DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Thirty-Fifth Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, convened on the District Camp Grounds at Kernersville, N. C., August 27, 1945. Greetings in the Name of the all-conquering Son of God!

It is proper that we should here offer thanks to God who has led us through these years of treacherous warfare and sorrow to triumphant victory over Christianity's foes; also, for the fact that despite many handicaps our work has made steady progress and kept generally free from the prevailing spirit of worldliness. Pastors, evangelists and laymen have been faithful to their duties, while workmen's tools have sounded in the erection of new churches.

Spiritual Progress has been in evidence throughout the work this year. Gracious revivals have blessed our churches and many have been received into membership.

Material Gains have also been made in the District as a whole. Outstanding in this connection has been the dedication of ten churches and one parsonage this year: Albemarle, Rev. U. N. Freeman, pastor; Gold Hill, Rev. Roy J. Rummage, pastor; Elkin, Rev. J. C. Wallace, pastor; Denton and Sawyersville, Rev. R. W. Farlow, pastor: Robbins (church and parsonage), Rev. Coy S. Saunders, pastor: Wilmot and Whittier (Western North Carolina), Rev. and Mrs. Norman Nations, pastors; Union Cross, Rev. V. C. Meachum, pastor: Biscoe, Rev. J. Q. Ball, pastor. To these pastors, their wives and the laymen we as a District owe a debt of gratitude for their excellent work. Also, to Brothers T. C. Vaughn and M. T. Cockman, who worked so untiringly upon the construction of Denton, Sawyersville and Biscoe, respectively, appreciation should be expressed, as they were the pastors under whose leadership these churches were built. This is the largest number of churches ever to be dedicated in the District in one conference vear.

Property Improvements have been made in many places over the District. Liberty church (Harmony Circuit) is building a parsonage. Randleman and Franklinton are also raising funds for the same purpose. Winston-Salem has raised nearly \$5,000.00 this year toward a new church. Spray has installed new pews; Elkin is in a remodeling program costing some \$2,500; Mt. Zion (Dav.) is building new Sunday School rooms and installing heating facilities at a cost of about \$4,500. Mt. Olive has added Sunday School rooms and Mt. Olivet is raising money for the same purpose. Edgeville has made a \$3,500 improvement on their church, and Bethel church is practically completed. Union Cross and Brower Memorial have also made considerable improvements; also Thomasville and Fayetteville churches.

The Sunday School work has made wonderful progress under the splendid directorship of Rev. T. R. York, Chairman of the Sunday School Board. He has been ably assisted by Rev. Wray J. Smith, Rev. C. C. McMasters and Rev. U. N. Freeman who made up the board. You will be interested to note the progress registered in their report. We appreciate their untiring services in this capacity.

As Young People's Executive Secretary, Rev. Chas. L. Stout performed an excellent service. We regret that part of our work was curtailed due to unavoidable circumstances, but we are grateful to Brother Stout for his services.

Our Camp this year was one of the greatest in our three years' history in this new location. Evangelists Rev. M. C. Kittle, Sanford,

Michigan, Rev. Joshua Stauffer, Westfield, Indiana, and Prof. J. L. Schell, Owosso, Michigan, in charge of the singing, and soloist, were a great team. Rev. U. N. Freeman, Albemarle, N. C., rendered commendatory service as Young People's worker, and Mrs. Huldah Way Layne and Mrs. L. B. Gallimore performed graciously at the piano. These were "days of heaven upon earth" for the saints, and many were blessed with experiences in grace.

The District Grounds Property received another increase of several thousand dollars in valuation this year. Twelve rooms were added to the New Dormitory and plumbing installed in this building. A new pump for the water system was also installed. Considerable furnishings were purchased and numerous other improvements made. Thanks to all who helped to make this possible. Special mention is here made by way of appreciation to an unnamed friend who has assisted numbers of our churches in their struggles and the District as well in times of need.

The Bible School Program has had a gracious response. Rev. O. L. Ruth, Field Representative, has done an excellent work in presenting the program to our people and raising finances as recourse to his report will show. Thanks to Brother Ruth for his faithful labors in this worthy work.

Our Home Missionary Work has made very gratifying progress this year. I have called three times upon most of the churches; therefore, I have had less time this year to devote to this work. Furthermore, considerable time and money have been expended in developing already existing projects, which has meant we could start fewer new ones.

Bessemer Pilgrim Chapel, Rev. T. A. Wyrick, pastor. Progress is being made here toward organization into a Pilgrim Holiness church.

Harker's Island, Rev. J. M. Smith, pastor. This is an independent work, but is under our care. After about five years of faithful service, Brother Smith felt he could not carry on as a full time pastor much longer. Rev. R. L. Bowling has been called to pastor the work. They use our Sunday School literature and subscribe to the Advocate. Pray for the future success of this work!

Hickory, Rev. Albert J. Smith, pastor. By the Lord's help and a large donation of lumber and time by Brother Smith and others, they have been able to erect a beautiful little church here this year. This is indeed a great victory for them. The work is in the best condition in its history. Rev. Miss Viola Dillon succeeds the Smiths as pastor.

Liberty, Rev. C. P. Richey, pastor. A lot has been purchased and some money raised for a new church which we hope may be built this year. Thanks to the Greensboro Second church for the use of their tent for the summer and to Rev. Mrs. Lauda Caudle for her assistance in the recent revival.

Lenoir, Rev. Wm. P. Armstrong, pastor. This work began in 1944 by cottage prayer meetings, conducted by Rev. L. E. Taylor. In August, 1944, Rev. and Mrs. J. B. Fulp and evangelistic party held a tent meeting there, resulting in the organization of a Pilgrim Fellowship. Upon investigation, the District Council loaned money to purchase the building in which they worshiped. Rev. Wm. P. Armstrong was placed there as pastor. Under his aggressive leadership and hard work, they now have a completely remodeled building with four new Sunday School rooms and a furnace room at a cost of \$1,600.00, about \$1,400.00 of which has been paid by the church there, besides paying on their loan.

At the close of a gracious revival conducted by Rev. D. R. Saunders last spring, we were able to organize with twenty-two charter members. They have an excellent Sunday School and prospects are bright for them.

Laurinburg, Rev. Chas. H. Williams, pastor. This summer Rev. and Mrs. J. B. Fulp and Miss Mabel Miller, of Dayton, Ohio, held a six weeks' tent meeting there. A Pilgrim Fellowship was organized with about twenty members, looking toward the organization of a church. Some time later the Fulps and Miss Miller returned for a second meeting which resulted in about fifty seekers and some new members for the Fellowship. Meanwhile, Brother Williams had been placed in charge and they were making some progress. The prospects for a work there are very good. Pray for this, our newest home missionary project.

Morganton, Rev. Wm. P. Armstrong, pastor. Under his leadership we are gaining ground. This has been considered a difficult field, but we believe that God will yet give us a good work there.

Statesville, Rev. H. R. Helms, new pastor. A successful revival was held last spring with the Shelhamers as evangelists. Recently, another gracious meeting was held by Rev. and Mrs. C. A. Bost and Rev. "Tommy" Holshouser. Under the leadership of Brother Helms we hope to soon have a good little church. Two young people plan to go to Bible School from there. Thanks to Rev. Carey Bulla for his faithful labors here for the most of the conference year.

Staley. Rev. T. R. York, Rev. Chas. L. Stout and Rev. and Mrs. C. A. Bost held a successful revival campaign there this summer. Plans are under way for the promotion of this work.

Whittier, Rev. and Mrs. Norman Nations, pastors. By hard labor and sacrifice Brother Nations and those who assisted him have been able to erect here a beautiful little chapel, replacing the one washed away by the flood in 1940. Prospects are good for a better work here than we have had for years. Please pray for ALL these home missionary projects.

This has been a strenuous but enjoyable year in the Lord's work. My brethren on the Council and Camp Meeting Board, as well as the pastors and laymen in general, have been very gracious to me and cooperative in the work. I appreciate this more than words can tell.

I beg to submit the following report of my labors:

Thank God for strength of soul and body in the performance of my duties this year. During the Conference year I have read 5,545 pages of religious literature, or the equivalent of 22 volumes of 200 pages each, not including the research work necessary in writing a new book of approximately 100 pages. Pray for me that I may be a better and more useful man.

BIBLE SCHOOL REPRESENTATIVE REPORT

To the Thirty-Fifth Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Greetings:

I herein submit the following report of the Field Representative of the Pilgrim Bible College. During this year we have visited fiftyeight churches, held one revival, attended many board meetings

of the District, spent more than three weeks in the interest of the General Church. Preached 127 times, raised in cash \$3,711.16, in pledges \$16,615.12. Money raised outside the church \$2,308.00. Also, the city of Kernersville has agreed to run a six-inch water main to our Bible School property without cost to us; estimated cost \$7,200.00; same to be installed within six months from now or by late spring. This makes a total of \$27,526.28.

Salary for eleven months, \$2,200.00.

We have appreciated greatly the cooperation of the pastors and churches in this Bible School Campaign. Many contacts that have been made to those outside our churches will no doubt bring good returns in future days. We are looking forward with glad hearts to the fall of 1946 when our own Bible School at Kernersville will be offering to our young people a guarded Christian education. Not a program of three R's, "Reading, Writing and Arithmetic," but one of four R's, with emphasis on Religion. It will take much prayer and sacrifice, but "God is able to do exceeding abundantly above all we can ask or think."

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PILGRIM YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETY

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

To the Thirty-Fifth Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Greetings:

Following District Conferences last year the Council elected the District Sunday School Board consisting of Rev. T. R. York, Chairman and Director, Rev. C. C. McMasters, Rev. U. N. Freeman, and Rev. Wray J. Smith. The Sunday School work suffered a severe blow at the beginning of the Conference year due to the polio epidemic and quarantine, but despite this fact, God has helped; and spiritual, numerical and financial gains have been made. Many churches have broken all-time records this year. These include Kannapolis, Salisbury, Asheboro, Bethel, Troy and Mt. Zion (Davidson County).

For the convenience of operating the Board divided the District into four zones designated as 1, 2, 3 and 4. The ban on travel prevented us from having a District Sunday School Convention, but all zones had the benefit of two meetings. The host churches were: Burlington, Salisbury, Greensboro First, Albemarle and a joint meeting at Staley.

The special speakers who appeared on these programs were: Rev. C. P. Pridgen, Rev. W. F. Page, Mrs. Helen Rothwell, Rev. C. C. McMasters, Rev. William Pratt and Rev. P. F. Elliott, Jr.

We cooperated with the general Sunday School Committee in launching a District-wide Sunday School revival which proved successful, spiritually, numerically and financially. More than thirty-five hundred circulars were distributed in this campaign. The total pieces of mail sent out during the year was around five thousands.

One new Sunday School was organized.

1. Whereas the Manual provides that the pastor may hold two revivals a year, Be It Resolved, that we grant the same privilege to our District Superintendent and that he retain the offerings

received from same and that all other offerings from church extension coming in the line of his duty be turned over to the District Treasurer. (1943).

- 2. The Council is authorized to formulate rules and regulations for the Camp Meeting and Conference. (1934).
- 3. The District Superintendent is the Chairman of the Camp Meeting Board. (1943).
- 4. We recommend that we pay at the rate of five cents per member per year for the Delegate Fund to the General Conference. (1938).
- 5. As there is some expense in the performance of the duties of the District officials, we recommend that they be allowed three cents per mile when traveling in interest of the District. (1941).
- 6. Be It Resolved: That this Conference organize a Camp Meeting Association by electing a Secretary-Treasurer and secure members who shall pay \$2.00 each for the first year, and \$1.00 per year thereafter. The duty of the Secretary-Treasurer shall be to keep a correct record of the membership, finances, etc., and disburse same as directed by the District Council. He shall make a report at each District Assembly. He shall also write to each member of the Association before the Camp opens, advising them of the date of the Camp, the evangelists and singers, and ask them for their dues. (1941).
- 7. Be It Resolved: That our Ministerial Convention shall convene on Tuesday after the first Sunday in April each year until said date shall be changed by the District Conference. (1940).
- 8. We recommend that the birthday offerings be used for the purpose of Church Extension, and that each pastor explain, encourage and push the offerings; however, we still retain the call card. (1942).
- 9. A Home Missionary Association shall be formed, made up of members to be secured by the District Superintendent as he makes his rounds. Each member is to pay \$1.00 when called upon, and not more than two calls per year. (1940).
- 10. Motion carried that we give our District Superintendent and also ask the churches to give the pastors a two weeks' vacation with pay. (1941).
- 11. Be It Resolved: That this Conference set a date for the Camp Meeting. (The Conference set the date for the Camp to begin on Friday night before the last two Sundays in August.) (1941).

12. Be It Resolved: That this Conference elect a Camp Meeting Board by secret ballot, said board to have authority to secure workers, and raise money and promote the interest of the Camp Meeting. The District Superintendent shall be chairman of said board.

Since there is no stated time when the term of the Camp Meeting Board expires, Therefore, Be It Resolved, that a Camp Meeting Secretary and Treasurer be elected by this Conference and that his term shall expire at the next Annual Conference.

Be It Further Resolved that the eight additional members be elected as follows:

Two members for a period of four years
Two members for a period of three years
Two members for a period of two years
Two members for a period of one year
and thereafter each year we are to elect two members for four
years as the term of the two members expire.



 - (c) To recommend to the District Conference through the Ways and Means Committee the amount considered necessary to finance the District Sunday School work.
 - 4. The District Sunday School Board shall be amenable to the District Council.






BIBLE SCHOOL ADMINISTRATION BUILDING KERNERSVILLE, N. C.






HIGH POINT CHURCH




INTERIOR OF MT. ZION PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH

MT. ZION CHURCH PARSONAGE








GREENSBORO SECOND CHURCH (EDGEVILLE)





GOLD HILL CHURCH



Recessed for supper.

At 6:30 P. M. an impressive service was held in memory of our departed. This service was conducted by Mrs. J. B. Fulp, Mrs. Eula Bryson, Mrs. U. N. Freeman and Mrs. D. R. Saunders.

TUESDAY EVENING

The sixth sitting of the Conference convened at 7 o'clock with the song, "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms," led by Brother M. M. Holmes, after which we were led in prayer by Brother Wray J. Smith.

The first item of business was the report covering those for ordination, license, etc. Motion carried that the names be presented to the Conference as the Council had recommended. Several were received into the Conference and were admitted to the Conference bar. These were: Roy P. Justus, Mary Dowell, Claude T. Bullock, Mrs. J. W. Covington, D. H. Haizlip, George Burris, Kermit Farlow, R. H. Hobbs, Wm. E. Scercy, J. Q. Ball and Annie Griffin.

The next order of business was the election of officers.

The Superintendent appointed the following tellers: T. C. Vaughn, C. C. McMasters, C. H. Pendergraft, Paul E. Uhrig, L. L. Lange, Chas. E. Apple.

The following officers were elected:

Rev. Wm. S. Deal, District Superintendent.

Rev. H. B. Barger, Assistant District Superintendent.

Rev. J. A. Grout, District Secretary.

L. B. Gallimore, District Treasurer.

Conference recessed by expiration of time.

TUESDAY MORNING

The fourth sitting of the Conference opened at 9:30 A. M. with the song of heart-felt expression, "'Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus," followed by Brother Barger praying for us.

Brother Sturk again spoke to us from II Peter 3:11, stirring our hearts with the thought of "what manner of persons ought we to be?" Special emphasis was laid on the fact that our church should be spiritual, alive, wide awake and aggressive. Our ministers should not be lazy, gabby, snobbish, gluttonous or untidy, but Spirit-filled, energetic, Holy Ghost annointed, soul burdened men of God. Our church should stand by one another, and especially in the presence of unbelievers. At the conclusion of this good message, the blessed mellowing presence of the Spirit came upon us and songs and testimonies and shouts were lifted to God on high, while "God came down our souls to greet, and glory crowned the mercy seat." The entire sitting was given over to rejoicing, weeping and praising God.

Conference recessed for lunch.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON

The fifth sitting of the Conference opened at 2 o'clock with the song, "When We All Get to Heaven," led by Rev. William P. Armstrong, after which we were led in prayer by Rev. J. Harold Loman. We were then favored with a special number in song from Brother Sturk, his selection being "The Lost Sheep."

The Reception Committee presented to the Conference Rev. Lacy Marshall from Burlington.

The Committee on Memorials to General Conference presented their resolutions.

The Ways and Means Committee concluded their report.

A motion carried that the election of officers be held at the 7 o'clock sitting.

The Committee on Resolutions reported and four of their recommendations were accepted. (See resolutions.)

The Ways and Means Committee reported. Part of their recommendations were accepted and part of them were referred back to the Committee for redrafting.

The closing part of the session was given over to an interesting discussion of the "Minister's Benevolent Fund," over which Brother P. F. Elliott, Jr., presided. The Conference approved the plan as a whole.

Conference recessed for supper.

MONDAY EVENING

After supper the Conference reassembled and opened with singing "When We All Get to Heaven." Brother Wm. Roy Phillips led us in prayer, after which Brother Sturk asked for several scripture verses to be quoted.

The Ways and Means Committee continued its presentation of resolutions.

Brother Deal gave a short history of our new work at Lenoir and the church was received into the Conference.

The Resolutions Committee continued its presentation of resolutions.

A motion prevailed that the Secretary write Brother M. A. Baldwin and Sister Mattie Buchanon, expressing our appreciation for them and that we have missed them during the Conference.

A motion carried that we extend the time long enough for the Sunday School Board to bring in its report. This report was gratefully received.

We must major on soul winning. Our burden and passion must be to win souls for the Master.

5. We must be a loyal church. Loyal to one another, to Christ, to His doctrine and standards; loyal to our leadership.

At the conclusion of Brother Sturk's message, the secretary called the roll of ministers, deaconesses and lay delegates.

The Conference bar was fixed to include the first six rows in the audience and the platform.

A motion prevailed that the hours of business be from 9 A. M. to 12 M., from 2 P. M. to 5 P. M., and from 7 P. M. to 9:30 P. M.

The Reception Committee presented as visitors to the Conference the following:

Rev. Wm. Roy Phillips, pastor of Roanoke, Va., Pilgrim Church.

Rev. P. F. Elliott, Jr., Superintendent of the Pittsburgh District.

A motion carried that these men be given seats in the Conference bar.

A motion also carried that we accept Rev. C. H. Pendergraft and Miss Viola Dillon back into the Conference.

Recessed for lunch.

MONDAY AFTERNOON

The second sitting of the Annual Conference was opened with the inspiring song, "The Way of the Cross Leads Home," led by Rev. C. C. McMasters, after which we were led in prayer by Rev. T. R. York.

Rev. Sturk made a few remarks concerning the great need of fresh annointings in our lives.

The District Superintendent gave his report for the year, and it was accepted; as was also the report of the auditors, the district treasurer, the statistician, and the Bible School representative.

A motion carried that Rev. Paul F. Elliott, Jr., be given the last thirty minutes of the time to represent "A Proposed Plan for the Pilgrim Minister's Benevolent Fund."

The Reception Committee brought forward and introduced to the Conference the following:

Therefore ,Be It Resolved, that it be changed to read as follows: "The budget ratio shall apply to new churches in established districts as follows: ¼ the first year, ½ the second year, ¾ the third year and the full quota thereafter."

4. WHEREAS, our pastors are elected by % vote of all present and voting, and whereas our district and general officials are elected without nomination and a simple majority,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that we have a uniform system of election laws. This Conference favors a ¾ vote for district and general church officers.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

After our gracious Camp Meeting had closed on Sunday night, it was refreshing to see the large attendance of ministers and delegates present on Monday morning for the opening session of the Thirty-Fifth Annual Conference, which convened at 10 A. M. August 27, on the District Grounds.

The Conference was opened with a devotional service. After singing "Leaning On The Everlasting Arms," we engaged in a season of prayer with Rev. Wray J. Smith leading us.

The Conference was called to order by our District Superintendent, Rev. Wm. S. Deal, who introduced our Assistant General Superintendent, Dr. L. W. Sturk of Cincinnati, to the Conference. After a few opening remarks, Dr. Sturk read from II Peter, Chapter 3, emphasizing verse eleven. His message was on the interesting subject, "What Kind of a Church Should Our Church Be?"

- 1. Our church should be a spiritual church. Spirit-filled and Godly. This is our only hope as a church. We have few wealthy, influential in politics, etc., but we can excel in spiritual lives.
- 2. Our church should be a united church. This was most aptly illustrated by the scripture that one can put a thousand to flight, and two can put ten thousand to flight; thus showing that in unity power is increased five times. As Jesus proclaimed, "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples if ye love one another."
- 3. We must be an unworldly church. Not only in outward manifestations, but chiefly in the spirit of unworldliness in the heart.
- 4. We must be a soul-winning church. If we are going to get on far as a church our altars must be wet with tears of penitents.

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that our Statistician be paid the sum of \$25.00 per year, this amount to be in excess of expenses involved in preparing said report. If more than one person is appointed to execute this work, the sum of \$25.00 shall be divided equally between them.

- 5. WHEREAS, there has been a steady increase in living costs;
- Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the District Superintendent be paid the sum of \$2,700 per year.
- 6. Be It Resolved, that we set the Bible School Field Representative's salary at \$2,000.00 per year and \$300.00 for expenses.
- 7. WHEREAS, there has been considerable discussion regarding raising Camp Meeting finance.

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the pastors take a special offering for this purpose, that is, the Camp Meeting, and further that they push the Camp Meeting Association membership.

MEMORIALS TO GENERAL CONFERENCE

1. WHEREAS, under the present set-up in our Manual, ministers uniting with our church between Conferences have no authoritative ministerial standing until it is granted at the following annual Conference,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the District Council be empowered to grant such ministers temporary ministerial standing, based upon their standing in the church from which they came, until their proper standing can be ascertained and granted at the next annual Conference.

2. WHEREAS, the Manual provides that the Sunday School Superintendent shall be nominated by the local church board (P. 38, Par. 3) and whereas the order of election of officers outlined (P. 37, Sect. 42) provides for the election of the secretary and treasurer first, which could create confusion in the election, if this order were followed.

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that page 37, section 42 be amended to read: "The annual church meeting shall elect a Sunday School superintendent, church secretary, treasurer, etc."

3. WHEREAS, page 91, paragraph 13, puts an extra burden upon newly organized churches often struggling with financial problems,

Sturk for his splendid messages and the way in which he handled the Conference.

- (a) That we express our appreciation to our District Superintendent, Rev. Wm. S. Deal, for his untiring efforts in directing the matters pertaining to the Conference.
- (b) That we give a rising vote of thanks to our outgoing District Treasurer, Rev. R. I. McCluskey, and to our outgoing Camp Meeting Secretary and Treasurer, Rev. J. A. Grout, for faithful service rendered during the past two and three years respectively.
- (c) That we give Brother Harold Loman a rising vote of thanks and a hearty "Amen" for the use of his tent and equipment.
- (d) That we express our appreciation to all those who made this Conference a success.
- (e) That all the men help take the benches down to the building.
 - (f) That we thank the cooks for the splendid meals.

REPORT OF WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1. WHEREAS, The budget set-up based on a 13% appropriation has been adequate to meet the various needs of the District:

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that a budget of 13% be adopted for this Conference year.

- 2. WHEREAS, there is a surplus in the District Budget funds: Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the District budget absorb the overdraft that is being carried on the District Parsonage.
- 3. WHEREAS, the General Conference convenes before our next District Conference, and whereas our General Conference Delegate Fund is insufficient to meet our obligations;

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that our District Superintendent upon his first visit to the churches in arrears urge them to meet their quota of 5 cents per member per year at their earliest possible convenience; and further,

Be It Resolved, that any additional amount needed to meet our General Conference assessment be paid out of the District Budget.

4. WHEREAS, there is required considerable labor to compile our statistical report:

- (e) That a Field Representative be employed for a period of twelve months each year.
- (f) That the duties of the Field Representative be outlined by the School Board.
- (g) That a Building Committee be elected to draw up plans for additional buildings to meet our requirements; said committee to be made up of two members from the Camp Meeting Board and two members from the Bible School Board. The Committee shall report to the District Council and they shall have the final vote before any work is started.
- (h) That we petition the General Board for a re-zoning of our school territory that we may be granted patronage to this school from other districts.
- No. 6. Be It Resolved, to have published quarterly a District Sunday School sheet showing the attendance of each Sunday School on the District for the month, the preceding month and the attendance for the same quarter a year ago, as well as the average attendance for the year, this sheet to be sent to each pastor and Sunday School Superintendent in the District.
- No. 7. Be It Resolved, that this Conference express their appreciation to the men and women of the armed forces; be it further resolved that the Conference stand for a moment of silent prayer in memory of the departed members of our church, and in appreciation of the service men and women who have gone out from our church.
- No. 8. Be It Resolved, that the Bible School Board be empowered to employ Bible School Faculty, set their salary and take other necessary action for the opening of the school.
- No. 9. Be It Resolved, that we as a Conference go on record as urging all churches of the District to be careful in electing delegates to the Conference and see that those who are elected are spiritual and that they conform to the standards of our Manual.
- No. 10. Be It Resolved, that a questionnaire prepared by the Council be sent to all ministers who belong to our Conference and who are working outside the District; these questionnaires to be returned one month previous to the District Conference.
- No. 11. Be It Resolved, that any unfinished business of this Conference be referred to the District Council.
 - No. 12. Be It Resolved, that we express appreciation to Brother

Camp begins. Any new officers elected at Conference will not take their places until the first Sunday of September.

No. 3. Since Standing Rule No. 12 states that the Secretary-Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Board be elected each year by the Conference, and that the eight additional members be elected for one term or until the successors are elected.

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that this Conference elect the Secretary-Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Board for a period of one year, and that the eight additional members shall be elected as follows:

Two members for a period of four years Two members for a period of three years Two members for e period of two years

Two members for a period of one year

and thereafter each year we are to elect two members for four years as the term of the two members expires.

No. 4. In order to help relieve the load of home missionary responsibility placed upon the District Superintendent,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that we elect an advisory committee of two members to work with the District Superintendent in all matters and details of District home missions. Said committee to function under and make recommendations to the Council. The Superintendent shall nominate and the Council ratify the nomination of the Superintendent of two persons to serve with himself as a committee on home missions.

No. 5 WHEREAS there has been a lot of work done and money raised looking forward to a Bible School,

Therefore, Be It Resolved:

- (a) That we open a Bible School in the fall of 1946.
- (b) That we elect a Board of five members, the Superintendent being chairman, and the school president an additional member.
- (c) That the Bible School Field Representative be a member of said board.
- (d) That the Bible School opening in the fall of 1946 carry a minimum of four years High School and two years Bible.

- 5. The District Council shall have the right to remove, or cause to be removed, any member of the District Sunday School Board who, in the judgment of such Council, is not in harmony with the teaching of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- If for any reason there is a vacancy on the District Sunday School Board, the District Council, by a majority vote may fill the vacancy.
- The District Sunday School Board shall work in conjunction with the General Sunday School Committee in promoting the Annual Rally Day, etc., etc.
- To have published each quarter a District Sunday School sheet showing the attendance of each Sunday School on the District for the month, the preceding month, and the attendance for the same quarter a year ago, as well as the average attendance for the year—this sheet to be sent to each pastor and Sunday School superintendent in the District. (1943).
- 14. Whereas, There is a shortage in our Home Missionary fund, and whereas, there is a surplus in our District budget,

We, therefore, recommend that the District budget read as follows: District Home Missions 2 per cent, District Loan Fund 1 per cent, Bible School 2 per cent, District budget 8 per cent, total 13 per cent.


RESOLUTIONS

No. 1. WHEREAS our young people are one of the greatest assets of our church, and to better serve the interest of their work,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the North Carolina District be divided into four zones, the same zone lines that have been set by the Sunday School Board, and officers appointed for each zone by the Council upon recommendation by the Executive Secretary and District Superintendent. Details of organization, officers, meetings, etc., to be worked out by the Executive Secretary and Superintendent under the Council's direction.

No. 2 WHEREAS there has been such confusion and a very marked absence of some of our ministers from our Camp due to the fact that they were getting their reports and matters for Conference out of the way,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that this Conference change the date of our Conference to Tuesday and Wednesday of the week that



Then followed the election of a Bible School Field Representative, and Rev. O. L. Ruth was elected.

A motion prevailed that the other four members of the Bible School Board be elected by secret ballot, and the following were elected: Rev. H. B. Barger, L. B. Gallimore, Rev. J. A. Grout and Rev. Terry P. Ragland.

Inasmuch as Rev. J. A. Grout has asked that his name not be run for office of Camp Meeting Secretary-Treasurer, a motion carried that we nominate individuals for this office. The nominations were as follows: Rev. U. N. Freeman, Rev. D. R. Saunders and Rev. Terry Ragland. Rev. U. N. Freeman was elected Secretary-Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Board.

In electing the Camp Meeting Board, a motion carried that we vote for eight individuals on the ballot without nominations. The Camp Meeting Board members elected were as follows: L. B. Gallimore, Rev. T. R. York, Rev. H. B. Barger, Rev. W. L. Cockman, Rev. W. F. Page, Rev. D. R. Saunders, Rev. J. A. Grout and Rev. T. C. Vaughn. (J. A. Grout, resigned: C. C. McMasters was appointed by Council to fill this vacanccy.)

The Chairman announced that eight ministerial delegates, all of whom must be ordained and actively engaged, were to be elected as delegates to the General Conference. The election proceeded but was not completed until the Wednesday morning sitting.

A motion carried that the Council elect the lay delegates to the General Conference from names turned in by the pastors of churches; seven lay delegates to be elected. October 1 was set as the deadline for pastors to turn in names from which the Council would elect the lay delegates.

At 10:45 motion was made that the Conference recess until 9 A. M. Wednesday.

WEDNESDAY MORNING

The seventh sitting of the Conference opened with the song, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus," led by Brother J. C. Wallace, after which we were led in prayer by Brother R. I. McCluskey.

This being the time for the Ordination Service, Brother Deal asked for those to be ordained to come forward. Brother Vaughn led the congregation in singing "A Charge to Keep I Have" as the candidates came forward. Brother Sturk appointed an Ordination Council consisting of Rev. R. I. McCluskey, Rev. O. L. Ruth, Rev.

J. A. Grout, Rev. H. B. Barger and Rev. Wm. S. Deal. The candidates for ordination were:

Ministers: Rev. Carey Bulla, Rev. T. A. Wyrick, Mrs. J. C. Wallace and Mrs. Chas. Apple. Deaconess: Mrs. W. H. Scott.

Brother Barger, Brother McCluskey and Brother Ruth read appropriate scriptures for the occasion after which Brother Sturk spoke briefly upon the great responsibility of the minister of the gospel, admonishing each one that he keep the anointing of the Holy Ghost upon his soul and that he preach the Word of God. At the conclusion of Brother Sturk's message, the candidates knelt around the altar, along with the Ordination Council, for prayer. The presence of the Lord was very near in this hour of service.

At the conclusion of the Ordination Service, the Conference was ready to proceed with further business, the first item of business being to complete the election of ministerial delegates to the General Conference. The following were elected: Rev. T. C. Vaughn, Rev. D. R. Saunders, Rev. T. R. York, Rev. W. F. Page, Rev. R. I. McCluskey, Rev. Wray J. Smith, Rev. Terry P. Ragland and Rev. U. N. Freeman.

Motion prevailed that if alternate delegates are needed to go to the General Conference the Council be empowered to fill any vacancies; said alternates to be selected from those receiving the next highest number of votes. W. L. Cockman and C. C. McMasters received the next highest number.

Brother York gave a report on the cost of printing the minutes. A motion carried that the matter of getting the minutes printed be turned over to the District Council. A motion also carried that we leave the matter of determining the number of copies of the minutes needed in the hands of the Council.

A motion carried that all pastors who desired to have their church or whatever picture they wanted placed in the minutes, send to the District Council within ten days, and the District Council was empowered to determine whether or not this would be done. Should such procedure be acceptable to the Council, the church sending in such picture would pay the additional \$3.40 on the basis of 500 copies, should a full page be used by one church.

Another matter of emphasis was that every pastor should meet his board and consider the licensed ministers in his church and recommend them or refuse to recommend them for license.

A partial report from the Camp Meeting Board Secretary was given.

Motion carried that we dispense with the reading of appointments.

The committees were appointed by the District Superintendent. (See directory.)

Motion carried that we stand for a moment of silent prayer in memory of the departed members of our church and in appreciation of the service men and women who have gone out from our church.

The Resolutions Committee made its final report.

A number of important announcements were made, after which the Conference adjourned.

The Conference stood and sang the Doxology, and Brother Sturk prayed the closing prayer.
