Report of District Superintendent

WILLIAM H. NEFF

I herewith greet again our general superintendent, Dr. W. L. Sturk, and all the members of this Forty-first Annual Conference with appreciation and love.

With some one hundred and fifty ministers of various standings, and song evangelists, we constitute a sizeable conference. We are a great crowd in Christ Jesus, but it seems that we have altogether too little to show for a sanctified army of such proportions.

We are here in conference on, what we believe to be, the King's business. This conference should have far reaching effects in the salvation of the lost and the building of the Kingdom. We must not miss the mind of the Spirit; I trust God will help us to do HIS work, and save us from invoking his blessing on that which is not his work. Denominations must ever be on the guard against institutionalism; they have value only as they serve their Lord.

I do want to thank the churches for their prayer for Mrs. Neff this past year, when she was so dangerously ill. Only God spared her. It was a heavy load, in other ways, too, but we have proved once again that God's grace is sufficient. I sincerely thank all for their prayers, and also those who gave us a boost on the heavy financial obligation.

A spirit of revival has prevailed in many of our churches which is reflected in increased membership and Sunday school attendance in those churches. The great program of evangelism, launched by our general church leaders, is filtering down to us and we are feeling the impact of it. Some of the churches are taking on new vision and interest. On the other hand, some of the churches have not had revival and are hardly holding the lines. America is talking revival as never before. We should put up our sails and get into this wind!

CHURCH EXTENSION

Home missionary meetings have been held at Forest City and Cherry Point this summer. Just what will develop from these efforts we are not able to say at present. We do honor the call for help down east. Moreover, the fields are white—but, the type of laborers it takes to establish new churches is scarce. Our progress is not satisfactory in this department; much more must be done.

NEW CHURCH BUILDINGS AND PROPERTY IMPROVEMENTS

The new churches at Asheboro and Salisbury have been completed; they can be proud of these buildings. Bethel church, under the inspiration of Brother Scercy, has done much needed improvements; Brown's Chapel, a splendid job of interior work; Elkin is in the process of putting in a basement for Sunday school rooms; Draper has done fine improvement work; Greensboro First is building a new S. S. unit; Creensboro Second's redecorating job was much needed and adds to the attractiveness of the building; Greensboro Third has added two new Sunday school rooms and a new entrance to the church. Brother Cooper has done much needed repairs at High Falls—a splendid piece of work. A new church building is about under cover at Robbins, which is much needed. Parsonage improvements have been made at Thurmond and Troy, and a new parsonage built at Randleman.

PILGRIM BIBLE COLLEGE

The school is on the way up and out, praise the Lord! With the good leadership of President Phipps and his spiritual staff a spiritual tone has been maintained throughout the school year. The enrollment this past year was the largest. I believe the report of the President and Treasurer will show the overall financial picture to be the best ever. Bible colleges are a great blessing to a district—and we must remember that always and everywhere even though they are a financial load and burden, they are, nevertheless, indispensible to the ongoing of a district. As our people and pastors realize this more and more, and as the administrators continue to be wise in their work, the school will grow.

NUMERICAL REPORT

As the statistician's report will indicate, we have made progress in every department of our work this conference year. A seven per cent gain in church membership has been made. With a revival spirit prevailing and continuing, God helping us, this percentage should be much higher this coming year.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS. YOUTH WORK, AND WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETIES

Under the direction of Brother York and his committee advancement has been made in district Sunday school work both in numbers and equipment. Although 22 of the Sunday schools did not get their annual report to the Sunday school committee in time for its statistical report yet we are showing a net gain of 224 scholars this year. While this is not nearly as much gain as we had hoped for we are thankful to say that we are becoming more and more Sunday school conscious.

The district youth leader, Brother Apple, has done well in advancing the young people's work this year. All who were privileged to attend the Southern Zone Youth Convention will agree, I am sure, that in management, fellowship, and spiritual results it proved that our young people are a growing army in our church, and that the North Carolina district has some of its choice young men and women.

The Women's Missionary Societies, under the leadership of Mrs. Neff, have grown in numbers and, although we do not have the statistics of all of their work, we do know that they are making a strong contribution to the local and general church.

We extend our thanks to the various leaders for the work they have done. The district Council, too, has been most cooperative.

PERSONAL ACTIVITIES

I have preached 213 times, and have participated in all the district responsibilities as outlined in the Manual to the best of my ability. I

take the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate. I have conducted Council and College Board meetings, and have done what general church work has come my way, although it has been very little this year. In salary, I have received from the district, \$3,199.92 and \$525 from evangelistic work, making a total salary of \$3,724.92.

I want to thank Brother Barger, the assistant district superintendent, for his kindness and readiness to help when I have called upon him. I also want to thank the Council and committees for their cooperation.

Pilgrim Bible College

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To the Forty-first Annual Conference of the District of North Carolina, Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Greetings in the Blessed name of Him who is above all, through all and in you all.

Since we met one year ago, conditions in the world have gotten steadily worse and worse until it is so now one wonders just what and where will be the next crisis. Boys being sent off to the battlefield, nation warring against nation, personalities vieing for preeminence, and the spirit of Anti Christ at work, all go to make the picture dark.

But through it all, God has given us the best year of my brief experience in school work. Several factors go to make this statement true. To be sure God was here to own and to bless, but He only comes because the people have made preparation. With this we had the finest student body your reporter has ever witnessed in any of our schools. They were consecrated, earnest and spiritual. Many outsiders have so testified to me concerning the splendid group of young people here in training. Then, too, there was an excellent spirit of cooperation among the faculty during the entire year. Each teacher was burdened for the work of God and was willing to make all the sacrifice necessary to see it go forward. And last, but by no means least was the marvelous cooperation from the District. I find some of the best saints in the land live in this great state. Their prayers and support have done much to see the work progress for God.

Following is a brief report of the work for the year 1950-51. There were 129 students enrolled: 69 in the Bible College, 7 music, 44 High School and 10 Special. This group represents a gross gain of 58% over the second semester of the previous year and a net gain of 40%. For this excellent growth we give the praise to God. These students come from 18 states and represent 15 different denominations. In addition to this day school record, we conducted night classes for six weeks at the College during the winter months and at these classes 96 were registered. Then Rev. Jennings and I opened another class at Ramseur for the churches in that area and 68 were enrolled there. This makes a total of 164 for night classes. Together with 129 for the regular school makes a grand total of 293. May I add a personal word here that I am delighted with the excellent reception I have been given in every church I visited in the interest of the college. The only word I know to describe it is to say it was a real warm reception. I find a spirit of cooperation over the district and a genuine interest in the school. This is gratifying indeed. It delights my heart to be a member of such an array of fine people and to be their servant.

You, all, have noticed the additional shrubbery on the campus from what appeared a year ago. This was the gift of an excellent graduating class, and for which we are grateful, as I know you are.

The college suffered somewhat because of the strikes and layoffs in the mills in this area. But God has definitely helped us in spite of it all, and we firmly believe will lead on to more definite victory in the future.

The prospects for the coming year look excellent and it now appears we will have a good gain in enrollment. However this gain will not equal last year for as the enrollment increases the percentage of growth decreases. Applications are coming in daily from all parts of the nation and inquiries also are reaching us from some very fine prospects. Things look good for Pilgrim Bible College.

We are sorry to have lost the services of Rev. Otho Jennings as Dean but God knows best and is able to lead us to a successor. We are scouring the country in search of someone but as yet no one seems able to qualify. We promise to continue this effort until an able and spiritual man is found to give strength to our Bible department. I plan on teaching between 8 and 12 hours each semester to help bridge the chasm. For your information we intend to completely revise our Bible work next year and begin offering much more Bible than in the past in order that our young men may be turned out as Bible preachers. You share this feeling.

VISITATION

During the past year I have been able, by the help of the Lord, to visit a large percentage of the churches of the District. Rev. Jennings visited many others so in all nearly every church was visited once except five or six, and part of these were due to conflicts in schedule. These unvisited churches will come in for the first attention during the autumn visitation.

Of course all of you are aware of the fact that Rev. W. R. Phillips has joined the college staff as business manager and is already proving himself as the man for the hour. We are expecting a strong business emphasis and a forward look at the college that will meet with the approval of our district, our friends and our creditors. We covet your prayer for this man of God with his heavy responsibility.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That there continue the same spirit of harmony and unity between the District and the College as has been evidenced the past year.

2. Many of you are acquainted with the splendid work done in our music department last year. In order for this to continue we need rooms and equipment to meet the demands. Friends, these are not idle words.

3. We have definite need of a much enlarged library. We should add at least 1,000 volumes this year.

4. As our student body grows we are now in great need of more furniture for our student rooms. This is now becoming a pressing need.

Honorable mention should be made of some excellent gifts made to Pilgrim Bible College this past year. The beautiful new sign that lights the way to the College was a gift of loyal friends; a new American flag by Ralph Holmes, paint and furniture by Mr. J. T. Smith, a completely remodeled class room, a gift of students; \$100.00 gift on a new piano; and others too numerous to mention. These all are most gratefully appreciated.

May God continue to bless you one and all is my humble prayer.

We want to tell you again that we appreciate you folk and are praying for you that God shall lead you forward in His Kingdom.



Standing Rules

DISTRICT AND CONFERENCE

1. The Council is authorized to formulate rules and regulations for the Camp Meeting and Conference. (1943)

2. Be It Resolved: That we as a Conference go on record as urging all churches of the District to be careful in electing delegates to the Conference and see that those who are elected are spiritual and that they conform to the standards of our Manual. (1945)

3. Be It Resolved: That a questionnaire prepared by the Council be sent to all ministers who belong to our Conference and who are working outside the District; these questionnaires to be returned one month previous to the District Conference.

4. Whereas there is required considerable labor to compile our statistical report, Be It Resolved: That our Statistician be paid the sum of \$50.00 per year, this amount to be in excess of expenses involved in preparing said report. If more than one person is appointed to execute this work, the sum of \$50.00 shall be divided between them.

5. Whereas there is no rule in the Manual nor yet in our Conference Standing Rules governing when the newly elected officers of a local church shall take over their duties; and whereas some new boards are beginning to operate following the close of our fiscal year, or the first of August, while others are waiting until after the Conference to take over their duties, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we interpret the Manual, Page 37, Section 42, Paragraph 1, so that new officers assume their duties the first of August. (1946)

6. As there is some expense in the performance of the duties of the District officials, we recommend that they be allowed four cents per mile when traveling in interest of the District. (1948)

7. Because of the continual election of the same officers each year, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the Conference Minutes of the previous year not to be used during the election of officers. (1947)

8. Be It Resolved: That we allow space in the District Minutes for our Young People's Minutes and officers' names. (1947)

9. Inasmuch as the Manual does not provide any time when local license of ministers shall be renewed, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That this Conference adopt the policy that they be required to be sent to the District Superintendent with a recommendation from the local church board, for renewal at each Annual Conference, and further, that any such license not renewed by recommendation of the local church board shall be null and void. (1947)

10. Resolved: That the delegate fund for General Conference be set at ten cents per member per year. (1950)

11. Whereas our Youth Convention being held on a separate day has caused a great deal of confusion as to the operating of a separate convention, and whereas we feel our Youth need the spiritual atmosphere of our annual Camp Meetings, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the Youth Convention convene on the first Friday night of Camp and continue all day Saturday, running in conjunction with Camp Board.

Standing Rules

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT,

1. Be It Resolved: That we give our District Superintendent and also ask the churches to give the pastors a two weeks' vacation with pay. (1941)

2. The District Superintendent is the Chairman of the Camp Meeting Board. (1943)

3. Resolved: That we grant the District Superintendent the privilege of conducting four revivals a year, and retaining all offerings received from same. (1950)

Standing Rules

COLLEGE

1. Whereas there has been a lot of work done and money raised looking forward to a Bible School,

Therefore, Be It Resolved:

- (a) That we open a Bible School in the fall of 1946.
- (b) That we elect a Board of five members, the Superintendent being chairman, and the School President an additional member. (See Rule 8 of this Section.)
- (c) That the Bible School opening in the fall of 1946 carry a minimum of four years high school and two years of Bible.
- (d) That a Building Committee be elected to draw up plans for additional buildings to meet our requirements; said Committee be made up of two members from the Camp Meeting Board and two members from the Bible School Board. The Committee shall report to the District Council and they shall have the final vote before any work is started.

2. We recommend to the District Conference a plan whereby our Bible School Board will be expanded to include representation from all the Districts of our Zone. The recommendation to the District Conference is as follows:

Whereas Pilgrim Bible College is a fully recognized and accredited institution of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, having been authorized by the General Church, and

Whereas the General Board has allotted a definite patronizing zone for Pilgrim Bible College, and

Whereas we are grateful that the following Districts are comprehended in this Zone, namely, South Carolina, the Gulf States and Tennessee,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we, the North Carolina Conference, upon recommendation of the College Board of Directors, urgently request that each of the above named Districts should have one official representative on the College Board, and further that said representative be the District Superintendent; Be It Further Resolved: That when, and if, the General Board should annex other territory as a patronizing zone the same courtesy should be granted each District. (1946)

3. Whereas we face the grave danger of too great a change in our College Board of Directors in any one year,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the two receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected for two years and the other two shall be elected for but one year.

Be It Further Resolved: That from this year on we shall elect but two each year to serve two years. (1946)

DUTIES AND POWERS OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE PILGRIM BIBLE COLLEGE AS PASSED UPON BY THE N. C. DISTRICT COUNCIL ON NOVEMBER 11, 1947

1. Whereas Pilgrim Bible College, located near Kernersville, N. C., is owned and largely financed by the N. C. District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the Board of Directors of the Pilgrim Bible College shall be empowered with the responsibility of operating said College under the direction of the N. C. Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Said Board is to carry out the rules and policies of said Conference.

2. The College Board of Directors shall employ the President, set his salary, and term of employment, subject to the approval of the District Council.

- (a) The College Board shall outline his duties and services to be rendered.
- (b) The President shall be amenable to the College Board of Directors.

3. All faculty members, workers, and employees who are employed by the College shall be employed by the College Board of Directors.

- (a) Such workers may be recommended to the College Board by the Executive Committee.
- (b) The President may recommend such workers to the Executive Committee.
- (c) No member of the faculty may be dismissed except by a twothirds vote of the College Board.
- (d) The President shall not be dismissed during his tenure of office except by a two-thirds vote of the College Board and the approval of the N. C. District Council.

4. There shall be two regular meetings of the Board of Directors annually. The Board shall set the dates.

(a) A special meeting of the Board may be called by the Chair, or by the President requesting the Chair to call such a meeting, or by a request of the majority of the Board members.

- (b) Due to the distance of some of the out-of-state Board members be it resolved that business needing attention between the semiannual meetings shall be handled by the members of the N. C. section of said Board.
- 5. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be:
- (a) To handle all matters of minor nature concerning the operation of the College between meetings of the College Board.
- (b) To make recommendations to the College Board concerning any, and all matters pertaining to the welfare of the College.
- (c) To make recommendations as to faculty members as in Rule No. 3, Paragraph a.
- (d) To secure speakers for special occasions of the school; to issue any special advertising for such services.

6. A financial report by the Operating Fund Treasurer for Pilgrim Bible College shall be given at the semi-annual meetings of the Board, and the same shall be submitted to the District Treasurer.

7. The College Board of Directors shall authorize the issuance of a catalogue and other printed advertising and publicity for the College, except student publications which shall be under the direction of the President and faculty.

(This action was authorized by the Conference of 1947. See Resolution No. 6, 1947 Minutes.)

8. The Executive Committee shall be elected by the College Board of Directors (Minutes, 1948, p. 30, par. 9). It shall also elect its Chairman (Resolution No. 4, 1949 Minutes).

Standing Rules

CAMP

1. Be It Resolved: That this Conference organize a Camp Meeting Association by electing a Secretary-Treasurer and secure members who shall pay \$2.00 each for the first year, and \$1.00 per year thereafter. The duty of the Secretary-Treasurer shall be to keep a correct record of the membership, finances, etc., and disburse same as directed by the District Council. He shall make a report at each District Assembly. He shall also write to each member of the Association before the Camp opens, advising them of the date of the Camp, the evangelist and singers, and ask them for their dues. (1941)

2. Be It Resolved: That this Conference set a date for the Camp Meeting. (The Conference set the date for the Camp to begin on Friday night before the last two Sundays in August.) (1941)

3. Be It Resolved: That this Conference elect a Camp Meeting Board by secret ballot, said Board to have authority to secure workers, and raise and disperse money and promote the interest of the Camp Meeting. The District Superintendent shall be Chairman of said Board. Since there is no stated time when the term of the Camp Meeting Board expires, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That a Camp Meeting Secretary and Treasurer be elected by this Conference and that his term shall expire at the next Annual Conference. Be It Further Resolved: That the eight additional members be elected as follows:

Two members for a period of four years

Two members for a period of three years

Two members for a period of two years

Two members for a period of one year

and thereafter each year we are to elect two members for four year as the terms of the two members expire.

4. Be It Resolved: That each pastor solicit each of his members to join the Camp Meeting Association and that he collect or appoint one of his members to collect and send the money collected to the Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Association.

5. Whereas the report of the Camp Meeting Secretary-Treasurer could not be completed prior to the Conference,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That this report be completed at the close of the Camp Meeting, be approved by the District Council and inserted in the Minutes.

Standing Rules

SUNDAY SCHOOL

1. Be It Resolved: That the District Council elect a Sunday School Board of four, including the Sunday School Secretary. The duties of the District Sunday School Board, in harmony with the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, shall be as follows:

- 1. The District Sunday School Board shall arrange an Annual Sunday School Convention to be held some time during the year.
- 2. To promote and encourage the Sunday School work throughout the District.
- 3. To present an annual report to the District Conference which shall include the following:
 - (a) A statement of the work accomplished during the year.
 - (b) A statement of the general condition of the Sunday School work in the District.
 - (c) To recommend to the District Conference through the Ways and Means Committee the amount considered necessary to finance the District Sunday School work.
- 4. The District Sunday School Board shall be amendable to the District Council.
- 5. The District Council shall have the right to remove, or cause to be removed, any member of the District Sunday School Board who, in the judgment of such Council, is not in harmony with the teaching of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

- 6. If for any reason there is a vacancy on the District Sunday School Board, the District Council, by a majority vote, may fill the vacancy.
- 7. To have published each quarter a District Sunday School sheet showing the attendance of each Sunday School on the District for the month, the preceding month, and the attendance for the same quarter a year ago, as well as the average attendance for the year—this sheet to be sent to each pastor and Sunday School Superintendent in the District. (1943)

2. Whereas, our own District Sunday Schools are in need of finances to operate, and whereas our General Sunday School Rally offerings are very good,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That half of the General Sunday School Rally offerings be kept in our own District to promote the work of the Sunday School here.

3. Whereas there is no uniform method of revising the Sunday School enrollment,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That cach church revise their Sunday School roll each quarter, and be it further resolved that no one be dropped from the roll until they have missed at least five consecutive Sundays and have been visited by Sunday School officials. (1947)

Standing Rules

HOME MISSIONS

1. We recommend that the birthday offering be used for the purpose of Church Extension, and that each pastor explain, encourage and push the offerings; however, we still retain the call card. (1942)

2. A Home Missionary Association shall be formed, made up of members to be secured by the District Superintendent as he makes his rounds. Each member is to pay \$1.00 when called upon, and not more than two calls per year. (1940)

3. In order to help relieve the load of home missionary responsibility placed upon the District Superintendent,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we elect an advisory committee of two members to work with the District Superintendent in all matters and details of District home missions. Said committee to function under and make recommendations to the Council. The Superintendent shall nominate and the Council ratify the nomination of the Superintendent of two persons to serve with himself as a committee on home missions. (1945)

4. Whereas, the established churches are requested to give a year's subscription to the Advocate and a copy of the Manual to each new member joining the church, and since no provision is made for new churches,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the District Home Missionary Department furnish a copy of the Manual and one year's subscription to the Advocate free to each family represented in the Charter membership of newly organized churches. (1946)

Standing Rules

YOUNG PEOPLE

1. Whereas, our young people are one of the greatest assets of our Church, and to better serve the interest of their work,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the North Carolina District be divided into four zones, the same zone lines that have been set up by the Sunday School Board, and officers appointed for each zone by the Council upon recommendation by the Executive Secretary and District Superintendent. Details of organization, officers, meetings, etc., to be worked out by the Executive Secretary and Superintendent under the Council's direction.

2. Whereas it is very embarrassing to those attending the Youth Convention to have the matter of entertainment discussed openly before the Convention, therefore, be it resolved that we as the District Youth Convention provide free entertainment for all at the Annual Youth Convention on the basis of free-will offerings.

Resolutions

1. Resolve that the month of October 1951 be designated as college church month, and while the local church is making an all-out effort to raise money for the building, that every congregation in North Carolina Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church be asked to raise a good substantial offering for the college church, and that the offerings be sent to the District Treasurer by November 1st.

2. (6) Whereas, approximately only 20% of our North Carolina Pilgrims take the Advocate, and whereas, the General Church, in its program of evangelism is emphasizing a campaign for new subscriptions, and whereas, an INFORMED PILGRIM is the best possible Pilgrim, be it resolved that every pastor put on a campaign and strive to secure as many subscriptions to the Advocate as his church has members.

3. (7) Whereas, our Youth Convention being held on a separate day has caused a great deal of confusion as to the operating of a separate convention, and whereas, we feel our Youth need the spiritual atmosphere of our Annual Camp Meetings, therefore be it resolved that the Y. P. Convention convene on the first Friday night of Camp and continue all day Saturday, running in conjunction with the Camp Meeting Board.

Ways and Means

1. Resolve that the present financial budget of 15% being carried on through next year, and that we pay our District Superintendent \$300.00 per month.

Journal of Proceedings

Through the tender mercies of God and His providential care, the Forty-first Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church was assembled and was called to order by our District Superintendent, Rev. Wm. H. Neff, at 10:00 A.M. August 16, 1951, on the District grounds at Kernersville, N. C.

An inspiring song service was led by Brother McCray Holmes after which our Assistant Superintendent, Rev. Barger, led our hearts to the throne in prayer.

Brother Neff presented to the Conference our beloved General Superintendent, Dr. W. L. Sturk, who brought greetings and a great message from John the 17th chapter on "Christian Unity." He stated that the Bible mentions four types of unity: 1. The unity of matrimony. Until a man is married, his life is not complete, he stated. The marriage unity is a beautiful type of Christ and the church. The church can't do anything without Christ, neither can Christ accomplish His work without the church. 2. The Unity of Opposition. This was illustrated by the dissenters from the great feast all "with one accord making excuses." 3. The Unity of Purpose; this was shown by the disciples tarrying in the upper room in obedience to Christ's command to wait for the promise of the Father. 4. The Unity of Perfection; this comes by the purifying of our hearts. It is a unity akin to God. In the Spirit we are to be one even as the Holy Trinity is one. This unity, he stated, is the true badge of Christian discipleship, for "by this shall all men know that ye are my disciples." Further he stated that the glory which Christ imparts is that which causes us to work together without friction even when we don't always agree on things. Even as the moon reflects the glory of the sun, so the Christian's life will reflect the glory of the Christ.

The Secretary called the roll of the Conference.

The Conference bar was fixed to be the first ten rows of benches across the tabernacle and the platform. The time of sitting was set to be 9:00 A.M. to 12 M., 2:15 P.M. to 5:00 P.M., and 7:00 P.M. through 9:30 P.M.

Superintendent Neff read his annual report of his work and of the work of the District, and it was gratefully accepted.

The Assistant Superintendent, Brother Barger, read his brief but good report and was accepted.

The Executive Secretary of the Youth Work of the District read his report and was accepted.

President of Pilgrim Bible College, Rev. Phipps, read a very inspiring report of the past school year, the outlook for the new year, and reported on the need for books in the library. The motion was gladly accepted.

The first session of the Conference recessed with the benediction by Rev. O. L. Ruth.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON-SECOND SITTING

The second sitting of the Conference opened at 2:15 P.M. with the singing of "We Have an Anchor That Keeps the Soul," then we were led in prayer by Rev. Tommy Holshouser.

Our General Superintendent brought a few pointed remarks on our church's program of evangelism and soul winning.

The Secretary read the minutes of the first sitting and they were adjudged correct.

A motion carried that we dispense with any further calling of the Conference roll

The reception committee presented guests: Rev. and Mrs. Rollin McCord of the Louisiana District, who have taken a position with Pilgrim Bible College; Rev. Boyd Kissler, fraternal delegate from the N. C. Wesleyan Conference; Rev. and Mrs. Kilwy, pastor of First Church, Cincinnati, Ohio; and Rev. Pendergraft of the Nazarene Church. After giving them a welcome, the Conference voted them honorary seats within the Conference bar.

The Statistician gave his splendid report and was received with gratitude.

The auditing committee reported that they had examined the District Treasurer's books and found the books balancing and judged that they were correct.

The District Treasurer presented his well prepared and mimeographed report of the year's finances, and it was accepted.

The Ways and Means committee presented resolution number 1 which carried.

The resolutions committee presented several resolutions, none of which was recommended. Resolution number one was considered and then held over to another session.

A motion prevailed that we give the last fiteen minutes to Rev. Kissler, fraternal delegate from the N. C. Wesleyan Methodist Church Conference.

Superintendent Neff presented Rev. Kissler.

Rev. Kissler brought greetings from the North Carolina Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. He stated that their Conference felt the warmest of regards for the Pilgrim Church, and that when they speak of the Pilgrim Church, it is always with highest of regards.

He also expressed appreciation for the cooperation between the two conferences in regards to our facilities during conferences, conventions, etc. He exhorted that we join hands in the great cause of soul winning and the spreading of scriptural holiness.

Rev. Neff responded by expressing the Pilgrim Holiness Church's appreciation for the feelings of the Wesleyan Church, and also that we pray God's blessing upon them in their great work.

The second session was recessed by the benediction being pronounced by Rev. Kissler.

THURSDAY NIGHT-THIRD SITTING

With the singing of our testimony, "I know whom I have believed," the third sitting of Conference opened at 7:00 P.M. This was followed by a season of prayer and quoting of precious promises. The Secretary read the minutes of the second sitting and they were approved as read.

The Resolution No. 1 of the resolutions committee was again brought back for consideration.

A motion prevailed to temporarily table said motion.

The reception committee presented Rev. and Mrs. Wm. Roy Phillips.

The resolutions committee presented without recommendation four other resolutions which did not carry.

Motion carried that we again lift from the table Resolution No. 1. After discussing it thoroughly it carried.

Motion carried that our General Superintendent Sturk render a special song. He chose "When the storms of life are raging, stand by me." This proved to be also of God's choosing and its beautiful message gripped the heart of the Conference.

Motion carried that we adjourn so as to give the committees more time to work, and that the orders of the next day be first the ordination service and then the election of officers.

In the closing moments of the session, God's Spirit settled over the Conference and many minutes were taken to praise God for His goodness, especially in the matter of touching the bodies of a number who were sick. Many requests were made for prayer for both body and soul. The Conference closed with several being anointed for healing and a great time of prayer around the altar.

FRIDAY MORNING-FOURTH SITTING

The fourth sitting opened at 8:45 A.M. with a very sacred ordination service in which seven ministers, Mrs. B. S. Jones, Clyde Parker, Paul Lain, Wm. Scercy, Marvin Hill, W. Vann Howard, and Coy Saunders, were ordained to the ministry.

Dr. Sturk brought the ordination charge, basing his message on 2 Kings the second chapter. He said that to succeed in the Christian ministry it requires: 1. Ministers of energy and zeal. 2. Ministers who are humble in spirit, and willing to begin at the bottom of the ladder. 3. They must needs have a definite call from heaven. 4. They should covet and obtain the double portion blessings.

The Conference recessed for fifteen minutes.

Reconvening, the Conference received a group of ministers into First Year Conference standing; said ministers were recommended by the proper boards.

The Conference received Rev. Wm. Roy Phillips, Rev. R. S. McCord, and Rev. Edward Easter as ordained ministers, and Mrs. Marie McCord as an ordained deaconess. Next the election of officers became the order of the day. Those elected were:

Adjourned by expiration of time.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON-FIFTH SITTING

With the singing joyfully of "Such Love" the fifth and last sitting of the Conference was opened. Brother Gallimore led in a fervent prayer.

Reports on the ballots cast in the latter part of the last session showed O. L. Ruth and W. F. Page elected to the Council, R. J. Hobbs and Chas. L. Stout elected to the Camp Meeting Board, and R. I. McCluskey and D. R. Saunders elected to the Bible School Board.

The resolutions committee presented resolutions number 6 and 7 which passed.

The committee on memoirs presented their report and was appreciated.

Dr. Sturk gave a beautiful farewell message and "slipped away."

A motion carried that the Council have authority to finish all unfinished business of the Conference.

A motion carried that by a standing vote we express our appreciation to those who served in helping to take care of the Conference. The Secretary read the appointments.

A motion carried that the fiscal year end the last of June hereafter, and that all reports must be in by the 15th of July.

A motion carried that we express our appreciation for the untiring service of Mrs. Neff in organizing and guiding the Missionary Societies of our District.

With the benediction, the Conference adjourned and the ministers and delegates went forth to spend and be spent in another great year of service for the Master if He tarries His coming.
