DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Thirty-Seventh Annual Conference of the North Carolina District, Pilgrim Holiness Church:

Greetings in Jesus' matchless name!

It is with deepest gratitude to God for His abundant blessings upon our work that we come to make this general survey and personal report. Inasmuch as the Pilgrim News Bulletin has been well received this year throughout the District and has kept our people well informed of the progress and developments from time to time, I shall omit as much detail as candor and justice to the occasion will permit.

SPIRITUAL WORK: God has blessed us with gracious revivals in many parts of the District. In many instances people have been praying through in regular services. We praise God for these revival seasons and refreshings from on high. Without these we cannot hope to succeed.

Generally speaking every department of our District work is in a healthy and progressive state. With conditions as we face them today, both in the world and in the church, we can rightfully praise God for the progress we have made. While we are not satisfied with present attainments in every case, yet reference to the various reports will show that we have every reason to rejoice for what has been accomplished.

MATERIAL PROGRESS: This, too, has been in evidence this year. The attempted brevity of this report permits only a casual mention of places and accomplishments. Albemarle has redecorated and painted the church and parsonage . . . Elkin has built a nice retaining wall and made other improvements . . . Erlanger has remodeled its church inside . . . Gold Hill has purchased a Sunday School bus . . . Fayetteville has installed bathroom facilities in the parsonage . . . Franklinville has completed several new Sunday School rooms . . . Burlington has liquidated its indebtedness on its new property and Greensboro First Church has done a beautiful job in its basement Sunday School Department and is planning a new church building program . . . Asheboro has moved its parsonage across the street in anticipation for its new church site where the parsonage once stood . . . Greensboro Second is installing new heating systems in both the church and parsonage and has made other improvements . . . High Point has purchased more parking space and made improvements otherwise . . . Mt. Zion (Davidson County) has added several new Sunday School rooms and is installing a heating plant . . . Hillsboro is raising money for a new church . . . Robbins parsonage has been redecorated in-

side . . . Reidsville has finished its parsonage and made some improvements . . . Siler City has liquidated the debt on its parsonage and it has been recently dedicated . . . Salisbury is planning an extensive remodeling program for their church building. . . . Thurmond has purchased a lot and plans to build a parsonage . . . Troy has added new Sunday School rooms and more auditorium space, and Winston-Salem continues to lay up treasures for a new church building in the not too distant future . . . The District parsonage has been redecorated inside and painted this year. Many other repairs, improvements, etc., have been made.

Our statistics will show that these improvements have amounted to more than \$32,000.00. The Treasurer's report of District financial progress will also be very interesting and gratifying.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS: Remarkable progress has been made in this department. Despite the weather and other winter setbacks we have marched ahead. The untiring efforts of our efficient Sunday School Secretary and Board and the hard work of pastors and Sunday School workers have not failed to produce results. The Sunday School Secretary's report will, I am sure, be most gratifying.

YOUTH WORK: In this department we have also made good progress. The Young People's Board last fall asked for a forward march in gaining new societies and the response as told in the Executive Secretary's report will be interesting, I am sure.

We are delighted with the results of our first District Young People's Conference. We feel this has been a step in the right direction. More of this will be brought out in the Secretary's report.

PILGRIM BIBLE COLLEGE: Our first school year was a very gracious success. We had a fine student body and they worked hard. We feel, however, that a large share of the credit goes to our good President and the capable faculty. Financially, we did well, also, coming out in excellent condition so far as operational costs are concerned. The Administration is to be highly commended for its wise handling of this matter. Our Field Representative also has done an excellent year's work as the reports will show.

We have recently been informed by the state educational department of North Carolina that we have been approved as an institution for the training of G. I.'s; and further, that our high school will be accredited before our next commencement. Thanks to those who worked so faithfully to obtain this standing for us as a School. An excellent faculty has been employed for the coming year and prospects are bright for a greater year than last.

CAMP MEETING: I am sure all of us are grateful for this beautiful new tabernacle. Through the hard work and planning of the Camp Meeting Board and the faithful giving of our people, we were able to begin this work with over \$4,500 on hand. Our good contractor placed the tabernacle here, getting it ready for us on time. Thanks to him and his fine crew of workmen. We must not forget, however, our financial obligation to him for the remaining several thousand dollars we owe on the building.

HOME MISSIONS: This has been a very favorable year in the Church Extension Department, in many respects. The Home Missionary Committee has worked hard. We have spent more time trying to build up the churches we already have than in digging out new ones.

The Whittier (Western N. C.) work has made remarkable progress. Bryson City parsonage has had a basement put under it, and bathroom facilities installed. The old Harmony church building has been turned over to the new church at Beulah to be sold and applied on their property. Mt. Tabor church property likewise is in process of liquidation, proceeds to go into the Loan Fund which will aid many churches from time to time. Harker's Island has completed its parsonage this year. They are not yet Pilgrims but have been of substantial aid to us in several ways. The church at Biscoe is in process of being moved to a better location. The work has taken on new life of late and numbers are being saved.

At Staley we have sold the old church building, proceeds to be applied on the new church. During the year a lovely little chapel with full basement Sunday School rooms to be completed, has been erected. The work is doing fine and prospects for a new church are in view. The Beulah church is nearing completion of a new seven room parsonage. Lenoir, also, has built a new parsonage this year. The Spray church has recently purchased a nice parsonage.

The work at Statesville did not prove successful and has therefore been discontinued for the time being. A new Sunday School has been started this year at Mooresville, and we hope for it a good future.

We are especially happy to report the organization of a new church at Midway Chapel, near Greensboro, with twenty charter members. Rev. Theo. A. Wyrick is to be highly commended for his hard work and faithful ministry in producing this church, under God, in the past four years.

Plans are under way for entering other territories and expanding wherever possible in the coming year. Pray for this needy work.

OUR LOSSES: Five noble soldiers of the cross and faithful servants of Jesus Christ have left the ranks of the church militant to join those of the church triumphant during the past year. I refer to the homegoing of Rev. Mrs. W. S. Gallimore, Miss Cornie Caudle, Miss Mattie Buchanan, Rev. M. A. Baldwin and Rev. J. Q. Ball. Two of them were taken so quickly, Sister Gallimore and Brother Ball. The latter was cut down in the height of the strength of his life and his sun has gone down at noon-day. But the Lord knoweth the best for us all and He doeth all things well. Further report will be heard from the Memoirs Committee.

PILGRIM BIBLE COLLEGE REPRESENTATIVE REPORT

To the Twenty-Seventh Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Greetings:

One fine year of school work has been completed by the Pilgrim Bible College, and we are looking forward for a greater year in 1947-48.

The enrollment to the present is very encouraging, also a fine faculty has been secured. With many problems that faced us last year out of the way, we feel the school should make great strides for God and His cause.

During the year we have visited the churches in the District, and Ministerial meetings and Camps in the Zone, also a number of individual churches. We have held 63 Bible School services; preached 78 times; done the buying for the school this year; raised in the churches \$8,418.81; outside regular church offerings \$2,405.00; for students' tuition \$450.00; and a loan fund of \$300.00 for worthy students has been started. Total money raised, \$11,573.81.

Also, a farm of 146 acres has been willed to the school this year, of which the school will receive two-thirds. Many items in equipment for the school and provisions have been donated this year.

We are also very thankful for the fine Thanksgiving offering which consisted of 550 cans of fruit, 235 pounds of dressed turkey, a good number of chickens, beef, potatoes, etc., which has not been estimated in the total.

During the year we have traveled 24,000 miles in the interest of the school. We have received \$2,000.00 salary, and been allowed \$500.00 for traveling expense.

ANNUAL YOUNG PEOPLE'S REPORT

The first North Carolina Pilgrim Holiness Young People's Convention was opened August 19, 1947, at 2:30 P. M., on the District Conference Grounds, with a devotional service under the direction of Rev. Paul E. Uhrig, Executive Secretary of the District Young People's Society. Rev. Uhrig led us in the opening song service. We were blessed by instrumental music and singing by Brother Pearce and his brothers, also Miss Rosa Jane Cashatt and Miss Grace Maull favored us with a duet.

Rev. Deal, our District Superintendent, introduced the speaker of the hour, Rev. J. C. Wallace, who gave a most timely message in the form of an inspirational challenge to the Local, Zone and District officers to reach and hold Young People for Christ.

Rev. Uhrig turned the business session over to our District Superintendent, Rev. Wm. S. Deal, as Chairman. After briefly presenting the purpose and plan of the first District Young People's Convention the following business was transacted.

The motion was made and carried that the first ten rows of seats in the tabernacle constitute the bar.

Members of local Young People's Societies between the ages of 12 and 35 years were declared eligible on the convention floor to share in the discussions and voting with the pastors and Young People's officers.

The motion was made and carried that young ministers of the District, with Local or District license or ordination, such as those in school or Evangelists or Singers in full time work, but not representing a local society, be included in the bar and given the privileges of the Convention.

The Convention requested the Chairman to appoint needed committees and the following were appointed:

Resolutions Committee: Paul E. Uhrig, Joseph C. Brown, U. N. Freeman and J. Frank Kernodle.

Ways and Means Committee: R. J. Rummage, L. L. Lange, Chas. L. Stout and Terry P. Ragland.

Reception Committee: McCray Holmes, J. A. Grout, Jr., and Clyde Parker.

It was announced that by the kindness of the District Council, meals were being furnished free for all attending this first Young People's Convention.

A report from the Young People's Board regarding a probable re-zoning of the District was withheld to allow the Resolutions Committee to recommend a resolution covering the question.

A motion was carried to present the names nominated by the Council for Executive Secretary at the evening session.

Rev. Deal admonished all to pray much and seek the mind of God for the evening business session.

The Convention recessed until 7:00 P. M., giving the committees time to work. We were adjourned with prayer by Clyde Parker.

EVENING SESSION

The second sitting of the Young People's Convention convened at 7:00 P. M., August 19, 1947, with an inspirational song service led by Brother Bob Loman. We were led in prayer by Rev. Lange after which we were favored by a special song by a young ladies' trio from Winston-Salem. A short but powerful sermonette was given by Rev. Paul E. They were given honorary seats within the Conference bar.

A report that there were 171 registrations in our Convention was thankfully received from the Registrars.

A report from the Resolutions Committee was given by Rev. Freeman, the Secretary of the Committee. Six resolutions were presented and adopted subject to the approval of the District Council.

We enjoyed a splendid rendition of "Oh Happy Day" by a male quartet, after which an offering was received to apply on the expense of the Young People's Convention.

Rev. Ragland, Secretary of the Ways and Means Committee, presented the Committee report of four resolutions. Resolution number one was adopted subject to the approval of the District Council. Number two was referred back to the Committee to redraft and present to the District Council. Number three was adopted as redrafted, also subject to the approval of the District Council. Number four was also adopted subject to the approval of the District Council.

A motion was carried designating a District Young People's Board to include the District Superintendent, Executive Secretary, Recording Secretary, Treasurer and the six Zone Chairmen.

The Chairman appointed tellers to serve during the election of officers.

A unanimous rising vote of thanks and appreciation was given Rev. Uhrig, Executive Secretary for the closing year.

A REPORT

To the North Carolina District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Greetings:

It is indeed a pleasure to bring to you a little report of the Lord's blessings and the progress made at Pilgrim Bible College during the past year.

From the very opening of the College last fall the clear evidence of God's smile and pleasure rested richly upon the work. To all who knew God and lived close to the workings of the College, it was definitely evident that the work was of God and that He was pleased to smile richly upon it. Although we had two scheduled revivals during the year, we had many occasions when the Holy Spirit came flooding in upon us and many hungry students sought the Lord in chapel, class rooms and dormitory. On the whole God gave us a grand year of deep spirituality and lasting Scriptural results.

The Lord gave us a choice faculty of very godly, hard-working, well-degree, self-sacrificing teachers and workers, for which we are very grateful. Their salaries, as well as all current bills, were paid to date when the College closed. Our faculty was not afraid of work or long hours, and manifested a beautiful spirit of cooperation while doing it. While most of our teachers are remaining with us, you will rejoice to know that the Lord has given us five new teachers, who, we confidently believe, will fit perfectly into our program for the Lord.

We are also very grateful for the splendid student body of choice students that the Lord gave us. We are expecting most of our old students to return. These, together with the large group of prospective students who are making application, should give us a splendid increase over our last year's enrollment of 140 students who were enrolled in all departments. If our student body is large enough to necessitate it, we shall place double-deck beds in the dormitory rooms and place from two to four students in a room.

ACCREDITATION

During the entire past year we have kept in touch with Dr. Highsmith of the State Department of Education at Raleigh, and have been constantly building along all lines for State accreditation in the high school, as well as approval to train ex-service men under the G. I. Bill of Rights. All necessary reports have been filed with the State, and the institution has been thoroughly inspected by the State Department of Education. The State Inspector advised us of some necessary changes and the Board of Directors has voted to take the necessary steps to meet the State's requirements for State accreditation.

Among other necessary steps, we shall have to enlarge our laboratory room. Our science equipment is all on hand and with the enlargement of the laboratory we shall have the best equipped laboratory of any school in the Church.

In reply to special appeals, and a long distance telephone call on July 23, Dr. Highsmith assured me that we have been granted the privilege of adult education under the G. I. Bill of Rights, and later he confirmed the same by letter. In the same telephone conversation he assured me that our high school will be accredited during the coming school year. This is good news, over which we should all rejoice.

One year ago our library shelves did not contain a single book, while today we have hundreds of very valuable books on hand. The assembly of these has been made possible by purchases as well as gifts from churches and friends. Possibly our greatest gift was the new and latest 30-volume set of the "Encyclopedia Americana" that was presented to the College by the Men's Bible Class of our

High Point church. Second to this was the new 15-volume set of "Compton's Encyclopedia" by Mrs. Leo Hinshaw of the Elkin church. Our Gold Hill church gave us some splendid books, and Rev. C. P. Pridgen of Ohio gave us a set of the "Encyclopedia Britannica." While several other friends donated some books, some of our churches gave funds with which to purchase others.

Several hundred new books of a special and selected type are still needed, and this will necessitate an expenditure of several hundred dollars more. We shall appreciate the prayers of the saints that we may have the funds to meet this real need in the near future.

Under the direction of the Board of Directors we have sought to advertise the College in three different Holiness papers. We have met with very gratifying success in advertising in the "American Holiness Journal" and the "Pentecostal Herald," while a small notice has been run in the Advocate.

Among other gifts that came to us during the year were two lovely pianos. The one was a gift from our friend Rev. W. R. Phillips, and the other was purchased by financial gifts from our faculty and students. These met a real need.

An Appreciation

While we are very grateful for the cooperation of our Board of Directors, and for our efficient Treasurer, we are indeed very grateful to God for our splendid field representative and buyer, Rev. O. L. Ruth. The fact he is so well known over the Church, and particularly in this Zone has greatly enhanced his value as a buyer and representative. As a result of his faithful and excellent services, we have been able to make some splendid progress. In the language of the Apostle Paul, we "have no man likeminded, who will naturally care . . ." for this work, so it is to be hoped that the Conference will keep him employed at this task.

While we are most grateful to all of our people and churches for their prayers, gifts and cooperation, there are three churches that seem to merit honorable mention as having given hundreds of dollars more to the College than the others. These three are Troy, High Point and Greensboro.

To God and our faithful Pilgrims we render our heartiest thanks. It has been the result of God's faithfulness, together with the prayers, sacrifices and liberal contributions of our people that we have been able to go forward as we have.

Permanency and success in schools, as well as in men, is the result of long years of careful training, planning, and building. There is every evidence that Pilgrim Bible College has a very promising, growing future.

Besides the pressing need of much prayer, and your continued cooperation, our next need is for more class room and auditorium space. May I request and urgently solicit your prayers for God's continued blessing upon Pilgrim Bible College.

STANDING RULES

DISTRICT AND CONFERENCE

- 1. We recommend that we pay at the rate of five cents per member per year for the Delegate Fund to the General Conference. (1938)
- 2. Be It Resolved: That our Ministerial Convention shall convene on Tuesday after the first Sunday in April each year until said date shall be changed by the District Conference. (1940)
- 3. As there is some expense in the performance of the duties of the District officials, we recommend that they be allowed three cents per mile when traveling in interest of the District. (1941)
- 4. The Council is authorized to formulate rules and regulations for the Camp Meeting and Conference. (1943)
- 5. Be It Resolved: That this Conference change the date of our Conference to Tuesday and Wednesday of the week that Camp begins. Any new officers elected at Conference will not take their places until the first Sunday of September. (1945)

Action of Conference of 1947 is that we have Conference on Wednesday before Camp begins.

- 6. Be It Resolved: That we as a Conference go on record as urging all churches of the District to be careful in electing delegates to the Conference and see that those who are elected are spiritual and that they conform to the standards of our Manual. (1945)
- 7. Be It Resolved: That a questionnaire prepared by the Council be sent to all ministers who belong to our Conference and who are working outside the District; these questionnaires to be returned one month previous to the District Conference.
- 8. Wherefore there is required considerable labor to compile our statistical report,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That our Statistician be paid the sum of \$25.00 per year, this amount to be in excess of expenses involved in preparing said report. If more than one person is appointed to execute this work, the sum of \$25.00 shall be divided between them.

9. Whereas there is no rule in the Manual nor yet in our Conference Standing Rules governing when the newly elected officers of a local church shall take over their duties; and whereas some new boards are beginning to operate following the close of our fiscal year, or the first of August, while others are waiting until after the Conference to take over their duties,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we interpret the Manual, Page 37, section 42, paragraph 1, so that new officers assume their duties the first of August. (1946)

10. Be It Resolved: That the District Council appoint two members from the College Board of Directors, along with the College President, to serve as an executive committee, minutes of such executive committee meetings to be approved by the College Board of Directors. (Council appointed Rev. O. L. Ruth and Rev. T. P. Ragland.) (1946)

STANDING RULES

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

- 1. Be It Resolved: That we give our District Superintendent and also ask the churches to give the pastors a two weeks' vacation with pay. (1941)
- 2. The District Superintendent is the Chairman of the Camp Meeting Board. (1943)
- 3. Whereas the Manual provides that the pastor may hold two revivals a year, Be It Resolved: That we grant the same privilege to our District Superintendent; (1943) and that he retain the offerings received from the same, and all other offerings from Home Missionary conventions. (1946)

STANDING RULES

COLLEGE

1. Whereas there has been a lot of work done and money raised looking forward to a Bible School,

Therefore, Be It Resolved:

- (a) That we open a Bible School in the fall of 1946.
- (b) That we elect a Board of five members, the Superintendent being chairman, and the School President an additional member.
- (c) That the Bible School Field Representative be a member of said Board.
- (d) That the Bible School opening in the fall of 1946 carry a minimum of four years high school and two years Bible.
- (e) That a Field Representative be employed for a period of twelve months each year.
- (f) That a Building Committee be elected to draw up plans for additional buildings to meet our requirements; said committee to be made up of two members from the Camp Meeting Board and two members from the Bible School Board. The committee shall report to the District Council and they shall have the final vote before any work is started.
- 2. We recommend to the District Conference a plan whereby our Bible School Board will be expanded to include representation from all the Districts of our Zone. The recommendation to the District Conference is as follows:

Whereas the Pilgrim Bible College is a fully recognized and accredited institution of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, having been authorized by the General Church, and

Whereas the General Board has allotted a definite patronizing zone for Pilgrim Bible College, and

Whereas we are grateful that the following Districts are comprehended in this Zone, namely, South Carolina, the Gulf States, and Tennessee,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we, the North Carolina Conference, upon recommendation of the College Board of Directors, urgently request that each of the above named Districts should have one official representative on the College Board, and further that said representative to be the District Superintendent;

Be It Further Resolved: That when, and if, the General Board should annex other territory as a patronizing zone that the same courtesy should be granted each District.

3. Whereas we face the grave danger of too great a change in our College Board of Directors in any one year,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the two receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected for two years and the other two shall be elected for but one year.

Be It Further Resolved: That from this year on we shall elect but two each year to serve two years.

STANDING RULES

CAMP

- 1. Be It Resolved: That this Conference organize a Camp Meeting Association by electing a Secretary-Treasurer and secure members who shall pay \$2.00 each for the first year, and \$1.00 per year thereafter. The duty of the Secretary-Treasurer shall be to keep a correct record of the membership, finances, etc., and disburse same as directed by the District Council. He shall make a report at each District Assembly. He shall also write to each member of the Association before the Camp opens, advising them of the date of the Camp, the evangelist and singers, and ask them for their dues. (1941)
- 2. Be It Resolved: That this Conference set a date for the Camp Meeting. (The Conference set the date for the Camp to begin on Friday night before the last two Sundays in August.) (1941)
- 3. Be It Resolved: That this Conference elect a Camp Meeting Board by secret ballot, said Board to have authority to secure workers, and raise and disperse money and promote the interest of the Camp Meeting. The District Superintendent shall be Chairman of said Board.

Since there is no stated time when the term of the Camp Meeting Board expires, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That a Camp Meeting Secretary and Treasurer be elected by this Conference and that his term shall expire at the next Annual Conference. Be It Further Resolved: That the eight additional members be elected as follows:

Two members for a period of four years Two members for a period of three years Two members for a period of two years Two members for a period of one year

and thereafter each year we are to elect two members for four years as the terms of the two members expire.

4. Be It Resolved: That each pastor solicit each of his members to join the Camp Meeting Association and that he collect or appoint one of his members to collect and send the money collected to the Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Association.

5. Whereas the report of the Camp Meeting Secretary-Treasurer could not be completed prior to the Conference,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That this report be completed at the close of the Camp Meeting, be approved by the District Council and inserted in the Minutes.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

- 1. Be It Resolved: That the District Council elect a Sunday School Board of four, including the Sunday School Secretary. The duties of the District Sunday School Board, in harmony with the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, shall be as follows:
 - The District Sunday School Board shall arrange an Annual Sunday School Convention to be held some time during the year.
 - To promote and encourage the Sunday School work throughout the District.
 - 3. To present an annual report to the District Conference which shall include the following:
 - (a) A statement of the work accomplished during the year.
 - (b) A statement of the general condition of the Sunday School work in the District.
 - (c) To recommend to the District Conference through the Ways and Means Committee the amount considered necessary to finance the District Sunday School work.
 - The District Sunday School Board shall be amenable to the District Council.
 - 5. The District Council shall have the right to remove, or cause to be removed, any member of the District Sunday School Board who, in the judgment of such Council, is not in harmony with the teaching of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
 - If for any reason there is a vacancy on the District Sunday School Board, the District Council, by a majority vote, may fill the vacancy.
 - 7. To have published each quarter a District Sunday School sheet showing the attendance of each Sunday School on the District for the month, the preceding month, and the attendance for the same quarter a year ago, as well as the average attendance for the year—this sheet to be sent to each pastor and Sunday School Superintendent in the District. (1943)
- 2. Whereas, our own District Sunday Schools are in need of finances to operate, and whereas our General Sunday School Rally offerings are very good,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That half of the General Sunday School Rally offerings be kept in our own District to promote the work of the Sunday School here.

STANDING RULES

HOME MISSIONS

- 1. We recommend that the birthday offering be used for the purpose of Church Extension, and that each pastor explain, encourage and push the offerings; however, we still retain the call card. (1942)
- 2. A Home Missionary Association shall be formed, made up of members to be secured by the District Superintendent as he makes his rounds. Each member is to pay \$1.00 when called upon, and not more than two calls per year. (1940)
- 3. In order to help relieve the load of home missionary responsibility placed upon the District Superintendent,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we elect an advisory committee of two members to work with the District Superintendent in all matters and details of District home missions. Said committee to function under and make recommendations to the Council. The Superintendent shall nominate and the Council ratify the nomination of the Superintendent of two persons to serve with himself as a committee on home missions. (1945)

4. Whereas, the established churches are requested to give a year's subscription to the Advocate and a copy of the Manual to each new member joining the church, and since no provision is made for new churches,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the District Home Missionary Department furnish a copy of the Manual and one year's subscription to the Advocate free to each family represented in the Charter membership of newly organized churches. (1946)

STANDING RULES

YOUNG PEOPLE

1. Whereas, our young people are one of the greatest assets of our Church, and to better serve the interest of their work,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the North Carolina District be divided into four zones, the same zone lines that have been set by the Sunday School Board, and officers appointed for each Zone by the Council upon recommendation by the Executive Secretary and District Superintendent. Details of organization, officers, meetings, etc., to be worked out by the Executive Secretary and Superintendent under the Council's direction.

RESOLUTIONS

1. Whereas it was voted by the last District Conference (1946) for the Bible College to assume the administration of Ministerial Study Courses,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That this work be begun as of September this year.

2. Whereas there is no uniform method of revising the Sunday School enrollment,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That each church revise their Sunday School roll each quarter, and be it further resolved that no one be dropped from the roll until they have missed at least five consecutive Sundays and have been visited by Sunday School officials.

3. Whereas our Church has touched a very small part of North Carolina.

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That our District Council be empowered to purchase a portable tabernacle and to employ a home missionary worker who shall work under the direction of the District Council, and shall be amenable to the District Council; said worker to be paid from home missionary funds.

4. Because of the continual election of the same officers each year,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the Conference Minutes of the previous year not be used during the election of officers.

- 5. Be It Resolved: That we allow space in the District Minutes for our Young People's Minutes and officers' names.
- 6. Inasmuch as there is a need that the College Board of Directors' powers and duties be more fully outlined than they are set forth in the Minutes,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That there be a committee consisting of at least five members appointed by the District Council to outline the duties and powers of the said Board. (See p.p. 45, 46.)

(The Council met in session as asked by this Conference and elected the following committee to pass upon the duties and powers of the College Board of Directors. They are T. P. Ragland, Carl E. Hightower, T. R. York, U. N. Freeman, Wray J. Smith, O. L. Ruth, W. L. Surbrook. In connection with this resolution, the District Council recommended that due to the large task asked of these brethren, they shall carefully carry out this order and return their recommendations to the District Council for ratification. Further, motion carried that their final decision be placed in the Minutes.)

7. Inasmuch as we did not reach our goal of 300 membership gain above losses (however, we did reach a fine record),

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we set a more moderate gain and strive to reach this goal, that is a goal of 200 new members this year.

8. Inasmuch as the Manual does not provide any time when local license of ministers shall be renewed,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That this Conference adopt the policy that they be required to be sent to the District Superintendent with a recommendation from the local church board, for renewal at each Annual Conference, and further, that any such license not renewed by recommendation of the local church board shall be null and void.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

- 1. We recommend that the salary of our District Superintendent be raised to \$3,000.00 a year.
 - 2. We recommend a budget of 15% broken down as follows:

District Budget	7%
Bible College	5%
Loan Fund	1%
Home Missions	

- 3. We recommend that the salary of the Home Missionary Worker be determined by the District Council.
- 4. We recommend that each local Young People's Society or church endeavor to raise in a free will offering a minimum of five dollars to be used in defraying the expense of the next District Young People's Convention. Said offering to be raised before the first of May, 1948.
- 5. Whereas, this property is owned by the North Carolina District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, but its use or operation involves a three-way interest, namely, District Conference, Camp Meeting and Bible School, each with their respective treasurer but feeling the need for closer coordination between the departments in the matter of sharing in expense items incidental to operation,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we adopt a pro-rated basis between the three groups for paying operational expense, repairs and insurance. We further recommend that the percentage basis adopted be as follows:

Bible	School	50%
Camp	Meeting	25%
Dist.	Conference	25%

(Recommendation from Committee appointed by Council.)

6. Whereas, the North Carolina Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church owes a large sum of money on buildings and improvements of said Conference at Kernersville, N. C.,

Be It Therefore Resolved: That we authorize the District Council to borrow sufficient money and mortgage said property and pay such amounts not later than December 1, 1947. Terms and payment of said loan to be left to the District Council and lenders.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

The Thirty-Seventh Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church opened at 10 A. M., August 20, 1947, on the District Grounds, with Rev. C. C. McMasters leading the songs, "I Will Sing of My Redeemer" and "What a Friend We Have in Jesus." Rev. H. B. Barger, our Assistant District Superintendent, voiced the sentiments of the Conference in praising God for bringing us together after another twelve months for this our 37th Conference.

We were led in prayer by Rev. P. H. Greeson and Rev. O. L. Ruth, after which Mrs. Eula Bryson sang for us "I Have Been Born Again." Her singing was blessed of the Lord and several testimonies followed.

In the absence of our General Superintendent, Rev. L. W. Sturk, who was not able to be here for the opening session, our District Superintendent, Rev. W. S. Deal, spoke briefly on "The Preservation of the Church," reading for the lesson II Timothy 2:1-15. In his address, Brother Deal pointed out that if the Church is to be preserved,

- We must conserve the doctrines of the Church, for the doctrines are the foundation and backbone of the Church.
- We are to preserve the Church by raising up in its midst faithful men who will preach its doctrines and stand by its standards.
- 3. If we are to preserve the Christian Church, we shall do so by holding the New Testament standards of conduct and piety, not formalism on the one side and narrowness on the other. Christ-likeness should be our standard of conduct.

In conclusion he pointed out the rewards in this life and in the life to come for our being faithful in these matters.

The Conference bar was fixed to include the first nine rows of the tabernacle and the entire platform.

The Secretary called the roll of ministers, deaconesses and lay delegates.

A motion prevailed that the hours of business be from 9 A. M. to 12 M., from 2 P. M. to 5 P. M., and from 7 P. M. to 9 P. M.; also that meals be at 7:30 A. M., 12 M., and 5 P. M.

The Secretary read the names of the ministers being received into this Conference from other districts These were as follows:

Ordained: Rev. Kenneth Davis, Kentucky District; Rev. P. H. Greeson, Immanuel Missionary Church; Rev. R. S. Shelton, South Carolina District; Rev. F. W. Henry, California District; Mrs. F. W. Henry, California District.

Ordained Deaconess: Mrs. R. S. Shelton, South Carolina District. Licensed Minister: Rev. H. P. Alexander, Virginia District.

Inasmuch as our General Superintendent could not arrive until late afternoon, and since there was so much committee work to be done, a motion carried that we recess until the call of the Chair.

Motion carried to extend the time long enough to hear an announcement of where and when the various committees would meet.

Recessed for lunch.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The second sitting of the Conference convened at the call of the Chair at 3:30 P. M. Rev. J. Frank Kernodle led us in singing, "He Lives," after which Rev. R. I. McCluskey and Rev. J. B. Fulp led us in prayer. At this time our General Superintendent, Rev. L. W. Sturk, arrived on the grounds, and was welcomed by all. Brother Sturk brought greetings from the official family of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, including Rev. W. H. Neff, Rev. A. H. Wilson, Rev. R. G. Flexon, Rev. R. A. Beltz, Rev. S. M. Stikeleather, Rev. E. V. Halt, Rev. P. F. Elliott, Rev. P. W. Thomas, and members of the General Board.

The Reception Committee brought before the Conference the following visitors: Rev. P. F. Elliott, Rev. P. H. Greeson, and Rev. and Mrs. Frank Henry.

The Committee on Resolutions and Ways and Means reported. Three Resolutions were accepted. (1, 2 and 3.)

The District Superintendent read his recommendations to the Conference for their thought and consideration.

Conference recessed for supper.

EVENING SESSION

The third sitting of the Conference convened at 7 P. M., with Rev. Paul Uhrig leading the song service, after which Rev. P. F. Elliott, our General Sunday School Secretary, led us in prayer. We were then favored with a song by Rev. Bob Loman, his selection being "A Child of the King."

Rev. Sturk, our General Superintendent, then brought an address to the Conference. Reading several verses of scripture from Matthew 16, he spoke on the subject, "My Heart's Desire for Our Church," or "The Things Upon Which the Success of Our Church Depends."

He stressed the points that our Church must be:

A spiritual Church. We must be spirit filled and godly. This
is our only hope as a Church, and though we cannot excel in
wealth, politics, etc., we can excel in spiritual lives.

- 2. Our Church must be a united Church. This was most aptly illustrated by the scripture that one can put a thousand to flight, and two can put ten thousand to flight. On the day of Pentecost they were all of one accord.
- 3. Our Church must be an unworldly Church. Not only in outward manifestations but chiefly in the spirit of unworldliness in the heart. If we are to succeed as a Pilgrim Holiness Church, we have to cut loose from the world.
- Our Church must be a loyal Church. Loyal to each other, loyal to Christ and loyal to our leadership. We must stand by one another.

At the conclusion of this fine address, the Secretary called the roll of ministers and lay delegates and the necessary corrections were made.

Reception Committee presented to the Conference the following visitors: Mrs. P. F. Elliott, wife of our General Sunday School Secretary; Rev. R. R. Massey, Greensboro, N. C., and Rev. Kenneth Davis from the Kentucky District.

At this time we heard the splendid report of the District Superintendent, which was heartily received by the Conference.

Motion carried that the election of officers be the first thing after dinner on Thursday, August 21.

Conference recessed by expiration of time.

MORNING SESSION

The fourth sitting of the Conference was opened at 9 A. M. After the song service, which was led by Rev. U. N. Freeman, we were led in prayer by Rev. Marvin Cockman. Rev. and Mrs. Paul E. Uhrig sang "Thank God, He Lifted My Load."

Our General Superintendent brought us a brief devotional message on unity. His text was John 17:21, "That they all may be one; as thou, Father, art in me, and I in thee, that they also may be one in us, that the world may believe that thou hast sent me." At the conclusion of Brother Sturk's message, the minutes of the previous sittings were read and approved.

Motion carried that we dispense with the calling of the roll throughout the remainder of the Conference.

Our District Superintendent presented to the Conference a new church, organized with twenty members, at Midway Chapel, Greensboro. Motion carried that this new church be received into the Conference.

The Reception Committee presented the following visitors to the Conference: Rev. Clyde Smith, Greensboro; Rev. H. P. Alexander,

Virginia; Rev. J. Paul Hill, Pastor of First Wesleyan Church, High Point, and Secretary of the State Holiness Association, and Rev. W. C. Lovin, President of the North Carolina Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, and fraternal delegate from said church. Each of these men gave a brief testimony, after which a motion carried to grant them an honorary seat in the Conference bar. Motion carried that following the reading of the reports, we hear from Rev. Lovin, fraternal delegate from the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

The Auditor's report was read and accepted.

The District Treasurer's report was read and accepted with a rising vote of thanks.

The Conference expressed to the District Superintendent by a rising vote of thanks their appreciation for his splendid report given previously.

The Statistical report was read and accepted.

The Sunday School Secretary's report was read and accepted.

The Young People's Executive Secretary's report was read and accepted.

The College Field Representative's report was read and accepted. In the absence of Rev. W. L. Surbrook, President of Pilgrim Bible College, his report was read by Rev. Carl Hightower and received by the Conference.

A rising vote of thanks was given to the President of the College and the faculty for the splendid work done in the school during the year.

Motion carried that the Conference express their appreciation by a rising vote of thanks to all who had prepared the reports so ably given.

At this time, Rev. W. C. Lovin, fraternal delegate from the Wesleyan Church, addressed the Conference briefly on "Our Responsibility as a Church," pointing out that our duty was (1) winning souls to Christ; (2) keeping people saved, and (3) combatting the sins and evils abroad in the land.

He also brought greetings from the North Carolina Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. Brother Deal, our District Superintendent, in turn expressed appreciation for the fine address given.

Motion carried to extend the time ten minutes.

Motion previously carried that we have the election of officers at the 2 o'clock sitting of the Conference on Thursday, August 21, was ruled out of order, and the time for election of officers was set for 7 o'clock.

Rev. W. C. Lovin dismissed with prayer.

Recessed for lunch.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The fifth sitting of the Conference opened at 2 P. M., with Rev. Bob Loman leading the song service. After prayer we were favored with a special song by Rose Jane Cashett and Grace Muhl,

Our General Superintendent, Rev. L. W. Sturk, addressed the Conference briefly in a devotional service, on the necessity of being anointed with the Spirit, lest there be any friction; and pointing out that there is only one purifying, but many anointings for service.

Resolutions Committee reported. (4, 5, 6, 7 and 8 carried.)

Reception Committee presented to the Conference the following visitors: Rev. R. S. Shelton, who came into our Conference from South Carolina; Rev. and Mrs. Claire Elkins, pastors of the Nazarene Church, Burlington.

Motion carried to extend the time until 5:30 in order that Rev. P. F. Elliott might present to the Conference the Pilgrim Pension plan.

Dismissed with prayer by Rev. L. W. Sturk. Recessed for supper.

EVENING SESSION

The sixth sitting of the Conference opened at 7 P. M. with Rev. Joseph Brown leading the song service. Rev. R. I. McCluskey prayed. This hour had been set aside for a Memorial Service. Rev. Sturk sang "Afterward." Rev. McCluskey spoke briefly on the life of Mrs. W. S. Gallimore, one of the ministers of our Conference, and Rev. Way spoke on the life of Rev. M. A. Baldwin and Rev. J. Q. Ball. Mrs. Saunders read "In Loving Memory" and called the names of those who had gone from our midst during the past year. Mrs. Eula Bryson and Mrs. Lloyd Gallimore sang "The Lights of Home." Rev. Sturk asked that we stand and sing "Amazing Grace," and in the singing of this old hymn waves of glory and blessings came upon the conference. Shouts of victory and testimonies were heard.

Brother Sturk spoke briefly, encouraging the Church to keep on in the old-fashioned way and to keep the fire burning.

Motion carried to set aside the order of the day long enough to look after certain matters necessary before the election of officers.

Ways and Means Committee reported. (1 carried.)

Motion carried to adopt the recommendation of the District Council to receive the following ministers into the Conference:

Ordained: Rev. Clyde Smith, Rev. R. R. Massey.

First Year Conference License: Walter Van Howard, J. C. Pick-erell, Clyde Parker, Roy Lee Grant, Claude T. Bullock:

The District Superintendent appointed the following tellers and we proceeded with election of officers: Rev. T. C. Vaughn, Rev. U. N. Freeman, Rev. Bob Loman, Rev. R. J. Hobbs, Rev. D. R. Saunders, Rev. Paul E. Uhrig, Rev. L. L. Lange and W. A. Foster.

There were no elections at the evening session, so a motion carried to wait until Friday morning to proceed with election of officers.

Brother Sturk prayed the dismissal prayer.

MORNING SESSION

The seventh sitting of the Conference opened at 9 A. M., with Rev. Wallace leading us in singing "What a Friend We Have in Jesus." Brother Hightower prayed.

Brother Sturk read from Ezekiel 9:1-6, and spoke briefly on the responsibility of pastors, preachers and leaders to the Church, stressing the fact that our Church will be just what our preachers and leaders make it.

The following telegram of greetings to the Conference was received:

Brown City, Mich. Aug. 22, 1947.

N. C. Conference of the P. H. Church:

Greetings to the Conference. We are praying God will give you a gracious and victorious Conference. (Signed) W. L. and Mrs. Surbrook.

This telegram of greeting was received by the Conference with gratitude.

Motion carried to set aside the order of the day (election of officers) for fifteen minutes until the people all get to the tabernacle.

Motion carried that this Conference ratify the action of the General Board, increasing the general budget from \$3.00 to \$4.00. (Our General Superintendent presented this matter to the Conference.)

Motion carried that we as a Conference accept and put into operation the Pilgrim Pension Plan, and that we ask all of our churches and ministers to participate.

Motion carried authorizing the District Council to study this Pension Plan with reference to our evangelists, Bible School employees and all others not covered.

Motion carried to purchase insecticide and spray rooms. Rev. D. R. Saunders appointed by District Superintendent to look after this matter.

Motion carried to proceed with election of officers.

The following officers were elected:

Rev. Wm. S. Deal, District Superintendent.

Rev. H. B. Barger, Assistant District Superintendent.

Rev. J. A. Grout, District Secretary.

The Reception Committee presented the following visitors: Rev. and Mrs. Leon Adams, St. Louis, Mo.; Rev. Herbert Donnelly, Superintendent of S. C. Work; Rev. Boyd Kissler, Pastor, Wesleyan Methodist Church, Asheboro, N. C.

Motion carried that these be given honorary seats in Conference bar.

The Conference gave to our General Superintendent, Rev. L. W. Sturk, a rising vote of thanks for his untiring efforts in presiding over our Conference. (His leaving before Conference was over was necessary in order to fill another engagement.)

Dismissed with prayer by Rev. L. W. Sturk.

Recessed for lunch.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The eighth sitting of the Conference opened at 1:45 with Bob Loman leading us in singing "I Will Sing the Wondrous Story" and "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms." We were led in prayer by Rev. Leroy Adams, after which we proceeded with business.

The following five advisory councilmen were elected: Rev. Wray J. Smith, Rev. T. C. Vaughn, Rev. T. R. York, Rev. D. R. Saunders, Rev. W. F. Page.

The Conference expressed to Brother O. L. Ruth, by a rising vote of thanks, their appreciation for his long years of service on the District Council.

Rev. Carl E. Hightower was elected to the Board of Education, three year term.

Rev. Wray J. Smith was re-elected to the Examining Board for a three year term.

Rev. J. A. Grout was re-elected to the College Board of Directors, two year term.

Rev. D. R. Saunders was elected to the College Board of Directors, two year term.

Nothing pertaining to election, so we proceeded with election.

Motion carried that the Conference employ a full time Field Representative for the College, said representative to work under direction of the District Council; that the matter of buyer for the school be referred to the College Board of Directors and the District Council.

Motion carried to leave the salary of the Field Representative the same, but leave the traveling expenses unspecified, thus making it salary plus traveling expenses.

Rev. O. L. Ruth was re-elected as College Field Representative. Ways and Means Committee reported and several of their recommendations passed.

Recessed until 9 A. M., Saturday, August 23.

MORNING SESSION

The ninth sitting of the Conference opened at 9 A. M., with Brother Holmes leading the song service, after which Rev. Walter Cockman prayed. Rev. W. S. Deal read a short scripture and spoke briefly, after which we proceeded with the election of officers.

Motion carried that we elect the Secretary-Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Association prior to election of the two members whose term expired.

Rev. U. N. Freeman re-elected Secretary-Treasurer of Camp Meeting Association.

Rev. Paul E. Uhrig and Rev. T. P. Ragland were elected to the Camp Meeting Board, each for a term of four years.

Rev. R. I. McCluskey was re-elected to the Board of Trustees (five year term).

Motion carried to have a prominent announcement printed in the District Minutes of our Conference, Ministerial Meeting and Camp Meeting, and that each of these be advertised well in advance. Ministerial Meeting: Tuesday after the first Sunday in April.

Conference: To convene on Wednesday preceding the opening of the Camp Meeting.

Camp: August 20-29.

Motion carried to extend the time until through with business. Motion carried that a committee be appointed to report to the District Council in connection with the college church, regarding plans for a new building; and that the Council be empowered to implement the program when it deems it advisable, including a referendum if deemed necessary.

Motion carried that the Kernersville church to be built be known as the Louella Teague Gallimore Memorial Church.

Motion to adjourn, and the Conference was dismissed with prayer.

IN LOVING MEMORY

Our District has suffered this year the loss of four of its ministers. The home-going of Rev. Mrs. W. S. Gallimore was a shock to most of her many friends, it came so unexpectedly. This faithful mother in Israel contributed a gracious bounty to the work of Christ in this District. Her holy character, noble life and blessed spirit were both an example and exhortation to all who knew her. Her works cannot here be enumerated, but they were many and far-reaching.

After a long and successful Christian life, Rev. M. A. Baldwin, senior minister of the District, was called to report for "higher duties" by our great Captain of the Lord's host. He answered the summons with great calm and rejoicing. Brother Baldwin's years

of faithful service to the Church as pastor, evangelist, District Superintendent and counsellor of young and older Christians cannot be estimated in value. Early in its history, he gave of his best to its noble cause, and was a faithful standard bearer until the last.

Also from our ranks Miss Cornie Caudle was called this year. Sister Caudle, so quiet and unassuming, "went about doing good" as did the blessed Master. She spent several years of service as a missionary to India. The price she paid was ill health throughout the most of the remainder of her life. But she ceased not to do her faithful bit by the cause she loved so dearly. Doubtless her reward will be rich and great.

Suddenly the death angel took from our midst one of our younger ministers, Rev. J. Q. Ball, just before Conference. He had been a successful pastor for a few short years, but in this time he had accomplished a great amount of good for the Lord. He was pastor of Franklinville and Mt. Olivet when called home. Why he should have been called so early we cannot tell, but we know that "Jesus doeth all things well."

DUTIES AND FOWERS OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE PILGRIM BIBLE COLLEGE AS PASSED UPON BY THE

N. C. DISTRICT COUNCIL ON NOVEMBER 11, 1947

- 1. Whereas Pilgrim Bible College, located near Kernersville, N. C., is owned and largely financed by the N. C. District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, therefore be it resolved that the Board of Directors of the Pilgrim Bible College shall be empowered with the responsibility of operating said College under the direction of the N. C. Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Said Board is to carry out the rules and policies of said Conference.
- 2. The College Board of Directors shall employ the President, set his salary, and term of employment, subject to the approval of the District Council.
 - (a) The College Board shall outline his duties and services to be rendered.
 - (b) The President shall be amenable to the College Board of Directors.
- 3. All faculty members, workers, and employees who are employed by the College shall be employed by the College Board of Directors.
 - (a) Such workers may be recommended to the College Board by the Executive Committee.
 - (b) The President may recommend such workers to the Executive Committee.
 - (c) No member of the faculty may be dismissed except by a two-thirds vote of the College Board.
 - (d) The President shall not be dismissed during his tenure of office except by a two-thirds vote of the College Board and the approval of the N. C. District Council.
- 4. There shall be two regular meetings of the Board of Directors annually. The Board shall set the dates.
 - (a) A special meeting of the Board may be called by the Chair, or by the President requesting the Chair to call such a meeting, or by a request of the majority of the Board members.
 - (d) Due to the distance of some of the out-of-state Board members, be it resolved that business needing attention between the semi-annual meetings shall be handled by the members of the N. C. section of said Board.

- 5. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be:
- (a) To handle all matters of minor nature concerning the operation of the College between meetings of the College Board.
- (b) To make recommendations to the College Board concerning any, and all matters pertaining to the welfare of the College.
- (c) To make recommendations as to faculty members as in Rule No. 3, paragraph a.
- (d) To secure speakers for special occasions of the school; to issue any special advertising for such services.
- 6. A financial report by the Operating Fund Treasurer for Pilgrim Bible College shall be given at the semi-annual meetings of the Board, and the same shall be submitted to the District Treasurer.
- 7. The College Board of Directors shall authorize the issuance of a catalogue and other printed advertising and publicity for the College, except student publications which shall be under the direction of the President and faculty.
