## District Superintendents Report

To the Thirty-Ninth Annual Conference of the North Carolina District, Pilgrim Holiness Church:

Greetings in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ!

Our hearts glow with gratitude to God for His constant mercies and gracious visitations among us during this Conference year, as we come to submit this survey of District work and personal report.

For much we can be thankful: for food and raiment, clothes and shelter, health and homes, for an open Bible and established churches unmolested, and more, for full salvation here and now and the hope of heaven beyond this vale of tears. For these and many more blessings we can be thankful.

**Spiritual Assets:** This has been a gracious year. God has been in our midst and blessed us in many ways. Many have found pardon and holiness in the scores of revivals which have been held in our churches. Our churches have prospered; our pastors have been blessed of God and have been faithful, and we are grateful that all of them have been spared to work for God another year.

Our work in general is in good condition. Most churches have made gains, while a few show losses due to the fact that an overdue revision of their rolls has been effected. Kannapolis seems to be in the lead this year in increase in membership, having received 40 new members this Conference year.

A survey of the departmental work of our Conference shows some gains in practically every department, for which we praise the Lord. These reports will be heard from the various leaders in the departments.

**Temporal Progress:** Here we have also made a fairly good showing this year, for which we praise the Lord. We list some highlights as follows:

Albemarle has purchased a large property nearby the church, which will bring in a considerable revenue by way of rent and also provides splendid and much needed parking space. . . . Bagley Swamp has added four new S. S. rooms, remodeled the auditorium, added a vestibule and installed a modern heating plant. . . . Beulah Church has built two new S. S. rooms. . . . Burlington is in the process of building the main structure of their beautiful new brick veneer church. . . . Draper has remodeled its interior. . . . Durham has added two new basement S. S. rooms. . . . Franklinville has installed a new heating system. . . . Franklinton has painted the church outside and done some improvement on the parsonage. . . . Erlanger has made interior improvements and installed lovely new pews. . . . Gold Hill is in the process of building a beautiful modern brick veneer parsonage. . . . High Point has redecorated both its parsonage and its primary department S. S. rooms. . . . Hillsboro has built a lovely brick veneer church with full basement S. S. rooms and hopes to finish some interior work, etc., this fall. . . . Kannapolis has remodeled and redecored parsonage and basement of church. . . . Lenoir has floored its church with hardwood floor, the young people there having raised the money for this. . . . Mebane has cleared all indebtedness, remodeled some and added a lovely large S. S. room, giv-

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ing more auditorium space. . . . Mt. Zion (Davidson County) has completely remodeled its auditorium. . . . Ramseur is raising money for a new church and Kildree is installing a new heating system. . . . Robbins has refinished floors and installed beautiful new pews. . . . Reidsville has redecorated S. S. rooms and installed gas heating system for them. . . . Sawyersville has erected a lovely new six-room parsonage. . . . Mt. Olive is our last country church to my present knowledge to have installed electric lights. . . . Siler City Church was donated a lovely interior redecorating job by a friend; they have also provided excellent parking space, cared for by a friend. . . . Spray Church has finished S. S. rooms and made other improvements. . . . St. Paul has completed its new S. S. rooms and remodeling of auditorium and the church is now ready for the rock veneer expected to be erected soon. . . . Thomasville has redecorated its auditorium beautifully. . . . Thurmond has made some progress toward completion of its parsonage. . . . Troy has installed a heating system, provided an excellent parking lot and erected a lovely lawn bulletin board. . . . Winston-Salem is in process of erecting a very beautiful brick veneer church and complete S. S. plant with some ten or twelve rooms.

There are other small items, many of them, not here included. This progress alone runs into many thousands of dollars.

I think I can truly say that as a whole our District is in excellent condition. We have had a wonderful year with very little difficulty anywhere among our people.

**Sunday Schools:** Brother T. R. York and his brethren on the S. S. Board have worked hard and have given us a good S. S. year. His report will indicate this more fully when presented.

**Young People's Work:** Brother Joseph Brown has proved a capable and efficient worker as Executive Secretary these past two years. The work this year has done well. I have been unable to attend the rallies as I have desired to on account of other pressing duties, especially in connection with the work of the Bible School services this year. The good reports and fine Convention just past prove that this work is progressing and growing.

**Pilgrim Bible College:** We have had a fine school year. Brother Ragland has done a good piece of work as acting president this year. As there will be a report given from the school I shall only mention one or two items. Thanks to Brothers Senter and Wright and those faithful workers who have assisted them in putting the campus into such splendid shape as you see it.

We wish to thank our churches and pastors for the fine response for the indebtedness this past Conference year. Brother Ragland or I have visited practically every church in the Conference and the response has been fine. By far the larger amount of these churches Brother Ragland and I visited together, with a group from the school, singing and speaking and helping us in presenting the work of P. B. C. Several week-end conventions were held with considerable profit to the churches spiritually, as well as to the school financially. About \$10,000 or over was raised, of which \$7,000 or more has already come into the District Treasurer's office.

This year we have been able to whittle down the Pilot Life loan to \$21,500. This is certainly encouraging. We do owe to the departments of the District certain monies which we borrowed when we made the

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loan, but this is not on interest and can be repaid in due season. We certainly praise the Lord for His wonderful help this year, and thank all the Pilgrims and friends for their gifts.

**Home Missions:** This department has not made the glowing show we would like to have seen for the past two years, but we have been doing a good work in consolidating our former gains and building up already established home missionary churches.

We retreated at Gastonia by closing out our services there after seeing it would be best for the present.

Turning to the brighter side, Spray Church is in the best condition in its history, so they reported to me upon my last visit. Brother Cockman has done an excellent work there. We have supplemented this church during the year, and it is well that we have, seeing the progress made and the prospects ahead now.

Draper, under the ministry of Brother Hobbs, has made good progress. We have had a struggle there but prospects look much brighter now than for sometime before.

At Statesville Brother Hill has carried on successfully. A lot has been purchased and plans are under way for building a church as the Lord opens the way. This work is not on Conference support but we appreciate the good work being done and the prospects there. Likewise, the work at Mooresville, under Brother Bost, has made good progress. This work is not under Conference supervision but is prospective for our church.

During the year Brother Reece Farlow and wife have worked faithfully at Brower Memorial Church, near Asheboro. Early in the year we organized a Fellowship there, and in July, we completed the organization of a new church there. Some will remember that this church was once in the Conference but failed. Now we are happy to present it for acceptance as a newly reorganized church.

Brother Burris has done excellent work at Harker's Island. This church has been under the supervision of the Superintendent for several years, at their desire. They have contributed quite a bit to our work, which we appreciate very much. We are happy to present this church to the Conference as a new church. Good progress has been made at Staley, too, and it is now reorganized.

**Camp Meeting Interests:** We are happy for the gracious way in which God has helped us to erect and pay for this fine tabernacle. The Association is not as large as we could wish, but its membership is very helpful in promoting the cause. We wish to urge our pastors to do their best to help us increase this membership.

### Seven Years of Progress in North Carolina District

We wish to recount for you a few highlights of the past seven years in the Lord's work in this District.

First, to God be all praise and honor for whatever little good may have been accomplished during this time.

Second, to Rev. S. M. Stikeleather, former District Superintendent, goes no small amount of credit, for the excellent condition in which he left the work; and also, to the District Council of those days, for their foresight and work in purchasing our present Conference Grounds.

Third, to the Members of the District Council, Camp Meeting Board, College Board of Directors, Sunday School Board and Youth Board; and to the faithful pastors and unselfish and sacrificing Pilgrims and friends of this District, goes a lion's share of the credit for all that has been done.

During this time God has helped us to organize, and develop a fine District camp meeting, having the first one here on the hilltop in August, 1943, and to build and pay for this lovely tabernacle.

About 1944 we finally got our District zoned and a Sunday School Board appointed. Rev. T. R. York has served from the first as District S. S. Secretary and has done a wonderful work.

In 1946 we zoned the District into six zones for Y. P. work, and in 1947 we had our first annual District Y. P. Convention. From thenceforthward we have had a fine District organization, working excellently.

Possibly our greatest accomplishment was the founding and development to the present of Pilgrim Bible College. As early as 1943 plans were being made looking toward this achievement, when the first section of the girls' dormitory was built.

About 1945 our plans began to materialize. The Conference took action to open P. B. C. in the fall of 1946. Rev. O. L. Ruth was elected Field Representative, which post he held for four years, doing an im-

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mense amount of good raising funds and contacting students. Under the capable leadership of Dr. W. L. Surbrook, first president, the high school was fully accredited and the junior college standardized. Considerable credit is also due to Rev. Terry P. Ragland, then Secretary to the College Board, for his splendid work in helping to organize the school.

As early as 1944 the campus was beginning to show signs of the future of this work, and by the fall of 1946, most of the new buildings one sees here today were erected. God had blessed the North Carolina District with a good sanctified contractor in the person of L. B. Gallimore, to whom we no doubt owe more than to any other man for the fact that Pilgrim Bible College is in operation today.

As for home missions, in 1942 we had one home missionary worker who was being paid part-time salary by the District, through some others were engaged in the work. Our present departmental set-up was launched about 1944. Rev. T. R. York and Rev. T. C. Vaughn have served with me on the Home Missionary Committee since that time, except one year when Rev. Wray J. Smith very ably served. To these members of this committee who have served with me we owe much credit for the hard work done, aside from their pastorates, and for the wisdom used in advancing the cause.

With very limited finances, due to the heavy financial load in connection with the Bible School and the camp meeting tabernacle and other equipment, including the purchase of a District parsonage in 1943, the Home Missionary Department has not been able to do what it would otherwise have done. There have been some 12 churches organized and brought into the Conference, which has represented a considerable gain. During this time, also, we have built, bought or had given to us by groups coming into our Conference some 12 church buildings, and about three or four parsonages have been provided by home missionary churches. We have had as high as six to eight part-time workers on our staff part of this time. A good District tent and equipment has been purchased also.

Now for a few dry but perhaps interesting figures in closing. It should be remembered that we are now making more money than in 1942 when these comparisons start, to be fair, in comparisons.

In 1942 we paid our pastors the sum of \$29,201.16, as reported by the churches, as against \$89,972.33 for 1949. Increase of \$60,771.27. In 1942 we showed church property valuation of \$404,700, as against \$708,100.00 for 1949. But remember this is a very vacillating thing, as few churches place the same estimates each time! In 1942, we paid the general church \$5,141.88, as against \$16,227.00 for '49, an increase of \$11,085.12. In 1942 we showed a membership in the District of 2,446, as against 3,064 for 1949, an increase of 618. The S. S. Enrollment for '42 showed 5,907 as against 7,231 for 1949, a gain of 1,324. Average attendance in '42 was 3,867, whereas by '49 we finally managed to get it up to 5,169, an increase of 1,302.

In 1942 only nine Y. P. societies reported with an enrollment of 369 and an average weekly attendance of 261. In '49, 25 were reported, with an enrollment of 804, and an average attendance of 857, an increase of 16 societies with enrollment increase of 435 and average attendance increase of 596. We raised for all purposes in 1942 the sum of \$80,473.99, as against \$300,236.15 in '49, an increase of \$219,762.16 Money raised. Pastors reported 1,458 seekers for '42 as against 3,063 for '49.

## THE THIRTY-NINTH ANNUAL CONFERENCE

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During this period we have witnessed the organization of every major department of our work. We are now ready for the greatest forward move in our history. Our foundations are laid, our machinery is installed and functioning and we have the Divine signal as well as the human need for a great forward advance. Never was there a greater challenge before us, nor ever a greater opportunity.

These have been seven wonderful years; years packed with intense labor, soul burden for the work and prayer. I have not been without my faults, and these have often been most keenly felt and I have many times regretted that I was not a better leader. I have earnestly sought to improve and trust it may not all have been in vain. The brethren have been very kind to me. In counsel they have been brotherly, in patience with me, saintly and in charity, fracious.

My decision to withhold my name from the ballot for superintendent this year came after many weeks of earnest prayer. I feel that God is leading me onward to other fields of preparation and labor. I shall remain a member of this District and assure you that I shall not forget to pray for you.

Turn your prayers and your support and attention now to your new superintendent. He must increase; I must decrease. Brethren, let us press on to fight the good fight of faith for the right as God gives us to see it, and finish His tasks for us. May God bless you and keep you in His care. In the words of another I can truly say: "With love for all and malice for none, I bid you adieu."

To the Thirty-Ninth Annual Conference of the North Carolina  
District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church

Greetings:

About sixty years ago God began to put it on the hearts of Bible believing people throughout the North American Continent to establish Bible Schools and vital Christian Colleges in order to keep Christian education alive and provide workers for the Kingdom.

This leading of the Lord became a necessity because many of the great old schools of learning suffered an awful decline of morality, spirituality, and fundamental and theological soundness. This decline was largely caused by the impact of a materialistic philosophy, and a severely critical attitude toward "the faith"; crashing into the church and schools.

This same breakdown of morals and fundamentals has become widespread in the public school system, ever going down to lower levels and age groups.

The devastation of this trend has forced upon thoughtful people who are genuinely spiritual the necessity of Bible Schools and Colleges in which to shield our youth from this withering blast, and to train them in the things that are vital.



## PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH OF NORTH CAROLINA

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Pilgrim Bible College was organized and opened and its work is justified under these general principles.

A great deal of enthusiasm, success, and blessing attended the opening of P. B. C. in September of 1946. Three good years have been completed. That interest is not dying in our District and zone as financial and other reports have shown. It is certainly on the increase among our youth and in an ever widening circle of God's people everywhere.

The opportunity which the Lord has given to us in our school is most encouraging. The need is as desperate as ever. With prayer, hard work, and faithful cooperation a few more years should see an institution established and functioning which will be a credit to all, who have labored to make it so.

Let it be clearly understood that the school exists to meet the need of our young people and for no other reason. The student body God has given us is certainly a fine group.

Prospects seem encouraging now that a good student group will be in attendance in the year 1949-50 if Jesus tarries and the financial needs are supplied.

A splendid faculty of consecrated men and women are working in P. B. C. There are eleven full-time and three part-time faculty members. The Dean of Men, Dean of Women, Cook, and Office Secretary complete the staff. In addition to the regular duties, many hundreds of dollars worth of extra labor has been donated by these workers and teachers.

## THE THIRTY-NINTH ANNUAL CONFERENCE

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The work with the Board of Directors and Executive Committee of the Board has been a real joy and pleasure. They have a vital interest in this institution.

The representation work was placed in hands of the school administration. The students were used when possible going along with Brother Deal or myself and often both of us. God's blessing was certainly upon this phase of the work, and the financial response and general interest of the churches has been splendid. I heartily recommend that this method be continued and extended. During the year I have visited about half the churches in Tennessee, several Camp Meetings this summer, and almost every church in the North Carolina District.

Revival seasons scheduled and unscheduled have been experienced. Brother Grout gave us a week at the opening last September. Our General Superintendent spent a week with us just before Christmas, and it was a blessed revival season. Brother McCluskey and Byron Crouse came in to bless the school with a week of rich ministry in the Spring. Dozens of evangelists and missionaries were here to inspire and challenge us through the year. Student leadership in spiritual things was very encouraging and helpful.

The Thanksgiving Day Harvest Home Ingathering was helpful and much appreciated, but my recommendation is that its scope be greatly expanded and its possibilities further developed.

The commencement exercises were very well attended in June. A fine class was graduated. Dr. Wm. Kirby of Martinsville, Virginia, really inspired the class in a timely Baccalaureate message. Rev. Paul F. Elliott brought a real challenge in the commencement address. The music program was a genuine treat to all who heard it. This year witnessed the first Th.B. degrees being awarded.

My recommendations are: that we all keep up the cooperation, interest, good will and prayer; that we put forth especial effort to remove the indebtedness as soon as possible; that we, however, make provision for a normal growth and progress of a healthy nature. Thank God for each and every response to the needs, but some very substantial gifts must come. Some people or groups should sponsor projects of development or equipment needed.

Two small scholarships are being provided this year. Soon we should have several more. A student loan fund or some provision for operating capital is a pressing need. It is not too early to begin thinking of endowment funds of some type.

My personal report is in the hands of the Statistical Committee and will be found among the unstationed ministers reports.

It was a heavy assignment to which the Lord and the brethren directed me when the need became apparent at P. B. C., many mistakes and blunders are readily conceded, but our God has given victory and we humbly praise Him for it.

## Standing Rules

### DISTRICT AND CONFERENCE

1. We recommend that we pay at the rate of five cents per member per year for the Delegate Fund to the General Conference. (1938)

2. Be It Resolved: That our Ministerial Convention shall convene on Tuesday after the first Sunday in April each year until said date shall be changed by the District Conference. (1940)

3. The Council is authorized to formulate rules and regulations for the Camp Meeting and Conference. (1943)

4. Be It Resolved: That this Conference change the date of our Conference to Tuesday and Wednesday of the week that Camp begins. Any new officers elected at Conference will not take their places until the first Sunday of September. (1945) Action of Conference of 1947 is that we have Conference on the Wednesday before Camp begins.

5. Be It Resolved: That we as a Conference go on record as urging all churches of the District to be careful in electing delegates to the Conference and see that those who are elected are spiritual and that they conform to the standards of our Manual. (1945)

Be It Resolved: That a questionnaire prepared by the Council be sent to all ministers who belong to our Conference and who are working outside the District; these questionnaires to be returned one month previous to the District Conference.

7. Whereas there is required considerable labor to compile our statistical report, Be It Resolved: That our Statistician be paid the sum of \$25.00 per year, this amount to be in excess of expenses involved in preparing said report. If more than one person is appointed to execute this work, the sum of \$25.00 shall be divided between them.

8. Whereas there is on rule in the Manual nor yet in our Conference Standing Rules governing when the newly elected officers of a local church shall take over their duties; and whereas some new boards are beginning to operate following the close of our fiscal year, or the first of August, while others are waiting until after the Conference to take over their duties, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we interpret the Manual, Page 37, Section 42, Paragraph 1, so that new officers assume their duties the first of August. (1946)

9. As there is some expense in the performance of the duties of the District officials, we recommend that they be allowed four cents per mile when traveling in interest of the District. (1948)

10. Because of the continual election of the same officers each year, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the Conference Minutes of the previous year not to be used during the election of officers. (1947)

11. Be It Resolved: That we allow space in the District Minutes for our Young People's Minutes and officers' names. (1947)

12. Inasmuch as the Manual does not provide any time when local license of ministers shall be renewed, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That this Conference adopt the policy that they be required to be sent to the District Superintendent with a recommendation from the local church board, for renewal at each Annual Conference, and further, that any such license not renewed by recommendation of the local church board shall be null and void. (1947)

## THE THIRTY-NINTH ANNUAL CONFERENCE

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Whereas, this property is owned by the North Carolina District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, but its use or operation involves a three-way interest, namely, District Conference, Camp Meeting and Bible School, each with their respective treasurer, but feeling the need for closer coordination between the departments in the matter of sharing in expense items incidental to operation, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we adopt a pro-rated basis between the three groups for paying operational expense, repairs and insurance. We further recommend that the percentage basis adopted be as follows:

Bible School .....	50%
Camp Meeting .....	25%
District Conference .....	(1947) 25%

### Standing Rules

#### DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

1. Be It Resolved: That we give our District Superintendent and also ask the churches to give the pastors a two weeks' vacation with pay. (1941)
2. The District Superintendent is the Chairman of the Camp Meeting Board. (1943)
3. Whereas the Manual provides that the pastor may hold two revivals a year, Be It Resolved: That we grant the same privilege to our District Superintendent, (1943) and that he retain the offerings received from same, and all other offerings from Home Missionary Conventions (1946)

### Standing Rules

#### COLLEGE

1. Whereas there has been a lot of work done and money raised looking forward to a Bible School,  
Therefore, Be It Resolved:
  - (a) That we open a Bible School in the fall of 1946.
  - (b) That we elect a Board of five members, the Superintendent being chairman, and the School President an additional member. (See Rule 8 of this Section.)
  - (c) That the Bible School opening in the fall of 1946 carry a minimum of four years high school and two years of Bible.
  - (d) That a Building Committee be elected to draw up plans for additional buildings to meet our requirements; said Committee be made up of two members from the Camp Meeting Board and two members from the Bible School Board. The Committee shall report to the District Council and they shall have the final vote before any work is started.
2. We recommend to the District Conference a plan whereby our Bible School Board will be expanded to include representation from all the Districts of our Zone. The recommendation to the District Conference is as follows:



## **PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH OF NORTH CAROLINA**

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Whereas Pilgrim Bible College is a fully recognized and accredited institution of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, having been authorized by the General Church, and

Whereas the General Board has allotted a definite patronizing zone for Pilgrim Bible College, and

Whereas we are grateful that the following Districts are comprehended in this Zone, namely, South Carolina, the Gulf States and Tennessee,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we, the North Carolina Conference, upon recommendation of the College Board of Directors, urgently request that each of the above named Districts should have one official representative on the College Board, and further that said representative be the District Superintendent; Be It Further Resolved: That when, and if, the General Board should annex other territory as a patronizing zone the same courtesy should be granted each District. (1946)

3. Whereas we face the grave danger of too great a change in our College Board of Directors in any one year,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the two receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected for two years and the other two shall be elected for but one year.

Be It Further Resolved: That from this year on we shall elect but two each year to serve two years. (1946)

### **DUTIES AND POWERS OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE PILGRIM BIBLE COLLEGE AS PASSED UPON BY THE N. C. DISTRICT COUNCIL ON NOVEMBER 11, 1947**

1. Whereas Pilgrim Bible College, located near Kernersville, N. C., is owned and largely financed by the N. C. District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the Board of Directors of the Pilgrim Bible College shall be empowered with the responsibility of operating said College under the direction of the N. C. Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Said Board is to carry out the rules and policies of said Conference.

2. The College Board of Directors shall employ the President, set his salary, and term of employment, subject to the approval of the District Council.

(a) The College Board shall outline his duties and services to be rendered.

(b) The President shall be amendable to the College Board of Directors.

3. All faculty members, workers, and employees who are employed by the College shall be employed by the College Board of Directors.

(a) Such workers may be recommended to the College Board by the Executive Committee.

(b) The President may recommend such workers to the Executive Committee.

(c) No member of the faculty may be dismissed except by a two-thirds vote of the College Board.

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- (d) The President shall not be dismissed during his tenure of office except by a two-thirds vote of the College Board and the approval of the N. C. District Council.
- 4. There shall be two regular meetings of the Board of Directors annually. The Board shall set the dates.
  - (a) A special meeting of the Board may be called by the Chair, or by the President requesting the Chair to call such a meeting, or by a request of the majority of the Board members.
  - (d) Due to the distance of some of the out-of-state Board members be it resolved that business needing attention between the semi-annual meetings shall be handled by the members of the N. C. section of said Board.
- 5. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be:
  - (a) To handle all matters of minor nature concerning the operation of the College between meetings of the College Board.
  - (b) To make recommendations to the College Board concerning any, and all matters pertaining to the welfare of the College.
  - (c) To make recommendations as to faculty members as in Rule No. 3, Paragraph a.
  - (d) To secure speakers for special occasions of the school; to issue any special advertising for such services.
- 6. A financial report by the Operating Fund Treasurer for Pilgrim Bible College shall be given at the semi-annual meetings of the Board, and the same shall be submitted to the District Treasurer.
- 7. The College Board of Directors shall authorize the issuance of a catalogue and other printed advertising and publicity for the College, except student publications which shall be under the direction of the President and faculty.

(This action was authorized by the Conference of 1947. See Resolution No. 6, 1947 Minutes.)
- 8. The Executive Committee shall be elected by the College Board of Directors (Minutes, 1948, p. 30, par. 9). It shall also elect its Chairman (Resolution No. 4, 1949 Minutes).

## Standing Rules

### CAMP

- 1. Be It Resolved: That this Conference organize a Camp Meeting Association by electing a Secretary-Treasurer and secure members who shall pay \$2.00 each for the first year, and \$1.00 per year thereafter. The duty of the Secretary-Treasurer shall be to keep a correct record of the membership, finances, etc., and disburse same as directed by the District Council. He shall make a report at each District Assembly. He shall also write to each member of the Association before the Camp opens, advising them of the date of the Camp, the evangelist and singers, and ask them for their dues. (1941)
- 2. Be It Resolved: That this Conference set a date for the Camp Meeting. (The Conference set the date for the Camp to begin on Friday night before the last two Sundays in August.) (1941)

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3. Be It Resolved: That this Conference elect a Camp Meeting Board by secret ballot, said Board to have authority to secure workers, and raise and disperse money and promote the interest of the Camp Meeting. The District Superintendent shall be Chairman of said Board.

Since there is no stated time when the term of the Camp Meeting Board expires, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That a Camp Meeting Secretary and Treasurer be elected by this Conference and that his term shall expire at the next Annual Conference. Be It Further Resolved: That the eight additional members be elected as follows:

- Two members for a period of four years
- Two members for a period of three years
- Two members for a period of two years
- Two members for a period of one year

and thereafter each year we are to elect two members for four years as the terms of the two members expire.

4. Be It Resolved: That each pastor solicit each of his members to join the Camp Meeting Association and that he collect or appoint one of his members to collect and send the money collected to the Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Association.

5. Whereas the report of the Camp Meeting Secretary-Treasurer could not be completed prior to the Conference,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That this report be completed at the close of the Camp Meeting, be approved by the District Council and inserted in the Minutes.

## Standing Rules

### SUNDAY SCHOOL

1. Be It Resolved: That the District Council elect a Sunday School Board of four, including the Sunday School Secretary. The duties of the District Sunday School Board, in harmony with the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, shall be as follows:

1. The District Sunday School Board shall arrange an Annual Sunday School Convention to be held some time during the year.
2. To promote and encourage the Sunday School work throughout the District.
3. To present an annual report to the District Conference which shall include the following:
  - (a) A statement of the work accomplished during the year.
  - (b) A statement of the general condition of the Sunday School work in the District.
  - (c) To recommend to the District Conference through the Ways and Means Committee the amount considered necessary to finance the District Sunday School work.
4. The District Sunday School Board shall be amendable to the District Council.
5. The District Council shall have the right to remove, or cause to be removed, any member of the District Sunday School Board who, in the judgment of such Council, is not in harmony with the teaching of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

## THE THIRTY-NINTH ANNUAL CONFERENCE

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6. If for any reason there is a vacancy on the District Sunday School Board, the District Council, by a majority vote, may fill the vacancy.
  7. To have published each quarter a District Sunday School sheet showing the attendance of each Sunday School on the District for the month, the preceding month, and the attendance for the same quarter a year ago, as well as the average attendance for the year—this sheet to be sent to each pastor and Sunday School Superintendent in the District. (1943)
2. Whereas, our own District Sunday Schools are in need of finances to operate, and whereas our General Sunday School Rally offerings are very good,
- Therefore, Be It Resolved: That half of the General Sunday School Rally offerings be kept in our own District to promote the work of the Sunday School here.
3. Whereas there is no uniform method of revising the Sunday School enrollment,
- Therefore, Be It Resolved: That each church revise their Sunday School roll each quarter, and be it further resolved that no one be dropped from the roll until they have missed at least five consecutive Sundays and have been visited by Sunday School officials. (1947)

## Standing Rules

### HOME MISSIONS

1. We recommend that the birthday offering be used for the purpose of Church Extension, and that each pastor explain, encourage and push the offerings; however, we still retain the call card. (1942)
  2. A Home Missionary Association shall be formed, made up of members to be secured by the District Superintendent as he makes his rounds. Each member is to pay \$1.00 when called upon, and not more than two calls per year. (1940)
  3. In order to help relieve the load of home missionary responsibility placed upon the District Superintendent,
- Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we elect an advisory committee of two members to work with the District Superintendent in all matters and details of District home missions. Said committee to function under and make recommendations to the Council. The Superintendent shall nominate and the Council ratify the nomination of the Superintendent of two persons to serve with himself as a committee on home missions. (1945)
4. Whereas, the established churches are requested to give a year's subscription to the Advocate and a copy of the Manual to each new member joining the church, and since no provision is made for new churches,
- Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the District Home Missionary Department furnish a copy of the Manual and one year's subscription to the Advocate free to each family represented in the Charter membership of newly organized churches. (1946)

## **Standing Rules**

### **YOUNG PEOPLE**

1. Whereas, our young people are one of the greatest assets of our Church, and to better serve the interest of their work,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the North Carolina District be divided into four zones, the same zone lines that have been set by the Sunday School Board, and officers appointed for each zone by the Council upon recommendation by the Executive Secretary and District Superintendent. Details of organization, officers, meetings, etc., to be worked out by the Executive Secretary and Superintendent under the Council's direction.

## **Resolutions**

Whereas the pension plan does not provide for the evangelist, therefore be it resolved that the Church Board and pastor work out a solution for the evangelists in their respective churches, where possible.

2. Resolved that the District Trustees be increased in number from five to nine.

3. Resolved that the North Carolina Conference have a committee of three to five to prepare a suggested report blank, and send it to the Executive Committee of the General Church.

4. Whereas the other College Boards of our denomination elect their own Chairman, and, whereas at times this has its advantages, therefore, be it resolved that the District Superintendent be a member of our College Board by virtue of his office and that the Board elect its own Chairman.

5. Since provision has been made for the pastors and evangelists of the North Carolina District to participate in the pension plan, and whereas no provision has been made for the College employees: Be it resolved that the College Board make provision as soon as sufficient operating funds are available.

6. Resolved that we encourage the organizing of a Woman's Missionary Society in each church in the District where possible.

## **Ways and Means**

1. We recommend that a 15% budgetary program be adopted with the breakdown of District funds to follow the pattern heretofore set; i.e., District Budget 7 per cent, Bible School 5 per cent, Loan fund 1 per cent, and Home Missions 2 per cent.

2. Resolved that paragraph 3 under Ways and Means in the District Minutes be changed to read "ask each one of our churches to raise for this indebtedness the equivalent of \$3.00 per member per year until said debt is paid.

## **Memorials to the General Conference**

1. Whereas the delegates to the District Conference are elected by popular ballot, and whereas at time those best qualified to serve are overlooked, therefore be it resolved that for each delegate to be elected

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from the local church, the Board nominate not less than three competent persons from which the annual church meeting will select its delegates and alternates.

2. Whereas the District Young People's Society Executive Secretary is elected by the District Youth Convention from the nominations of the District Council, and, whereas the important position of District Young People's Treasurer is elected by popular vote, therefore be it resolved that the District Council present nominations for the District Young People's Treasurer from which the Youth Convention may select their treasurer.

3. Be it resolved that the General Conference make provision for the General Board to be composed of the General Church officers; the District Superintendents of all homeland organized districts.

4. Resolved that we have three recognized school presidents on the General Board.

5. Since paragraph 11 of our Church Covenant deals with worldly amusements, and since baseball games are the only games that are forbidden, and since such games are a part of the athletics of our Church Schools, and of the public schools which our children attend, be it resolved that paragraph 11, page 32 of our Manual shall read as follows: "To avoid worldly amusements, such as dances, shows, theatres, horse races, promiscuous bathing, all competitive ball games, and places where gambling is indulged in."

## Journal of Proceedings

The Thirty-Ninth Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church opened at 10:30 A. M., August 17, 1949, on the District Grounds with Rev. Maurice Holmes leading in a good song service. After several requests for prayer, we were led in prayer by Bro. John Foster and Rev. D. R. Saunders.

A motion prevailed that the Conference bar be fixed to include the first ten rows of seats across the tabernacle and the platform; this to be the bar each year hereafter, or until such a time as necessity demands more room.

The Secretary called the roll of ministers and lay-delegates.

The District Superintendent presented the General Superintendent, Dr. W. L. Sturk, who had just arrived by airplane.

Brother Sturk brought a cheering report of the good year in the Lord in our church as a whole, and of the goodness of the Lord in making a way through the fog for him to arrive here on time.

Rev. T. P. Ragland's resignation from the Education Board was received. Due to the heavy load of school work that he is carrying, this resignation was accepted.

Motion carried that the time of the Conference sittings be set at 9:00 A. M. to 12 M., 2:15 P. M. to 5:00 P. M., and 7:00 P. M. through 9:30 P. M.

The different committee chairmen announced when and where they would meet.

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In the absence of Rev. Paul Uhrig, Rev. T. R. York was asked to serve on the Ways and Means Committee.

Due to the resignation of Rev. Joseph Brown as Chairman of the Reception Committee, the Chair appointed Rev. R. I. McCluskey.

Motion was carried that we extend the time fifteen minutes.

The District Superintendent, Brother Deal, read his annual report which revealed that he was truly "in labors more abundant." This fine report was accepted.

The District Superintendent also read a report, a survey of the work of the District for the past seven years that he has served as Superintendent. Motion carried that this report be accepted.

Motion carried that as a Conference we give Brother Deal a rising vote of thanks for his faithful and untiring efforts down through the years. The vote was unanimous.

\* Brother Deal explained that this was his final report. He withheld his name from the ballot for Superintendent for another year.

### RECESSED

### WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON—SECOND SITTING

The second sitting of the Conference opened at 2:15 P. M., with Bro. Bob Loman leading the congregation in the singing of "Jesus Saves" and "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms."

Brother Sturk spoke a few minutes on Eph. 5, bringing out the thought of sanctification as the act whereby the heart is made pure but that after this God irons the wrinkles out of his own by allowing trials and tribulations to come our way, that he might present us faultless before the Father.

The General Superintendent then spoke of the progress of the church. In a material way we can praise God for the final realization of a complete printing press now owned by the Pilgrims and that soon our Advocate and periodicals will be rolling from our own presses. Also the much needed parsonage for the General Superintendent in Indianapolis has now been purchased. Above financial gains, increase in numbers in either Sunday School or church, our greatest need is for deep spirituality. The General Superintendent reported that perfect harmony was among the general officials, and sweet peace was there.

A good season of prayer was engaged in after which "Amazing Grace" was feelingly sung. Brother Deal expressed thanks for the vote of thanks and appreciation that the Conference voted him at the morning sitting.

Assistant Superintendent Barger read his report for the past year, and it was carried to receive it with gratitude.

The fraternal delegate from the N. C. Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, Rev. Boyd Kissler, was presented and brought greetings in words of appreciation for the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Superintendent Deal responded to the greetings of Rev. Kissler.

The Auditing Committee reported that after examining the Treasurer's books they were found to be in balance and adjudged correct. The report was received.

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The District Treasurer handed out mimeographed copies of his report to each delegate and then proceeded to read his report. A motion to receive this splendid report and show our appreciation for his faithful work and also God's goodness, was shown by a standing vote and a hearty "praise the Lord." This was followed by words of praise for God's special mercies during the year.

The Statistical Committee read their report and a motion prevailed to accept it.

The Executive Secretary of the Young People's Work, Bro. Joseph Brown, read a report of the youth work, and was accepted.

The Committee on Memorials to General Conference read two resolutions. Number one carried.

Motion to extend the time.

Carried we meet at 7:30 P. M. tonight.

### WEDNESDAY NIGHT—THIRD SITTING

The third sitting opened with the spirited singing of "He Brought Me Out" and "He Lives." We were led in prayer by Rev. W. L. Cockman and then a number of scriptures were quoted.

Superintendent Sturk told us of one of the Christian young men who was a leper on one of the Islands, and how salvation works under all conditions.

The Secretary read the minutes of the morning session and were approved.

The Resolutions Committee presented number 1 and 2. Number one had a substitute motion offered which carried. Whereas the pension plan does not provide for the evangelist, therefore be it resolved that the Church Board and pastor work out a solution for the evangelists in their respective churches, where possible. Number two carried.

Motion carried that we extend the time.

The Ways and Means Committee presented Resolution No. 1 which carried.

Motion carried that paragraph 3 in our Minutes under Ways and Means be changed to read "three dollars per member per year until the debt is paid."

Motion carried that as soon as reports are in and any other business bearing on the election is taken care of, that the order of the day shall be the election of officers.

Motion carried that the time of meeting in the morning be set at 10:00 A. M.

Motion to adjourn.

### THURSDAY MORNING—FOURTH SITTING

The fourth sitting of the Conference was opened with a good song service led by Rev. J. Frank Kernodle singing "He Lives." Prayer was offered by Rev. T. C. Vaughn.

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Brother Sturk spoke on the subject, "God's Choice of a Leader." God chooses leaders by quality and character. Moses was selected for his meekness, David for his humility, Daniel for his faith, and Stephen for his fullness of Spirit.

The four qualities necessary for leadership were designated: 1, Piety; 2, Integrity; 3, Humility; 4, Vision.

A resolution was presented from the floor which carried: "Whereas some of our preachers and churches are opposed to wearing rings, and some seem to favor them, and this has caused an unpleasant condition, therefore be it resolved that this Conference ask the General Board's Executive Committee to investigate the Bible teaching on the matter, or appoint a committee to do it, and bring a recommendation to the next General Conference concerning same."

The Resolutions Committee presented No. 3 and 4 resolutions. Resolution No. 3 had a substitute motion carried: "Resolved that the N. C. Conference have a committee of three to five prepare a suggested report blank, and send it to the Executive Committee of the General Church.

Resolution No. 4 carried.

Rev. Paul Black of the Christian Missionary Alliance Church favored us with a most beautiful rendition of "A Child of the King."

The Reception Committee presented some of our visiting brethren: Rev. Lovin and Rev. Keiger of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, Rev. Wm. R. Phillips of Virginia, and Rev. Marvin Cockman of South Carolina. Motion carried to afford said men an honorary seat within the Conference bar.

The District Superintendent presented two new churches to the Conference:

The fifth sitting of the Conference opened with the singing of "Walking in the King's Highway" and "Amazing Grace" as led by Rev. J. Frank Kernodle. Bro. L. B. Gallimore led us in prayer.

The Secretary read the minutes of the Conference to the present sitting and they were approved.

A motion carried that we receive into the Conference for first year license, Bro. Carl A. Lain, and for second year license, Bro. Paul Lain.

A motion carried to grant the Second Church of Greensboro to substitute Mr. Max Gallimore and Mrs. Juanita Richey for two of their delegates who were not able to be present.

The tellers gave a report of the ministers elected as delegates to the General Conference. They were Rev. U. N. Freeman, Rev. D. R. Saunders, Rev. T. C. Vaughn, Rev. Wray J. Smith, Rev. T. R. York, Rev. Harold Loman, Rev. Wm. S. Deal, Rev. R. I. McCluskey, Rev. Joseph Brown.

Alternates elected were Rev. Charles L. Stout, Rev. W. L. Cockman, Rev. L. L. Lange, Rev. W. A. Way, Rev. C. C. McMasters, Rev. R. J. Hobbs.

Memorial number 5 was substituted to read "All competitive ball games and places where gambling is indulged in." Carried.

A motion carried that we remain till we finish the business of the Conference.

The following resolution regarding our retiring District Superintendent was read and heartily accepted. "Be it resolved that we extend to our retiring District Superintendent a vote of thanks for his fine contribution of leadership, for his prodigious labors of love, for his untiring application of talent, for his conscientious adherence to Christian principles, for his unswerving devotion to duty, for his thoughtful consideration of subordinates, for his undeviating loyalty to superiors, for his Christlike spirit under pressure and his humble acceptance of reversal."

Motion carried that the matter of continuing the Pilgrim News Bulletin be referred to the Council.

The Memoirs Committee presented a beautiful service in tribute to our departed dead who have been called to their heavenly reward. Their memoirs were received.

The Superintendent read his appointment of committees:

The Secretary read the standing of the license ministers for the new year.

A sacred and blessed ordination service took place when Rev. George Burris, Rev. Maurice M. Holmes, Rev. George Farah, Rev. Tommy Holshouser, and Rev. A. E. Barefoot, Jr., were ordained to the ministry of the Gospel of Christ.

A motion carried to turn all matters of minor nature over to the District Council to take care of.

A motion carried that greetings be sent to two of our ministers who are sick, Rev. J. F. Talbirt and Rev. Hugh Johnson.
