Journal Of Proceedings Hopkins, Michigan August 4-5, 1960 First Sitting

The first sitting of the 60th Annual Michigan Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 9:00 a.m., August 4, 1960 at the District Camp Grounds, Hopkins, Michigan.

Rev. A. C. Doehring called the conference to order after which Rev. J. D. Witmer led in the singing of "Tis So Sweet To Trust In Jesus." Rev.

J. H. Kotesky led in prayer.

Rev. Doehring then presented our General Superintendent and presiding officer, Dr. R. G. Flexon. Dr. Flexon addressed the conference from Romans 10:11-14. The ministers were urged to do more expository preaching - that is reading the scripture and explaining it. Our ministers must make long range plans, keep our churches spiritual, and promote growth.

The roll call was read and approved. Rev. C. M. Marshall read a recommendation from the District Council concerning the seating of pastors and delegates from churches where budgets were not paid in full. It

was moved and carried that this recommendation be accepted.

A recommendation from the District Council brought the following ministerial transfers:

Phillip W. Mitchell from the East Michigan District as a second year licentiate.

Paul F. Elliott from the Northern Indiana District as an ordained minister.

Clifford Van Sickle from the East Michigan District as a fourth year licentiate.

Walter Thomas from the California District as a fourth year licentiate.

It was moved and carried to receive these ministers into our conference and fellowship. Dr. Flexon and Rev. Doehring welcomed the new members which were also received by a standing vote of the conference.

Second Sitting

The conference re-convened for its second sitting at 1:30 p. m. with Rev. J. D. Witmer leading in the singing of "Leaning On The Everlasting Arms." Mrs. Draggoo played the piano.

Rev. M. L. Goodman led in the opening prayer.

Rev. C. M. Marshall read the minutes from the first sitting and they were approved.

The following tellers were appointed: C. Dean, E. Carl, P. Mitchell, C. Johnson, D. Warren, R. Diehl, W. Manker, V.Randall.

Before proceeding with the election, Dr. Flexon led in prayer.

The ballots were cast and the following elected: Rev. A. C. Doehring, District Superintendent, Rev. J. H. Kotesky, Assitsant District Superintendent, Rev. C. M. Marshall, District Secretary, and Rev. C. Messer, District Treasurer.

Advisory members of the council: Rev. M. L. Goodman, Rev. V. Draggoo and Rev. D. Price.

The conference was recessed for 10 minutes.

The welcoming committee presented Rev. and Mrs. C. Hendrick to the conference. It was moved and carried that they be given seats in the conference bar.

The motion was made and carried that the trio, Wesley Manker, James Witmer and Vaughn Drummond, sing.

The election continued with the following being elected: Mr. Burdette Shattuck, District Trustee, Rev. M. L. Goodman and Rev. F. McCallum elected to the Board of Education and Examination.

The conference recessed for 10 minutes so that cars could be moved to permit spraying of the camp grounds.

The election then continued: Rev. L. Kessor was elected to the Church Extension Board, Rev. Evan Downey was elected to be Editor of the Michigan Pilgrim. Rev. Carroll Johnson, Rev. Phil Mitchell and Rev. Ron Diehl were elected to the camp board.

It was moved and carried to adjourn for the supper hour.

After announcements were made, Rev. A. C. Doehring dismissed in prayer.

Third Sitting

The third sitting of the Michigan Conference reconvened at 7:00 p.m. Rev. J. Witmer led the congregation in the singing of "Rock of Ages" and "A Charge To Keep I Have." Mrs. Draggoo accompanied at the piano.

Dr. R. G. Flexon called for the following ordination candidates to come forward, Lyle Reynolds and Carroll Johnson Candidates for the ministry and Mrs. Darolene Reynolds candidate for deaconess. Rev. Doehring led in prayer.

Rev. J. H. Kotesky read from I Timothy 3, Rev. M. L. Goodman read from II Timothy 4:1-8, and Rev. C. Marshall read from Titus 3:1-11.

- Dr. R. G. Flexon took his text from I Kings 17:24, "Thou art a man of God." The candidates were reminded of their obligations to their church and exhorted to be loyal to God, denomination, and superior officers. Rev. Flexon reminded them of what their relationship should be to other ministers, and local congregations, as well as their duty to themselves. They should be patient, punctual, kind and impartial.
- Rev. A. C. Doehring presented the candidates with their certificates. Rev. J. Witmer led in the singing of "We're Marching To Zion." There was a brief altar service and the ordination service was dismissed by the singing of "My Jesus I Love Thee."

Rev. Flexon called the conference to order.

Resolution No. 4 regarding putting the election of officers as the last item of conference business. Carried.

Resolution No. 5 regarding the sending of two pastors to a foreign missionary field. Lost.

Resolution No. 6 regarding the use of our pastors as speakers in the afternoon services of camp. Lost.

Resolution No. 7 regarding pastor's vacations and revival meetings. Lost

Resolution No. 8 ruled out of order.

Resolution No. 9 regarding the recall of pastors and pastoral change. Lost.

Resolution No. 10 regarding that the conference go on record as opposing the election of a Roman Catholic President. Carried.

Conference was adjourned by expiration of time.

Announcements were made.

Rev. R. G. Flexon closed in prayer.

Fourth Sitting

- Rev. A. C. Doehring called the conference to order. Rev. J. D. Witmer led in the singing of "Take Time To Be Holy." Mrs. Draggoo was at the piano.
- : Dr. R. G. Flexon spoke from St. Luke 9:57-62. Dr. Flexon pointed out seven things that need to be stressed to help our churches grow and become more spiritual. They are: 1. Schools, 2. Finances, 3. Recreation activities for the young people, 4. Goals, 5. Branch Sunday Schools, 6. Junior churches and 7. House to house visitation.

Resolution No. 11 regarding the course of study listed by Owosso College for ordination. Carried.

Resolution No. 12 regarding voting to ratify the purchase of the Hopkins Camp Grounds. Lost.

It was moved and carried to rescind former action on resolution no. 12.

Resolution No. 13. It was moved and carried to table this resolution. Resolution No. 14 regarding having the conference during camp. Lost. Resolution No. 15 regarding the time for the ministerial convention. Carried.

Resolution No. 16 regarding rescinding resolution no. 9, page 24 in the conference resolutions. Lost.

Resolution No. 17 regarding a church organizational planning committee of three. It was amended to add the following "The services of the committee shall be available at the call of the pastors." Carried as amended.

Resolution No. 18 regarding the appointments of the following to Owosso College:

Dr. F. McCallum, Dr. P. F. Elliott, Rev. R. Evans, Dr. C. Thomas, Mrs. B. Keinbaum, Dr. J. Stauffer, Rev. D. Warren, was adopted. It was moved and carried to recess 10 minutes.

Rev. E. Klein reported for the Ways and Means Committee.

Resolution No. 1 regarding standing rule no 21 be amended to read "the Bible Department of Owosso College." Motion carried.

Resolution No. 2 regarding Owosso College representatives visiting the churches annually. Carried.

Resolution No. 3 regarding the superintendent's salary was amended to include "the equivalent of his social security." Motion carried as amended.

Resolution No. 4 regarding salaries of statistician and editor of Michigan Pilgrim. Motion carried.

Resolution No. 5 regarding Pilgrim Pension Plan. Motion carried.

Rev. L. Kessor reported for the resolutions committee.

Resolution No. 12 regarding voting to ratify the purchase of Hopkins Camp Ground. Carried.

It was moved and carried to reconsider resolution no. 13.

Resolution No. 13 regarding the developing of camp grounds. Motion carried.

A motion was made from the floor regarding accommodations for delegates during conference. Lost.

A resolution was made from the floor regarding appointing a committee for the investigation of a joint camp meeting with the East Mich igan District, Motion Lost.

It was moved and carried to extend the time.

Rev. C. Hendrick was requested to inform us as to the feelings of the East Michigan Conference regarding a joint camp.

Conference dismissed in prayer by Rev. C. Marshall.

Fifth Sitting

The fifth session of the conference re-convened with Rev. J. D. Witmer leading in the singing of "Love Lifted Me." Mrs. Draggoo was at the piano.

Dr. Clifford Thomas led in prayer.

Sister Schultz of the Nazarene Church was introduced to the conference by Brother Flexon. It was moved and carried to give her a seat within the conference bar.

It is therefore not only necessary for us in this conference to set new goals, but if we are to successfully carry forth our commission in the face of the world's turmoil and the world's fears, we must bend every effort to be fully cemented together in Unity of Purpose, Unity of Effort, and Unity in Scriptural Standards Any thing less than this will only tend to bring confusion in our ranks, and nullify our efforts to win souls for Christ.

In these days when we hear so much about compromising and world-liness, and I know we stand in no small danger of both, I am more afraid of becoming legalistic and staid and drifting into a complacent attitude in the midst of the needy souls around us and the many opportunities we have to work for Christ. We need not fear of being set adrift on the sea of confusion, midst clammering voices and contrary winds, if we adhere to and faithfully execute the Great Motto of our Church, "In Essentials Unity, In Non-Essentials Liberty, and In All Things Charity."

Midst the versatile business that will be placed before this Conference, which will demand our full attention and clear thinking, may it all tend to keep before us the eternal value of a soul, and to hear more specifically the words of the Master, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel", reminding us afresh of our great responsibility to this generation, even in the face of a darkening world.

Improvements Among The Churches

It is with pleasure I bring to you the report of the building and remodeling program made by the churches.

Owosso finished and dedicated their large new educational unit.

Grand Rapids, now Berkley Hills, built and are occupying their fine new church in a residential community.

Lansing First is occupying and have dedicated their new church located in a beautiful residential district. They have also purchased a lot 80 x 186 feet adjacent to the church for parking facilities.

The fine new church at Burnips is in use. They dismantled the old one and used much of the material in their educational unit, which is as yet not fully finished on the inside.

Kalamazoo is making good progress in their new location having purchased a church building in Parchment.

Battle Creek First is completing the large educational unit added to its church.

The Church at Frankfort burned, and they are building a new church which is nearly finished.

Lansing Emmanual built a new parsonage, and dug the basement for a new church.

After long planning the good people at Hastings have started to build their new church.

Merrill remodeled and dedicated their Youth Activity Center.

Lansing Grace moved in a parsonage, and added a new unit to their church.

Almira is planning to add a new addition to their parsonage.

Midland Grace added a large room on their parsonage and also built a garage.

Scottville has made improvements on their church.

Our new church at Wyoming City has had a constant growth both in Sunday School attendance and Church membership. They are now worshipping in a new school building but they are making plans to build.

These many improvements and buildings have increased the valuation of property in our district several hundred thousands dollars.

District Achievements

This report is not in the spectacular but we thank God that for years we have had a steady growth in membership, Sunday school attendance, and in every department of the church. The report revals the membership gain of 6% and the Sunday School gain of 6.3%. A full report will be received from the statistician and the respective secretaries. Two branch Sunday Schools have been started, one in Polaski and the other in Mason. The one in Polaski closed for the lack of community co-operation. The one at Mason has developed into a Pilgrim Mission. Several other places seem to have possibilities for a Pilgrim Church. I trust the Church Extension Committee will make a survey of these as soon as possible after the conference.

Youth Society

The Michigan Youth purchased two hundred dollars, (\$200.00) worth of mattresses for the youth dorms. I am sure the youth camping on the grounds will appreciate this gift. We as a council deeply appreciate it. The Youth also had the largest and best organized youth camp we have had. Their great need is for two or more one week camps, divided in age limits, so better instruction and supervision can be given. As the number of youth increase in the district the demands for larger and better facilities will increase.

Missionary Society

The Missionary societies have continued to make fine contributions to help fill some of the needs of the camp. They supplied silverware and chairs for the dining hall, curtains and shades for the dorms, dining hall and workers cottage, carpet runners for the alter in the tabernacle, and paint for the workers cottage. Thanks to the societies, and to the committee for directing this work.

Pastoral Changes

It might be a note of interest to you to have this report. Rev. Kessor moved to Jackson, and Rev. Kraatz to Breckenridge. Rev. Ford accepted Lansing Grace, and Rev. Randall accepted Elmira. Rev. Watkins moved to Cheboygan and Rev. Ranson to Lutz Corners. Rev. Mitchell is at Midland Grace, Rev. Jackson at Crystal and Rev. Estle Engle has accepted Newberry. We bid each one God's best as they take up their work in their new fields of labor.

A Note Of Encouragement

While the salary of some of our pastors is still small and some pitifully small, it will be encouraging to you to know that thirteen pastors have received increases in salary the past Conference year. May God hasten the day when every pastor will have a good livable wage.

A Few Suggestions

Since much of the advance we have made as a church today is among the youth. In our planning with them and for them, I suggest that the youth hold their conference before, instead of after the District Conference. This would make it possible for them to immediately place before the District Conference any thing on which they desired the district's approval.

I further suggest that since we must do all we can to tie our youth to our district, we make provisions to enlarge the needed facilities so proper supervision can be given the young people during the camp—via more housing, a recreational field, and a center recreational pavilion. It may just be possible that some delegate here would like to pledge his church for one of the projects, or two churches unite to see that this great need is supplied for the youth. If so the project could be named after the church or churches.

I would like to further suggest that a committee be appointed to make a survey of all our smaller churches to see if assistance can be given them to expedite their growth, in organizing or re-organizing the program of their church, or even in some financial aid if necessary. I feel it is as important for our smaller churches to grow and become strengthened, as it is to start new churches.

In my visits to the churches I discovered a need for having blue prints or pencil sketches of parsonages and churches in the medium price range available. This is true especially among the churches with limited finance. I suggest that we as a conference petition the general church to make such available, or if they cannot, then we as a district proceed to fill this need.

A Word Of Appreciation

I deeply appreciate the help and councel I received from my good assistant Rev. Kotesky, and the loyal assistance from the district council. It is a pleasure, even in the midst of difficult problems, to work with men who love God and have a deep interest in every phase of the district. We also say "Thank You" to every pastor and his wife and the members of the churches for showing us every kindness and bestowing upon us every consideration possible. May God supply you with His rich grace and His presence in every hour of need.

Report Of The District Sunday School Secretary

To our honored General Superintendent, Dr. R. G. Flexon, and our District Superintendent, Rev. A. C. Doehring, and to the members of this 60th Annual Conference of the Michigan District.

I am very gratful to have a little part in this great Sunday School work that is being carried on by the entire church. I love our church and appreciate its doctrines and standards. I appreciate the leadership of our superintendents and all of our general officers. It has been a great pleasure to work with Brother Doehring, our District Superintendent, these three years. He has been a great blessings to me and we have had wonderful fellowship these years as we have worked together. It has also been a pleasure to work with our entire Sunday School Committee. They have each one co-operated in carrying on the Sunday School work. All have been ready and willing at all times to accept any assignment they have been askd to perform. Each of our five zone chairman have co-operated with the district committee.

Our tour this year was one of the best we have had in these three years. The district committee presented this program in all five zones:

- 1. Promotion of attendance.
- 2. Promotion of publicity.
- 3. Promotion of finance.

This was well attended in all zones. The comments of pastors, Sunday school superintendents, teachers, and Sunday school workers, were: "Wonderful," "This is what we need," "There is something here for every Sunday school," "This is what we have been waiting for." God has blessed the district Sunday school work this year. The Capitol zone has started a branch Sunday School in the lovely city of Mason, twelve miles south of Lansing. At this time they are having Sunday School in the home of Brother and Sister Vern Walker. Rev. T. H. Meyers, who is a member of my church in Lansing, is over-seeing this work. The prospects are good and they are looking for a place to rent or buy. Pray much for them.

Let us not forget the resolutions no. 1 - 2, that were passed in our 1958 conference. The primary objective of this Sunday school organization plan is four-fold:

- 1. To bring about a closer relationship between the local Sunday School and the district Sunday School program.
- 2. To promote growth in the local Sunday School.
- 3. To promote closer co-operation of the Sunday School in the zones.
- 4. To encourage zone participation in starting branch Sunday Schools.

The co-operation of the Sunday Schools has been wonderful. All forty-one schools have complete reports (except Fayette, no report since June 1957). Twenty-two Sunday schools showed gains, eighteen schools showed losses, one was even. Numerical gain per Sunday was 275. Percentage gain per Sunday was 6.3%. Our average weekly attendance this year was 4,169 over last years average of 3,894. Sunday schools of the year:

I submit the following suggestions for the district Sunday Schools:

- 1. That each Sunday School co-operate with General Church Sunday school program of actually participating in the Standard of Excellency.
- 2. That each school make a gain of at least 25 per cent in total enrollment this year.
- 3. That a cradle roll be maintained in each school equal to at least 15 per cent of the total enrollment.
- 4. To win more families secure or renew pledges from at least 50 per cent of the active enrollment to try to win a family this year.
- 5. To enangelize with D.V.B.S. and each Sunday school promote one in its church this year.
- 6. To reach more through visitation make calls equal to ten times the total enrollment.
- 7. That specific places be found where efforts could be made to organize a branch Sunday school.
- 8. That all Sunday schools supply each teacher and officer with an individual copy of the Sunday School Advance.
 - 9. That all Sunday schools conduct regular workers meetings.
- 10. That each Sunday School send their school Superintendent and a delegation to the District Sunday School Rally each year at the Pilgrim Holiness Camp at Hopkins.
- 11. That pastors, and Superintendents of each zone meet once every three months to discuss problems and new ideas for Sunday Schools.
- 12. That each church, wherever possible, sponsor at least one branch. Sunday school during the year taking into consideration both colored and white people.

Michigan Conference Resolutions

1. Whereas the ministers of the Michigan District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church are the spiritual leaders of the flock, and whereas all ministers should be examples of spirituality and prayfulness during the camp meeting, and whereas the prayerful and faithful cooperation of the ministers adds much to the spiritual success of the Camp Meeting, therefore be it resolved that all actively engaged ministers of the Michigan District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church be urged to sit on the platform during the evening services only. Be it further resolved that a time and place be designated in the camp schedule for a daily ministers prayer

meeting in addition to the regular morning prayer service and that all ministers of the Michigan District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church be expected to attend this prayer service.

- 2. Inasmuch as the Annual Ministerial Convention is primarily for the benefit of the ministers of our district, and whereas the problems of ministers and laymen are very diversified and should be discussed privately, therefore be it resolved that all morning and afternoon sessions will be closed to the public and open only to the ministerial family. Be it further resolved that all evening services shall be open to the public.
- 3. Inasmuch as there is so much work to do in the preparation and maintenance of the camp ground be it resolved that each church be responsible for five days work per year to the Conference at the call of the District Council. Be it further resolved that any work that is not taken care of during work week be taken care of by help hired by the Camp Board at \$1.25 an hour. This Resolution to become a Standing Rule.
- 4. Whereas open and public debate is the democratic method of attaining united action in all conference issues, and whereas the burdened expression of opinion presented by speakers on the Conference floor have a definite bearing on the results of the election of officers, be it therefore resolved that the elections of officers be the last item of business in the conference. Be it further resolved that this resolution replace standing rule no. 16 on page 30 of the conference minutes.

- 10. Inasmuch as we are opposed to the apparent aggression of the Roman Catholic Church into the political arena of our nation with its consequent threat to religious freedom in particular. Be it resolved that this conference go on record as opposing the election of a Roman Catholic to the presidency of the United States. Be it further resolved that this resolution be mineographed and sent to each pastor by Sept. 1, 1960 and he be urged to read it to his congregation.
- 1. Whereas a clear understanding is needed in our district concerning the course of study requirements for ordination;

 Be it resolved that the course of study requirements as presented in the 1960-61 catologue of Owosso College be printed in the conference minutes, and that this resolution be made a standing rule.
- 12. Whereas there has, for a considerable period of time, been a marked difference of opinion among the members of the Michigan District concerning the advisability of continuing the purchase, maintainence, and development of our present camp ground at Hopkins, Michigan, and whereas it appears that this marked difference of opinion has resulted in indecision, lack of proper planning, and inefficient operation of many of the material aspects in camp and conference, and, whereas all the above mentioned things taken to-gether is definately producing a dilatory effect upon the greatly needed and united support of the entire Michigan District for the interests and needs of our camp ground, and, whereas these

conditions cannot and must not be charged to any one individual, or any group of individuals, but are the responsibility of every member of the Michigan District: Be it therefore resolved that clear and definite action be taken by this conference specifically aimed at clarifying our purposes, dissolving our differences, and delegating authority for the continued purchase, maintenance, and development of our camp ground at Hopkins, Michigan. Be it further resolved that a rising vote be taken in this conference ratifying the previous council action in the purchasing of the Hopkins Holiness Camp.

13. In order that the Hopkins Camp might have a progressive and orderly development, be it resolved that a camp planning and promotion committee be elected by this conference. It shall be the duty of this committee to prsent to the 1961 annual conference for consideration an illustrated camp development plan. This plan shall include a five-year program with a specified project as a goal for each year. Plans for financing the projects shall also be presented by this committee. This committee shall have the duty of advertising the camp and its services. The committee, through its chairman, shall annually report the progress of the development program to the district conference with recommendations and suggestions for the ensueing year. It is recommended that the committee consult the district council and the camp board for any recommendations they might have. This committee shall consist of six members. This conference shall elect six members: Two members for 3-year terms, two members with 2-year terms, two members with 1-year terms. Ten names shall be presented by the district council from which these six members shall be elected. The order of election shall retermine the term of office. Hereafter the district conference shall elect two members annually from at least four nominations from the district council. The chairman of the committee shall be chosen annually by the committee.

14. Lost.

15. Be it resolved that standing rule no. 27 (page 32, 1959 journal), read as follows: The morning service of the last day of the ministerial convention shall be the concluding service of the convention. The ministerial convention shall begin on the 4th Tuesday evening of April.

- 17. Whereas some churches appear to have a potential for greater growth and whereas there seems to be a need for better organization in many of the smaller congregations, and inasmuch as the Conference Superintendent has recommended a "Planning Committee" in his annual report; Be it resolved that the council be authorized to set up a Church Organizational Planning Committee of three, the purpose of which is to assist smaller churches with such organizational plans as would tend to encourage more rapid growith. The services of this committee shall be available at the call of the pastors.
- 18. We do hereby recognize and approve the stationing of the following ordained ministers to serve in the ministry of Owosso College for the year 1960-1961: Dr. Floy d McCallum, Dr. Paul Elliott, Dr. Clifford Thomas, Rev. Ronald Evans, Rev. Bertha Kienbaum, Rev. Donald Warren, and Rev. Joshua Stauffer.

- 19. An amendment was made to Standing Rule No. 9, page 29, 1959-1960 Conference Journal. Furthermore, that the secretary of the committee provide the conference chairman, conference secretary, and district superintendent with copies of the resolutions as read to the conference.
- 20. Whereas there is a definite need of a more efficient supervision of the grounds, buildings and other facilities of our camp ground, be it therefore resolved: that the district council be authorized to hire a full time caretaker to accomplish the care and maintenance of Hopkins, Pilgrim Holiness Camp Ground.
- 21. Be it resolved that a standing vote of thanks be given to our General Superintendent, Dr. R. G. Flexon, for his fine leadership in our conference.
- 22. Be it resolved that a vote of thanks be given to the camp board for their splendid work.
- 23. Be it resolved that the district secretary be instructed to send greetings to those absent members of the conference, such as missionaries, retired ministers, those who may be ill, and officials engaged in other areas of the church.

Resolutions Of Ways And Means Committee

- 1. Whereas the Owosso College has been requested by the Accrediting Association to maintain separate records of the Bible Department, therefore, be it resolved that in Standing Rule No. 21 the words "Bible Department of Owosso College" be substituted for Owosso College.
- 2. Be it resolved that the Bible Department of Owosso College be given the privilege of visiting annually the churches, and that an offering be received. Be it further resolved that this be placed in the Standing Rules.
- 3. Be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 24 be changed to read as follows: The Conference Superintendent's salary shall be set at \$4.500.00 per year, the equivalent of his social security, full 6% pension plan, family plan hospital insurance, and 7c a mile traveling expenses.
- 4. Be it resolved that the salaries of the conference statistician and editor of the Michigan Pilgrim, as mentioned in Standing Rule No. 24, be changed to conference statistician, \$75.00, and editor, \$50.00 per year.
- 5. Whereas, the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized the Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc. to make loans of pension funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches under such conditions as require active participation on the part of the Pilgrim Holiness Districts.

Therefore, be it resolved by the Annual Conference of this district that the District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials be, and they are hereby authorized, to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in said Resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.

6. Be it recommended that the Pilgrim Holiness Churches of the Michigan District enroll their pastors and families in the group hospitization plan that is in effect in the Michigan Conference. This is to become a Standing Rule.

Standing Rules

Camp

No. 1 — CAMP MEETING FUNDS

The conference treasurer shall submit an itemized report of camp meeting funds.

No. 2 — CAMP MEETING SUNDAY SCHOOL SESSION

Sunday School committee.

On the two Sundays during camp meeting there shall be a Sunday school session beginning at 9:30 a.m. until 10:15 a.m. following the testimony meeting; said session shall be arranged and supervised by the Sunday School committee.

A credit card shall be given to all in attendance, and each card shall be signed and returned by the pupil to his local church Sunday school secretary for the attendance record and reports to the conference.

No. 3 — CAMP BOARD

A camp board of nine members shall be elected in the following manner: three members to be elected for three years; three members to be elected for two years; three members to be elected for one year. Following this, three members shall be elected annually for three year terms.

Board duties: secure all manual workers for camp and conference; supervise grounds and buildings; purchase good and necessary equipment for camp and conference. Any member of the camp board who has served for a period of three years shall not be re-elected to the camp board until at least three years have expired. The conference council shall provide nominations from which board members shall be elected.

No. 4 — CAMP MAINTENANCE

Each church shall be responsible for five days work per year to the conference at the call of the District Council for camp maintenance. Be it further resolved that any work that is not taken care of during work week be taken care of by help hired by the Camp Board at \$1.25 an hour.

No. 5 - MINISTER'S EXPENSES

Recognized actively engaged and retired ministers of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, their wives and their children 11 years old and under shall be enterained free for camp and conference. Trailer courts and tent facilities are included in this free entertainment. All minister's children 12 years to 20 years old shall be charged the same registration fee for camp and youth convention as the laymen's children of these ages.

Church Extension

No. 6 — CHURCH EXTENSION FELLOWSHIP

Inasmuch as the present church extension department of our conference is not producing the number of new churches that we are capable of producing, and whereas, the establishing of new churches is necessary for a steady and healthy growth for any conference, and whereas there appears to be a definite weakness in our present policy of raising funds for church extensions work, the Michigan Conference adopted a Church Extension Fellowship which reads as follows:

CHURCH EXTENSION FELLOWSHIP OF THE

PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH, MICHIGAN CONFERENCE

Holding the conviction that God would have us further the cause of Christ by establishing new churches within our conference borders, I subscribe to the following:

- (a) I will pray for the leading of the Lord in the work of the Church Extension Board.
- (b) I will be alert for any possibilities of new churches and will inform the Board.
- (c) I recognize that the first financial obligations in the opening of a new work are the most difficult to meet, and will therefore be responsible for two units, (\$5. per unit), to total \$10.00 for the Church Extension Fellowship.
- (d) I assume this obligation for not more than two new works in any one conference year. Said works to be approved by the Church Extension Board.
 - (e) I will try to secure other members for the Fellowship.
- (f) I understand this agreement may be terminated any time I deem it necessary by noitfying the Church Extension Board.

Inasmuch as there is a financial need among some of the smaller churches of the conference, and there may be times when two Church Extension Fellowship calls are not made, the following plan may be used. When and if no call is made to the fellowship within any six months period, the district superintendent shall have the authority to send a letter to each member asking for the call which shall be used in aiding struggling churches as specified by the district council.

Members are to be instructed that their original pledge does not bind them to this payment, but that is shall be in a voluntary basis of giving.

The Church Extension Fellowship shall be presented at least once a year to all local churches by the district superintendent or some other district official. If the district superintendent or one of his council members cannot be present, the pastor will be expected to present this propsition.

No. 7 — CHURCH EXTENSION COMMITTEE

The church extension committee, as soon as possible following conference and camp and likewise every year following camp, shall study and survey any or all areas where a new church may be started. After careful examination of the various possibilities the committee shall forward its information on to the district council with its recommendations. The most promising and assuring project shall be recognized as a district project and finances, attention, interests, and prayers shall be focused on this project.

No. 8 — COLLEGE

Be it resolved that the Bible Department of Owosso College be given the privilege of visiting annually the churches, and that an offering be received.

Conference

No. 9 - CONFERENCE YEAR

The conference year shall close June 30, and complete reports must be reviewed by the local boards and forwarded directly to the conference statistician, Rev. Kenneth P. Boileau, 746 Kimball, Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan, by July 15. All reports received after July 15 shall be omitted from the yearly report.

No. 10 — DATE OF CONFERENCE AND CAMP MEETING

Conference shall be held Thursday and Friday preceding camp meeting. Camp meeting shall start Friday preceding the first week in August.

No. 11 — RESOLUTIONS

No resolutions shall be presented to the conference until it has been typewritten and signed. Furthermore, the secretary of the committees shall provide the conference chairman, conference secretary, and district superintendent with copies of the resolutions as read to the conference.

No. 12 — CONFERENCE SESSIONS

The first eight rows in the three center sections shall constitute the conference bar. The hours of conference sittings shall be from 9:00 a.m. to 12 noon, 1:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.

No delegates shall be seated in the conference unless they are elected by their respective churches

No. 13 - ORDINATION SERVICE

The order of business on the first night of the conference shall be the ordination service.

No. 14 — COURSE OF STUDY REQUIREMENTS FOR ORDINATION

Those persons desiring to be ordained in the Pilgram Holiness Church of the Michigan District may meet the EDUCATIONAL REQUIRE-MENTS in any of the following ways:

- I. Successful completion of the courses of study as outlined in the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- II. Successful completion of the following three-year Ministerial Course at Owosso College.
 - 1. 94 semester hours, including at least 60 hours from the Division of Religion.
 - 2. Completion of the reading course or its equilvalent as prescribed by the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

This standard will be required of all candidates graduating during 1962 and thereafter. Those graduating prior to 1962 with the Bible College degrees of either Bachelor of Theology or Bachelor of Arts in Bible will be considered to have met the educational requirement for ordination. Those graduating prior to 1962 with liberal arts degrees will be required to meet this standard or a minimum of 60 semester hours in the field of religion and Bible.

*Courses that can be counted in the field of religion or liberal arts.
**14 hours in Bible and/or religion (including a minimum of 6 hours in Bible) may be substituted for the Greek rquirement.
This standard provides for 69 hours in the field of religion

- IV. Successful completion of a combination of the above programs, said combination to be determined by the Educational Examining Board of the respective District Conference.
- V. Candidates providing evidence of equivalent educational preparation from our other colleges or similar institutions or like home study courses shall have their work evaluated according to the programs outlined above.

No. 15 — COMPANIONS OF CANDIDATES

We recommend that the companion of each candidate be given an honorary seat with him (or her) during the ordination service.

No. 16 - RECOGNIZED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANT

All treasurer's books of the conference shall be audited annually by a recognized public accountant so that a report from the auditor can be given to the conference when called for.

Elections

No. 17 — ELECTION OF OFFICERS

The election of officers shall be the last item of business of the conference.

No. 18 — OPEN BALLOT

All district officers shall be elected by open ballot, except those nominated by the district council.

No. 19 — NOMINATIONS

There shall be no duplication of nominations for any district office.

Credentials

No. 20 — EDUCATION AND EXAMINING BOARD

The conference superintendent shall be chairman of the Educational and Examining Board by virtue of his office.

No. 21 — LICENTIATES

The conference superintendent shall have read Section 104 and 105, of the Manual instructing all conference licentiates that hereafter they shall appear before the conference examining board at conference time before their credentials shall be granted.

Finance

No. 22 — CHURCH BUDGET

Each church shall raise for the United Stewardship Fund the equivalent of \$8.00 per member, and for the Conference Budget the equivalent of \$8.50 per member; the Conference Budget to be divided as follows: Conference Church Extension, \$1.75; Conference Church Extension Loan Fund, \$1.00; Ministeral Relief, \$0.75; General Conference Delegate Expense, \$0.25; Camp Meeting Expense, \$0.50; Youth Department, \$0.50; Branch Sunday School Fund, \$0.50; Bible Department of Owosso College, \$1.00. Each church shall pay its budget monthly from the local church treasury. (Conference Treasurer: Rev. C. E. Messer, Box 155, Burnips, Michigan.)

No. 23 — DISTRICT AND GENERAL FUNDS

All monies raised in the local church for conference and general work shall be sent to the conference treasurer, who shall forward general funds to the general treasurer.

No. 24 — ADMINISTRATIVE FUND

The local church treasurer shall send to the conference treasurer along with the monthly budget the equivalent of 10 per cent of the pastor's salary for the Administrative Fund.

Also, ministers doing secular work shall turn 5% of their salary to the Conference Budget.

All other licensed and ordained ministers shall turn 10 per cent of their ministerial income to the Administrative Fund.

No. 25 — SALARIES

The Conference Superintendent's salary shall be sent at \$4,500.00 per year, the equivalent of his social security, full 6% pension plan, family plan hospital insurance, and 7c a mile traveling expenses. Conference Treasurer, \$375 per year; Conference Secretary, \$175 per year; Conference Sunday School Secretary, \$75 per year; Conference Statistician, \$75 per year; Editor of the Michigan Pilgrim, \$50 per year; District Youth President, \$75 per year. All conference officials shall receive six cents per mile

for miles traveled in the interest of the conference except for transportation to and from any meeting (business or otherwise) when said transportation serves the purpose of attendance at the annual conference, camp meeting, work week, and annual ministerial convention. Additional secretarial or clerical help by any or all conference officials shall be provided by the district council.

No. 26 — SUNDAY SCHOOL & YOUTH DEPARTMENT SALARIES.

The Sunday school and the youth department shall be responsible for the salaries of said department heads.

No. 27 — BURIAL BENEFITS

All actively engaged pastors, evangelist and ministers of the conference shall be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association as well at their wives. Cost of membership and calls shall be paid from the treasuries of the department that employs them. Complete resolution appears in Standing Rule No. 20 of the 1947 Conference Journal.

"Each local church in the Michigan District shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association, and pay the expense of their membership, and each call that comes thereafter, from the church treasurery.

All general full-time evangelists and their wives, receiving their principal support from their meetings shall be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association, said membership and each call that comes thereafter shall be paid by the church of which he is a member.

Also that the District Superintendent and his wife shall be included, the expense to be paid from the Administrative Fund.

The ministers employed in our educational institutions and their wives to be included in this action and the expense be paid from the Bible School Treasury.

Our home missionary pastors are included in this action, the expense to be paid from the home missionary treasury.

The retired elderly ministers and their wives are included in this action, the expense to be paid from the ministerial relief fund."

No. 28 — PILGRIM PENSION LOAN PLAN

Whereas, the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized the Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc. to make loans of pension funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches under such conditions as require active participation on the part of the Pilgrim Holiness Districts.

Therefore, be it resolved by the Annual Conference of this district that the District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials be, and they are hereby authorized, to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in said Resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizeing said loans.

Ministerial Convention

No. 29 — ORDER OF SERVICE

The morning service of the last day of the ministerial convention shall be the concluding service of the convention. The ministerial convention shall begin on the 4th Tuesday evening of April.

Missionary

No. 30 — REPORTS

A yearly report of each missionary society shall be printed in the CONFERENCE MINUTES.

Pastors

No. 31 — PASTORS AT CAMP MEETING

Inasmuch as our pastors are expected to support and attend annual camp meeting each church shall provide the equivalent of the pastor's offering or salary for the two Sundays of the camp and the pastor shall be privileged to attend the entire camp meeting.

No. 31 — PARSONAGE UTILITIES

The local church shall provide good, modern heating and cooking facilities for the parsonage, the type to be suitable to the locality where the parsonage is situated. All churches in the Michigan Conference are to provide the utilities for the parsonages. The Conference shall provide the same for the Conference parsonage.

No. 33 — VACATIONS

It is recommended that our churches grant their pastors a two-weeks vacation with pay. The conference superintendent shall be given a twoweeks vacation with pay.

No. 34 — RECALL OF PASTORS

The second week of May shall be designated as the time for the churches of our conference to vote on the recall of the pastor.

No. 35 — HOSPITALIZATION PLAN

The Pilgrim Holiness Churches of the Michigan District shall enroll their pastors and families in the group hospitalization plan that is in effect in the Michigan Conference.

Sunday Schools No. 36 — DISTRICT EXPENSE

Whereas there is a certain amount of expense in connection with promoting the district Sunday school work, the following plan shall be put into effect: Sunday schools with an average:

150 to 199	15.00
200 to 299	20.00
300 and over	25.00

Superintendent

No. 37 — APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEES

The conference superintendent shall appoint all committees. The standing committees are to be appointed to include new members where possible and to avoid the duplication of men on several committees.

No. 38 — RETIRING SUPERINTENDENT

Whenever there shall be elected another conference superintendent, the conference shall take steps to fill the pastorate left vacant by recommending the retiring superintendent to that church as a pastor. The conference council may also recommend him to the field of evangelism.

No. 39 — MINISTERIAL CONVENTION COMMITTEE

A committee of six shall be appointed as a ministerial convention committee by the conference superintendent. Two shall be appointed for three years, two for two years, two for one year, and two shall be appointed each year respectively.

No. 40 — REVIVALS

Our conference superintendent shall be allowed to hold two two-Sunday meeting per year, either on or off the District, other than his regular work.

No 41 YOUTH EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE BUSINESS MEETING

Inasmuch as there is need of more intensive youth activities during the conference year the Conference Youth Executive Council shall hold quarterly meetings.

No. 42 — YOUTH CONVENTION PROGRAM

Our youth convention shall consist of four services: a Friday evening evangelistic service, Saturday morning business session, Saturday afternoon service, and a great rally Saturday evening.

A youth program under the direction of the youth council shall be correlated with the regular camp session, consisting of a youth service each week-day morning, and a recreational period each afternoon.

No. 43 — INCUMBENTS OF BOARDS TO SERVE THROUGH CAMP

The incumbents of the district youth council and of camp board shall serve until the close of the camp each year, even though new members may have been elected at conference time, inasmuch as activities must be planned many weeks in advance. Any new officers who may be elected to said boards shall serve with the retiring members until the close of camp.

No. 44 — NOMINATIONS OF ZONE OFFICERS

The zone officers and zone pastors shall present nominations for the offices of zone secretary and zone treasurer.

No. 45 — YOUTH CAMP

The Youth Council shall continue to rent a camp until such time as the said council presents to this conference a request to develop a youth camp of our own.

No. 46 — JOINT COUNCIL MEETINGS

There shall be two combined meetings of the District Council and the Youth Council each year. The first meeting shall be in the first six months of the church fiscal year and the second meeting shall be in the second six months of the church year. These meetings shall be called expressly for the purpose of joint business.

- 2. Be it resolved that Resolution No. 5, page 44 of the 1959-1960 Conference Journal be placed in the Standing Rules.
- 3 Be it resolved that Resolution No. 9, page 44, in the 1959-1960 Conference Journal be placed in the Standing rules.
- 4. Be it resolved that a complete mailing list of names and addresses of the local youth society presidents be published in the youth section of the Conference Journal.

Be it further resolved, that where there is no organized or chartered society the pastor submit the name and address of a local leader.

- 5. Be it resolved that a rising vote of thanks be given our superintendent, Rev. A. C. Doehring, for his gracious presiding at this conference.
- 6. Be it resolved that a rising vote of thanks be given to Nadine Kincaid for her efficient secretarial help for this conference.

Ways and Means

Michigan District Youth Conference

1. Be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 12 on page 46 of the 1959-1960 Journal be made to read as follows: "Each local society sending a president and a duly appointed delegate(s) to the youth conference and convention be required to pay the \$2.00 fee for each one sent.

All youth, ages 12 through 20 shall be entertained free Friday through Sunday during youth convention, upon payment of a \$2.00 registration fee.

2. Be it resolved that our district youth secretary receive a salary of \$25.00 per conference year. This to become a Standing Rule.

Standing Rules

Conference

- (1) The song "Forward Ever" shall be adopted as the theme song of the Pilgrim Youth of the Michigan Conference.
- (2) The district youth conference shall be held on Saturday morning of the youth convention and shall convene at 9:00 a.m.
- (3) Whereas there is a need of a complete mailing list as an aid in sending out district material, be it resolved that each local society send the name of its local youth leader to the district youth president. Where there is no organized society, the pastor shall see that the name of any local youth leader and their address, be sent to the district youth president.
- (4) Because the Youth Conference is a very important part of the district youth program and because it is becoming more detailed; therefore be it resolved that the district conference youth minutes be edited by the youth. Be it further resolved that the Youth Conference Secretary serve as chairman of an editing committee composed of three or more additional members to be appointed by the district president. Be it further resolved that the Youth Conference minutes be placed in the Conference Journal in a portion set aside for this purpose.

Convention

- (5) Each zone president shall give an annual report to the business meeting of the youth convention.
- (6) A district treasurer's report shall be given at the business meeting of the youth convention.
- (7) The youth president shall give an annual report to the business meeting of the youth convention.

Finance

- (8) The local youth society treasurer shall send 25% of the total offerongs to the zone youth treasurer the week following the last Sunday of each month. One-half of the zone rally offerings shall be sent to the district youth treasures to be used for district youth expense. The zone youth treasurer shall send monthly 60% of regular offerings received from the local youth treasurer to the district youth treasurer. The district youth treasurer shall send 10% of the regular receipts to the general church.
- (9) The members of the Executive Committee shall receive six cents per mile for traveling expense incurred for district business.
- (10) The district youth treasurer shall send a monthly financial report to the district youth president and the district superintendent.
- (11) The zone shall pay one-half of the mileage traveled by zone presidents to all district youth council business meetings.
- (12) The district youth treasurer shall receive \$50 in salary per conference year.
- (13) Be it resolved that the zone president be paid a minimum of three cents per mile, for travel to and from zone rallies.
- (14) "Each local society sending a president and a duly appointed delegate(s) to the youth conference and convention be required to pay the \$2.00 fee for each one sent.
 All youth, ages 12 through 20 shall be entertained free Friday through Sunday during youth convention, upon payment of a \$2.00 registration fee.
- (15) Be it resolved that our district youth secretary receive a salary of \$25.00 per conference year.

Youth Camp

- (16) There shall be an annual camp with date and the program of the camp to be set by the youth council as soon as possible after youth conference.
- (17) A one dollar registration fee shall be sent with youth camp registration card by each applicant to the district youth treasurer fifteen days prior to youth camp. The remainder of the fee will be paid on the day of registration.
- (18) The youth council shall continue to rent a camp until such time as the youth council presents to this conference a request to develop a youth camp of their own.

Zone

- (19) There shall be at least six (6) youth rallies held in each zone during the conference year.
- (20) The election of zone officers and the annual zone business meeting shall be held at the first rally of the conference year.
- (21) The officers of the zone shall consist of President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer. The pastors and youth presidents shall be active voting members of the business session.
- (22) There shall be a report by each zone president to the district youth president within two weeks following a zone rally on report blanks supplied by the district youth president.

District Activities

- (23) A district youth rally shall be held annually under the supervision of the Youth Council. The time, date, and place are to be determined by the Youth Council.
- (24) Inasmuch as the Youth Council is desirous to uphold the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church we therefore recommend that action be taken not to allow any person to work during camp or conference wearing make-up, immodest forms of dress, or anything contrary to church standards as stated in the Manuel.
