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Journal of Proceedings

The Forty-third Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church was called to order by District Superintendent Wm. H. Neff at 10:00 a.m., August 19, 1953, in the great tabernacle on the conference grounds at Kernersville, N. C. Rev. Paul Uhrig led the congregation in the singing of "Blessed Assurance" and "Amazing Grace." The entire conference gathered around the altar for a gracious season of humbling of hearts before God, of offering of thanks for the multiplied mercies and blessings that have been ours through another year, and to earnestly supplicate for a mighty anointing of the Spirit upon our individual hearts for the business at hand.

Brother Neff presented our beloved General Superintendent, Dr. L. W. Sturk, who brought blessed tidings of God's blessings upon our church and himself. He then spoke on the subject, "The Pilgrim Holiness Church; Its Past and Present." He stated that in looking over the past we don't find anything so very sensational, but do find that the church has ever tried to be consistent, constant, and careful. However, he stated that much credit should be given to the men of conviction, conscience and concept who labored with earnestness to establish a church true to holiness of life and purity of heart.

Speaking of the present he said that we now have the best coordinated and harmonious working of the various organizations that the church has ever known. Then, the physical gains of our church in buildings, such as parsonages, church schools, and the general building, are the best the church has ever known. He also stated that the vision and burden of God's people which he has noted over the various conference and campus equal anything of the good days of thirty-five or forty years ago. To God be the glory!

Concluding his remarks, he stressed that our supreme need for this conference is the mighty presence of God to oil the machinery, clear our minds, and unify our spirits.

The secretary called the roll of ministers and lay delegates.

The conference bar was set to include the first fifteen rows, excepting the row of seats on the right which is for visitors. The time of the sittings was placed at 9:00 a.m. to 11:45, 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m., and 7:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m.

Two newly organized churches were presented with their delegates and were joyfully received into the conference. They were: Charlotte Church; delegate, A. D. Sizemore, and Guilford Church, with Mrs. T. C. Vaughn as delegate.

A motion carried that the sitting be extended to 12:00 noon.

A motion carried that we give 15 minutes to Rev. Biggerstaff of the Allied Church League of the State to present the work of this worthy organization.

The reception committee presented Rev. and Mrs. L. E. Schendell of the Rocky Mountain District.

The conference adjourned with shaking of hands with one another.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON-SECOND SITTING

The second sitting of the conference opened at 2:00 p.m. with the singing of "Under the Atoning Blood of the Lamb," which was followed by a good season of prayer ied by Rev. Walter Cockman.

Minutes of the previous sitting were read and approved.

The District Superintendent read his report which was accepted by a rising vote of thanks. The General Superintendent re-emphasized a note of the District Superintendent's report about the Pilgrim Holiness Church keeping the glory upon its services.

Assistant Superintendent Barger reported, and his report was accepted with gratitude.

Auditing Committee read its report which was accepted.

The Treasurer read his report after giving his testimony and passing mimeographed sheets of his detailed report among the delegates. His report was accepted by the conference giving a hearty Amen.

Statistician L. L. Lange read his report which was accepted.

The S. S. Promotional Secretary, T. R. York, read his report, and it was accepted.

President Phipps read his report of Pilgrim Bible College, which report was enthusiastically received and accepted.

Resolutions Committee presented Resolutions 1 and 2.

Moved and seconded that Resolution 1 be referred to committee for redrafting.

Moved and seconded that Resolution 2 be referred to committee for redrafting.

Ways and Means Committee reported:

- 1. We recommend that the budget for 1953-1954 remain the same and we set our District Superintendent's salary at \$4,000.00 per year. Adopted.
- 2. Whereas, there has been a steady increase in the cost of living, and whereas, this has not been taken into consideration by many of our local church boards, therefore be it resolved that every church of our district be requested to pay the pastor's utilities. After discussion this was adopted.
- 3. Whereas there has been an oversight on the part of our churches in sending in the delegate fund for General Conference, therefore be it resolved that we pay 15 cents per member. After discussion this was adopted.

Moved and seconded that the election of officers be the order of business as we convene at 7:00 P.M.

The Young People's Executive Secretary read a splendid report which was accepted with a hearty Amen.

Moved and seconded that we adjourn until 7:00 P.M.

Committees made announcements.

Brother McMasters was appointed by the District Superintendent to serve temporarily on the Examining Board. Moved and seconded that the appointent be approved by the conference.

The sitting was adjourned by singing a verse of "When We All Get to Heaven" and prayer by Brother Phipps.

WEDNESDAY NIGHT-THIRD SITTING

The third sitting of the conference opened at 7:00 P.M. with the congregation joyfully singing "Love Lifted Me," and was followed with a season of prayer led by Rev. W. A. Way.

The Secretary read the minutes of the second sitting and were approved as read.

Upon recommendation of the council, it was moved and seconded to accept as ordained ministers into this District, A. E. Barefoot, C. R. Farris and Omar K. Biddlingmeir. And as fourth year conference licensed ministers, Charles McHargue and James Denny.

The next order of business was the election of officers which resulted in the following elections:

District Superintendent—Wm. H. Neff Assistant Superintendent—W. F. Page Secretary—J. A. Grout Treasurer—L. B. Gallimore Additional Advisory Members—Wray J. Smith, D. R. Saunders, H. B. Barger, and O. L. Ruth On Board of Education—Rev. Carl E. Hightower succeeded himself On Examining Board—Rev. Wray J. Smith succeeded himself.

In the closing moments of the session, Dr. Sturk beautifully sang "Stand By Me," and then gave the thrilling story of the conversion of his son in answer to fervent prayers.

After announcements, the session was dismissed by Rev. O. L. Ruth.

THURSDAY MORNING-FOURTH SITTING

The fourth sitting of the conference opened at 9:00 A.M. with the singing of "Hiding in Thee." Prayer was offered by Rev. George Farah.

Rev. Neff presented Rev. Biggerstaff, Associate Secretary of the Allied Church League of North Carolina. He stated that the purpose of said League is the abolition of beverage alcohol in North Carolina, but that they are also taking steps toward abolishing the legalized gambling of the eastern part of our State. He said the three propaganda lies that the liquor interests are fostering are: 1. That we must control drinking by legalized sale of liquor. 2. We need the revenue from sales of liquor to operate our government; however, they fail to mention that it costs \$5.00 to take care of the criminal effects of drinking for each dollar received in revenue. 3. The last great propaganda lie is that it isn't wrong to drink.

He made a strong appeal to this conference to join hand and heart in praying, working, and giving to see this evil overcome.

The matter of election of officers which was in progress when we recessed from the third sitting was again taken up, and resulted in the following elections:

Advisory Member to Council—Rev. Charles Apple Trustees—Rev. O. L. Ruth, Rev. H. B. Barger, and Rev. C. A. Brown Camp Meeting Secretary and Treasurer—L. L. Lange

Camp Board Members-L. B. Gallimore and Rev. T. R. York

A motion carried that in electing the ministerial delegates to the General Conference, all such be elected by the plurality of vote, and those next highest in number be the alternates. Those elected were: Delegates—Rev. R. I. McCluskey, Rev. L. L. Lange, Rev. Wray J. Smith, Rev. U. N. Freeman, Rev. H. B. Barger, Rev. D. R. Saunders, Rev. George Farah, Rev. R. J. Hobbs, Rev. Paul Uhrig, Rev. W. A. Way, Rev. Charles Apple, and Rev. C. C. McMasters. Alternates—Rev. W. L. Cockman, Rev. H. M. Holmes, Rev. Charles L. Stout, Rev. Harold Loman, Rev. T. C. Vaughn, Rev. F. W. Henry.

Moved and seconded that to nominate the lay delegates, we adjourn for five minutes and that pastors and conference delegates get together and nominate proper names.

Moved and seconded that we extend to Rev. L. E. Schendell of the Rocky Mountain District an honorary seat in the conference bar.

District Superintendent Neff presented Rev. W. C. Lovin, fraternal delegate from the North Carolina Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

Rev. Lovin brought greetings from their conference and expressed their appreciation for the spirit of fellowship that exists between our denominations. He stated that there were four things that he felt that we should have in common, namely: 1. A giving of ourselves to earnest prayer for "times like these." 2. A united stand against the evils of our day. 3. A united effort to solve the problems of our world today by giving to them a full-Gospel. 4. Together, we should have an unwavering faith and trust in Almighty God, our great Heavenly umpire who not only is with us at the beginning of the race, but all through, and certainly will be with us at the end.

Our good Superintendent responded graciously to Rev. Lovin's inspiring message and the conference also showed their appreciation by a hearty "Amen."

The Committee on Resolutions presented four.

Number 1 carried with an amendment to read "we add two additional laymen to the College Board, and that hereafter there shall always be three laymen on the Board.

After several announcements, the session was adjourned by expiration of time. The ballots cast for two additional lay members to the College Board of Directors resulted in the election of Mr. J. W. Lain and Mr. Johnny Smith.

Moved and seconded that we go on record as supporting the work of the Allied Church League and that we authorize the District Council to set some date when each church shall receive a plate offering for said work.

Moved and seconded that we stand as a token of appreciation to the splendid chairmanship of our General Superintendent during the conference.

Mrs. Wm. H. Neff read her report of the work of the Missionary Societies of the State and it was accepted.

Mr. L. B. Gallimore gave a report on the possibilities of group hospital insurance for all conference employees. Moved and seconded that this matter again be referred to the council to work out, and if possible have it negotiated within 60 days.

By request Dr. Sturk again pleased the conference by giving the famous "Bicycle Story" concerning his boys which teaches the moral of how we should cooperate together as brothers even though we may be radically different in personalities, etc. Then just before leaving he beautifully sang "I Won't Have to Cross Jordan Alone."

Moved and seconded that all unfinished business be turned over to the District Council to finish.

With blessing upon our soul, and inspiration to "fight the good fight of faith and lay hold of eternal life," the ministers and delegates said their "goodbyes" to return to their fields and "labor till the Master comes."

Report of District Superintendent

To the North Carolina District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, convened at Kernersville, this August, 1953, Greetings! First, to our General Superintendent and then to all of you who make up this sizeable group.

It is customary for the District Superintendent to give his report, and I am happy to do so. I am not unmindful of the fine spirit and the faithful labors of you Pilgrims over this district, who, under God, have made possible much of this report.

This conference meets at a dark time in the history of the world. The threat of war is still with us, the dangers that a growing communism set up are very real, the fear of an economic slump is widespread. In the church a creeping compromise is dangerous, the sluggishness of many is alarming, the lust for money and material things among our people weakens the offensive against sin; nevertheless, there is a brighter side—God leads on, wherever our people have a will to work and pray the cause is going ahead; we are not defeated, "He that is in us is greater than he that is in the world . . ." if God be for us everything is for us. We are not defeated. The victory is ours through Christ. The spiritual tide of the district is increasing. This has been a year of some outstanding revivals. Our people are seeing the need of reaching out after God in prayer and fasting and of trusting the Holy Ghost more than the programs of men. More and more they are seeing that we must turn from the empty fountains of this world to the fountains of living water. I hope they are seeing that none of us can be spiritual without a regular devotional life of prayer and the reading of God's Word. We must keep the glory of God among us lest we raise up a generation of youth that do not know what the glory is. If we keep the spiritual tide high we will have fewer problems.

With the cooperation of the pastors and the Sunday school boards our Sunday school attendance has increased 325 members.

According to our Statistician's report our net church membership gain is 25.

An increased interest in the young people of our district has been shown by the number of new local young peoples' societies having been organized this year. Also, several revival meetings have been sponsored by the youth groups of the churches. The first District Youth Camp, held on these grounds at Kernersville, in June, proved to be successful in the point of numbers attending, deportment of the young people, cooperation of the pastors, and the spiritual tide of the gathering. More than three-fourths of the group were seeking the Lord during the evangelistic appeals.

Material gains are not as important as spiritual gains but I want you to see what has been done by way of building and improvements on the district.

ASHEBORO renovated the parsonage and did some added work to the church.

BISCOE has made some nice improvements.

ELKIN has built a lovely parsonage.

FAYETTEVILLE has added Sunday school rooms.

FOREST CITY has built a beautiful new church, a credit to Sister Bertha Nations and the little band of Pilgrims in Forest City.

GREENSBORO FIRST has built an educational wing to its church and added other improvements.

KERNERSVILLE has its much-needed and beautiful new church. Hats off to Brother Smith and his people.

LENOIR has paid off several loans.

LIBERTY (Davie County) is starting a new church.

LIBERTY has added two new Sunday school rooms.

MT. OLIVET has added two Sunday school rooms.

MT. OLIVE has built a new parsonage, a real achievement, and it is paid for.

STALEY has put up some Sunday school rooms.

TROY has greatly improved the sanctuary and Sunday school rooms by a complete interior decorating job.

THOMASVILLE is building a new parsonage.

WINSTON-SALEM has added three rooms.

Thank God for these improvements and others in the making.

PILGRIM BIBLE COLLEGE has had its best year, spiritually, financially and numerically. The President and his staff have wrought well.

It appears that THE WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETIES WORK goes ahead. New societies have been organized, and most of them, we believe, are proving a blessing to the local churches. God will bless a missionary church.

I am glad to say that we have organized a new church at Charlotte. It is small but healthy. We have organized at Muir's Chapel, Greensboro (to be known as Guilford Church).

Rev. Ray Hamrick has held a good tent meeting at Atlantic and sees a good prospect there.

I have preached 195 times. My salary of \$3,600 is paid up. I have received \$425 in three meetings totaling only 3 weeks from the district work this year. My traveling expenses have been paid. I have made 165 calls upon the churches, besides council, school board and other committee meetings.

As Mrs. Neff and I have gone in and out among our pastors and laymen we have received the truest Southern hospitality. You have slept us in your best beds, fed us with your choice food, and made us feel at all times that we were welcome both in your homes and in your churches. You have won our hearts completely; we could say many more complimentary words. Believe me, when I say a sincere and humble thank you.

For the constant protection of the Lord, on highway and byway, and for health and grace to carry on the work that we have endeavored to do, we bow our heads to the merciful and loving God.

I officially visited 9 churches, preached 9 sermons, conducted 8 business meetings, organized 1 church, traveled 1,392 miles, received for traveling expenses \$69.60; received for said meetings \$90.00; total support received was \$159.10.

Report of Pilgrim Bible College

To the Forty-Third Annual Conference of the North Carolina District Pilgrim Holiness Church: Greetings!

Through the gracious and benevolent providence of God we are permitted to report to you once again. We wish first to thank God for His mercy and grace that has brought us thus far and promises to lead us on to greater victories and larger fields of service. With deep gratitude and reverent awe we wish to present the following report:

The past year was one marked with spiritual blessings and as I have stated on several occasions, I saw, this year, some of the mightiest manifestations of the power of God, I have ever witnessed. Time will not permit me to relate them, though it would be profitable. I want it to be known we are still stressing a spiritual emphasis, and even more so as the days roll by. Our young people must develop in a spiritual atmosphere or in a short time we will drift into a state of formalism. I could sense many of our young men deepening in God with a decided interest in study, especially of the Word of God.

Numerically it has also been a successful year. There were 145 students enrolled which is 22 per cent above last year. This is the largest student body of any year since the school began. These students came from 15 states and 9 separate denominations. Permit me to brag a little in the Lord, will you? Since I have been here three and one-half years, the student body has grown from 81 to 145 or an increase of 79 per cent. To God goes all the glory.

Financially we closed the books this year the best ever. The Treasurer's report will show we closed this year in the red only \$545.00 as compared to \$3,500.00 a year ago. It is true that when we closed the books the students of this year owing us \$8,363.85 but of this amount \$859.72 has been collected leaving us a balance of \$7,504.13. For God's help in this matter of finance I say praise God. However, I feel, there are two human factors that make it possible for this report. First the increased student body which brought in \$5,338.35 additional receipts and the free will offering the conference granted us a year ago. This amounted to \$1,281.17 additional funds. I trust this privilege will be granted to us another year.

THE INFLUENCE OF THE COLLEGE

The influence of Pilgrim Bible College is reaching out into newer and broader areas every year. This is evidenced by the ever increasing mail from other parts of the country, and this intensifies with each passing year. During my summer travels I found more and more interest in the college and its program.

GIFTS

Pilgrim Bible College has been the recipient of some excellent gifts during the past year. Three friends have each given \$100 gifts to the college during the year. Then the Senior Class gave the school a new high quality tape recorder.

The Kluttz Music and Furniture Company of Granite Quarry, N. C., presented the college with a new Consonatta Electronic Organ. These gifts are all greatly appreciated and will be used to the glory of God.

OUR NEEDS

With greater interest comes greater number of students and with greater number of students the need for more room. We were crowded out for chapel, office and classroom space last year and from present indications it will be more crowded this year. Seriously, we are in desperate need of room for boys' dormitory and classrom space, not to say anything about a chapel. I am praying that some definite and concrete steps will be taken at this conference in the way of an expansion program.

CHANGE OF ADMINISTRATION

Recent changes in the administration has brought about one major shift. Mr. Gordon E. Miller has accepted the office of Acting Dean of the College and will have full authority and responsibility. Upon completion of his work for his Master's degree he will automatically become a full Dean. With his training and experience, we feel this is a definite change for the better. He will also continue as head of the Music Department and direct the A'Cappella Choir.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Library. I would like to urge continued cooperation in securing good books for our library.

2. Expansion program. I repeat, I would like to recommend this conference take immediate action in a definite expansion program for the college.

3. Continued cooperation. I trust the good feeling between district and college shall continue.

In a closing word, may I reiterate that your work and ours is for one great cause, for one great leader and in one great name, for one great end. In these days of weakness, laxity, and indolence in the church world, may God give us a spirit of unity, harmony and cooperation. Only in this manner can we prove to the world that we live and practice the teachings of the Word of God.

May God bless you precious people, and may He give us the wisdom to carry on His program to a successful conclusion.

Report of the Missionary Secretary

The North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church is blessed with ministers, laymen and laywomen who love their Christ and the people to the extent that they are endeavoring, more and more, to carry out the Great Commission, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel."

Because of this it has been easy to guide the missionary endeavors of the churches and to organize missionary societies.

Most of the organized societies are studying the prescribed course of study, are reading the books suggested by the missionary office, and are contributing to some phase of our missionary program.

What has been accomplished by the societies, materially and spiritually, can only be properly evaluated by our God. Nevertheless, some records have been kept by our secretaries and these we are happy now to report.

We have 33 organized societies. Ten of these societies have been organized this past year. There are 203 active members and 185 associate members. Nearly \$1,000 was given for foreign missionary work, \$425 to our general home missionary program, \$125 to student support at Pilgrim Bible College, and \$515.43 to repairs or merchandise for local churches. All the societies did not report so, of course, this is not the entire giving of the societies. I have had the joy of preaching 14 missionary messages, organizing 10 new societies, and teaching the course of study 8 times.

Two churches have given me \$14.00 toward my traveling expenses and to help buy literature for the new societies.

Since it is not possible for me to serve my Lord on a foreign field this little bit of missionary work that I am privileged to do is as dear to me as living.

Memorials to General Conference

1. We recommend that no local board member serve longer than three years consecutively where other members are able to qualify, and that they be elected on a 1, 2, and 3-year term basis.

2. Resolved that paragraph 3 of section 112, page 83 of our manual be deleted; it reads, "In considering the ratio for our ministerial delegation to the General Conference, our foreign missionaries shall not be counted. All foreign missionaries who may be home on furlough and/or who are under appointment by the General Board at the time of the General Conference shall act as a delegation to the General Conference to represent our foreign missionary work irrespective of their fields of labor; and all expenses incurred by their being at the General Conference shall be paid from the foreign missionary fund.

3. Resolved that the introductory statement of paragraph 192, page 134 of our manual be deleted. It reads, "No person shall be admitted to the Lord's Supper who is guilty of any practice for which we would exclude a member of our church."

4. Whereas the education of our young people is of vital importance to the success of the church, therefore be it resolved, that there shall be a Secretary of Education, elected by the General Conference from a group of four nominees named by the General Board; and who shall hold office for the quadrennium; and who shall be a member of the General Executive Council and the General Board.

The duties and responsibilities of the Secretary of Education are as follows:

- 1. To execute the educational policies of the General Church and General Board.
- 2. To represent all educational requests, reports, and interests to the General Board.
- 3. To promote a Holiness Teachers Association.
- 4. To integrate the curricula of all Pilgrim Holiness Schools.
- 5. To maintain a teacher pool or placement center where prospective teachers may be obtained.
- 6. To promote a Senior College.
- 7. To bring recommendations to the Executive Council on matters which shall be presented to the General Board.
- 8. To encourage and promote publicity through the pages of our Advocate.
- 9. To visit each campus once each year, offering advice and suggestions to the administration and exchange such data that will be helpful to the local unit.
- 10. To promote the program of all schools showing no partiality.

The Secretary of Education will receive no full time salary but shall be paid commensurate to the other secretaries while on duty and remuneration for travel as determined by the General Board. He shall also be given office space and equipment in the Headquarters Building.

Standing Rules

DISTRICT AND CONFERENCE

1. The Council is authorized to formulate rules and regulations for the Camp Meeting and Conference. (1943)

2. Be It Resolved: That we as a Conference go on record as urging all churches of the District to be careful in selecting delegates to the Conference and see that those who are elected are spiritual and that they conform to the standards of the Manual. (1945)

3. Be It Resolved: That a questionnaire prepared by the Council be sent to all ministers who belong to our Conference and who are working outside the District; these questionnaires to be returned one month previous to the District Conference.

4. Whereas there is no rule in the Manual nor yet in our Conference Standing Rules governing when the newly elected officers of a local church shall take over their duties; and whereas some new boards are beginning to operate following the close of our fiscal year, or the first of July, while others are waiting until after the Conference to take over their duties, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we interpret the Manual, Page 37, Section 42, Paragraph 1, so that new officers assume their duties the first of July. (1946)

5. Because of the continual election of the same officers each year, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the Conference Minutes of the previous year not be used during the election of officers. (1947)

6. Be It Resolved: That we allow space in the District Minutes for our Young People's Minutes and officers' names. (1947)

7. Inasmuch as the Manual does not provide any time when local license of ministers shall be renewed, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That this Conference adopt the policy that they be required to be sent to the District Superintendent with a recommendation from the local church board, for renewal at each Annual Conference, and further, that any such license not renewed by recommendation of the local church board shall be null and void. (1947)

8. Whereas our Youth Convention being held on a separate day has caused a great deal of confusion as to the operating of a separate convention, and whereas we feel our Youth need the spiritual atmosphere of our annual Camp Meetings, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the Youth Convention convene on the first Friday night of Camp and continue all day Saturday, running in conjunction with Camp Board. (1951)

9. As there is some expense in the performance of the duties of the District Officials and whereas the cost of operation has increased, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we recommend that they be allowed 5c per mile for traveling expenses. (1952)

10. Whereas, there has been a request by the Sunday School Board for more funds to carry on the District work, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That all churches with fifty members and over pay five dollars (\$5.00) a year, and all churches with under fifty members, shall pay three dollars (\$3.00) into the Sunday School Board: said money to be sent specified to the District Treasurer. (1952)

PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH OF NORTH CAROLINA

11. Whereas, the Conference has established the \$3.00 per member budget to be broken down as follows: \$1.50 for indebtedness, \$1.00 for maintenance, \$.50 for insurance; and whereas, there is need for additional revenue for operation of the Bible School; Therefore, Be It Resolved: That this Conference take action that each church put the Bible School in the budget; and be it further resolved that the churches allow the school representatives to conduct one service in the interest of the school, and that they be allowed to raise a cash offering. (1952)

12. Whereas, the present practice of pastoral change involves too great a lapse of time and inconvenience. Therefore, Be It Resolved: That all pastors changing to a new field terminate their labors the last Sunday in July and move to their new field and take up their work the first Sunday in August. (1952)

13. Whereas, our Assistant Superintendent gives much of his time to District work, and whereas the only remuneration he receives is four cents per mile for car expense. Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the Assistant Superintendent receive \$10.00 per trip for business meeting to churches besides the five cents per mile. This to be retroactive for this past year. (1952)

14. Whereas, some churches have failed to win banners, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That all Youth and Sunday School attendance banners be awarded on percentage; not on numerical count. (1952)

15. Resolved: That the budget for 1953-54 remain the same, and that we set our District Superintendent's salary at \$4,000.00 per year. (1953)

16. Resolved: That the delegate fund for General Conference be set at 15c per member. (1953)

17. Resolved: That to secure nominees for General Conference delegates, the pastor and delegate (or delegates) shall get together and nominate a name (or names) to submit to the Conference. (1953)

Standing Rules

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

1. Be It Resolved: That we give our District Superintendent, and also ask the churches to give the pastors, a two weeks' vacation with pay. (1941)

2. The District Superintendent is the Chairman of the Camp Meeting Board. (1943)

3. Resolved: That we grant the District Superintendent the privilege of conducting four revivals a year, and retaining all offerings received from same. (1950)

Standing Rules

COLLEGE

1. Whereas there has been a lot of work done and money raised looking forward to a Bible School,

Therefore, Be It Resolved:

- (a) That we open a Bible School in the fall of 1946.
- (b) (Revised 1953) That we elect a Board of seven members, the Superintendent being chairman, and the School President an

additional member; there shall always be three laymen on the Board. (See Rule 8 of this section.)

- (c) That the Bible School opening in the fall of 1946 carry a minimum of four years high school and two years of Bible.
- (d) That a Building Committee be elected to draw up plans for additional buildings to meet our requirements; said Committee be made up of two members from the Camp Meeting Board and two members from the Bible School Board. The Committee shall report to the District Council and they shall have the final yote before any work is started.

2. We recommend to the District Conference a plan whereby our Bible School Board will be expanded to include representation from all the Districts of our Zone. The recommendation to the District Conference is as follows:

Whereas Pilgrim Bible College is a fully recognized and accredited institution of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, having been authorized by the General Church, and

Whereas the General Board has allotted a definite patronizing zone for Pilgrim Bible College, and

Whereas we are grateful that the following Districts are comprehended in this Zone, namely, South Carolina, the Gulf States and Tennessee,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we, the North Carolina Conference, upon recommendation of the College Board of Directors, urgently request that each of the above named Districts should have one official representative on the College Board, and further that said representative be the District Superintendent; Be It Further Resolved: That when, and if, the General Board should annex other territory as a patronizing zone the same courtesy should be granted each District. (1946)

3. Whereas we face the grave danger of too great a change in our College Board of Directors in any one year,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the two receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected for two years and the other two shall be elected for but one year.

Be It Further Resolved: That from this year on we shall elect but two each year to serve two years. (1946)

DUTIES AND POWERS OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE PILGRIM BIBLE COLLEGE AS PASSED UPON BY THE N. C. DISTRICT COUNCIL ON NOVEMBER 11, 1947

1. Whereas Pilgrim Bible College, located near Kernersville, N. C., is owned and largely financed by the N. C. District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the Board of Directors of the Pilgrim Bible College shall be empowered with the responsibility of operating said College under the direction of the N. C. Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Said Board is to carry out the rules and policies of said Conference. 2. The College Board of Directors shall employ the President, set his salary, and term of employment, subject to the approval of the District Council.

- (a) The College Board shall outline his duties and services to be rendered.
- (b) The President shall be amenable to the College Board of Directors.

3. All faculty members, workers, and employees who are employed by the College shall be employed by the College Board of Directors.

- (a) Such workers may be recommended to the College Board by the Executive Committee.
- (b) The President may recommend such workers to the Executive Committee.
- (c) No member of the faculty may be dismissed except by a twothirds vote of the College Board.
- (d) The President shall not be dismissed during his tenure of office except by a two-thirds vote of the College Board and the approval of the N. C. District Council.
- 4. There shall be two regular meetings of the Board of Directors annually. The Board shall set the dates.
- (a) A special meeting of the Board may be called by the Chair, or by the President requesting the Chair to call such a meeting, or by a request of the majority of the Board members.
- (b) Due to the distance of some of the out-of-state Board members be it resolved that business needing attention between the semiannual meetings shall be handled by the members of the N. C. section of said Board.
- 5. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be:
- (a) To handle all matters of minor nature concerning the operation of the College between meetings of the College Board.
- (b) To make recommendations to the College Board concerning any and all matters pertaining to the welfare of the College.
- (c) To make recommendations as to faculty members as in Rule No. 3, Paragraph a.
- (d) To secure speakers for special occasions of the school; to issue any special advertising for such services.

6. A financial report by the Operating Fund Treasurer for Pilgrim Bible College shall be given at the semi-annual meetings of the Board and the same shall be submitted to the District Treasurer.

7. The College Board of Directors shall authorize the issuance of a catalogue and other printed advertising and publicity for the College. except student publications which shall be under the direction of the President and faculty. (This action was authorized by the Conference of 1947. See Resolution No. 6, 1947 Minutes.)

8. The Executive Committee shall be elected by the College Board of Directors (Minutes, 1948, p. 30, par. 9). It shall also elect its Chairman (Resolution No. 4, 1949 Minutes).

Standing Rules

CAMP

1. Be It Resolved: That this Conference organize a Camp Meeting Association by electing a Secretary-Treasurer and secure members who shall pay \$2.00 each for the first year, and \$1.00 per year thereafter. The duty of the Secretary-Treasurer shall be to keep a correct record of the membership, finances, etc., and disburse same as directed by the District Council. He shall make a report at each District Assembly. He shall also write to each member of the Association before the Camp opens, advising them of the date of the Camp, the evangelist and singers, and ask them for their dues. (1941)

2. Be It Resolved: That this Conference set a date for the Camp Meeting. (The Conference set the date for the Camp to begin on Friday night before the last two Sundays in August.) (1941)

3. Be It Resolved: That this Conference elect a Camp Meeting Board by secret ballot, said Board to have authority to secure workers, and raise and disperse money and promote the interest of the Camp Meeting. The District Superintendent shall be Chairman of said Board.

Since there is no stated time when the term of the Camp Meeting Board expires, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That a Camp Meeting Secretary and Treasurer be elected by this Conference and that his term shall expire at the next Annual Conference. Be It Further Resolved: That the eight additional members be elected as follows:

Two members for a period of four years

Two members for a period of three years

Two members for a period of two years

Two members for a period of one year

and thereafter each year we are to elect two members for four years as the terms of the two members expire.

4. Be It Resolved: That each pastor solicit each of his members to join the Camp Meeting Association and that he collect or appoint one of his members to collect and send the money collected to the Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Association.

5. Whereas the report of the Camp Meeting Secretary-Treasurer could not be completed prior to the Conference,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That this report be completed at the close of the Camp Meeting, be approved by the District Council and inserted in the Minutes.

Standing Rules

SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

1. Be It Resolved: That the District Council elect a Sunday School Board of four, including the Sunday School Secretary. The duties of the District Sunday School Board, in harmony with the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, shall be as follows:

- 1. The District Sunday School Board shall arrange an Annual Sunday School Convention to be held some time during the year.
- 2. To promote and encourage the Sunday School work throughout the District.
- 3. To present an annual report to the District Conference which shall include the following:
 - (a) A statement of the work accomplished during the year.
 - (b) A statement of the general condition of the Sunday School work in the District.
 - (c) To recommend to the District Conference through the Ways and Means Committee the amount considered necessary to finance the District Sunday School work.
- 4. The District Sunday School Board shall be amenable to the District Council.
- 5. The District Council shall have the right to remove, or cause to be removed, any member of the District Sunday School Board who, in the judgment of such Council, is not in harmony with the teaching of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- 6. If for any reason there is a vacancy on the District Sunday School Board, the District Council, by a majority vote, may fill the vacancy.
- 7. To have published each quarter a District Sunday School sheet showing the attendance of each Sunday School on the District for the month, the preceding month, and the attendance for the same quarter a year ago, as well as the average attendance for the year—this sheet to be sent to each pastor and Sunday School Superintendent in the District. (1943)

2. Whereas there is no uniform method of revising the Sunday School enrollment,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That each church revise their Sunday School roll each quarter, and be it further resolved that no one be dropped from the roll until they have missed at least five consecutive Sundays and have been visited by Sunday School officials. (1947)

Standing Rules

HOME MISSIONS

1. We recommend that the birthday offering be used for the purpose of Church Extension, and that each pastor explain, encourage and push the offerings; however, we still retain the call card. (1942) 2. A Home Missionary Association shall be formed, made up of members to be secured by the District Superintendent as he makes his rounds. Each member is to pay \$1.00 when called upon, and not more than two calls per year. (1940)

3. In order to help relieve the load of home missionary responsibility placed upon the District Superintendent,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we elect an advisory committee of two members to work with the District Superintendent in all matters and details of District home missions. Said committee to function under and make recommendations to the Council. The Superintendent shall nominate and the Council ratify the nomination of the Superintendent of two persons to serve with himself as a committee on home missions. (1945)

4. Whereas, the established churches are requested to give a year's subscription to the Advocate and a copy of the Manual to each new member joining the church, and since no provision is made for new churches.

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the District Home Missionary Department furnish a copy of the Manual and one year's subscription to the Advocate free to each family represented in the Charter membership of newly organized churches. (1946)

Standing Rules

YOUNG PEOPLE

1. Whereas, it is desirable to have identification of those attending our Youth Conventions, Be It Resolved: 'That a \$1.00 registration fee be charged of all who desire entertainment at our convention. (1952)

2. Whereas, our young people are one of the greatest assets of our church, and to better serve the interest of their work, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the North Carolina District be divided into five zones, and officers appointed for each zone by the Council upon recommendation by the Executive Secretary and District Superintendent. Details of organization, officers, meetings, etc., to be worked out by the Executive Secretary and Superintendent under the Council's direction. (1953)

3. Whereas the expense of the Executive Youth Secretary involves more than merely travel, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we pay said Secretary \$50.00 per year. (1953)

4. Whereas our first Youth Camp has proven to be a grand success, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That a District Youth Camp be an annual event in our District, and that the planning and program of this Camp be supervised by our District Youth Board subject to the approval of the District Council. The purpose of this Camp will be spiritual instruction, supervised recreation, and the salvation of our youth. (1953 Conference action)

Resolutions

1. Whereas, Pilgrim Bible College has experienced excellent growth, and whereas the influence of the College is increasing, therefore be it resolved that we add two additional laymen to the College Board, and that hereafter there shall always be three laymen on said Board.

2. Whereas, Pilgrim Bible College has made remarkable growth during its short history, and whereas, the College is taxed to its capacity with present enrollments, and whereas, the influence of the College is steadily reaching new friends, therefore, be it resolved that the Council, School Board, and any other related committees have authority to go forward with the enlargement campaign when and if they see fit to proceed.
