the chairman of which shall be the district superintendent. The other two on this committee shall be elected from a nomination of four by the district council.

7. We recommend the following By-Laws to govern the organization of the Young People of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the Michigan District.

### NAME

The district organization of the Young People of the Pilgrim Holiness Church shall be called the Pilgrim Holiness Young People's Society.

## PURPOSE

The object of this organization shall be to build up its Young People in Christian character, to instruct them in the doctrines of the church, and to bring about the salvation of the young people of the community. It purposes to hold the young people in the church by means of mutual help and inspiration that district and zone meetings shall furnish. Again it purposes to aid in bringing about a unified effort in personal evangelism with the aid of the various pastors.

## DISTRICT SOCIETY

There shall be a district advisory council consisting of a president, vice-president, secretary-treasurer, and the district superintendent. These shall labor under the jurisdiction of the district council. (Church).

Members of the advisory council shall be elected at the annual Young People's Convention and shall hold office for the period of one year, providing their spirit and conduct conforms to the requirements of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. In case of vacancy, an appointment shall be made by the district council, for the term of expiration.

## ZONE SOCIETIES

The district shall be divided into seven zones, each of which shall be presided over by a zone leader, appointed and governed by the advisory council.

Zone meetings shall be conducted on the last Friday of every month under the supervision of the zone leader who is guided by the advisory council.

## LOCAL SOCIETIES

The local organizations shall be effected according to the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, section 82, paragraph three and four. For dismissal of members, the procedure shall be followed according to section 82, paragraph six, seven, and eight.

We recommend that weekly devotional services be held at the time most convenient for the local organization, not to conflict with the zone meetings. These shall consist of a song service, prayer, remarks, by an appointed leader, testimonies, and altar services when the Spirit leads. These meetings shall comply with the directions given in the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, section 82, paragraph 5.

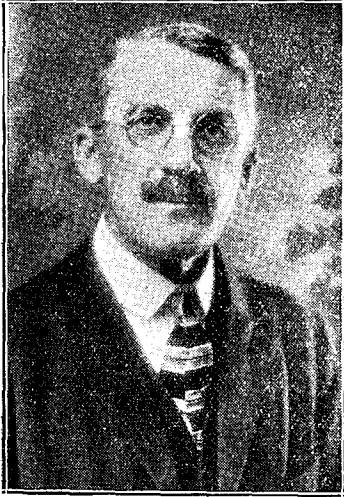
## FINANCES

Each local organization will be responsible to the state advisory council for the amount of a monthly assessment of ten cents per member to defray the expenses involved.

8. Whereas, there are so many applicants for district license by young men who are not actively engaged in the ministry; nor ready for such activity: Be it therefore Resolved, That no such license be granted any applicant until actively engaged. Be it further Resolved, That our pastors discourage the recommendation of unstationed ministers for district license.

## MEMORIALS

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November 14, 1931, marked the Home going of Rev. J. E. Strong, Battle Creek, Mich. Not only has the local P. H. Church of Battle Creek suffered a great loss, but the P. H. Church in general; also the Foreign Missionary work to which he had contributed so liberally. This noble Christian character did not have to depart this life in order to be well spoken of. His devoted service to God and his friendship to humanity won for him a wealth of friends. In the Battle Creek church he was assistant pastor, class leader, and teacher of the men's Bible class, and he was held in high esteem because of his deep spirituality and steady walk with God. He so walked and talked with God that he had a wonderful insight into and apprehension of Divine and spiritual things. He lived a high standard of Christian perfection; so much so, that his father-in-law, Rev. Geo. B. Kulp, stated that "He never saw him do anything out of the way that would demand a rebuke."—Rev. J. C. Brillhart, pastor.

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Robert A Woodcock was born in Ontario, July 7, 1871. He came to Michigan when three years old, and lived in Midland with his parents. He was married there in 1895 to Miss Elizabeth Kane. Soon after his marriage he was soundly converted in an old time Methodist Revival. Soon after that hearing the truth on the second work of grace, sought earnestly for the blessing and received a wonderful baptism of Holy Fire, and was definitely called to preach, and he gave the message with unction and power, and many sought and found God under his preaching. He was known thru-out Michigan for his strong faith in Divine Healing. He anointed and prayed for many and they were wonderfully healed. He met death as he had lived with a strong faith in Jesus Christ, and during his brief sickness caused by being kicked by a horse, there was not a complaint or murmur from him. He carried the same smile that he had carried thru-out life. The summons was sudden but he was ready. Nearly the last words he said were, "I hear the Angels singing." He was much loved by his family and friends, and he has left a vacancy that none can fill.—Rev. P. F. Elliott, pastor.



# MEMORIALS

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Miss Nellie Churchford came to Holland in June, 1902. Her intentions were to hold a series of meetings in a tent, but her work was so blessed both in attendance and souls that she was prevailed on by the people of Holland to continue her work here.

This work was carried on with some very strong opposition because of the definite teaching of regeneration, sanctification, healing and Christ's Second Coming. But with the opposition came also marvelous success, until scores have been saved, many scattered all over the states and some out preaching the Gospel. Her work was largely among the poor and unfortunate.

While in Holland, Miss Churchford graduated from the Scofield Bible School taking a correspondence course and was also ordained a Minister of the Gospel by the Pilgrim Holiness Association at Battle Creek, of which association she was a member until she was called Home, Dec. 6, 1931.

The work she has begun is still being carried on, begun in a tent in 1902, carried on in various buildings, until a beautiful mission was built to her honor and dedicated Oct. 16, 1927. Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth: Yea, saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labors; and their works do follow them. Rev. 14:13.— Mrs. H. Blink.

## THE BUDGET SYSTEM EXPLAINED

### A Three-fold budget system: General Budget, District Budget, and Local Budget

In working the Budget System one of the first things necessary is to arrive at some approximate figure which you feel you will be able to raise during the coming year and classify your church in either the A, B, C, D, E, or F Class according to the following table. This calculation, of course, may best be obtained from your last year's figures. Also remember that all money paid out for building purposes or indebtedness may be deducted from this budget percentage system. For example, you plan to raise \$1,500.00 this year, but \$500.00 of this will be paid on a new building or on an old indebtedness; that would leave you only \$1,000.00 to be divided and place you in Class F.

As for the method of raising your budget, this is left to the best judgment of the Local Church; however it should be remitted to the District Treasurer so he will receive it not later than the tenth of each month.

It will be in much better keeping with our Budget system if you would send both your General and District Budget money unspecified, and be assured that the same will be divided according to the table inclosed.

Relative to the Local Budget: it is in the power of the church board to change the percentages of this fund from the given table if by so doing it may be made more satisfactory.
