#### JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

Hastings, Michigan

August 1, 1956

#### FIRST SITTING

The first sitting of the 56th Annual Conference of the Michigan Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 1:00 p. m., August 1, 1956, at Hastings, Michigan, on the Wesleyan Methodist Camp Ground.

Rev. Vaughn Drummond led in the singing of "Down at the Cross" and "Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus." Mrs. Vaughn Drummond was at the piano. Rev. A. C. Doehring, assistant conference superintendent, led in prayer.

Rev. M. C. Kittle, conference superintendent, welcomed the delegates. He stated that our general superintendent, Rev. W. H. Neff, had written his regrets that he could not be present for this Conference. Rev. Kittle then introduced Dr. R. D. Gunsalus, second assistant general superintendent, as presiding officer of the Conference.

After response and personal greeting, Dr. Gunsalus brought greetings from Rev. W. H. Neff, general superintendent, whom he described as "a prince among us." He also conveyed greetings from the official family as expressed by Rev. Melvin Snyder, present acting general superintendent.

Dr. Gunsalus read a Scripture lesson from I Cor. 1:1-9. His short talk was based on these four points, namely:

- (1) Our Call
- (2) Our Relationship
- (3) Our Importance
- (4) Our God.

He then called the Conference to order by asking for the roll. Rev. M. L. Goodman, conference secretary, responded. The roll was approved after corrections were made.

It was moved and carried that we amend Standing Rule No. 9 on page 40 of the 1955 Journal to read, "The first eight rows shall constitute our Conference Bar."

Rev. W. L. Silvers and Rev. Vernon Draggoo were asked to serve as a reception committee.

Rev. M. L. Goodman gave a report of the Examining and Educational Board. It was moved and carried that we ratify the report of this Board.

Two churches with their pastors and delegates were presented by Rev. Kittle and given seats within the Conference Bar. They were: Sterling Church with Rev. Bob Nelson as pastor; Miss Marion Seator as delegate. The Midland Church with Rev. Clifford Dean as pastor; Mrs. Elsie Drummond as delegate. Mrs. Clifford Dean, licensed minister, was also presented with the Midland Church. A recommendation came from the Council to accept several from other Conferences, namely:

Rev. and Mrs. Clifford Dean from the East Michigan Conference.

Rev. Joshua Stauffer from the Union Friends Church.

Rev. George L. Bruce from the East Michigan Conference.

Rev. David Shafer from the New York Conference.

Rev. and Mrs. William Stanley from the North Central Conference.

Rev. Pat LaFon from the West Virginia Conference.

Rev. Paul Davis from the Eastern Ohio Conference.

Rev. Hubert Traugh from the Eastern Ohio Conference.

Rev. Nevin Smith from the Pennsylvania-New Jersey Conference.

Rev. Charles Stewart from the North Central Conference.

It was moved and carried that we ratify this recommendation from the Council. Rev. Kittle, conference superintendent, gave them the right hand of fellowship. The Conference accepted these ministers by responding with a hearty "amen."

The reception committee presented the following visitors:

Rev. Nicholas Fair, Eastern Michigan Conference.

Rev. Paul Trissel, Church of the Nazarene.

Rev. M. C. Kittle, conference superintendent, read his report. It was moved and carried that this fine and detailed report be accepted by a rising vote of thanks.

Rev. A. C. Doehring, assistant conference superintendent, gave a verbal report. It was moved and carried that this report be accepted.

It was moved and carried that we accept the report of Earl Hayward, auditor, which covered all the financial reports to be read at the Conference.

Rev. J. H. Koteskey, conference treasurer, reported. It was moved and carried that we accept this report with appreciation and commendation.

Mrs. Lloyd Thompson, reported for the Conference Missionary Society. This report was accepted with appreciation and commendation.

Rev. G. E. Stace, treasurer of Owosso Bible College, gave a report. This fine report was accepted with warmth and commendation.

It was moved and carried that the detailed report of Rev. Stace be spread in the minutes. It was interesting to note that the Michigan churches gave \$22,551.92 toward Owosso Bible College this past year. Rev. Vernon Draggoo, district statistician, reported. Rev. Draggoo offered to do his best to complete the missionary society report and thus make the statistical report more complete. It was moved and carried that we accept the report with this understanding.

The following tellers were appointed: Lawrence Keesor, James Witmer, Clifford Dean, Vernon Randall, R. S. Miller, Charles Stewart, William Stanley, Robert Wasson.

Dr. Gunsalus called a short recess.

Miss Evelyn Ritenburgh of the Idaho-Washington District was introduced to the Conference and given an honorary seat within the bar.

Dr. W. L. Surbrook prayed before the election of Conference officers. The ballots were cast and the following officers were elected:

Rev. M. C. Kittle was elected superintendent of the Michigan Conference, for a two-year term.

Rev. A. C. Doehring was elected assistant superintendent of the Michigan Conference for one year.

The Conference Council presented nominees for the remaining officers to be elected:

Rev. M. L. Goodman was elected Conference secretary.

Rev. J. H. Koteskey was elected Conference treasurer.

A ballot was cast for the three advisory members to the Conference Council, with the understanding that the ballot be counted during the supper hour.

The Conference was adjourned by expiration of time. Rev. D. F. Price dismissed in prayer.

- (c) We have just closed a splendid Youth Camp that has reassured us that the youth of our church are ready to accept the challenge of tomorrow as it shall present itself to them. Rev. Eldon Schram, Youth Executive Secretary, and his splendid corps of workers deserve much praise for the Christ directed efforts. The zone rallies were well attended and fruitful.
- (d) The Sunday School Institute was signally owned of God and many said that they had received help and encouragement that they could translate into renewed Sunday School efforts. Rev. Carl Messer, our faithful Sunday School Promotional Secretary, has unselfishly given hours of his time to District promotion.
- (e) The Ministerial Meeting was well attended and our hearts and minds were refreshed by blessings from God both in the messages and songs by our workers.
- (f) Our relations with Owosso Bible College have been most pleasant and we believe God will meet every present and future need of the school. We are pleased with its progress.
- (g) We have had blessed fellowship with the East Michigan Conference and rejoice with them in their progress.
- (h) Our pastors have labored faithfully under increasing economic pressure and many of them have made sacrifices that will only be known in eternity.
- (i) Our laymen have stood by us loyally and have given sacrificially time and again in finance and labors.
- (j) Time fails me in giving a complete report, but our evangelists, singers, missionary societies, committees, etc., have all had an important part in Kingdom building.

#### II -- PROGRESS OF THE CHURCHES

- (a) Spiritually. Many of our churches have had revivals that have quickened their spiritual life and resulted in membership gains. We feel, however, that there must be a deepening of spiritual life, a burning devotion to the Cause of Christ, and appropriating faith that shall help us to claim the promises that are our inheritance, a complete abandonment of ourselves to the whole will of God, "For He is able to do . . . according to His power that worketh in us."
- (b) Materially, we have had a very good year. Alma has discharged its indebtedness and plans are already drafted for a two story Sunday school unit 36'x40' to provide 17 additional rooms.

- ASHLEY has made extensive improvements on its parsonage.
- BATTLE CREEK FIRST has completed and dedicated its new parsonage, purchased an organ, and made improvements in its church.
- BATTLE CREEK SECOND has completely redecorated its building.,
- BELLAIRE has completed some landscaping and substantially reduced its debt.
- BRECKENRIDGE has put in new sidewalks, a parking lot, and has made basement improvements in the church.
- BURNIPS redecorated its church, bought a new organ, and plan to build a new church or completely remodel the present structure.
- CHEBOYGAN remodeled its church, put in a new floor, lights, etc. as well as 5 new Sunday School rooms, and landscaped its lot.
- COLEMAN installed a new furnace, carpeting, painting, etc., in the church.
- EATON RAPIDS has purchased a large building in one of the best locations in the village and will have splendid facilities when remodeling is completed.
- EDGETTS has remodeled and redecorated its church which has greatly added to its appearance and usefulness.
  - ELLSWORTH has completed extensive improvements in the parsonage, on the grounds, and also some church improvements.
  - **FAYETTE** has completed an addition to its parsonage and the parsonage has been modernized.
  - GRAND RAPIDS has completed parsonage improvements.
  - HASTINGS has purchased a fine eight room house and nearly two acres of land for a new church site with small indebtedness on the entire property of \$1000.00 or less.
  - **HOUGHTON LAKE** has built a fine new parsonage and made church improvements.
  - KALAMAZOO completely redecorated its church.
  - LANSING FIRST has purchased, remodeled, and equiped a splendid Sunday School unit.
  - LANSING GRACE has completed extensive remodeling in its church.
  - LANSING EMMANUEL joined its two buildings with a breezeway.
  - LUTZ CORNERS is building a new parsonage.
  - MERRILL has purchased a building for use in zone rallies, missionary services, etc. It has also remodeled the kitchen of its parsonage, and has put on a new church roof.
  - MIDLAND has purchased pews and has made many improvements in its building.
  - MUSKEGON made some improvements in the church.

Rev. M. C. Kittle, Conference Superintendent, asked permission to address the Conference briefly on what he termed a general misunderstanding as to how the delegates were to be entertained with reference to paying their way. The presiding officer ruled that general privilege should be granted by the Conference until disposition could be made of this.

It was moved and carried that the Ways and Means Committee be dismissed to bring in a resolution to clear this matter.

A telegram conveying greetings from Rev. Ernest Thomas of Indianapolis, Indiana, was read.

The minutes of the previous sitting were read and approved.

Report of the last ballot cast in the afternoon session was given. Rev. G. E. Stace and Rev. E. C. Schram were elected as advisory members of the Conference Council.

Motion made and carried to take the three highest for the next ballot. Rev. D. F. Price was elected as the third advisory member of the Conference Council.

The Conference Council presented nominees for the Examining and Educational Board.

Dr. W. L. Surbrook was elected.

Motion made and carried that on the second ballot we vote on the two highest names. Rev. Stace was elected.

The Ways and Means Committee reported:

"Inasmuch as it seemed to be the understanding as expressed in the Conference that delegates were to be entertained free, therefore be it resolved that we grant free entertainment to all elected delegates during this Conference. Furthermore, we urge that all pastors endeavor to send in their camp apportionment to help finance this present Conference and Camp."

Moved and carried that we adopt this resolution.

Motion made and carried that in ballots involving three nominees the election shall be declared by plurality vote.

Dr. H. T. Mills was elected to the Conference Board of Trustees.

Rev. A. C. Doehring was elected to a three-year term as Owosso Bible College trustee.

Moved and carried that we extend the time to complete the elections.

Rev. E. C. Schram was elected to a three-year term on the Church Extension Board.

By unanimous consent, it was agreed that the two elections to the Camp Meeting Board be by plurality vote.

Rev. Lawrence Keesor and Rev. Charles Stewart were elected to the Camp Meeting Board for three-year terms, which expire in 1959.

Conference was adjourned due to expiration of time.

#### THIRD SITTING

The third setting of the Conference convened Thursday, August 2 at 9:00 a.m.

Rev. D. F. Price led in the singing of "The Cleansing Wave." Mrs. Elizabeth Warren was at the piano. Dr. H. T. Mills led in prayer.

Dr. R. D. Gunsalus, presiding officer, read Romans 11:33-36 and Romans 12.

The minutes of the previous sitting were read and approved.

It was moved and carried that we accept the following recommenda-

tion from the Conference Council, namely:

"That Rev. and Mrs. Nicholas Fair be accepted into the Michigan Conference, pending receipt of their transfer from the East Michigan Conference."

The Conference Secretary brought this word from the Council:

It was brought to our attention that approximately 25% of the Sunday schools did not report during the year. All were urged to send in reports, even though they show a loss. All ministers were further urged to

take care of their moral obligations in regard to reports and other relative matters.

Rev. Vaughn Drummond, secretary of the Resolutions Committee, reported.

Resolution No. 1 regarding billing for Conference Journals was adopted.

Resolution No. 2 regarding deletion of one phrase in Standing Rule No. 9 was adopted.

Resolution No. 3 regarding missionary report blanks was adopted as amended.

Moved and carried that the Secretary have jurisdiction in appointing a committee to work with him on this matter.

Resolution No. 4 was substituted with a resolution from the floor, in regard to Standing Rule No. 22, to delete "Owosso Bible College" and to delete "certified" and replace it with "recognized public accountant."

Resolution No. 5 in regard to Standing Rule No. 15 was presented. It was moved and carried that we refer this back to the Resolutions Committee for re-drafting.

Resolution No. 6 was referred to the Conference Council for further study and to be presented at the Conference next year.

Resolution No. 7 regarding the minutes of the Youth Conference being included in the Conference Journal was adopted.

Resolution No. 8 regarding Standing Rule No. 26 was adopted.

Resolution No. 9 regarding the privilege of the Conference Superintendent to hold two revivals a year was adopted. This is to become a Standing Rule.

Resolution No. 10 regarding renting of camp facilities was adopted with this amendment "until property for a camp is purchased and can be developed for our use."

Resolution No. 13 regarding youth camp site at Higgins Lake was passed with this amendment "and that the expenditures for the development be under the supervision of the District Council."

Rev. Kittle, Conference Superintendent, made an appeal to the ministers to be loyal to the camp, even after the Conference is over, emphasizing the effect such action has on a camp meeting.

Rev. D. Wayne Brown was presented from the East Michigan Conference and given an honorary seat within the Bar.

Rev. Otho Jennings, president of Owosso Bible College, was invited to bring anything that was on his heart concerning his work at the College. He emphasized that there were three goals the College is seeking to achieve, namely:

(1) Build up student morale.

(2) Promote good will among our constituents.

(3) Stabilize the faculty.

He stated that the victories have been greater than the problems. He further stated that the future looks very promising. His talk was accepted with a rising vote of appreciation and attestation.

Conference was adjourned for lunch. Rev. G. E. Stace dismissed with prayer after announcements.

It was moved and carried that the figure 10.00 be changed to 10.50 in Standing Rule No. 2.

Resolution No. 5 regarding the debt-free program of Owosso Bible College was adopted.

Resolution No. 6 regarding recognition for those churches who pay their budgets in full was adopted.

It was moved and carried that the Conference Council appoint a committee on memorials, and anyone desiring may forward memorials to the Conference Secretary.

The Rev. Mrs. B. E. Manker and Mrs. Roy Rummage, Committee on Memorials, presented memorials for Rev. C. B. Greenman and Rev. I. L. Mudge. These were accepted by the Conference, after which Dr. Gunsalus asked the Conference to stand with bowed heads for a moment of silent prayer.

The Resolutions Committee again reported.

Moved and carried that we have 400 copies of the Conference Journal printed.

Moved and carried that the nominations be closed.

The Conference voted to accept the invitation to go to Breckenridge.

By motion the Conference was adjourned. Rev. G. E. Stace dismissed in prayer.

# MEMORIALS

#### CLAUDE B. GREENMAN

Rev. Claude B. Greenman was born in Banks Township, near the village of Atwood in Antrim County, Michigan, Juanary 22, 1888. He passed away at his home at Bellaire, Michigan, September 28, 1955, at 7:55 a.m.

He was married to Muriel Elizabeth Sutton on July 30, 1909. He is survived by three sons: Orval and Robert of Grand Rapids, and Claude of Traverse City; also seven grandchildren. Also surviving are three brothers: Frank of Bellaire, Milan of Central Lake, and Wesley of Traverse City.

He received his early schooling in Antrim County, Michigan, and his ministerial training at Asbury College, Wilmore, Kentucky. He was ordained to the ministry in 1912 and served with the Evangelical Church, and later with the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Brother Greenman began his ministry with the Pilgrims at Flint, Michigan, where he built and organized the Brown Street Church. He also served pastorates at Bellaire, Eaton Rapids and Jackkson, Michigan; Trappe and Oxford, in Maryland; and East Pasadena Church, at Pasadena, California. His last pastorate was at Traverse Heights, Michigan. He retired from active ministry in 1952, after 43 years of service.

He loved Christ and the Church and gave his life in God's work, often receiving meager salary, but never complaining. He enjoyed the work of the Kingdom. His desire was that he might remain a few more years and work for the Master, but God saw fit to take him to join the church triumphant. This man of God will be greatly missed.

The funeral was conducted by the Rev. Alton Finney, pastor of the Bellaire Church, where he was a member. Several ministers of the Michigan District took part in the services. Rev. M. C. Kittle, Conference Superintendent, brought the message. There was a large crowd of friends in attendance.

#### ISAAC LANSING MUDGE

Rev. Isaac Lansing Mudge was born July 11, 1880, in Wales Township, St. Clair County, Michigan, and departed this life May 25, 1956. He was the oldest son of Isaac and Carolyn Mudge. When Brother Mudge was two years of age, his parents moved to Sanilac County where he grew to young manhood. In 1905 he was married to Mary M. Holbrook. To this union were born five children, two sons and three daughters.

One year after his marriage, he entered the ministry of the Free Methodist Church which he followed for several years. In 1922 he settled in Owosso, entered the employ of the city as Captain of the Westside Fire Department, and was for four years a member of the police force. In 1930 he entered the employ of the State as guard in Jackson Prison. In 1934 he re-entered the ministry in the Pilgrim Holiness Church. The churches he served in the Michigan Conference were as follows: Croswell, Ashley, Lansing, and Brightmoor in Detroit. Because of failing health, he was compelled to retire in 1945.

Brother Mudge preached the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ uncompromisingly, and without fear or favor. He was a member of the church at Owosso and will be missed greatly.

Brother Mudge suffered greatly in his final illness before his home going.

He leaves to mourn their loss: his wife, Mary; two sons, Leon of St. Andrews, Florida, and Arthur of Owosso; two daughters, Mrs. Leon Bruff of Owosso and Mrs. Iris Shaft of Saginaw; one daughter, Irene, preceded him in death.

The funeral was held in the Pilgrim Holiness Church with Rev. M. L. Goodman officiating, assisted by Rev. H. T. Mills. There were 35 ministers present.

His body was laid to rest in the peaceful Pine Tree Cemetery at Corunna, Michigan, there to await the resurrection of the just.

#### RESOLUTIONS OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

- 1—Inasmuch as our Camp Meeting expenses will remain practically the same as before the Conferences were divided, and inasmuch as our District Camp is a vital part of our district program, therefore, we recommend that Standing Rule No. 7 be eliminated, and that in place of the Camp Meeting apportionment, fifty cents per member be placed in the Conference Budget for Camp and Conference expense. We further recommend that all actively engaged and retired ministers with their families be entertained free for the Camp and Conference and that delegates be entertained free for the Conference.
- 2—Inasmuch as it became necessary to purchase a district parsonage within the year, and since no provision was made to meet this added expense in our Conference budget, as a consequence of which the strain on the administrative fund has been very heavy, and so much so that we have operated most of the year in the red in said fund, and inasmuch as we do not desire to add another offering to the local church program, Be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 4 be changed to read: 10 per cent instead of 8 per cent.
- 3—Be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 10 be changed to read: The Conference Superintendent's salary shall be \$4,400.00 per year, plus 7 cents per mile for traveling expense. The Conference Treasurer shall receive \$375.00 per year, and the Conference Secretary shall receive \$175.00 and the balance of the Rule remain the same.
- 4—Whereas the cost of living has risen so rapidly in recent years and this definitely affects the operation of the Owosso Bible College, therefore be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 2 be changed to read: Owosso Bible College Debt Retirement \$2.50, Owosso Bible College \$2.00.
- 5—Be it resolved that we as the Michigan Conference endorse the "Debt Free by the Golden Jubilee" program as presented by the Board of Trustees of the Owosso Bible College. Be it further resolved that we strongly urge every minister and church in our Conference to give full support to this program.
- 6—Inasmuch as our Conference Budget would meet the needs of our Conference at the present time if paid in full, and in order to inspire a greater interest in our Conference claims and obligations and to give proper recognition to the churches on the basis of the budgets raised, therefore, be it resolved that at the next Conference all reports be publicly posted, and all churches be rated on the following basis:

A Gold Star church is one who pays 100% or more of all budgets. Silver Star — 90% to 100%.

Blue Star -- 80% to 90%.

Green Star -- 70% to 80%.

Red Star --- 70% or less.

Be it further resolved that certificates of recognition be presented to the pastors and delegate, or delegates, of all Gold Star churches in the Conference at the time of the reading of Conference Treasurer's report.

#### MICHIGAN CONFERENCE RESOLUTIONS

- 1—Be it resolved that each church shall be billed for their requested quota of Conference Journals. Same to be paid by the local church treasurer to the Conference Treasurer.
- 2—Whereas we are not using the camp grounds at Owosso; therefore, be it resolved that we delete the following from Standing Rule No. 9: "The first ten seats in the three middle sections of the tabernacle and the platform are fixed as the Conference Bar."
- 3—Be it resolved that we add the following words to Standing Rule No. 18: "Adequate report blanks shall be supplied by the District Secretary."
- 4—Whereas Owosso Bible College has been incorporated as a zone school; be it resolved that in Standing Rule No. 22 the words "Owosso Bible Col" be deleted, also the word "certified" be deleted and replaced with "recognized public accountant".
- 5—This resolution in regard to Standing Rule No. 15 was referred back to the Committee for re-drafting. (This resolution was not brought back to the Conference).

The District Council being authorized by the Conference to complete any unfinished business has ratified the following redraft of Resolution No. 5.

The Conference Council shall appoint a Conference Building Committee composed of three members who have experience in the work of acoustics, architecture and construction. All churches and Church Boards must have the approval of said Committee before the erecting of buildings or improvements in excess of five hundred dollars.

- 6—This resolution in regard to secularization was referred to the Conference Council for further study and to be presented to the Conference next year (1957).
- 7—Whereas the district youth have their own conference, be it resolved that their Journal of Proceedings appear in a separate section of the the Conference minutes.
- 8—Whereas there is a need for a stronger relationship of our youth to the entirety of our district camp, be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 26 be changed to read as follows:

Be it resolved that our youth convention consist of Saturday morning and Saturday afternoon business sessions and a great youth rally Saturday evening.

Be it further resolved that a youth program under the direction of the youth council be correlated with the regular camp session, consisting of a youth service each week-day morning, and a recreational period each afternoon.

- 9—Resolved that our Conference Superintendent be allowed to hold two two-Sunday meetings per year, either on or off the District, other than his regular work.
- 10—Whereas we lack adequate funds to purchase and develop a camp ground at the present time; therefore, be it resolved that we continue to rent camp facilities until property for a camp is purchased and can be developed for our use.
- 11—Whereas the Michigan Conference is in need of youth camp facilities; and

Whereas suitable ground near Higgins Lake has been given to the combined Michigan Conferences for the specific purpose of developing the site for a youth camp, and

Whereas the Michigan Conference has purchased the East Michigan Conference's share of the Higgins Lake property for a Michigan Conference Youth Camp;

Therefore, be it resolved that the Michigan Conference give permission to the Michigan Conference Youth Council to proceed in the development of the Higgins Lake Youth Camp site, and that the expenditures for the development be under the supervision of the Conference Council.

- 12—Be it resolved that a rising vote of thanks be given to Rev. D. F. Price for advertising the Camp Meeting by means of his radio program, "The Family Altar of the Air."
- 13—Be it further resolved that a rising vote of thanks be given to Dr.R. D. Gunsalus for his gracious service in conducting our Conference.
- 14—Be it resolved that this Conference send greetings to Rev. Wm. H. Neff, our General Superintendent, and that we wish him a speedy recovery.
- 15—Be it resolved that this Conference send greetings to Rev. B. O. Shattuck, Rev. Mrs. E. F. Ewers, Rev. R. C. Hawkins, Rev. Mrs. Harry Woods, Rev. F. H. Harmon, Rev. Ernest Thomas, Mrs. L. W. Sturk, Mrs. I. L. Mudge, Mrs. C. E. Cliff, Rev. and Mrs. Roger Bassett, Rev. and Mrs. Eldon Nelson, and any others the Secretary may wish to send to.

#### STANDING RULES

#### CAMP

#### No. 1 --- CAMP MEETING FUNDS

The Conference Treasurer shall submit an itemized report of Camp Meeting Funds as recorded in the 1945 Conference Journal, Page 13. This report to appear in the Minutes.

#### No. 2 --- CAMP MEETING SUNDAY SCHOOL SESSION

On the two Sundays during Camp Meeting there shall be a Sunday School session beginning at 9:30 a. m. until 10:15 a. m. following the testimony meeting; said session shall be arranged and supervised by the Sunday School Committee.

A credit card shall be given to all in attendance, and each card shall be signed and returned by the pupil to his local church Sunday school secretary for the attendance record and reports to the Conference.

#### No. 3 -- TABERNACLE AND CAMP SITE FINANCING

- (a) Each member of the Conference shall be asked to contribute one cent per day for the three year period (1954-1957, as designated in Conference Resolutions of 1954 Journal, page 21).
- (b) A penny bank appropriate for this project will be given to every member of the Conference along with complete instructions, information as to goal and plans for honoring through the Michigan Pilgrim, the churches who have reached the 100% mark at the end of each year.
- (c) A chart of instructions with a thermometer will be supplied each pastor and be placed in a conspicuous place, and where so desired, these charts will be supplied for Sunday School classes, and Y. P. S. A Master Chart with place for names of churches and thermometer will be placed at Camp Meeting, and one free-will offering will be received at each of these. The Conference Council shall provide for the supplying of the charts and thermometers.
- (d) The Conference Superintendent shall promote this through letters to the pastors, graphs detailing proposed schedule of success, etc., and the Conference Superintendent shall speak of this upon his visits to the churches, ministerial gatherings, Sunday School conventions, etc.

#### CHURCH EXTENSION

#### No. 4 --- CHURCH EXTENSION

Inasmuch as the present Conference Church Extension Department is not producing the number of new churches that we are capable of producing, and whereas, the establishing of new churches is necessary for a steady and healthy growth for any Conference, and whereas there appears to be a definite weakness in our present policy of raising funds for Church Extension work:

Therefore, be it resolved that the Michigan Conference adopt the Church Extension Fellowship which reads as follows:

# CHURCH EXTENSION FELLOWSHIP OF THE PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH, MICHIGAN CONFERENCE

Holding the conviction that God would have us further the cause of Christ by establishing new churches within our Conference borders, I subscribe the following:

- (a) I will pray for the leading of the Lord in the work of the Church Extension Board.
- (b) I will be alert for any possibilities of new churches and will inform the Board.
- (c) I recognize that the first financial obligations in the opening of a new work are the most difficult to meet, and will therefore be responsible for two units, (\$5.00 per unit), to total \$10.00 for the Church Extension Fellowship.
- (d) I assume this obligation for not more than two new works in any one Conference year. Said works to be approved by the Church Extension Board.
  - (e) I will try to secure other members for the Followship.
- (f) I understand this agreement may be terminated any time I deem it necessary by notifying the Church Extension Board.

## CONFERENCE

#### No. 5 --- CONFERENCE YEAR

The Conference year shall close June 30, and complete reports must be reviewed by the local boards and forwarded directly to the Conference Statistician, Rev. V. L. Draggoo, 746 Michigan, Eaton Rapids, Michigan, by July 15. All reports received after July 15 shall be omitted from the yearly report.

#### No. 6 --- RESOLUTIONS

No resolutions shall be presented to this Conference until it has been typewritten and signed.

#### No. 7 --- CONFERENCE SESSIONS

The first eight rows shall constitute the Conference Bar. The hours of Conference sittings shall be from 9:00 a. m. to 12 noon, 1:30 p. m. to 5:00 p. m.; and 7:00 p. m.to 10:00 p. m.

#### No. 8 --- ORDINATION SERVICE

The order of business on the first night of the Conference shall be the ordination service.

#### No. 9 -- RECOGNIZED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

All treasurer's books of the Conference shall be audited annually by a recognized public accountant so that report from the auditor can be given to the Conference when called for.

#### No. 10 -- ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Inasmuch as most religious bodies follow the order of having election immediately after Conference reports, and, inasmuch as many Conferences of the Pilgrim Holiness Church follow this same order, therefore, be it resolved that election of officers be immediately following Conference reports.

#### No. 11 -- DELEGATES

No delegates shall be seated in the Conference unless they are elected by their respective churches.

#### No. 12 -- WIVES OF CANDIDATES

Whereas the minister's wife makes a vital contribution to her husband's work, therefore we recommend that the wife of the candidate be given an honorary seat with the candidate during the ordination service.

#### CREDENTIALS

#### No. 13 --- EXAMINING AND EDUCATIONAL BOARD

The Conference Superintendent shall be chairman of the Examining and Educational Board by virtue of his office.

#### No. 14 --- CREDENTIALS

The Conference Superintendent shall have read Sections 99, 100, and 101 of the Manual instructing all Conference Licentiates that hereafter they shall appear before the Conference Examining Board at Conference time before their credentials shall be granted.

#### FINANCE

#### No. 15 --- CHURCH BUDGET

Each church shall raise for the General Budget the equivalent of \$6.00 per member, and for the Conference Budget the equivalent of \$10.50 per member; the Conference Budget to be divided as follows: Conference Church Extension \$2.00; Conference Church Extension Loan Fund \$1.25; Owosso Bible College Debt Retirement \$2.50; Owosso Bible College \$2.00; Ministerial Relief \$0.75; General Delegate Expense \$0.25; Administrative Fund \$1.25\*; Camp Meeting Expense \$0.50.

#### No. 16 --- DISTRICT AND GENERAL FUND

All monies raised in the local church for Conference and general work shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer, who shall forward general funds to the General Treasurer.

#### No. 17 --- ADMINISTRATIVE FUND

The local church treasurer shall send to the Conference Treasurer along with the monthly budget the equivalent of 10 per cent of the pastor's salary for the Administrative Fund.

Also, ministers doing secular work shall turn one-half of their tithe to the Conference Budget.

All other licensed and ordained ministers shall turn 10 per cent of their ministerial income to Administrative Fund.

#### No. 18 --- SALARIES

The Conference Superintendent's salary shall be set at \$4,400.00 per year, plus 7 cents per mile for traveling expenses. The Conference Treasurer shall receive \$375.00 per year, the Conference Secretary shall receive \$175.00, the Conference Sunday School Secretary \$75.00, the Conference Statistician \$50.00, and the Editor of the Michigan Pilgrim \$40.00. All Conference officials shall receive 6 cents per mile for miles traveled in the interest of the Conference. Conference Youth Director shall receive \$75.00 per year.

#### No. 19 --- BURIAL BENEFITS

All actively engaged pastors, evangelists and the ministers of the Conference shall be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association as well as their wives. Cost of membership and calls shall be paid from the treasuries of the department that employs them. Complete Resolution appears in Standing Rule No. 20 of the 1947 Minutes.

#### MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

#### No. 20 --- MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

The afternoon service of the last day of the Ministerial Convention shall be the concluding service of the Convention.

#### No. 21 - MISSIONARY REPORTS

A yearly report of each missionary society shall be printed in the Conference Minutes.

#### **EXECUTIVE SECRETARY'S REPORT**

To the Second Annual Youth Conference of the Michigan District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Greeting in Jesus' Name.

It has been a real privilege and pleasure to serve you as District Executive Secretary for the past Conference year. We had a rather difficult beginning with our Youth work following the division of the District, but in spite of the handicaps, the spirit of our youth is to go "Forward Ever," as evidenced by the splendid zone rallies I have attended.

I wish to express my deep appreciation to our District Superintendent, Rev. M. C. Kittle, and the Youth Council, for their cooperation in the youth program.

#### PASTORS

## No. 22 --- PASTORS AT CAMP MEETING

Inasmuch as our pastors are expected to support and attend the Annual Camp Meeting, each church shall provide the equivalent of the pastor's offering or salary for the two Sundays of the Camp and the pastor shall be privileged to attend the entire Camp Meeting.

#### No. 23 --- PARSONAGE UTILITIES

The local church shall provide good, modern heating and cooking facilities for the parsonage, the type to be suitable to the locality where the parsonage is situated. All churches in the Michigan Conference are to provide the utilities for the parsonages.

The Conference shall provide the same for the Conference parsonage.

#### No. 24 --- VACATIONS

It is recommend that our churches grant their pastors a two-weeks vacation with pay. The Conference Superintendent shall be given a two-weeks vacation with pay.

#### No. 25 --- RECALL OF PASTOR

The second week of May shall be designated as the time for the churches of our Conference to vote on the recall of the pastor.

#### SUPERINTENDENT

## No. 26 --- APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEES

The Conference Superintendent shall appoint all committees. The Standing Committees are to be appointed to include new men where possible and to avoid the duplication of men on several committees.

#### No. 27 --- RETIRING SUPERINTENDENT

Whenever there shall be elected another Conference Superintendent, the Conference shall take steps to fill the pastorate left vacant by recommending the retiring superintendent to that church as a pastor. The Conference Council may also recommend him to the field of evangelism.

#### No. 28 --- MINISTERIAL CONVENTION COMMITTEE

A committee of six shall be appointed as a Ministerial Convention Committee by the Conference Superintendent. Two shall be appointed for three years, two for two years, two for one year, and two shall be appointed each year respectively.

#### No. 29

Our Conference Superintendent shall be allowed to hold two two-Sunday meetings per year, either on or off the District, other than his regular work.

#### No. 30 -- YOUTH EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE BUSINESS MEETING

Inasmuch as there is need of more intensive youth activities during the Conference year, the Conference Youth Executive Council shall hold quarterly meetings.

#### No. 31 --- YOUTH CONVENTION PROGRAM

Our Youth Convention shall consist of Saturday morning and Saturday afternoon business sessions with a great youth rally Saturday evening.

A youth program under the direction of the youth council shall be correlated with the regular camp session, consisting of a youth service each week-day morning, and a recreational period each afternoon.

We have also had a good gain of 54 members in the youth societies.

It was my privilege to attend the National Youth Convention at Winona Lake, Indiana, under the efficient leadership of Dr. Paul F. Elliott. The witnessing of the Spirit was mightily manifested in our midst and many dedicated their lives to Christian service.

I stand ready to give my best for our Pilgrim Youth and the advancement of our church.

# RESOLUTION FROM THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were submitted by the Resolutions Committee and were adopted by the Convention:

- (1) There shall be a report by each zone president to the Executive Secretary within two weeks following a zone rally on report blanks supplied by the Executive Secretary.
- (2) Each zone president shall give an annual report to the business meeting of the youth convention.
- (3) A District Treasurer's report shall be given at the business meeting of the youth convention.
- (4) The executive secretary shall give an annual report to the business meeting of the youth convention.
- (5) The song "Forward Ever" shall be adopted as the theme song of the Pilgrim Youth of the Michigan Conference.
- (6) There shall be an annual youth camp with the date and the program of the camp to be set by the Youth Council.
- (7) Work shall begin as soon as possible on a program for the Higgins Lake Youth Camp. A work program shall be set up by the Youth Council.
- (8) The election of zone officers and the annual zone business meeting shall be held at the first rally after the District Youth Convention. This rally shall be held by the end of the month of September.
- (9) Regular zone rallies are to be held.
- (10) The officers of the zone shall consist of President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer. The pastors and the Youth Presidents shall be active voting members of the business session.
- (11) There shall be a combined business meeting of the District Executive officers and the Zone Presidents immediately following the zone elections to formulate plans for district activities.
- (12) These resolutions shall be placed in the Conference Journal as standing rules.

#### RESOLUTIONS FROM THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

The following resolutions were submitted by the Committee on Ways and Means, and were adopted by the Convention.

(1) The local society treasurer shall send 40% of the total regular offerings to the zone treasurer the week following the last Sunday of each month.

The zone treasurer shall send 75% of the regular offerings received from the local treasurer and regular zone offerings to the district youth treasurer. One offering from each zone rally shall be designated for the Higgins Lake Youth project. These funds shall be forwarded monthly to the District Youth Treasurer.

The District Youth Treasurer shall send 15% of the regular receipts to the General Church for general youth projects.

- (2) The members of the Executive Committee shall receive six cents per mile for traveling expense incurred for district business.
- (3) The District Youth Treasurer shall send a monthly financial report to the District Executive Secretary and the District Superintendent.
- (4) The following plan shall be used to raise funds for the Higgins Lake project:

Offering envelopes designated for the Higgins Lake project shall be distributed to each society and made available to the people before each regular offering is received. This will make it possible to receive a special offering for the project at the same time a regular offering is received.

The Executive Committee shall make charts available to each society in order that it might see its part in contributing to the Higgins project.

(5) The following plan, to be known as the Pilgrim Youth Camp Savings Plan, shall be used to stimulate attendance at the district youth camp:

The District Youth Council shall distribute stamps and books to the local treasurers. These stamps are to be secured weekly by those desiring to attend camp.

Funds accumulated by this plan are to be held in the local treasury until two months before the date of the youth camp. These funds shall then be sent to the District Youth Treasurer.

(6) Be it resolved that the Ways and Means resolutions numbered 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5, be placed in the Conference Journal as standing rules.

- (8) The District Youth Treasurer shall send a monthly financial report to the District Executive Secretary and the District Superintendent.

### YOUTH CAMP

- (9) There shall be an annual youth camp with the date and the program of the camp to be set by the youth council.
- (10) Work shall begin as soon as possible on the program for the Higgins Lake Youth Camp. A work program shall be set up by the youth council.
