#### DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the 36th Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Convened on the District Camp Grounds at Kernersville, N. C., August 13, 1946, Greetings in the Name of our Blessed Lord:

It is with thanksgiving to God for His abundant goodness which has brought us through another year with its trials, heartaches, toils and triumphs that we pause here for a general survey of our district work, together with my personal report.

#### GENERAL ADVANCEMENT

Gracious revivals, "times of refreshing from the presence of the Lord," have been evident throughout the district this year. How we praise God for these wonderful outpourings of the Holy Ghost, reaching many sinners and believers with needed blessings, and refreshing our churches, giving them strength to carry on in the name of the Lord.

This year has not been without its disappointments, hard places and difficulties. There have been dark clouds and sometimes stormy sailing. But through it all the blessed Lord has been with us. He has been the Captain of our boat, and it has been nothing unusual in the midst of these distressing times to hear His gentle "Peace be still."

#### TEMPORAL AFFAIRS

There has been general progress throughout the district, for which we praise the Lord. In addition to the many improvements in the various churches and parsonages there have been three new parsonages and one new church erected.

The most outstanding piece of work for the year is the new nineroom parsonage at Albemarle. Rev. U. N. Freeman, and his people, are due warm congratulations upon this extraordinary accomplishment. The Albemarle parsonage is one of the finest in our connec-

tion. It is estimated at about \$10,000 value. It shows splendid workmanship throughout, for which Brother Freeman is largely responsible.

New parsonages have been built this year at Franklinton where Rev. Verlin Busick is the hard-working pastor, and at Reidsville where Rev. J. W. Covington so faithfully labors as pastor. Nice buildings have been erected at both places.

Rev. Cary Bulla has moved into the new parsonage on the Harmony circuit this year and has done somewhat toward its completion. It was begun under the ministry of Rev. H. R. Helms, the former pastor.

The Siler City Church has purchased a beautiful parsonage this year, under the direction of Rev. G. E. Laws, the aggressive pastor.

A number of improvements have been made in various places, among which are the following:

Durham has remodeled its church inside. Rev. A. J. Smith did a splendid work there this year.

Kannapolis, under the guidance of Rev. W. F. Page's gentle hand, made excellent improvements on their property.

Rev. T. R. York and the Mt. Zion Church are building a splendid large Sunday School department and installing a heating plant at the cost of several thousand dollars. This addition will give them one of the most beautiful rural churches in our entire denomination.

Mt. Olive has built Sunday School rooms. Rev. Terry P. Ragland did an excellent work there and also at Randleman, where he left a nice building fund for a new modern parsonage.

Rev. J. Q. Ball, the faithful pastor at Mt. Zion, has aided in the remodeling of the church there and has seen new pews installed at his church in Biscoe.

Rev. C. C. McMasters is leaving the church at Winston-Salem after ten years of faithful service with more than \$7,000 in their building fund for a new church and a nice lot on which to build.

Asheboro is raising funds for a large new church under the capable leadership of Rev. Chas. L. Stout. They have also purchased a Sunday School bus.

Burlington, where Rev. D. R. Saunders is the aggressive pastor, has reduced its debt and is looking forward toward the launching of a new church building program.

Spray Church, under the leadership of Rev. C. H. Pendergraft, has purchased a Sunday School bus. The work is doing fine.

Sawyersville, where Rev. Wade Linebarrier is doing a good work, plans a completion program to finish up Sunday School rooms, etc.

Rev. L. L. Lange, the wide-awake pastor of the Erlanger Church, and his people have made considerable improvements on their church this year.

We have dedicated two new churches this year, one at Thurmond, where Rev. J. F. Talbirt so faithfully labored and built the church, and the other at Bethel, near Kannapolis, which was built out of the sacrificing and untiring labors of Rev. W. E. Scercy.

Misses Arney and Royal have done a good work as pastors at Bethel during this year.

Pastors' salaries in numbers of places have been raised during the year. The district financial program stands at an all time high income. Many thousands of dollars have been raised and expended this year on new projects, improvements and indebtedness throughout the district. We seem to be in the best financial condition of our history.

We have been saddened this year by the removal from our midst of one of our ministerial brethren. Rev. "Jim" Brigman, as he was so well known to many, passed away at his home in Kannapolis on Sunday, June 9th, of a heart attack. The funeral was conducted by Rev. W. F. Page, Rev. H. B. Barger, and others, in the Pilgrim Holiness Church in Kannapolis, of which he was a member. Brother Brigman was a minister for many years in this conference. In later years he was not active as a pastor but continued to serve his Master in whatever way he could. His presence will be missed from the Kannapolis Church and among his many friends.

#### OUR SUNDAY SCHOOLS

Some genuine progress has been made in this department. Successful rallies have been held in all the zones, and our first state-wide convention, which was considered quite a success, was held on July 4th at High Point, N. C. Rev. T. R. York, our capable director, assisted by the efficient members of his board, Rev. U. N. Freeman, secretary, Rev. C. C. McMasters, treasurer, and Rev. Wray J. Smith, as an advisory member, have certainly done a good piece of work this year in connection with our Sunday Schools. Since there will be a report elsewhere of this department, my remarks here will be brief. This will hold good also for other departments that are making reports.

#### YOUTH WORK

In this field we have tried a new plan this year. Following the zones of our Sunday School Department, we appointed zone chair-

men soon after last conference. Under the excellent leadership of Rev. L. L. Lange, District Executive Secretary of the Young People, and the splendid zone chairmen of the several zones, our young people's work has gone forward in a very gratifying manner. I refer you to the report which will appear elsewhere.

#### CAMP MEETING

This year's camp meeting is yet future at this report. However, I would like to say that the Camp Meeting Board has done its best this year to provide you with the best possible camp meeting program.

Rev. U. N. Freeman, our wide-awake and hard-working secretary-treasurer, has done excellent work this year. We are grateful to him for his untiring labors in this connection.

It seems fitting and proper that I should here express appreciation for the hard work of the Camp Meeting Board members and those who have assisted to make possible the raising of thousands of dollars and the remarkable improvements which they have assisted in placing upon these grounds during the past four years.

#### NEWS BULLETIN

A new feature of the district work this year has been the Pilgrim News Bulletin, issued quarterly upon the authority of the District Council and edited by your superintendent. The Bulletin has been fully self-supporting by the subscriptions raised from the churches. It has received a warm welcome among us as a district, and we trust has been of some worth-while service.

#### PILGRIM BIBLE COLLEGE

This has been one of the greatest years in the history of our district so far, in that it is the opening year of P. B. C. The College Board of Directors has worked hard and long in getting things as nearly ready as we now have them. It has occasioned many meetings of this Board and much work on the part of its executive members especially. I am sure we as a district owe a debt of appreciation to them for their faithful services, and to the District Council for its assistance with the problems with which this Board has had to wrestle.

Rev. O. L. Ruth, Field Representative, has certainly worked hard this year and we are grateful to him for his services. He has visited the churches of our district, South Carolina, the Gulf States, and Tennessee districts, raising thousands of dollars in behalf of the school. He has also raised a considerable amount of money

outside the Church. Most of the student applications have been sent in by him. I refer you to his report.

To Rev. W. L. Surbrook, our good President, and to Rev. Carl Hightower, our fine High School Principal, along with Rev. Terry Ragland, goes credit for arranging our excellent catalog.

To Rev. Terry P. Ragland, our excellent and hard-working secretary, goes no small credit for his untiring labors. He has spent many, many long hours in correspondence, etc., on this work.

The excellent buildings you see on these grounds are the result of the careful planning of the Building Committee, appointed soon after last conference. This committee consists of Brothers O. L. Ruth, H. B. Barger, T. R. York, and L. B. Gallimore.

A large portion of the credit for their being here, however, must go to Mr. L. B. Gallimore, General Contractor of Greensboro, N. C. Without Brother Gallimore's faithful and unstinting service we could not have been so near ready for our opening day.

Also, Mrs. Gallimore has donated two lovely pianos to the college, for which we are indeed grateful. I hope that during this conference a fitting and proper expression of our appreciation will be made to Brother and Sister Gallimore for their work and contributions in this connection.

The Board of Directors is justly proud to have been able to secure the services of Rev. W. L. Surbrook as President of our School. We feel that we are especially favored in having a man of his sanctified character, education and ability, to head our school.

We also feel ourselves fortunate to have secured Brother Carl Hightower as High School Principal. His many years of experience in Bible School and High School work will be invaluable to us in the work here. We have a very fine faculty, and look forward toward a wonderful school year.

#### HOME MISSIONS

There is good news from this field, also, for which we are grateful to God.

During the year your superintendent has been graciously assisted in his home missionary endeavors by Rev. T. C. Vaughn and Rev. T. R. York, members of the District Home Missionary Committee. These brethren have labored faithfully in promoting the cause of home missions in our district. We are grateful to them for their excellent services. Our aim this year has been largely to conserve and strengthen our already existing projects rather than

to open new work. The Home Missionary Committee has held a number of conventions in the weaker churches and newer projects for this purpose. Good reports have come from the places where such conventions have been held.

Because of the many extra duties of the superintendent incident to the opening of the school work, etc., I have not been able to do as much home missionary work as I would like to have done. We have, however, a noble host of home missionary workers who have very ably carried on the work. A few words about several of these projects seem to be in place here.

Rev. T. A. Wyrick is making progress toward organization of his work into a Pilgrim Holiness Church at Besemer Chapel.

Harker's Island, under the capable leadershrip of Rev. R. L. Bowling, is making excellent progress. This, as you know, is not a Pilgrim Holiness Church but is under our supervision. We feel that definite progress is being made in the Pilgrim direction. Brother Bowling and the folk have built a beautiful parsonage there this year.

Sister Viola Dillon has made good progress in the pastorate at Hickory.

Rev. C. P. Richey and the faithful band of Pilgrims at Liberty have erected a lovely church there. The Sunday School and church are in a fine condition. Bro. Richey is certainly to be commended for the remarkable piece of work he has done at Liberty.

In addition to his many labors as pastor at Lenoir, Rev. Wm. P. Armstrong has done much to help hold our interests and gain some ground at Morganton. Besides this, he has branched out with the aid of local workers and opened up a new work near North Wilkesboro. They now have a good Sunday School and fair prospects for a work there.

At Laurinburg Rev. Chas. H. Williams has held on during the year. There has not been much progress because of the fact we do not have a building in which to worship. Brother Williams has been faithful and is certainly to be commended.

The work opened at Walnut Cove was not a success and was closed sometime ago. There was no district expenditure here.

Also, we regret to have lost the little church at Brower Memorial. The property never was deeded to our district and we sustained no financial loss. The church evidently went down because of unfortunate local conditions.

Rev. T. R. York has done a fine piece of work at the church in Staley in connection with his Mt. Zion pastorate. Cement blocks are on the ground and it is planned that the building for the new church will soon be under way.

Rev. H. R. Helms and wife have done excellent work at Statesville this year and the project there is in the best condition of its history. It was organized just prior to conference with a nice little class.

In connection with his work at Statesville, Brother Helms has also been working up a new work in the country above Harmony near Hamptonville. I have visited this group and preached to them on different occasions since Brother Helms has been working there. It was our happy privilege just after General Conference to organize a good church with 14 charter members at this place. They have a nice building which is being deeded to the district, together with a lot which Brother Wallace is giving on which to build a parsonage. Brother Helms is due no small credit for this excellent new work.

After many years of hard labor Brother Norman Nations and his wife were able to witness, the latter part of May, the organization of the Whittier work into a full-fledged Pilgrim Holiness Church. We are grateful for their services to these people through the years.

Wilmot and Whittier churches have been formed into a new circuit which is to be pastored this coming year by Rev. and Mrs. A. J. Smith. The Nations will continue as pastors of the Bryson City charge.

Whatever has been accomplished in the field of home missions, the credit goes largely to those faithful and untiring workers who have given so unstintingly of their devotion and service to this gracious work. It may be of interest to the Conference to know that we now have about seven workers on part-time support and more than ten churches and preaching points under home missionary supervision.

This has been one of the busiest years of my life in the work of the Lord. I have visited the churches of the district twice, most of them three times, and a number of them more than three times. I have enjoyed my work this year in the district and wish to express my deepest gratitude to God and to my brethren for the gracious spirit of cooperation which has been shown me by the District Council, the Camp Meeting Board, the Bible School Board, and all other boards and committees with which I have been associated, as well as our pastors and people in general.

Amidst the many and varied duties I have found time for soul culture and I trust have made some progress toward being a better minister of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. For every trial God has given grace, and in much labor the needed strength has been supplied. To God be the praise! I herewith submit my personal report:

#### BIBLE SCHOOL REPRESENTATIVE REPORT

To the Thirty-Sixth Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Greetings:

I herein submit the following report of the Field Representative of the Pilgrim Bible College.

During this year we have visited 52 churches in the North Carolina District, raised \$7,057.36 in the churches, \$1,069.15 in cash outside the churches, and have \$310.00 pledges from outside uncollected; have contacted 95 prospective students in this district.

In the month of December we visited the six churches we have in South Carolina, raised \$447.03, and contacted 14 prospective students.

In January we visited the Gulf States which includes Alabama, Louisiana and Mississippi. Our first visit was at their winter camp at Magnolia Springs, Ala. We raised \$515.00 at this camp, and a total of \$1,244.35 in the district; 28 prospective students.

In April following the Ministerial Conference, we visited the twelve churches in Tennessee, raised \$422.75, and contacted 17 prospective students. All the churches in this zone, except the North Carolina District, are in the home missionary class, and we greatly appreciate their offerings and sacrifice. Also, they furnished a fine list of students. Total money raised in the zone, \$10,550.64; total number of churches visited, 85; total number prospective students, 153.

We have had more than \$200.00 worth of books donated to the School, two pianos given outright, two loaned free of charge, office equipment for the President's office donated, four beeves, two half-hogs, trailer load of cabbage, load of apples, potatoes, canned fruit, chicken and turkeys promised for Thanksgiving service. We have four men who are helping pay part of four students' way through school.

During the year we have held three revivals, received \$250.00 from same; preached 130 times. had 93 professions; conducted 6 funerals; married 8 couples; traveled 18,716 miles in the interest of the School; traveling expense \$612.00; received salary \$2,000.00, and \$300.00 for traveling expense.

We appreciate so much the cooperation of both pastor and people. We are very thankful for the great blessing of the Lord on the program of the Bible School work this year. We feel it is God who is leading in this great undertaking, and that only the future will tell what the prayers and sacrifice of the people for the Bible School will mean to this Southland.

With no school in operation, all that has been done has been an act of faith. With the fine faculty we have, and the student body we are looking forward to, it seems we should make much more progress this coming year. Again we want to thank the people for their fine spirit of cooperation and investment in our Young People.

Our District was divided into four zones and chairmen for each zone were selected. The chairmen were as follows: Zone 1, Rev. D. R. Saunders; Zone 2, Rev. Reece Farlow; Zone 3, Rev. C. C. McMasters; Zone 4, Rev. W. P. Armstrong. We appreciate the privilege of working with these fine zone chairmen and the splendid work of planning and conducting the zone rallies. Each zone

conducted two zone rallies. They were as follows: Zone 1, Hillsboro and Mebane; Zone 2, Randleman and Asheboro; Zone 3, Erlanger and Elkin; Zone 4, Statesville and Salisbury. We were privileged to attend all but two of these Rallies. Attendance banners were presented to the church having the most in attendance at these Rallies. This created added interest. Most of all we praise God for His presence that was manifested in the services.

We had only one District Rally which was held at the Camp grounds. We were handicapped considerably at this Rally because of the confusing date of Thanksgiving. #### STANDING RULES

- 1. Whereas the Manual provides that the pastor may hold two revivals a year, Be It Resolved, that we grant the same privilege to our District Superintendent; (1943) that he retain the offerings received from same, and all other offerings from Home Missionary conventions. (1946).
- 2. The Council is authorized to formulate rules and regulations for the Camp Meeting and Conference. (1943).
- 3. The District Superintendent is the Chairman of the Camp Meeting Board. (1943).
- 4. We recommend that we pay at the rate of five cents per member per year for the Delegate Fund to the General Conference. (1938).
- 5. As there is some expense in the performance of the duties of the District officials, we recommend that they be allowed three cents per mile when traveling in interest of the District. (1941).
- 6. Be It Resolved: That this Conference organize a Camp Meeting Association by electing a Secretary-Treasurer and secure members who shall pay \$2.00 each for the first year, and \$1.00 per year thereafter. The duty of the Secretary-Treasurer shall be to keep a correct record of the membership, finances, etc., and disburse same as directed by the District Council. He shall make a report at each District Assembly. He shall also write to each member of the Association before the Camp opens, advising them of the date of the Camp, the evangelist and singers, and ask them for their dues. (1941).

- 7. Be It Resolved: That our Ministerial Convention shall convene on Tuesday after the first Sunday in April each year until said date shall be changed by the District Conference. (1940).
- 8. We recommend that the birthday offerings be used for the purpose of Church Extension, and that each pastor explain, encourage and push the offerings; however, we still retain the call card. (1942).
- 9. A Home Missionary Association shall be formed, made up of members to be secured by the District Superintendent as he makes his rounds. Each member is to pay \$1.00 when called upon, and not more than two calls per year. (1940).
- 10. Be It Resolved: That we give our District Superintendent and also ask the churches to give the pastors a two weeks' vacation with pay. (1941).
- 11. Be It Resolved: That this Conference set a date for the Camp Meeting. (The Conference set the date for the Camp to begin on Friday night before the last two Sundays in August.) (1941).
- 12. Be It Resolved: That this Conference elect a Camp Meeting Board by secret ballot, said board to have authority to secure workers, and raise money and promote the interest of the Camp Meeting. The District Superintendent shall be Chairman of said board.

Since there is no stated time when the term of the Camp Meeting Board expires, Therefore, Be It Resolved, that a Camp Meeting Secretary and Treasurer be elected by this Conference and that his term shall expire at the next Annual Conference. Be It Further Resolved, that the eight additional members be elected as follows:

Two members for a period of four years Two members for a period of three years Two members for a period of two years Two members for a period of one year

and thereafter each year we are to elect two members for four years as the terms of the two members expire.

- 13. Be It Resolved: That the District Council elect a Sunday School Board of four, including the Sunday School Secretary. The duties of the District Sunday School Board, in harmony with the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, shall be as follows:
  - The District Sunday School Board shall arrange an Annual Sunday School Convention to be held some time during the year.
  - To promote and encourage the Sunday School work throughout the District.

- 3. To present an annual report to the District Conference which shall include the following:
  - (a) A statement of the work accomplished during the year.
  - (b) A statement of the general condition of the Sunday School work in the District.
  - (c) To recommend to the District Conference through the Ways and Means Committee the amount considered necessary to finance the District Sunday School work.
- The District Sunday School Board shall be amenable to the District Council.
- 5. The District Council shall have the right to remove, or cause to be removed, any member of the District Sunday School Board who, in the judgment of such Council, is not in harmony with the teaching of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- 6. If for any reason there is a vacancy on the District Sunday School Board, the District Council, by a majority vote may fill the vacancy.
- 7. To have published each quarter a District Sunday School sheet showing the attendance of each Sunday School on the District for the month, the preceding month, and the attendance for the same quarter a year ago, as well as the average attendance for the year—this sheet to be sent to each pastor and Sunday School superintendent in the District. (1943).
- 14. Whereas, our young people are one of the greatest assets of our Church, and to better service the interest of their work,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the North Carolina District be divided into four zones, the same zone lines that have been set by the Sunday School Board, and officers appointed for each zone by the Council upon recommendation by the Executive Secretary and District Superintendent. Details of organization, officers, meetings, etc., to be worked out by the Executive Secretary and Superintendent under the Council's direction.

- 15. Be It Resolved, that this Conference change the date of our Conference to Tuesday and Wednesday of the week that Camp begins. Any new officers elected at Conference will not take their places until the first Sunday of September.
- 16. In order to help relieve the load of home missionary responsibility placed upon the District Superintendent,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that we elect an advisory committee of two members to work with the District Superintendent in all

matters and details of District home missions. Said committee to function under and make recommendations to the Council. The Superintendent shall nominate and the Council ratify the nomination of the Superintendent of two persons to serve with himself as a committee on home missions.

17. Whereas there has been a lot of work done and money raised looking forward to a Bible Scohol,

Therefore, Be It Resolved:

- (a) That we open a Bible School in the fall of 1946.
- (b) That we elect a Board of five members, the Superintendent being chairman, and the school president an additional member.
- (c) That the Bible School Field Representative be a member of said board.
- (d) That the Bible School opening in the fall of 1946 carry a minimum of four years High School and two years Bible.
- (e) That a Field Representative be employed for a period of twelve months each year.
- (f) That the duties of the Field Representative be outlined by the School Board.
- (g) That a Building Committee be elected to draw up plans for additional buildings to meet our requirements; said committee to be made up of two members from the Camp Meeting Board and two members from the Bible School Board. The committee shall report to the District Council and they shall have the final vote before any work is started.
- 18. Be It Resolved, that we as a Conference go on record as urging all churches of the District to be careful in electing delegates to the Conference and see that those who are elected are spiritual and that they conform to the standards of our Manual.
- 19. Be It Resolved, that a questionnaire prepared by the Council be sent to all ministers who belong to our Conference and who are working outside the District; these questionnaires to be returned one month previous to the District Conference.
- 20. Whereas there is required considerable labor to compile our statistical report,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that our Statistician be paid the sum of \$25.00 per year, this amount to be in excess of expenses involved in preparing said report. If more than one person is appointed to execute this work, the sum of \$25.00 shall be divided between them.

#### RESOLUTIONS

1. Whereas there is no rule in the Manual nor yet in our Conference Standing Rules governing when the newly elected officers of a local church shall take over their duties; and whereas some new boards are beginning to operate following the close of our fiscal year, or the first of August, while others are waiting until after the Conference to take over their duties,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that we interpret the Manual, page 37, section 42, paragraph 1, so that new officers assume their duties the first of August.

2. Whereas we have not yet proved just what effect the change of the Conference to prior to the Camp Meeting will have on the Camp Meeting, nor how successful this method will later be considered,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that this Conference empower the District Council, upon sufficient petition from members of the Conference to satisfy it to be justifiable, to change the date of the Conference for the coming year back to the old date, following the Camp Meeting.

3. Whereas, the established churches are requested to give a year's subscription to the Advocate and a copy of the Manual to each new member joining the church, and since no provision is made for new churches;

Therefore, Be It Resolved, That the District Home Missionary Department furnish a copy of the Manual and one year's subscription to the Advocate free to each family represented in the Charter membership of newly organized churches.

- 4. Be It Resolved, that we set our goal to increase our church membership in this District by at least 300 this conference year; same to be done in a spiritual fashion.
- 5. Be It Resolved, that we set our goal for a gain of 500 in average weekly Sunday School attendance over the Conference year of 1945-46.
- Be It Resolved, that the Sunday School Board bring in recommendations on enrollment and revision of enrollment for our Sunday Schools.
- 7. Be It Resolved, that that portion in the minutes, page 29, paragraph 7, relative to pastors taking an offering in their churches for Camp Meeting, be deleted.

Be It Further Resolved, that we set a goal for 1,000 new members to the Camp Meeting Association.

8. Be It Resolved, that each pastor solicit each of his members to join the Camp Meeting Association and that he collect or ap-

point one of his members to collect and send the money collected to the Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Association.

9. Whereas the report of the Camp Meeting Secretary-Treasurer could not be completed prior to the Conference,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that this report be completed at the close of the Camp Meeting, be approved by the District Council and inserted in the minutes.

10. Whereas two of our senior ministers were unable to attend the Conference,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the Secretary send greetings from the Conference to Brother Baldwin and Brother Talbirt.

11. Whereas it has developed that the City of Kernersville is unable to furnish water for our property as had originally been promised,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the matter of securing water on the grounds be turned over to the District Council to appoint a committee to investigate the possibility of getting water; said committee to report back to the District Council, and the Council to act as it sees fit.

12. Whereas there is no fire protection available for our buildings,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the District Council have purchased and installed the necessary fire extinguishers and fire bombs.

- 13. Be It Resolved, that the Camp Meeting Board and District Council be empowered to plan for erection of a tabernacle on these grounds when they deem it wise to build.
- 14. Whereas, there are several thousand Holiness people in this southern section, and as far as we know, there is no definite Holiness Association,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the District Council be empowered to appoint a committee who shall contact the Wesleyan Methodist and Nazarene people with a view toward forming such an Association at the earliest possible date.

15. We recommend to the District Conference a plan whereby our Bible School Board will be expanded to include representation from all the districts of our zone. The recommendation to the District Conference is as follows:

Whereas the Pilgrim Bible College is a fully recognized and accredited institution of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, having been authorized by the General Church, and

Whereas the General Board has allotted a definite patronizing zone for Pilgrim Bible College, and

Whereas we are grateful that the following districts are comprehended in this zone, namely, South Carolina, the Gulf States, and Tennessee,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we, the North Carolina Conference, upon recommendation of the College Board of Directors, urgently request that each of the above named districts should have one official representative on the College Board, and further that said representative be the district superintendent;

Be It Further Resolved: That when, and if, the General Board should annex other territory as a patronizing zone that the same courtesy should be granted each district.

- 16. Be It Resolved, that the Conference ask the Pilgrim Bible College Board of Directors to draw up Constitution and By-Laws for the College; same to be ratified by the District Council.
- 17. Be It Resolved, upon recommendation of District Council, Camp Meeting Board and Bible School Board, that we continue a Bible School Field Representative.
- 18. Whereas, we as a District are not well enough informed concerning the National Association of Evangelicals, .

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that we request Brother W. L. Surbrook to write a paper or an article, setting forth facts about the N. A. E., and that such article be printed in the District News Bulletin.

19. Whereas, there seems to be a growing feeling on the part of many that the Ministerial and Deaconess study courses should be taken under supervision of an Extension Department in Pilgrim Bible College,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that we empower the District Council to make this change as soon as an Extension Department can be set up in the College.

20. Whereas we face the grave danger of too great a change in our College Board of Directors in any one year,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the two receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected for two years and the other two shall be elected for but one year.

Be It Further Resolved: That from this year on we shall elect but two each year to serve two years.

21. Whereas, there seems to be no Manual for the disbanding of a church where it has gone down and has reached an irretrievable point in its history, and whereas there are some such churches in this District.

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the District Superintendent ap-

point a committee to formulate plans or methods of procedure which the District Council shall adopt in disbanding such churches until the General Conference shall adopt a general plan.

Committee appointed: Rev. H. B. Barger, Chairman; Rev. R. I. McCluskey, Rev. J. A. Grout, Rev. O. L. Ruth.

22. Whereas, The Pilgrim News Bulletin has been so well received and appreciated over the District,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the Bulletin be continued according to demand, and that members of churches subscribe for it as was the practice last year.

- 23. Be It Resolved, that we plan for a three-day conference in 1947.
- 24. Be It Resolved, that what has heretofore been known as the Bible School Board be known as the College Board of Directors.
- 25. Be It Resolved, that the District Council appoint two members from the College Board of Directors, along with the College President, to serve as an executive committee, minutes of such executive committee meetings to be approved by the College Board of Directors. (Council appointed Rev. O. L. Ruth and Rev. T. P. Ragland.)
- 26. Be It Resolved, that we give Rev. Harold Loman a rising vote of thanks for the use of his splendid tent and equipment for Conference and Camp Meeting.
- 27. Be It Resolved, that the District Council read and approve the minutes of the last sittings.
  - 28. Be It Resolved, that the appointments not be read.
- 29. Be It Resolved, that the Ordination Service be held during Camp Meeting, time to be set by District Council.
- 30. Be It Resolved, that the report of the Memoirs Committee be put in the minutes.

### WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

- 1. Whereas there has been a sharp increase in the cost of living, Therefore, Be It Resolved, that we increase the salaries of our Home Missionary workers 20 per cent.
- 2. The joint meeting of District Council, Camp Meeting Board and Bible School recommends the following budget of 15 per cent:

3. Whereas our District Council advanced funds to one of our ministers in an emergency, and whereas we have no funds for such an emergency,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that we take an offering at this Conference to reimburse the treasury for this amount. Motion also carried that any pastor who so desired could take an offering for this minister.

- 4. We recommend that the salary of our District Superintendent be continued on the present level of \$2,700.00, plus coal, lights, telephone, water and traveling expenses. Be It Further Resolved, that the District Superintendent be allowed to keep for himself all offerings from Home Missionary conventions and revivals.
- 5. We recommend that the salary of our Bible School Representative be set at \$2,000.00, and that we allow him \$500.00 for traveling expenses.

Whereas, the traveling expenses of our Bible School Representative exceeded the amount allotted by the Conference, for 1945-46,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that this deficit be paid out of Bible School Funds.

6. Whereas, our General Church expects to adopt the Ministers' Pension Plan,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that we empower the District Council to put into practice the Ministers' Pension Plan as soon as instructions are received from Headquarters.

7. Whereas, our own District Sunday Schools are in need of finances to operate, and whereas our General Sunday School Rally offerings are very good,

Therefore, Be It Resolved that half of the General Sunday School Rally offerings be kept in our own District to promote the work of the Sunday School here.

#### JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

The Thirty-Sixth Annual Conference opened at 10 A. M., August 13, 1946, on the District Grounds, with Rev. Buell Bingham leading the singing of "His Grace Aboundeth More." We were led in prayer by Rev. R. I. McCluskey.

The opening message to our Conference was brought by our Assistant District Superintendent, Bro. H. B. Barger, basing his message upon John 15.

 A revelation of the near relation between Christ and the church.

- 2. Reveals our utter dependence upon Christ.
- 3. God is glorified in our fruitfulness, and of the impending judgment upon us if fruitless.

Very forceful was the truth presented concerning the fruits of the spirit, love, joy, peace, etc.

At the conclusion of Bro. Barger's message, Bro. Deal presented to the Conference special greetings from our senior minister, Rev. M. A. Baldwin, who is unable to attend the Conference.

Bro. Barger brought word of why one of our General officials could not preside at our Conference, therefore, we turn the job of presiding to our Superintendent, Bro. W. S. Deal.

The Conference bar was fixed to include the first eight rows in the audience and the platform.

A motion prevailed that the hours of business be from 9 A. M. to 12 M., and from 2 P. M. to 5 P. M., and from 7 P. M. to 9:30 P. M.

The Secretary called the roll of ministers, deaconesses and lay delegates.

We were favored with selections by the Musical Messengers from Kokomo, Indiana. They sang their theme song, followed by three other selections, "I Claim Jesus First of All," "I'd Like to Talk It Over," and "What a Friend We Have in Jesus." Their singing was an inspiration to the entire Conference.

The Reception Committee presented as visitors to the Conference the following:

Rev. and Mrs. B. E. Bingham from Kentucky, who are coming back to the District; Rev. F. R. Cooper and Rev. Julian Howard, evangelists from the Virginia District; and Rev. Wm. Roy Phillips, pastor of the Pilgrim Church at Roanoke, Virginia; Rev. Carl Hightower who comes to our District from Indiana, to head the High School Department of our School.

The Conference voted to give all these honorary seats in the Conference bar.

Bro. Wm. Roy Phillips dismissed.

Recessed for lunch.

# AFTERNOON SESSION

The second sitting of the Conference convened at 2 P. M., August 13, 1946, with Brother McMasters leading the song service, in which we sang "I've Anchored in Jesus," and "Near the Cross." We were led in prayer by Bro. Roy Phillips, pastor of the Roanoke, Virginia, Church.

The minutes of the morning session were read and approved. Secretary called the roll and the necessary corrections were

made. Motion carried that the calling of the roll throughout the remainder of the Conference be dispensed with.

At this point, Bro. W. L. Surbrook arrived on the grounds and inasmuch as he had been appointed to preside over the Conference, Bro. Deal turned over to him the chairman's place. After a few remarks from Bro. Surbrook, we were ready to proceed with business.

The District Superintendent's report was called for, read and accepted.

At the conclusion of the Superintendent's report, he brought before the Conference several recommendations along the line of setting goals for the District.

Statistical report was read and accepted.

Brother Deal presented to the Conference three churches: Statesville, Beulah Church (Hamptonville), and Whittier, and delegates from these churches were received into the Conference bar.

The Auditor's report was read and accepted.

The District Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

Conference recessed for supper.

#### EVENING SESSION

After the song service, prayer was offered by Rev. O. L. Ruth. The Reception Committee presented as visitors of the Conference the following:

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Ackerman from Michigan; Mrs. W. L. Surbrook; Mrs. Carl Hightower; Rev. W. A. Way, who is returning to our District after an absence of several years; Rev. Raymond Shelton, Superintendent of the South Carolina District; Mrs. Yeoman from Harker's Island; Brother Miller from Roanoke, Virginia; Bro. Rose from Harker's Island; and Rev. Herbert Donally, pastor from the South Carolina District.

A motion prevailed that these visitors be given an honorary seat in the Conference bar.

Greetings to the Conference were received from Rev. Thurman Burgess, who was unable to attend.

The report of the Bible School Field Representative was read and accepted.

An incomplete report of the Camp Meeting Board Secretary-Treasurer was read and accepted.

Report from the Young People's Executive Secretary was read and accepted.

Report from the District Sunday School Director was read and accepted.

The Committee on Resolutions reported and several of their recommendations were accepted.

Conference recessed by expiration of time.

# MORNING SESSION-AUGUST 14, 1946

The fourth sitting of the Conference was opened at 9 A. M. After the song service, we were led in prayer by Rev. Julian Howard from the Virginia District.

Minutes of the previous sittings were read and approved.

Conference acted upon several resolutions. (See Resolutions.)

The Reception Committee presented to the Conference the following visitors:

Mrs. W. A. Way; Mr. O. T. Sizemore of the People's Christian Movement, Gibsonville; and Rev. L. F. Lance from the Wesleyan Methodist Church. Bro. Lance came to us as a fraternal delegate from the Wesleyan Methodist Church, and brought greetings from the North Carolina Conference of their Church. Greetings were received from the Wesleyan Methodist Church by the Conference.

Conference recessed until the call of the chair.

### AFTERNOON SESSION

The fifth sitting of the Conference opened at 3 P. M., with Rev. J. Byron Crouse leading the song service, after which we were favored with a special song by him.

The Resolutions Committee continued its report.

The Ways and Means Committee reported.

Inasmuch as there were several ministers to be received into the Conference, a motion prevailed that this be done prior to the election of officers, and that the order of the evening's business be the election of officers.

Conference recessed until 6:45 P. M.

### **EVENING SESSION**

The sixth sitting of the Conference convened at 6:45 P. M.

After song service and prayer, the Committee on Resolutions reported.

Brother Surbrook read the 13th chapter of I Corinthians and talked briefly from this chapter, after which Mrs. Surbrook sang "Wonderful Jesus."

The following were received into the Conference, as had been voted in previous sitting:

Rev. W. L. Surbrook, Rev. W. A. Way, Rev. and Mrs. Buell Bingham, Rev. Carl Hightower, Rev. Joseph C. Brown and Rev. L. C. Black.

The next order of business was the election of officers.

The District Superintendent appointed the following tellers: Rev. T. C. Vaughn, Rev. J. C. Wallace, Rev. M. M. Holmes, Rev. Wm. E. Scercy, W. A. Foster, Rev. C. C. McMasters, Rev. Paul E. Uhrig and Rev. U. N. Freeman.

After the tellers were appointed, we knelt for a moment of silent prayer, after which Bro. Surbrook prayed.

The following officers were elected:

Rev. Wm. S. Deal, District Superintendent.

Rev. H. B. Barger, Assistant District Superintendent.

Rev. J. A. Grout, District Secretary.

L. B. Gallimore, District Treasurer.

At this time we were favored with a special song by Rev. and Mrs. J. Byron Crouse, followed by an instrumental selection.

The following five advisory councilmen were elected: Rev. O. L. Ruth, Rev. T. R. York, Rev. W. F. Page, Rev. T. C. Vaughn, Rev. Wray J. Smith.

Rev. O. L. Ruth was re-elected to the Board of Examination. (3-year term.)

Rev. T. P. Ragland was re-elected to the Board of Education.

Rev. O. L. Ruth was re-elected as Bible School Field Representative.

Motion prevailed that Bro. Ruth also be made the school buyer or financial agent for the College, in addition to his other duties.

L. B. Gallimore was re-elected to the Board of Trustees. (5-year period.)

In addition to the District Superintendent, the College President and the Field Representative, the following were elected to the College Board of Directors:

Rev. T. P. Ragland (2 years), L. B. Gallimore (2 years), Rev. J. A. Grout (1 year), and Rev. H. B. Barger (1 year).

Rev. C. C. McMasters and Rev. T. C. Vaughn were re-elected to the Camp Meeting Board.

Rev. U. N. Freeman was re-elected Secretary-Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Board.

(Note: All officers of the Conference were elected on the first ballot.)

A motion prevailed to print 1,200 copies of the Conference minutes.

The Conference expressed its appreciation to Bro. Surbrook for presiding, as well as to all who had any part in making the Conference a success.

The Conference stood and sang the Doxology, after which Bro. Surbrook prayed the closing prayer.
