STANDING RULES

Annual Conference

No. 1-CONFERENCE YEAR

The conference year shall close June 30.

Complete annual reports must be reviewed by the local church boards and forwarded directly to the conference statistician, Rev. Lloyd J. Laubaugh, Box 77, Bellaire 49615, by July 15. All reports received after July 15 shall be omitted from the statistician's report.

No. 2-DATE OF CONFERENCE AND CAMP MEETING

Conference shall be held Thursday and Friday preceding camp meeting. Camp meeting shall start Friday preceding the first week in August.

No. 3-RESOLUTIONS

The Resolutions Committee, the Ways and Means Committee, and all other committees appointed by the conference for the purpose of presenting resolutions to the annual conference shall meet at the call of the district superintendent to prepare resolutions for the next conference.

All proposed resolutions shall be in the hands of the respective committees by May 15. Any resolution received after this date shall be considered only at the discretion of the committees. All resolutions shall be typewritten and signed.

The committees shall mail copies of the resolutions to the pastors and delegates by July 1.

The secretaries of the committees shall provide the conference chairman, district superintendent, and conference secretary with copies of the resolutions before reading them to the conference.

No. 4-CONFERENCE SESSIONS

The first ten rows and the platform area of the tabernacle shall constitute the conference bar. The hours of conference sittings shall be from 9 a.m. to 12 noon, 1:30 p.m. to 5 p.m., and 7 p.m. to 10 p.m.

No delegates shall be seated in the conference unless they are elected by their respective churches.

No. 5-ELECTION OF OFFICERS

The election of officers shall be the first item of business on Friday morning of conference.

All district officers shall be elected by open ballot, except those nominated by the district council.

No. 6-ORDINATION SERVICE

The order of business on the first night of conference shall be the ordination service, with a thirty minute intermission before the opening of business.

The companion of each candidate shall be given an honorary seat with him (or her) during the ordination service.

Camp

No. 7-CAMP BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Camp Board of Directors shall consist of five men elected by the district conference. Two members shall be elected annually for three-year terms, one to be elected from nominations presented by the district council and one to be elected from nominations presented by the youth council. The chairman

of this board shall be appointed by the district council.

The Board of Directors shall elect one of their number to be treasurer for all specified camp development funds.

The duties of the board shall be as follows:

1. Design a progressive and orderly program for the development of Hopkins Camp. These plans shall be in accordance with the master plan accepted by the 1961 annual conference.
2. Report to the district conference annually through the board chairman the progress of the development program.
3. Submit annually to the district conference a specified development project for the current year.
4. Present to the conference plans for financing the development program.
5. The chairman shall present the board's plans and recommendations in the form of resolutions to the conference at the time of the annual report.
6. The board shall be in charge of the renting of the camp ground.
7. The board shall be responsible for directing work week.

No. 8 - CAMP BOARD

The Camp Board shall consist of three members elected by the district conference. One member shall be elected annually for a three-year term from nominations presented by the district council. One of the elected members shall be appointed chairman by the district council.

The board shall organize and supervise all activities necessary for the functioning of the district camp and conference. This is to include:

1. Securing all manual workers.
2. Supervising grounds and buildings during camp and conference.
3. Advertising and promoting the annual camp meeting.
4. Making necessary purchases of camp supplies.

No. 9 - CAMP FUND REPORT

The conference treasurer shall submit an itemized report of camp meeting funds.

No. 10 - CAMP MEETING SUNDAY SCHOOL SESSIONS

On the two Sundays during camp meeting there shall be a Sunday school session from 9:30 a.m. until 10:15 a.m. The session shall be arranged and supervised by the Sunday school committee.

A credit card shall be given to all in attendance. Each card shall be signed and returned by the pupil to his local Sunday school secretary for the attendance record and reports to the conference.

No. 11 - MINISTERS' EXPENSES

Recognized actively engaged ministers of the Pilgrim Holiness Church shall pay a registration fee of \$10 for conference and camp. Their wives and their children, eleven years old and under, and all district retired ministers shall be entertained free. The registration fee shall cover the cost of dormitory privileges, meals, and trailer court and tent facilities. Ministers who do not pay the registration fee shall be charged full current rates for their room, board, and trailer and tent facilities. Ministers accepting an assignment of work for camp and conference from the camp board are to be exempted from the registration fee.

Delegated general church representatives, camp evangelists, singers, and other special camp or convention speakers shall be entertained free for the duration of their engagement.

No. 12-WORK WEEK

The third week of May shall be designated as camp work week.

Each church shall be responsible for five days work per year to the conference, or \$50 is to be paid to the district treasurer by the first of May that help may be hired. The camp board is authorized to hire help to complete any work that is not completed during work week.

Finance

No. 13-CHURCH BUDGET

Each church shall raise for the United Stewardship Fund the equivalent of \$9.50 per member, and for the district budget the equivalent of \$12.75 per member.

The district budget shall be divided as follows: Administrative Fund, \$2.75; Church Extension, \$3; Camp Maintenance, \$2; Camp and Conference, \$0.50; Ministerial Relief, \$0.75; Youth Department, \$0.50; Sunday School Department, \$0.50; Owosso College, \$1; International Conference, \$1.75.

Each church shall pay its budget monthly from the local church treasury.

No. 14-ADMINISTRATIVE FUND

The local church treasurer shall send to the district treasurer along with the monthly budget the equivalent of 10 per cent of the pastor's salary for the Administrative Fund. The pastor shall have the responsibility of seeing that this is done.

No. 15-CONTINGENCY FUND

Five per cent of all district budget receipts, excluding the Owosso College Fund and the International Conference Fund shall be credited to the district Contingency Fund. This fund shall be used for emergency loans to any district department.

No. 16-DISTRICT AND GENERAL FUNDS

All monies raised in the local church for district and general church work shall be sent to the district treasurer, who shall forward the general church funds to the general church treasurer.

To be included in the treasurer's annual report to the conference, funds must be received by him no later than July 10.

District treasurer. Rev. K. P. Boileau, 3765 N. Chapin, Merrill. 48637.

No. 17-BUDGET NOTICES

The district treasurer shall write two letters annually, one in the first quarter of the year and one in the fourth, to the secretary of each local church relative to the payment of the United Stewardship Fund and district budget, indicating the status of that church. These letters shall be presented to the church board at the next regularly scheduled board meeting.

No. 18-AUDITOR

All treasurers' books of the conference shall be audited annually by a recognized public accountant. The auditor's report shall be available to the annual conference.

No. 19-SALARIES

The district superintendent's salary shall be \$6,380 per year, the equivalent of his social security, full pension plan, family hospital insurance, and eight cents a mile traveling expenses.

The annual salaries of other district officials shall be as follows: treasurer,

\$600; secretary, \$250; statistician, \$100; insurance secretary, \$100; Sunday school secretary, \$100; Sunday school treasurer, \$50; Camp Board of Directors treasurer, \$50; Church Extension treasurer, \$50; and missionary treasurer, \$50. Each Department shall be responsible for payment of their respective salaries.

All district officials shall receive six cents per mile for miles traveled in the interest of the district, except for transportation to and from any meeting (business or otherwise) when said transportation serves the purpose of attendance at the annual conference, camp meeting, work week, the annual ministerial convention, and the annual pastor's seminar.

Secretarial or clerical help shall be provided for the district superintendent's office. The district council's permission must be granted for other district secretarial work.

Prior to an annual adjustment of salaries and mileage for the various district departments the salaries and mileage (with the exception of those of the youth department) shall be reviewed by the Ways and Means Committee and approved by the district conference. The salary and expenses of the district superintendent shall be reviewed by the district council and recommendations made to the Ways and Means Committee for approval by the district conference.

No. 20 - MINISTERIAL BENEFIT ASSOCIATION

All actively engaged pastors, evangelists, and ministers of the district, and their wives, shall be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association. The cost of membership and calls shall be paid from the treasuries of the departments that employ them.

Each local church shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Association and pay the expenses of their membership and each call.

All general full-time evangelists and their wives receiving their principal support from their meetings shall be enrolled in the Association. The cost of membership and each call shall be paid by the church of which they are members.

Membership expense for the district superintendent and his wife shall be paid from the Administrative Fund.

Membership expense for ministers, and their wives, employed at Owosso College shall be paid from the Owosso College treasury.

Membership expense for home missionary pastors shall be paid from the Church Extension Fund.

Membership expense for retired elderly ministers and their wives shall be paid from the Ministerial Relief Fund.

Owosso College

No. 21 - OWOSSO COLLEGE DAY

The Sunday following Mother's Day shall be designated Owosso College Day. On this day the college shall be represented and an offering shall be taken for the college with a goal of \$3 per member.

No. 22 - PILGRIM PENSION LOAN PLAN

The District Council, district trustees, and all district officials are hereby authorized to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness churches of this district, subject to the limitations and conditions included in the resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.

Ministerial Conventions

No. 23 - MINISTERIAL CONVENTION COMMITTEE

A ministerial convention committee shall be appointed annually by the dis-

strict superintendent to plan and provide a joint ministerial convention with the East Michigan District.

No. 24-FALL MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

An annual ministerial convention shall be held sometime in the early part of the conference year, the date to be set by the District Council. The convention shall be held in one of the local churches. The district superintendent shall appoint a committee of five persons to prepare the convention program.

Pastors

No. 25-PASTORS AT CAMP MEETING

Inasmuch as the pastors are expected to support and attend the annual camp meeting, each church shall provide the equivalent of the pastor's offering or salary for the two Sundays of the camp and the pastor shall be privileged to attend the entire camp meeting.

No. 26-CAR ALLOWANCE

The Conference recommends that each church provide a car allowance for its pastor.

No. 27-HOSPITALIZATION PLAN

The churches shall enroll their pastors and families in the group hospitalization plan that is in effect in the Michigan District.

Failure to pay premiums for a period of two months shall cancel insurance coverage. A letter shall be sent to the pastor before the insurance expires.

No. 28-SEMINAR EXPENSE

To make it possible for the pastors to attend the annual pastors' seminar, the Conference recommends that each church pay its pastor's seminar registration fee and mileage allowance.

Prior to the seminar the district superintendent shall send a copy of this resolution with a letter of reminder to all local church secretaries.

No. 29-UTILITIES

The local church shall provide good, modern heating and cooking facilities for the parsonage, the type to be suitable to the locality where the parsonage is situated. All churches are to provide the utilities for the parsonages. The district shall provide the same for the district parsonage.

No. 30-VACATIONS

Vacations with pay for all district pastors shall range from a minimum of two weeks to a maximum of four weeks. The length of vacations shall be based on the years of service in the ministry of the Pilgrim Holiness Church as follows:

Full-time service—a minimum of two weeks.

Fifteen years of service—three weeks.

Twenty years, or more, of service—four weeks.

No. 31-RECALL OF PASTORS

The second week of May shall be designated as the time for the churches of the district to vote on the recall of the pastor.

No. 32-MOVING DATE

The minister's term of office as pastor shall continue until and including the first Sunday following the district conference and camp.

No. 33-LICENSED MINISTERS

When a district licensed minister shall serve a church as pastor or assistant pastor he shall have the same privileges and rights as an ordained minister in fulfillment of his pastoral duties.

No. 34-PILGRIM MEN'S FELLOWSHIP

To provide fellowship for men within the Michigan District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, a Pilgrim Men's Fellowship shall be organized as follows:

Name of organization

A. _____ Pilgrim Men's Fellowship.

Purpose of organization

- A. To provide Christian fellowship for laymen.
- B. To provide an outlet for service to Christ and the church.
- C. To encourage witnessing.

Form of government and administration

All officers shall be limited to laymen.

A. Local church

- 1. Officers. President, vice president, secretary, treasurer and pastor.
- 2. Membership.
 - a. Active. Members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
 - b. Associate. Anyone interested in the fellowship.
- 3. Meetings. To be held once a month or as often as desired.
- 4. Finances. May be collected by the fellowship for projects and interests of the fellowship.
- 5. The president of the local fellowship shall serve on the zone board of directors.

B. Zone

- 1. The Board of Directors shall be composed of the local presidents of each men's fellowship within the zone.
- 2. The zone Board of Directors shall elect their own officers. (President, vice president, secretary and treasurer.)
- 3. The zone Board of Directors shall meet at least once a quarter to promote the activities of the zone's fellowship.

C. District

- 1. The president shall be elected by members of the Fellowship. Presidential nominations made by the District Council shall be sent to all the churches.
- 2. The District Board of Directors shall be composed of the president, the zone presidents, and the district superintendent.
- 3. The executive committee shall consist of the district superintendent, president, vice president, treasurer, and secretary.
- 4. The Board of Directors shall meet twice a year.

Reports

No. 35-ANNUAL REPORTS

Complete annual reports must be reviewed by the local church boards and forwarded directly to the district statistician, Rev. Lloyd J. Laubaugh, Box 77, Bellaire 49615, by July 15. All reports received after July 15 shall be omitted from the statistician's report.

No. 36-REPORTING OF PASTORAL CALLS

In order to have a uniform system of reporting pastoral calls the following

guide shall be used:

- a. Each visit to a home shall constitute a pastoral call.
- b. A call shall be recorded for each person ministered to in an institution.
- c. The pastor shall determine whether the call shall be recorded as a member or non-member.

No. 37 -REPORTING SEEKERS

The number of seekers during a revival shall be included in the report of the pastor of the church, as well as in the report of the evangelist.

No. 38 -MONTHLY REPORTS

The average attendance of the Sunday morning, Sunday evening, and prayer meeting services shall be reported monthly.

Report forms will be supplied by the district. Reports shall be submitted on the first day of each month as directed by the district council.

A monthly compilation of the reports shall be sent to the churches.

Sunday Schools

No. 39 -DISTRICT EXPENSE

To provide finances for District Sunday school work, each Sunday school shall send annually to the Conference Sunday school treasurer the amount shown for its category.

No. 40 -SUNDAY SCHOOL INSTITUTE WEEK

The third full week of September shall be known as Sunday School Institute Week.

No. 41 -SUNDAY SCHOOL COUNT

Each Sunday school shall cease counting the attendance at the end of the first one-half of the Sunday school session.

Superintendent

No. 42 -APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEES

The conference superintendent shall appoint all committees. The standing committees are to be appointed to include new members where possible and to avoid the duplication of men on several committees.

No. 43 -MEETINGS WITH LOCAL BOARDS

The district superintendent shall meet with each local board at least once annually to discuss specifically the importance of the United Stewardship Fund and the district budget.

He shall also discuss with the board the needs of the pastor relative to salary and the provisions specified in the manual and conference journal concerning parsonage, utilities, hospitalization insurance, pension plan and car allowance.

This meeting shall be arranged only with the knowledge and full concurrence of the pastor.

No. 44 - RETIRING SUPERINTENDENT

Whenever there shall be elected another superintendent, the conference shall take steps to fill the pastorate left vacant by recommending the retiring superintendent to the church as a pastor. The conference council may also recommend him to the field of evangelism.

No. 45 - REVIVALS

The superintendent shall be allowed to hold two two-Sunday meetings per year, either on or off the district, other than his regular work.

No. 46 - VACATIONS

The conference superintendent shall be granted a vacation period of 30 days with pay per conference year.

Youth

No. 47 - EXECUTIVE MEETINGS

The conference Youth Executive Council shall hold quarterly meetings.

No. 48 - CONVENTION PROGRAM

The youth convention shall consist of four services: a Friday evening evangelistic service, Saturday morning business session, Saturday afternoon service, and a rally Saturday evening.

No. 49 - CAMP YOUTH PROGRAM

A youth program under the direction of the youth council shall be correlated with the regular camp session, consisting of a youth service each week day morning, and a recreational period each afternoon.

No. 50 - TERMS OF SERVICE

Incumbents of the district youth council, though not re-elected, shall serve until the close of camp. Newly elected members shall begin to serve immediately upon their election.

No. 51 - NOMINATIONS OF ZONE OFFICERS

The zone officers and zone pastors shall present nominations for the offices of zone secretary and zone treasurer.

No. 52 - JOINT COUNCIL MEETINGS

There shall be two combined meetings of the district council and the youth council each year. The first meeting shall be in the first six months of the church fiscal year and the second meeting shall be in the second six months of the church year. These meetings shall be called expressly for the purpose of joint business.

Other

No. 53 - ASSOCIATE CHURCHES

Upon a temporary working agreement being effected between the Michigan District and an independent group, that group shall be considered as an "associate church." All assets and properties shall be legally transferred to the Pilgrim Holiness Church before final acceptance of the group by the conference.

No. 54 - CALENDAR

A calendar showing the dates of district activities shall be drafted by the district council each year.

No. 55 - YOUTH PROGRAM FOR DISTRICT CAMP

The youth program for the district camp, as printed in the 1963 Journal, Rule No. 48, is printed in the youth section.

No. 56 - CHURCH EXTENSION

Standing Rules in regard to Church Extension policy, Church Extension Fellowship, and Church Extension Loan Fund (Rules 15, 16, and 17 of 1963 Journal) are included in the 1966 District Handbook.

No. 57 - COURSE OF STUDY

Information regarding the course of study for ordination can be obtained from the district secretary.

No. 58 - MISSIONARY REPORTS

A yearly report of each missionary society shall be printed in the conference journal.

No. 59 - TRUSTEE CHAIRMANSHIP

The assistant superintendent shall be the chairman of the district board of trustees, which shall be composed of three other elected members.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

Annual Conference

August 3 - 4, 1967

FIRST SITTING

The first sitting of the sixty-seventh annual conference of the Michigan District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 9 a.m., August 3, 1967, at the district camp grounds, Hopkins, Michigan.

The district superintendent, Rev. C.M. Marshall, called the conference to order.

With Mrs. L.L. Keesor at the piano, Rev. L. L. Keesor led in the singing of "We'll Work Till Jesus Comes."

Rev. J.H. Koteskey, assistant district superintendent, led in prayer.

Rev. C. M. Marshall then presented Dr. Melvin Snyder, general superintendent, as the presiding officer. Dr. Snyder stated that this is the last annual conference of the Michigan District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church before the merger with the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

The General Superintendent read John 4:34, II Corinthians 6:2, and Luke 21:24. He spoke about the NOW of this generation. We have a NOW salvation. The fields are white unto harvesting NOW. He exhorted each one present to become a NOW Christian—a NOW generation.

Rev. C. E. Messer, district secretary, called the conference roll of pastors and delegates. Delegates present were: ministerial, 64; lay, 70.

The District Superintendent reported that the Holland church has recently organized with nineteen charter members. He commended the Church Extension Committee for their wonderful leadership, and Rev. William Osborne and the Burnips church for their monthly contributions to the Holland church. Rev. Marshall then presented Rev. Bob Nelson, pastor at Holland, and the lay delegate, Mrs. Adrian VanDonkelaar, to the General Superintendent. Dr. Snyder commended them for their progress and welcomed them into the Conference. Rev. Nelson spoke briefly to the Conference, expressing his appreciation for their support of the Holland work.

The Secretary presented a recommendation from the District Council that the following ordained ministers be accepted into the Conference by letter of transfer:

Rev. and Mrs. Daniel Bursch from the Rocky Mountain District.

Rev. William D. Moore from the California District.

Rev. and Mrs. T.M. Fast from the Central District.

The District Council further recommended that Rev. C.J. Adams be reinstated as an ordained minister in the Michigan Conference.

A motion carried to approve the recommendations of the Council.

The Secretary presented a resolution from the Council asking permission for Pilgrim ministers on loan as pastors to the Michigan Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church to retain their ministerial status in the Michigan Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church with voting privileges in the annual conference. The resolution was adopted.

The report of the Educational and Examining boards was read by the Secretary. A motion to approve the report was carried.

The district superintendent, Rev. C.M. Marshall, presented his report. By motion the report was accepted by a rising vote of thanks and gratitude for the work done by the Superintendent.

Rev. J.H. Koteskey, assistant district superintendent, reported that he had attended all regular district council meetings, conducted four annual meetings, was chairman at two other church business meetings, and had endeavored to loyally carry out the directions of the district superintendent. By motion the report was received with appreciation.

The Secretary read the auditors' reports for the treasurers' books for the following departments: Pilgrim Camp Improvement Fund, Michigan Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Michigan District Missionary Societies, and the Michigan Conference Church Extension Department. A motion to receive these reports carried.

By motion the reports of the following district officers were received:

Rev. K. P. Boileau, district treasurer

Mrs. Marya Barrett, district missionary treasurer

Rev. V. L. Draggoo, district Sunday school treasurer

Rev. E. B. Woirol, church extension treasurer

Rev. Carl Barrett, Camp Board of Directors treasurer

A motion was made that the District Council nominate lay delegates to the 1968 general conference. The lay delegates will be elected by the Conference from these nominations on a majority basis; the alternates are to be elected by plurality. The motion carried.

The Conference adjourned for lunch.

SECOND SITTING

The Conference reconvened at 1:30 p.m. at the call of the District Superintendent.

Rev. G.V. Drummonds led in the singing of "Blessed Be The Name" with Mrs. Ruth Keesor at the piano.

Rev. M. E. DePeal, pastor at Kalamazoo, led in prayer.

Rev. C. M. Marshall then presented to the Conference Mrs. Beulah Warner, a representative of Stevens Van Lines; Rev. Joseph Jackson, who is transferring from the Texas District; Rev. Daniel Bursch, president of Owosso College; and Reverends John Newby and C.J. Adams from Owosso Collebe. A motion carried to give each an honorary seat within the Conference bar.

The Secretary read the minutes of the first sitting. They were approved as read.

Rev. L.L. Keesor reported for the Sunday School department. A motion carried that the report be received.

Rev. Keesor presented the National March to Sunday School in March Division B award to Ithaca. Rev. E.B. Woirol, pastor, and delegate, Mrs. Aubrey Shaw, received the award.

The Rally Day award was presented to the Grand Haven Pilgrims. Rev. Keesor presented the plaque to Rev. Tripp and his delegate.

The District Superintendent presented to Rev. Keesor and the Jackson delegates the National March to Sunday School in March Division A award. The District trophy and a certificate from the general church for the largest numerical gain was also awarded to the Jackson church.

Each church that made a gain in Sunday school in 1966-67 was presented with a certificate. The following churches were acknowledged for their gains: Crystal 80%, Grand Haven 30%, Ashley 21%, Almira 20%, Berkley Hills 19%, Jackson 17%, Houghton Lake 15%, Ithaca 13%, Brady Center 9%, Sault Ste. Marie 7%, Cheboygan 7%, Memorial Drive 6%, Edgetts 6%, Owosso 4%, Scottsville 4%, Midland Grace 3%, Bellair 2%, Holland 2%, Lansing First 1%, and Wyoming 1%.

The Secretary read letters of greetings from Miss Orpha Case, missionary at Zambia, Africa, and Rev. Bernard Churchill, pastor at Lansing Emmanuel, who is vacationing in Anchorage, Alaska. A motion carried that the Secretary acknowledge these letters.

The Secretary read a recommendation from the District Council that Rev. Joseph Jackson be accepted into the Michigan Conference as an ordained minister, pending his letter of transfer from the Texas District. A motion carried to accept this recommendation.

Reverend M.V. Goodrich reported for the Resolutions Committee.

Resolution No. 1, regarding Standing Rule No. 19, was adopted.

Resolution No. 2, giving the district superintendent a vacation of 30 days, was adopted.

Resolution No. 3, combining Standing Rules No. 13 and No. 14, was adopted.

Resolution 4, regarding the possibility of the annual district conference being held earlier in the year, was adopted.

Resolution No. 5, regarding the property of associate churches, was adopted.

Resolution No. 6, asking the District Council to appoint a Michigan Conference Merger Study Committee, was adopted.

The conference adjourned for a brief recess.

After the singing of "Oh, How I Love Jesus," Dr. Snyder presented Rev. Daniel Bursch, president of Owosso College. Rev. Bursch spoke about the college, and its place in God's kingdom. He earnestly requested the prayers and sacrificial support of the members of the Conference.

Rev. R.N. Workman reported for the Ways and Means Committee.

Resolution No. 1, regarding the addition of \$1.25 to the International Conference portion of the district budget, was adopted.

Resolution No. 2, regarding a raise of salaries for all district officers, was replaced by a substitute.

The following substitute for Resolution No. 2 was adopted:

RESOLVED, That the salary of the district superintendent be increased 10%.

Resolution No. 3, regarding the Administrative Fund, was replaced by a substitute.

The following substitute for Resolution No. 3 was adopted:

RESOLVED, That the following be added to Standing Rule No. 16 in the 1966 Conference Journal: The pastor shall have the responsibility of seeing that the local church treasurer forward this money to the district treasurer.

Resolution No. 4, regarding mileage fees for district officials, was lost.

Resolution No. 5, regarding exemption from the registration fee for ministers working at camp and conference, was adopted.

Resolution No. 6, regarding each church being responsible for five days work on the camp grounds or the payment of \$50 per year, was adopted.

The Conference was adjourned with prayer by Rev. John Newby.

THIRD SITTING

The ordination service began promptly at 7 p.m. with Rev. L.L. Keesor leading in the singing of "A Charge To Keep." Mrs. Keesor was at the piano.

Rev. J.H. Koteskey led in prayer, after which the song "Rock of Ages" was led by Rev. Keesor.

Rev. C.M. Marshall presented the ordination candidates to Dr. Melvin Snyder. They were as follows: Rev. Ron King, Rev. Aaron Rummage, and Rev. D.G. Lichty, to be ordained to the ministry; Mrs. Katherine Rummage and Mrs. Ruth King to be ordained as deaconesses.

Rev. K.P. Boileau read I Timothy 3:1-10 and II Timothy 4:1-8. Rev. C.E. Messer read Titus 3:1-11.

Dr. Melvin Snyder read I Timothy 4, and used as his topic, "Paul's Three-fold Admonition to the Minister." The admonition consisted of: (1) A word of Warning; (2) A word of exhortation; and (3) A word of promise.

The Ordination Committee then met with the five candidates at the altar as Dr. Snyder read the charge to them. The candidates knelt at the altar for the prayers of dedication. Reverend Roy Rummage, pastor at Coleman, was asked by Dr. Snyder to pray the dedicatory prayer for his son, Aaron Rummage.

Dr. Snyder spoke briefly to the wives of the candidates about their duty as helpmeets and their responsibility to God and their church.

The entire assembly came forward to offer congratulations and best wishes, after which Rev. C.E. Messer led in a prayer of benediction.

Following a brief recess the Conference was called to order by the District Superintendent.

The Secretary read the minutes of the second sitting. They were approved as read.

Rev. R.N. Workman reported again for the Ways and Means Committee.

Resolution No. 7, asking that district treasurer be the Church Extension Loan Fund treasurer, was adopted.

Resolution No. 8, calling for a goal of three dollars per member on Owosso College Day, was adopted.

Reverend Clifford Dean, conference statistician, reported. A motion to receive this report carried.

The Conference adjourned with prayer by Rev. K.P. Boileau.

FOURTH SITTING

The conference superintendent called the Conference to order at 9 a.m., August 4.

The Secretary led in the singing of "I am Thine, O Lord." Rev. L.J. Laubaugh was at the piano.

Rev. R.G. Diehl, pastor at Berkley Hills, led the Conference in prayer.

Various passages of Scripture were quoted for the devotional period. Dr. Snyder then requested that Dr. C.W. Thomas relate how God miraculously healed his grandson.

A motion to dispense with the roll call carried.

The Secretary read the minutes of the third sitting. They were approved as read.

Certificates of recognition were given by Dr. Snyder to the churches that had 80% or more of their district and general budgets paid. The 20 three-star churches with 100% budgets paid were as follows: Almira, Battle Creek First, Bellaire, Brady Center, Burnips, Cheboygan, Coleman, Eaton Rapids, Edgetts, Ellsworth, Frankfort, Grand Rapids Berkley Hills, Hastings, Honor, Houghton Lake, Kalamazoo, Merrill, Owosso, Rockford, and Traverse City First. Alma was a one-star church, having paid 83% budget.

The Conference then proceeded with the election of officers. Dr. Snyder led in prayer, asking God's wisdom and guidance in the elections.

The District Superintendent appointed the following tellers: Edwin Woirol, head teller, Richard Workman, recording teller, Elwood Carl, Merlin Goodrich, Lyle Reynolds, Estle Engle, Alvin Ransom, Don Lichty, Aaron Rummage, David Leamon, Purlin Wesseling, Roy Tripp, Arthur O'Dell, Leonard Strait, Douglas Knight, Stanley Dean, Dale Brugger and G.E. Petterson.

Rev. C.M. Marshall then presented Rev. and Mrs. Lawrence Neff to the Conference. Rev. Neff is assistant to the pastor at the Owosso church. A word of greeting was given by Rev. Neff, after which the Conference voted to give the Neffs honorary seats within the Conference bar.

Rev. Aaron Rummage, CYC Director, gave his report. He reported that he had conducted six presentation meetings, traveled 830 miles, mailed 45 questionnaires, and distributed twelve director's packets. There are four organized CYC groups in the district, he stated, and nine churches have indicated an interest in starting one. The Director's report was accepted by motion.

After further discussion, a motion carried to rescind the former motion, and a motion was made that the nine highest names be listed on the blackboard in the order that they received ballots. The motion carried.

The Conference adjourned.

FIFTH SITTING

The Conference reconvened at 1 p.m. at the call of the District Superintendent.

Rev. G.E. Petterson, pastor at Rockford, led in prayer.

Minutes of the fourth sitting were read by the Secretary. They were approved as read.

Dr. C.W. Thomas, dean of Owosso College, spoke to the Conference about a random survey he and Dr. Melvin Dieter are making regarding the status and educational levels of 500 ministers.

The tellers reported the results of the election for three Advisory Council members. Those elected were: Rev. William Osborne, Rev. L.L. Kessor, and Rev. M.L. Goodman.

Mr. D. A. Harper, director of Pilgrim Men's Fellowship, reported. A motion carried to receive his report with deep appreciation for Mr. Harper's work in this field.

Rev. C.F. Barrett, chairman of the Camp Board of Directors, reported.

Resolution No. 1, asking that the camp project this year be the purchase of a tractor, mower, and trailer, was discussed. A motion to refer this back to the committee was lost. By motion the resolution was adopted.

Rev. C. M. Marshall spoke briefly to the Conference about the *Pilgrim Holiness Advocate*.

Election was held for the delegates to the 1968 International and Merger Conferences. While ballots were being counted, the Conference recessed briefly.

Following the recess, a motion prevailed that the District Council approve the minutes of the last session of conference.

Rev. M.V. Goodrich reported for the Resolutions Committee.

The following resolutions were adopted by motion.

Resolution No. 7. RESOLVED, That a rising vote of thanks be given to General Superintendent M.H. Snyder for his leadership as presiding officer.

Resolution No. 8. RESOLVED, That a vote of thanks be given to District Superintendent C.M. Marshall for his leadership throughout this past year.

Resolution No. 9. RESOLVED, That a vote of thanks be extended to our district youth president and his workers for their outstanding achievements in camp projects and youth camps.

Resolution No. 10. RESOLVED, That a vote of thanks be given to Mrs. Evan Downey for her assistance in the secretarial department.

Resolution No. 11. RESOLVED, That a vote of thanks be extended to the Camp Board and others working in the kitchen and on the camp grounds.

Resolution No. 12. RESOLVED, That the District Council be authorized to take care of any unfinished business.

A motion carried that we send greetings to Conference missionaries and Rev. M.L. Goodman, who is camp evangelist at the Virginia Camp.

A motion prevailed that the Church Extension Loan Fund Committee draft

a suitable annuity program and look into the possibility of a bond program to furnish funds for the Church Extension Loan Fund.

The tellers announced the election of lay delegates to the International and Merger Conferences. The following eight persons were elected as delegates to the International Conference: Leonard Mills, D.A. Harper, Paul Doehring, Larry Mohl, Ed Sayers, Clare Loew, Leonard Schultz, and Vernon Workman. The following were elected as alternate delegates: Howard Inman, William Loflin, Clay Reeves, James Greenman, Carl Shaw, Russell Grosteffon, Harold Albertson, and Edwin Petter.

The following eleven persons were elected as delegates to the 1968 Merger Conference: Leonard Mills, D.A. Harper, Paul Doehring, Larry Mohl, Ed Sayers, Clare Loew, Leonard Schultz, Vernon Workman, Howard Inman, William Loflin, and Clay Reeves.

The following were elected as alternate delegates to the Merger Conference: James Greenman, Carl Shaw, Russell Grosteffon, Harold Albertson, Edwin Petter, Frank Bowles, Elton Hornstra, Leo Putney, Roy Anderson, Leslie Rekkla, and Robert Buchler.

Dr. M.H. Snyder spoke to the Conference about the Pilgrim Pension Plan.

Mrs. Darolene Reynolds reported for the Memoirs Committee. She reported that four conference members have passed away this past year, namely, Rev. P.H. Emlinger, Rev. Mrs. Lillian Lash, Rev. T.H. Myers, and Mrs. I.N. Polmonter. After a few moments of silent prayer, Rev. C.M. Marshall led the Conference in prayer.

The Reception Committee presented Rev. D. Wayne Brown, general secretary-treasurer, to the Conference.

The Superintendent spoke briefly concerning his committee appointments for the coming year. A motion prevailed that a letter be sent to the pastors informing them of the Superintendent's committee appointments.

The Secretary read the appointments made by the District Council. They were as follows: CYC director, Aaron Rummage; PELT director, Marcella Dean; Building Advisory Committee, District Council.

The following were appointed to the Missionary Committee: secretary, Mrs. Bernard Churchill; treasurer, Mrs. Marya Barrett; advisory members, Mrs. Donna Gibbs and Mrs. Helen Marshall.

The Sunday School Committee appointments were: L.L. Keesor, chairman; Fred Gibbs (1970), treasurer.

D.A. Harper was appointed secretary of the Church Extension Loan Fund.

The Superintendent reported that a telegram from Rev. J. A. Byrd, scheduled camp evangelist, states that he is ill and cannot keep his engagement. Rev. A.S. Joppie has been secured as speaker.

Four ministerial delegates to the International and Merger Conferences were elected on the first ballot. After failure to elect the remaining delegates, a motion carried that the delegates be selected on a plurality ballot.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To General Superintendent Dr. M.H. Snyder, delegates, and friends of the sixty-seventh annual session of the Michigan Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, greetings in the precious name of our wonderful Lord and Saviour.

Twenty-seven years ago, in a revival meeting at the altar of a little Pilgrim church, I found the Saviour. Like the Apostle Paul, deeply ingrained in the very fiber of my being is a sense of debt and loyalty, firstly, to the Lord, and secondly, to my church. It is a real joy to serve the Lord through the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

I am aware of the many obstacles confronting the Church of Christ in this twentieth century, yet I believe that this is our day of opportunity. The challenge of new horizons beckons. It is no time to permit the pessimistic attitude of "it can't be done" to chart our course and determine our destiny.

We are limited only by our lack of faith. If we have faith, it will be evidenced by works. Did not James write, "Even so faith, if it hath not works, is dead, being alone." James 2:17.

It is impossible to report the prayers, the burdens, and the sacrifices of the pastors and laymen of this conference. Only God has the complete record, but you can be sure that for every substantial gain reported, a price was required of someone. Thank God for the faithful, dedicated pastors and laymen of our conference.

It would be difficult to find more consecrated men than those comprising the district council. These men have labored willingly and untiringly throughout the year to fulfill their responsibilities. Special mention should be made of Rev. J.H. Koteskey, assistant superintendent, who has made my job much easier by helping to bear the load and responsibility of a much greater pastoral turnover than usual this year.

Under the very able leadership of its president, the Rev. Evan Downey, the Youth Department has had a very successful year. The youth camp was one of the finest in recent years, with 144 boys and girls attending. The district project of raising funds for the new dining room and kitchen exceeded the goal of \$2,000. The youth are giving consideration to ways of improving the zone rallies. I would urge that every church of the conference take a greater interest in the zone youth work.

The inspirational leadership of Rev. L.L. Keesor and his Sunday school committee again led our conference to top honors in the national Sunday school contest. Many of the Sunday schools have made outstanding gains, but a number of others have had losses, resulting in only a small gain for the yearly average attendance. The Sunday school committee had a record attendance at the fall zone institutes and promoted a district-wide "balloon ascension."

It was a real thrill to organize the new church at Holland. This has been the main emphasis of the Church Extension Committee for the past three years. This church was organized with 19 charter members.

Camp improvements include work on the new dining room, showers in some of the rest rooms, improvements in the missionary cottage, wiring, etc. The Dow Chemical Company gave a supply of styrofoam worth several thousand

dollars to the camp. Special mention should be made of Rev. William Osborne and his good people of Burnips, as well as the Muskegon people, who worked to prepare the dorms and grounds for camp.

The District Treasurer reports that 85.8% of the United Stewardship Fund is paid and 79.1% of the district budget was paid. Twenty churches paid budgets in full. The financial picture of the district is much improved, but there is a need to take a hard look at the International Conference fund, due to the merging conference of next June.

I shall report only the major items on the local church level.

Bellaire dedicated a beautiful new church building.

Kalamazoo completed and dedicated a much needed and adequate educational unit.

Lansing First built and dedicated a new parsonage.

Eaton Rapids also built and dedicated a new parsonage.

Holland has a new church building under construction.

Breckenridge is building a new parsonage.

The Burnips church had a mortgage burning service. Since that time, they have been taking a special offering each month for the new Holland Church.

The Edgetts Church paid off their debt and had a mortgage burning service.

Cheboygan, Muskegon First, and Frankfort have purchased land for new building sites.

Most of the churches have made some improvements. We are grateful to the Lord for all of these material gains.

There have been a number of pastoral changes with some yet to be effected. These are the ones approved by the District Council: Battle Creek First, Rev. Vaughn Drummond; Alma, Rev. J.H. Koteskey; Lansing First, Rev. William Kinnan; Kalamazoo, Rev. Carl Messer; Frankfort, Rev. Douglas Knight; Newberry, Rev. David Cheyne; Traverse First, Rev. Dale Kessler; Traverse Heights, Rev. Lyle Reynolds; Edgetts, Rev. Estle Engle; Witmer Memorial, Rev. David Leamon; Lansing Emmanuel, Rev. Dale Brugger; Midland First, Rev. Don Lichty; Houghton Lake, Rev. Bernard Churchill.

The Reverends M.E. DePeal and Philip Mitchell have accepted churches in the North Michigan Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

It has been a pleasure to work with the pastors of the district and to visit in their homes. Much credit should be given to the pastors' wives for their devotion to the work the Lord has called them to as a helpmeet to their pastor husband. I have been entertained royally in each pastor's home.

The laymen have been kind and understanding. I feel that if anything has been accomplished in the conference it is because of the dedicated efforts of our pastors and laymen and the faithfulness of our Lord.

SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

To our General Superintendent Dr. Melvin H. Snyder, our District Superintendent Rev. C.M. Marshall, fellow ministers, and members of the annual conference of the Michigan District, greetings in the name of our coming King.

I desire at this time to pay special tribute to the Michigan District for its fine efforts in the work of the Sunday school. Are you aware of the fact that this district for the past four years has won the national March To Sunday School In March Crusade? This, to me, is a great accomplishment when you realize that we are competing against all other Sunday schools in our denomination. This year the divisional winners are as follows: Division "A," Jackson, 1st place; Berkley Hills, 2nd place; Division "B," Ithaca, 1st place; Division "D," Crystal, 2nd place. Each of these Sunday schools is to be commended for its efforts in the national crusade.

This year's district Sunday school attendance is nothing to write home about, but thanks be to God we are still in the gain column. We take our hats off to the Sunday schools that have shown a gain this year. Twenty-one Sunday schools show a gain, seven were even, and seventeen show a loss. Special mention ought to be given to the Sunday schools in double figures. Jackson led the way with a forty numerical gain and thus wins the district trophy. Berkley Hills was close behind with a thirty-eight numerical gain. Ithaca and Grand Haven tied with a seventeen gain and Owosso, Almira, Ashley, and Crystal rounded out those Sunday schools in double figures. Grand Haven has won the rally day award for this year.

Our fall district Sunday school conventions were the best attended in the history of our district. There seems to be a growing interest in these conventions each year, and we hope that this year will be the best yet. This fall the conventions will be held September 18th through the 22nd. We are planning the best possible convention with the best possible workers. You will be receiving more information soon.

As I survey the Sunday school with all its opportunities, I am amazed that much more has not been accomplished. The Sunday school's greatest weakness is ignorance of her own powers. We need to get a clear grasp of what a Spirit-filled Sunday school can do in our day. What the Spirit did for the people after Pentecost, He should be doing for our people now. If one hundred and twenty inspired people could add thousands to the church daily, should we not expect and attempt the same? We say that He is the same yesterday, today and forever. We talk a lot about it, but do little to fulfill the Great Commission. Our Sunday schools as well as our people ought to be living, walking and talking Christ. Our belief in the Sunday school should be so powerful that we will not worry about self-preservation. We will worry about getting the will of God done in our communities no matter what the cost may be.

May God grant that we may be full of the Spirit, cleansed, enlightened, directed, and empowered that we may have bigger and better Sunday schools for our times. I can't help but feel like the great Dwight L. Moody when he said, "The world has yet to see what God can do with and for and through and in a man who is fully and wholly consecrated to Him." This is true with the Sunday School. This district, this denomination, has yet to see what God could do with and for and through a Sunday school that is wholly committed unto Him. My prayer is that God will make our Sunday schools forward-looking and aggressive schools for our times. The time is now to generate new enthusiasm and a new challenge to our people.

I propose the following for substantial growth in the Sunday school: deliberate planning, determined effort, and defined responsibility. It is our aim to pray till every church school is gaining spiritually and numerically in our district. It can be done.

Many thanks go to our district superintendent, our pastors, and each officer of the Sunday school for making this year what it is. My appreciation goes to the district Sunday school committee for their fine work they have done this year. May God bless the Michigan District in all its labors of love.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

Resolution No. 1. RESOLVED, That the following be added to the last line of Standing Rule No. 19, page 14, of the 1966 Conference Journal:

“And that said letter be presented to the church board at the next regularly scheduled board meeting.” (Adopted).

Resolution No. 2. RESOLVED, That Standing Rule No. 47, page 19 of the 1966 Conference Journal, be amended to read:

“The Conference Superintendent shall be granted a vacation period of 30 days with pay per conference year.” (Adopted).

Resolution No. 3. INASMUCH as Standing Rule No. 14, page 14 of the 1966 Conference Journal, does not clearly state that Owosso College be represented at each church on Owosso College Day, **BE IT RESOLVED**, That said standing rule be amended to read:

“The Sunday following Mother’s Day shall be designated Owosso College Day. On this day the College shall be represented and an offering shall be taken for the College with a goal of one dollar per member.”

“**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that standing rule No. 13, page 14 of the 1966 Conference Journal concerning College visits be deleted.” (Adopted).

(See Ways and Means Resolution No. 8).

Resolution No. 4. “WHEREAS there have been embarrassing situations that have developed from our present vote for the retaining of the district superintendent and in the placement of the former superintendent, and **WHEREAS** the East Michigan District holds its conference much earlier, thus hindering the correlation of pastoral placements between conferences,

BE IT RESOLVED, That the District Council be requested to investigate the possibilities of an earlier district conference for the deliberation of conference business and the election of conference officials.” (Adopted).

Resolution No. 5. “BE IT RESOLVED that upon a temporary working agreement being effected between our district and an independent group, that said group be listed as “Associate Church.”

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That all assets and properties be legally transferred to the Pilgrim Holiness Church before final acceptance of said group by the conference. (Adopted).

Resolution No. 6. BE IT RESOLVED, That the conference authorize the District Council to appoint a Michigan Conference Merger Study Committee. This committee shall consist of two ministers, two laymen, and the district superintendent. The committee shall work with similar committees from the Michigan conferences of the Wesleyan Methodist Church and the East Michigan Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and will recommend merger proposals for the State of Michigan.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

Resolution No. 1. INASMUCH as there is no financial plan to cover the cost of the merging conference to be held in June 1968, be it therefore

RESOLVED, That there be \$1.25 added to the International Conference portion of the district budget for the church year 1967-1968. (Adopted).

Resolution No. 2. INASMUCH as there has been a raise in the general cost of living, be it therefore

RESOLVED, That all district officials listed in Standing Rule No. 21 of the 1966 Conference Journal be increased 10 percent.

(A substitute motion carried that the district superintendent's salary be increased 10%).

Resolution No. 3. INASMUCH as the administrative fund is needed to pay the officials of our district, be it therefore

RESOLVED, That if the local church fails to send in the equivalent of 10% of the pastor's salary for the administrative fund, the pastor is to take the responsibility of sending it to the district treasurer.

(A substitute motion carried that the following be added to Standing Rule No. 16 in the 1966 Conference Journal: "The pastor shall have the responsibility of seeing that the local church treasurer forward this money to the district treasurer.").

Resolution No. 4. BE IT RESOLVED, That the district superintendent receive nine cents per mile for miles traveled in the interest of the district, and all other district officials receive eight cents per mile. LOST.

Resolution No. 5. BE IT RESOLVED, That the following be added to Standing Rule No. 11 of the 1966 Conference Journal: "Ministers accepting an assignment of work for camp and conference from the Camp Board are to be exempted from the registration fee." (Adopted).

Resolution No. 6. BE IT RESOLVED, That Standing Rule No. 12 on page 14 of the 1966 Conference Journal be changed to read:

"Each church shall be responsible for five days work per year to the conference, or \$50 is to be paid to the district treasurer by the first of May that help may be hired. The Camp Board is authorized to hire help to complete any work that is not completed during work week." (Adopted).

Resolution No. 7. RESOLVED, That the Church Extension Loan Fund legislation (Standing Rule No. 17, 1963 Conference Journal, and 1966 District Handbook) be amended to make the district treasurer the treasurer of the Church Extension Loan Fund. (Handbook, page CE-4, Article 3).

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Church Extension Loan Fund borrow no money for the purpose of lending. (Handbook, page CE-4, Article 4). (Adopted).

Resolution No. 8. RESOLVED, That the goal for the Owosso College Day offering, as mentioned in Standing Rule No. 14, be changed from one dollar per member to three dollars per member. (Adopted).

OTHER RESOLUTIONS

Camp Board Resolution. BE IT RESOLVED, That the Camp Board of Directors' project for the year be the purchase of a tractor, mower, and trailer for the maintenance of the camp grounds, of which the estimated cost will be \$1,000.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That coin cards be presented to the churches as a means of raising the necessary money. (Adopted).

District Council Resolution. BE IT RESOLVED, That the Pilgrim ministers of the Michigan Conference on loan as pastors to the Michigan Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church be permitted to retain their ministerial status in the Michigan Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church with voting privileges in the annual conference. (Adopted).

Memoirs

REV. P.H. EMLINGER

Rev. P.H. Emlinger, retired minister of the East Michigan Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, passed away at the Gratiot Community Hospital in Alma, on Thursday morning, April 20, 1967, following a five-week illness.

Starting the Alma church 35 years ago, Rev. Emlinger gave 29 years of his life in active ministerial service, pastoring in Alma, Ashley, Bay City, Applegate and Flint. He was forced to retire about seven years ago following a heart attack.

Funeral services were conducted from the Alma Pilgrim Holiness Church on Saturday, April 22, at 2 p.m. with the Rev. Clyde M. Marshall, district superintendent, officiating.

REV. LILLIAN R. LASH

DISTRICT YOUTH SOCIETY STANDING RULES

Annual Conference

No. 1—CONFERENCE DATE

The district youth conference shall be held on Saturday morning of the youth convention and shall convene at 9 a.m.

NO. 2—CONFERENCE SESSIONS

The first ten rows of the center section and the platform area of the tabernacle shall constitute the conference bar.

The hours for conference sittings shall be from 9 a.m. to 11:45 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. until finished.

NO. 3—DELEGATES TO CONFERENCE

Only duly elected delegates of the youth society shall be seated in the conference bar. Only the vice president can be seated in the president's place.

NO. 4—REPORTS TO CONFERENCE

Reports to the conference shall be given by the district youth president, the district youth treasurer, and each zone president.

Finance

NO. 5—FINANCIAL PROGRAM

The local youth society treasurer shall send 30% of the total offerings to the district youth treasurer the week following the last Sunday of each month. One-sixth of this money shall be sent to the General Department of Youth. The district youth treasurer shall send quarterly 40% of the remainder received from the local youth treasurer to the zone youth treasurer.

NO. 6—SALARIES

The annual salaries for district youth officers shall be as follows: president, \$250; secretary, \$75; treasurer, \$100.

NO. 7—MILEAGE

The members of the executive committee shall receive eight cents per mile for traveling expense incurred for district work.

The zone presidents shall be paid a minimum of four cents per mile for travel to and from zone rallies.

The zone shall pay one-half of the mileage traveled by the zone president to all district youth council business meetings.

NO. 8—FINANCIAL REPORT

The district youth treasurer shall send a quarterly financial report to the district youth president and the district superintendent.

Journal

NO. 9—EDITING OF MINUTES

The district youth conference minutes shall be edited by the youth. The district youth secretary shall serve as chairman of an editing committee composed of three or more additional members to be appointed by the district youth president. The youth conference minutes shall be placed in the conference journal in a portion set aside for this purpose.

NO. 10—LIST OF PRESIDENTS

A list of the names and addresses of the local youth society presidents shall be published in the conference journal. Where there is no organized or chartered society the pastor shall submit the name and address of the local leader.

Youth Camps

NO. 11—JUNIOR AND SENIOR CAMPS

The facilities at Hopkins Camp shall be used for two separate youth camps consisting of two age groups. The senior youth camp shall be held in conjunction with the regular Hopkins Camp; the District Youth Council shall be in charge.

A Youth Camp Board consisting of the Youth Executive Council and the District CYC Director shall be formed for the purpose of planning and promoting the youth camps.

NO. 12—ADVANCE REGISTRATION

A one dollar registration fee shall be sent with a youth camp registration card by each applicant to the district youth treasurer fifteen days prior to youth camp. The remainder of the fee will be paid on the day of registration.

Zone Rules

NO. 13—RALLIES

There shall be at least six youth rallies held each zone during the conference year. A schedule of rallies shall be sent to the district superintendent and the district youth president.

NO. 14—ZONE OFFICERS

The officers of the zone shall be a president, vice president, secretary and treasurer. Each one must be a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and a member of a local youth society. The pastors and youth presidents shall be active voting members of the business session.

NO. 15—ELECTION OF OFFICERS

The election of zone officers and the annual zone business meeting shall be held at the first rally of the conference year.

NO. 16—DUTIES OF ZONE OFFICERS

The duties of the zone officers shall be as listed below.

President

1. Meet with the zone committee and plan dates in advance for zone rallies.
2. Send dates of zone rallies to the district youth president and to all pastors in the zone.
3. Plan and promote all zone rallies.
4. Preside at all zone rallies.
5. Give attention to financial matters of the zone.
6. Serve on the district youth council.
7. Cooperate in promoting the district and national youth program.
8. Keep an up-to-date mailing list of all local officers in the zone.
9. Give a report to the annual district youth conference.

Vice President

1. Serve on the zone committee.
2. Serve for one year as the zone president requests.

Treasurer

1. Receive and disburse funds as directed by the zone committee.
2. Keep accurate records of receipts and disbursements and bank all monies immediately upon receiving.
3. Send a treasurer's report at least twice a year to the zone pastors.
4. Serve on the zone committee.

Secretary

1. Keep minutes of all zone committee meetings.
2. Help the zone president with zone correspondence.
3. Keep an up-to-date mailing list of all local officers in the zone.
4. Report each zone rally to the district youth president as soon as possible after each rally.

Other

NO. 17—DISTRICT RALLY

A joint rally with the East Michigan District shall be held on the first Saturday of November at Owosso College. This rally shall be counted as a zone rally. The program shall be geared to all youth.

NO. 18—PROMOTION COMMITTEE

A youth promotion committee shall be appointed by the youth council. This committee shall be responsible for the origination and distribution of materials for promotion of all district youth activities.

NO. 19—THEME SONG

The song "Forward Ever" shall be the theme song of the Pilgrim youth of the Michigan Conference.

NO. 20—ATTIRE

The conference recommends that action be taken not to allow any person to work during camp or conference wearing make-up, immodest forms of dress, or anything contrary to church standards as stated in the Manual.

District standing rules affecting the youth work are listed in the youth section of the standing rules. They are as follows:

YOUTH PROGRAM FOR DISTRICT CAMP

(STANDING RULE NO. 55 OF DISTRICT CONFERENCE)

1. A youth director shall be hired to organize, plan, and direct all activities of the youth (recreational, spiritual, and social) at the district camp. The director shall be contacted and appointed at least six months prior to the conference.

His duties shall be as follows:

- a. Responsibility for the registration of all youth.
- b. Assignment of sleeping quarters, squads, and work details.
- c. Plan and organize all recreational activities.
- d. Make available a list of all games and sheets to be signed by the youth for the area in which he wishes to participate.
- e. Appoint a counselor to oversee and direct each area of recreational activity.
- f. Responsibility for seeing that all youth participate in the required spiritual activities.
- g. Collect a health form from each young person and see that the forms are filed with the camp nurse.
- h. Handle all matters requiring discipline, along with the head counselor and, if need be, the district youth president.

II. Two head counselors shall be hired, one for boys and one for girls. These counselors shall be under the direct supervision of the youth director and shall give him complete co-operation.

The duties of the head counselors shall be as follows:

- a. Responsibility for the execution of all rules and regulations.
- b. Responsibility for morning and evening devotions.
- c. Supervision of the squad counselors in the execution of their duties and responsibilities.
- d. See that all youth are in service with the squad counselors during required periods.
- e. Check all sleeping quarters for lights out and quietness.
- f. Periodically check with squad counselors during recreational activities.
- g. May excuse any young person who is ill, or has a good reason, from an activity.
- h. Inspect sleeping quarters at designated time each day.

III. A counselor shall be acquired for each squad. The squad counselors shall be under the direct supervision of the head counselor and the youth director.

The duties of the squad counselors shall be as follows:

- a. Responsibility for his or her squad at all times except during recreational periods.
- b. See that all work is done properly during work periods.
- c. Shall not leave the grounds without first notifying the head counselor and another person placed in charge of the squad.
- d. Sit in all required services in the area reserved for the youth.
- e. Check roll at all activities and see that every squad member is accounted for.
- f. See that sleeping quarters are kept clean, beds made, and ready for inspection at the designated time.
- g. Take bed check, see that every one is in bed, lights out, and maintain quietness. Any person missing or violating the rules shall be reported to the head counselor.

IV. The squads shall be no larger than fifteen persons.

V. The camp fee for youth shall be set by the district youth council, to be

approved by the District Council. The registration fee is to be included in this amount. One dollar of the set fee is to be paid to the district youth treasurer.

IV. The camp board shall submit a list of the work details expected to be done by the youth to the youth director and/or the youth council four weeks prior to the conference.

VII. Camp staff applications, evaluation forms, and the camper evaluation forms shall be used.

YOUTH JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

FIRST SITTING

The thirteenth Pilgrim Holiness Youth Conference of the Michigan District convened at 9:00 A.M., August 5, 1967, at the Pilgrim Holiness Camp Grounds at Hopkins, Michigan. Rev. E.L. Downey, Youth President, called the Conference to order.

Rev. Gerald Grindley, Camp song evangelist, opened the song service with the singing of "'Tis So Sweet To Trust In Jesus" and "Victory In Jesus". Mrs. Grindley was at the piano.

Rev. C.R. Hendricks, former District Superintendent of the East Michigan Conference, led in prayer.

Rev. E.L. Downey, Youth President, then presented Rev. D. Wayne Brown, Secretary-Treasurer of our General Church, as our Presiding Officer. Rev. O.D. Emery, Secretary of Sunday Schools and Youth, was unable to be with us, due to finding it necessary to conduct another Conference.

Reverend Brown spoke to the Conference from II Tim. 3:1-5, regarding "Having a form of godliness, but denying the power thereof". He stressed that in this present age we have many substitutes, but we cannot have a substitute for God in our lives. He brought a challenging message to the youth about putting God first.

The Youth Secretary, Rev. G.V. Drummonds, called the roll.

The District Youth President reported. It was moved and carried to adopt this report by a rising vote of appreciation to Rev. Downey for his work in the Youth Department.

A motion prevailed that Rev. Douglas Knight and Rev. David Cheyne be seated within the Conference bar, inasmuch as they are taking pastorates this year in the Michigan Conference.

Reverend Alvin Ransom, District Youth Treasurer, read his report. A motion carried to receive this report.

A motion carried to receive these fine reports.

Representatives from the following youth societies reported:

Alma, Almira, Ashley, Battle Creek I, Witmer Memorial, Brady Center, Burnips, Eaton Rapids, Edgetts, Grand Haven, Berkley Hills, Houghton Lake, Ithaca, Lansing I, Merrill, Midland I, Memorial Drive, Newberry, Owosso, Rockford, Sault Ste. Marie, Scottville, Chesaning, and Crystal. A motion carried to accept these reports.

Rev. J.H. Koteskey commented briefly regarding some of our Michigan District Youth who have excelled in sports and music. The Conference was so impressed by these achievements that a motion carried that Rev. Koteskey

write an article about these youth, and send it to Rev. O.D. Emery for publication in the Youth News.

Due to expiration of time, the Conference adjourned. Rev. Aaron Rummage dismissed with prayer. Conference is to reconvene at 1:00 P.M.

SECOND SITTING

The Conference reconvened at 1:00 P.M. at the call of the Youth President, Rev. E.L. Downey.

Rev. Grindley led in the singing of, "Glory To His Name", with Mrs. Grindley at the piano and Rev. Vaughn Drummond at the organ.

Rev. C.M. Marshall, District Superintendent, led in prayer.

The Singing Grindleys sang a special number, after which by common consent the delegates moved to the first five rows of the tabernacle, due to public address difficulties.

District Youth Secretary, Rev. G. Vaughn Drummonds, read the minutes of the First Sitting. They were approved as read.

Reverend Fred Gibbs, Secretary of the Resolutions Committee, reported.

Resolution No. 1, regarding purchasing agents for the youth. Carried.

Resolution No. 2, regarding an all-day rally at Owosso College. Carried.

Resolution No. 3, regarding youth camps, on page 46. Carried.

Reverend D.G. Lichty reported for the Ways and Means Committee.

Resolution No. 1, regarding Standing Rule #8, Page 46, concerning traveling expenses. Carried.

Resolution No. 2, regarding Standing Rule #6, Page 45, regarding Conference and Convention fees. Motion carried to refer this back to the committee.

Resolution No. 3, regarding Standing Rule No. 7, page 46, raising of salaries. Carried.

The Conference proceeded with the election of officers. The following tellers were appointed: Ed Woirol, Head Teller, R.N. Workman, Recording Secretary, Aaron Rummage, Al Ransom, Purlin Wesseling, Don Lichty, Roy Tripp, Dale Kessler, Leonard Strait, M.V. Goodrich, Dale Brugger, Norm Kessler.

Ballots were cast for Vice President. Rev. E.B. Woirol was re-elected.

The District Youth Secretary read the nominations from the District Council for the District Youth Treasurer. Rev. Al Ransom was re-elected.

Ballots were cast for District Youth Secretary. Rev. Aaron Rummage was elected. Our former youth secretary, Rev. G. Vaughn Drummond, found it necessary to resign this year, and a motion carried to give him a rising vote of thanks for his years of service to the youth department.

The officers elected are listed in the directory under "Zone Leaders." The Conference voted to approve these elections.

The Conference reconvened after a short recess, with the singing of, "He Ransomed Me", led by Rev. D. Wayne Brown.

The District Youth President gave his committee appointments for the coming year. They are as listed in the Youth Directory.

Rev. D. G. Lichty reported back for the Ways and Means Committee.

Resolution No. 2, which had been referred back to the committee, was brought to the floor again. It was recommended to delete Standing Rule No. 6, Page 45, and that the matter be referred to the Executive Council. Carried.

Rev. Fred Gibbs reported for the Resolutions Committee.

The following resolutions were presented and carried by motion.

RESOLVED, That Rev. D. Wayne Brown be given a rising vote of thanks for his efficient leadership in this conference.

RESOLVED, That Rev. C.M. Marshall be given a vote of appreciation for his leadership and concern for our youth work.

RESOLVED, That Mrs. Evan Downey be given a vote of appreciation for

her secretarial work.

RESOLVED, That Rev. Evan Downey be given a rising vote of appreciation for his work as youth president.

A motion carried that the District Youth Council be authorized to approve the minutes of the final sitting and take care of any unfinished business.

A motion carried that the conference adjourn. Dr. H. T. Mills dismissed with prayer.

What a glorious and wondrous thought, that by this time next year we may all be at the Marriage Supper of the Lamb. We may be rejoicing around the Throne of God—singing His praises forevermore. I am reminded this morning of the song, "It Will Be Worth It All, When We See Jesus. Life's trials will seem so small, when we see Christ." Brethren, we must keep pressing on, and working for our youth and helping them in any way possible.

This has been one of the greatest years of my life as far as the youth work is concerned. As we take a backward look, I am sure you will rejoice with me about God's wonderful guidance and blessings on our youth department.

ZONE RALLIES

I visited each zone last year, and held their zone elections. However, the new Manual states that we are to elect all the zone officers at the District Conference. Section 153, #5. This will omit one of the hardest to promote Zone Rallies of the year. I still would like to visit each zone, and be of any help I can in their organization.

YOUTH IN ACTION DAY

Because it is now becoming more and more difficult for students to be excused from school to attend Youth In Action Day at Owosso College, this day is now largely devoted to student procurement instead of a day that we can call a District Youth Rally. Because of this, the East Michigan Youth Council and our own District Youth Council are recommending that November 4 of this year be set aside for a great all-day rally at Owosso for both Districts.

YOUTH CAMPS

It has been said that "Laughter is good medicine". Youth camps are made up of laughter. It warms your heart to see youth so full of zeal and life.

However, because it is becoming more difficult each year to secure a staff, I would like to recommend that in the near future we try to secure a permanent Youth Camp Staff; one that will work from year to year. Also, the Youth Council feels that a raise in the registration fee would be in order in the near future.

Due to the lack of interest in the Senior Camp, our Executive Youth Council felt it wise to incorporate our Senior Youth Camp with the Youth Program at the regular camp. This year it is being directed by Rev. Merlin Goodrich, who is doing a fine job.

We are praising God for our Junior Camp, which had "146" registered campers. This was, I believe, the largest in recent years, and there were no major discipline problems. I say, "Praise God for our wonderful Michigan youth".

This camp to me was the most rewarding I have ever attended. Rev. E.B. Woirol, pastor at Ithaca, conducted Bible classes daily on the various cults. The campers were thrilled with this type of program. On the last day, a test was given, and 80% of the campers received high ratings. Youth Camp is a wonderful time to instruct our youth in the things of God.

Rev. L.L. Keesor, pastor at Jackson, brought an evangelistic message each evening to the campers, and each evening seekers were at the altar. Brother Keesor was certainly the instrument in God's hands. Rev. R.N. Workman, pastor at Brady Center, was in charge of the recreation, and did a fine job.

FINANCES

Pilgrims are a giving people. They give because they love God, and His Kingdom. They give with cheerful hearts. You will notice in the Youth Treasurer's report that it is one of the best reports ever to be turned into the Conference. Our Youth Project of \$2,000 for the dining hall went over the top, and the money has already been sent to the Camp Board of Director's Treasurer. I would like to thank each pastor and loyal Pilgrim who gave toward this project. It is because of YOU that I am able to give such a good report.

For 1967-68 I would like to see each church in the district send in 30% of their local youth offerings. We can do it Let's try to have 100% cooperation next year.

PERSONAL COMMENTS

Again, I would like to stress that I do not receive the credit for the progress that has been made. Many times this year I have felt GOD undertake, and I give HIM the praise. The burdens have been heavy at times, and that is when I have felt God's presence so real. I know the pastors have cooperated with me, and they deserve the credit for what has been accomplished. I want God to use me this coming year, and keep His hand on me as Youth President, on our Youth Council, and on our complete Youth Department. I would appreciate your prayers.

Whereas there has been considerable difficulty in contacting proper government authorities and offices in government food programs and food buying: BE IT RESOLVED that a committee composed of the District Youth Treasurer and one other member, be appointed by the Youth Council as purchasing agents. Carried.

No. 2

Whereas YOUTH IN ACTION DAY at Owosso College is mainly for the high school juniors and seniors to acquaint them with the college curriculum,

BE IT RESOLVED that a joint rally with the East Michigan District be held on the first Saturday of November, at OWOSSO COLLEGE, and this rally is to be counted as a ZONE RALLY with a program geared to all youth. Carried.

No. 3

BE IT RESOLVED that the senior youth camp shall be held in conjunction with the regular Hopkins Camp and that the District Youth Council shall be in charge of the same. Carried.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1

BE IT RESOLVED that Standing Rule #8, Page 46, be amended to read as follows:

The members of the executive committee shall receive eight cents per mile for traveling expense incurred for district work.

The zone presidents shall be paid a minimum of four cents per mile for travel to and from zone rallies.

The zone shall pay one-half of the mileage traveled by the zone president to all district youth council business meetings. Adopted.

No. 2

Whereas the operational expense has increased, be it resolved that the following standing rule #6, page 45, of the 1966 Conference Journal be amended to read as follows:

Each local society sending a president and duly appointed delegate to the youth conference and convention shall be required to pay a \$3 registration fee for each person sent. It is recommended that each local society offer to pay the expenses to and from the conference for each delegate.

All youth, ages 15 through 20, shall be entertained free Friday through Saturday during the youth convention upon payment of a \$3 registration fee. The fee for the total camp meeting will be \$20 with minimum of work, or \$10 part time work. The rate for single days will be \$3. Young people who have completed high school or are 18 years of age, who choose to pay full current rates for rooms and meals, will not be required to register in the youth program at the annual district camp meeting.

(Referred back to committee. Standing Rule deleted by motion and matter referred to the executive council).

No. 3

BE IT RESOLVED that Standing Rule #7 on Page 46 of the 1966 Conference Journal be adjusted to read:

The annual salaries for district youth officers shall be as follows: president, \$250; secretary, \$75; treasurer, \$100. Carried.

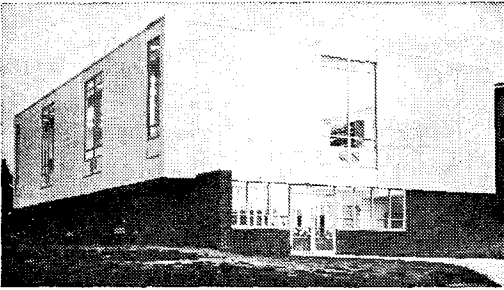

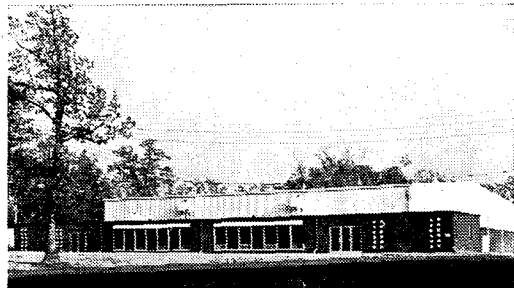
