STANDING RULES

1. Conference Year

The Conference year shall close June 30th, and complete reports must be reviewed by the local boards and forwarded directly to the District Statistician, Rev. A. C. Doehring, 725 Grand Avenue, Owosso, Michigan by July 15th. All reports received after July 15th shall be omitted from the yearly report.

2. Funds.

Each church shall raise for the general budget the equivalent of \$.50 per member per year for general administration expense; \$.60 for general home missions; plus \$1.90 per member for foreign missions.

home missions; plus \$1.90 per member for foreign missions. They shall also raise for district budget the equivalent of \$3.00 per member, divided as follows: Home 60%. District 20%, District Supt. 14%, Ministerial Relief 3%, General Assembly Delegate 3%.

3. Bible School Fund.

Each church shall raise for the Bible School Fund the equivalent of \$1.50 per member per year, pastor included at same rate. All money raised for the Bible School Fund, plus other Bible School offerings, shall be sent to the Bible School treasurer, Rev. H. T. Mills, 1020 S. Washington Street, Owosso, Michigan.

4. Ministerial Tithes.

One-half of all ministerial tithes shall be turned to the support of the district superintendent.

5. District and General Funds.

All monies raised in the local church for district and general funds shall be sent to the district treasurer, who shall forward general funds to the general treasurer.

6. District Official's Salaries.

The District Superintendent's salary is fixed at a minimum of \$2800.00 per year, plus 3 cents a mile for traveling expenses. The District Treasurer shall receive \$100.00 per year and the District Secretary shall receive \$100.00 per year.

7. Pastor's Camp-Meeting Expense

Inasmuch as our pastors are expected to support and attend the Annual Camp Meeting, each church shall provide the equivalent of the pastor's offering or salary; for the two Sundays of the camp, and that the pastors be privileged to attend the entire Camp Meeting.

8. Examining Board.

The District Superintendent shall be chairman of the examining board by virtue of his office.

9. Camp Meeting Expense.

Churches are to be rated according to their financial strength and part of the Camp Meeting expense shall be raised among the churches of the district. The District Council shall pro-rate the expense among the churches. The ministers' wives and their children sixteen years old and under shall be entertained free of charge.

All money raised for Camp Meeting expense should be in the hands of the District Treasurer not later than thirty days prior to the Camp Meeting.

10. Resolutions.

Inasmuch as many resolutions are presented to this committee without signature:

Therefore, be it resolved, that no resolution be presented to this conference until it has been typewritten and signed.

Be it further resolved, that this resolution be made a standing rule in this conference.

11. Home Missionary Pastors.

All active home missionary pastors, and all active pastors receiving no more support than our home missionary pastors, shall receive free entertainment throughout conference and Camp-meeting.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

FIRST SITTING

The first sitting of the 43rd Annual Conference of the Michigan District of the Pilgrim Holiness Churches convened at 8:30 A. M. July 29th, 1943 at Seminary Park, Owosso, Michigan. Congregational singing was led by Rev. G. V. Skinner with Rev. Henry

Alexander at the piano.

Prayer was offered by Rev. H. B. Kreider.

Rev. B. O. Shattuck read the Scripture lesson from 1 Cor. 13. Rev. J.R. Thompson, district superintendent, who had presided, surrendered the chair to Rev. W. L. Surbrook, general superintendent, who used as a text II Cor. 4: 5; then brought a message divided under three headings, "Religion, Ruts and Revivals."

The roll was called by the secretary, Rev. M. L. Goodman. Motion prevailed to seat Mrs. Fred Stalker as a delegate from Arcadia. Motion prevailed to seat Mrs. Carl Messer as a delegate.

Motion prevailed to seat Mrs. B. A. Kraatz as a delegate.

Moved and seconded that the following ministers be received into the conference: Dr. C. E. Moran, Rev. J. C. Brillhart, Rev. M. C. Kittle and Rev. Clare Elkins Carried.

Moved and seconded that C. E. Lucas, pastor at Dearborn, be seated in conference. Carried.

The first ten seats in the tabernacle and the platform were fixed as the conference bar.

Rev. D. P. Price was chosen to assist the secretary.

The hours for sittings were f xed from 9:00 A. M. to 12:00, 2:00 P. M. to 5:00 P. M., and 7:00 to 9:00 P. M.

Moved and seconded that the district superintendent be authorized to appoint committees. Carried.

Rev. J. R. Thompson, district superintendent, announced the appointment of Mrs.H. T. Mills to the committee on memorials, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Rev. Mrs. J. E. Strong.

The District Superintendent read his annual message and report. Motion prevailed that it be accepted.

TO THE FORTY-THIRD ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE MICHIGAN DISTRICT OF THE PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH:

Greetings in the Name of Him who has called us from the dark domain of sin to wonderful liberty and peace in the Holy Spirit.

In gratitude to God for His blessings and favors bestowed upon us as a district, we may well join with Paul saying, "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, who hath blessed us with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ; according as He has chosen us in Him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame before Him in love, and we should be to the praise of His glory who first trusted in Christ.'

By the mercies and favors of God we have come through another year to this annual conference. during which time onr ministers and laymen have gone through many distressing conditions and perplexing problems. Sorrow. caused by death. has entered a number of our Pilgrim homes and many sad partings, because of our young men leaving for the never failing arm of God has supported His own. "His eye is upon the righteous and His ear is open to their cries." Thank God for the unfaltering hand which has guided us in the past and which will guide us in the unpredictable future. He will dispell all clouds and distressing fears if we but trust Him.

In this world of confusion and aggressiveness of evil we must hold dear the faith and the Bible standards of Christian living, which are established in our hearts by the Holy Spirit. Never was there a time when we should seek the leadership of the Holy Spirit more than now. In this time of distress and confusion the church needs One who can see into the future and guide her in paths of righteousness; no one needs fear the ability of the blessed Holy Spirit to do th s. The church of other years has passed through the testings and, no doubt, there are fierce testings for her in the future, but with the Holy Spirit as her leader, and the promise of the Savior that "the gates of hell shall not prevail against her", our faith should reach out in an even greater inclusiveness while we work for Him in the ripened harvest field which is ready for the reapers.

This year brought many difficult problems due to the national emergency. The induction of nearly all able-bodied young men into the armed forces, and also the moving of so many families to defense centers, has drawn heavily on our constituency in several sections. The passing of our highly esteemed sister and fr.end, Rev. Mrs. J. E. Strong, of Battle Creek, is a distinct loss to the church. From this Godly character radiated a holy influence which was felt throughout the Holiness movement. Rev. J. W. Smith of Lansing, who lived close to the Lord passed to his reward during the year. To hear him weep and pray over the church and needy souls reminded one of the patriarchs of old. Rev. and Mrs. L. C. Philo, who are very much appreciated in the district, suffered the loss of a son, Daniel, who was known as Danny and was loved by all. Danny will be m ssed on the campus when school opens this fall. God, who never errs in judgment, called them from life's stormy sea to the glorious calm of eternal life, where they shall shine as the stars of the morning. Thank God we shall meet again at that happy reunion on the fair banks of glad deliverance.

While our loss of these is keenly felt, God has enabled the church to march steadily on. Our ministers and laymen have shown great courage and faith while battling the unseen forces of evil constantly trying to undermine Christianity. There is evidence among our people of a deeper vision and a growing interest in God's work. This is not only true of the district but is also true of the general church interests. It is evident we stand ready to co-operate in all it's work.

We cannot cla m any great gain numerically, but spiritually our church has made splendid progress, many have enjoyed good revivals and times of out-pouring of the Spirit. The communion services have been especially owned and blessed of God, making one feel he was on holy ground.

In addition to the churches growing spiritually, many have taken advantage of the increase of the flow of revenue and have liquidated their property debts. It has been the privilege of your servant to assist in several mortgage-burning services this year. Besides the liquidating of debts, several churches have made necessary repairs and some have purchased new property. The work at Muskegon, under the supervision of Rev. D. P. Pr ce, is much more encouraging now than it has been for years. They recently purchased a new parsonage on Washington avenue, and are making needed repairs which, when finished will make this property a credit to the church. The church at Pontiac, having had to rent a place of worship for years, now is enjoying a new church home. They are making commendable progress under the leadership of Rev. R. C. Hawkins. The congregation has increased, making it necessary to enlarge the new building. Rev. Orville Smith of St. Clair Shores has a growing work They recently enjoyed a very good revival and now have plans on foot to enlarge their place of worship. The congregation at Ecorse, under the leadership of T. H. Myers, has purchased new pews and pulpit constructed frem red elm which will add beauty to their newly decorated church. Rev. L. N. Nelsen, at the Lapeer Road church of Flint, is doing a good work of repairing, and is also enlarging the parsonage. Rev. L. R. Neff of Ann Arbor is repairing the church which will add to its value and convenience. Rev. E. C. Swanson at Ellsworth has improved his church by completing the basement and building an addition on the south end. Rev. C. E. Cliff, and his splendid people at Port Huron, have purchased a new parsonage on Lapeer avenue to take care of a long standing need. It can rightly be said of our ministers and laymen that they have an aggressive spirit, and what they have done this year by the help of the Lord is a testimony that they can do even better in the future.

OUR HOME MISSIONARY WORK. Owing to national conditions, church extension work has been more difficult this year; however, this has not retarded our work in this field as God is blessing our home missionaries. Rev. E. G. Ritenburgh, in the work at Marquette, felt for some time that it would be a benefit, as well as a blessing to our work to get on the air with a good spiritual program. By the contributions of several churches and individuals, he has been able to launch a fourteenweek broadcast. Rev. Paul Hollman at Munising is progressing nicely. By the co-operation of the people in that little northern city, the church has been able to buy a lot on a contract and is now working on plans to build a church. Rev. Hollman and wife by careful living, have gained the confidence of the business men of that city. Rev. Miss Ruth Alexander, at Cheboygan, is doing a good work. Under her able leadership, they have outgrown their first place of worship and have recently rented a larger place in a more suitable location. She has also won the confidence of the people.

Rev. P. H. Emlinger is doing a noble work at Bay City. While he has lived there less than one year, God has blessed his labors until we have an organ zed church; also we have purchased a building in which to worship. Rev. Nelson Miller of Dryden has labored faithfully and, with the splendid co-operation of his people, has been able to purchase a schoolhouse and has had it moved to the church lot. This work was launched three years ago with Rev. H. S. Bennett and Rev. Russell Mohl and wife holding the first meeting. They have been using the "George B. Kulp" portable tabernacle for a place of worship. They are now off the home miss onary list, being self-supporting, and have been organized into a Pilgrim Holiness church. In addition to being self-supporting, they raised the money among their own people to buy the schoolhouse and pay for moving it to the church lot. Rev. Paul DeGrandchamp, who has been faithful to the church, launched a new work at Utica and now has a newly constructed church building. This new work is also organized and is a self-supporting Pilgrim Holiness church. Our Grace Street church at Lansing, under the leadership of Rev. A. H. Williams is now self-supporting. Through the vision of and interest in church extension work of the eastern zone, we have been able to launch a new work at Willow Run. The people of that zone gave the money to buy a lot at the corner of Jerome and Forest Streets. Rev. & Mrs. Herbert Diller are the workers there and are getting a splendid start in that rapidly growing section. Our laymen have shown a growing interest in church extension work and have given every evidence of being willing "to go a little farther" by giving liberally to this work Several churches are supporting workers in this field, over and above the regular budget.

I am happy to tell you that it has been a pleasure this year to work with the pastors and laymen of the district. The greatest courtesy and kindest regard have been given to your servant. In all the problems of the district the ministers have shown a willingness to share in every burden in order to advance the work of the Lord. Having been royally entertained in the homes of the pastors and laymen, has made me feel indebted to them. What has been said of the ministry can rightly be said of Bible Holiness Seminary. President Mills and his staff have co-operated most beautifully in the work of the district. With almost endless labors falling upon the President, I have never found him too busy to co-operate.

Moved and seconded that the report be accepted. Carried.

Rev. A. F. Osborn, district treasurer, read the treasurer's report. Moved and seconded that it be accepted. Carried.

Rev. H. T. Mills submitted the treasurer's report for Bible Holiness Seminary. Moved and seconded that it be accepted. Carried.

Rev. Russell Mohl submitted the report of the young people's societies by zones. Moved and seconded that it be accepted. Carried.

The resolutions committee submitted the following resolution which was read by Rev. Calvin Hendricks:

Be it resolved, that all active home missionary pastors be entertained free during conference and Camp-meeting.

Be it further resolved, that any other active pastor receiving no more support from his church than our home missionary pastors, receive entertainment free during the camp meeting and conference.

Be it resolved further, that this be placed on the minutes as a standing rule.

On motion which was seconded the resolution carried.

Motion prevailed to recess until 2: 00 P. M.

FIRST SITTING-Continued

The conference reconvened at 2:00 P. M. with General Superintendent Surbrook in the chair.

Song Service was led by Rev. G. V. Skinner with Rev. H. Alexander at the piano.

Prayers were offered by Rev. B. O. Shattuck and Rev. H. T. Mills. Recomendations were read from the district council for the ordination of the following: Paul DeGrandchamp, Russell Hoover, Vernon Dragoo. And for licenses to be granted as follows: Three year: Theron Bearup, Raymond Dean, Mrs. Raymond Dean, Clare Elkins, Mrs. T. M. Fast, Mrs. Bernice Goodrich, A. C. Hoos. Carl Messer, Miss Clara Sherman, Orville Smith, Fred Stalker, Ernest Thomas: Two year: John Bare, Paul Hollman, Norval Rickner, Miss Aleta Sinkey, A. H. Williams, Miss Hazel Yewey; And One year: Kermit Boyce, Grant Blakely, LeRoy Bruce, Lawrence Hoffman, Charles Lucas, Harry Rhines, Lawrence L, Taylor, Ivan Steed.

Motion made and seconded that these recommendations be approved. Carried.

The conference proceeded with the election of officers.

Rev. J. R. Thompson, district superintendent, appointed the following to act as tellers: Clare Elkins, R. C. Hawkins, G. V. Skinner, Nelson Miller, Carl Messer and Harold Rickner.

Rev. J. R. Thompson was elected district superintendent.

Motion made and seconded that the district superintendent be given two weeks vacation with pay. Carried.

Rev. M. L. Goodman was elected assistant district superintendent.

Rev. D. P. Price was elected district secretary.

Rev. A. F. Osborn was elected district treasurer. Rev. L. C. Philo was elected a member of the examining board to succeed himself

Rev. George Lounds was elected a trustee of Michigan district for a term of three years.

Motion made and seconded to extend the time of this session to 5: 30 P. M. Carried.

Ballots were cast for five advisory members of the council and also for three trustees of Bible Holiness Seminary. Tellers were instructed to count ballots and report later.

Motion made and seconded to adjourn until 7:00 P. M.

SECOND SITTING

The second sitting of the 43rd Annual Conference of the Michigan District of the Pilgrim Holiness Churches opened at 7:00 P. M. July 29th, 1943. Congregational singing was led by Rev. Gaylord Skinner with Rev. Henry Alexander at the piano.

Prayer was offered by Rev. A. S. Joppie.

Motion was made and seconded to dispense with calling of the roll. Carried.

The minutes of the first sitting were read and approved.

Reports of the tellers were as follows: Rev. A. C. Doehring, Rev. B. O. Shattuck, Rev. C. E. Cliff, Rev. L. R. Neff, and Rev. A. S. Joppie were elected to the district council; and Rev. W. L. Surbrook, Rev. H. T. Mills and Rev. L. R. Neff were elected trustees of Bible Holiness Seminary.

Rev. Mrs. E. F. Ewers read memorials to Rev. John Wesley Smith and Rev. Mrs Sadie Kulp Strong, which had been prepared by the memorial committee.

Motion made and seconded that the memorials be accepted. Carried. Mrs. Seth C. Rees was invited to the platform by the Chair and gave a cheering testimory.

The secretary called the roll to determine the number of minutes of the conference to be printed. Each minister was asked to announce the number of Advocate subscriptions his church would endeavor to secure during the fiscal year. The total amounted to 1044.

Moved and seconded that the matter of determining whether or not to hold another ministerial institute, be left with the district council. Carried.

Moved and seconded that there be five hundred copies of the minutes printed. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the district council be authorized to create a Sunday School committee. Carried.

The Ways and Means committee submitted the following resolution:

Be it resolved, that the salaries of the district officials be fixed as follows: Dist. Supt. Salary \$2600.00 plus 3c a mile traveling expenses.

Secretary 100.00

Treasurer 100.00

Moved and seconded that the resolution be amended to provide that the salary of the district superintendent be fixed at \$2,800.00 as a minimum. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the original resolution as amended be adopted. Carried.

The Ways and Means committee submitted the following resolution: Be it resolved, that each church shall raise three dollars (\$3) per member for the district budget, which shall be apportioned as follows:

Home missions..... 60% General Assembly delegate....3% District expenses 20% Ministerial relief 3% District superintendent..... 14%

Moved and seconded that the resolution be adopted. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the district council be authorized to revise the budget percentages if the need arises. Carried. Moved and seconded that monies may be drawn from the district

superintendent's fund for the following purposes:

\$500.00 payment on district parsonage

Furnace for district parsonage

Roof for district parsonage

Carried.

Moved and seconded that the ordination service be held at this time. Carried.

The Ordination service opened with the congregation singing "A Charge to Keep I Have", lead by Rev. Gaylord Skinner with Rev. Henry Alexander at the piano.

Prayer was offered by Rev. A. F. Osborn.

Scriptures were read by:
