STANDING RULES

Annual Conference

No. 1 - CONFERENCE YEAR

The conference year shall close June 30.

Complete annual reports must be reviewed by the local church boards and forwarded directly to the conference statistician, Reverend Clifford Dean, 1006 Green Creek Road, North Muskegon, by July 15. All reports received after July 15 shall be omitted from the statistician's report.

No. 2 - DATE OF CONFERENCE AND CAMP MEETING

Conference shall be held Thursday and Friday preceding camp meeting. Camp meeting shall start Friday preceding the first week in August.

No. 3 - RESOLUTIONS

The Resolutions Committee, the Ways and Means Committee, and all other committees appointed by the conference for the purpose of presenting resolutions to the annual conference shall meet at the call of the district superintendent to prepare resolutions for the next conference.

All proposed resolutions shall be in the hands of the respective committees by May 15. Any resolution received after this date shall be considered only at the discretion of the committees. All resolutions shall be typewritten and signed.

The committees shall mail copies of the resolutions to the pastors and delegates by July 1.

The secretaries of the committees shall provide the conference chairman, district superintendent, and conference secretary with copies of the resolutions before reading them to the conference.

No. 4 - CONFERENCE SESSIONS

The first ten rows and the platform area of the tabernacle shall constitute the conference bar. The hours of conference sittings shall be from 9 a. m. to 12 noon, 1:30 p. m. to 5 p. m., and 7 p. m. to 10 p. m.

No delegates shall be seated in the conference unless they are elected by their respective churches.

No. 5 - ELECTION OF OFFICERS

The election of officers shall be the first item of business on Friday morning of conference.

All district officers shall be elected by open ballot, except those nominated by the district council.

No. 6 - ORDINATION SERVICE

The order of business on the first night of conference shall be the ordination service, with a thirty minute intermission before the opening of business.

The companion of each candidate shall be given an honorary seat with him (or her) during the ordination service.

Camp

No. 7 - CAMP BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Camp Board of Directors shall consist of five men elected by the district conference. Two members shall be elected annually for three-year terms, one to be elected from nominations presented by the district council and one

to be elected from nominations presented by the youth council. The chairman of this board shall be appointed by the district council.

The Board of Directors shall elect one of their number to be treasurer for all specified camp development funds.

The duties of the board shall be as follows:

1. Design a progressive and orderly program for the development of Hopkins Camp. These plans shall be in accordance with the master plan accepted by the 1961 annual conference.
2. Report to the district conference annually through the board chairman the progress of the development program.
3. Submit annually to the district conference a specified development project for the current year.
4. Present to the conference plans for financing the development program.
5. The chairman shall present the board's plans and recommendations in the form of resolutions to the conference at the time of the annual report.
6. The board shall be in charge of the renting of the camp ground.
7. The board shall be responsible for directing work week.

No. 8 - CAMP BOARD

The Camp Board shall consist of three members elected by the district conference. One member shall be elected annually for a three-year term from nominations presented by the district council. One of the elected members shall be appointed chairman by the district council.

The board shall organize and supervise all activities necessary for the functioning of the district camp and conference. This is to include:

1. Securing all manual workers.
2. Supervising grounds and buildings during camp and conference.
3. Advertising and promoting the annual camp meeting.
4. Making necessary purchases of camp supplies.

No. 9 - CAMP FUND REPORT

The conference treasurer shall submit an itemized report of camp meeting funds.

No. 10 - CAMP MEETING SUNDAY SCHOOL SESSIONS

On the two Sundays during camp meeting there shall be a Sunday school session from 9:30 a.m. until 10:15 a.m. The session shall be arranged and supervised by the Sunday school committee.

A credit card shall be given to all in attendance. Each card shall be signed and returned by the pupil to his local Sunday school secretary for the attendance record and reported to the conference.

No. 11 - MINISTERS' EXPENSES

Recognized actively engaged and retired ministers of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, their wives, and their children, 11 years old and under, shall be entertained free for camp and conference. Trailer courts and tent facilities are included in this free entertainment.

All ministers' children 12 years to 20 years old shall be charged the same registration fee for camp and youth convention as the laymen's children of these ages.

No. 12 - WORK WEEK

Each church shall be responsible for five days' work per year to the conference during the third week of May, designated as work week. Any work that is not taken care of during work week shall be taken care of by help hired at \$1.25 per hour.

College

No. 13 - COLLEGE VISITS

The Bible department of Owosso College shall be given the privilege of visiting the churches annually, at which time an offering shall be received.

No. 14 - OWOSSO COLLEGE DAY

The Sunday following Mother's Day shall be designated as Owosso College Day. On this day an offering shall be taken for the College with a goal of one dollar per member.

Finance

No. 15 - CHURCH BUDGET

Each church shall raise for the United Stewardship Fund the equivalent of \$8.00 per member, and for the conference budget the equivalent of \$9.15 per member.

The conference budget shall be divided as follows: Administrative Fund, \$2.25; Church Extension, \$2.75; Camp and Conference, \$1.00; Ministerial Relief, \$0.75; Youth Department, \$0.50; Sunday School Department, \$0.50; Bible Department of Owosso College, \$1.00; International Conference Fund, \$0.40.

Each church shall pay its budget monthly from the local church treasury.

No. 16 - ADMINISTRATIVE FUND

The local church treasurer shall send to the conference treasurer along with the monthly budget the equivalent of 10 per cent of the pastor's salary for the Administrative Fund.

No. 17 - CONTINGENCY FUND

Five per cent of all district budget receipts, excluding the Owosso College Fund and the International Conference Fund, shall be credited to the district Contingency Fund. This fund shall be used for emergency loans to any district department.

No. 18 - DISTRICT AND GENERAL FUNDS

All monies raised in the local church for conference and general church work shall be sent to the conference treasurer, who shall forward the general church funds to the general church treasurer.

To be included in the treasurer's annual report to the conference, funds must be received by him no later than July 10.

Conference treasurer: Rev. K. P. Boileau, 3765 N. Chapin, Merrill.

No. 19 - BUDGET NOTICES

The district treasurer shall write two letters annually, one in the first quarter of the year and one in the fourth, to the secretary of each local church relative to the payment of the United Stewardship Fund and conference budget, indicating the status of that church.

No. 20 - AUDITOR

All treasurers' books of the conference shall be audited annually by a recognized public accountant. The auditor's report shall be available to the annual conference.

No. 21 - SALARIES

The conference superintendent's salary shall be \$5,460 per year, the equivalent of his social security, full pension plan, family plan hospital insurance, and 8c a mile traveling expenses.

Annual salaries of other conference officials shall be as follows: treasurer, \$500; secretary, \$250; statistician, \$75; and insurance secretary, \$100.

All conference officials shall receive six cents per mile for miles traveled in the interest of the conference, except for transportation to and from any meeting (business or otherwise) when said transportation serves the purpose of attendance at the annual conference, camp meeting, work week, and annual ministerial convention.

Secretarial or clerical help shall be provided for the district superintendent's office. The district council's permission must be granted for other district secretarial work.

No. 22 - SUNDAY SCHOOL AND YOUTH DEPARTMENT SALARIES

The Sunday School and Youth Departments shall be responsible for the salaries of their department heads.

No. 23 - BURIAL BENEFITS

All actively engaged pastors, evangelists and ministers of the conference, and their wives, shall be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association. Cost of membership and calls shall be paid from the treasuries of the departments that employ them.

Each local church shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Association and pay the expenses of their membership and each call that comes thereafter from the church treasury.

All general full-time evangelists and their wives, receiving their principal support from their meetings, shall be enrolled in the Association. Cost of membership and each call that comes thereafter shall be paid by the church of which he is a member.

Membership expense for the District Superintendent and his wife shall be paid from the Conference Administrative Fund.

Membership expense for ministers, and their wives, employed at Owosso College shall be paid from the Owosso College treasury.

Membership expense for home missionary pastors shall be paid from the Conference Church Extension Fund.

Membership expense for retired elderly ministers and their wives shall be paid from the Ministerial Relief Fund.

No. 24 - PILGRIM PENSION LOAN PLAN

The District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials are hereby authorized to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject, however, to the limitations and conditions set out in the Resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.

Ministerial Convention

No. 25 - MINISTERIAL CONVENTION COMMITTEE

A Ministerial Convention Committee shall be appointed annually by the District Superintendent to plan and provide a joint ministerial convention with the East Michigan District.

Pastors

No. 26 - PASTORS AT CAMP MEETING

Inasmuch as our pastors are expected to support and attend annual camp meeting each church shall provide the equivalent of the pastor's offering or salary for the two Sundays of the camp and the pastor shall be privileged to attend the entire camp meeting.

No. 27 - PARSONAGE UTILITIES

The local church shall provide good, modern heating and cooking facilities for the parsonage, the type to be suitable to the locality where the parsonage is situated. All churches in the Michigan Conference are to provide the utilities for the parsonages. The Conference shall provide the same for the Conference parsonage.

No. 28 - HOSPITALIZATION PLAN

The Pilgrim Holiness Churches of the Michigan District shall enroll their pastors and families in the group hospitalization plan that is in effect in the Michigan Conference.

Failure to pay premiums for a period of two months shall cancel insurance coverage. A letter shall be sent to the pastor before the insurance expires.

No. 29 - CAR ALLOWANCE

The Conference recommends that each church provide a car allowance for its pastor.

No. 30 - VACATIONS

It is recommended that our churches grant their pastors a two weeks vacation with pay. The conference superintendent shall be given a two weeks vacation with pay.

No. 31 - RECALL OF PASTORS

The second week of May shall be designated as the time for the churches of the conference to vote on the recall of the pastor.

No. 32 - PASTOR'S MOVING DATE

The minister's term of office as pastor shall continue until and including the first Sunday following the District Conference and camp.

No. 33 - CONFERENCE LICENSED MINISTERS

When a district licensed minister shall serve a church as pastor or assistant pastor he shall have the same privileges and rights as an ordained minister in fulfillment of his pastoral duties.

Sunday Schools

No. 34 - DISTRICT EXPENSE

To provide finances for District Sunday school work, each Sunday school shall send annually to the Conference Sunday school treasurer the amount shown for its category.

No. 35 - SUNDAY SCHOOL INSTITUTE WEEK

The third full week of September shall be known as Sunday School Institute Week.

No. 36 - SUNDAY SCHOOL COUNT

Each Sunday school shall cease counting the attendance at the end of the first one-half of the Sunday school session.

Superintendent

No. 37 - APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEES

The conference superintendent shall appoint all committees. The standing committees are to be appointed to include new members where possible and to avoid the duplication of men on several committees.

No. 38 - MEETINGS WITH LOCAL BOARDS

The district superintendent shall meet with each local board at least once annually to discuss specifically the importance of the United Stewardship Fund and the district budget.

He shall also discuss with the board the needs of the pastor relative to salary and the provisions specified in the manual and conference journal concerning parsonage, utilities, hospitalization insurance, pension plan and car allowance.

This meeting shall be arranged only with the knowledge and full concurrence of the pastor.

No. 39 - RETIRING SUPERINTENDENT

Whenever there shall be elected another superintendent, the conference shall take steps to fill the pastorate left vacant by recommending the retiring superintendent to the church as a pastor. The conference council may also recommend him to the field of evangelism.

No. 40 - REVIVALS

The superintendent shall be allowed to hold two two-Sunday meetings per year, either on or off the district, other than his regular work.

Youth

No. 41 - EXECUTIVE MEETINGS

The conference Youth Executive Council shall hold quarterly meetings.

No. 42 - CONVENTION PROGRAM

The youth convention shall consist of four services: a Friday evening evangelistic service, Saturday morning business session, Saturday afternoon service, and a rally Saturday evening.

No. 43 - CAMP YOUTH PROGRAM

A youth program under the direction of the youth council shall be correlated with the regular camp session, consisting of a youth service each week day morning, and a recreational period each afternoon.

No. 44 - TERMS OF SERVICE

Incumbents of the district youth council, though not re-elected, shall serve until the close of camp. Newly elected members shall begin to serve immediately upon their election.

No. 45 - NOMINATIONS OF ZONE OFFICERS

The zone officers and zone pastors shall present nominations for the offices of zone secretary and zone treasurer.

No. 46 - JOINT COUNCIL MEETINGS

There shall be two combined meetings of the district council and the youth council each year. The first meeting shall be in the first six months of the church fiscal year and the second meeting shall be in the second six months of the church year. These meetings shall be called expressly for the purpose of joint business.

Other

No. 47 - CALENDAR

A calendar showing the dates of district activities shall be drafted by the district council each year.

NO. 48 — YOUTH PROGRAM FOR DISTRICT CAMP

The youth program for the district camp, as printed in the 1963 Journal, Rule No. 48, is printed in the youth section.

No. 49 - CHURCH EXTENSION

Standing Rules in regard to Church Extension Policy, Church Extension Fellowship, and Church Extension Loan Fund (Rules 15, 16 and 17 of 1963 Journal) are included in a special Journal supplement.

No. 50 - COURSE OF STUDY

Information regarding the course of study for ordination can be obtained from the district secretary.

No. 51 - MISSIONARY REPORTS

A yearly report of each missionary society shall be printed in the conference journal.

No. 52 - TRUSTEE CHAIRMANSHIP

The assistant superintendent shall be the chairman of the district board of trustees which shall be composed of three other elected members.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

Annual Conference

July 29, 30, 1965

FIRST SITTING

The first sitting of the Sixty-fifth Annual Conference of the Michigan District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 9 a.m., July 29, 1965, at the District Camp Grounds, Hopkins, Michigan.

District Superintendent Rev. Clyde M. Marshall called the Conference to order. With Mrs. J. H. Koteskey at the piano and Mrs. Vaughn Drummond at the organ, Rev. Bernard Churchill led the congregation in the singing of "Saviour, Like A Shepherd Lead Us."

Prayer requests were made for Rev. A. C. Doehring, Rev. and Mrs. Edwin Woirol, and Rev. M. E. DePeal. Rev. J. H. Koteskey, Assistant District Superintendent, led in prayer.

Rev. Marshall presented presiding officer Dr. W. H. Neff, General Superintendent, to the Conference. Dr. Neff spoke briefly from Acts 4:31, noting that as the apostles prayed the following happened:

1. They were filled with the Holy Spirit.
2. They prayed through.
3. They were renewed spiritually.
4. They had one heart and one soul.
5. They had great power through the living Christ.
6. They had all things in common.

At the conclusion of the message Dr. Neff led the congregation in the singing of "I'll Live For Him."

The Conference roll of pastors and delegates was called.

The first ten rows of seats and the platform were set as the Conference bar.

The District Superintendent requested the Church Extension Committee, Rev. and Mrs. Roy Tripp, and Fay Ewers to come forward. Rev. Marshall presented the pastor of the Grand Haven Pilgrim Holiness Church, Rev. Tripp, Mrs. Tripp, and delegate Fay Ewers to Dr. Neff, stating that the church was organized last winter with 15 charter members. The Grand Haven church was accepted into fellowship by a rising vote of the Conference.

Rev. M. L. Goodman, District Secretary, presented a recommendation from the District Council that the following ministerial transfers be accepted: West-erly Tressler, third year licentiate, from the East Michigan Conference; Leonard Davis, first year licentiate, from the West Virginia District; John Newby, ordained minister, from the California District; and E. W. Hall, ordained minister, from the Pacific-Northwest District. The Secretary also recommended that Merlin Goodrich, an ordained minister from the East Michigan Conference who is accepting the pastorate at Sault Ste. Marie, be accepted into the Conference pending the receipt of his letter of transfer. A motion carried that these ministers be accepted into the Michigan Conference and fellowship.

The report of the Board of Examiners was given by Rev. M. L. Goodman. A motion that the report be ratified was carried.

District Superintendent Rev. Clyde M. Marshall presented his report. The report was unanimously accepted by the Conference.

Rev. J. H. Koteskey, Assistant District Superintendent, reported that he had attended all District Council meetings, accompanied the District Superintendent to four local church business meetings, conducted two church annual meetings, and received remuneration amounting to \$20.00.

Rev. M. L. Goodman read the auditors' reports on the treasurers' books for the following departments: Church Extension Department, Michigan District Missionary Societies, and the Michigan Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. The reports were received by the Conference.

The Conference Secretary announced that the 1964 Conference Journals were on sale for 25c each.

The Conference Treasurer, Rev. K. P. Boileau, presented his report. A motion to accept the report with appreciation was carried.

Rev. Paul Graham, a representative of the National Association of Evangelicals, spoke briefly on "Evangelical Cooperation."

Mrs. Marya Barrett, District Missionary Treasurer, reported. The report was received by the Conference.

Rev. V. L. Draggoo, Conference Sunday School Treasurer, reported. The report was received by the Conference.

It was moved and carried that the Conference adjourn at 11:45 a.m. After several announcements the Conference was adjourned with prayer by Dr. Neff.

SECOND SITTING

The Conference reconvened at 1:30 p.m. for the second sitting. With Mrs. J. H. Koteskey at the piano and Rev. W. W. Tromble at the organ, Rev. L. J. Laubaugh led the congregation in singing "Wonderful Peace."

Rev. V. L. Draggoo led in prayer.

The minutes of the first sitting were read by the Conference Secretary and approved.

Rev. L. L. Keesor, District Sunday School Secretary, reported. A motion carried that his report be accepted.

Certificate awards for gain in Sunday school attendance were presented to the following churches: Brady Center, 88% gain; Ashley, 27%; Traverse City First, 16%; Midland Grace, 14%; Jackson, 13%; Houghton Lake, 12%; Newberry, 7%; Ithaca, 7%; Muskegon Memorial, 6%; and Kalamazoo, 2%. Holland and Grand Haven, both new churches, had a good year, reported Rev. Keesor.

Rev. Roy Rummage, pastor at Coleman, accepted a plaque for having the largest gain on Rally Day.

The District Superintendent presented the District Annual Sunday School Trophy to Rev. L. L. Keesor, Jackson pastor, for the largest numerical gain in the District. Rev. Keesor was also the recipient of a \$50 check from the General Sunday School Department as an award to the District Promotional Secretary whose district had the largest gain in the March to Sunday School in March contest.

An award from the General Sunday School Department was presented by Rev. Clyde M. Marshall to Rev. L. L. Keesor, Jackson pastor, for having the largest Sunday school gain in the Conference this year.

Rev. C. E. Messer, Church Extension Treasurer, reported. A motion carried that the report be received.

Dr. Paul F. Elliott, President of Owosso College, brought greetings from the college and related instances of God's mighty providence in helping the college financially.

Rev. Robert Worgul of the Michigan Temperance Foundation spoke briefly, after which the Conference recessed by common consent.

The Conference reconvened with the singing of "Near the Cross."

Rev. W. L. Silvers, District Statistician, reported. A motion carried that the report be accepted with appreciation.

Rev. Dale Kessler reported for the Resolutions Committee.

Resolution No. 1, regarding a district ministerial convention, was referred back to the Committee for further study and redrafting.

Resolution No. 2, regarding pastors' vacations, was lost.

Resolution No. 3, regarding church extension meetings in local churches, was passed.

Resolution No. 4, regarding Resolution No. 8 on page 31 becoming a Standing Rule, was passed.

Resolution No. 5, regarding resolutions to be presented to the Conference, was amended to read, "The committees shall mail copies of the resolutions to the pastors and delegates by July 1." The resolution, as amended, was passed.

Resolution No. 6, regarding an intermission after the ordination service, was passed.

Resolution No. 7, regarding the date of Sunday School Institute Week, was tabled until Resolution No. 1 could be brought back to the floor.

A motion carried that the Conference adjourn at 4:45 p.m. After announcements the Conference was dismissed with prayer by Mr. Lloyd Thompson.

THIRD SITTING

The ordination service began at 7 p.m. with Rev. G. Vaughn Drummond leading in the singing of "Joy Unspeakable." Organist for the service was Mrs. G. Vaughn Drummond; Miss Carolyn Koteskey was at the piano. After singing "A Charge to Keep," Rev. J. H. Koteskey led in prayer. The congregation then sang "Rock of Ages."

Appropriate Scriptures were read by the following: Rev. M. L. Goodman, I Timothy 3:1-7; Rev. V. L. Draggoo, II Timothy 4:1-8; and Rev. C. E. Messer, Titus 3:1-11.

Dr. W. H. Neff, General Superintendent, read John 5:17 and spoke to the ordination candidate and the Conference on the subject, "Four Things You Can Expect in the Way of Reward in God's Work." The following points were stressed:

1. An inner satisfaction and a singular joy in knowing you are in God's will.
2. Appreciation from an understanding people.
3. Appreciation of God.
4. Success in Gospel work.

Rev. C. M. Marshall presented the ordination candidate, James Campau, to the General Superintendent. Dr. W. H. Neff asked the candidate and his wife to come to the altar. Dr. Neff gave the ordination charge, after which Rev. C. M. Marshall offered the dedicatory prayer. The ordination service closed with the congregation singing "The Doxology." The Conference recessed, giving an opportunity for everyone to congratulate the newly ordained minister and his companion.

Following an intermission the Conference reconvened with the singing of "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms," led by Rev. J. H. Koteskey.

Rev. Edwin B. Woirol, Secretary of the Ways and Means Committee, reported.

Resolution No. 1. The original resolution, regarding fees for conference delegates, was not recommended by the Committee. An alternate resolution regarding the elimination of the Camp Deficit Fund and the transfer of the budget apportionment for that fund to the Camp and Conference Fund, was passed.

Resolution No. 2, regarding the establishment of a contingency fund, was passed.

Resolution No. 3 passed after being amended to read: Secretarial or clerical help shall be provided for the district superintendent's office; permission must be granted by the district council for other district secretarial work.

Resolution No. 4, regarding the district superintendent's traveling expense, was passed.

Resolution No. 5 was ruled to be an editorial adjustment.

Resolution No. 6, regarding budget for the Sunday School Department, was passed.

Resolution No. 7, regarding a deadline for funds reaching the district treasurer, was passed.

Rev. Dale Kessler reported for the Resolutions Committee.

Resolution No. 1, regarding a district ministerial convention, was brought to the floor again. The resolution was amended to read: The Michigan District shall have a ministerial convention sometime in the early part of the year, the date to be set by the district council. The resolution, as amended, was passed.

Resolution No. 8, regarding the deletion of Standing Rule No. 16, was passed.

Rev. M. L. Goodman, secretary of the Committee on Memorials to the General Conference, read the first memorial. A motion prevailed that the secretary read all the memorials and action would be taken on them at the next meeting.

After several announcements the Conference adjourned due to expiration of time. Dr. H. T. Mills dismissed the session with prayer.

FOURTH SITTING

The fourth sitting of the Annual Conference was called to order at 9 a. m., July 30. Rev. L. L. Keesor led in the singing of "We'll Work Till Jesus Comes," with Mrs. G. Vaughn Drummond at the organ and Mrs. L. L. Keesor at the piano. Rev. Bernard Churchill, Lansing Emmanuel pastor, led in prayer.

Rev. Clyde M. Marshall reported that Mrs. Clifford Thomas of Owosso College was to undergo surgery this morning. Her pastor, Rev. M. L. Goodman, led the Conference in special prayer for her.

The minutes of the second and third sittings of the Conference were read by the Conference Secretary. The minutes were approved as read.

Dr. W. H. Neff, presiding officer, spoke briefly to the Conference on "Making Religion a Vital Force." He stressed the following points: contact, cultivation, commitment, and conservation.

The Conference proceeded with the election of officers.

The District Superintendent, Rev. Clyde M. Marshall, appointed the following ministers as tellers: Edwin B. Woirol, head teller; Richard N. Workman, recording teller; Audley Freed; Ronald Lichty; Wesley Manker; Roy Tripp; David Tabler; Lyle Reynolds; James Campau; Arthur O'Dell; Estle Engle; Bob Nelson; Clyde Loew; Leonard Strait; Clifford Dean; Stanley Dean; David Brugger; and Elwood Carl.

Ballots were cast for District Superintendent. Rev. Clyde M. Marshall was re-elected for a two-year term. Brother Marshall expressed to the Conference his appreciation for the vote of confidence.

Ballots were cast for Assistant District Superintendent. Rev. J. H. Koteskey was re-elected.

Nominations from the District Council for Conference Secretary were read. Rev. Marshall explained to the Conference that Rev. M. L. Goodman's name did not appear in the nominations because of Brother Goodman's request that it be left off this year. Rev. Goodman spoke briefly to the Conference of his being saved, sanctified, and called into the ministry, after which the Conference sang "The Doxology." A motion carried that Brother Goodman be given a rising vote of appreciation for his many years of service to the Lord and the Michigan District.

Rev. C. E. Messer was elected as Conference Secretary.

Ballots were cast for Conference Treasurer. Rev. K. P. Boileau was re-elected.

Ballots were cast for Conference Missionary President. Mrs. Fred Gibbs was re-elected.

A motion carried that the Conference recess until 10:45 a. m. while the tellers count the ballots for the three advisory Council members.

The Conference reconvened with the singing of "Let the Beauty of Jesus" with Rev. W. W. Tromble at the piano.

The tellers reported the results of the election for the three advisory Council Members. Rev. L. L. Keesor was elected.

A motion carried that the two remaining Council members be elected from the four highest names. Rev. William Osborne and Rev. M. L. Goodman were elected as advisory Council members.

Ballots were cast for a member of the Educational Board. Dr. C. W. Thomas was elected.

Ballots were cast for a member of the Examining Board. Rev. M. L. Goodman was elected.

Rev. Marshall requested that Rev. A. C. Doebling, former District Superintendent, come to the platform and give a word of greeting. Brother Doebling gave a victorious testimony of God's many blessings to him and expressed his desire to continue preaching the Word.

Ballots were cast for Conference trustee. Rev. C. E. Messer was elected.

Ballots were then cast for a member of the Church Extension Committee. Rev. W. L. Silvers was elected.

Nominations from the District Council for a member of the Camp Board of Directors were read and ballots were cast. Rev. Carl F. Barrett was elected.

Nominations from the Youth Council for a member of the Camp Board of Directors were read and ballots were cast. Rev. E. L. Downey was elected.

Ballots were cast for a Camp Board member. Rev. Bernard Churchill was elected.

Ballots were cast for eight ministerial delegates to the General Conference. A motion was made and carried that this vote be on the basis of plurality, the eight persons receiving the highest number of votes to be delegates and the next eight to be alternate delegates; this is to apply to the vote for lay delegates also.

Nominations from the District Council for lay delegates to the General Conference were read and ballots were cast.

While the tellers were tallying the votes, the Conference was adjourned for lunch. Rev. Alton Finney dismissed with prayer.

FIFTH SITTING

The Conference reconvened at 1:30 p. m., July 30, with the singing of "Every Day with Jesus" and "Standing on the Promises." The song leader was Rev. William Watkins; Mrs. G. V. Drummond was at the organ and Mrs. J. H. Koteskey at the piano.

Prayer was offered by Rev. Arthur O'Dell, pastor at Ashley.

Dr. W. H. Neff, presiding officer, read John 12:31 and spoke briefly, stressing the word, "Now." He emphasized the fact that NOW the devil is a defeated foe and NOW judgment is at hand.

The results of the voting for ministerial delegates to General Conference were given. The following were elected: C. E. Messer, L. L. Keesor, William Osborne, V. L. Draggoo, W. L. Silvers, Ronald Diehl, G. V. Drummond. Due to a tie for the 8th delegate the Conference voted again, electing K. P. Boileau.

The following were elected as alternate ministerial delegates: Bob Nelson, Edwin B. Woirel, Roy Rummage, E. L. Downey, Fred Gibbs, Carl F. Barrett, A. C. Doehring, and Herbert C. Diller.

The following persons were elected as lay delegates to the General Conference: Leonard Mills, Gladys Kessler, Paul Doehring, Loren Hartman, D. A. Harper, Ray Loew, Dean Fiedler, and Larry Mohl.

Alternate lay delegates elected were as follows: Leonard Schultz, Clare Loew, Harold Albertson, Frank Bowles, Charles Murray, and Elton Hoonstra.

Rev. W. L. Silvers reported for the Camp Planning and Promotion Committee. The report was accepted.

Mrs. Ruth Keesor reported for the Memoirs Committee. She reported that during the past year two of the ministerial brethren, Rev. Walter Johnson and Rev. B. A. Kraatz, went to be with the Lord. Dr. W. H. Neff led the Conference in a moment of silent prayer and in the singing of "When the Roll is Called Up Yonder."

Mrs. Warner, a representative of Stevens Van Lines, spoke briefly to the Conference.

Mr. Jim Seville, director of Youth for Christ in Central Michigan, was introduced to the Conference and brought greetings.

The minutes of the morning session were read by the Secretary. They were approved as read.

Rev. M. L. Goodman, Secretary of the Polity Committee, read the proposed memorials to the General Conference. The memorials were presented as recommended by the Polity Committee.

Memorial No. 1, regarding the licensing of ministers of music, was read. An amendment, giving the church congregation the authority to elect a minister of music, was lost. The original memorial was passed.

Memorial No. 2, regarding the number of delegates to the District Conference, was read. A motion to table the memorial was lost. The memorial was lost.

Memorial No. 3, regarding a District Secretary-Treasurer, was carried.

Memorial No. 4, regarding raising the voting age of a church member, was carried.

Memorial No. 5, regarding the election of zone youth officers, was passed.

The Conference asked that Memorial No. 6, which had not been recommended by the Polity Committee, be presented.

Memorial No. 6, regarding an inactive member status, was presented and carried.

Rev. W. L. Silvers, Conference Insurance Secretary, presented the Pilgrim Medical Plan as a recommendation of the Conference Insurance Committee. A motion to defer action on the plan for one year was lost.

A substitute motion was made to make Blue Cross the district hospitalization insurance plan. The motion prevailed.

A motion was made to authorize the Conference Insurance Committee to obtain the best possible coverage in the Blue Cross—Blue Shield plan for a maximum cost of \$25 per month per church. The motion prevailed.

A motion prevailed to extend the session until all business is finished.

Rev. C. M. Marshall, District Superintendent, read the appointment of committees.

A motion carried that each church receive the same number of Conference Journals they received last year.

A motion carried that greetings be sent to absent members of the Conference.

Rev. Dale Kessler reported again for the Resolutions Committee.

A resolution regarding expressing appreciation to Dr. W. H. Neff, presiding officer, by a hearty "Amen," led by Dr. H. T. Mills, was carried.

A resolution regarding giving District Superintendent C. M. Marshall a rising vote of thanks for his leadership throughout the past year was carried.

A resolution regarding a vote of thanks for the Camp Board and the ladies who helped in the kitchen was carried.

A motion carried that the District Council be instructed to take care of any unfinished business.

After several announcements the Conference was dismissed with prayer by Rev. C. E. Messer.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

To General Superintendent, Dr. W. H. Neff, delegates, and friends of the sixty-fifth annual session of the Michigan Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, greetings in the precious name of Jesus.

A realistic evaluation of the past conference year reveals that our front lines have been under constant surveillance and attack by the enemy; that our defenses have not always been invulnerable; and, that occasionally we have had to withdraw to lick our wounds.

However, I am pleased to report that in most areas of the district and local churches, the clarion command of our "Commander in Chief" has rallied our forces to move forward. This year, under the "Blood-stained" banner of Jesus Christ, battles have been won and new territory wrested from the enemy. Did not Jesus say, "All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth. Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world. Amen."

I should like to share with you some of the remarkable answers to prayer of men and women of faith of our conference.

DISTRICT CHURCH

The Church Extension Department, under the able leadership of its chairman, the Rev. W. L. Silvers, has done a wonderful job. From its always insufficient funds, five pastors have received partial support, and one pastor has received full support. The "Holland Club" has made it possible to open a new church in the city of Holland. This work is showing great promise under the leadership of the Reverend Bob Nelson. A parsonage and a lovely building site have been purchased. Participation in the Holland Hundred Club is being urged for another year as these funds are necessary to continue the work there.

The thrill of organizing a new church with fifteen charter members is hard to express in a few words. The Reverend Roy Tripp has been wonderfully used of the Lord to bring together a fine, loyal, devoted group of Christians in the new Grand Haven Church. They have purchased a well located three acre building site; remodeled the house into a parsonage; and converted the former dance hall into a temporary place of worship.

The Sunday School Committee, under the energetic and zealous leadership of its chairman, the Reverend L. L. Keesor, has done a commendable job of promotion. The committee members toured the district last fall, holding five zone conventions with over six hundred in attendance. They sponsored the national "March to Sunday School in March" contest in our district and came up with an amazing record on the national level. We also placed in each church category on the national level. Brady Center was first in its category. Owosso and Jackson were second and Ashley was third in their respective categories.

The District Youth, led by its capable president, the Reverend Ronald Diehl, have made many worthwhile contributions to our conference. Perhaps the most enduring and rewarding of these were the two fine youth camps. I personally feel that they were exceptionally good from the standpoint of spiritual help received, personnel, and youth.

The new dining room and kitchen, now under construction, is a monument to their faith. Their project for the past two years has been to raise funds for this building. It is hoped that by this time next year all of you will be able to share in the use of this much needed facility.

The District Missionary Society has been working on a four-fold project. Mrs. Fred Gibbs is the capable leader of this committee. Their project for the year consisted of raising \$150 for the education of the children of Rev. and Mrs. Bob Duda; raising \$150 toward the bathroom fixtures of the camp missionary cottage; making curtains for the camp dormitories; and packing Christmas boxes for the missionaries and our own church extension pastors. These goals have been either reached or exceeded. Certainly the beautiful curtains in the dorms have been noticed and appreciated by all of us.

The Camp Board of Directors has been a very busy and efficient committee. Its chairman, the Reverend W. L. Silvers, has set the example by giving many hours of his time to the camp projects. This committee has found a way to construct some of the much needed facilities of the camp. They are co-sponsoring the new dining room and kitchen with the youth; they have completed or have under construction a central sewage system, a sixty-place trailer court, completion of the youth rest rooms, installation of showers in both the men's and ladies' rest rooms, extensive electrical improvements, etc. A successful work week was also sponsored by this committee.

The Camp Board, under the direction of a fine leader, the Reverend William Osborne, has been working diligently behind the scenes to prepare for camp and conference. Special mention should be made of the good people of Burnips, Hastings, the Grand Rapids churches, and others who have cleaned the dorms and readied the grounds not only this year, but year after year.

LOCAL CHURCHES:

Edgetts dedicated a lovely new church. They deserve honorable mention, because (although they are not a large church) in the midst of their building program they did not forget their budget obligation. This was the first church in the Conference to pay its budgets in full.

Witmer Memorial has completed a lovely new parsonage.

Merrill is to be commended for a very adequate and beautiful new church.

Midland First is completing a lovely new parsonage.

Jackson has built a new parsonage and has an activities building under construction.

Brady Center hopes to move their pastor into their new parsonage in a few weeks.

Rockford has added a nice addition to its parsonage.

Midland Grace has completed and equipped its educational unit and has improved the parking area.

Battle Creek First has built a new pastor's study in the church and black-topped their parking area.

Scottville installed a new hot water heating system in their church.

Fayette redecorated the parsonage and installed a new bath room.

Houghton Lake paid off the indebtedness on their church and purchased a new piano and organ.

Munising paid off its mortgage on the church and parsonage.

Hastings sold their old church building for \$14,000 and applied most of this on the new church mortgage.

Alma has beautifully remodeled the parsonage kitchen.

Almira has been completing their very fine activities building.

Bellaire is in a new church building program.

Lansing Grace is completing an adequate Sunday School unit.

Memorial Drive of North Muskegon is building a very lovely parsonage type church. They have also purchased a parsonage.

Owosso has purchased a new custom-built Sunday school bus.

Traverse First sold their old parsonage and purchased a very adequate parsonage.

Many other churches have made improvements which space will not permit to relate, but inasmuch as it has been done for the cause of Christ, He will not let it pass by unnoticed.

APPRECIATION:

I should like to express appreciation for the fine, dedicated, Christian men that you elected to serve with me on the district council. Special mention should be made of the invaluable assistance and counsel of the assistant superintendent, the Reverend J. H. Koteskey; of the very efficient labors of the secretary, the Reverend M. L. Goodman; and of the faithful labors of the good treasurer, the Reverend K. P. Boileau.

I should like to express appreciation for the many kindnesses of the pastors, pastors' wives, and families as I have visited in each of your homes over the past year.

I should like to express appreciation to the wonderful group of laymen that God has given the Michigan Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

I should like to express appreciation to the members of the local church boards. Most of you have been kind and patient, and have responded to my suggestions concerning pastor support, district and general church obligations, etc. Because of this, most churches are supporting their pastors better and the budgets show a substantial increase over last year.

Most of all, I should like to express appreciation to the ONE who loved me, and who redeemed me, and who made it possible for me to serve in a small way as a soldier of the Cross. If anything has been accomplished, the glory belongs to God and the credit rightly belongs to the good pastors and laymen of our Conference.

SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

To our capable General Superintendent, Dr. William H. Neff, our District Superintendent, Rev. C. M. Marshall, and to all pastors, delegates, and visitors to the 65th Annual Conference of the Michigan District, greetings in the name of our Lord.

We would like to begin our report today by offering our congratulations to the Michigan District for winning the national "March to Sunday School in March" campaign. This was done with a grand total of 56,956 points. Our nearest rival had a total of 11,490 points. This winning margin proves once again the value of every church reporting. Congratulations are also in order for the following churches who won national recognition: Group A, Owosso,

2nd place; Group B, Jackson, 2nd place; Group C, Brady Center, 1st place; Group D, Ashley, 3rd place. Ours was the only district that placed a church in all four divisions.

We take our hats off to the five churches in our district that won the district and zone awards. Jackson led the way by winning the district award. Ashley, Newberry, Rockford, and Cheboygan won the zone awards. We want to thank every pastor and Sunday school superintendent for their splendid work. Each of you has made this campaign a success.

The annual district trophy for the Sunday school of the year goes to the Jackson church with a twenty numerical gain. Special recognition should be given to the Brady Center church for their thirty-seven numerical gain, though they were merged and not eligible for the district trophy. Grand Haven and Holland, our two new churches, did well this year.

It has been said that there are two theories to the work of the Sunday school. One is that it is a fort, its members are guards, and their chief duty is to hold the fort and keep the forces of evil from making any fresh encroachments. The other theory is that the Sunday school is an army of conquest that cannot be satisfied with present achievements, that it will never rest satisfied until the orders of our commander in chief have been literally obeyed. How can we be satisfied when many of our Sunday Schools are not gaining? It is impossible to hold when our function is to give.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

1. Be it resolved that the Michigan District have a ministerial convention sometime in the early part of the year, the date to be set by the district council. The convention shall be held in one of the local churches. The district superintendent shall appoint a committee of five to prepare the convention program. The resolution was passed.

2. Resolution in regard to ministers' vacations lost.

3. Be it resolved that the District Church Extension Committee be authorized to schedule a meeting in each local church annually for the purpose of promoting the church extension program. The resolution was passed.

4. Be it resolved that Resolution No. 8, page No. 31 of the 1964 Conference Journal, (regarding an annual district calendar) be made a standing rule. Resolution was passed.

5. Be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 3, page 15 of the 1964 Conference Journal, be amended to read:

The Resolutions Committee, the Ways and Means Committee, and all other committees appointed by the conference for the purpose of presenting resolutions to the annual conference shall meet at the call of the district superintendent to prepare resolutions for the next conference.

All proposed resolutions shall be in the hands of the respective committees by May 15. Any resolution received after this date shall be considered only at the discretion of the committees. All resolutions shall be typewritten and signed.

The committees shall mail copies of the resolutions to the pastors and delegates by July 1.

The secretaries of the committees shall provide the conference chairman, district superintendent, and conference secretary with copies of the resolutions before reading them to the conference.

Resolution was passed.

6. Be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 7, page 15 of the 1964 Conference Journal, shall be amended to read:

The order of business on the first night of conference shall be the ordination service, with a thirty minute intermission before the opening of business.

The companion of each candidate shall be given an honorary seat with him (or her) during the ordination service.

The resolution was passed.

7. A resolution in regard to the date of Sunday School Institute Week was lost.

8. Be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 16 (regarding licentiates) be deleted from the Standing Rules. The resolution was passed.

THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

1. Be it resolved that the Camp Deficit Fund be eliminated and the 50c from the budget now applying to said fund be added to the Camp and Conference Fund. The resolution was passed.

2. Be it resolved that a district Contingency Fund be developed by crediting 5% of all district budget receipts, excluding the Owosso College Fund and the International Conference Fund, to this fund; this fund shall be used as an emergency loan fund for any district department. The resolution was passed.

3. Be it resolved that the last paragraph of Standing Rule No. 23 on page 17 of the 1964 Conference Journal be amended to read: Secretarial or clerical help shall be provided for the district superintendent's office; permission must be

granted by the district council for other district secretarial work. The resolution was passed.

4. Be it resolved that the first paragraph of Standing Rule No. 23 on page 17 of the 1964 Conference Journal be amended to read: "... 8c a mile traveling expenses." The resolution was passed.

5. A resolution in regard to deletions from Standing Rule No. 23 was ruled to be an editorial adjustment.

6. Be it resolved that the portion of Standing Rule No. 18 relating to Sunday schools be made to read "Sunday School Department, \$0.50" instead of "Branch Sunday School Fund, \$0.50." The resolution was passed.

7. Be it resolved that all money to be included in the district treasurer's annual report must be received by him no later than July 10; this shall become a Standing Rule. The resolution was passed.

MEMORIALS TO THE 1966 GENERAL CONFERENCE

MEMORIAL NO. 1

Whereas there is no provision for a minister of music in the present manual, and yet many churches are in desperate need for such a person who is qualified to fill the position, it seems most urgent that the church with deep concern for advancing its evangelical outreach and enhancing its worship toward God take immediate steps to provide for the musical ministry at the local church level.

Therefore, be it resolved that the General Board provide a course of study which, when completed, will lead to the licensing and ordination of qualified persons as ministers of music. Upon being licensed the individual shall be known as a Minister of Music. He shall be recommended for credentials in the same manner as candidates for ministerial credentials, and shall be examined and recommended to the Conference in like manner.

Whenever possible the local church board shall appoint or engage a director of music to direct the musical affairs of the church. In the event the board selects a licensed or ordained minister of music he shall be called the "Minister of Music." He shall serve as an ex officio member of the church board. His duties shall be specified by the church board. Generally, the duties might include: (1) appointing a music committee and serving as its chairman; (2) conducting the congregational singing; (3) overseeing the special music; and (4) conducting the adult choir in rehearsal and performance. His salary shall be set by the church board.

MEMORIAL NO. 2

Inasmuch as some districts may deem it advisable to have a full-time secretary-treasurer,

Be it resolved that the following be added to the Manual, Section 83, paragraph 1, item 6:

With the approval of the district conference the offices of district secretary and district treasurer may be combined and filled by one full-time secretary-treasurer.

Be it resolved that the following paragraph follow paragraph 3 of Section 101:

In districts where the offices of secretary and treasurer are combined, one additional council member shall be elected to fill the complement.

Necessary editorial changes shall be made in Section 81, paragraph 1, and Section 101, paragraph 5.

MEMORIAL NO. 3

Be it resolved that Section 39, paragraph 2, of the Manual be made to read: No member under the age of 16 years and no probationary member shall be allowed to vote at any church meeting, and all such members shall be listed as non-assessable members.

MEMORIAL NO. 4

Whereas there is a larger representation of the youth at the zone rallies than at the annual youth conference, be it resolved that Section 75, Article 4, of the Manual be amended to read:

The annual youth conference shall organize the district into zones. There shall be zone leaders elected for these zones at the first zone rally following the annual youth conference. A zone leader must be a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. These zone leaders shall become members of the district youth council. The other members of the youth council, who shall be elected by ballot at the annual youth conference, are the district youth society officers, namely, the president, the vice-president, secretary, and treasurer. All district officers shall be active members of a local society and members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church within the bounds of the district. The district superintendent, by virtue of his office, shall be a member of the district youth council. The district council shall nominate three or more persons for the offices of district president, district treasurer and zone leaders.

MEMORIAL NO. 5

Be it resolved that an inactive member status be established. An inactive member shall be one who does not attend church regularly, who is residing in another community, and does not support the church financially. The local church shall not report or pay budget on inactive members. An inactive member may be reinstated to active status at the discretion of the church board.

Original memorial No. 2, regarding the number of delegates to the District Conference, was lost. The numbers of the succeeding memorials were changed so they could be presented to the General Polity Committee in the above order.

IN MEMORIAM



Rev. B. A. Kraatz

Rev. B. A. Kraatz was born December 13, 1899, in Merrill, Michigan, to Frederick and Pauline Kraatz. He departed this life on October 12, 1964.

He was converted in a tent meeting held in Merrill about forty years ago. He attended Bible Holiness Seminary, Owosso, five years in preparation for the ministry. On October 17, 1931, he was married to Josephine Doctor in Burnips. The churches served by Rev. Kraatz as pastor were Crosswell, Jeddo, Alma, Lincoln Park, Traverse City First, Jackson, and Breckenridge.

After his retirement Brother Kraatz moved to Owosso and united with the Owosso Pilgrim Holiness Church. He was in ill health most of the time he was in Owosso and the last two months of his life were spent in the hospital.

To the end his faith never faltered nor did he even question God's providence in his suffering.

Surviving besides his wife and daughter, Vesta, are two brothers, George and William; two sisters, Mrs. William (Esther) Weber and Mrs. Matthew (Bertha) Reis. One son, a brother, and two sisters preceded him in death.

The funeral service was held in the Owosso Pilgrim Holiness Church with Rev. M. L. Goodman officiating. Rev. A. C. Doehring and Rev. L. N. Nelson assisted in the service. Rev. Kraatz was laid to rest in Hillcrest Memorial Gardens, there to await the first resurrection.

Rev. Walter Johnson

Rev. Walter Johnson was born February 21, 1886, in Indianapolis, Indiana. His wife, Josie, preceded him in death in 1955.

Brother Johnson was converted at the age of 17. His early ministry was in the United Missionary Church.

Out of the burden and vision of Rev. Johnson's heart, the Kalamazoo Pilgrim Holiness Church was founded. He was greatly beloved by all who knew him.

He had a victorious testimony right up to the day he was taken with a stroke. His last days were spent in the Cadillac Hospital, where he passed away in December, 1964.

The funeral service was held in Cadillac with Rev. M. E. DePeal officiating.

DISTRICT YOUTH SOCIETY

STANDING RULES

Annual Conference

NO. 1 - CONFERENCE DATE

The district youth conference shall be held on Saturday morning of the youth convention and shall convene at 9 a.m.

NO. 2 - CONFERENCE SESSIONS

The first ten rows of the center section and the platform area of the tabernacle shall constitute the conference bar.

The hours for conference sittings shall be from 9 a.m. to 11:45 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. until finished.

NO. 3 - DELEGATES TO CONFERENCE

Only duly elected delegates of the youth society shall be seated in the conference bar. Only the vice president can be seated in the president's place.

NO. 4 - REPORTS TO CONFERENCE

Reports to the conference shall be given by the district youth president, the district youth treasurer, and each zone president.

Finance

NO. 5 - FINANCIAL PROGRAM

The local youth society treasurer shall send 30% of the total offerings to the district youth treasurer the week following the last Sunday of each month. One-sixth of this money shall be sent to the General Department of Youth. The district youth treasurer shall send monthly 40% of the remainder received from the local youth treasurer to the zone youth treasurer.

NO. 6 - CONFERENCE AND CONVENTION FEES

Each local society sending a president and duly appointed delegates to the youth conference and convention shall be required to pay a \$2.00 registration fee for each person sent. It is recommended that each local society offer to pay the expenses to and from the conference for each delegate.

All youth, ages 12 through 20, shall be entertained free Friday through Sunday during the youth convention upon payment of a \$2.00 registration fee.

NO. 7 - SALARIES

The annual salaries for district youth officers shall be as follows: president, \$100; secretary, \$50; treasurer, \$75.

NO. 8 - MILEAGE

The members of the executive committee shall receive six cents per mile for traveling expense incurred for district work.

The zone presidents shall be paid a minimum of three cents per mile for travel to and from zone rallies.

The zone shall pay one-half of the mileage traveled by the zone president to all district youth council business meetings.

NO. 9 - FINANCIAL REPORT

The district youth treasurer shall send a quarterly financial report to the district youth president and the district superintendent.

Journal

NO. 10 - EDITING OF MINUTES

The district youth conference minutes shall be edited by the youth. The district youth secretary shall serve as chairman of an editing committee composed of three or more additional members to be appointed by the district youth president. The youth conference minutes shall be placed in the conference journal in a portion set aside for this purpose.

NO. 11 - LIST OF PRESIDENTS

A list of the names and addresses of the local youth society presidents shall be published in the conference journal. Where there is no organized or chartered society the pastor shall submit the name and address of the local leader.

Youth Camps

NO. 12 - JUNIOR AND SENIOR CAMPS

The facilities at Hopkins Camp shall be used for two separate youth camps consisting of two age groups: Group 1, ages 10 through 13; Group 2, ages 14 through 19.

The youth council shall be given the authority to set the dates for the youth camps.

NO. 13 - ADVANCE REGISTRATION

A one dollar registration fee shall be sent with a youth camp registration card by each applicant to the district youth treasurer fifteen days prior to youth camp. The remainder of the fee will be paid on the day of registration.

Zone Rules

NO. 14 - RALLIES

There shall be at least six youth rallies held in each zone during the conference year.

NO. 15 - ZONE OFFICERS

The officers of the zone shall be a president, vice president, secretary and treasurer. Each one must be a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and a member of a local youth society. The pastors and youth presidents shall be active voting members of the business session.

NO. 16 - ELECTION OF OFFICERS

The election of zone officers and the annual zone business meeting shall be held at the first rally of the conference year.

NO. 17 - DUTIES OF ZONE OFFICERS

The duties of the zone officers shall be as listed below.

President

1. Meet with the zone committee and plan dates in advance for zone rallies.
2. Send dates of zone rallies to the district youth president and to all pastors in the zone.
3. Plan and promote all zone rallies.
4. Preside at all zone rallies.
5. Give attention to financial matters of the zone.
6. Serve on the district youth council.
7. Cooperate in promoting the district and national youth program.
8. Keep an up-to-date mailing list of all local officers in the zone.
9. Give a report to the annual district youth conference.

Vice President

1. Serve on the zone committee.
2. Serve for one year as the zone president requests.

Treasurer

1. Receive and disburse funds as directed by the zone committee.
2. Keep accurate records of receipts and disbursements and bank all monies immediately upon receiving.
3. Send a treasurer's report at least twice a year to the zone pastors.
4. Serve on the zone committee.

Secretary

1. Keep minutes of all zone committee meetings.
2. Help the zone president with zone correspondence.
3. Keep an up-to-date mailing list of all local officers in the zone.
4. Report each zone rally to the district youth president as soon as possible after each rally.

Other

NO. 18 - DISTRICT RALLY

A district youth rally shall be held annually under the supervision of the

youth council. The time, date, and place are to be determined by the youth council.

NO. 19 - PROMOTION COMMITTEE

A youth promotion committee shall be appointed by the youth council. This committee shall be responsible for the origination and distribution of materials for promotion of all district youth activities.

NO. 20 - THEME SONG

The song "Forward Ever" shall be the theme song of the Pilgrim youth of the Michigan Conference.

NO. 21 - DIRECTORY OF PRESIDENTS

Each local society shall send the name of its president to the district youth president. Where there is no organized society the pastor shall see that the name and address of the youth leader is sent.

NO. 22 - ATTIRE

The conference recommends that action be taken not to allow any person to work during camp or conference wearing make-up, immodest forms of dress, or anything contrary to church standards as stated in the Manual.

YOUTH PROGRAM FOR DISTRICT CAMP

(STANDING RULE NO. 48 OF DISTRICT CONFERENCE)

I. A youth director shall be hired to organize, plan, and direct all activities of the youth (recreational, spiritual, and social) at the district camp. The director shall be contacted and appointed at least six months prior to the conference.

His duties shall be as follows:

- a. Responsibility for the registration of all youth.
 - b. Assignment of sleeping quarters, squads, and work details.
 - c. Plan and organize all recreational activities.
 - d. Make available a list of all games and sheets to be signed by the youth for the area in which he wishes to participate.
 - e. Appoint a counselor to oversee and direct each area of recreational activity.
 - f. Responsibility for seeing that all youth participate in the required spiritual activities.
 - g. Collect a health form from each young person and see that the forms are filed with the camp nurse.
 - h. Handle all matters requiring discipline, along with the head counselor and, if need be, the district youth president.
- II. Two head counselors shall be hired, one for boys and one for girls. These

counselors shall be under the direct supervision of the youth director and shall give him complete co-operation.

The duties of the head counselors shall be as follows:

- a. Responsibility for the execution of all rules and regulations.
- b. Responsibility for morning and evening devotions.
- c. Supervision of the squad counselors in the execution of their duties and responsibilities.
- d. See that all youth are in service with the squad counselors during required periods.
- e. Check all sleeping quarters for lights out and quietness.
- f. Periodically check with squad counselors during recreational activities.
- g. May excuse any young person who is ill, or has a good reason, from an activity.
- h. Inspect sleeping quarters at designated time each day.

III. A counselor shall be hired for each squad. The squad counselors shall be under the direct supervision of the head counselor and the youth director.

The duties of the squad counselors shall be as follows:

- a. Responsibility for his or her squad at all times except during recreational periods.
- b. See that all work is done properly during work periods.
- c. Shall not leave the grounds without first notifying the head counselor and another person placed in charge of the squad.
- d. Sit in all required services in the area reserved for the youth.
- e. Check roll at all activities and see that every squad member is accounted for.
- f. See that sleeping quarters are kept clean, beds made, and ready for inspection at the designated time.
- g. Take bed check, see that every one is in bed, lights out, and maintain quietness. Any person missing or violating the rules shall be reported to the head counselor.

IV. The squads shall be no larger than fifteen persons.

V. The camp fee for the youth staying through the entire camp shall be as follows: \$15 and no work; \$7.50 and work. The registration fee is to be included in this amount. \$1 of the above amounts goes to the youth treasurer.

VI. The camp board shall submit a list of the work details expected to be done by the youth to the youth director and/or the youth council four weeks prior to the conference.

VII. Camp staff applications, evaluation forms, and the camper evaluation forms shall be used.

YOUTH JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

FIRST SITTING

The eleventh Pilgrim Holiness Youth Conference of the Michigan District convened at 9 a.m., July 31, 1965, at the Pilgrim Holiness Camp Grounds at Hopkins, Michigan. Reverend Ronald Diehl, Youth President, called the Conference to order.

Mr. Clifford VanSickle led the Conference in the singing of "I Love Him Better Every Day." Mrs. Vaughn Drummond was at the organ. The Conference then sang "My Desire," after which Reverend Diehl led in prayer.

Reverend C. M. Marshall, Conference Superintendent, addressed the Conference from the Scripture, Proverbs 12:1. He pointed out three thoughts for a successful life:

1. You must have an unselfish life.
2. You must have a goal in living for God.
3. You must work diligently at the job.

The roll was called by the Secretary. The roll was approved.

The motion was made that the first ten rows in the middle section and the platform constitute the Conference bar. Carried.

The hours of the sessions were set from 9:00 - 11:45 a. m. and 1:30 p. m. until finished.

Reverend Ronald Diehl, Youth President, reported. It was carried that the Conference give a rising vote of thanks for this good report.

The Youth Treasurer, Rev. Lyle Reynolds, read the report from the auditor. Moved and carried to accept this report.

After Reverend Reynolds reported for the Youth Treasury, it was moved and carried to accept this excellent financial report.

The report of zone leaders followed. The following zone presidents reported:

Northern Light Zone. Rev. K. P. Boileau

Western Pioneer Zone Rev. W. L. Silvers

Capitol Zone Rev. E. L. Downey

By common consent the Conference recessed.

The Conference reconvened with the singing of "Every Day with Jesus," led by Maurice Shattuck, of Owosso, and Mrs. Elmina Hall, of Midland, at the piano.

Youth representatives from the following churches reported on their activities of the past year: Ashley, Battle Creek First, Burnips, Cheboygan, Edgetts, Frankfort, Ithaca, Kalamazoo, Lansing First, Merrill, Midland First, Owosso, Rockford, and Witmer Memorial. It was moved and carried that these reports be accepted.

A motion carried that the Conference reconvene at 1 p. m. instead of 1:30 p. m.

The Conference adjourned for dinner. Rev. Purlin Wesseling dismissed in prayer.

SECOND SITTING

The second sitting of the Youth Conference was called to order at 1:00 p. m. Mr. Maurice Shattuck led in the singing of "All Hail the Power," with Mrs. Vaughn Drummond at the organ. Rev. M. L. Goodman led in prayer.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read by the Conference Youth Secretary, G. V. Drummond. They were approved as read.

Reverend Dale Brugger reported for the Resolutions Committee.

Resolution No. 1, regarding the rezoning of our District, was lost.

A motion from the floor prevailed that this rezoning be investigated further, that the Youth Council make whatever adjustments necessary, and that the churches involved be conferred with. Lost.

Resolution No. 2, regarding the ages of the Youth Camp, was lost.

Resolution No. 3, regarding the camp for ages 8-9-10, was lost.

Resolution No. 4, regarding duly elected delegates being seated in the Conference, was adopted.

Resolution No. 5, regarding placing Resolution No. 1, page 48 of 1964 Conference Journal, in the Standing Rules was adopted.

Resolution No. 6, regarding fixing of the Conference bar, was adopted.

Resolution No. 7, asking that any unfinished business be handled by the District youth council, was adopted.

Reverend Arthur O'Dell reported for the Ways and Means Committee.

Resolution No. 1, regarding amending Standing Rule 19, Page 50, was adopted.

Resolution No. 2, regarding the fees for Youth Camp, was read. A substitute motion that due to the change in cost in operating Youth Camps the rate charge be deleted from our minutes, and the Youth Council under the supervision of the District Council set the price, was carried.

A motion from the floor prevailed that the Youth Council at one of their regular meetings make a thorough study of rezoning our District and bring their recommendations back to the Conference next year.

The election of officers followed. Rev. Ronald Diehl, Youth President, appointed the following tellers: Rev. Arthur O'Dell, recording teller, Rev. A. Freed, Rev. D. Brugger, Rev. J. Campau, Rev. P. Wesseling, Rev. R. Rummage, Rev. C. Barrett, Rev. B. Churchill, Rev. L. L. Keesor.

Reverend R. Diehl, Youth President, then presented his resignation to the Youth Conference. A motion carried that we accept this resignation with regret, and that we give a rising vote of thanks for his leadership.

The Conference recessed.

The Conference opened with prayer by Reverend C. M. Marshall, District Superintendent, asking God's blessings upon the elections.

Ballots were cast for District Youth President. Rev. E. L. Downey was elected. Rev. Downey then spoke briefly to the Conference, asking God's guidance and the support of the Conference.

Ballots were cast for Conference Youth Secretary. Rev. G. Vaughn Drummond was elected.

The Conference then voted for Conference Youth Treasurer. Rev. James Campau was elected. Rev. Drummond and Rev. Campau both spoke briefly.

While the tellers were counting the votes for Vice President, Billy Watkins and Rev. J. H. Koteskey told the Conference of highlights of the National Youth Convention.

A motion carried that we vote for the four highest candidates for Vice President. Ballots were cast again.

The newly elected Youth President, Rev. E. L. Downey, made his Committee appointments for the coming year.

Inasmuch as there was no election on the last ballot for Vice President, a motion carried that we vote on the two names with the highest number of votes. Rev. David Leamon was elected.

The Conference divided into groups to elect Zone Presidents. The following were elected:

- North Central Zone Rev. A. O'Dell
 - Fruitful Zone Rev. F. Gibbs
 - Capitol Zone Rev. L. L. Keesor
 - Western Pioneer Zone Rev. W. L. Silvers
 - Northern Light Zone Rev. M. Goodrich
- Reverend Dale Brugger reported for the Resolutions Committee.

Resolution No. 8, asking that a rising vote of thanks be given to Rev. C. M. Marshall for his efficient leadership over this Conference, was adopted.

Resolution No. 9, asking the Conference to give a rising vote of thanks to Mrs. Evan Downey for her secretarial help, was adopted.

The eleventh Annual Youth Conference was dismissed in prayer by Rev. Ronald Diehl, Youth President.

This has been a very wonderful year. We truly thank God for all of His help in what has been accomplished.

We were privileged to enjoy a wonderful Youth in Action Day at Owosso College. Hundreds of our young people attended this district rally, and many made their choice to attend Owosso College.

In June we saw many of our Michigan young people at the National Youth Convention. We won two awards in the Talent Quest; this made us very proud of our youth.

The youth camps were a great success this year, and we are praising God for the many young people who found help at the altar during this time.

The work on the beach is completed. Next year we will treat the weed problem and have a very fine beach for our youth camps.

It is only as we have worked together that we have accomplished as much as we have in the past year. I also wish to thank Rev. Evan Downey, who, with a fine staff, so ably led the Junior Youth Camp. A special "thank you" goes to Rev. Fred Gibbs, who is now leading the youth program of our regular youth convention and camp meeting.

To Rev. W. L. Silvers, chairman of the Camp Board of Directors, and all of you who have worked on and given to the District project of building the kitchen and dining room, a big "thank you" and our sincere appreciation.

I have enjoyed working as your youth president the past four years. I feel, however, I would like to resign and let someone else carry on the banner of youth and lead us to greater things in Christ.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

No. 1. Whereas there is an excess of driving in our present zone arrangement, be it resolved that the district be rezoned according to the following plan:

Zone 1. Battle Creek First, Eaton Rapids, Hastings, Jackson, Kalamazoo, Lansing Emmanuel, Lansing First, Lansing Grace, and Witmer Memorial.

Zone 2. Burnips, Berkley Hills, Grand Haven, Holland, Memorial Drive, Muskegon, Rockford, and Wyoming.

Zone 3. Alma, Ashley, Brady Center, Breckenridge, Chesaning, Crystal, Ithaca, Merrill, Owosso, Coleman, Midland First, Midland Grace.

Zone 4. Edgetts, Houghton Lake, Scottville, Sterling.

Zone 5. Almira, Bellaire, Cheboygan, Ellsworth, Frankfort, Honor, Traverse City First, Traverse Heights.

Zone 6. Fayette, Munising, Newberry, Sault Ste. Marie.

The resolution was lost.

No. 2. Whereas many of the youth camps over the nation take youth at the age of 9 into their youth camps, be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 20, page 50 of the 1964 Conference Journal be changed to read: ages 9 through 12 and ages 13 through 19. The resolution was lost.

No. 3. Whereas there is a need for a children's camp, be it resolved to hold a children's camp for ages 8, 9, and 10. The time for such a camp shall be set by the district youth council. The resolution was lost.

No. 4. Whereas there is a need for efficient delegations to the youth conference, be it resolved that only duly elected delegates of the youth society shall be seated in the conference bar and only the vice president can be seated in the president's place. This is to be a standing rule. The resolution was adopted.

No. 5. Be it resolved that Resolution No. 1 on page 48 of the 1964 Conference Journal be placed in the Standing Rules. The resolution was adopted.

No. 6. Whereas there is nothing in our present minutes about a conference bar, be it resolved that the first ten rows of the center section and the platform area of the tabernacle constitute the conference bar. This is to be placed in the Standing Rules. The resolution was adopted.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

No. 1. It is recommended that Standing Rule No. 19, page 50 of the 1964 Conference Journal be amended to read: Each local society sending a president and duly appointed delegates to the youth conference and convention shall be required to pay a \$2.00 registration fee for each person sent. It is recommended that each local society offer to pay the expenses to and from the conference for each delegate.

The resolution was adopted.

No. 2. Because of the rising costs of operation of the youth camp, be it resolved that the following family rate plan be established: \$15 for one child per family; \$25 for two children per family; \$30 for three children per family; \$5 per person more than three. The resolution was lost.

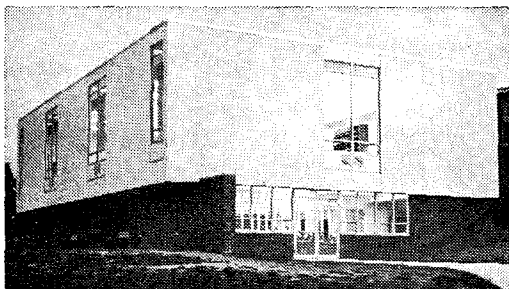

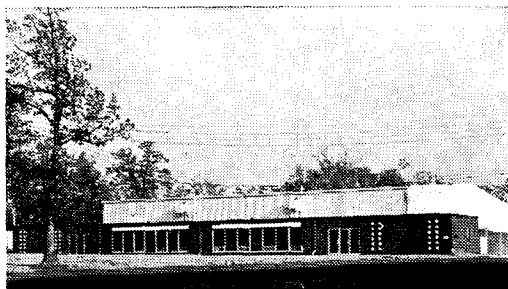
