Hopkins, Michigan

August 1, 1957

FIRST SITTING

The first sitting of the 57th Annual Michigan Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 9:00 a.m., August 1, 1957, at our newly acquired camp ground at Hopkins, Michigan.

MEMOIR

James Russell Thompson

Rev. James R. Thompson, son of Tom and Emily Thompson. was born October 8, 1891, one of a family of fifteen children.

He was converted at the family alter of his employer in 1912 and joined the Pilgrim Holiness Church the same year.

He spent two years at Owosso Bible College after which he served pastorates at Schomberg, Merrill, Burnips, Applegate, Lansing First, Bellaire, and Kalamazoo of the Michigan Conference. He was ordained to the ministry in 1923, along with Edward Boone and S. I. Emery.

He served on the district council for fifteen years, seven of which he was district superintendent. For several years, he was a member of the Board of Directors of Owosso Bible Colege; and succeeding his superintendency, he spent two years as field representative. In 1942 he was elected to the General Board for a term of four years.

Because of failing health, he had planned to retire at the close of this year, but God had planned otherwise, and he was called to his enternal abode, February 26, 1957.

His last public testimony was given at the Ministerial Convention at Breckenridge. The Holy Spirit witnessed the truthfulness of it to his own soul, and also verified it to the congregation present.

A memorial service was held in Kalamazoo, and the following day at the Owosso Pilgrim Holiness Church. Rev. M. C. Kittle, district superintendent, was in charge. Dr. W. L. Surbrook, a schoolmate and life-long friend, and Rev. Howard Eagle spoke briefly.

GENERAL CONFERENCE MEMORIALS

Memorial No. 1

WHEREAS the Protestant world is becoming more and more divided into two camps, that of Evangelicals and Liberals, or the spiritual and the antispiritual, and

WHEREAS the National Association of Evangelicals has furnished the courageous leadership and voice needed for millions of fundamental Bible believing Christians, and for years has represented us in Congress and before foreign embassies in defense of the Bible and Protestantism and the protection of persecuted missionaries, and,

WHEREAS this great Christian voice is speaking more potently every day in defense of the Bible and true Christianity, and

WHEREAS several other holiness bodies have affiliated themselves with this group, and

WHEREAS we, as a small denomination, definitely need the potent influence of this great body: Therefore be it

RESOLVED, That we, as a church, shall by a majority vote, this General Conference, affiliate ourselves with the National Association of Evangelicals.

Memorial No. 2

Inasmuch as many of our ministers and people are not aware of the tremendous political and insidious influence of the Roman Catholic Church, therefore, be it resolved that the book "American Freedom and Catholic Power" be placed in our study course for ministers.

Memorial No. 3

Inasmuch as no provision has been made in the Manual for special offering for religious education,

Be it therefore resolved that chapter 13, section 149, part 4 be a-mended to read:

"Four special offerings are to be taken annually, over and above the budget as follows: November, self-denial offering for foregin missions; the Easter offering for church extension; the rally day offering for general Sunday school work, and the educational offering in the month of May for general educational work".

Memorial No. 4

Inasmuch as the demands of our day require a progressively higher scholastic standard for our ministers.

Be it therefore resolved that section 162, page 86 be amended to read:

"The licentiate, who has held his license at least three years and has successfully completed the required course of study, which shall include at least two years of resident work (60 semester hours) in a church college, shall be eligible for ordination as a minister of the gospel. The district council shall have authority to make exceptions to the above requirements".

BE IT RESOLVED that the General Board Shall draft a question-aire covering every phase of ministerial reponsibility, and that the information secured by this questionnaire shall be used by the District examining board as the basis on which licenses and ordination shall be recommended.

MICHIGAN CONFERENCE RESOLUTIONS

- 1—Whereas there is a need of a closer working relationship between the local church board and the Conference Education and Examining
- Board, and wheras in the past the local boards have not been advised as to the questionnaires used and required by the Educational and Examining Board, therefore, be it resolved that the questionaire now in use, be filled in by the licentiate at least thirty days before Conference, after which it shall be approved by the local board and mailed by them to the Conference Superintendent. No licentiate shall appear before the board without the questionnaire and proper recommendation.
- 2—Whereas, we have no standing rule concerning the time of our Camp Meeting in relation to Conference: Be it resolved that we have Conference Thursday and Friday preceding Camp Meeting.
- 3—Be it resolved that this Conference be presented with five nominees for each office requiring nominations by the district council and that the nominations be applied to these six offices: educational and examining board, Conference secretary, conference treasurer; youth executive secretary, youth treasurer, youth recording secretary.
- 4—Whereas an informative paper could be of great value to our people and ministers, and wheras provision has already been made for salary for the editor of such paper, be it resolved that this conference elect an editor to publish a quarterly paper know as the "Michigan Pilgrim". Editor shall be elected from the nominees presented by the Council to this conference.

No 5 -- CONFERENCE YEAR

The conference year shall close June 30, and complete reports must be reviewed by the local boards and forwarded directly to the conference statistician, Rev. V. L. Draggoo, 746 Michigan, Eaton Rapids, Michigan, by July 15. All reports received after July 15 shall be omitted from the yearly report.

No. 6 --- TIME OF CONFERENCE

Conference shall be held Thursday and Friday preceding Camp Meeting.

No. 7 --- RESOLUTIONS

No resolutions shall be presented to this Conference until it has been typewritten and signed.

No. 8 -- CONFERENCE SESSIONS

The first eight rows in the three center sections shall constitute the conference bar. The hours of conference sittings shall be from 9:00 A.M. to 12 noon, 1:30 P.M. to 5:00 P.M. and 7:00 P.M. to 10:00 P.M.

No. 9 -- DELEGATES

No delegates shall be seated in the Conference unless they are elected by their respective churches.

No. 10 --- ORDINATION SERVICE

The order of business on the first night of the Conference shall be the ordination service.

No. 11 --- COMPANIONS OF CANDIDATES

We recommend that the companion of each candidate be given an honorary seat with him (or her) during the ordination service.

No. 12 --- RECOGNIZED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

All treasures' book of the Conference shall be audited annually by a recognized public accountant so that report from the auditor can be given to the Conference when called for.

ELECTIONS

No 13 --- ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Election of officers shall be immediately following conference reports.

No. 14 --- OPEN BALLOT

All district officers shall be elected by open ballot, except those nominated by the district council.

No. 15 -- NOMINATIONS

The district council shall present to the Conference five nominations for each of the following offices: Educational Examining Board, Conference Secretary, Conference Treasurer, Youth Executive Secretary, Youth Treasurer and Youth Recording Secretary.

CREDENTIALS

No 16 --- EDUCATIONAL AND EXAMINING BOARD

The Conference Superintendent shall be chairman of the Educational and Examining Board by virtue of his office.

No. 17 --- LICENTIATES

The Conference Superintendent shall have read Sections 99, 100, and 101 of the Manual instructing all conference licentiates that hereafter they shall appear before the Conference Examining Board at conference time before their credentials shall be granted.

FINANCE

No 18 --- CHURCH BUDGET

Each church shall raise for the General Budget the equivalent of \$6.00 per member, and for the Conference Budget the equivalent of \$10.50 per member; the Conference Budget to be divided as follows: Conference Church Extension, \$2.00; Conference Church Extension Loan Fund, \$1.25; Owosso Bible College Debt Retirement, \$2.50; Owosso Bible College, \$2.00; Ministerial Relief, \$0.75; General Delegate Expense, \$0.25; Administrative Fund, \$1.25: Camp Meeting Expense, \$0.50. Each local church shall pay its budget monthly from the local church treasury.

No 19 -- DISTRICT AND GENERAL FUND

All monies raised in the local church for conference and general work shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer, who shall forward general funds to the General Treasurer.

No. 20 --- ADMINISTRATIVE FUND

The local church treasurer shall send to the Conference Treasurer along with the monthly budget the equivalent of 10 per cent of the pastor's salary for the Administrative Fund.

Also, ministers doing secular work shall turn one-half of their tithe to the Conference Budget.

All other licensed and ordained ministers shall turn 10 per cent of their ministerial income to Administrative Fund.

No. 21 --- SALARIES

The Conference Superindent's salary shall be set at \$4,400. per year, plus 7 cents per mile traveling expenses. The Conference Treasurer, \$375. per year; Conference Secretary, \$175.; Conference Sunday School Secretary, \$75. per year; Conference Statistician, \$50. per year; and the Editor of the Michigan Pilgrim, \$40. per year. All Conference officials shall receive 6 cents per mile for miles traveled in the interest of the Conference. Youth Director shall receive \$75. per year. Additional secretarial or clerical help on any or all Conference officials shall be provided by the district council.

No. 22 --- BURIAL BENEFITS

All actively engaged pastors, evangelists and the ministers of the Conference shall be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association as well as their wives. Cost of membership and calls shall be paid from the treasuries of the department that employs them. Complete Resolution appears in Standing Rule No. 20 of the 1947 Minutes.

MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

No. 23 -- ORDER OF SERVICE

The afternoon service of the last day of the Ministerial Convention shall be the concluding service of the Convention.

MISSIONARY

No. 24 --- REPORTS

A yearly report of each missionary society shall be printed in the CONFERENCE MINUTES.

PASTORS

No. 25 --- PASTORS AT CAMP MEETING

Inasmuch as our pastors are expected to support and attend the annual Camp Meeting, each church shall provide the equivalent of the pastor's offering or salary for the two Sundays of the Camp and the pastor shall be privileged to attend the entire Camp Meeting.

No. 26 --- PARSONAGE UTILITIES

The local church shall provide good, modern heating and cooking facilities for the parsonage, the type to be suitable to the locality where the parsonage is situated. All churches in the Michigan Conference are to provide the utilities for the parsonages.

The Conference shall provide the same for the Conference parsonage.

No. 27 --- VACATIONS

It is recommended that our churches grant their pastors a two-weeks vacation with pay. The Conference Superintendent shall be given a two-weeks vacation with pay.

No. 28 --- RECALL OF PASTOR

The second week of May shall be designated as the time for the churches of our Conference to vote on the recall of the pastor.

SUPERINTENDENT

No. 29 --- APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEES

The Conference Superintendent shall appoint all committees. The Standing Committees are to be appointed to include new members where possible and to avoid the duplication of men on several committees.

No. 30 --- RETIRING SUPERINTENDENT

Whenever there shall be elected another Conference Superintendent, the Conference shall take steps to fill the pastorate left vacant by recommending the retiring superintendent to that church as a pastor. The Conference Council may also recommend him to the field of evangelism.

No 31 --- MINISTERIAL CONVENTION COMMITTEE

A committe of six shall be appointed as a Ministerial Convention Committee by the Conference Superintendent. Two shall be appointed for three years, two for two years, two for one year, and two shall be appointed each year respectively.

No. 32 --- REVIVALS

Our Conference Superintendent shall be allowed to hold two two-Sunday meetings per year, either on or off the District, other than his regular work.

No. 33 --- YOUTH EXECUTIVE COMMITTE BUSINESS MEETING

Inasmuch as there is need of more intensive youth activites during the conference year, the Conference Youth Executive Council shall hold quarterly meetings.

No. 34 --- YOUTH CONVENTIONS PROGRAM

Our Youth Convention shall consist of Saturday morning and Saturday afternoon business sessions with a great youth rally Saturday evening.

A youth program under the direction of the youth council shall be correlated with the regular camp session, consisting of a youth service each week-day morning, and a recreational period each afternoon.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

Third Pilgrim Holiness Youth Convention of the Michigan Conference August 3, 1957.

The Third Pilgrim Holiness Youth Covention of the Michigan Conference convened at 2:00 p.m., August 3, at the Pilgrim Holiness Camp Grounds at Hopkins, Michigan.

The convention was called to order by Rev. Eldon Schram, Youth Executive Secretary. Robert Robinson conducted the song service. Prayer was offered by Rev. M. C. Kittle.

Rev. A. C. Doehring, Conference Superintendent, was presented. He greeted the convention expressing his hopes that the youth societies might grow in spirituality as well as in numbers during the coming year.

Rev. M. C. Kittle was presented as the presiding officer of the convention. Rev. Carl Barrett was elected Treasurer.

Rev. Clyde Marshall thanked the convention for the vote of confidence and pledge his best in the interest of Michigan Conference Youth. He also paid tribute to Rev. Eldon Schram for his fine work as Executive Secretary for the past two years.

The Finance Committee reported:

YOUTH CAMP

- (9) There shall be an annual youth camp with date and the program of the camp to be set by the youth council.
- (10) Work shall begin as soon as possible on the program for the Higgins Lake Youth Camp. A work program shall be set up by the youth council.
- (11) The following plan shall be used to raise funds for the Higgins Lake project: An offering for the Higgins Lake project shall be received by each society the first Sunday of each month. Said money shall be forwarded to the zone treasurer monthly.

Charts shall be made available by the Executive Committee to each society in order that the society might see its part in contributing to the Higgins project.

ZONE

- (12) Regular zone rallies shall be held.
- (13) The election of zone officers and the annual zone business meeting shall be held at the last zone rally of the conference year.
- (14) The officers of the zone shall consist of President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer. The Pastors and youth Presidents shall be active voting members of the business session.
