FIRST SITTING

The first sitting of the 58th Annual Michigan Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 9:00 a.m., July 31, 1958, at the Hopkins Camp Grounds, Hopkins, Michigan.

Rev. R. L. Mohl, pastor at Jackson, led in singing, "The Solid Rock" and "O Happy Day". Mrs. Vaughn Drummond presided at the piano.

Rev. J. H. Koteskey, assistant conference superintendent, read from Matt. 5:13-20, and led the conference in prayer.

The roll was called and approved. The conference bar was set in accordance with Conference action of 1957; namely, the first eight rows in the three center sections of the tabernacle. The hours of the conference sittings were announced as 9:00 a.m. to 12 noon, 1:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.

Rev. C. L. Walker, Sunday school secretary, gave his report. It was moved and carried to accept this report.

Rev. William H. Osborne, executive youth secretary, gave his report. It was moved and carried to accept the report.

Rev. Mrs. B. E. Manker reported for the committee on memoirs. They were: Mrs. William H. Neff, wife of our general superintendent; two ministers and one ordained deaconess from the Michigan Conference: Mrs. Ella Ewers, Rev. F. H. Harmon and Mrs. Ada Elliott. It was moved and carried to accept this report.

A short memorial service was observed in memory of these workers. The audience stood for silent prayer, after which Rev. M. L. Goodman offered the memorial prayer.

It was moved and carried to recess until 1:30 p.m. Dr. H. T. Mills dismissed with prayer.

SECOND SITTING

The conference re-convened for its second sitting at 1:30 p.m. with the singing of "Tis So Sweet To Trust in Jesus", led by Rev. R. L. Mohl. Mrs. Mohl was at the piano. Rev. W. H. Joppie, former district superintendent, led in prayer.

Rev. A. C. Doehring, conference superintendent, presented our general superintendent and presiding officer, Dr. William H. Neff. He quoted this Scripture for our meditation: II Cor. 3:5 "Not that we are sufficient of ourselves to think any thing as of ourselves; but our sufficiency is of God".

A motion from the floor regarding change of fiscal year was lost.

Moved and carried to adjourn.

FOURTH SITTING

The conference re-convened for the fourth sitting on Friday morning, August 1, at 9:00 a.m. Rev. R. L. Mohl led in singing "Near the Cross" with Mrs. Vaughn Drummond at the piano.

Rev. W. L. Silvers, pastor at Ellsworth, led in prayer.

Dr. William H. Neff, general superintendent, read from Phil. 3:1-4 and spoke briefly on these points:

1. "Beware of dogs"
2. "Beware of evil workers"
3. "Beware of the concision"

4. "Have no confidence in the flesh"
 1. "We are the circumcision"
 2. "We worship God in the Spirit"
 3. "We rejoice, we magnify Jesus Christ"
- The audience sang "Power in the Blood".

Minutes of the first, second and third sittings were read and approved.

Dr. Neff asked for a point of personal privilege. He acknowledged with deep appreciation every kindness and consideration shown during the illness and passing of Mrs. Neff.

Rev. R. L. Mohl, secretary of the Ways and Means Committee, reported:

Resolution No. 1 regarding Standing Rule No. 18 was adopted.

Resolution No. 2 regarding district Sunday school work was adopted.

Resolution No. 3 regarding a change in the Church Extension Fellowship was not recommended by the committee or given consideration from the floor.

Resolutions No. 4 (substitute for No. 3) regarding aid for small churches was adopted.

Resolution No. 5 regarding deficit was adopted.

Resolution No. 6 regarding new method of camp financing was adopted.

Resolution No. 7 regarding entertainment for children and young people was adopted.

It was moved and carried that this be placed in the standing rules.

Resolution No. 8 regarding conference budget was adopted with this amendment: "that the Church Extension Fund stay the same and the additional amount of \$.75 for the Church Extension Fund and the additional amount of \$.25 for the Church Extension Loan Fund be placed in the branch Sunday school fund."

Resolutions No. 9 was taken care of by No. 8.

Resolution No. 10 regarding funds for Ionia was adopted.

Resolution No. 11 regarding presentation of Church Extension Fellowship to our churches was adopted with this amendment:

"that if the district superintendent or one of his council members cannot be present, the pastor will expect to present this proposition".

The Resolutions Committee presented Resolutions 13-17 but they were not acted upon.

Rev. C. E. Moran dismissed with prayer.

FIFTH SITTING

The conference reconvened in its fifth sitting with the singing of "I'll Live For Him", led by Rev. R. L. Mohl. Rev. James Witmer led in prayer.

Dr. William H. Neff, our General Superintendent, admonished the pastors and churches to pay their general budget. He stressed that the Executive Council was taking action to enforce the stipulation in our Manual that no pastor or delegate could be seated in the district conference if their general budget was not paid.

The minutes of the fourth sitting were read. After minor corrections they were approved.

The Resolutions Committee reported:

Resolution No. 13 regarding rescission of Resolution No. 7 in the 1957 Conference Journal was adopted.

It was moved and carried that the committee bring in a new proposal with reference to the youth camp.

Resolution No. 14 regarding requirements of local preachers was ruled out of order by the chair.

Resolutions No. 15 regarding license for lay evangelists was ruled out of order by the chair.

Resolution No. 16 regarding work of the Church Extension Board was adopted.

Resolutions No. 17 regarding combined meetings of district and youth councils was adopted, with this amendment:

"that the executive youth secretary became an ex-officio member of the district council with a voice but not a vote."

Resolution No. 18 regarding election of Sunday School Committee was ruled out of order by the chair.

Resolutions No. 19 regarding camp board was adopted with the following amendment: "that we request the Council to fill these additional members for this year only."

The Conference Secretary reported for the Council on a camp development project.

It was moved and carried that the disposition of this entire matter be left in the hands of the Council, with two reservations:

"Due to the possible need of more buildings for our camp and conference, **BE IT RESOLVED** that the Conference reserve the parcel of land beginning at a point 15 feet east of Twining Cottage, southeast corner of foundation, north 75 feet, thence east to present road going over the hill north, thence south along road 75 feet, thence back to point of beginning.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the sale of lots be started on a day following the 1958 Conference as designated by the District Council. This to be done after reasonable advertising in our churches."

Resolution No. 23 to send greeting to Rev. and Mrs. Roger Bassett, Miss Orpha Case, Mrs. Catherine Cliff, Mrs. Myrtle Greenman, Rev. and Mrs. R. C. Hawkins, Rev. and Mrs. M. C. Kittle, Mrs. Lillian Lash, Rev. and Mrs. E. G. Ritenburg, Rev. and Mrs. B. O. Shattuck, Mrs.

Mae Sturk, Mrs. Gertrude Thompson, Mrs. Emily Woods, Mrs. Mary Gaylord, Mrs. F. H. Harmon, Mrs. Lydia Briggs, Chaplains Eugene Freisen and Paul Kreider, and any other the secretary wishes to contact, was adopted.

Dr. Neff asked to be excused to make plane connections. The audience sang "God Be With You."

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To our beloved General Superintendent, Dr. Neff, fellow ministers, delegates and friends of the 59th Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the Michigan District. Greetings!

In this crucial, critical, and grim hour of world history, it will behoove us to pause in prayer and ask God to direct the leaders and Statesmen of the world. The nuclear war that is threatening the world can be stayed by the providential intervention of our great God.

It is with a deep sense of heart-felt gratitude that we give thanks to our God and Saviour who has enabled us to gather together to hold our Conference and Camp for the second time on the camp grounds He has so graciously provided.

I do not find words to express the feeling of my heart for the wonderful co-operation and kind reception we have received from the pastors and churches of the district. The Christian fellowship, the kind words of appreciation and encouragement will never be forgotten. We just say a big **THANK YOU**.

SPIRITUAL CONDITIONS

In my visits to the churches and pastors, we discovered a real concern to have their churches progress spiritually. Among the many burdens of the pastors (the setting of goals, planning programs, financial problems, and concern for numerical increase) I sensed that the deepest burden was to have a fresh anointing and visitation of the Holy Spirit upon their churches, resulting in a harvest of souls. Several of our churches have experienced a real revival spirit with souls praying through and new people added to the church. Thanks be to God, the days of the visitation of the Spirit are not passed! I keenly feel the spiritual progress of the district and the smoothness with which it has operated in most places this year has been the result of the spiritual emphasis of the pastors. The prayers of the Family Altar of the Michigan Conference, the 1261 praying daily for the leadership and visitation of the Holy Spirit, has been blessed of God.

Nevertheless, the year has not been without attacks from the enemy. In a few places he has tried to disrupt the spiritual progress of the church by bringing in confusion and discord. But the God of all grace intervened and we are marching on in progress and victory.

TEMPORAL PROGRESS

This has been a year of mortgage burning. The church at Bellaire, Traverse First, Breckenridge, and Muskegon burned the mortgages including both parsonage and church. Sterling burned the mortgage on their church.

Almira has built a new parsonage. The pastor, Rev. and Mrs. Ford, have already moved in. This church is only a little over a year old.

Ashley purchased a new electric stove for the parsonage and put a new roof on the church. Other improvements were also made.

Alma has continued to make improvements in their new educational unit.

Battle Creek First has made improvements in it's Sunday school facilities amounting to around \$8,000. They have also set new records in D.V.B.S., an average of 298, and a record high of 333 present.

Battle Creek Second called Rev. Witmer for their pastor and are looking for a suitable house for them. Not having a church parsonage, they no doubt will rent for awhile.

Burnips is forging ahead with their new 50x100 ft. church building. The footing is already in.

Bellaire received a gift of new pulpit furniture, which it was my privilege to dedicate. They have also added rest rooms to their church.

Breckenridge has done some remodeling in their church basement and burned the mortgage on their entire property.

Cheboygan is planning to side their new parsonage this year. They are having the best attendance, as far as I know, in the history of the church.

Coleman has made much improvement in their church building. An entire new front has been added including the pastor's study, two Sunday school rooms, and two rest rooms. The basement has been remodeled and painted. A new junior auditorium has been added and a new oil furnace installed. This improvement amounted to around \$10,000 leaving only \$2,000 indebtedness.

Eaton Rapids has entirely remodeled the building purchased for a new church. No doubt, they will be occupying it in the near future. This is the first church in the Michigan Conference to use electricity for heating. We are anticipating fine results.

Grand Rapids has plans to sell its present church and built a new plant in a new location in the city. This church also painted the camp kitchen and put formica tops on the counter and tables.

Hastings is planning to build a new church on the grounds they purchased last year.

Houghton Lake built a new garage next to the parsonage and added cement sidewalks around the church and parsonage. A new furnace was installed in the parsonage and other improvements were made.

Kalamazoo has made many improvements on it's church. Their progress, however, is hindered by their location. They desire to sell and build elsewhere.

Lansing First brought valuable property in a new development of the city. They plan to build a new church and educational unit in the near future. They have had the greatest numerical gain of any previous year in the history of the church. A \$3,800 Hammond Organ was given to the church by some new converts. It was my privilege to dedicate this new gift.

Lutz Corners added a new paint job to their church.

Merrill remodeled part of their parsonage.

Midland First made many improvements in the basement of their new church. They now have a large assembly room with newly decorated Sunday school rooms on each side. For a new church just dedicated this conference year, they have done exploits.

Midland Grace put in sidewalks, fixed the lawn in front of the church and parsonage, and graveled their parking lot. Both of the Midland churches received a \$5,000 gift from the Dow Chemical Foundation.

Muskegon burned the mortgage on their entire property.

Owosso is remodeling its recently purchased parish house. They set a new average record of 270 in their D.V.B.S. this year.

Sault Ste. Marie installed a new furnace in their parsonage and remodeled their basement to accommodate youth gatherings.

Scottville added two large rooms to their parsonage and are planning to remodel the entire parsonage.

Sterling burned the mortgage on their church.

Traverse First paid off their entire indebtedness. They are planning to add a Sunday school unit to their church.

Traverse Heights installed new gas furnace in their church and parsonage, purchased a new electric range, put siding on their church, and did some landscaping around their property.

In a year of recession, I feel our churches have done wonderfully well. Be well assured this progress has been made because of the untiring leadership of the pastors and wives, and through the cooperation of the laity. May God bless your church as you continue to greater progress and victory.

MISSIONARY SOCIETIES

The District Missionary Society purchased new stainless steel flatware for the camp dining hall. They desire a new project for this year. The Pioneer Zone Missionary Society purchased oil cloth for all the tables in the dining room. If any missionary society or church desires to take a project for the coming year, I will give you some suggestions; decorating the workers' cottage on the inside, supplying the workers for the painting of the dining hall, a new pulpit desk for the tabernacle, a large electric mixer and a large window fan for the kitchen, a porch floor on the south end of the dining hall, and the steps leading to the upper floor of the west dormitory must also be rebuilt. To the district society, and the Pioneer Zone Society we say **THANK YOU** for the splendid gift you gave the camp. All of us appreciate it and will enjoy it for years to come.

NEW CHURCHES ORGANIZED

Two new churches were organized this year. St. Helen, with Rev. Raymond Apley as pastor, organized with 10 members. They have a fine new cement block church. This little group is making the payments on the church property; Rev. and Mrs. Apley are sacrificing much to help them do this. The district is furnishing the parsonage.

Rev. Norman E. Nixon, while pastoring a small but godly group of people at Crystal, directed them to unite with us. It was my privilege to expound to them our manual; then the group of 11 with the pastor united with the Pilgrims. They are worshiping in a previously closed Methodist Church. Brother Nixon is continuing his work with them. Let us pray God will enlarge their borders this year.

OUR CAMP GROUNDS

As we left the grounds last year, all of us were conscious of the fact that at least three major things needed to be done before another camp meeting. They were: the need of more parking space, an increased water supply, and adequate electrical wiring. The council, committees, and

willing workers, have accomplished at least in part, all three of these. At the close of the camp last year we were able to purchase 6½ acres north of the drive adjacent to the camp grounds. Just before the camp last year, we purchased 1½ acres south of the drive. This gives us an almost square plot of 21 acres for our camp grounds.

The driving of the present well to a better supply of water, the drilling of a new well in the same well pit, the installing of heavier electrical equipment, the running of wiring to break up the currents for housing and trailers, and the moving of earth, grading, and filling that have been done costs money. To accomplish this, the council floated a loan of \$5,000. We are hoping this will be entirely covered by the 1000 Club. We are thankful to Rev. Messer and Rev. Koteskey for the fine work, even beyond the call of duty, they did on these grounds during the year.

FUTURE PLANS FOR CAMP

Some lots are now available for cottages and more will be as soon as the committee can get them plotted. Much earth has been removed and some filling needs to be done. The over-all plans are to supply lots for everyone who desires to build a cottage. An open trailer court will be available for those who come and go during camp and conference time. A more private trailer court is planned for those who desire to select a plot for their house trailers instead of building cottages. We trust in time the lake frontage will be sufficiently filled to make into a park with tables and benches for all the camp to enjoy. If we push the 1000 Club, these things will be accomplished soon. Other plans include providing for more adequate rooms for the camp. We trust that direction will be given more fully by this conference.

MINISTERIAL CHANGES

I cannot remember any previous year when we have had as few pastoral changes as we have had this year. Several pastors already had extended calls, while eight or nine received extended calls this year.

Rev. J. C. Brillhart resigned from Battle Creek Second and is entering the evangelistic field.

Rev. and Mrs. J. D. Witmer accepted Battle Creek Second.

Rev. and Mrs. W. E. Sexton are moving to Edgetts.

Rev. and Mrs. Lyle Reynolds accepted Frankfort.

Rev. and Mrs. Evan Downey are moving to Chesaning.

A FEW SUGGESTIONS

1. In these days of joining and belonging to clubs in every age group, I suggest that each pastor with his church board get the ones who are saved to join the church as soon as possible. Rev. Kulp used to say, "If you don't string your fish when you catch them, someone else will string them for you."
2. I suggest that each church of the district, who has not already done so, adopt the directions given by the General Conference and organize a Junior Church with Junior Church membership. This is to be effected wherever possible.

3. I suggest that each zone of the district through the ministerial retreat, or the Sunday school committee, or the youth committee, or all three combined, work for the establishing of at least one branch Sunday school in each zone with the objective of making it a preaching point as soon as it becomes advisable to do so. Direction and approval are to be given by the district council.
4. I suggest that the church extension committee, as soon as possible after this conference, survey the different possibilities for opening new churches. They should then present to the district council a program for the opening of at least one new church in the district. yearly. This to be made a district project over and above the zone projects.
5. I suggest we as a conference extend the Church Extension Fellowship by enlarging its usefulness to include the starting of new works and the helping of struggling churches instead of just the building of a new church building. Each call is to be under the direction and approval of the district council. I trust the committees will take these suggestions under consideration, and if they deem it advisable, bring to this conference resolutions for us to consider.

A WORD OF APPRECIATION

I wish to express my gratitude to the pastors, their wives and families, for giving us every kind consideration. Your prayers for us, your kind and understanding spirit, with your deep concern for the spiritual welfare of your people and community have made my work among you a real joy. Likewise to my assistant, Rev. Koteskey, and to the district council, I wish to say Thank You for your assistance and kind, understanding spirit. When I became bewildered, and in the midst of my mistakes that seemed to be so prevalent, you gave such kind and considerate counsel. I doubt if any district superintendent has ever been shown any more kindness and consideration from the pastors and council than has been bestowed upon me this year. With you, as pastors, at the helm of your respective churches, and the district council to help direct, I am sure the district is in safe hands.

To our beloved General Superintendent, Dr. W. H. Neff, Rev. A. C. Doebling, and friends. It is with praise and thanksgiving to God that I give this report to the Michigan Conference.

First, allow me to give my personal testimony. I love God with all my heart. He sweetly saves and sanctifies, and am enjoying His blessing. Ada Sowers Elliott

Mrs. Ada Sowers Elliott was born in Mason, Michigan, February 10, 1873, to Sarah and George Sowers. She departed this life Tuesday, April 22, 1958, at the age of 85 years. She was united in marriage to the late Rev. P. F. Elliott, December 18, 1890. To this union were born six sons and four daughter, three (Fred, Glen, and Anna) of whom preceded her in death.

Early in her married life she was converted, and later sanctified. As a faithful wife and devoted mother she stood by her husband's side through many years of ministry. They held pastorates in the following places: Mason, Lansing, and Owosso, Michigan; and also in Dover, Delaware. Her husband spent many years in the field of evangelism, in which he enjoyed great success. All of these years, Mrs. Elliott stayed at home, reared the children, prayed earnestly, and proved a real blessing in the local church.

Sister Elliott and her husband were among the pioneers of the Pilgrim Holiness work in Michigan. Thirty-eight years of her life were spent in Owosso. She was a mother in Israel, and a highly-esteemed member of the College Pilgrim Holiness Church. Her godly life and noble deeds will live in the memories of her host of friends in the church and community.

The funeral was held in the Owosso church. There were 21 ministers together with many friends, present. Rev. M. L. Goodman was in charge of the service. Rev. A. C. Doebling, District Superintendent of the Michigan Conference, a long-time friend of the family, brought the message. His theme was taken from the scripture where Mary broke her alabaster box and anointed Christ unto his burial.

Dr. H. T. Mills and Rev. M. L. Goodman spoke briefly. At Sister Elliott's request, Mrs. Goodman sang, "The Last Mile of the Way", and "Good Night and Good Morning".

Mrs. Elliott was laid to rest by the side of her husband in beautiful Oakhill Cemetery, there to await the sounding of the trumpet that shall awaken the righteous dead. — PILGRIM HOLINESS ADVOCATE.

Ella E. Ewers

Rev. Mrs. Ella E. Ewers, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Orrin Shaw, was born in Bunkerhill, Michigan, November 9, 1872. She lived there until she was 18 years of age.

On October 2, 1889, she was married to the late Rev. E. F. Ewers, and to this union were born a son, Paul E., now of Ferndale, Michigan, and a daughter, Flossie Gard, of Oakland, California.

Rev. E. F. Ewers was for many years associated with Bible Holiness Seminary of Owosso, now known as Owosso College. He was a long-time member of the board of trustees, and served as its treasurer from 1911 to 1914. At one time he served as assistant superintendent of the Michigan District.

Rev. and Mrs. Ewers were the first pastors of the Pilgrim Holiness Church in Owosso, starting the work in 1911. They served until 1917, after which they pastored elsewhere in Michigan, Indiana, and New York. They returned in 1939, retiring from the ministry, and lived to observe their sixty-first wedding anniversary in October, 1950.

She was an ordained minister of the Michigan District, and for many years served on the Memorial Committee. She was faithful in her duties, strongly adhering to the old-fashioned way.

She was laid at rest in the Fair View Cemetery at Dansville, Michigan, there to await the great resurrection morning when the dead in Christ will rise to be forever with their Lord.

Frank H. Harmon

Rev Frank H. Harmon was born December 8, 1875, and went to be with his Saviour on December 5, 1957, after having a heart attack on December 4.

He was united in marriage to Rosa Woker on February 24, 1898. To this union, seven children were born; three preceded him in death.

Brother Harmon began his ministry before he was eighteen years of age. He joined the United Brethren Church and was ordained to the ministry in that denomination. MICHIGAN CONFERENCE RESOLUTIONS

- 1—Inasmuch as we believe that the Michigan District desires to make real progress and fervently desires to increase God's kingdom on earth; therefore, we propose the following aggressive program for the Sunday school department of the District:

Point No. One.

1. That each Sunday School co-operate with the quadrennial program of achievement as set forth by the Sunday school departments of the general church.
2. That the increase in Sunday school attendance be not less than ten per cent.
3. That there be a regular monthly meeting of Sunday school teachers and officers in each local church.
4. That the pastors and superintendents of each zone meet once every three months to discuss problems and new ideas for the Sunday school.
5. That each Sunday school sponsor a revival at least once a year. The ultimate aim of every teacher should be to win each pupil to Christ and develop in them a more Christlike spirit.
6. That each Sunday school board conduct an annual promotion day and we suggest that it be the last Sunday in June.
7. That the local church Sunday school board conduct a Sunday school survey of the community and follow up all prospects. (Survey should be made at least once every three years).
8. That our Sunday schools provide the best available literature from our own publishing house. We should strongly urge the introduction of graded lessons in schools that have the facilities for departmentalization.
9. That the district promotional secretary or a member of the committee visit one of the Sunday school rallies in each zone of the district each year.
10. That we have a district-wide Sunday school drive to climax with an Easter Sunday rally. (to illustrate: Church with 100 average Easter Sunday goal . . . 130). The goal is to be equivalent to a thirty per cent increase of our present membership, to follow up all new prospects, and show an interest in their spiritual welfare.
11. That each zone strive to have a Sunday school promotional service every quarter (pep meeting). Each church in the zone is to take responsibility in boosting these services. Each pastor should urge the teachers and superintendents to attend regularly.
12. That our teachers endeavor to make of each pupil a Sunday school booster and soul-winner.

13. That special effort be put forth to reduce the tremendous loss we have experienced with teen-aged boy and girls. We must plug this gap by winning them to a vital experience of salvation. Each teacher of this group should supply interests and activities sufficient to tie this group in with the program of the church.
14. That these recommendations be read by the pastor to at least two meetings of the Sunday school staff this year, that adequate time be given for discussion of these items, and that they be posted in a prominent place in the church.

Point No. Two.

We recommend that our district Sunday school committee consist of promotional secretary (chairman), vice chairman, secretary, and treasurer. We recommend that two of them be appointed each year and serve a two year term. Furthermore, we recommend that the district be organized into zones similar to the district youth zones, and that a Sunday school committee be placed in each zone. This committee to consist of a chairman, vice chairman, a secretary and a treasurer. Their duty is to work the district chairman and his committee in promoting the work of the Sunday Schools. The objectives of these zone committees are:

1. To plan at least four Sunday school promotional services (pep meetings) for their zone each year.
 2. To plan one Sunday school institute in their zone each year. This could take the place of one of the promotional meetings.
 3. To start at least one branch Sunday school in their zone each year.
 4. To plan and help promote a state-wide Sunday school promotional day of all zones at the annual camp meeting.
- 2—Be it resolved that the word "morning" be substituted for the word "afternoon" in Standing Rule No. 23, page 27, of the 1957 Journal.
 - 3—Be it resolved that all standing rules now affecting our conference be printed in their entirety and be placed in the standing rules.
 - 4—Whereas the ordination service is of extreme importance in the life of a minister and because the family of the candidate may desire to be present, plans may need to be made well in advance of such service, therefore be it resolved that the Educational and Examining Board examine and notify such candidate 15 days prior to the conference.
 - 5—Lost.
 - 6—Be it resolved that the following resolution be substituted for Standing Rule No. 15, page 26, of the 1957 Journal. "There shall be no duplication of nominations for any district office."
 - 7—Inasmuch as the local church programs is handicapped by lack of information concerning conference action for the first part of the church fiscal year, be it resolved that a mimeographed copy of all officers and new legislation be sent to each local church by September 1 by the conference secretary.

- 8—Whereas there has been a desire on the part of some purchase lots and build cottages on the camp ground, and whereas there has been no plan provided by conference action, therefore be it resolved that the district council present a detailed plan to this conference for its consideration. This plan to include lot size, price, utility provision, a fair method of distribution, availability of cottages for use other than camp purposes, length of possession, etc.
- 9—Whereas the youth activities during camp and also the work program as prepared by the camp board must of necessity be planned many weeks prior to camp, therefore be it resolved that incumbents of the district youth council and of the camp board serve until the close of the camp each year, even though new members may have been elected at conference time and
Be it further resolved that any new officers who may be elected to said boards shall serve with the retiring members until the close of the camp.
- 10—Whereas there is a need for competent officers in the youth zones; be it resolved that the zone officers and zone pastors present nominations for the offices of zone secretary and zone treasurer.
- 11—Lost.
- 12—Whereas the church fiscal year ends on June 30 and because there is a period of three months between the time a pastor is called and the time he moves, be it resolved that the date for district camp be moved up to Friday of the second week of July.
- 13—Whereas new developments have arisen at the Hopkins camp grounds with the purchase of additional acreage, and whereas it seems advisable to reconsider the location of a youth camp, therefore be it resolved that Resolution No. 7 on page 22 of the 1957 Conference Journal be rescinded and that this matter be reconsidered.
- 14— Ruled out of order.
- 15— Ruled out of order.
- 16—Be it resolved that the church extension committee, as soon as possible following conference and camp and likewise every year following camp, study and survey any or all areas where a new church may be started. Be it further resolved that after careful examination of the various possibilities that the committee forward its information on to the district council with its recommendations. Be it also resolved that the most promising and assuring project be recognized as a district project and that finances, attention, interests, and prayers be focused on this project. Be it further resolved that this be placed in the standing rules.
- 17—Whereas there needs to be a closer working relationship between the district council and the youth council be it therefore resolved that there be two combined meetings of these councils each year. Be it further resolved that the first meeting be in the first six months of the church fiscal year and that the second meeting be in the second six months of the church year.

The above was amended as follows: "that the executive youth secretary become an ex-officio member of the district council with a voice but not a vote".

18—Ruled out of order.

19—Inasmuch as there is no standing rule in regard to a camp meeting board in our present Conference Journal, and inasmuch as the present camp board has been operating in accordance with Standing Rule No. 20 on page 25 of the 1954 Conference Journal, be it resolved that same rule as amended below become a standing rule in the Conference Journal.

The amendment is as follows: be it resolved that a camp meeting board of nine members be elected for terms of three years. Be it further resolved that for the election of the three new members this year, one member is to be elected for three years, one member is to be elected for two years, and one member is to be elected for one year. The numerical order of this election shall determine the terms of the three newly elected members.

The above was further amended as follows: "that we request the council to fill in these additional members for this year only."

20—Whereas the conference has instructed the resolutions committee to bring in a resolution giving directive concerning youth camp, be it resolved that the youth council continue to rent a camp until such time as the youth council presents to this conference a request to develop a youth camp of their own.

21—Be it resolved that a standing vote of thanks be given to our general superintendent, Dr. Wm. H. Neff, for his fine leadership in our conference.

22—Be it resolved that a vote of thanks be given the camp board for their splendid work.

23—Be it resolved that this conference send greetings to Rev. and Mrs. Roger Basset, Miss Orpha Case, Mrs. Catherine Cliff, Mrs. Myrtle Greenman, Rev. and Mrs. R. C. Hawkins, Rev. and Mrs. M. C. Kittle, Mrs. Lillian Lash, Rev. and Mrs. E. G. Ritenburg, Rev. and Mrs. B. O. Shattuck, Mrs. Mae Sturk, Mrs. Gertrude Thompson, Mrs. Emily Woods, Mrs. Mary Gaylord, Mrs. Rose Harmon, Mrs. Lydia Briggs, Chaplains Eugene Freisen and Paul Kreider, and any other the secretary wishes to contact.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1—Inasmuch as Owosso Bible College has become a liberal arts college financed by the General Church, therefore be it resolved that the Bible College portion of the conference budget as stated in rule No. 18, page 26 of the 1957 Journal, be deleted.

2—Whereas there is a certain amount of expense in connection with promoting the district Sunday school work, be it therefore resolved that the following plan be put into effect; Sunday schools with an average:

50 to 74	\$5.00
75 to 99	\$7.50
100 to 149	\$12.00
150 to 199	\$15.00
200 to 299	\$20.00
300 and over	\$25.00

Be it further resolved that this be placed in the standing rules.

3—Not considered.

4—(Substituted for No. 3)

Inasmuch as there is a financial need among some of the smaller churches of the conference, and, whereas, there may be times when two Church Extension Fellowship calls are not made; be it resolved that when and if no call is made to the church Extension Fellowship within any six months period, the district superintendent shall have the authority to send a letter to each member asking for the call which shall be used in aiding struggling churches as specified by the district council.

Members are to be instructed that their original pledge does not bind them to this payment, but that it shall be on voluntary basis of giving.

This is to be a part of Standing Rule No. 4, page 24 of the 1957 Journal.

5—Inasmuch as a deficit of \$3,565.67 exists in the Conference Administrative Fund; be it resolved that this deficit be erased by transferring \$1,800 from the Church Extension Loan Fund and \$800 from the Church Extension Fund, to the Administration Fund.

6—Inasmuch as the camp financing plan known as the "Thousand Club" does not meet the need; be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 3, page 24 of the 1957 Journal, be deleted from the conference journal. Be it further resolved that the proposed pledge card be adopted for use in raising finances for the camp.

7—Whereas all lay member's children between the ages of 12 and 20 are charged a registration fee of \$2. for the youth convention or a fee of \$5. for the entire camp; and whereas all actively engaged ministers' children under the age of 16 are entertained free of charge for camp and conference; be it resolved that recognized actively engaged and

retired ministers of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, their wives, and their children 11 years and under shall be entertained free for camp and conference. All ministers' children 12 to 20 years old shall be charged the same registration fee for camp and youth convention as the laymen's children of these ages.

- 8—Be it resolved that the conference budget be the equivalent of \$8.50 per member and that it be divided as follows:

- 10—Inasmuch as it seems impractical to start a church at Ionia at this time; be it resolved that the amount of \$1,065. in the Church Extension Fellowship specified for Ionia be made available to start a new church elsewhere. This release is to be contingent upon the approval of fellowship members.

- 11—Inasmuch as there is a need to sustain interest and to develop future growth of the Church Extension Fellowship; be it therefore resolved that the Church Extension Fellowship be presented at least once a year to all local churches by the district superintendent or some other district official. Be it further resolved that this be a part of Standing Rule No. 4, page 24 of the 1957 Journal.

The above was amended as follows: "that if the district superintendent or one of his council members cannot be present, the pastor will be expected to present this proposition".

STANDING RULES

CAMP

No. 1 — CAMP MEETING FUNDS

The conference treasurer shall submit an itemized report of camp meeting funds as recorded in Standing Rule No. 17, page 18 of the 1946 Conference Journal:

"Receipts; cash on hand; received in church assessments and cash offerings; received in dining room; received from lunch stand; received from incidentals and total receipts. Disbursements: paid for camp evangelists; paid for camp workers; paid for provisions for dining room; paid for provisions for lunch stand; paid for fuel, water and electricity; paid for incidentals, and balance. This report to appear in the minutes".

No. 2 — CAMP MEETING SUNDAY SCHOOL SESSION

On the two Sundays during camp meeting there shall be a Sunday school session beginning at 9:30 a.m. until 10:15 a.m. following the testimony meeting; said session shall be arranged and supervised by the Sunday school committee.

A credit card shall be given to all in attendance, and each card shall be signed and returned by the pupil to his local church Sunday school secretary for the attendance record and reports to the conference.

No 3 — CAMP BOARD

A camp board of nine members shall be elected in the following manner: three members to be elected for three years; three members to be elected for two year; three members to be elected for one year. Following this, three members shall be elected annually for three year term.

Board duties: secure all manual workers for camp and conference; supervise grounds and building; purchase good and necessary equipment for camp and conference; have charge of all advertising. Any member of the camp board who has served for a period of three years shall not be re-elected to the camp board until at least three years have expired. The conference council shall provide nominations from which board members shall be elected.

No. 4 — MINISTER' EXPENSES

Recognized actively engaged and retired ministers of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, their wives, and their children 11 years and under shall be entertained free for camp and conference. All ministers' children 12 years to 20 years old shall be charged the same registration fee for camp and youth convention as the laymen's children of these ages.

CHURCH EXTENSION

No. 5 — CHURCH EXTENSION FELLOWSHIP

Inasmuch as the present church extension department of our conference is not producing the number of new churches that we are capable of producing, and whereas, the establishing of new churches is necessary for a steady and healthy growth for any conference, and whereas there appears to be a definite weakness in our present policy of raising funds for church extension work, the Michigan Conference adopted a Church Extension Fellowship wish reads as follows:

CHURCH EXTENSION FELLOWSHIP OF THE PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH, MICHIGAN CONFERENCE

Holding the conviction that God would have us further the cause of Christ by establishing new churches within our conference borders, I subscribe the following:

(a) I will pray for the leading of the Lord in the work of the Church Extension Board.

(b) I will be alert for any possibilities of new churches and will inform the Board.

(c) I recognize that the first financial obligations in the opening of a new work are the most difficult to meet, and will therefore be responsible for two units, (\$5. per unit), to total \$10.00 for the Church Extension Fellowship.

(d) I assume this obligation for not more than two new works in any one conference year. Said works to be approved by the Church Extension Board.

(e) I will try to secure other members for the Fellowship.

(f) I understand this agreement may be terminated any time I deem it necessary by notifying the Church Extension Board.

No. 6 — CHURCH EXTENSION COMMITTEE

The church extension committee, as soon as possible following conference and camp and likewise every year following camp, shall study and survey any or all areas where a new church may be started. After careful examination of the various possibilities the committee shall forward its information on to the district council with its recommendations. The most promising and assuring project shall be recognized as a district project and finances, attention, interests, and prayers shall be focused on this project.

CONFERENCE

No. 7 — CONFERENCE YEAR

The conference year shall close June 30, and complete reports must be reviewed by the local boards and forwarded directly to the conference statistician, Rev. V. L. Draggoo, 746 Michigan Street, Eaton Rapids, Michigan, by July 15. All reports received after July 15 shall be omitted from the yearly report.

No. 8 — TIME OF CONFERENCE

Conference shall be held Thursday and Friday preceding camp meeting.

No. 9 — RESOLUTIONS

No resolutions shall be presented to the conference until it has been typewritten and signed.

No. 10 — CONFERENCE SESSIONS

The first eight rows in the three center sections shall constitute the conference bar. The hours of conference sittings shall be from 9:00 a.m. to 12 noon, 1:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.

No. 11 — DELEGATES

No delegates shall be seated in the conference unless they are elected by their respective churches.

No. 12 — ORDINATION SERVICE

The order of business on the first night of the conference shall be the ordination service.

No. 13 — COMPANIONS OF CANDIDATES

We recommend that the companion of each candidate be given an honorary seat with him (or her) during the ordination service.

No. 14 — RECOGNIZED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

All treasurers' books of the conference shall be audited annually by a recognized public accountant so that a report from the auditor can be given to the conference when called for.

ELECTIONS

No. 15 — ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Election of officers shall be immediately following conference reports.

No. 16 — OPEN BALLOT

All district officers shall be elected by open ballot, except those nominated by the district council.

No. 17 — NOMINATIONS

There shall be no duplication of nominations for any district office.

CREDENTIALS

No. 18 — EDUCATIONAL AND EXAMINING BOARD

The conference superintendent shall be chairman of the Educational and Examining Board by virtue of his office.

No. 19 — LICENTIATES

The conference superintendent shall have read Section 99, 100, and 101, of the Manual instructing all conference licentiates that hereafter they shall appear before the conference examining board at conference time before their credentials shall be granted.

FINANCE

No. 20 — CHURCH BUDGET

Each church shall raise for the United Stewardship Fund the equivalent of \$8.00 per member, and for the Conference Budget the equivalent of \$8.50 per member; the Conference Budget to be divided as follows: Conference Church Extension \$2.00; Conference Church Extension Loan Fund, \$1.25; Ministerial Relief, \$0.75; General Conference Delegate Expense, \$0.25 administrative Fund, \$2.25; Camp Meeting Expense, \$0.50; Youth Department \$0.50; Sunday School Department, 1.00. Each local church shall pay its budget monthly from the local church treasury. (Conference Treasurer: Rev. C. E. Messer, Box 155, Burnips, Michigan).

No. 21 — DISTRICT AND GENERAL FUNDS

All monies raised in the local church for conference and general work shall be sent to the conference treasurer, who shall forward general funds to the general treasurer.

No. 22 — ADMINISTRATIVE FUND

The local church treasurer shall send to the conference treasurer along with the monthly budget the equivalent of 10 per cent of the pastor's salary for the Administrative Fund.

Also, ministers doing secular work shall turn one-half of their tithe to the Conference Budget.

All other licensed and ordained ministers shall turn 10 per cent of their ministerial income to Administrative Fund.

No. 23 — SALARIES

The Conference Superintendent's salary shall be set at \$4,400. per year, plus seven cents per mile traveling expenses. The Conference Treasurer, \$375. per year; Conference Secretary, \$175.; Conference Sunday School Secretary, \$75. per year; Conference Statistician, \$50. per year; and the Editor of the Michigan Pilgrim \$40. per year. All conference officials shall receive six cents per mile for miles traveled in the interest of the conference. Youth Director shall receive \$75. per year. Additional secretarial or clerical help by any or all conference officials shall be provided by the district council.

No. 24 — BURIAL BENEFITS

All actively engaged pastors, evangelists and the ministers of the conference shall be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association as well as their wives. Cost of membership and calls shall be paid from the treasuries of the department that employs them. Complete resolution appears in Standing Rule No. 20 of the 1947 Conference Journal.

"Each local church in the Michigan District shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association, and pay the expense of their membership, and each call that comes thereafter, from the church treasury.

All general full-time evangelists and their wives, receiving their principal support from their meetings shall be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association, said membership and each call that comes thereafter shall be paid by the church of which he is a member.

Also that the District Superintendent and his wife shall be included, the expense to be paid from the minister's one-half tithe fund.

The ministers employed in our educational institutions and their wives to be included in this action and the expense be paid from the Bible School Treasury.

Our home missionary pastors are included in this action, the expense to be paid from the home missionary treasury.

The retired elderly ministers and their wives are included in this action, the expense to be paid from the ministerial relief fund."

MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

No. 25 — ORDER OF SERVICE

The morning service of the last day of the ministerial convention shall be the concluding service of the convention.

MISSIONARY

No. 26 — REPORTS

A yearly report of each missionary society shall be printed in the CONFERENCE MINUTES.

PASTORS

No. 27 — PASTORS AT CAMP MEETING

Inasmuch as our pastors are expected to support and attend the annual camp meeting, each church shall provide the equivalent of the pastor's of fering or salary for the two Sundays of the camp and the pastor shall be privileged to attend the entire camp meeting.

No. 28 — PARSONAGE UTILITIES

The local church shall provide good, modern heating and cooking facilities for the parsonage, the type to be suitable to the locality where the parsonage is situated. All churches in the Michigan Conference are to provide the utilities for the parsonages.

The Conference shall provide the same for the conference parsonage.

No. 29 — VACATIONS

It is recommended that our churches grant their pastors a two-weeks vacation with pay. The conference superintendent shall be given a two-weeks vacation with pay.

No. 30 — RECALL OF PASTOR

The second Sunday of May shall be designated as the time for the churches of our conference to vote on the recall of the pastor.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS

No. 31 — DISTRICT EXPENSE

Whereas there is a certain amount of expense in connection with promoting the district Sunday school work, the following plan shall be put into effect; Sunday schools with an average:

SUPERINTENDENT

No. 32 — APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEES

The conference superintendent shall appoint all committees. The standing committees are to be appointed to include new members where possible and to avoid the duplication of men on several committees.

No. 33 — RETIRING SUPERINTENDENT

Whenever there shall be elected another conference superintendent, the conference shall take steps to fill the pastorate left vacant by recommending the retiring superintendent to that church as a pastor. The conference council may also recommend him to the field of evangelism.

YOUTH CAMP

- (9) There shall be an annual camp with date and the program of the camp to be set by the youth council as soon as possible after youth conference.
- (10) A one-dollar registration fee shall be sent with youth camp registration card by each applicant to the district youth treasurer fifteen days prior to youth camp. The remainder of the fee will be paid on the day of registration.
- (11) The youth council shall continue to rent a camp until such time as the youth council presents to this conference a request to develop a youth camp of their own.

ZONE

- (12) Regular zone rallies shall be held.
- (13) The election of zone officers and the annual zone business meeting shall be held at the last zone rally of the conference year.
- (14) The officers of the zone shall consist of President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer. The pastors and youth presidents shall be active voting members of the business session.
- (15) There shall be a report by each zone president to the Executive Secretary within two weeks following a zone rally on report blanks supplied by the Executive Secretary.

DISTRICT ACTIVITIES

- (16) A district youth rally shall be held annually under the supervision of the Youth Council. The time, date and place are to be determined by the Youth Council.
- (17) There shall be a combined annual business meeting of the district executive officers and the zone presidents immediately following zone elections to formulate plans for district activities.
- (18) Inasmuch as the Youth Council is desirous to uphold the standards of of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, we therefore recommend that action be taken not to allow any person to work during camp or conference wearing makeup, immodest forms of dress, or anything contrary to church standards as stated in the Manuel.

- (3) Be it resolved that a one dollar registration fee be sent with Youth Camp registration card by each applicant to the district youth treasurer fifteen days prior to Youth Camp. The remainder of the fee will be paid on the day of registration. This is to take the place of Resolution No.2, page 33, of the 1957 Conference Journal. Be it further resolved that this be placed in the standing rules.
- (4) Be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 6, page 34, be changed to read: The local society treasurer shall send 25% of the total offerings to the zone treasurer the week following the last Sunday of each month. Be it further resolved that one-half of the zone rally offerings be sent to the district treasurer to be used for district expense.
