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District Superintendent's Report

To the thirty-eighth Annual Conference of the North Carolina District, of the Filgrim Holiness Church,

Greetings in the name of our all conquering Christ!

It is with deep joy and humble gratitude to God that we come today to submit this survey of District work and conditions and personal report. The Lord has blessed us greatly this year. His blessings have been showered down upon every department of our work. There have been times of distress and sorrow, times of difficulties and problems; but there have also been times of "refreshing from the presence of the Lord," times when the solutions of problems and the way out of difficulties were made known by the only One who can meet our every need and cause us to triumph even in Christ Jesus.

SPIRITUAL PROGRESS: This has been a good year in the churches in general. Gracious revival fires have burned upon most of their altars. Many have been saved and sanctified and a good number have united with our churches. It is heartening indeed in times like these to see so many new people being saved and sanctified and uniting with our churches. Asheboro has the honor of leading the churches in membership increase this year. They have received during the Conference year fifty-three new members, practically all of whom it is reported were saved in their revivals or regular services of the church. Numbers of other churches also made unusual gains for which we thank the Lord. The next highest percentage reported is Elkin where a 44% gain was reported. As a District we have made reasonably good membership gains.

I am especially happy to report that we as a District appear to be in a very good condition, spiritually. I have had very little occasion to visit churches this year where disrupting conditions threatened the welfare of the church. While we praise the Lord for this it is nevertheless true that we can all stand to press up a little closer to the precious Lord. Yet, it is a joy to report that spiritual progress is in evidence in a general way throughout our work.

Since Pilgrim News Bulletin and Carolina Pilgrim have kept our people well informed of the vorious projects, I shall confine this report to a mere mention of items of interest.

TEMPORAL ADVANCEMENT: In this realm we have not been without signal blessings from God. Albemarle has redecorated its parsonage . . . Asheboro broke all S. S. records this year and will soon be forced to build . . . Bagley Swamp has added four beautiful S. S. rooms to their church, increasing the auditorium, and are also installing a new heating system . . . Beulah has painted its parsonage . . . Burlington has moved into the lovely basement quarters of the new church and plans to finish the structure as early as possible . . .

Durham has purchased pews and made other improvements . . . Elkin has excavated its basement in preparation for four new S. S. rooms . . . Hillsboro is in the opening phases of building a new church. High Point has completely remodeled its auditorium and made other needed repairs at a cost of thousands of dollars . . . Mebane has redecorated its parsonage and made considerable other improvements and repairs . . Mt. Zion Dav. Co.) has done considerable work toward completion of its large new S. S. department and also installed a new heating system . . . Mt. Zion in Moore Co., has installed a new lighting system in its church . . . Robbins has painted their parsonage, secured a S. S. bus and placed new pews in their church at a cost of hundreds of dollars.

Randleman has purchased a nice S. S. bus, redecorated its parsonage, and is still raising funds for a new one . . . Salisbury plans to build a large addition to their church, fronting the main street . . . Sawyersville has been working toward completion of their S. S. rooms . . . Siler City has made several hundred dollars worth of improvements on their parsonage . . . St. Paul is building some new S. S. rooms and rock veneering their church . . . Thurmond has built a new parsonage and Winston-Salem plans to launch a building program for a large new church in the near future. If any other major improvements have been overlooked we are not aware of it.

Financially, our District has done very well. The Treasurer's report will reflect two things: that we have had a considerably heavy expenditure, especially on Conference Property indebtedness; second, but that otherwise, all our obligations have been met, and had all churches paid budgets in full, we could have operated within our income with a slender margin to the good. Pastor's salaries have been raised several thousand dollars and thousands of dollars more have been spent on improvements.

OUR SUNDAY SCHOOLS: Many Sunday Schools have made excellent gains this year. The Secretary's report will disclose an over all gain this year for the third consecutive year. The poliomyelitis epidemic greatly handicapped the general average gain, it should be pointed out, and retarded us considerably during the last few weeks of the Conference year. Otherwise, we had a remarkable year in Sunday School work. The Sunday School Board and all the pastors and Sunday School workers who so faithfully cooperated are to be highly commended.

OUR YOUTH WORK: This has been one of the best years this department has ever had. The attendance at Rallies has been exceptionally good and the programs offered were fine. The new setup has proved very effective and successful.

The gracious Youth Convention just preceeding this Conference speaks of the enthusiasm and spiritual fervor of our young people. May God grant us the greatest year this department has ever witnessed.

PILGRIM BIBLE COLLEGE: The College has had a wonderful year in the Lord, both spiritually and temporally. The Acting President's report will disclose some very interesting things along this line. We praise God, and hereby express gratitude to our former President and all others who were concerned, for that fact that our high school was fully accredited by the State Department of Education just prior to the commencement last spring. Financially, we did very well, also, as the reports will show. We appreciate the good work of our Field Representative in raising funds this year.

We regret the loss of our former President, Dr. W. L. Surbrook. The College Board recalled him unanimously and arranged for a raise in salary. Upon his resignation sometime afterwards, the College Board endeavored to persuade him to reconsider and remain with us, but he did not feel inclined to do so. He has accepted the presidency of our school at Owosso, Michigan and we wish him the best of success in his new field of labor. Upon Dr. Surbrook's resignation, the College Board of Directors, unanimously elected Rev. Terry P. Ragland as Vice-President and asked him to act for the coming year. The District Council unanimously sustained this action. Brother Ragland assumed his duties this summer and has been working diligently in preparation for school opening. At present the prospects for our school this year are very encouraging and the future looks bright.

CAMP MEETING INTERESTS: At the close of last year's camp, only a comparatively small indebtedness remained on this lovely tabernacle, which has not been cared for by cash or pledges. You will recall that it cost something over \$10,000. It was remarkable how people came to our aid in lifting this obligation. We now owe only about \$1,000.00 which we expect to see cleared from the books this fall by God's help. We are looking forward to a truly great camp this year.

Home Missions and Church Extension: This department has made a good contribution to the work of the District this year. Our work this year is not so prominent as in some years passed, but none the less constructive. After thorough investigation and consideration the District Council saw that we could not possibly build a portable tabernacle and secure a full time home missionary worker with the limited means financially at our disposal. We could not feel clear to obligate the District in an indebtedness to do so; therefore, the matter had to be postponed. However, we did the next nearest thing which we could do by purchasing a 40x60 tent in good condition and complete equipment, except piano, for the very reasonable sum of \$700.00. It has been and will be put to good use in forwarding the cause of church extension.

The church at Biscoe has been moved recently into the heart of town. The Aileen Mills Co. gave us a lot and paid the equivalent of half the moving bill. The church has been resituated and is in good condition. This District Home Missionary tent was pitched there and

Rev. Chas. L. Stout and Misses Imogene Jacobs, Mariam Scott and Nannie Mae Segers, assisted by others at various times conducted a a fine meeting there. This resulted in 10 new members for the church there, putting the church back on the map, which is almost the equivalent of organizing a new work.

The western N. C. work has done well under the leadership of Brother Donnelly this year.

The home missionary department also sponsored a meeting for the Hickory church this summer.

Rev. C. A. Bost has worked untiringly at Mooresville and now has a nice cement block church with two S. S. rooms on which only a reasonable amount of indebtedness left. Rev. Wm. E. Scercy held a successful revival there this summer. Prospects look good for a new church there this coming year.

Plans are under way for a tent campaign at Gastonia immediately following Conference, sponsored by the department and conducted by Rev. Wm. E. Scercy and others, for the purpose of digging out a new church there. Prospects are reported to be very favorable. Plans are also made for another tent campaign at Staley immediately after camp sponsored by the department, for the purpose of putting that church on its feet.

It is hoped that for the coming spring and summer the schedule can be arranged and workers secured as early this fall as possible so that the department will have the advantage of knowing exactly what, where and who in its moves. We must, and by God's help we will, reach out into more new territory in the coming year.

I wish to express to all of you my deepest appreciation for your kindness and cooperation. I have had beautiful cooperation from all the District Boards and the pastors and people of the District in general for which I am humbly grateful to God and to you.

May God's smile and blessing ever rest upon the great North Carolina District as she marches forward with Christ to greater things.

District Sunday School Report

To the Thirty-Eighth Annual Conference of the North Carolina Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church:

Greetings:

There is possibly no other department of the church which relies more on statistics than the Sunday School Department. The attendance is checked every week and posted in the most of our schools. Some of our schools have broken all time records while others have had a struggle and some have suffered a loss. However, in fairness to all, I think we should consider TWO outstanding set backs which the Sunday Schools have suffered. First, some of our schools have been affected by the polio situation, both in the opening and closing months of the Conference year. Second, we experienced one of the most difficult winters recorded in many years. Roads were closed or practically closed for weeks in some sections of the state. One or two of our schools did not have services for weeks due to the road conditions

Quarterly reports have been sent out giving a comparative view of the same quarter of the preceding year. We have conducted Zone Conventions at Liberty, Mebane, Winston-Salem, Kannapolis, and Erlanger. The attendance has been pleasing and the spirit very encouraging. We held a district wide union Sunday School convention under the Pilgrim Tabernacle at Randleman on July 5, with the Wesleyan Methodist church and the People's Methodist church participating. Rev. W. S. Deal brought the main message in the morning and Rev. Burton Jessup of the People's Methodist church, and Rev. W. C. Lovin of the Wesleyan Methodist church, spoke in the afternoon. The Holy Spirit set His seal upon the convention and plans are now under way to have a union convention on a larger scale next year.

I wish to express my appreciation to the Sunday School board, Rev. W. A. Way, Rev. C. C. McMasters and Rev. Frank Henry, for their cooperation and assistance in the work, We are also indebted to the pastors and Sunday School workers for their cooperation and consideration. We feel that our people are seeing the possibilities in the Sunday School work as never before.

Annual Young People's Convention Report

The Second Annual Youth Convention of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened under the tabernacle at the Conference grounds on Tuesday morning, August 17, 1948, at 10:30, Rev. Wm. S. Deal presiding. The song service was under the direction of Bro. Bob Loman, and began with the singing of "He Lives." Miss Mary Smith was at the piano.

The devotions were conducted by Brother Deal, reading the 12th chapter of Ecclesiastes. Splendid comments were made as words of explanation and exposition. Numerous prayer requests were made, after which the convention was led in prayer by Rev. Georga Farah of the Michigan District.

Rev. Joseph C. Brown, District Executive Secretary, was presented to the Convention. He in turn recognized the zone chairmen and pastors present.

A splendid report of the youth work was given by the District Superintendent to the convention.

Motion carried that the first eight rows of the two center sections of the tabernacle and the platform constitute the bar.

Brother Brown then spoke briefly as to the work in general, then presented th zone chairmen who gave short reports of their work.

The District Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The following committees were appointed by the District Superintendent:

Resolution Committee: George Burris, Joseph C. Brown, Kermit Farlow and Carlee Bost.

Ways and Means Committee: H. P. Alexander, McCray Holmes, H. Donnelly and Odell Burr.

Reception Committee: J. F. Kernodle and Eugene Smith.

Motion carried to take two offerings during the day to coverentire cost of meals for everyone during the convention.

Recess for lunch.

Registration was called for in rear of tabernacle.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The afternoon session of the convention began at 2:30 with Mc-Cray Holmes conducting the singing and Mrs. Joseph Brown at the piano. We were then favored with a special number in song by Misses Grace Mohl and Rosa Jane Cashatt.

The scripture reading was taken from the second chapter of Titus and was read by Brother George Burris, after which we were led in prayer by Brother J. Frank Kernodle. We were favored with another special number in song by Bro. and Sister Carlee Bost.

The Reception Committee brought forward the following visitors Rev. L. W. Sturk, General Superintendent; Rev. and Mrs. Roy P. Justus, Rev. Wm. Roy Phillips, Rev. Boyd Kistler, Rev. George Farah and Rev. & Mrs. Wm. Brady.

Brother Sturk then spoke to the convention for a few minutes. His remarks were uplifting and an encouragement to all.

The minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Resolutions Committee reported as follows:

- 1. Be it resolved that each local society or church report each quarter the average total attendance of the Young People's services to the Executive Secretary, and be it further resolved, that the zone attendance banner be awarded as follows: that a count be taken at each zone rally and that the church which has the largest increase in attendance over the last rally, based on percentage basis, be given the banner. Carried.
- 2. Whereas the manual provides regulations for the organization of Pilgrim Youth Societies, and whereas many of our churches are not organized as such, be it resolved, that our churches and societies be encouraged to organize as nearly as possible according to the manual. Carried.
- 3. Be it resolved that each Young People's zone plan at least two zone rallies during each year.

A report from the Ways and Means Committee was heard. The recommendation offered was not acceptable to the convention; therefore, the matter of supporting the Youth work for another year was referred to the District Conference Ways and Means Committee. The next business was election of officers. Tellers were appointed as follows: McCray Holmes, Verlin Busick, Wade Linebarrier and R. J. Hobbs.

The following were elected: Rev. Joseph C. Brown, Executive Secretary; Rev. U. N. Freeman, Recording Secretary and Judson R. Foster, Treasurer.

The Zone groups then reported their recommendations and the following Zone Chairmen were elected: Albemarle Zone, H. P. Alexander; Asheboro Zone, Kermit Farlow; Burlington Zone, M. M. Holmes; Elkin Zone, Wade V. Linebarrier; High Point Zone, R. J. Hobbs; Salisbury Zone, U. N. Freeman. Recessed for supper.

EVENING SESSION

The evening session of the convention began at 7:30 with Rev. Joseph Brown conducting the song service and Mrs. Brown at the piano. Prayer by Rev. Coy Saunders.

The service was of the inspirational type, and was packed full of songs, testimonies, 'readings, choruses, etc.

The scripture lesson, taken from various classics of the book of Isaiah, was presented by Rev. Paul E. Uhrig. Prayer was offered by Rev. F. W. Henry.

The minutes of the afternoon were read and approved.

Motion carried that we have another Advocate subscription campaign this year. (Youth Board set time for campaign from November 6 to December 6.)

The message of the evening was brought by Brother Ager Lee Vanderburg.

The convention adjourned with a closing prayer by Bro. J. A. Grout.

Standing Rules

DISTRICT AND CONFERENCE

- 1. We recommend that we pay at the rate of five cents per member per year for the Delegate Fund to the General Conference. (1938)
- 2. Be It resolved: That our Ministerial Convention shall convene on Tuesday after the first Sunday in April each year until said date shall be changed by the District Conference. (1940)
- 3. The Council is authorized to formulate rules and regulations for the Camp Meeting and Conference. (1943)
- 4. Be It Resolved: That this Conference change the date of our Conference to Tuesday and Wednesday of the week that Camp begins. Any new officers elected at conference will not take their places until the first Sunday of September. (1945) Action of Conference of 1947 is that we have Conference on the Wednesday before Camp begins.
- 5. Be It Resolved: That we as a Conference go on record as urging all churches of the District to be careful in electing delegates

to the Conference and see that those who are elected are spiritual and that they conform to the standards of our Manual. (1945)

Be it Resolved: That a questionaire prepared by the Council be sent to all ministers who belong to our Conference and who are working outside the District; these questionaires to be returned one month previous to the District Conference.

- 7. Whereas there is required considerable labor to compile our statistical report, Be It Resolved: That our Statistician be paid the sum of \$25.00 per year, this amount to be in excess of expenses involved in preparing said report. If more than one person is appointed to execute this work, the sum of \$25.00 shall be divided between them.
- 8. Whereas there is no rule in the Manual nor yet in our Conference Standing Rules governing when the newly elected officers of a local church shall take over their duties; and whereas some new boards are beginning to operate following the close of our fiscal year, or the first of August, while others are waiting until after the Conference to take over their duties,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we interpret the Manual, Page 37, Section 42, Paragraph 1, so that new officers assume their duties the first of August. (1946)

- 9. As there is some expense in the performance of the duties of the District officials, we recommend that they be allowed four cents per mile when traveling in interest of the District. (1948)
- 10. Because of the continual election of the same officers each year, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the Conference Minutes of the previous year not to be used during the election of officers. (1947)
- 11. Be It Resolved: That we allow space in the District Minutes for our Young People's Minutes and officers' names. (1947)
- 12. Inasmuch as the Manual does not provide any time when local license of ministers shall be renewed,
 Therefore, Be It Resolved: That this Conference adopt the policy that they be required to be sent to the District Superintendent with a recommendation from the local church board, for renewal at each Annual Conference, and further, than any such license not renewed by recommendation of the local church board shall be null and void. (1947)
- 13. Whereas, this property is owned by the North Carolina District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, but its use or operation involves a three-way interest, namely, District Conference, Camp Meeting and Bible School, each with their respective treasurer, but feeling the need for closer coordination between the departments in the matter of sharing in expense items incidental to operation, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we adopt a pro-rated basis between the three groups for paying operational expense, repairs and insurance. We further recommend that the percentage basis adopted be as follows:

Standing Rules

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

- 1. Be It Resolved: That we give our District Superintendent and also ask the churches to give the pastors a two weeks' vacation with pay. (1941)
- 2. The District Superintendent is the Chairman of the Camp Meeting Board. (1943)
- 3. Whereas the Manual provides that the pastor may hold two revivals a year, Be It Resolved: That we grant the same privilege to our District Superintendent, (1943) and that he retain the offerings received from same, and all other offerings from Home Missionary Conventions. (1946)

Standing Rules

COLLEGE

1. Whereas there has been a lot of work done and money raised looking forward to a Bible School,

Therefore Be It Resolved:

- (a) That we open a Bible School in the fall of 1946.
- (b) That we elect a Board of five members, the Superintendent being chairman, and the School President an additional member.
- (c) That the Bible School opening in the fall of 1946 carry a minimum of four years high school and two years of Bible.
- (d) That a Building Committee be elected to draw up plans for additional buildings to meet our requirements; said Committee be made up of two members from the Camp Meeting Board and two members from the Bible School Board. The Committee shall report to the District Council and they shall have the final vote before any work is started.
- 2. We recommend to the District Conference a plan whereby our Bible School Board will be expanded to include representation from all the Districts of our Zone. The recommendation to the District Conference is as follows:

Whereas Pilgrim Bible College is a fully recognized and accredited institution of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, having been authorized by the General Church, and

Whereas the General Board has allotted a definite patronizing zone for Pilgrim Bible College, and

Whereas we are grateful that the following Districts are comprehended in this Zone, namely, South Carolina, the Gulf States and Tennessee,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we, the North Carolina Conference, upon recommendation of the College Board of Directors, urgently request that each of the above named Districts should have one official representative on the College Board, and further that said

representative be the District Superintendent; Be It Further Resolved: That when, and if, the General Board should annex other territory as a patronizing zone the same courtesy should be granted each District. (1946)

3. Whereas we face the grave danger of too great a change in our College Board of Directors in any one year,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the two receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected for two years and the other two shall be elected for but one year.

Be It Further Resolved: That from this year on we shall elect but two each year to serve two years. (1946)

OUTIES AND POWERS OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE PILGRIM BIBLE COLLEGE AS PASSED UPON BY THE N. C. DISTRICT COUNCIL ON NOVEMBER 11, 1947

- 1. Whereas Pilgrim Bible College, located near Kernersville, N. C., is owned and largely financed by the N. C. District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, therefore be it resolved that the Board of Directors of the Pilgrim Bible College shall be empowered with the responsibility of operating said College under the direction of the N. C. Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Said Board is to carry out the rules and policies of said Conference.
- 2. The College Board of Directors shall employ the President, set his salary, and term of employment, subject to the approval of the District Council.
 - (a) The College Board shall outline his duties and services to be rendered.
 - (b) The President shall be amendable to the College Board of Directors.
- All faculty members, workers, and employees who are employed by the College shall be employed by the College Board of Directors.
 - (a) Such workers may be recommended to the College Board by the Executive Committee.
 - (b) The President may recommend such workers to the Executive Committee.
 - (c) No member of the faculty may be dismissed except by a two-thirds vote of the College Board.
 - (d) The President shall not be dismissed during his tenure of office except by a two-thirds vote of the College Board and the approval of the N. C. District Council.
 - 4. There shall be two regular meetings of the Board of Directors annually. The Board shall set the dates.
 - (a) A special meeting of the Board may be called by the Chair, or by the President requesting the Chair to call such a meeting, or by a request of the majority of the Board members.
 - (d) Due to the distance of some of the out-of-state Board members, be it resolved that business needing attention be-

tween the semi-annual meetings shall be handled by the members of the N. C. section of said Board.

- 5. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be:
- (a) To handle all matters of minor nature concerning the operation of the College between meetings of the College Board.
- (b) To make recommendations to the College Board concerning any, and all matters pertaining to the welfare of the College.
- (c) To make recommendations as to faculty members as in Rule No. 3, paragraph a.
- (d) To secure speakers for special occasions of the school; to issue any special advertising for such services.
- 6. A Financial report by the Operating Fund Treasurer for Pilgrim Bible College shall be given at the semi-annual meetings of the Board, and the same shall be submitted to the District Treasurer.
- 7. The College Board of Directors shall authorize the issuance of a catalogue and other printed advertising and publicity for the College, except student publications which shall be under the direction of the President and faculty.

(This action was authorized by the Conference of 1947. See Resolution No. 6, 1947 minutes)

Standing Rules

CAMP

- 1. Be It Resolved: That this Conference organize a Camp Meeting Association by electing a Secretary-Treasurer and secure members who shall pay \$2.00 each for the first year, and \$1.00 per year thereafter. The duty of the Secretary-Treasurer shall be to keep a correct record of the membership, finances, etc., and disburse same as directed by the District Council. He shall make a report at each District Assembly. He shall also write to each member of the Association before the Camp opens, advising them of the date of the Camp, the evangelist and singers, and ask them for their dues. (1941)
- 2. Be It Resolved: That this Conference set a date for the Camp Meeting. (The Conference set the date for the Camp to begin on Friday night before the last two Sundays in August.) (1941)
- 3. Be It Resolved: That this Conference elect a Camp Meeting Board by secret ballot, said Board to have authority to secure workers, and raise and disperse money and promote the interest of the Camp Meeting. The District Superintendent shall be Chairman of said Board.

Since there is no stated time when the term of the Camp Meeting Board expires, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That a Camp Meeting Secretary and Treasurer be elected by this Conference and that his term shall expire at the next Annual Conference. Be It Further Resolved: That the eight additional members be elected as follows:

Two members for a period of four years Two members for a period of three years Two members for a period of two years Two members for a period of one year

and thereafter each year we are to elect two members for four years as the terms of the two members expire.

- 4. BE IT RESOLVED: That each pastor solicit each of his members to join the Camp Meeting Association and that he collect or appoint one of his members to collect and send the money collected to the Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Association.
- 5. Whereas the report of the Camp Meeting Secretary-Treasurer could not be completed prior to the Conference,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That this report be completed at the close of the Camp Meeting, be approved by the District Council and inserted in the Minutes.

Standing Rules

SUNDAY SCHOOL

- 1. Be It Resolved: That the District Council elect a Sunday School Board of four, including the Sunday School Secretary. The duties of the District Sunday School Board, in harmony with the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, shall be as follows:
 - The District Sunday School Board shall arrange an Annual Sunday School Convention to be held some time during the year.
 - To promote and encourage the Sunday School work throughout the District.
 - 3. To present an annual report to the District Conference which shall include the following:
 - (a) A statement of the work accomplished during the year.
 - (b) A statement of the general condition of the Sunday School work in the District.
 - (c) To recommend to the District Conference through the Ways and Means Committee the amount considered necessary to finance the District Sunday School work.
 - 4. The District Sunday School Board shall be amendable to the District Council.
 - 5. The District Council shall have the right to remove, or cause to be removed, any member of the District Sunday School Board who, in the judgment of such Council, is not in harmony with the teaching of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
 - 6. If for any reason there is a vacancy on the District Sunday School Board, the District Council, by a majority vote, may fill the vacancy.

- 7. To have published each quarter a District Sunday School sheet showing the attendance of each Sunday School on the District for the month, the preceding month, and the attendance for the same quarter a year ago, as well as the average attendance for the year—this sheet to be sent to each pastor and Sunday School Superintendent in the District. (1943)
- 2. Whereas, our own District Sunday Schools are in need of finances to operate, and whereas our General Sunday School Rally offerings are very good,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That half of the General Sunday School Rally offerings be kept in our own District to promote the work of the Sunday School here.

3. Whereas there is no uniform method of revising the Sunday School enrollment.

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That each church revise their Sunday School roll each quarter, and be it further resolved that no one be dropped from the roll until they have missed at least five consecutive Sundays and have been visited by Sunday School officials. (1947)

Standing Rules

HOME MISSIONS

- 1. We recommend that the birthday offering be used for the purpose of Church Extension, and that each pastor explain, encourage and push the offerings; however, we still retain the call card. (1942)
- 2. A Home Missionary Association shall be formed, made up of members to be secured by the District Superintendent as he makes his rounds. Each member is to pay \$1.00 when called upon, and not more than two calls per year. (1940)
- 3. In order to help relieve the load of home missionary responsibility placed upon the District Superintendent,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we elect an advisory committee of two members to work with the District Superintendent in all matters and details of District home missions. Said committee to function under and make recommendations to the Council. The Superintendent shall nominate and the Council ratify the nomination of the Superintendent of two persons to serve with himself as a committee on home missions. (1945)

4. Whereas, the established churches are requested to give a year's subscription to the Advocate and a copy of the Manual to each new member joining the church, and since no provision is made for new churches.

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the District Home Missionary Department furnish a copy of the Manual and one year's subscription to the Advocate free to each family represented in the Charter membership of newly organized churches. (1946)

Standing Rules

YOUNG PEOPLE

1. Whereas, our young people are one of the greatest assets of our Church, and to better serve the interest of their work,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the North Carolina District be divided into four zones, the same zone lines that have been set by the Sunday School Board, and officers appointed for each Zone by the Council upon recommendation by the Executive Secretary and District Superintendent. Details of organization, officers, meetings, etc., to be worked out by the Executive Secretary and Superintendent under the Council's direction.

Resolutions

- 1. Whereas, the population of North Carolina is about 1|5 negroes, be it resolved that the Home Missionary Committee be asked to consider working among the negroes where possible and practical.
- 2. Be it resolved that the minutes of the Youth Convention of 1948 be published in the District Minutes.
- 3. Whereas, at the annual session of the Conference on August 22, 1947 a resolution was adopted authorizing the District Council to borrow such money as would be necessary to pay off the large sum owed on the buildings and improvements at Kernersville and authorized the District Council to arrange the necessary terms of payment and interest and mortgage said property to secure any loan which might be necessary;

Whereas, at the District Council meeting, November 22, 1947 the Council accepted an offer from the Pilot Life Insurance Company for the loan of \$30,000.00 to be secured by a mortgage on the property at Kernersville and the District Parsonage in Greensboro:

AND WHEREAS, on December 16, 1947 the Trustees of the North Carolina District (same as the Southern District) of the Pilgrim Holiness Church executed a note and deed of trust as security for said loan from the Pilot Life Insurance Company, which said deed of trust covered both the Conference property at Kernersville and the District Parsonage at Greensboro.

Now, therefore, be it resolved that we ratify and approve the action of the District Council and Trustees in making the said loan from the Pilot Life Insurance Company and we do ratify and confirm the action of the Council and the Trustees in mortgaging the District Parsonage property in Greensboro as well as the Conference property at Kernersville in order to secure this loan. Carried.

4. Whereas the last issue of the new bulletin published under the name of the Carolina Pilgrim was a larger and a better issue, therefore be it resolved that we continue the publication as the Carolina Pilgrim.

- 5. Since our Ministerial Course has been placed in the hands of the school and there needs to be further information concerning it made available to our young ministers, therefore, be it resolved that a mimeographed bulletin be printed by the school fully setting forth the details in connection with it, and that it be sent to all the ministers (undergraduate) in the school zone.
- 6. Inasmuch as we do not wish to raise the District Budget if at all avoidable, and since expense tends to increase in the operational costs, and whereas there are a number of churches which do not meet their regular District Budget, which if we all met would give us sufficient funds without raising the Budget at this time, therefore be it resolved that the conference authorize the District Treasurer to notify the churches when in default and thus encourage payment of the budget in full.
- 7. Since our present College Field Representative is retiring and has accepted a pastorate, and since our indebtedness is heavy, and we need field representation, it was moved that we change our form of representation to be handled by the acting president and his Executive Committee, and that students shall participate in College representative services.
- 8. Whereas the office of Bible School Representative as a Conference elective position is discontinued and since this will result in a vacancy on the Bible School Board, therefore, be it resolved that this conference elect another member in addition to the two that are normally to be elected in order that the total number of members on the Board may not be changed, and further be it resolved that said member be elected for a period of two years.
- 9. Whereas, there has been some misunderstanding with respect to the election of the Executive Committee of the College Board of Directors, therefore, be it resolved that the Executive Committee be elected by the College Board of Directors from its membership to which it will be responsible for all of its work as outlined in the duties and powers of the Board of Directors and published in the thirty-seventh annual conference minutes, pages 45 and 46.
- 10. Motion carried that full time Song Evangelist's names be listed in our Conference Minutes so they may be able to receive Clergy permits for travel.
- 11. Be is resolved that we show our deep appreciation and spirit of gratitude to our highly esteemed General Superintendent, Dr. L. W. Sturk, with a rising vote of thanks, for his fair and equitable administration, of his ministry of helpfulness during this conference.
- 12. Resolved that we show our appreciation with a hearty Amen, for the beautiful flowers and palms arranged by Mrs. Bryson and Mrs. Vaughn
- 13. Resolved that we show our appreciation with a rising vote of thanks, for the faithful and untiring efforts of our Bible School Representative during his years of service.

Ways and Means

- 1. We recommend a budget of 15% broken down as follows: District budget 7%, Bible College 5%, Loan Fund 1%, and Home Missions 2%.
- 2. We recommend that the salary of our District Superintendent be raised to \$3,200 a year.
- 3. Whereas there remains a considerable indebtedness on the Conference property for buildings etc., and whereas the Conference has authorized the borrowing of a loan from the Pilot Life Insurance Company, and whereas it is our desire to pay this off within the next three years; therefore be it resolved; That this conference ask each one of our churches to raise for this indebtedness during the Conference year the equivalent of \$3.00 per member as the minimum.
- 4. Whereas it has been voted to print the minutes of the District Young People's Convention in the District Minutes, therefore be it resolved that the same be paid for out of District Conference funds.
- 5. Whereas we have no concrete means of defraying the expense of our District Youth Work except through special offerings taken in Young People's Rallies and the District Young People's Convention, therefore we recommend that each church or Young People's Society take a special offering for this purpose prior to the youth convention. We further recommend that the entertainment for all attendants at the Youth Convention be furnished from this fund.
- 6. Whereas the Kernersville Church has been designated as the College Church, and whereas they are endeavoring to purchase a parsonage, be it therefore resolved that this conference authorize the District treasurer to donate \$500.00 from District Funds provided the local church raises \$1,000.00 towards the cost of the same.

Journal of Proceedings

The thirty-eighth Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church opened at 10:00 A. M., August 18, 1948 on the District Grounds with Rev. C. C. McMasters leading a spirited song service with portions of "Showers of Blessings," "What A Friend We Have In Jesus" and "Blessed Assurance".

After several requests for prayer, we were led in prayer by Rev. D. R. Saunders and followed by Rev. R. L. Bolling, after which the congregation sang "He Abides".

District Superintendent, Rev. Wm. S. Deal introduced our General Superintendent, Dr. L. W. Sturk, who brought us greetings, and a report of the work of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. He stated that God has been giving some of the best Camps and Conferences witnessed for sometime, and that the general outlook is bright. The expected gain in the over-all membership will be about seven per cent.

Bro. Sturk brought us a message which stirred and blessed the Conference on the subject of "Going Forward" or of "Letting the Church Roll On." He based his message on the words of Exodus 14:18 "Go Forward". Introducing his message he spoke of God miraculously bringing Israel out of Egypt, then their despair at the Red Sea, but of God's great command, "Go forward." Our condition today, he stated, is much like that of Israel at the sea; the devil is endeavoring to hedge up God's people and fill them with doubts and despair, but again comes the ringing challenge from God to "Go Forward." As God's people we should live a good standard because of the examples of our founders, because of the enormity of our profession, the expectation of others, and the tragedy of the times in which we are living.

We were then exhorted to -

- 1. Go forward in the old paths marked out by our fathers.
- Go forward under Divine direction and leadership of our Lord and Holy Spirit.
- 3. Go forward in the realm of soul-winning.
- 4. Go forward in separateness from the world and its spirit.
- 5. Go forward with faith in God, in each other, in the cause which we represent, namely Holiness, and
- 6. Go forward with good courage to fight the battle of the Lord, and to stand by our convictions.

Dr. Sturk's message was blessed of God as evidenced by the shouting, rejoicing and etc. of the Christians.

A motion carried that we reconvene at 1:30 P. M.

Time was given for announcements, after which we were dismissed.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

The second sitting of the Conference convened at 1:30 P. M. Bro. Bob Loman led the Conference in singing "Wonderful" and "Beulah Land" after which we were led in prayer by Rev. W. A. Way. Miss Rosa Jane Cashett, and Miss Grace Mohl rendered a special entitled "I Claim Jesus First Of All".

The secretary called the roll of ministers and lay-delegates.

A motion prevailed that the Conference bar be fixed to include the first ten rows of seats across the tabernacle.

The reception committee brought forward to introduce the following visitors: Rev. Wm. Roy Phillips, Roanoke, Va.; Rev. O. W. Glassburn, Pomona, N. C.; Rev. Ray Hemrick, Hamptonville, N. C.; Rev. George Farah, Michigan.

Motion carried that these visitors be granted honorary seats within the Conference Bar.

The District Superintendent read his excellent report which was accepted with the privilege of adding to his report an item which has just gone through from the Home Missionary project, since it was done during the past Conference year.

The District Superintendent read some recommendations for the coming conference year.

The Assistant Superintendent read his report and it was accepted.

The auditor of the treasurer's books, Rev. R. I. McCluskey, read his report and it was accepted.

The treasurer read his report, also had printed copies of same handed out through the audience. It was unanimously accepted, and appreciated for its manner of clarity.

The statistician gave his report and it was accepted.

The Executive Young People's Secretary read his report and it was accepted.

A motion carried that we have a full twelve months report of the Sunday Schools for the minutes, and that those who turned in only an eleven months report send a new twelve months report to the proper authorities so that it can be correctly printed in the minutes.

Carried that from now on we report all sessions in the Sunday School for the 12 months period.

The reception committee brought forward and introduced Rev. W. M. Phaup, Charlotte, N. C.; Rev. Albert Mattison, Jacksonville, N. C.; Rev. Paul Hill, High Point, N. C.; Rev. R. S. Taylor, N. J.; Rev. Lyman Nance, High Point N. C.; and Rev. and Mrs. Marvin Cockman, Michigan. Motion carried that these have an honorary seat in the Conference bar.

Rev. Carl Hightower gave a report of the work and progress of the Pilgrim Bible College of Kernersville, N. C., and it was accepted.

Rev. Paul Hill, fraternal delegate from the Wesleyan Methodist Church of the N. C.—Va. Conference brought greetings from their church. He spoke of our mutual work in the Kingdom, and the mutual challenge of the whitened harvest fields. He expressed their church's joy in our victories and prayers that our church might move forward in God.

Rev. Deal responded to his greetings and expressed our appreciation for the Weslevan church.

The Resolution Committee reported by bringing three resolutions all of which were adopted.

The Ways and Means reported by bringing in five resolutions. Resolutions 1, 2, 3 were carried.

Due to expiration of time, the conference was recessed until the night session.

WEDNESDAY EVENING SESSION

The third session of the conference opened with a good song service led by Prof. J. Byron Crouse, and was followed with prayer by Rev. Wray J. Smith. Bro. Crouse favored us with a beautiful song entitled "In Times Like These."

Dr. Sturk gave a short talk in which he told the story of "the death bird of Barbados," and in so doing gave a little insight into the

work on the Island of Barbados, British West Indies, and of the Redeemed Pilgrims of that Island.

The secretary read the minutes of the morning and afternoon sessions and they were approved.

The Ways and Means committee again reported with resolutions 4.5. being carried.

A motion carried that we extend the time to 9:30 P. M.

The Reception Committee presented to the Conference Rev. Donald Snow of Indiana, Rev. Shetler of Tennessee, and Rev. Paul Eversole of Cuba. It was carried that these friends have a seat of honor within the conference bar.

Motion carried that we raise the traveling expense of District officials from three to four cents per mile.

The Resolution Committee read six resolutions, but due to time, we were able only to consider number 4 which carried.

Motion carried that we have the election of officers just as soon as the reports are heard and business necessary to the election is finished.

A motion carried that this Conference send a letter of appreciation to the Cotton Mill at Biscoe, N. C., which so graciously helped us in the moving of the Church into town, and by donating one of their lots to the Church.

After announcements, the service closed with the benediction.

THURSDAY MORNING SESSION

The fourth session of the conference opened with a song service led by Bro. Bob Loman. Bro. Sturk presented a special request for prayer for Bro. Deiter, President of the A. B. I.; other requests were received before Rev. Marvin Cockman led us in prayer.

Bro. Sturk spoke from Romans 14:7 on the subject of "Misunderstandings" and stated that most heartaches that come to God's people are the result of misunderstandings. Christ Himself was misunderstood. He further stated that sometimes it is better to keep quiet than to speak the truth, or what you think. We should not judge because 1. We do not know the motive of the heart, 2. Every man stands or falls before his own Master, and 3. There's coming a day when the Lord, the righteous Judge, will judge all the people.

Motion carried that the roll call be dispensed with.

The conference was favored with a special song by Bro. Sturk who sang "He'll Understand and Say Well Done." Showers of blessings fell on the conference as testimonies were heard throughout the audience.

Again upon request, Bro. Sturk sang; this time singing "I Won't Have To Cross Jordan Alone."

The Resolutions committee reported and numbers 6, 7, 9, 10, 11, and 12 carried.

The Chairman of the Board of Education reported on the names and standing of the Conference ministers and deaconesses and recommended by the joint committees of the Educational, Examining, and District Council. Their recommendations were adopted.

The welcoming committee persented to the Conference Rev. Fred Cooper formerly of Virginia Conference.

The District Superintendent appointed for tellers, U. N. Freeman, T. C. Vaughn, Harold Loman, Joseph Brown, R. J. Hobbs, Charles Stout, and R. L. Bowling, and L. B. Gallimore.

Motion carried that we reconvene at 1:30 P. M.

The Secretary of Sunday Schools of the District read his report and it was accepted.

The Ways and Means Committee presented resolution No. 6 which carried.

Adjourned by expiration of time.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

A great song service was conducted by Prof. J. Byron Crouse. The conference was led in prayer by Gen'l Supt. Sturk; special prayer was offered for guidance in the matter of election of officers.

The secretary read the minutes and they were approved.

The next item of business was the election of officers.

District Superintendent — Rev. Wm. S. Deal.

Motion carried that we recess for five minutes.

Bro. Deal gave his acceptance speech.

Assistant District Superintendent - Rev. H. P. Barger.

Bro. Barger gave his acceptance speech.

District Secretary - J. A. Grout.

The secretary responded with a "thank you."

District Treasurer — Bro. L. B. Gallimore.

The treasurer gave his acceptance speech.

After a ballot was cast for the five additional Council members, we adjourned to reconvene at 6:30 at which time an ordination service was announced to take place.

THURSDAY EVENING SESSION

A fine song service again was conducted by Prof. J. Byron Crouse after which Rev. W. F. Page led us to the throne in prayer.

The tellers announced the result of the balloting in the previous session. It was found that we had elected the five additional council members on the first ballot. They were T. C. Vaughn, W. F. Page, T. R. York, D. R. Saunders, and Wray J. Smith.

Rev. R. I. McCluskey was elected to succeed himself on the Educational Board.

A very impressive, sacred and blessed ordination service followed on which God especially placed His stamp of approval. Those ordained were Rev. Herman P. Alexander, Rev. Verlin Busick, Rev. G. C. Craven, Rev. Kermit Farlow, and Rev. R. J. Hobbs.

Gen. Supt. Sturk gave the ordination charge based on Ruth 2:17. From this he drew forceful and encouraging lessons of comparison between Ruth the gleaner, and that of the true minister in respect to:

1. The parting of the ways. 2. Gleaning in the Fields and 3. Rest and reward at the end of the day.

At the conclusion of this service waves of glory rolled over the conference time after time; tears, shouts, testimonies, and rejoicing was the order of service for an extended time.

The results of the balloting for members to the College Board of Directors showed, L. B. Gallimore, O. L. Ruth, and Wray J. Smith elected.

Rev. O. L. Ruth was re-appointed to serve as trustee of the N. C. District.

A motion carried that we nominate four for the office of Camp Meeting Board members and elect two from these. Those elected were Rev. H. B. Barger and Rev. L. L. Lange.

Bro. Paul Uhrig tendered his resignation from the Camp Board due to his entering the evangelistic field. Motion carried that we accept his resignation.

Motion carried that the Council be asked to appoint someone to fill this vacancy.

Motion carried that we elect by acclamation Rev. U. N. Freeman to succeed himself as Camp Meeting Association Secretary and Treasurer.

The District Superintendent read the appointments of committees to serve during the new conference year.

Motion carried that we include Rev. Claude T. Bullock in the third year Conference license ministers list.

Motion carried that we extend the time of service until the conference is finished.

The Committee on memoirs conducted a very touching service in memory of those fellow-pilgrims who have been called unto the Father during the past year. (See page of Memoirs)

Motion carried that a letter of appreciation and encouragement be sent to Rev. Hugh Johnson and Rev. J. F. Talbirt, ministers of the Conference who have been ill for several years now; also that a love-offering be received and divided evenly between the two. (Amount of offering, \$105.59.

Motion carried that the Council see to the request of the Ministerial Convention in appointing a committee or person to notify fellow-ministers and to send flowers when some close relative of our ministers dies.

The Resolution Committee presented resolutions numbers 11, 12, and 13 which carried.

Motion carried that all unfinished business be turned over to the District Council to take care of.

Motion carried that we adjourn.

The Conference closed with the singing of the Doxology and dismissal by General Superintendent Sturk.
