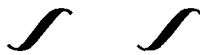

Journal of Proceedings

The Forty-Fourth Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church was called to order at 10 a.m., August 18, 1954, at the Conference Tabernacle, Kernersville, N. C., by District Superintendent Wm. H. Neff who greeted the many ministers, lay-delegates, and friends who through the mercies of God had been permitted to gather once again to do business for our great God and church.

Brother Stutts led the conference in singing "He Abides" and a verse of "A Charge to Keep I Have."

Prayer was led by our much-loved and respected former District Superintendent, Rev. S. M. Stikeleather.

Brother Neff presented our capable and very busy General Superintendent, Dr. L. W. Sturk, who brought greetings and reports from the church as a whole. He then brought a fine message on "Our Church."

He said, First, Our Objective as a church is two-fold: to win souls to Christ, and to build them up in the most holy faith. All our activities, gifts, and works are with the thought of building up men for life and eternity. Second, he said, Our Controlling Motivation as a church is to ever carry a deep compassion for the souls of men. Men daily make great sacrifices to save property and lives; how much more should we exercise ourselves to rescue lost souls as "brands from eternal burnings."

Third, he said, the Basic Qualification in our church for the ministry and workers is a right relationship with God. As valuable as are gifts, education, and the like, our relationship to God is of the supreme importance.

The conference bar was set to include the first fifteen rows of the tabernacle, excepting the rows on the right which are for visitors. The time of sittings was placed at 9:00 a.m. to 11:45 a.m., 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m., and 7:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m.

An announcement concerning meal time stated that meals would be served at 7:30 a.m., 12 noon, and 5:15 p.m.

The District Superintendent announced several changes on the boards:

Resolutions: Rev. Chas. Williams appointed to replace D. R. Saunders, Rev. U. N. Freeman replaced R. I. McCluskey.

Ways and Means: Rev. W. L. Cockman replaced F. W. Henry.

Auditing Committee: Rev. and Mrs. F. W. Henry replaced Rev. and Mrs. D. R. Saunders.

Several announcements were made concerning various places where Boards would be meeting.

The first sitting adjourned with the benediction by Rev. O. L. Ruth.

PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH OF NORTH CAROLINA

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON—SECOND SITTING

The second sitting of the conference was opened at 2:00 p.m. with Brother Stutts leading the conference in singing "Revive Us Again." Prayer was led by Rev. W. L. Cockman.

The secretary read the minutes of the first sitting and were approved.

A motion carried that we accept Rev. W. D. Shepherd, ordained minister of the People's Methodist Church, as a minister in the full standing of ordination into this conference.

The reception committee presented Rev. and Mrs. S. M. Stikeleather of Kingswood, Ky. They gave words of testimony and greeting. They were voted a seat in the conference and a warm welcome by a standing vote.

The District Superintendent, Wm. H. Neff, gave his good report of our district work, and of his untiring efforts for the cause of Christ. His report was cheerfully and gratefully received.

The Assistant Superintendent, F. W. Page, read his report and was accepted.

The Auditing Committee's report was given by Rev. F. W. Henry.

The Treasurer, L. B. Gallimore, again had his fine report of District finances all mimeographed out, and passed them out to the audience, and then proceeded to give us a most excellent report of the financial work of the District, plus an enlightening report of the Group Insurance plan now carried by the conference ministers. A motion carried that we accept this splendid report with a hearty Amen.

President K. W. Phipps of Pilgrim Bible College gave a challenging and encouraging report and was accepted.

The Statistician, L. L. Lange, read the statistical report and was accepted.

The Camp Meeting Treasurer, L. L. Lange, read a detailed report of the finances of the camp of 1953 and was accepted.

Rev. Mrs. Wm. H. Neff reported for the Ladies Missionary Societies of our conference, and was accepted.

Rev. Geo. Farah, Executive Young People's Secretary, gave a report of the achievements of our wonderful Youth, and was accepted.

Rev. Charles Stout, Executive Sunday School Secretary, reported for the State Sunday School work and was accepted with gratefulness for the reported gains that were shown.

The second sitting was adjourned early due to a coming storm and also that the committees might sooner get into session for some needed work.

WEDNESDAY NIGHT—THIRD SITTING

The third sitting opened with the singing of "I Know Whom I Have Believed" and prayer was offered by Rev. H. R. Helms.

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A motion carried that we have the ordination service at 8:30 a.m. Thursday, and the election of officers at 9:15 a.m.

The resolutions committee presented eleven resolutions for our consideration of which six carried.

Motion carried that we authorize the District Treasurer to borrow what money is needed, from funds on hand, and pay off some pressing bills for Pilgrim Bible College until the operating fund is put in order, or other means are sufficient for repayment.

The Ways and Means Committee recommended that the budget for 1954-1955 remain the same, and that we set our District Superintendent's salary at \$4,000.00 per year.

THURSDAY MORNING—FOURTH SITTING

The fourth sitting of the conference opened with a very beautiful ordination service in which ten men and one lady were ordained to the ministry, and one lady was ordained as a deaconess. General Superintendent L. W. Sturk delivered the ordination charge. His charge was on the subject of "How To Succeed In The Christian Ministry." He said that first, and of fundamental importance, was "Know Your Standing With God." Then, second: Be definite in your calling. Third: Have a high estimate of your trust. Fourth: Be encouraged by the reward coming at the end of the journey.

The Reception Committee presented Rev. J. A. Grout, Jr., of Wilmore, Ky., Rev. Hilton of the Wesleyan church, Mrs. Olson of California, but now of Kernersville, and Rev. and Mrs. Beck of California.

A new church was presented to the conference. It was the Summerfield church. Rev. R. A. Pegram dug this work out. Miss Pegram was the delegate from the new church. A motion prevailed to accept the new church into conference.

A group of first year licensed ministers, and R. L. Bowling accepted as an ordained minister into the conference.

Rev. Wm. H. Neff who has so untiringly and efficiently served our District for the past five years withdrew his name from the ballot as nominee for Superintendent.

By a rising vote of thanks, the conference spoke their appreciation of the wonderful services of Rev. and Mrs. Neff.

Also a motion carried that we give a love offering as a further token of our appreciation of our Superintendent's labors. Offering amounted to \$108.90.

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THURSDAY AFTERNOON—FIFTH SITTING

The fifth sitting of the conference opened at 1:20 p.m. with the Secretary reading the minutes of the third and fourth sittings, and they were adjudged correct.

The Reception Committee presented Rev. and Mrs. Roy Rummage, pastors in Detroit, Michigan.

The next order of business was the electing of the remaining officers:

Examining Board—O. L. Ruth to succeed himself

College Board of Directors—3 years: L. B. Gallimore, Wray J. Smith, O. L. Ruth; 2 years: Wm. H. Neff

District Trustees—3 years: Troy C. Vaughn; 1 year: F. W. Henry

Camp Meeting Board—Secretary-Treasurer: L. L. Lange

The Board of Education made its recommendations as to the licentiates standings for the next year, and they were accepted.

Motion carried that the council have authority to ratify any further consideration of licentiates.

Motion carried that the council and camp meeting board take steps to set the conference and camp forward in August two weeks, starting in 1959.

Motion carried that the Educational and Examining Boards meet the afternoon preceding conference to get their work started.

Motion carried that we waive any matter necessary in order that our ministry may join the group-insurance without paying back fees or having to take an examination.

The Memoirs Committee presented a beautiful tribute to those of our number who were taken from us by death during the past year.

A motion carried that any pastor having a family leave his church and move to another town where we have a church, contact our pastor there so that he may secure their attendance.

Motion carried that the council prepare a statement relative to our stand on the liquor problem and give it to the reporters.

Motion carried that minister's children under 18 and unemployed be entertained free at the District Conference.

By a rising vote of thanks, the conference stood to express their deep appreciation for the untiring efforts of Mrs. Neff in the conference work of our District, and especially in the Missionary Societies.

A motion carried that we leave all unfinished business to the District council.

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A benedictory prayer of great depth was offered by the retiring Superintendent, Rev. Wm. Neff, in which he especially prayed for his successor and the work of the District that it may grow and prosper under God.

Report of District Superintendent

In the goodness of God we come together again to carry on the business assigned to us in the interest of this great Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. It is with heartfelt gratitude that I submit this report. For any good and worthwhile achievement that it may represent I want you to know that has been made possible by the cooperation and work of our pastors, people and friends.

As we review the months that are past we are made to realize how limited the wisdom, how inadequate the strength of us mere humans when called on to deal with this matter of getting men out of sin into grace and getting the church forward and onward for Christ and full salvation. But we have not worked alone; we have had our helper—the blessed Holy Ghost. And it has been a good year.

Practically our entire time has been given to the District work; our work for the General Church has taken little of our time, and we have carried out the duties of the Manual as best we could. To help make up time I have not taken all the meetings allowed me by the District. Every kindness has been shown us as we have gone from church to church, and we have enjoyed your fellowship.

Let me call your attention, as is customary, first, to the **physical improvements** made. This is important. I'm glad to see home base strengthened. The small but aggressive band at EUREKA has just built a lovely new parsonage. The Pilgrims at BETHEL are completing a Sunday school unit. BETHLEHEM has made substantial parsonage repairs. A nice new church is well on the way to completion at BROWER'S CHAPEL. BRYSON CITY free from debt. There stands at CHARLOTTE a fine, large church that is a credit to the denomination. DRAPER has completed a Sunday school room and much needed repairs on the parsonage. FAYETTEVILLE has added a Sunday school unit which was much needed. FOREST CITY, fine improvement in church. The Pilgrims at FRANKLINVILLE have greatly added to the looks and improvements of both church and parsonage. HILLSBORO has brought its church building work to completion. LENOIR is free from debt. LIBERTY (Davie County) has completed its new church. LIBERTY (Davidson County) has set up its pastor in a fine new parsonage. Further improvements have been made at MT. OLIVE. ST. PAUL has completed the church building and is now erecting a nice 7-room parsonage. The THOMASVILLE Pilgrims have completed a lovely parsonage. TROY has added a beautiful parsonage to its equipment and also purchased a building adjacent to the church for Sunday school facilities. FRANKLINTON has done a thorough repaint job. I praise God for these, and other, improvements. In most instances the churches are carrying on their obligations to the District and General Church work. If I have overlooked any major improvement, please bear with me and tell me about it—I shall incorporate it in this report. BISCOE church has added two much-needed Sunday school rooms. J. R. Washington is the pastor. STALEY has completed two Sunday school rooms and redecorated the interior of the church. W. Vann Howard is the pastor.

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NEW WORK

You are always interested in new work. This is always hard; you have only to read the reports of other conferences to discover that. But I am glad to report some advances. A new church has been organized with 16 members at SUMMERFIELD. Brother R. A. Pegram got that place on his heart, held meetings there in a rented store building, and has given us this new church. A new building is almost completed, paying as they go. God bless Brother Pegram and his faithful little band!

At ATLANTIC a lot has just been purchased and the church at HARKERS together with the Home Mission Committee expects soon to have a new church there. Brother Hemrick with several other pastors has directed this advance.

The District Superintendent met with a band of believers at WASHINGTON, which Brother Carrol has gotten together, and they want a Pilgrim Holiness Church. With a little more nurture and help and counsel we shall have such a church there. It will be good to see Atlantic and Washington, down east, develop into strong Pilgrim Holiness churches.

I believe another new work will soon be ours, but as yet I am not at liberty to disclose the facts regarding this prospect. So the future is bright for Pilgrim Holiness Church.

PILGRIM BIBLE COLLEGE

Our Bible College moves on in real progress. But since President Phipps will be making a full and complete report I shall leave that to him.

SUNDAY SCHOOL AND YOUTH WORK

A wide awake Sunday school work and a wide awake youth work will be reported by Brothers Stout and Farah. I'm delighted with their work and rejoice in the victory which they have had this year.

According to our Statistician, Brother Lange,

Mrs. Neff has been successfully getting the Foreign Missionary work before our people, with new societies being organized, and a God-blessed District convention held at Greensboro First Church in January.

I have preached 203 times, have seen a number of souls seeking God for pardon or purity. My salary is paid up in full, and I have received \$395 in other meetings.

I should like to suggest that we set a few goals: 3 new churches this coming year, 10% gain in membership, 10 new Sunday schools and a real revival in every church. This state needs a salvation work that will stay by the Word of God. Let's do that and go ahead.

For the protection of God, the fine loyal support of my assistant, Brother Fred Page, and the cooperation of all the pastors and people, I humbly praise God.

Report of Pilgrim Bible College

To the Forty-Fourth Annual Conference of the North Carolina District:

Greetings in the Name of God who loved us and gave His Son to die for us.

In these days of strain and stress, uncertainty and insecurity, it is good to have one to whom to turn in the hour of need. For the first time in twenty years the nations of the world are not at war. It was twenty years ago that Mussolini invaded Ethiopia and what devastation, ruin and bloodshed since that time.

One wonders what next! The forces of democracy seemingly are permitting Communism to call all the plays and they are helpless to interfere. Just recently 13,000,000 more people were put under the hammer and sickle. It could be that this cessation of hostilities over the world is what is referred to in I Thessalonians 5:3. "When they shall say, Peace and safety, then cometh sudden destruction upon them."

Further, it could mean that the forces of Communism are using it for a breather and are making plans for another attack or agitation somewhere else in the world. They will be satisfied with Korea's and Indo China's as long as they are in any means successful. This is all done without loss of Russian soldiers. Unless there is a decided change in the future, United States will become, if not already, a second rate power. That could mean trouble.

But in spite of it all God is still on the throne. He is still at the helm of world affairs and if we stay with Him, He will bring us safely into victory.

The past year at Pilgrim Bible College was not without its battles and hardships, but we believe God is bringing us through. It seems the forces of evil are trying desperately to get in and hinder the work of God. This added to financial reverses has made it a very hard year indeed. Mr. Gallimore's report will show this condition.

As you well know by now the A'Cappella choir of P. B. C. was invited to sing at the General Conference and they certainly made a fine exhibition both for the District and the school. We certainly appre-

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ciate these young people and their effort and all the people who contributed to make it possible for them to go. If we desired to pat ourselves a little on the back, I think we had the best group there from a musical standpoint.

STUDENT BODY

Last year saw the student body reach its highest number since the school began as 151 persons registered. It should be pointed out that the growth of the college has not been rapid but steady which, by the way, is more healthy. About 54% of these were enrolled in the Bible Department; about 29% in High School; about 11% in Junior College; about 2% in Music; about 4% Special. These students come from North Carolina, Virginia, Florida, Alabama, Louisiana, South Carolina, Georgia, Kentucky, Tennessee, West Virginia, Delaware, Pennsylvania, Ohio, and Michigan.

While we are on this topic let me say a word about the prospects for the coming year. I would say according to present indications the prospects appear for a student body about equal to what we had a year ago. It is going to be necessary to screen some and that of course will affect the total enrollment. I look for about 150 again next year.

OUR PRODUCT

The value of any institution is not to be judged only upon the plant but also upon the product. Pilgrim Bible College is making a fine record in this respect, though it is only eight years old. Ten of her graduates now hold pastorates in this conference. In addition to these 10 there are six others who are now attending our school or have attended in the past but have not graduated also hold pastorates in this conference. That makes a total of 16 or 29% of the pastors in this conference that are the products of P. B. C. But that is not all. From our school have gone three pastors in Tennessee, one in Virginia, a Nazarene pastor, two to the Wesleyan Methodist, one Christian and Missionary Alliance and one Baptist. This makes a grand total of 25 doing pastoral work.

Pilgrim Bible College is not without a Missionary product either. We now have two missionaries in Africa, a missionary-teacher in New Mexico, and one under appointment to New Guinea. From the Home Missionary field we have a young man working in the Alabama-North West-Florida District and one over in the Louisiana District.

Pilgrim Bible College also boasts of the fact that nine of her product are now in the teaching profession. Four are nurses to say nothing of those now training for the splendid profession. Time would fail me to tell of the young people in college completing their training, those doing gainful employment, those who have become splendid pastors' wives, and those doing work with children and young people and the work among the colored in Winston-Salem and Kernersville.

You folk may well be proud of the splendid product that has gone and is going out from your school. Please hold them up in prayer and lend a helping hand. Our land needs a tremendously large number of such fine workers.

IMPROVEMENTS

Since last conference there has been considerable change in the buildings and on the campus. In the girls' dorm a new oak floor has been

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laid on the top floor; and in addition Mr. Easter of Winston-Salem completely remodeled the two end rooms at no cost to the College. Then the College remodeled another room and to date three churches have sent in money to remodel other rooms. These churches are Randleman, Burlington and High Point. The cost of this work is \$50.00 per room. We are now in the process of this remodeling and I hope there is no letting up until all the rooms are remodeled and new furniture installed. Then as you notice we have put up a restraining wall to keep water from washing the dirt away in front of the Ad Building. I am sure you all appreciate the brick walks that have been laid and also the landscaping done in front of the girls' dorm. This credit should go to Mr. West.

Then Mr. Hoover from Mebane gave us some new screen doors for the dining room and kitchen. The Louisiana Conference is furnishing new table cloths for the dining room. We are grateful for all these things.

HARVEST INGATHERING

This has been a great asset to the College in the days past and could be even greater. We appreciate all that has been done and want to thank everyone for it. But I would like to suggest a change in our method and ask your opinion upon it. Instead of every church bringing in just anything and everything, I would like to recommend that each church be assigned one definite type of product and the entire church give on that one thing. For instance, Greensboro First would provide meat, and Asheboro would give vegetables, and Forest City would send sugar and flour. I believe this would be a better method and I am prepared to assign the commodities to the respective churches. I trust you will make your feelings known in this matter.

NEEDS

In a word I would say that we must continue to pray about a new building. It is true that another contemplated road through this property has postponed our activities up to the present time but they should be put back into action again. Then there is need for finishing the girls' dorm throughout. We are now in need of a new piano for the chapel also. We have made a fine addition to the library but more must be done here. And of course there is always the need of additional money.

It would be a great forward step if this conference could and would take definite action and supply the College with a good surplus fund. This would do two things: It would give needed money for running expenses of the College and would meet a requirement of an endowment to satisfy accreditation demands. This fund must total a minimum of \$5,000 as that is about our deficiency this year. It could be done, I believe, in the form of a living endowment. That is if a person gives \$10.00 that would be the interest at 5% on a reserve of \$200. An accreditation association would look upon that gift of \$10.00 as interest and the donor making available \$200.00 to the College, though they would not actually give the \$200.00.

I figured it out on this basis and if it could be done it would work no hardship on anyone. If over our zone we could find the following:

- 15 persons giving \$100 per year
- 25 persons giving \$ 50 per year
- 50 persons giving \$ 25 per year
- 50 persons giving \$ 10 per year
- 100 persons giving \$ 5 per year

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this amount would be cared for easily. This would total \$5,000. Will you please make this a subject of prayer and consideration.

I trust you will continue to pray for us in this tremendous work. It is too great for human shoulders but can be successful with Divine aid. To watch these young people settle in God, grow in grace and live for God is gratifying indeed. This school has some of the finest young people that can be found anywhere and we need to stand by them and pray for them. This College now is building your District for tomorrow and we are trying to build it well.

Thank you for every prayer you have prayed, every burden you have carried, every dollar you have given, every nice word you have spoken, every encouragement you have shared and every other contribution you have made. God bless you richly and may He lead us on.

May the light of His grace shine exceedingly bright in this dark day of sin. We pledge to help you carry the load of the District. It might be of interest for you to know that the product of this school has already brought into this conference two new churches in the last two years and we are praying many more will come in as a result.

We must work together, stand together, fight together, labor together and when victory comes shout together.

May God bless you is my prayer.

It is with a deep sense of thanksgiving and appreciation to our Heavenly Father, also to members of the Sunday School Board, pastors, superintendents, teachers, and all Sunday school workers of our great District, that we are able to give this report.

I would like to say that we appreciate the fine work and the good foundation for our District Sunday school work laid by our former Promotional Secretary, Rev. T. R. York, during the nine years that he served our North Carolina Conference as Secretary. During those nine years our Sunday schools showed a gain in average attendance of 2,098 per Sunday.

This year many of our schools show a gain in attendance, while some others show a loss. This does not mean that these schools have not been on the job for many times circumstances handicap our progress.

There have been six zone conventions held this year, along with the District Annual Convention of last Camp, which was the largest we have ever had thus far.

Report of the Young People's Executive Secretary

To the Forty-Fourth Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church:

Following is an outlay of our Youth Program, and a report of another year's activities.

YOUTH SOCIETIES: The grass roots of our Youth Program is in the youth organization of the individual church. Our District work will not succeed unless we have an active group in our local churches.

ZONE RALLIES: We wish to report that fifteen rallies were held in our District last year. These have been conducted by our Zone Chairmen: Clyde Parker, Elkin Zone; W. B. Walker, Asheboro Zone; L. L. Lange, Salisbury Zone; Charles Williams, Burlington Zone. This is a very important part of our Youth Program, and the full support of our pastors is not only appreciated but necessary.

YOUTH CAMP: Because of the hard work and full cooperation of our workers and teachers, our second Annual Youth Camp was a big success. Our program of instruction, recreation, and evangelism proved to be very efficient and the results were gratifying. Our Camp this year was divided into two groups: one week for the juniors and the second week for the senior age group. We had a total enrollment of 196 and about 70 of our youth knelt for Spiritual help at the altar. We feel this is a very important part of our program, and a very aggressive method of winning our youth to Christ. We also feel this is a good method of instructing them and keeping them interested in our church. We urge you to begin now to make plans, and urge your youth to attend next year's camp.

DISTRICT RALLY: Our District Rally is conducted the first two days of camp each year. By this means our youth have the privilege of enjoying evangelism at its best and at the same time lend an impact to the first services of the camp that could not be obtained by any other means.

OUR PROJECTS: We promised \$40.00 per month toward the support of our Charlotte work. We have paid \$500.00. We feel this is a good contribution to our District, and it further proves our youth are inter-

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ested in our church and have a desire to advance its cause. We have also pledged and paid this past year \$100.00 to help liquidate the debt on Pilgrim Bible College.

I have traveled about 1,100 miles in the interest of our Youth Work this year, attending Board Meetings, Rallies, and conducting the business of our Youth Work.

We wish to thank our District Superintendent, our Zone Leaders, our pastors, and our youth workers in each church for their faithful support which has made possible another successful year in our District Youth Work.

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Seven new societies have been organized this year. One pastor said that the organization of the Missionary Society in his church has proved a great blessing to the local church as well as to the regions beyond. Thirty-one dollars and 24 cents (\$31.24) has been given me in offerings, all of which, and more, I have used for the purchase of missionary materials distributed to the various societies.

Resolutions

1. Resolve that a strong Church Extension Board of five men be elected by this conference from a list of ten or more nominees submitted by the District Council. Said Board shall elect its own officers, with the exception that the Assistant District Superintendent will be the chairman. The District Superintendent shall be an advisory member of this Board by virtue of his office and shall give advice and assistance in every way possible. Said Board shall be subject to the District Council.

The duties of the said Board are to study the field, select appropriate locations, provide facilities, secure workers, launch campaigns, give guidance, and work towards organizing churches.

The financial resources shall be as follows:

1. District Home Missionary Funds.
2. Public offerings in services held on the field.
3. Personal donations.
4. An appeal to the established churches not more than once a year.
5. That one thousand dollars be paid out of the home missionary funds as a starter for this project.
6. The expenses of the Board in connection with this work may be collected from the home missionary fund.

2. Resolved that the District Superintendent, the College President, and the District Treasurer be appointed by this conference as a committee of three to raise an operating fund in the amount of \$6,000.00. The plans of said committee shall be approved by the District Council before being put into action.

3. Resolved that candidates for ordination be reviewed one month preceding conference by the educational, examining boards and District Council, and that they be notified immediately whether or not they will be ordained.

PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH OF NORTH CAROLINA

2. That the first night session of the conference be designated for the ordination service.

3. That the certificate of ordination be presented formally during the ordination service.

4. (6) Resolved that any church changing pastors have the privilege and pleasure of contacting any minister in the District whom the church board feels would be a suitable pastor.

5. (7) Resolved that the offerings taken for the Youth Home Missionary project be sent direct to our District Youth Treasurer.

6. (11) Whereas the harvest ingathering has been a great blessing to the Pilgrim Bible College, and whereas, it could be a greater asset if all cooperated and confined their giving on a single commodity, therefore, be it resolved that each church be assigned a single commodity and the entire church give toward that item.

WAYS AND MEANS

1. Resolved that the budget for 1954-1955 remain the same, and that we pay our District Superintendent the salary of \$4,000.00 a year.

Standing Rules

DISTRICT AND CONFERENCE

1. The Council is authorized to formulate rules and regulations for the Camp Meeting and Conference. (1943)

2. Be It Resolved: That we as a Conference go on record as urging all churches of the District to be careful in selecting delegates to the Conference and see that those who are elected are spiritual and that they conform to the standards of the Manual. (1945)

3. Be It Resolved: That a questionnaire prepared by the Council be sent to all ministers who belong to our Conference and who are working outside the District; these questionnaires to be returned one month previous to the District Conference.

4. Whereas there is no rule in the Manual nor yet in our Conference Standing Rules governing when the newly elected officers of a local church shall take over their duties; and whereas some new boards are beginning to operate following the close of our fiscal year, or the first of July, while others are waiting until after the Conference to take over their duties, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we interpret the Manual, Page 37, Section 42, Paragraph 1, so that new officers assume their duties the first of July. (1946)

5. Because of the continual election of the same officers each year, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the Conference Minutes of the previous year not be used during the election of officers. (1947)

6. Be It Resolved: That we allow space in the District Minutes for our Young People's Minutes and officers' names. (1947)

7. Inasmuch as the Manual does not provide any time when local license of ministers shall be renewed, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That this Conference adopt the policy that they be required to be sent to the District Superintendent with a recommendation from the local church board, for renewal at each Annual Conference, and further, that any such license not renewed by recommendation of the local church board shall be null and void. (1947)

8. Whereas our Youth Convention being held on a separate day has caused a great deal of confusion as to the operating of a separate convention, and whereas we feel our Youth need the spiritual atmosphere of our annual Camp Meetings, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the Youth Convention convene on the first Friday night of Camp and continue all day Saturday, running in conjunction with Camp Board. (1951)

9. As there is some expense in the performance of the duties of the District Officials and whereas the cost of operation has increased, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we recommend that they be allowed 5c per mile for traveling expenses. (1952)

10. Whereas, there has been a request by the Sunday School Board for more funds to carry on the District work, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That all churches with fifty members and over pay five dollars (\$5.00) a year, and all churches with under fifty members, shall pay three dollars (\$3.00) into the Sunday School Board: said money to be sent specified to the District Treasurer. (1952)

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11. Whereas, the Conference has established the \$3.00 per member budget to be broken down as follows: \$1.50 for indebtedness, \$1.00 for maintenance, \$.50 for insurance; and whereas, there is need for additional revenue for operation of the Bible School; Therefore, Be It Resolved: That this Conference take action that each church put the Bible School in the budget; and be it further resolved that the churches allow the school representatives to conduct one service in the interest of the school, and that they be allowed to raise a cash offering. (1952)

12. Whereas, the present practice of pastoral change involves too great a lapse of time and inconvenience, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That all pastors changing to a new field terminate their labors the last Sunday in July and move to their new field and take up their work the first Sunday in August. (1952)

13. Whereas, our Assistant Superintendent gives much of his time to District work, and whereas the only remuneration he receives is five cents per mile for car expense, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the Assistant Superintendent receive \$10.00 per trip for business meeting to churches besides the five cents per mile. This to be retroactive for this past year. (1952)

14. Whereas, some churches have failed to win banners, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That all Youth and Sunday School attendance banners be awarded on percentage; not on numerical count. (1952)

15. Resolved: That the budget for 1954-55 remain the same, and that we set our District Superintendent's salary at \$4,000.00 per year. (1954)

16. Resolved: That the delegate fund for General Conference be set at 15c per member. (1953)

17. Resolved: That to secure nominees for General Conference delegates, the pastor and delegate (or delegates) shall get together and nominate a name (or names) to submit to the Conference. (1953)

18. Whereas, there has been a steady increase in the cost of living, and whereas, this has not been taken into consideration by many local church boards, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That every church of our District be requested to pay the pastor's utilities. (1953)

19. Resolved: That candidates for ordination be reviewed one month preceding conference by the educational, examining boards, and District Council, and that they be notified immediately whether or not they will be ordained.

2. The first night session of the conference be designated for the ordination service.

3. The certificate of ordination be presented formally during the ordination service. (1954)

20. Resolved: That any church changing pastors have the privilege and pleasure of contacting any minister in the District whom the church board feels would be a suitable pastor. (1954)

21. Resolved: That ministers' children under 18, and unemployed, be entertained free at the District Conference. (1954)

Standing Rules

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

1. Be It Resolved: That we give our District Superintendent, and also ask the churches to give the pastors, a two weeks' vacation with pay. (1941)
2. The District Superintendent is the Chairman of the Camp Meeting Board. (1943)
3. Resolved: That we grant the District Superintendent the privilege of conducting four revivals a year, and retaining all offerings received from same. (1950)

Standing Rules

COLLEGE

1. Whereas there has been a lot of work done and money raised looking forward to a Bible School,

Therefore, Be It Resolved:

- (a) That we open a Bible School in the fall of 1946.
- (b) (Revised 1953) That we elect a Board of seven members, the Superintendent being chairman, and the School President an additional member; there shall always be three laymen on the Board. (See Rule 8 of this section.)
- (c) That the Bible School opening in the fall of 1946 carry a minimum of four years high school and two years of Bible.
- (d) That a Building Committee be elected to draw up plans for additional buildings to meet our requirements; said Committee be made up of two members from the Camp Meeting Board and two members from the Bible School Board. The Committee shall report to the District Council and they shall have the final vote before any work is started.

2. We recommend to the District Conference a plan whereby our Bible School Board will be expanded to include a representation from all the Districts of our Zone. The recommendation to the District Conference is as follows:

Whereas Pilgrim Bible College is a fully recognized and accredited institution of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, having been authorized by the General Church, and

Whereas the General Board has allotted a definite patronizing zone for Pilgrim Bible College, and

Whereas we are grateful that the following Districts are comprehended in this Zone, namely, South Carolina, the Gulf States and Tennessee,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we, the North Carolina Conference, upon recommendation of the College Board of Directors, urgently request that each of the above named Districts should have one official repre-

sentative on the College Board, and further that said representative be the District Superintendent; Be It Further Resolved: That when, and if, the General Board should annex other territory as a patronizing zone the same courtesy should be granted to each District. (1946)

3. Whereas we face the grave danger of too great a change in our College Board of Directors in any one year,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the two receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected for two years and the other two shall be elected for but one year.

Be It Further Resolved: That from this year on we shall elect but two each year to serve two years. (1946)

DUTIES AND POWERS OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE PILGRIM BIBLE COLLEGE AS PASSED UPON BY THE N. C. DISTRICT COUNCIL ON NOVEMBER 11, 1947

1. Whereas Pilgrim Bible College, located near Kernersville, N. C., is owned and largely financed by the N. C. District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the Board of Directors of the Pilgrim Bible College shall be empowered with the responsibility of operating said College under the direction of the N. C. Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Said Board is to carry out the rules and policies of said Conference.

2. The College Board of Directors shall employ the President, set his salary, and term of employment, subject to the approval of the District Council.

(a) The College Board shall outline his duties and services to be rendered.

(b) The President shall be amenable to the College Board of Directors.

3. All faculty members, workers, and employees who are employed by the College shall be employed by the College Board of Directors.

(a) Such workers may be recommended to the College Board by the Executive Committee.

(b) The President may recommend such workers to the Executive Committee.

(c) No member of the faculty may be dismissed except by a two-thirds vote of the College Board.

(d) The President shall not be dismissed during his tenure of office except by a two-thirds vote of the College Board and the approval of the N. C. District Council.

4. There shall be two regular meetings of the Board of Directors annually. The Board shall set the dates.

(a) A special meeting of the Board may be called by the Chair, or by the President requesting the Chair to call such a meeting, or by a request of the majority of the Board members.

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- (b) Due to the distance of some of the out-of-state Board members be it resolved that business needing attention between the semi-annual meetings shall be handled by the members of the N. C. section of said Board.
- 5. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be:
 - (a) To handle all matters of minor nature concerning the operation of the College between meetings of the College Board.
 - (b) To make recommendations to the College Board concerning any and all matters pertaining to the welfare of the College.
 - (c) To make recommendations as to faculty members as in Rule No. 3, Paragraph a.
 - (d) To secure speakers for special occasions of the school; to issue any special advertising for such services.
- 6. A financial report by the Operating Fund Treasurer for Pilgrim Bible College shall be given at the semi-annual meetings of the Board and the same shall be submitted to the District Treasurer.
- 7. The College Board of Directors shall authorize the issuance of a catalogue and other printed advertising and publicity for the College, except student publications which shall be under the direction of the President and faculty.

(This action was authorized by the Conference of 1947. See Resolution No. 6, 1947 Minutes.)
- 8. The Executive Committee shall be elected by the College Board of Directors (Minutes, 1948, p. 30, par. 9). It shall also elect its Chairman (Resolution No. 4, 1949 Minutes).

Standing Rules

CAMP

- 1. Be It Resolved: That this Conference organize a Camp Meeting Association by electing a Secretary-Treasurer and secure members who shall pay \$2.00 each for the first year, and \$1.00 per year thereafter. The duty of the Secretary-Treasurer shall be to keep a correct record of the membership, finances, etc., and disburse same as directed by the District Council. He shall make a report at each District Assembly. He shall also write to each member of the Association before the Camp opens, advising them of the date of the Camp, the evangelist and singers, and ask them for their dues. (1941)
- 2. Be It Resolved: That this Conference set a date for the Camp Meeting. (The Conference set the date for the Camp to begin on Friday night before the last two Sundays in August.) (1941)
- 3. Be It Resolved: That this Conference elect a Camp Meeting Board by secret ballot, said Board to have authority to secure workers, and raise and disperse money and promote the interest of the Camp Meeting. The District Superintendent shall be Chairman of said Board.

Since there is no stated time when the term of the Camp Meeting Board expires, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That a Camp Meeting Secre-

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tary and Treasurer be elected by this Conference and that his term shall expire at the next Annual Conference. Be It Further Resolved: That the eight additional members be elected as follows:

- Two members for a period of four years
- Two members for a period of three years
- Two members for a term of two years
- Two members for a period of one year

and thereafter each year we are to elect two members for four year as the terms of the two members expire.

4. Be It Resolved: That each pastor solicit each of his members to join the Camp Meeting Association and that he collect or appoint one of his members to collect and send the money collected to the Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Association.

5. Whereas the report of the Camp Meeting Secretary-Treasurer could not be completed prior to the Conference,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That this report be completed at the close of the Camp Meeting, be approved by the District Council and inserted in the Minutes.

Standing Rules

SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

1. Be It Resolved: That the District Council elect a Sunday School Board of four, including the Sunday School Secretary. The duties of the District Sunday School Board, in harmony with the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, shall be as follows:

1. The District Sunday School Board shall arrange an Annual Sunday School Convention to be held some time during the year.
2. To promote and encourage the Sunday School work throughout the District.
3. To present an annual report to the District Conference which shall include the following:
 - (a) A statement of the work accomplished during the year.
 - (b) A statement of the general condition of the Sunday School work in the District.
 - (c) To recommend to the District Conference through the Ways and Means Committee the amount considered necessary to finance the District Sunday School work.
4. The District Sunday School Board shall be amenable to the District Council.
5. The District Council shall have the right to remove, or cause to be removed, any member of the District Sunday School Board who, in the judgment of such Council, is not in harmony with the teaching of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
6. If for any reason there is a vacancy on the District Sunday School Board, the District Council, by a majority vote, may fill the vacancy.

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7. To have published each quarter a District Sunday School sheet showing the attendance of each Sunday School on the District for the month, the preceding month, and the attendance for the same quarter a year ago, as well as the average attendance for the year—this sheet to be sent to each pastor and Sunday School Superintendent in the District. (1943)
2. Whereas there is no uniform method of revising the Sunday School enrollment,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That each church revise their Sunday School roll each quarter, and be it further resolved that no one be dropped from the roll until they have missed at least five consecutive Sundays and have been visited by Sunday School officials. (1947)

Standing Rules

HOME MISSIONS

1. We recommend that the birthday offering be used for the purpose of Church Extension, and that each pastor explain, encourage and push the offerings; however, we still retain the call card. (1942)

2. A Home Missionary Association shall be formed, made up of members to be secured by the District Superintendent as he makes his rounds. Each member is to pay \$1.00 when called upon, and not more than two calls per year. (1940)

3. In order to help relieve the load of home missionary responsibility placed upon the District Superintendent,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we elect an advisory committee of two members to work with the District Superintendent in all matters and details of District home missions. Said committee to function under and make recommendations to the Council. The Superintendent shall nominate and the Council ratify the nomination of the Superintendent of two persons to serve with himself as a committee on home missions. (1945)

4. Whereas, the established churches are requested to give a year's subscription to the Advocate and a copy of the Manual to each new member joining the church, and since no provision is made for new churches,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the District Home Missionary Department furnish a copy of the Manual and one year's subscription to the Advocate free to each family represented in the Charter membership of newly organized churches. (1946)

Standing Rules

YOUNG PEOPLE

1. Whereas it is desirable to have identification of those attending our Youth Conventions, Be It Resolved: That a \$1.00 registration fee be charged of all who desire entertainment at our convention. (1952)

2. Whereas, our young people are one of the greatest assets of our church, and to better serve the interest of their work, Therefore, Be

THE FORTY-FOURTH ANNUAL CONFERENCE

It Resolved: That the North Carolina District be divided into five zones, and officers appointed for each zone by the Council upon recommendation by the Executive Secretary and District Superintendent. Details of organization, officers, meetings, etc., to be worked out by the Executive Secretary and Superintendent under the Council's direction. (1953)

3. Whereas the expense of the Executive Youth Secretary involves more than merely travel, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we pay said Secretary \$50.00 per year. (1953)

4. Whereas our first Youth Camp has proven to be a grand success, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That a District Youth Camp be an annual event in our District, and that the planning and program of this camp be supervised by our District Youth Board subject to the approval of the District Council. The purpose of this Camp will be spiritual instruction, supervised recreation, and the salvation of our youth. (1953 Conference action.)

5. Resolved that the offerings taken for the Youth Home Missionary project be sent direct to our District Youth Treasurer. (1954)

Minutes of the Annual Youth Convention

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we extend an invitation to the General Secretary of the Youth Department to hold said convention at Pilgrim Bible College, Kernersville, North Carolina.

3. This resolution was not adopted.

4. Carried. Whereas, according to our present program, many of our young people under the age of 21 years are not offered free enter-

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tainment during our annual convention, and whereas many of our senior young people are able to pay their way,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we lower the age limit and offer free entertainment to all young people from the ages of 10-25 years.

Special song was rendered by a group of young ladies. They sang "He Hideth My Soul." Rev. Charles Williams received an offering for Convention expense.

The Ways and Means Committee presented this resolution:

Whereas, our financial set-up for the past year has proved satisfactory, Be It Resolved: That the following plan be adopted for next year:

2. Request a special offering from each church: Large pay \$10.00 and the small \$5.00.
