STANDING RULES Annual Conference

No. 1 - CONFERENCE YEAR

The conference year shall close June 30.

Complete annual reports must be reviewed by the local church boards and forwarded directly to the conference statistician, Rev. W. L. Silvers, 228 Washington Ave., Muskegon, Michigan, by July 15. All reports received after July 15 shall be omitted from the statistician's report.

No. 2 - DATE OF CONFERENCE AND CAMP MEETING

Conference shall be held Thursday and Friday preceding camp meeting. Camp meeting shall start Friday preceding the first week in August.

No. 3 - RESOLUTIONS

The Resolutions Committee, the Ways and Means Committee, the Camp Planning Committee, and all other committees appointed by the conference for the purpose of presenting resolutions to the next conference shall meet at least sixty days before conference time for the purpose of preparing resolutions for the annual conference.

All resolutions shall be in the hands of the respective committees by May 15. Any resolutions received after this date shall not be considered by the committees. All resolutions shall be typewritten and signed.

The committees shall mail copies of the resolutions as they are to be presented to the conference to the ministers and lay delegates by July 1.

The Secretaries of the committees shall provide the conference chairman, conference secretary, and district superintendent with copies of the resolutions before reading them to the conference.

No. 4 - CONFERENCE SESSIONS

The first ten rows and the platform area of the tabernacle shall constitute the conference bar. The hours of conference sittings shall be from 9:00 a.m. to 12 noon, 1:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m., and 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.

No delegates shall be seated in the conference unless they are elected by their respective churches.

No. 5 - ELECTION OF OFFICERS

The election of officers shall be the first item of business on Friday morning of conference.

No. 6 - OPEN BALLOT

All district officers shall be elected by open ballot, except those nominated by the district council.

No. 7 - ORDINATION SERVICE

The order of business on the first night of the conference shall be the ordination service.

The companion of each candidate shall be given an honorary seat with him (or her) during the service.

Camp

No. 8 - CAMP BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Camp Board of Directors shall consist of five men elected by the District Conference. Two members shall be elected annually for three-year terms, one to be elected from nominations presented by the District Council and one to be elected from nominations presented by the Youth Council. The chairman of this Board shall be appointed by the District Council.

The Board of Directors shall elect one of their number to be treasurer for all specified camp development funds.

The duties of this board shall be as follows:

1. Design a progressive and orderly program for the development of Hopkins Camp. These plans shall be in accordance with the master plan accepted by the 1961 Conference.
2. Report to the District Conference annually through the Board chairman the progress of the development program.
3. Submit annually to the District Conference a specified development project for the current year.

4. Present to the Conference plans for financing the development program.
5. The chairman shall present the Board's plans and recommendations in the form of resolutions to the Conference at the time of the annual report.
6. The Board shall be in charge of the renting of the camp ground.
7. The Board shall be responsible for directing Work Week.

No. 9 - CAMP BOARD

The Camp Board shall consist of three members elected by the District Conference. One member shall be elected annually for a three-year term from nominations presented by the District Council. One of the elected members shall be appointed chairman by the District Council.

The Board shall organize and supervise all activities necessary for the functioning of the District Camp and Conference. This is to include:

1. Securing all manual workers.
2. Supervising grounds and buildings during Camp and Conference.
3. Advertising and promoting the annual camp meeting.
4. Making necessary purchases of camp supplies.

No. 10 - CAMP MAINTENANCE

Each church shall be responsible for five days' work per year to the Conference during the third week of May, which shall be designated as "Work Week." Any work that is not taken care of during "Work Week" shall be taken care of by help hired at \$1.25 per hour.

No. 11 - MINISTERS' EXPENSES

Recognized actively engaged and retired ministers of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, their wives, and their children, 11 years old and under, shall be entertained free for camp and conference. Trailer courts and tent facilities are included in this free entertainment. All ministers' children 12 years to 20 years old shall be charged the same registration fee for camp and youth convention as the laymen's children of these ages.

No. 12 - CAMP MEETING FUNDS

The conference treasurer shall submit an itemized report of camp meeting funds.

No. 13 - CAMP MEETING SUNDAY SCHOOL SESSION

On the two Sundays during camp meeting there shall be a Sunday School session from 9:30 a.m. until 10:15 a.m. The session shall be arranged and supervised by the Sunday School Committee.

A credit card shall be given to all in attendance. Each card shall be signed and returned by the pupil to his local Sunday School Secretary for the attendance record and reports to the conference.

College

No. 14 - COLLEGE VISITS

The Bible Department of Owosso College shall be given the privilege of visiting the churches annually, at which time an offering shall be received.

No. 15 - OWOSSO COLLEGE DAY

The Sunday following Mother's Day shall be designated as Owosso College Day. On this day an offering shall be taken for the College with a goal of one dollar per member.

Credentials

No. 16 - LICENTIATES

The conference superintendent shall have read Section 104 and 105 of the Manual instructing all conference licentiates that hereafter they shall appear before the conference examining board at conference time before the credentials shall be granted.

No. 17 - COURSE OF STUDY REQUIREMENTS FOR ORDINATION

Information regarding the course of study for ordination can be obtained from the District secretary.

Finance

No. 18 - CHURCH BUDGET

Each church shall raise for the United Stewardship Fund the equivalent of \$8.00 per member, and for the Conference budget the equivalent of \$9.15 per member.

The Conference budget shall be divided as follows: Administrative Fund, \$2.25; Church Extension, \$2.75; Camp Meeting Expense, \$0.50; Camp and Conference Deficit Fund, \$0.50; Ministerial Relief, \$0.75; Youth Department, \$0.50; Branch Sunday School Fund, \$0.50; Bible Department of Owosso College, \$1.00; International Conference Fund, \$0.40.

Each church shall pay its budget monthly from the local church treasury.

No. 19 - ADMINISTRATIVE FUND

The local church treasurer shall send to the conference treasurer along with the monthly budget the equivalent of 10 per cent of the pastor's salary for the Administrative Fund.

No. 20 - DISTRICT AND GENERAL FUNDS

All monies raised in the local church for conference and general church work shall be sent to the conference treasurer, who shall forward the general church funds to the general church treasurer.

Conference treasurer: Rev. Kenneth P. Boileau, 765 Kimball St., Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan.

No. 21 - BUDGET NOTICES

The District Treasurer shall write two letters annually, one in the first quarter of the year and one in the fourth, to the secretary of each local church relative to the payment of the United Stewardship Fund and Conference Budget, indicating the status of that church.

No. 22 - AUDITOR

All treasurers' books of the Conference shall be audited annually by a recognized public accountant. The auditor's report shall be available to the annual conference.

No. 23 - SALARIES

The Conference Superintendent's salary shall be \$5,460 per year, the equivalent of his social security, full pension plan, family plan hospital insurance, and 7¢ a mile traveling expenses.

Annual salaries of other Conference officials shall be as follows: Treasurer, \$500; Secretary, \$250; Sunday School Promotional Secretary, \$100; Sunday School Treasurer, \$25; Statistician, \$75; Youth President, \$75; and Insurance Secretary, \$100.

All Conference officials shall receive six cents per mile for miles traveled in the interest of the conference, except for transportation to and from any meeting (business or otherwise) when said transportation serves the purpose of attendance at the annual conference, camp meeting, work week, and annual ministerial convention.

Additional secretarial or clerical help shall be provided for the district council and other Conference officials.

No. 24 - SUNDAY SCHOOL AND YOUTH DEPARTMENT SALARIES

The Sunday School and Youth Departments shall be responsible for the salaries of their department heads.

No. 25 - BURIAL BENEFITS

All actively engaged pastors, evangelists and ministers of the conference, and their wives, shall be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association. Cost of membership and calls shall be paid from the treasuries of the departments that employ them.

Each local church shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Association and pay the expenses of their membership and each call that comes thereafter from the church treasury.

All general full-time evangelists and their wives, receiving their principal support from their meetings, shall be enrolled in the Association. Cost of membership and each call that comes thereafter shall be paid by the church of which he is a member.

Membership expense for the District Superintendent and his wife shall be paid from the Conference Administrative Fund.

Membership expense for ministers, and their wives, employed at Owosso College shall be paid from the Owosso College treasury.

Membership expense for home missionary pastors shall be paid from the Conference Church Extension Fund.

Membership expense for retired elderly ministers and their wives shall be paid from the Ministerial Relief Fund.

No. 26 - PILGRIM PENSION LOAN PLAN

The District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials are hereby authorized to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject, however, to the limitations and conditions set out in the Resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.

Ministerial Convention

No. 27 - MINISTERIAL CONVENTION COMMITTEE

A Ministerial Convention Committee shall be appointed annually by the District Superintendent to plan and provide a joint ministerial convention with the East Michigan District.

Pastors

No. 28 - PASTORS AT CAMP MEETING

Inasmuch as our pastors are expected to support and attend annual camp meeting each church shall provide the equivalent of the pastor's offering or salary for the two Sundays of the camp and the pastor shall be privileged to attend the entire camp meeting.

No. 29 - PARSONAGE UTILITIES

The local church shall provide good, modern heating and cooking facilities for the parsonage, the type to be suitable to the locality where the parsonage is situated. All churches in the Michigan Conference are to provide the utilities for the parsonages. The Conference shall provide the same for the Conference parsonage.

No. 30 - HOSPITALIZATION PLAN

The Pilgrim Holiness Churches of the Michigan District shall enroll their pastors and families in the group hospitalization plan that is in effect in the Michigan Conference.

Failure to pay premiums for a period of two months shall cancel insurance coverage. A letter shall be sent to the pastor before the insurance expires.

No. 31 - CAR ALLOWANCE

The Conference recommends that each church provide a car allowance for its pastor.

No. 32 - VACATIONS

It is recommended that our churches grant their pastors a two weeks vacation with pay. The conference superintendent shall be given a two weeks vacation with pay.

No. 33 - RECALL OF PASTORS

The second week of May shall be designated as the time for the churches of our conference to vote on the recall of the pastor.

No. 34 - PASTOR'S MOVING DATE

The minister's term of office as pastor shall continue until and including the first Sunday following the District Conference and camp.

No. 35 - CONFERENCE LICENSED MINISTERS

When a district licensed minister shall serve a church as pastor or assistant pastor he shall have the same privileges and rights as an ordained minister in fulfillment of his pastoral duties.

Sunday Schools

No. 36 - DISTRICT EXPENSE

To provide finances for District Sunday school work, each Sunday school shall send annually to the Conference Sunday school treasurer the amount shown for its category.

No. 37 - SUNDAY SCHOOL INSTITUTE WEEK

The third full week of September shall be known as Sunday School Institute Week.

No. 38 - SUNDAY SCHOOL COUNT

Each Sunday school shall cease counting the attendance at the end of the first one-half of the Sunday school session.

Superintendent

No. 39 - APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEES

The conference superintendent shall appoint all committees. The standing committees are to be appointed to include new members where possible and to avoid the duplication of men on several committees.

No. 40 - MEETINGS WITH LOCAL BOARDS

The District Superintendent shall meet with each local board at least once annually to discuss specifically the importance of the United Stewardship Fund and the District Budget.

He shall also discuss with the board the needs of the pastor relative to salary and the provisions specified in the Manual and Conference Journal concerning parsonage, utilities, life insurance, pension plan and car allowance.

This meeting shall be arranged only with the knowledge and full concurrence of the pastor.

Whenever there shall be elected another conference superintendent, the conference shall take steps to fill the pastorate left vacant by recommending the retiring superintendent to the church as a pastor. The conference council may also recommend him to the field of evangelism.

No. 42 - REVIVALS

Our conference superintendent shall be allowed to hold two two-Sunday meetings per year, either on or off the District, other than his regular work.

Youth

No. 43 - YOUTH EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE BUSINESS MEETING

The Conference Youth Executive Council shall hold quarterly meetings.

No. 44 - YOUTH CONVENTION PROGRAM

The youth convention shall consist of four services: a Friday evening evangelistic service, Saturday morning business session, Saturday afternoon service, and a rally Saturday evening.

A youth program under the direction of the youth council shall be correlated with the regular camp session, consisting of a youth service each week day morning, and a recreational period each afternoon.

No. 45 - INCUMBENTS OF COUNCIL TO SERVE THROUGH CAMP

Incumbents of the district youth council, though not re-elected, shall serve until the close of camp. Newly elected members shall begin to serve immediately upon their election.

No. 46 - NOMINATIONS OF ZONE OFFICERS

The zone officers and zone pastors shall present nominations for the offices of zone secretary and zone treasurer.

No. 47 - JOINT COUNCIL MEETINGS

There shall be two combined meetings of the District Council and the Youth Council each year. The first meeting shall be in the first six months of the church fiscal year and the second meeting shall be in the second six months of the church year. These meetings shall be called expressly for the purpose of joint business.

Other

No. 48 - TRUSTEE CHAIRMANSHIP

The district assistant superintendent shall be the chairman of the district board of trustees which shall be composed of three other elected members.

No. 49 - MISSIONARY REPORTS

A yearly report of each missionary society shall be printed in the Conference Journal.

CHURCH EXTENSION

Standing Rules in regard to Church Extension Policy, Church Extension Fellowship, and Church Extension Loan Fund (Rules 15, 16 and 17 of 1963 Journal) are included in a special Journal supplement.

DISTRICT CAMP YOUTH PLAN

The District Camp Youth Plan, as printed in the 1963 Journal, Rule No. 48, is included in a Journal supplement.

Journal of Proceedings

Hopkins, Michigan

August 1-3, 1963

The first sitting of the sixty-fourth Annual Conference of the Michigan District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 9:00 A.M., July 30, 1964, at the District Camp Grounds, Hopkins, Michigan.

Our District Superintendent, Rev. Clyde Marshall, welcomed the ministers and delegates, after which he led in an opening prayer, asking for God's blessings on the Conference.

Rev. Vaughn Drummond led the congregation in the singing of "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms" and "My Desire" with Mrs. Drummond at the piano.

A good spirit of prayer prevailed as Rev. J. H. Koteskey, Assistant Superintendent led in prayer. Rev. Marshall presented several urgent prayer requests: Rev. B.A. Kraatz, who is critically ill; Mrs. Edwin Woilol, wife of our Ithaca pastor, is ill with rheumatic fever; and the granddaughter of Rev. and Mrs. Roy Rummage. Rev. Koteskey led in prayer for these special needs.

Rev. Marshall then presented Dr. W. H. Neff, General Superintendent and Presiding Officer. Dr. Neff spoke briefly on several things which make a successful Conference:

- I. Our very best thinking.
- II. Earnest and prevailing prayer.
- III. A sensitive spirit of understanding and love.

Dr. Neff also noted the improvements made on the tabernacle. He then read from the Church Manual regarding the individuals who are eligible to be seated within the Conference bar.

The roll was called. According to the Manual, a pastor's wife cannot be a delegate to the conference; therefore, Dr. Neff admonished all delegates who are appointed to do everything possible to attend.

It was moved to change Standing Rule No. 4, Page 28, to include the first ten rows of seats and the platform as the Conference Bar. The motion carried.

The Conference Secretary announced that the 1963 Conference Journals are on sale at 25 cents each.

The District Superintendent reported that the Lutz Pilgrim Holiness Church and the Brady Evangelical United Brethren Church had merged to form one Pilgrim Church. The pastor, Rev. Richard Workman, and the delegate, Mr. Ed. Cooper, were brought to the platform and presented to Dr. Neff. Rev. Marshall informed the Conference about the merger and what an asset this will be to the Michigan Conference.

The District Superintendent also announced that Rev. Bob Nelson, now a member of the Michigan Conference, is in the process of starting a new work at Holland, Michigan. He also stated that a branch Sunday School and preaching point has been started between Greenville and Sheridan and another preaching point and Sunday School is being started in Grand Haven. Dr. Neff expressed congratulations over the openings of these new works for the Kingdom of God.

A recommendation from the District Council brought the following Ordained Ministerial Transfers: Rev. Dale Kessler, from the Central District and Rev. Bob Nelson, from the East Michigan District.

The District Secretary, Rev. M. L. Goodman, reported that Rev. Karul Bevin, a native born South African missionary, is now a member of the Owosso church. Rev. Goodman moved that he be seated in the bar as an ordained minister, pending the arrival of his letter of transfer. The motion was carried.

A motion was made and carried to receive Rev. and Mrs. Howard Rogers into our Conference and fellowship; Rev. Rogers as an ordained minister and Mrs. Rogers as an ordained deaconess. They were presented to Dr. Neff, who welcomed them on behalf of the Conference.

Rev. M. L. Goodman, Conference Secretary, read the report of the Education and Examining Board. It was moved and carried to accept this report.

Rev. Goodman also read a report from the Taylor Accounting and Tax Service, covering the financial reports of the Conference Missionary Society. It was moved and carried to accept this report.

It was moved and carried that we adjourn at fifteen minutes to twelve.

The Conference Secretary made several announcements, among which it was stated that the Conference would like to send greetings to Rev. B. A. Kraatz who is ill. The Conference wholeheartedly consented.

It was moved and carried to adjourn and to reconvene at 1:30 P.M. Conference was dismissed with prayer by Mr. Roy Ensminger.

SECOND SITTING

The Conference reconvened at 1:30 P.M. for the second sitting with Rev. William Watkins leading in the singing of "In the Sweet Bye and Bye", with Mrs. V. L. Draggoo accompanying at the piano.

Rev. R. A. Beltz led in prayer at the request of the District Superintendent.

The Conference Secretary read the minutes of the first sitting and they were approved.

The following pastors gave reports: M. DePeal, H. Diller, R. Diehl, E. Downey, V. Draggoo, V. Drummond, A. Finney, L. Ford, F. Gibbs, M. Goodman, L. Keesor, E. Klein, J.H. Koteskey, L. Laubaugh, D. Leamon, W. Manker, C. Messer, W. Osborne, G. Petterson, L. Reynolds and W. Silvers.

The District Superintendent then made several announcements after which the pastoral reports were resumed. The following pastors reported: W. Watkins, C. Walker, E. Woirol, L. Bruff, D. Brugger, A. Freed, E. Engle, J. Campau, A. O'Dell, R. David, R. Workman, H. Rogers and R. Rummage.

At the request of the Presiding Officer, Rev. Richard Workman, pastor of the newly merged Pilgrim Holiness-E. U. B. Churches, spoke briefly about the work. He reported they now have a \$40,000 church with an indebtedness of only \$10,000. A good spirit is prevailing there and God is blessing.

Dr. Neff spoke briefly regarding the pastors' reports. He emphasized the fact that we need "saved, sanctified, and dedicated Sunday School teachers, preachers, and laymen" more than anything else.

The Conference Treasurer, Rev. K. P. Boileau, reported at this time. It was moved to receive this very detailed and accurate report. The motion carried.

The Conference Statistician, Rev. W. L. Silvers, reported. By motion this report was accepted by the Conference.

After several announcements, the congregation was dismissed with the singing of "The Doxology".

THIRD SITTING

The third sitting of the Michigan Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church reconvened at 7:00 P. M.

Rev. L. L. Keesor led in the singing of "A Charge to Keep", with Mrs. Keesor at the piano.

The District Superintendent, Rev. Marshall, presented to the Conference the "Gospel Harmony Trio" from Battle Creek, Michigan. They sang, "Lovest Thou Me?". Rev. J. H. Koteskey led in prayer.

The congregation, under the leadership of Rev. L. L. Keesor, sang, "Rock of Ages".

Rev. Marshall then presented the ordination candidates, Audley Freed, Leon Bruff, and Dale Brugger, to Dr. Neff, Presiding Officer.

Appropriate Scriptures were read by Rev. M. L. Goodman, 1 Tim. 3; Rev. V. L. Draggoo, 11 Tim. 4:108; and Rev. C. E. Messer, Titus 3:1-11.

Dr. Neff read from 11 Corinthians 4:1-6, and based his message to the ordination candidates on four essential attributes of a successful minister of Jesus Christ:

- I. He is to have confidence in the power of the Gospel.
- II. He is to have an attitude of Moral Courage.
- III. He must have the virtue of candor.
- IV. He must preach the Word.

The Ordination Candidates, along with their wives, knelt at the altar. As the Ordination Council laid their hands on each candidate, Dr. Neff gave the Ordination charge to him.

Rev. Marshall led in the dedicatory prayer, after which the parents of the newly ordained ministers came forward to stand with them. The ordination service closed with the singing of the "Doxology".

Dr. W. H. Neff, Presiding Officer, then called the Conference to order.

The "Gospel Harmony Trio" favored the Conference with another number in song, entitled, "Jesus Signed My Pardon". The Holy Spirit settled on the group and a spirit of testimony prevailed.

The minutes of the second sitting were read and approved.

In the absence of the Conference Missionary Treasurer, Mrs. Marya Barrett, her report was read by Mrs. Bernard Churchill. It was moved and carried to accept this report.

The Conference Sunday School Treasurer, Rev. V. L. Draggoo, reported. He also read a report from the auditor, Mr. Larry Wieland, of Hastings, Michigan which stated the books to be in proper order.

It was moved and carried to receive the auditor's report.

It was moved and carried to accept the Sunday School Treasurer's report.

The Conference Sunday School Secretary, Rev. L. L. Keesor, reported. He stated that our Conference Sunday School average was 4463 for the year 1964. This was the largest yearly average in the history of the Conference. It was moved and carried to accept this report.

Rev. Marshall then presented a plaque to Rev. Keesor, pastor at Jackson, on behalf of the General Church. This was due to the wonderful gain in the Jackson Church Sunday School attendance during the "March to Sunday School in March".

Rev. Keesor then presented plaques to the Ithaca Church and the Muskegon First Church for having the largest numerical gain for the year and largest gain on Rally Day, respectively. Ribbons were also presented to other churches in recognition of their good gains.

The new members who were received into our Conference and fellowship during the first sitting were asked to give their testimonies. Rev. Dale Kessler, Rev. Karul Bevin, and Rev. Bob Nelson responded. Mr. Clarence Voice, a layman from Traverse City, and Mr. Fay E. Ewers of the Salvation Army were asked to testify. Our District Superintendent pointed out that Mr. Voice donated the use of his earth moving equipment to our camp this year.

Rev. C. L. Walker reported for the Resolutions Committee as follows:

Resolution No. 1, regarding the reorganization of the camp board committee. It was carried.

Resolution No. 2, regarding the duties of the camp board. It was carried.

Resolution No. 3, regarding a two-day Ministerial Fellowship was held over until Resolution No. 5 was discussed.

Resolution No. 5, regarding the changing of the dates of Camp and Conference was lost.

Resolution No. 3 was brought back before the conference again and was lost.

Resolution No. 4, regarding a Family Camp was lost.

Resolution No. 6, regarding the third week of May being Work Week, was carried.

Resolution No. 7, regarding a Committee for Insurance Protection Plans was carried.

Resolution No. 8, regarding adopting a District Church Calendar, was carried.

The Secretary read a resolution from the District Council to the effect that inasmuch as the Conference appointed the District Council to serve as the Committee on Memorials for the last two General Conferences, that this Con-

ference designate the Council as the Committee on Memorials for the coming General Conference in 1966. It was carried.

It was moved and carried that we adjourn. Conference was dismissed with prayer by Dr. Walter Thomas.

FOURTH SITTING

The fourth sitting of the Pilgrim Holiness Church Conference was called to order at 9:00 A.M., July 31, 1964, by Rev. Clyde M. Marshall.

Rev. L. J. Laubaugh, pastor at Bellaire, led in the singing of "Oh, How I Love Jesus", with Mrs. Gerald Marquardt at the piano.

At the request of the District Superintendent, Dr. H. T. Mills, Dean of the Teaching Ministry of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, led in prayer.

The minutes of the third sitting were read and approved.

The Reception Committee presented Rev. Raymond Dean, Treasurer of the East Michigan Conference.

Dr. Neff, Presiding Officer, then addressed a timely message to the lay delegates in particular. He listed seven ways that the laity can be a blessing to their pastor:

1. Inform your pastor of sickness or spiritual needs.
2. Criticize constructively.
3. Attend services consistently.
4. Carry your share of the church's load.
5. Tell him about new people in the community.
6. Share the visitation load.
7. Be a friend to your pastor.

The Conference proceeded with the election of officers.

Conference Superintendent, Rev. Clyde Marshall, appointed the following tellers: Rev. D. Leamon, head teller; Rev. L. Keesor, recording teller; Rev. D. Brugger, Rev. C. Dean, Rev. A. Freed, Rev. E. Engle, Rev. W. Manker, Rev. R. Workman, Rev. J. Campau, Rev. Ed. Woirol, Rev. A. O'Dell, Rev. D. Kessler, Rev. R. David, Rev. R. King, Rev. B. Nelson, Rev. W. Osborne, and Rev. Purlin Wesseling.

Ballots were cast for Assistant District Superintendent and Rev. J. H. Koteskey was elected.

Ballots were cast for District Secretary and Rev. M. L. Goodman was elected.

Ballots were cast for District Treasurer and Rev. K. P. Boileau was elected.

Ballots were cast for Conference Missionary President and Mrs. Fred Gibbs was elected.

Ballots were cast for advisory members of the District Council and the following were elected: Rev. C. E. Messer, Rev. V. L. Draggoo, Rev. L. L. Keesor.

Ballots were cast for the election of a member to the Board of Education and Dr. Joshua Stauffer was elected.

Ballots were cast for Conference Trustee. After the first balloting, a motion prevailed that the Conference vote for one of the two names having the most votes. Rev. V. L. Drummond was elected.

Ballots were cast for a member of the Examining Board. There was no election on the first ballot. A motion was carried that we vote on the two names having the most votes. Rev. J. H. Koteskey was elected.

Ballots were cast for a member for the Church Extension Board. Rev. Carl Messer was elected.

Ballots were cast for a member of the Camp Board. A motion carried to vote on the two names having the most votes.

While the ballots were being tabulated, the Conference recessed for twenty minutes.

The Conference reconvened and the tellers reported on the results of the Camp Board election. Rev. E. L. Downey was elected.

The Secretary read the nominations for the Camp Board of Directors. It was moved that this ballot be by simple plurality. The motion was carried.

The Conference Secretary read the names of the nominees for the Camp Board, which had been submitted by the Youth Council and ratified by the District Council. A motion was carried that this election be by simple plurality.

After several announcements were given, a motion prevailed that the Conference adjourn until 1:30 P.M. Rev. G.E. Marquardt dismissed with prayer.

FOURTH SITTING

The Fifth Sitting of the District Conference opened with the singing of "The Solid Rock", led by Rev. Wesley Manker, with Mrs. C.W. Thomas at the piano.

Rev. Howard Rogers, pastor at Midland Grace Church, led in prayer, after which Reverend C. M. Marshall, District Superintendent, turned the chair over to the Presiding Officer, Dr. W. H. Neff.

The Reception Committee presented Dr. Paul F. Elliott to Dr. Neff, and Dr. Elliott was invited to be seated on the platform.

The tellers reported the results of the Camp Board of Directors election. The following were elected from those nominated by the District Council and Youth Council:

Rev. Fred Gibbs, Secretary of the Ways and Means Committee, presented the following resolutions:

Resolution No. 1, regarding pastors' car expense to become a Standing Rule and was carried.

Resolution No. 2, regarding clarification of the pastors' tithe and was lost.

Resolution No. 3, refers to adopting the tithe system for all churches of the Conference. The District Superintendent informed the Conference that the Committee had invited Rev. Raymond Dean, Treasurer of the East Michigan Conference, to be here to explain this program. He was invited to the platform and made explanation as to how this program was operating in their Conference. An amendment to keep the pastor's tithe in the local church was lost. The proposition was brought to a vote and lost.

Resolution No. 4, regarding United Stewardship Fund was lost.

Resolution No. 5, regarding salaries for District officers was carried.

Resolution No. 6, regarding Missionary funds was lost.

Resolution No. 7, regarding a Camp Treasurer to handle all specified Camp Development Funds was amended to read that the District Council appoint a Treasurer out of the Camp Meeting Board. A substitute amendment was presented that the Camp Meeting Board elect their own treasurer, subject to the ratification of the Council. The substitute amendment was carried. A motion was made to clarify the wording of the resolution, making it read, "That all specified Camp Development Funds be separated from the District Funds, and that there be a Camp Treasurer to handle all specified Camp Development Funds". Carried.

Dr. W. H. Neff, Presiding Officer, then presented Mr. Paul A. Graham, the Great Lakes Regional Director for the National Association of Evangelicals. Mr. Graham spoke briefly, and gave startling information relative to the need of a revival in America.

A motion from the floor came to bring Resolution No. 6 back to the Conference for discussion. This motion was carried.

A motion was presented and carried that we divide the resolution into two parts, dealing first with the 10% of the local missionary societies' regular offerings being sent to the District Missionary Treasurer. After much discussion, the vote was taken, and Resolution No. 6 lost.

A motion was made that the District Council be authorized to take care of the expenses of the Conference Missionary Society and that concrete plans be brought to the Conference next year that will put the Missionary Department

on a paying basis, and that the salaries of the officers be included in this. This motion was carried.

Rev. M. E. DePeal, Secretary of the Camp Study Committee, reported. A report regarding the purchase, development and maintenance of the Hopkins Camp Ground was read before the Conference. A motion was made that we table this matter. It was lost.

A motion was made that this Conference go on record as favoring the continuance of the already established plan, for purchase, development and maintenance of Hopkins Pilgrim Camp Ground. The motion was carried.

Rev. W. L. Silvers was available to report for the Insurance Committee. However, he stated that he did not have any new data to present. A motion was made that the Insurance Committee make a further study and report as soon as possible -- perhaps at the Ministerial Convention. The motion was carried.

A motion was made from the floor that the Conference pay for an extension phone which Rev. Marshall is having installed in his trailer on the camp, and also that Rev. Marshall be given a five dollar a week raise. Since such a motion would ordinarily come from a committee, it was first moved and carried to let this resolution come to the floor for discussion. The motion was then carried.

The Resolutions Committee made their final report, with Rev. C. L. Walker reporting.

Resolution No. 8 was presented that a rising vote of thanks be given to Dr. W. H. Neff, General Superintendent. The resolution was carried.

Resolution No. 9, to give a rising vote of thanks to Rev. Clyde M. Marshall, District Superintendent was carried.

Resolution No. 10, to give a rising vote of thanks to the Camp Board for their fine work was carried.

Resolution No. 11, that the Conference Secretary write a letter to missionaries and others who should be recognized by the Conference was carried.

It was moved and supported that the District Council take care of all unfinished business. The motion was carried.

The District Secretary, Rev. J. L. Goodman, moved that we extend the time to finish the Conference business. The motion was supported and carried.

Rev. Clyde M. Marshall, District Superintendent, appointed the following committees:

After several announcements, a motion was carried to adjourn. Dr. W. H. Neff, our Presiding Officer, led in the closing prayer.

Superintendent's Report

To our esteemed General Superintendent, Dr. W. H. Neff, Fellow Ministers, Lay Delegates, and visitors of the 64th Annual Conference, Christian greetings! Conference is an occasion of retrospection, introspection, and projection. It is under these three divisions that I desire to make my report.

RETROSPECTION:

The successes or failures of the past are eternally recorded and duly credited to our individual and collective accounts. Prayerful attention should be given to the reports of the pastors, churches, and conference committees as these will help to reveal our strengths and our weaknesses. The cold facts and figures of a report, however, can never fully reveal spiritual gains or losses. Reports are only indicative of the burdens, the heartaches and the spiritual battles waged - whether won or lost.

Churches: Inasmuch as each pastor will read his personal report, I shall refrain from reviewing the accomplishments of the individual church. I should like to mention, however, that because of a dedicated ministry and a consecrated laity substantial spiritual, numerical, and financial gains have been made by the churches of the District.

Conference Committees: Every major conference committee has functioned faithfully and effectively this year. The members of the District Council have unfalteringly devoted themselves to their respective duties without fear or favor.

The Youth Council has given good and aggressive leadership. The two youth camps of this year were well attended with a combined record attendance of nearly two hundred and fifty. Only eternity will fully reveal the value of the spiritual impact of the youth camps upon Pilgrim youth. Nearly two thousand dollars has been raised for the district youth project of building a new kitchen and dining room on the camp grounds.

The Sunday School Committee has sponsored successful fall and spring Sunday School enlargement campaigns. The Editor of Pilgrim Sunday school literature, the Reverend A. D. Peisker, toured the district with the committee. His presentation of materials available to Pilgrim Sunday schools through our own Publishing House was enlightening and beneficial. A branch Sunday school has been opened near Greenville. Financial assistance is being planned for the Sunday school of the new Holland Church.

The Conference Missionary Committee held zone meetings over the district accompanied by Sister Ruth Meeks, General Church Missionary Society Director. These meetings were well attended and proved to be a real inspiration to the societies. All of us are grateful for the twenty quart mixer purchased for the camp kitchen by the missionary societies through the leadership of the district committee.

The Church Extension Committee has assisted some of the smaller churches with evangelists for revival meetings, has launched a new church at Holland, and has opened a preaching point at Grand Haven. In addition, the small Luetz congregation was merged with a group outside of our denomination to become the Brady Center Pilgrim Church. This merger resulted in the acquisition of a beautiful church building and an activities building valued at approximately forty thousand dollars plus an enlarged congregation.

The Camp Board sponsored a very fine organized camp work week. During the winter, Brother Clarence Voice of Traverse City, several ministers, and

laymen donated the use of machinery and time to filling in the swamp just back of the parking area. Because of the generosity of Brother Voice, a job that was estimated to cost between the thousand to fourteen thousands of dollars, was done for less than two thousand dollars. This gives increased parking area, trailer parking, youth recreational area, and a place for a central sewage system.

The Camp Planning and Promotion Committee, among other things, has developed a master sewage disposal plan that has been approved by the Allegan County authorities.

INTROSPECTION:

Although organization and programs are necessary, perhaps the greatest need revealed by self-examination is that of a ministry and a people who are willing to "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God, and His righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you." Matthew 6:33. The tendency is to shift our sense of values from the spiritual to the materialistic. Our danger is to become so accustomed to the false values of life that we are tempted to accept them as true values.

I read of a woman who lived all of her life midst the foul, heavy air of the slums of New York. She said that when she visited the country and breathed in the fresh air, it actually made her ill.

The acceptance of false values, the use of wrong attitudes, and wrong motives will tend to subtract "these things" of Matthew 6:33. The big need is for Pilgrims who are fully committed to the cause of Kingdom building.

I share this quotation with you. "the degree to which God uses a person is determined, not by the denomination in which he is located, but by the depth of his surrender to God, regardless of where he is."

PROJECTION:

The past is history and there is no road back. The future belongs to us. Together, let us covenant with God and with each other to be more spiritual, to be more faithful, and to work harder at Kingdom building.

From observation, while visiting the churches of the district, I make the following recommendations:

1. Set goals for each department of the church.
2. Establish a teacher training program.
3. Establish organized lay visitation.
4. Establish a budget system that would include local, district, and general church obligations.
5. Provide adequate support of the ministry---this to include salary, car allowance, medical insurance, pension plan, etc.
6. Make a church calendar for the year at the beginning of the year.
7. Organize better and more lively youth services.
8. Organize the Sunday school into a smoothly working machine.
9. Establish junior Sunday schools, junior churches, and junior missionary societies.
10. Let every phase of the church program be Christ centered.

Sunday School Promotional Secretary Report

To our General Superintendent, Dr. William H. Neff, our District Superintendent, Rev. C. M. Marshall, and members of the 64th Annual Conference of the Michigan District, greetings in the name of our wonderful Lord!

First of all, I want you to understand that when you are talking about the Sunday School, you are talking about the greatest work on earth! I am not going to give it the second place to any department of the church. It stands absolutely first in its character and its power. The Sunday School of today is the feeder of all other departments of this great church of ours. This is why it holds first place in my heart.

You may conceive of three things we could do with reference to this matter of Sunday School work. We could go backward, we could stand still, or we could advance. Practically, however, there are but two, for standing still and going backward are about the same thing. We must advance, for reasons that will occur to you without much suggestion from me.

This year the record shows that we made a numerical gain of seven. This, dear people, is not perfect, though the number implies it. We are encouraged to note that we had an average of 4,463 this year. This is the largest yearly average in the history of our District even though it is only by seven. Moreover, we can offer no excuse for failing to do more and go forward. We cannot say that we have not good men. We have the men, the churches, and the potential to do the job and do it well. May God help us to accept the challenge and go forward for the Lord.

I desire to pay special tribute to the Ithaca Sunday School for having the largest numerical gain in the District for the second year in a row. The Muskegon First Church should be commended for having the largest gain on Rally Day. Our Jackson church won the national "March to Sunday School in March" campaign. These are just a few of the results of faithful Pilgrims.

This has been a good year in many of our Sunday Schools. Much credit must be given to each pastor, Sunday School Superintendent, officer and teacher. Twenty-four churches showed a gain, four were even and fifteen showed a loss. We trust that every pastor and superintendent will work this year to put their church in the "gain" column. It can be done, and we can do it by God's help. We are asking each church to set a goal of 10% gain for their Sunday School this year. Do this and we can come near to our average goal of 5,000.

The "March to Sunday School in March" campaign will be promoted by the general Sunday School Department again this year. We urge that each church will lay aside the month of March for this great campaign. Awards will be given to each winner in their class. The District will also make plans to go along with the General Program.

Under the capable leadership of our District Superintendent, we have two new branch Sunday Schools. We welcome Sheridan, Michigan and Grand Haven, Michigan. May we have two more to add to this number this year. Pray that God will make these two new branch Sunday Schools a success.

I am pleased to report that nearly all of our Sunday Schools paid their Sunday School assessments. This makes the work of the Promotional Secretary much lighter. My thanks goes to the fine District Sunday School Committee you gave me to work with this year.

Youth Conference Resolutions

RESOLUTION NO. 1

Inasmuch as there is a need for a change in our camp organizational structure, be it resolved that a camp board of directors consisting of five men be elected as follows: two from nominations supplied by the Youth Council and approved by the District Council and three from nominations supplied by the District Council. The one who receives the highest number of votes from the Youth Council nominations to serve two years and the other to serve one year. The one who receives the highest number of votes from the District Council nominations to serve three years, second highest two years, and third highest one year. One member to be elected from the nominations supplied from the respective councils each year. This committee shall replace the present Camp Planning and Promotional Committee and also the Camp Rental Committee - page 28 and 29, Standing Rule No. 9 and No. 11. Therefore it be further resolved that their duties shall be as follows:

1. To design a progressive and orderly program for development of the Hopkins Camp. These plans shall be in accordance with master plan accepted by the Conference.

2. To report to the District Conference annually through the committee chairman the progress of the developing program.
3. To submit annually to the District Conference a specified development project for the current year.
4. To present to the Conference plans for financing the development program.
5. The chairman shall present the committee's plans and recommendations in the form of resolutions to the Conference at the time of the committee report.
6. This committee is to be in charge of the renting of the camp ground.
7. They shall be responsible for directing Work Week.

Be it further resolved that the District Council appoint the chairman of this committee. It was passed.

RESOLUTION NO. 2

Be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 8 be made to read as follows: The Camp Board shall consist of three members elected by the District Conference. One member shall be elected annually for a three year term from nominations presented by the District Council. One of the elected members shall be appointed chairman by the District Council. The Board shall organize and supervise all activities necessary for the functioning of the District Camp and Conference. This to include;

1. Securing all manual workers.
2. Supervising grounds and buildings during Camp and Conference.
3. Advertising and promoting the annual campmeeting.
4. Making necessary purchases of camp supplies. It was passed.

RESOLUTION NO. 3

Regarding a ministerial family retreat. Lost.

RESOLUTION NO. 4

Regarding a family camp. Lost.

RESOLUTION NO. 5

Regarding the date change of the District Camp and Conference. Lost.

RESOLUTION NO. 6

Be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 10 be amended to read: Each church shall be responsible for five days work per year to the Conference during the third week of May, which shall be designated as "Work Week". Any work that is not taken care of during "Work Week" shall be taken care of by help hired at \$1.25 per hour. It was carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 7

Inasmuch as it appears to be desirable and beneficial for church boards to know what other churches have done in providing insurance protection for their property, be it resolved that a committee be appointed by the District Council to make a survey of property insurance held by churches of the District for the purpose of providing factual information to churches to guide them in insurance programs. Be it further resolved that this survey should ask those churches, which have filed claims with insurance companies, to evaluate the services of the particular companies. Be it further resolved that this committee investigate the possibility and desirability of making property group insurance available. Be it further resolved that the secretaries of each church board in the District be informed of the results of this survey. It was passed.

RESOLUTION NO. 8

Inasmuch as many conflicts develop through the yearly changes of dates for the District program, be it resolved that we adopt a calendar regulating the dates of District activities from year to year, and that the District Council be authorized to draft a District calendar to be used each year. It was passed.

The Ways and Means Committee Report

RESOLUTION NO. 1

Be it resolved that Resolution No. 10 on page 23 of the 1962 Conference Journal (whereas a pastor's car expense constitutes one of his major financial burdens, and is often not provided for in his regular salary, and, whereas a pastor's car is a necessity to the efficiency of his ministry, be it resolved that this Conference recommend to the churches of our District that each church provides a car allowance for its pastor.) be placed in the standing rules. It was passed.

RESOLUTION NO. 2

Regarding a clarification of where the pastor's tithe was to be sent. It was lost.

RESOLUTION NO. 3

Regarding each church tithing the local receipts. It was lost.

RESOLUTION NO. 4

Regarding the distribution of the budget proposed in Resolution No. 3. It was lost.

RESOLUTION NO. 5

Be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 27, page 33, be amended to read as follows: Conference Treasurer - \$500.00 per year, Conference Secretary - \$250.00 per year, Conference Sunday School Secretary - \$100.00 per year, Conference Sunday School Treasurer - \$25.00 per year, Conference Insurance Secretary - \$100.00 per year. It was passed.

RESOLUTION NO. 6

Regarding 10% of Missionary Societies' offerings being sent to Missionary Treasurer to pay the officers' salaries and help defray expense. It was lost.

RESOLUTION NO. 7

In the event that Resolution No. 1 of the Resolutions Committee is adopted by this Conference, we present the following resolution: Be it resolved that all specified camp development funds be separated from the District monies and that there be a Camp Treasurer to handle all specified Camp Development Funds. It was passed.

Youth Journal of Proceedings

FIRST SITTING

The tenth Pilgrim Holiness Youth Conference of the Michigan Conference convened at 9:00 A.M., August 1, 1964, at the Pilgrim Holiness Camp Grounds at Hopkins, Michigan. Rev. Ronald Diehl, Youth President, called the Conference to order.

Rev. Earl Bray, the engaged Camp Song Evangelist, led in the singing of

"Savior, Like a Shepherd Lead Us", with Mr. Bill Bauman of the King's Crusaders Quartet presiding at the piano.

Rev. Diehl then presented Dr. A. S. Joppie, Camp Evangelist, who addressed the group. Dr. Joppie pointed out that life is a miracle in itself, and what we do with it is our responsibility. He asked, "Is your life going to be the dream of God, or are you going to live and be a disappointment of God and a disappointment to yourself? The decision is YOURS!"

Rev. Diehl then presented Rev. J. H. Koteskey, who led in prayer.

Rev. C. M. Marshall, District Superintendent, was presented by Rev. Diehl as the Presiding Officer of this Conference. Rev. Marshall commended the District Youth for the fine program and splendid spirit of co-operation during this past year. He also urged all pastors to encourage their youth to present better youth programs, and instruct them in the things of God. He encouraged the youth to be reverent in God's house, and serve Him faithfully.

Rev. Marshall then presented a letter from Rev. Dale Emery, the General Secretary of Youth, in which Brother Emery stated that we need to help our youth to have a definite and clear testimony, and that we should pray that many of our youth would receive the calling of God to be ministers and missionaries. Brother Marshall then read from the Manual, Section 75, Para. 3, regarding membership in the District Youth Conference.

The first order of business was the roll call, by the District Youth Secretary, Rev. Vaughn Drummond. The roll was approved.

A motion was made that the Conference bar be set as the Center section of the tabernacle, to the first aisle. Carried.

It was moved and carried to grant the Owosso Church the privilege of seating several youth from their church, until their appointed delegates arrive. Charlene Schwab and Ronald King were seated within the bar.

A motion was made and carried that we adjourn at 11:45 A.M. for noon, and also that we have a recess at 10:30 A.M.

Rev. Ronald Diehl, District Youth President, then presented his report. This good report was received by a rising vote of appreciation.

The District Youth Treasurer, Rev. L. A. Reynolds, reported for the District Youth Treasury. A motion was made and carried that he read only the first page of the fully detailed report. It was moved that we accept this report. Carried.

A period of discussion followed, regarding the finances of the youth department.

The following Zone Presidents reported for their respective zones:

Rev. James Campau, Vice-President, reported for the North Central Zone, in the absence of the President.

Rev. Estel Engle reported for the Northern Light Zone.

Rev. Ronald David reported for the Western Pioneer Zone.

A motion was made and carried that we extend the time of recess to include the two remaining reports of the Presidents.

Rev. E. L. Downey then reported for the Capitol Zone.

Rev. Wesley Manker reported for the Fruitful Zone.

After the above two presidents reported, a motion prevailed that we dispense with the recess. Carried. A standing vote was asked for from the floor. The vote showed we were to continue until noon.

A motion was made and carried that we accept these reports of the Zone Presidents.

Dr. P. F. Elliott, President of Owosso College, was escorted to the platform by Rev. C. E. Messer and spoke briefly concerning the need of youth in our church, and encouraged them to continue on in their education. He stressed emphatically that each pastor should send the names of their High School students to Owosso College.

A motion was made and carried that we grant Dr. Elliott an honorary seat within the Conference Bar.

A request was made from the floor that the King's Crusaders Quartet from Owosso College sing. They consented by singing, "Wonderful".

The Presiding Officer, Rev. C. M. Marshall, requested that all local Youth Presidents come to the platform and be prepared to give a short report from their respective societies.

Representatives from 16 churches gave their reports, several announcements were made, after which we adjourned, to reconvene at 1:30 P.M.

Rev. M. L. Goodman dismissed with prayer.

SECOND SITTING

Rev. Ronald Diehl, District Youth President, called the Conference to order at 1:30 P.M. The King's Crusaders Quartet of Owosso College favored the Conference with another number in song, entitled, "Now Look Away To Heaven". Rev. Carl Barrett, pastor at Merrill led in prayer.

Reverend Clyde Marshall, Presiding Officer, asked the five remaining youth presidents to come to the platform to resume their reports. It was moved and carried to receive all of the youth presidents' reports.

The minutes of the morning session were read by the District Conference Secretary, Rev. Vaughn Drummond. They were approved by the Conference.

At the recommendation of Rev. O. D. Emery, General Secretary of Youth, the District Council has instituted the Christian Youth Crusaders program in the Michigan Conference. Rev. William Watkins was appointed by the Conference as Conference Director of the C.Y.C. Brother Watkins came to the Platform and spoke briefly regarding this new program.

Rev. E. L. Downey, Secretary of the Resolutions Committee reported.

Resolution No. 1, regarding the correspondence of the Zone Secretary with the District Youth President. Carried.

Resolution No. 2, regarding the Zone Rally count was amended to read, "The number of members in the Youth Society be taken from the latest Conference Journal". Amendment carried. This resolution as amended was referred back to the Committee for further study.

Resolution No. 3, regarding placing Resolution No. 1, page 46 in Standing Rules to replace Standing Rule No. 21, carried.

Resolution No. 4, regarding duties of Zone Officers, and these duties being placed in the Standing Rules. Carried.

A motion was made that we recess for ten minutes. Carried.

After a ten-minute recess, Rev. Marshall reopened the Conference.

Rev. E. L. Downey reported for the Resolutions Committee on Resolution No. 3, which had been referred. It was moved and carried that this resolution be referred to the District Youth Council, and they are to work out a plan suitable for all Zones.

Resolution No. 5, regarding the hours of the Youth Conference. Carried. This is to be placed in the Standing Rules.

Reverend Wesley Manker reported for the Ways and Means Committee.

Resolution No. 1, regarding Family Plan rates for Youth Camp. Carried.

Resolution No. 2, regarding transportation across the Mackinac Bridge for those coming to Youth Camp. Carried.

Resolution No. 3, ruled by Presiding Officers as being under the jurisdiction of the Editing Committee.

The Conference then proceeded to elect officers. Rev. Diehl appointed the following tellers:

Rev. William Osborne, Head Teller, Rev. C. E. Messer, Rev. Alton Finney, Rev. Ronald David, Rev. Arthur O'Dell, and Rev. Richard Workman.

It was moved and carried that we permit several absentee ballots to be cast.

The nominations for District Youth officers were read by the District Youth Secretary, Rev. Vaughn Drummond.

Ballots were cast for District Youth President. Rev. Ronald Diehl was re-elected for a 2 year period. He spoke briefly, expressing his appreciation for their confidence.

Ballots were cast for District Youth Treasurer. After the first ballot, there was no election, and two of the nominees withdrew their names. Therefore a motion prevailed that the District Council submit two more names for the office of District Youth Treasurer. Motion carried.

Ballots were cast for District Youth Secretary. Rev. Vaughn Drummond was elected.

While our Presiding Officer, Rev. C. M. Marshall, met with the District Council, the Conference divided into Zone groups to elect their Zone Presidents. The following were elected:

Ballots were cast for District Youth Vice-President. While awaiting the results of the election, Rev. C. M. Marshall spoke briefly concerning the Christian Youth Crusaders Program, after which Rev. Ronald Diehl, District Youth President, made several announcements to the youth.

Inasmuch as there was no election on the first ballot, a motion prevailed that we vote on the two names having the highest votes. Motion carried.

Rev. Diehl, District Youth President, made his Committee Appointments for the coming year.

The tellers then gave the results of the Vice-Presidential election. Rev. David Leamon was elected.

Rev. E. L. Downey reported for the Resolutions Committee.

Resolution No. 6, to give the Youth Council authority to take care of any unfinished business. Carried.

Resolution No. 7, to give a rising vote of thanks to Rev. C. M. Marshall for his efficient leadership over this Conference. Carried.

Resolution No. 8, regarding sending a letter to Dr. Paul Elliott and the Youth In Action Committee, from the Youth Conference, stating our appreciation for the excellent Youth In Action Day accommodations and program. Carried.

Resolution No. 9, to give Mrs. Evan Downey a rising vote of thanks for her efficient secretarial help for this Conference. Carried.

Moved and carried to adjourn.

Rev. C. M. Marshall, Presiding Officer, led in the closing prayer of the 1964 Youth Conference.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

RESOLUTION NO. 1

Whereas there has been a lack of communication between the zones and the District Youth President, therefore, be it resolved that each Zone President authorize the Zone Secretary to report each Zone Rally to the District Youth President as soon as possible after each rally. Carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 2

Whereas there is a need to encourage our youth to attend zone rallies; therefore, be it resolved, that we adopt the following plan to be used to determine the count in all zones. Under 12 years of age, 1 point each service. Over 35 years of age, 1 point each service. Between the ages of 12 and 35, 3 points each service. This includes pastor and youth president regardless of age. Pastor and Youth President are to be given a 10 point bonus each if they attend both services.

This is added to the handicap for total points. In case the rally consists of only one service, the Pastor and Youth President will still be given the 10 point bonus.

FIGURING THE HANDICAP--Subtract the number of active and associate members of the local society, as in the current Conference Journal, from 100 then multiply by .6.

EXAMPLE: Local society has 22 active members and associate members. 100 less 22 equals 78. $78 \times .6$ equals 46.8 or a 47 handicap. Referred back to District Youth Council.

2. Keep accurate records of receipts and disbursements and bank all monies immediately upon receiving.
3. Send a treasurer's report at least twice a year to the Zone Pastors.
4. Serve on the Zone Committee.
5. Must be a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and the Local Youth Society.

SECRETARY:

1. Keep minutes of all Zones Committee Meetings.
2. Help the Zone President with Zone correspondence.
3. Keep an up-to-date mailing list of all local youth officers in the Zone.
4. Must be a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and the Local Youth Society.
5. Send a report of all Zone Rallies to District Youth President.

Carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 5

Whereas there is a need to set hours for the convening and dismissal of the District Youth Conference, be it resolved that the following schedule be adopted by the Youth Conference; and become a Standing Rule: 9:00 A.M. to 11:45 A.M. and 1:30 until finished. Carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 6

Be it resolved that any unfinished business be handled by the District Youth Council. Carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 7

Be it resolved a rising vote of thanks be given Rev. Marshall for his efficient leadership over this Conference. Carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 8

Be it resolved that a vote of appreciation be expressed by letter to Dr. Paul Elliott and the Youth in Action Committee from the Youth Conference for the excellent Youth In Action Day accommodations and program. Carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 9

Be it resolved that a rising vote of thanks be given to Mrs. Downey for her efficient secretarial help for this Conference. Carried.

Ways and Means

1. Because of rising cost and present deficits, the Family Plan rates for Youth Camp shall be established as follows; 1 child--\$12.00, 2 children--\$10.00 each, and each additional child--\$7.00. Carried.

2. Because of additional costs involved in traveling from the Upper Peninsula, be it resolved that the Youth Camp funds stand the costs, two ways, of the bridge fare for vehicles bringing youth to Youth Camp. Carried.

3. Because of obvious repetition, be it resolved that Standing Rule #20, Page 48 of the 1963 Conference Journal, be deleted. Be it further noted that it appear as Standing Rule #12, Page 47, of the 1963 Conference Journal. Ruled by Chair to be under the jurisdiction of the Editing Committee.

STANDING RULES

- (1) The song "Forward Ever" shall be adopted as the theme song of the Pilgrim Youth of the Michigan Conference.
- (2) The District Youth Conference shall be held on Saturday morning of the Youth Convention and shall convene at 9:00 a.m.
- (3) The hours for District Youth Conference shall be from 9:00 a.m. to 11:45 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. until finished.
- (4) Each local society shall send the name of its local youth leader to the District Youth President. Where there is no organized society, the pastor shall see that the name of any local youth leader and their address, be sent to the District Youth President.
- (5) A Youth Promotion Committee shall be appointed by the Youth Council, and that they will be responsible for the origination and distribution of materials for promotion of all future Youth Activities.

- (6) A complete mailing list of the names and addresses of the Local Youth Society Presidents shall be published in the youth section of the Conference Journal. Where there is no organized or chartered society the pastor shall submit the name and address of a Local leader.
- (7) The District Conference Youth Minutes shall be edited by the Youth. The Youth Conference Secretary shall serve as Chairman of an Editing Committee composed of three or more additional members to be appointed by the District President. The Youth Conference minutes shall be placed in the Conference Journal in a portion set aside for this purpose.
- (8) Each Zone President shall give an annual report to the business meeting of the Youth Conference.
- (9) A District Treasurer's report shall be given at the business meeting of the Youth Conference.
- (10) The District Youth President shall give an annual report to the business meeting of the Youth Conference.
- (11) The District Youth President shall receive \$100 salary for his Youth duties.
- (12) The District Youth Secretary shall receive \$50 salary for his Youth duties.
- (13) The District Youth Treasurer's salary shall be fixed at \$75.
- (14) The members of the Executive Committee shall receive six cents per mile for traveling expense incurred for district business.
- (15) The District Youth Treasurer shall send a quarterly financial report to the District Youth President and the District Superintendent.
- (16) The Zone shall pay one-half of the mileage traveled by Zone President to all District Youth Council business meetings.
- (17) The Local Youth Society Treasurer shall send 30% of the total offerings to the District Youth Treasurer the week following the last Sunday of each month. One sixth of this money shall be sent to the General Youth Department. The District Youth Treasurer shall send monthly 40% of the remainder received from the Local Youth Treasurer to the Zone Youth Treasurer.
- (18) The Zone President shall be paid a minimum of three cents per mile, for travel to and from Zone Rallies.
- (19) Each Local Society sending a President and duly appointed delegate(s) to the Youth Conference and Convention be required to pay the \$2.00 fee for each one sent.
All youth, ages 12 through 20 shall be entertained free Friday through Sunday during Youth Convention, upon payment of a \$2.00 registration fee.

Youth Camp

- (20) The facilities at Hopkins Camp shall be used for two separate youth camps consisting of two age groups.
Group One Ages 10 through 13
Group Two Ages 14 through 19
The Youth Council shall be given the authority to set the dates for the Youth Camps.
- (21) A one dollar registration fee shall be sent with Youth Camp registration card by each applicant to the District Youth Treasurer fifteen days prior to Youth Camp. The remainder of the fee will be paid on the day of registration.

- (22) There shall be at least six Youth Rallies held in each Zone during the conference year.
- (23) The election of Zone Officers and the Annual Zone Business Meeting shall be held at the first rally of the conference year.

District Activities

- (26) A District Youth Rally shall be held annually under the supervision of the Youth Council. The time, date, and place are to be determined by the Youth Council.
- (27) Inasmuch as the Youth Council is desirous to uphold the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church we therefore recommend that action be taken not to allow any person to work during camp or conference wearing make-up, immodest forms of dress, or anything contrary to church standards as stated in the Manual.
