



District Superintendent's Report

To the Thirty-Third Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, which convened on the District Camp Grounds at Kernersville, N. C., I herewith submit the report of my year's work.

We praise the Lord for the gracious way in which He has blessed His work in this part of the vineyard this year. Truly His blessings have been upon His people as we have labored together for the advancement of His cause.

SPIRITUAL PROGRESS.—Most of our churches have had two and some three revivals during the year, which have generally been successful in reaching many souls in saving and sanctifying grace. Quite a number of new members have been added to our churches and many of our Sunday Schools have made gains. Several successful Daily Vacation Bible Schools have been held this summer, and we wish to encourage this splendid phase of Christian work among our people.

did phase of Christian work among our people. We have suffered some losses in the removal of members from our rolls. But our pastors have been faithful to them, many having been carried over for long periods before final removal. TEMPORAL PROGRESS.—In this direction, great strides have been

TEMPORAL PROGRESS.—In this direction, great strides have been made. Most of our larger churches are clear of indebtedness, and numbers of the smaller and younger churches, which have borrowed from our Loan Fund, are paying off their indebtedness in a most gratifying manner. Pastors' salaries over the District generally have been raised, and in many places our churches have substantial amounts of money in their treasuries. Our District and General budgets have been well cared for and Home and Foreign Missions have received splendid attention among our people.

Our District and General budgets have been well cared for and Home and Foreign Missions have received splendid attention among our people. **OUR YOUNG PEOPLE**.—Under the capable direction of Rev. U. N. Freeman, Young People's Executive Secretary of the District, our work among the young people has gone forward. We have enjoyed three very gracious rallies this year wrich have been unusually well attended, considering gas shortage. With a blessed spiritual atmosphere prevailing among them, and the fact that they are catching the vision of their possibilities in God, it appears that our best days in this work are yet ahead of us. CAMP MEETING.—Our people have responded well to the Camp Meeting interest. Much valuable material has been donated, and considerable bought, all of which is paid for, thanks be to our God. This, our first District Camp for years, has been a blessed one. Thanks to the Camp Meeting Board for their untiring labors in making this year's Camp possible, and to all donors and friends who helped us.

BIBLE SCHOOL.—Due to our being unable to secure a heating system for the Bible School building, and that the brethren thought it inadvisable to open the school without this necessary equipment, it has been postponed for the time being. It is hoped that in the coming year we may be able to purchase a heating system. The Bible School property is paid for and we have some funds on hand.

PASTORAL CHANGES.—There have been more pastoral changes this year than have occurred for some ten years or more. This has added extra work and problems, often sending us before God in earnest pleading for wisdom and direction by the Holy Ghost. We have met several of the boards more than once before getting settled on a pastor; but they are not to be criticised, for the choosing of a pastor is a serious matter for a church board. Several of these churches have not had a change of pastors for a number of years. Practically all the changes are complete, and it is felt that both ministers and churches have received a reaonably equitable adjustment, and that they may look forward to gracious years of service and progress in the things of God. A number of pastors have been recalled for two year terms on strong ballots in every case.

We praise God for the wonderful spirit of Christian love, kindness and tolerance shown by our people during the pastoral readjustment period this year. With the unrest and high nerve tension of today, we could have had considerable trouble, but we praise God that He brought us through so graciously.

THE NEW SET-UP.—How has the new arrangement of two visits to regular churches during the year and more time to Home Missions worked? From the Home Missionary viewpoint, it has been quite favorable; however, there has arisen some complaint on the part of pastors and people, who feel that they have not had adequate service from the Superintendent under this system. It has its deficiencies, as do all systems, but on the whole it is not a bad policy, and with a little readjustment could be made quite practical. However, I have visited many of the churches more than twice this year. I here present the report of my labors: During the year I have preached 235 times; assisted in 40 other serv-

During the year I have preached 235 times; assisted in 40 other services. Have prayed in 175 homes; prayed with ten people for healing; dealt with 425 people personally about salvation, dedicated 38 children; performed one marriage ceremony, baptized one person, assisted in one funeral. I have conducted five two-week revivals, and six week-end conventions, resulting in about 240 seekers for salvation and holiness; have appeared on eleven radio programs, conducted 13 District Council meetings and three Camp Meeting Board meetings; assisted in three Young People's rallies. I have visited the churches and preaching points 125 times, conducting 110 business meetings, and have organized two new churches. I have secured 50 subscriptions for the Advocate.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT OF THE HOME MISSIONARY DEPARTMENT

To the Thirty-Third Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, I hereby submit the report of Home Missionary activities and churches in the District:

Due to the fact that the last Conference voted so much of the Superintendent's time to Home Missions, it is felt that a separate report of this work should be made, including the status of new churches organized just prior to this year which are still in the Home Missionary stage.

Despite such hindrances as gas shortage, curtailment of lumber sales for civilian purposes, etc., God has blessed our workers and given success in this field. This is a point by point report:

HICKORY.—This church was organized last fall as a result of the untiring efforts of Rev. and Mrs. A. J. Smith, the pastors. Rev. Miss Bertha Lapish and Misses Mary Bost and Mary Keller were the workers in the revival during which it was organized. God is blessing and they are going forward with the work.

BETHEL CHURCH (near Kannapolis).—The church here was organized last spring at the close of a revival in which Mrs. Laura B. Adams assisted the writer. This work came into being through the faithful labors of Rev. William E. Scercy who began a Sunday School there last September in a rented building. Lots for the church site were purchased, and during this spring and summer a very nice church has been erected, and the work moves on with bright future prospects.

WELCOME.—Here Brother D. R. Saunders has faithfully labored during the year, conserving the results of the last fall tent meeting. Regular services have been conducted in homes and a lot has been purchased on which to build a church. This work is not yet organized.

THURMOND.—Though organized for some time, this work deserves special mention. Two revivals have added several new members to the church, and the faithful pastor, Brother Talbirt, has done splendidly with the new paint job and other improvements.

SPRAY.—Organized last year, this work has made excellent progress under the ministry of Brother Cooper. A \$750.00 lot has been purchased and a new church edifice is in process of construction now.

BISCOE.—Slowed down by lack of a place to worship, this church is going forward again since finishing the new church sufficiently to worship in this spring. Brother Marvin T. Cockman is the hard working pastor here.

UNION CROSS.—The sacrificing pastor, Brother Wade Linebarrier, moved his family into the community of the church some time ago. Though it ill-convenienced him from his work, it has paid large dividends in the church work. Sunday school increased remarkably, and a number of new members have joined. Their prospects brighten at Union Cross. WESTERN NORTH CAROLINA.—Our churches in this area are doing nicely under the direction of Brother Norman Nation. The Wilmot people have re-roofed their church at a cost of some \$200.00, together with other repairs. At Whittier, a new church is in the process of construction. The Bryson City church is re-roofing their parsonage soon. Successful revivals were held there by Brother William Armstrong and the Singletary boys this summer.

CHARLOTTE.—Here we have a building donated to us for its upkeep. After considerable repairs and painting, most of the money being raised in the vicinity, we now have a very nice place of worship. Miss Jessie Roddy has been holding forth in this place for some months. She was assisted this summer by Miss Bernice Smith of Lima, Ohio. Attendance has not been large, but a foundation is being laid. We plan a campaign this fall and anticipate gracious results.

MORGANTON.—For months we were burdened for this place. Finally, in July Brother Fulp consented to go with his tent for the campaign. He was assisted by Misses Ruby Gray and Decie Russell, of Randleman. Their work was not in vain. God blessed in the meeting, saving souls. A building has been rented and we are planning to open immediately following Conference, placing workers there.

DRAPER.—Here Brother F. R. Cooper, pastor at Spray, has faithfully labored as pastor during the year. This is a lovely little brick church with several Sunday School rooms. It was formerly a Methodist Protestant church before the merger, but is now looking our way. We hope in the near future it will unite with us as a body.

LIBERTY.—Following a revival here held by Rev. Henry Rees and Bob Loman, a Sunday School was begun which has continued with good attendance and interest, using our literature. After Brother Rees gave up the work it was taken over by Brother Harold Loman who now has it in charge. We hope to see a Pilgrim church here in the near future.

GLENOLA.—In a school house near here Brother and Sister Fulp have a fine Sunday School and preaching point. They have worked faithfully here and it is developing towards a new church.

BASON SCHOOL HOUSE (near Reidsville).—Here Rev. John Madison is holding forth for the Lord. There are some fine people here, and it appears that we may some day have a good Pilgrim work in that section.

BESSEMER PILGRIM CHAPEL.—This church is located just at the edge of the community known as Bessemer Heights, near Greensboro. Some time ago Rev. Theo. A. Wyrick of the Brown's Chapel church felt led to go into this community to establish a work. Following this leading, he entered, and the newly erected church building in the community is witness to his labors. A Sunday School has been established and the revival recently held yielded gracious results.

These are a few glimpses from the Home Missionary front. I thank God for the faithful, sacrificing workers whose devoted labors have made possible this report. It is workmen like this that carve out new territories for God and accept the challenges of the untried new fields to win lost humanity. I am likewise thankful for the aid of the District in this gracious work.

Great territories lay ahead of us; new fields of expansion are only awaiting our coming. As we face the coming year, some plans are already made and others in the making for forward moves in this field, as well as other departments of the District work. Your prayers and co-operation, together with God's grace, which have made possible the accomplishments of the past, guarantee a bright future for His cause.

14

Report of the Committee on Pesolutions

No. 1. Be it resolved, that the District Council elect a Sunday School Board of four including the Sunday School Director. The duties of the District Sunday School Board, in harmony with the Manual of the Filgrim Holiness Church, shall be as follows:

1. The District Sunday School Board shall arrange for an Annual Sunday School Convention to be held some time during the year.

2. To promote and encourage the Sunday School work throughout the District.

3. To present an annual report to the District Conference which shall include the following:

a. A statement of the work accomplished during the year.

b. A statement of the general condition of the Sunday School work on the District.

c. To recommend to the District Conference through the Ways and Means Committee the amount considered necessary to finance the District Sunday School work.

4. The District Sunday School Board shall be amenable to the District Council.

5. The District Council shall have the right to remove, or cause to be removed, any member of the District Sunday School Board who, in the judgment of such Council, is not in harmony with the teaching of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

6. If for any reason there is a vacancy on the District Sunday School Board, the District Council, by a majority vote, may fiil the vacancy.

In addition to the above resolution, may I suggest the following:

7. The District Sunday School Board shall work in conjunction with the General Sunday School Committee in promoting the Annual Rally Day, etc., etc.

8. To have published each month a District Sunday School sheet showing the attendance of each Sunday School on the District for the month, the preceding month, and the attendance for the same month a year ago, as well as the average attendance for the year—this sheet to be sent to each pastor and Sunday School superintendent on the District.

Motion carried that the District Council be empowered to appoint a Sunday School Committee.

No. 2. Since some people are interested in erecting cottages on the Camp Ground property:

Therefore, be it resolved, that the Camp Meeting Board be granted the power to choose the location and draw up regulations governing same with the approval of the District Council.

No. 3. Since there is no stated time when the term of the Camp Meeting Board expires: therefore, be it resolved that a Camp Meeting Secretary and Treasurer be elected by this Conference and that his term shall expire at the next Annual Conference.

Be it further resolved, that eight additional members be elected for a one-year term, or until their successors are elected, and that this Board shall have power to raise and disburse finances in the interest of the Camp Meeting.

Report of the Ways and Means Committee

No. 1. Whereas the Manual provides that the pastor may hold two revivals a year, be it resolved, that we grant the same privilege to our District Superintendent and that he retain the offerings received from same and that all other offerings from church extension coming in the line of his duty be turned over to the District Treasurer.

No. 2. Whereas as yet we have no District parsonage, and whereas the general cost of living has so increased, be it resolved that we increase our District Superintendent's salary to \$2,500, \$2,200 allocated as salary and \$300 for house rent.

No. 3. Whereas our District Superintendent's salary has been increased, we recommend that our District Budget read 13 per cent, broken down as follows: 10 per cent District Budget, 1 per cent Loan Fund, 2 per cent Bible School, District Headquarters, Camp, etc.

Important Motions Carried

That we authorize the Council to formulate rules and regulations for the Camp Meeting and Conference.

That the Conference authorize the Camp Meeting Board to draw plans and specifications for a dormitory for the Camp Meeting and submit same to the District Council for their approval, so that the work can go ahead and the building be ready before another year.

That we take pledges from the floor and then each one go back to his church and raise as much more as possible for this building. Pledges to be paid on or before November 1, 1943.

That the District Superintendent be the Chairman of the Camp Meeting Board.

That we have a ten-day Camp next year, the date left to the Camp Meeting Board.

Standing Rules

1. We recommend that we pay at the rate of five cents per member per year for the Delegate Expense Fund to the General Assembly. (1938.)

2. As there is some expense in the performance of the duties of the District officials, we recommend that they be allowed three cents per mile when traveling in the interest of the District. (1941.)

3. Be it Resolved: That this Conference organize a Camp Meeting Association by electing a Secretary-Treasurer and secure members who shall pay \$2.00 each for the first year, and \$1.00 per year thereafter. The duty of the Secretary-Treasurer shall be to keep a correct record of the membership, finances, etc., and disburse same as directed by the District Council. He shall make a report at each District Assembly. He shall also write to each member of the Association before the Camp opens, advising them of the date of the Camp, the evangelists and singers, and ask them for their dues. (1941.)

4. Since sometimes there is agitation in the local church at the time of calling a pastor and in some instances the progress of the church is retarded, be it, therefore resolved, that no church meeting for the purpose of calling a pastor be held earlier than 90 days prior to our Annual Assembly. (1940.)

5. Be it resolved: That our Ministerial Convention shall convene on Tuesday after the first Sunday in April each year until said date shall be changed by the District Assembly. (1940).

6. We recommend that the birthday offerings be used for the purpose of Church Extension, and that each pastor explain, encourage and push the offering; however, we still retain the call card. (1942.)

7. A Home Missionary Association shall be formed, made up of members to be secured by the District Superintendent as he makes his rounds. Each member is to pay \$1.00 when called upon, and not more than two calls be made per year. (1940.)

8. Be it resolved: That a District Home Missionary evangelist be appointed by the District Council, as Chairman of this Association, who shall give at least six months of the year to Home Missionary meetings in new places and weaker churches. He shall be amenable to the District Superintendent and District Council, by whom his work shall be supervised. (1942.)

Journal of Proceedings

On Monday, August 30, 1943, at 10:00 A. M., the Pilgrims of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church gathered from the mountains to the sea for their annual reunion and Conference at the new Bible School and Camp Ground at what was formerly Dunlap Springs, where there is an abundant flow of fine mineral water. This is our Thirty-Third Annual Conference.

Our first Camp Meeting on the grounds with Rev. William H. Neff, District Superintendent of the California District, as evangelist; Rev. R. D. Brown, converted policeman, who represented Home Missions; Rev. I. C. Hiles, representing Foreign Missions, and Rev. and Mrs. Paul Trissel, song evangelists, has just closed. It was a great Camp for the Lord met His people in mighty power.

Sister Deborah Hoover, of Millville, N. J., who has been doing evangelistic work in the District, led us to the throne.

We were glad to have present as our chairman our capable and efficient General Superintendent, Rev. W. L. Surbrook, who gave us some very good advice, using as his text, II Cor. 4:5----"Your Religion, Your Ruts, Your Revivals," especially the Ruts. We trust his counsel will not be soon forgotten.

We were glad to see our senior minister present, Rev. M. H. Baldwin. During his long years of ministry he pastored many of our churches and also served as District Superintendent. We trust the Lord will spare him to attend many more Conferences.

The roll call revealed that practically all the ministers of the District and their church delegates were in their places for the first session.

The Conference this year is being held under the Camp Meeting tent, as we have been unable to get material for building a tabernacle. The Conference bar was fixed to include the three middle tiers of seats.

The hours for meeting and adjournment were set: 10:00 to 12:30; 2:00 to 4:00; 6:00 to 10:00; meals to be served in the dining room of the Bible School building, 9:00 and 4:00.

Mrs. L. W. Mauldin and Mrs. Reece Farlow were added to the Committee on Memoirs because of the absence of members of the Committee. The business of the Conference began.

The District Superintendent's report was called for, read and accepted. Motion carried that we ask the District Treasurer to reimburse Bro. Deal the amount of money he turned over to the District for offerings received in revivals held in the District during the year.

The Statistical report was read and accepted.

Motion was made and carried that we accept the new churches at Hickory and Bethel.

The Auditors' report was read and accepted.

The Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The following visitors were brought forward and introduced to the Conference:

Rev. and Rev. Mrs. J. C. Wallace, from the Tennessee District, who are taking the church at Elkin; Rev. Mrs. Mae Baumgarner, from our mountain district; Rev. Mrs. Deborah Hoover, from Millville, N. J., who has been doing evangelistic work in the District; Rev. Miss B. Arnie and Rev. Miss E. Royal, from the New Jersey Wesleyan Methodist Church, who are joining our church at Kannapolis; Bro. Eb. Fowler, who has been associated with another denomination, but is now returning to us; Rev. Harold Loman, a very successful radio preacher, who is coming to us from the Christian Church.

Recessed.

The Conference reconvened 2:00 p.m. After the song service prayer was offered by Rev. R. I. McCluskey, of the First Greensboro Church, who prayed especially for Mrs. Paul W. Thomas, wife of our General Secretary of Foreign Missions, who is critically ill.

Reports were called for and the Resolutions Committee brought forward:

No. 1. Motion carried that the District Council be empowered to appoint a Sunday School Committee.

Nos. 2 and 3. Carried.

Motion carried that Bro. Scercy, local preacher who is pastoring a church, be given a seat in the Conference bar.

The Ways and Means Committee made report:

No. 1. Carried.

No. 2. Substitute motion carried.

No. 3. Carried.

The following visitors were brought forward:

Rev. and Mrs. Paul Trissel, song leaders at the High Point Church;

Rev. William H. Neff, District Superintendent of the California District, and his wife who is working in the office of the Oriental Missionary Society.

Rev. Harold Loman, Rev. and Rev. Mrs. Lawrence, Rev. Miss Arnie and Rev. Miss Royal, were given honorary seats in the Conference bar.

Mention was made of the serious illness of one of our good pastors, Rev. L. L. Lange, and an offering was taken for him amounting to approximately \$80.00.

Motion carried that we meet this evening at 7:00 p. m. and the business of the hour will be the election of officers, following the report of the Committees on Education and Examination, as approved by the District Council.

Rev. Surbrook gave an earnest exhortation to the people to put their

money to work for God, stating that many would not have lost so much in the depression if this had been done.

Recessed for dinner. Prayer by Bro. Ruth.

After song and prayer Rev. Surbrook again gave an exhortation much needed and timely.

The roll call was dispensed with for the remainder of the Conference.

The minutes of the preceding meeting were read, corrected, and approved.

The report of the District Council in accepting ministers from other denominations was read and accepted by the Conference, viz:

The election of officers was then the order of the day.

Tellers appointed: Vaughn, McMasters, Farlow, Freeman, Loman, Page.

This was a very precious service, there being an election on the first ballot each time, which seemed to show that the Lord was leading. Several good speeches were made, especially by the Assistant District Superintendent who told how he was converted, of how he never expected to be one of the Holiness people, but he is "glad he is one of them today," while ecstacy rolled over the audience. Adjournment was made by prayer.

TUESDAY MORNING

A good spirit prevailed, with testimonies and shouts of glory. Rev. R. I. McCluskey was asked to read the Scripture lesson and speak as led of the Lord. He read the story of the man who fell among thieves, using the church man who passed by "on the other side" as his lesson, and showed him up in his true light—"If we will stop passing by on the other side, we will win many souls during the coming year." The minutes of the evening session were read and approved.

Rev. and Rev. Mrs. Talmadge Bristow, of the Glenwood, Greensborg, Quaker Church, were introduced, also L. F. Lance, from the Wesleyan Mtehodist Church.

The names of the churches were called and the pastors and delegates responded with the number of subscriptions to the Advocate they will endeavor to obtain. Nine hundred were promised.

Motion carried that we authorize the Council to formulate rules and regulations for the Camp Meeting and Conference.

Appreciation was expressed of the services of many who have helped in the kitchen, especially Sister Lovett, Bertha Lapish, Bro. Russell and others who have served so faithfully during the Camp and Conference. The Secretary was instructed to write a letter of appreciation to the Sidney Cone Print Works for a large amount of cloth donated, and the Dixon Ice Company for ice. Appreciation was also expressed for the splendid work of our General Superintendent and also our District Superintendent in the Conference.

Whereas, Rev. W. A. Way has been a member of this District for over thirty years, serving as District Superintendent for four years and as Assistant District Superintendent much of the time and also a member of the District Council all the time he was in the District, and has served as pastor of the Second Greensboro Church (Edgeville) for sixteen years, and is now leaving the District; therefore, be it resolved that this Conference give him a vote of thanks for his faithful service rendered the church, and, as he is now on a bed of affliction, be it further resolved that this act be conveyed to him, and also spread on the minutes. Unanimously carried.

Motion carried to discuss a dormitory for the use of the Camp and Conference. Motion then carried that the Conference authorize the Camp Meeting Board to draw plans and specifications for a dormitory for the camp meeting and submit same to the District Council for their approval so that the work can go ahead and the building be ready before another year.

Motion carried that we take pledges from the floor and then let each one go back to his church and raise as much more as possible for this building. (Cash and pledges received amounted to approximately \$800.) Motion carried that these pledges be paid on or before the first of November, 1943.

The Ministerial Convention was left to the wisdom of the District Council.

Motion carried that our District Superintendent be the Chairman of the Camp Meeting Board.

Motion carried that we have a ten-day camp next year. The date of the camp was left to the Camp Meeting Board.

Five babies were brought forward and dedicated to the Lord.

A very sacred ordination service was conducted with our General Superintendent giving the charge.

General Superintendent Surbrook again exhorted us to bear with each other as never before because of the frayed nerves at this time. He also exhorted us to stand by our District Superintendent and each other.

The Conference adjourned with prayer by General Superintendent Surbrook.
