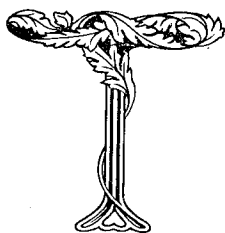

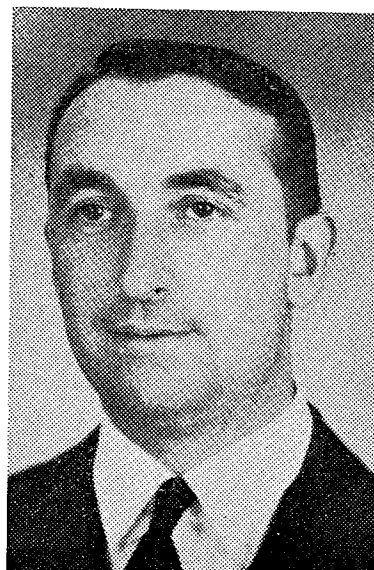

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

The Thirty-Second Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the North Carolina District met at 10:00 a. m. on the first day of September, 1942, at Asheboro Church. The song service was led by Rev. U. N. Freeman, of the Albemarle Church. Many requests came in for prayer, especially for our host pastor, who has been having grippe for two days. Rev. R. I. McCluskey, of the First Greensboro Church, in behalf of the Conference, led us to the Throne. Our District Superintendent, Rev. S. M. Stikeleather, introduced Rev. L. W. Sturk, Assistant General Superintendent, who presided throughout the Conference.

Rev. Sturk expressed himself as very happy to again return to North Carolina; that there is a friendliness and cordiality here which is deeply appreciated. He spoke briefly on "Practical Points for Pilgrims", using the first nineteen verses from the fourteenth chapter of Romans, and especially the key-word, "Let", which occurs six times. He used five C-words, Charity, Conviction, Caution, Consistency, and finally Conclusion.

Charity with relation to the convictions we have that we do not judge others with different convictions. God wants us to be different, but the danger lies in being critical of others over the differences.

Convictions from the Lord and not from men. Convictions that are God-given. Stand upon them and go forward with them.

Caution. Much damage has come to our Church because of being hasty. We never know the motives of others.

Consistency. There are things of greater consequence than the color of hose or absence of ties. God is appraising us by our spirit.

Conclusion: 1.—Proper regard for the convictions of others. 2.—Confidence in others. One of the most dangerous things is a critical spirit. If you are looking for faults you will find them. 3.—Divine love. The Apostle said that he would eat nothing that would cause offense in others.

In the absence of the pastor, Rev. Chas. L. Stout, the District Superintendent welcomed the Conference and made announcements. The roll was called and the Conference bar was fixed to include the first four pews, the seats at the sides of the platform, also the Sunday School room back of the platform, reserving the wing and back of the Church for visitors.

Rev. H. R. Helms was added to the Reception Committee and the following visitors were brought forward and introduced: Rev. and Mrs. Masterman, singers, from New York; Rev. and Mrs. J. H. Felter, from Pennsylvania; the Keller sisters, singers, from Pennsylvania; and Rev. and Mrs. M. R. Harvey, of the Wesleyan Church, Asheboro.

The hours for meeting and adjournment were set: 9:00 to 12:30 and 2:30 to 5:00, meals to be served on a large table at the rear of the Church at 12:30 and 5:30. It was announced that Mrs. Mary Loew Gaylord, missionary on furlough from Africa, would speak on missions in the Church at 7:30.

The District Superintendent's report was called for, read and accepted.

The Statistical Report was read and accepted.

The Auditors' Report was read and accepted.

The Treasurer's Report was read and accepted.

Motion was made and carried that we accept the new Churches, Spray and Biscoe, and the Mission at Hickory.

Mrs. W. S. Gallimore was made Chairman of a Committee on Memoirs, she to select her assistants.

Bro. Barger thanked the Lord for His presence in the morning service and invoked His presence in the afternoon business.

On account of rain, a very enjoyable lunch was served in the Sunday School rooms.

Tuesday Afternoon

The Conference reassembled with song and refreshing from the presence of the Lord, as Rev. W. L. Cockman, of Randleman, prayed. Psalm 136 was read as a responsive reading by the Chairman and Conference.

Letters of recommendation were read from prominent members of the Friends' Church and Rev. Ben H. Millikan was received into the Conference. By motion one of these letters was ordered spread on the minutes.

The roll was completed and the minutes of the morning were read and approved.

The following visitors were introduced: Rev. Miss Trotsky, who is holding a meeting in the Durham Church; Rev. G. A. Castevens, formerly one of our members, but now of the Virginia District, and Rev. and Mrs. Albert J. Smith, of Indiana, who are casting their lot with us.

The Committee on Resolutions brought in Nos. 1, 2, 3, and 4. No. 1 was divided and the first paragraph amended and carried. No. 2 was ruled out of order, but this ruling was overruled and the question was brought before the Conference and discussed. It was then tabled. Nos. 3 and 4 carried.

The Committee on Ways and Means presented Nos. 1, 2, and 3. No. 1 was adopted. No. 2 was amended to still use the call card plan. Adopted. No. 3 was adopted.

Motion was made and carried that since Rev. M. A. Baldwin, a senior member of this body, has been seriously sick for some time and has not

recovered sufficiently to attend this Conference, be it resolved that the Conference send him greetings.

Recessed by expiration of time.

Tuesday Evening

The song service included, "I Must Tell Jesus", and "Whosoever Will". Prayer was offered by Rev. A. J. Smith, pastor of the Pilgrim Mission in Hickory. Rev. L. W. Sturk sang very impressively a stanza of "After", and the song, "I Won't Have to Cross Jordan Alone", while waves of ecstasy swept the Conference. Mrs. Jason Felter, visitor from Pennsylvania, sang, "Then Jesus Came". Mrs. Laura Burrus Adams was introduced by District Superintendent Stikeleather, stating that she was "exquisitely happy, having just recently been married." She sang, "Nothing Between My Soul and the Saviour".

Rev. Sturk, presiding official, read from the book of Esther, "Who knoweth whether thou art come to the kingdom for such a time as this," and spoke briefly on the Risks and Rewards of religion: 1.—Times like these: (a) Time and fear and toning down. (b) Spirit of lukewarmness. Lethargy is invading the Holiness movement. (c) Time of moral deflection, and political darkness. 2.—Our responsibility in a time like this. (a) We should be abundant in the fields of harvest. (b) We should be unworldly in our spirit and attitude. (c) We should be clean in our Christian experience. (d) Demands an ardent devotion to Christ—His doctrines, His standards. (e) Loyalty to the person of Christ. The speaker concluded with a magnificent description of Christ's irresistible sweep to final and complete world mastery. The Conference broke into song, "We're Marching to Zion".

Motion carried that we give to the local Church at Asheboro and their many friends a rising vote of thanks and a hearty Amen.

Motion that we recess until morning carried. Prayer by Bro. Deal.

Wednesday Morning

Rev. C. C. McMasters, of the Winston-Salem Church, led the singing, which was followed by prayer by Rev. William S. Deal, who begged the Spirit to lead in the business of the day. Bro. Sturk read the 84th Psalm, commenting on the agreeableness of God's house. He explained that "amiable" means agreeable. "The saints love God's house. If I don't get there, I get a headache. Why even a sparrow or swallow knows that God's house is a good place to nest. When the other fellow has dried up, the man who loves God's house will still be praising His name. The valley of Baca was renowned for its dryness, but the saint will find a well there. The man who loves God's house has his strength renewed day by day. When you come to God's house, you appear before the Lord. David, who was a mighty king, thought it a blessing to be a janitor in the house of God."

The roll call was dispensed with.

Rev. B. H. Loudermilk, of the Christian Church, was introduced.

The joint committees: Education and Examination, made report which was accepted.

At a meeting of the District Council on Tuesday evening it was decided to have the election of officers on Wednesday morning. Tellers were appointed as follows: Deal, McMasters, York, Lange, Catlett.

Wednesday Afternoon

The Conference reassembled with singing and prayer, and eight young men were ordained: Paul K. Ausley, R. L. Bolling, Marvin Cockman, Joseph L. Crouse, Paul R. Holt, C. H. Pendergraft, Terry P. Ragland, Roy J. Rummage. Rev. L. W. Sturk gave the charge. (Excerpts printed elsewhere in the minutes).

Three children were dedicated by Bro. Stikeleather.

The Committee on Resolutions brought in Nos. 5, 6, and 7.

No. 5 was carried by standing and singing "Blest Be the Tie That Binds". At the suggestion of the Chairman a table was placed in the front of the Church and an offering for Bro. Stikeleather amounting to \$155.00 was placed thereon. A large part of the Conference shook him by the hand and several of the strong men wept on his shoulder.

No. 6 was passed, but No. 7 was tabled, as the Conference thought it had accomplished its purpose by the discussion.

Mrs. Mary Loew Gavlord, one of our African missionaries, and Rev. Boyd Kistler, of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, were introduced.

Motion carried that we empower the District Council to employ whatever help they may deem necessary in our evangelistic campaign.

The Conference decided that where and when the Conference shall be held next year is to be determined by the District Council, provided arrangements cannot be made for a camp meeting. If there is a camp, the Conference will follow the camp meeting.

Ballot was taken for the election of the Camp Meeting Board which resulted in the following: Ministers: H. B. Barger, W. A. Way, T. C. Vaughn, R. I. McCluskey, J. A. Grout, T. R. York, O. L. Ruth. Lay members: Lloyd B. Gallimore, Greensboro; Joe Hoover, High Point; Dock Church, Edgeville; and R. H. Moody, Burlington.

Motion passed that we give Bro. Sturk a rising vote of thanks for the very fair and impartial manner in which he has conducted the business of the Conference and the sweet spirit he has manifested throughout.

The District Council was empowered to look after any unfinished business which may have been overlooked by the Conference.

Thus another Conference closes. We all appreciate these times of fellowship and conferring together. As we enter another untried year, our trust is in One who never slumbers nor sleeps. As we buckle the armor a little tighter, we are glad to know that "our times are in His hands."

Some of our Sunday School and Church services have fallen off during the year owing to the shifting of many people to defense plants, but others have made splendid gains for which we give God all the glory. Two splendid new Churches have been organized: One at Spray, N. C., with eighteen charter members, which is the result of a pioneer meeting conducted by Rev. F. R. Cooper as evangelist and Misses Ruby Gray and Pauline Burton as musicians and children's workers. The other one at Biscoe, N. C., with Rev. M. T. Cockman as evangelist. This one was organized with fourteen charter members. The Church at Biscoe has a new Church building well on the way and out of debt as far as they have gone. A splendid new Sunday School and Mission work has been opened up near Hickory, N. C., by Rev. and Mrs. A. J. Smith from the Indiana District, assisted by Rev. Miss Viola Dillon. The outlook here is very promising for a good Pilgrim Holiness Church. Many improvements have been made over the District some of which have been paid for in full. Other improvements are being planned and a nice new brick veneer Church is in process of construction at Gold Hill, N. C. A fine new Church building site with a good parsonage on it has been purchased and practically paid for by our Church at Albemarle, N. C. Our Church at Troy has paid out of debt entirely almost two years ahead of schedule. Kannapolis is far ahead of schedule on their payments too on the improvements made last year. A splendid pioneer meeting is now in progress at Welcome, N. C., conducted by Rev. and Mrs. D. R. Saunders of Erlanger and the Kellar Sisters of Pennsylvania. Also one at Morganton, N. C., with Rev. Miss Bertha Lapish as evangelist and Misses Mary Bost and Ila Beck as children's workers and musicians. The Church at Fayetteville is raising funds for a new Church building there. Siler City deserves special mention just here. Since the last Conference through the special efforts of their new pastor, Rev. G. E. Laws and the Church and its many friends, they have built five beautiful Sunday School rooms at a cost of approximately \$2,000.00, all of which is paid in full.

All of our Churches have had from one to two revivals during the year, some of which have been outstanding. Several have just closed and some are in progress at this time, while several others are beginning in the near future. Pray that God may give unusual outpourings of His Spirit in all of these meetings.

Since our last Conference we have made some progress in developing our Camp Meeting and Bible School property. The new Federal highway cut off eighteen acres of our property from the main tract. This was developed and sold at auction last Thanksgiving afternoon which brought us \$5,335.00 after all expenses were paid. We had expected to be able to have our District Camp in a nice new tabernacle this year and our Bible School opening this fall, but, owing to war conditions and the freezing of many necessary materials by the Government, we have been unable to do so. I am sure your District Council regrets this as much or more than any member of the District.

During the year your District Superintendent has traveled by his own auto 9,486 miles for the District and for the General Church and himself 8,599 miles; by train approximately 2,500 miles. The Lord has enabled me to put into His work \$333.24. I have preached 150 times, prayed in 155

homes, conducted 123 business meetings, attended two General Board meetings, two Executive Council meetings, six District Council meetings, the National Convention in St. Louis, Mo., for United Action of Evangelicals, dedicated five children, conducted two funerals and held one revival where 23 were saved and 10 sanctified. This has been a good year for my soul and I am supremely happy in the service of our King.

Report of Committee on Resolutions

1. WHEREAS: The Home Missionary Committee needs more centralized authority and better financial backing to properly function, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED: That a District Home Missionary evangelist be appointed by the District Council, as Chairman of said Committee, who shall give at least six months of the year to Home Missionary meetings in new places and weaker Churches. He shall be amenable to the District Superintendent and District Council, by whom his work shall be supervised. Carried.

2. Since there is a trend to wordliness in this fast age, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED: That no member of any Church in the North Carolina District be allowed to wear rings, this to include the wedding ring. Tabled.

3. That this Conference elect a Camp Meeting Board of at least twelve members, by secret ballot, two-thirds to be ministers and one-third lay members, said Board to have authority to secure workers, raise money and promote the interests of the Camp meeting. The District Superintendent shall be Chairman of said Board. Carried.

4. Since there is some reflection on the District, inconvenience, and much dissatisfaction because of the District Superintendent's living out of the District, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED: That the District Superintendent be located in the District. Carried.

5. WHEREAS: Our beloved District Superintendent, Bro. Stikeleather, has indicated that his services to us are drawing to a close, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED: That this Conference give him a rising vote of thanks, thereby expressing our deepest gratitude to him for the eleven years of honest toil, faithful spiritual work, and efficient services rendered to this District. We wish to further express our appreciation for the beautiful Christlike spirit he has manifested among us and the straightforward and honorable manner of his conduct in religion and business matters. Carried

6. RESOLVED: That we require our District Superintendent to make two regular rounds a year to the Churches of the District and that he give as much time as possible to the work of Church extension. Carried.

Report of the Ways and Means Committee

1. We recommend that the Conference empower the District Council to purchase at their discretion a District parsonage in a central location; that the purchase price be raised by a special offering at each Church, the offering to equal the amount of \$1.00 per member, if possible. Adopted.

2. Since there has been some complaint concerning our Church extension system of collecting \$1.00 per call by card, we recommend that the birthday offerings be used for the purpose of Church extension, and that each pastor explain, encourage and push the offering.

Amended to still include the call card. Adopted.

3. Whereas, the renter of the Bible School building in Greensboro has moved out, thereby causing a shortage of \$900.00 per year in our treasury, we recommend a 12 per cent. District budget to be divided as follows:

9 per cent. District Budget.

1 per cent. Loan Fund.

2 per cent. Bible School, District Camp, and Conference Headquarters.

Ordination Services

A very fine class of eight young men were ordained: Paul K. Ausley, R. L. Bolling, Marvin Cockman, Joseph L. Crouse, Paul R. Holt, C. H. Pendergraft, Terry P. Ragland, and J. Roy Rummage. Rev. L. W. Sturk gave the charge, a seven-fold admonition of what a preacher should be:

1.—Be sure of your standing with God. There will be trials, temptations and hardships and unless you are well grounded in the Truth and well established in your own experience, you may turn back.

2.—The Pilgrim preacher should be a preacher of the Word. You are not to preach too much on your own personal convictions, those which have reference to non-essential things, and not too much on your own experience; however, no man should attempt to preach who does not have one.

3.—Don't take your congregation as your text, like the man who said, "I don't have to study. All I have to do is to look my crowd over and I have plenty of material for my sermon. Over there I see a sister with a feather in her hat, and over there is an old man that I know has been a hypocrite for years." I admonish you to get your messages from headquarters and God will do more in five minutes to handle that hypocrite than you could do in twenty sermons.

4.—Keep out of debt. Some folk will expect you to live on \$5.00 a week. They must think we are Israelites back in the wilderness where their clothes never grew threadbare and their shoes never wore out.

5.—Keep clean, physically and morally. We are going to expect you

young men to go straight. You can ruin your ministry by your filthy habits and attire.

6.—Keep the anointing of the Spirit upon your heart. Jesus sent the apostles out to the ends of the earth, but He told them to first tarry at Jerusalem until they were endued with power from on high, and they not only received purity of heart, but anointing for Divine service. Never enter the pulpit without asking for the anointing of the Spirit.

7.—Have a passion for souls. That is a scarce thing today. The average Church member knows nothing about it. God has called every one of you to win souls for the kingdom. Unless you have a burning desire for the souls of men that has become a passion in your heart that drives you to your knees and causes you to weep over dying men, my advice to you today would be to withdraw from ordination, because you will never succeed without a passion for souls.

Then the messenger of the Gospel should keep up his courage by remembering that the rewarding day is coming at the end of the journey. This is a job for men and women of character and courage. There are many burdens and heartaches along the way; many hard things to bear, many difficulties to meet, problems that will break your heart, situations that will drive you to your knees; but, thank God, the rewarding day is coming at the end of the journey.
