

Journal of Proceedings

Through the providential mercies of our wonderful Lord, the Forty-fifth annual conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church met in the Kernersville Pilgrim Holiness Church at 10 a.m., August 17th, 1955.

The conference was called to order by District Superintendent, W. F. Page, who greeted us in the Master's name, giving thanks to Him for His presence and help through another year, and in bringing us together today.

Rev. F. W. Henry led the conference in the singing of "Down at the Cross" and "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing." Prayer was offered by Rev. C. C. McMasters.

Bro. Page presented our much-loved and appreciated General Secretary of Sunday schools and Youth work, Dr. P. F. Elliott, who is to be the presiding officer for the conference. Bro. Elliott expressed his personal pleasure of being sent to this district conference. He brought us greetings from the church as a whole.

Bro. Elliott read a scripture lesson from Colossians the third chapter. He stated that he felt we should chart our course, and set our goals for the new year. With the hour being so late, and so much work to be done, we should double our efforts and strive to achieve much more.

The secretary called the roll of ministers and lay-delegates.

A motion carried that the time of conference sittings be from 9:00 a.m. to 11:45 a.m., 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m.

Our good District Superintendent, W. F. Page read his splendid report of the past year; a report which showed good progress made in the district in every line.

The Assistant District Superintendent, Rev. Wray J. Smith read his report as Assistant Superintendent and also as Chairman of the Home Missionary Committee, and was gratefully accepted.

The Statistician, Rev. W. R. Phillips, gave his report with mimeographed copies being handed out to the conference and was accepted.

The Auditing Committee gave their report and was accepted.

The Treasurer gave his well prepared report with mimeographed copies being given to the conference members.

Superintendent Page appointed Rev. M. M. Holmes to the Resolutions committee to take the place of one member who has moved away.

After announcements, the sitting recessesd.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON - SECOND SITTING

The second sitting of the conference was opened at 2:00 p.m. with Rev. Mc-Cray Holmes leading in the singing of "The Comforter Has Come." Prayer was offered by Rev. John S. Dean, our new Bible School president.

The group of ministers recommended by the district council to be received into the conference was accepted.

The treasurer continued his report of the finances of the district.

Motion carried that the treasurer's report be accepted.

For ordination as deaconess: Miss Vera Thompson.

The president of Pilgrim Bible College, Rev. John S. Dean, read the report of the school's year and was accepted.

The reception committee presented:-

Rev. Terry P. Ragland of Owosso, Michigan, former president of P. B. C. Rev. Dixon Wood of Shady Grove Wesleyan Methodist Church.

A motion carried that they be given an honorary seat within the conference bar.

The Camp Meeting Treasurer read the report of the Camp of 1954 and was accepted.

Mrs. Fred Page, Chairman of the Missionary Societies of the State, read their report and was accepted.

The Young People's Executive Secretary gave a thrilling report of their work and achievements during the year. The report was accepted.

The Executive Secretary of the Sunday Schools read his report and was accepted.

The list of licensed ministers and their standing, as recommended by the council and proper boards, was read and accepted.

The Chair called attention to a ruling of the General Conference of 1954 relative to a list of inactive ministers, section 1.78 of the manual, and told the council it should see that said list was prepared and inserted in the conference journal.

Rev. Hobbs, Secretary of the resolutions committee presented five resolutions. Number one was passed as substituted, and the other four passed as received.

Aftr a few announcements, the session was adjourned to meet at 7:00 p.m.

WEDNESDAY NIGHT – THIRD SITTING

The third sitting opened with an impressive ordination service. With the singing of "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing," our hearts were drawn close to Him who is our all and in all. Prayer was offered by Rev. Fred Sumwalt.

Dr. Paul Elliott brought the ordination charge. In opening his remarks he quoted the words of the Master as recorded in John 17:8, "As my Father hath sent me into the world, even so now send I you into the world."

He built his message around the thought of "Making A Success Or Failure Of Life." He stated that there are three things among others which will determine whether one makes a success or failure.

1. Your thought life will greatly determine your life. "As a man thinketh in his heart, so is he." Our outer actions follow our inner thinking.

2. Your success or failure may be determined by the way you take misfortunes, adversities, or successes. He stated that little-soul folk blame their condition on someone else;—had they the breaks that others have had, they would be where their successful friends are. It isn't so much, he said, what happens to you that counts, as your attitudes concerning what comes that determines your future.

3. Your success or failure is also determined by the way one faces criticism. The one who always flies to his own defence, shows resentment, defends self, etc., does not turn stumbling blocks into stepping stones. Here one must watch his heart-life; it's attitudes, affections, and ambitions lest it be said of him, "slightly soiled; price greatly reduced."

He stated that one should discipline his heart in order to excell. If we would obtain the greatest happiness, we will find it in the struggle for the prize, and not in the prize itself.

At the ordination, Miss Vera Thompson was ordained as a deaconess. W. D. Richardson, James Crews, J. A. Grout, Jr., and R. A. Pegram were ordained as ministers of the Gospel.

The reception committee presented as guests, Rev. and Mrs. H. J. Olson and Rev. and Mrs. John S. Dean. Each gave a personal testimony. Motion carried that our guests have an honorary seat within the conference bar.

The secretary read the minutes of the first and second sittings and were approved.

The Ways and Means Committee presented four resolutions, all of which carried.

A motion carried that we adjourn.

THURSDAY MORNING – FOURTH SITTING

The fourth sitting of the conference opened with Rev. U. N. Freeman leading the conference in the singing of "What a Friend We Have in Jesus." Prayer was offered by Rev. Kermit Farlow.

The secretary read the minutes of the third sitting and were approved.

The reception committee presented Rev. and Mrs. John Kenyon who have returned to our conference.

Rev. T. R. York gave a report of the work of Home Missions in our district in the recent years and was accepted.

Bro. Page presented two new churches to the conference, and they were happily received: They were, Grace Chapel Pilgrim Holiness Church of near Greensboro, with Rev. W. D. Shepherd being the pastor. Atlantic Pilgrim Holiness Church of Atlantic, N. C., with Rev. Kermit Farlow the pastor; Miss Hallie Wagoner, Delegate.

Dr. Elliott gave a stirring challenge to start branch Sunday schools, missions, etc., in order to establish new churches.

A motion carried that we have sample-church signs at our bookstand during the camp meeting, and that they receive orders for the same.

The reception committee presented Evangelist Rev. Lealean of New York, of the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

The council presented a resolution relative to the possibility of loans from the pension fund. "Whereas, the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized the Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc., to make loans of pension funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches under such conditions as require active participation on the part of the Pilgrim Holiness Districts,

Therefore, be it resolved by the Annual Conference of this District, that District Council, District Trustees, and all District officials be, and they are hereby authorized, to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this District; subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in said Resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans. Carried.

The Resolution committee presented one resolution which carried.

The next order of business became the election of District Officers; those elected were:

District Superintendent, Rev. W. F. Page. Assistant Superintendent: Rev. Wray J. Smith.

A motion carried to adjourn.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON - FIFTH SITTING

The fifth sitting of the conference opened with singing and prayer.

Brother Wray Smith will report the work of the newly selected Church Extension Board. Their work has been largely in the planning stage this year but I believe we will realize some fruitful results from this source in the future.

REPORT OF THE YOUNG PEOPLE'S EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

To the Forty-fifth Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church:

Following is a report of the activities of the Youth Work of our North Carolina District.

YOUTH SOCIETIES: We have had many encouraging reports concerning the Youth groups in our local churches. New Societies have been organized and new interest has been inspired. It is surprising what can be done with a little effort. The reward is great when we save our Youth and attract them to Christ. A Youth Society is one of the best mediums through which we may accomplish the work of saving our youth. A strong Youth Society is the most important part of our program.

ZONE RALLIES: We are able to report that 17 rallies were conducted in our District last year. Most of these were inspiring and well attended. It is through these rallies that we keep contact with our youth and keep them informed of our work during the conference year.

YOUTH CAMP: We witnessed and enjoyed the best Youth Camp this year that we have as yet conducted. It took a lot of work on the part of our teachers and workers, but the results were beyond our expectations. Over 200 were enrolled during a two week period and 130 of these accepted Christ as their Saviour and Sanctifier.

Our Camp is unique in that it is designed primarily for our Youth between the age of 10 and 20 years. In the classes, during song inspiration, through the recreation period and at the time of worship in the evening service our aim is to help build Christian character, inspire the fellowship among our Youth and most of all encourage them to accept Christ into their lives. This is a successful and aggressive method of winning our youth to Christ and to our Church. Our pastors will do well to encourage our youth to attend our Camp each summer.

DISTRICT RALLY: Our District Rally, the first two days of our District Camp give our Youth the opportunity to enjoy the influence of Evangelism and good Gospel Preaching. Many of our Youth attended the first two days of Camp last year and we expect a good group again this year.

OUR PROJECT: Our project this year was to build a portable Chapel to be used for Home Missionary Work in our District. You have probably noticed our Chapel upon your arrival at conference. This Chapel has cost us about \$1,300.00 and this is without the furnishings. 1. Concerning District Minutes: see rule No. 23 of District Rules. (Page 32).

- 2. Official Resignation: see rule No. 24 of District Rules. (Page 32).
- 3. Boards Meet Early: see rule No. 25 of District Rules. (Page 32).

4. Whereas our District Parsonage is too small to adequately meet our need, therefore, be it resolved, that we sell the present one, and build one at Kerners-ville.

5. Home Missionary Board: see rule No. 4 under Home Mission Rules. (Page 35).

6. Resolved that Home Missionary Committee members be elected on a staggering-term of office; namely 5, 4, 3, 2, and 1 year. Term of office shall be determined by popularity vote this time; hereafter they shall be elected for a 5-year term.

WAYS AND MEANS

Recommendation No. 1. We recommend that the District Budget remain the same as last year; which was 15% of all regular Church and Sunday School offerings.

Recommendation No. 2. We recommend that the District Superintendent's salary be set at \$4,200.00 for this conference year.

Recommendation No. 3. We recommend that the standing rule No. 9 be changed to provide six cents per mile for the traveling expense of the district officials.

Recommendation No. 4. Whereas this Conference voted to sell the old District parsonage in Greensboro and build a new district parsonage at Kernersville; and whereas the difference in the selling price and the building price has been estimated by Bro. Gallimore to be some \$5,000.00.

Therefore we recommend that a temporary District Parsonage Fund be established by a special 1% assessment on all regular church and Sunday School offerings.

STANDING RULES

DISTRICT AND CONFERENCE

1. The Council is authorized to formulate rules and regulations for the Camp Meeting and Conference. (1943)

2. Be It Resolved: That we as a Conference go on record as urging all churches of the District to be careful in selecting delegates to the Conference and see that those who are elected are spiritual and that they conform to the standards of the Manual. (1945)

3. Be It Resolved: That a questionnaire prepared by the Council be sent to all ministers who belong to our Conference and who are working outside the District; these questionnaires to be returned one month previous to the District Conference.

4. Whereas there is no rule in the Manual nor yet in our Conference Standing Rules governing when the newly elected officers of a local church shall take over their duties; and whereas some new boards are beginning to operate following the close of our fiscal year, or the first of July, while others are waiting until after the Conference to take over their duties, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we interpret the Manual, Page 37, Section 42, Paragraph 1, so that new officers assume their duties the first of July. (1946)

5. Because of the continual election of the same officers each year, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the Conference Minutes of the previous year not be used during the election of officers. (1947) 6. Be It Resolved: That we allow space in the District Minutes for our Young People's Minutes and officers' names. (1947)

7. Inasmuch as the Manual does not provide any time when local license of ministers shall be renewed, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That this Conference adopt the policy that they be required to be sent to the District Superintendent with a recommendation from the local church board, for renewal at each Annual Conference, and further, that any such license not renewed by recommendation of the local church board shall be null and void. (1947)

8. We recommend that a 15% budgetary program be adopted with the breakdown of District funds to follow the pattern heretofore set; i.e., District Budget 7 per cent, Bible School 5 per cent, Loan fund 1 per cent, and Home Missions 2 per cent.

9. Whereas our Youth Convention being held on a separate day has caused a great deal of confusion as to the operating of a separate convention, and whereas we feel our Youth need the spiritual atmosphere of our annual Camp Meetings, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the Youth Convention convene on the first Friday night of Camp and continue all day Saturday, running in conjunction with Camp Board. (1951)

10. As there is some expense in the performance of the duties of the District Officials and whereas the cost of operation has increased, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we recommend that they be allowed 6c per mile for traveling expenses. (1955)

11. Whereas, there has been a request by the Sunday School Board for more funds to carry on the District work, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That all churches with fifty members and over pay five dollars (\$5.00) a year, and all churches with under fifty members, shall pay three dollars (\$3.00) into the Sunday School Board: said money to be sent specified to the District Treasurer. (1952)

12. Whereas, the Conference has established the \$3.00 per member budget to be broken down as follows: \$1.50 for indebtedness, \$1.00 for maintenance, \$.50 for insurance; and whereas, there is need for additional revenue for operation of the Bible School; Therefore, Be It Resolved: That this Conference take action that each church put the Bible School in the budget; and be it further resolved that the churches allow the school representatives to conduct one service in the interest of the school, and that they be allowed to raise a cash offering. (1952)

13. Whereas, the present practice of pastoral change involves too great a lapse of time and inconvenience, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That all pastors changing to a new field terminate their labors the last Sunday in July and move to their new field and take up their work the first Sunday in August. (1952)

14. Whereas, our Assistant Superintendent gives much of his time to District work, and whereas, the only remuneration he receives is five cents per mile for car expense, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the Assistant Superintendent receive \$10.00 per trip for business meeting to churches besides the five cents per mile. This to be retroactive for this past year. (1952)

15. Whereas, some churches have failed to win banners, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That all Youth and Sunday School attendance banners be awarded on percentage; not on numerical count. (1952)

16. Resolved: That the delegate fund for General Conference be set at 15c per member. (1953)

17. Resolved: That to secure nominees for General Conference delegates, the pastor and delegate (or delegates) shall get together and nominate a name (or names) to submit to the Conference. (1953)

18. Whereas, there has been a steady increase in the cost of living, and whereas, this has not been taken into consideration by many local church boards, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That every church of our District be requested to pay the pastor's utilities. (1953)

19. 1. Resolve that the first night session of the conference be designated for the ordination service.

2. The certificate of ordination be presented formally during the ordination service. (1954)

20. Resolved: That any church changing pastors have the privilege and pleasure of contacting any minister in the District whom the church board feels would be a suitable pastor. (1954)

21. Resolved: That ministers' children under 18, and unemployed, be entertained free at the District Conference. (1954)

22. Resolved: That a temporary District Parsonage Fund be established by a special 1% assessment on all regular church and Sunday school offerings. (1955)

23. Whereas some churches have seemed to receive too many minutes, and some not enough, therefore be it resolved that minutes be given as requested by the pastor; said number is to be one for each member-family. The number requested must be in the secretary's hand not later than two weeks after Camp if minutes are to be received. (1955)

24. Whereas a resignation by a public servant may take place any time, and since a notice of said resignation might cause misunderstandings and divisions to occur, therefore, be it resolved that the time of said resignation shall take effect within 60 days or less. (1955)

25. Whereas, it seems to work a hardship on all concerned if the Educational and Examining Boards do not meet until after conference commences, therefore, be it resolved that the Educational and Examining Boards meet not later than 9:00 a.m. of the day before conference for the purpose of examining candidates for ordination and for licensing of ministers. The District Council shall meet the same day to review the recommendations of the committee. (1955)

STANDING RULES

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

1. Be It Resolved: That we give our District Superintendent, and also ask the churches to give the pastors, a two weeks' vacation with pay. (1941)

2. The District Superintendent is the Chairman of the Camp Meeting Board. (1943)

3. Resolved: That we grant the District Superintendent the privilege of conducting four revivals a year, and retaining all offerings received from same. (1950)

STANDING RULES

COLLEGE

1. Whereas there has been a lot of work done and money raised looking forward to a Bible School,

Therefore, Be It Resolved:

(a) That we open a Bible School in the fall of 1946.

- (b) (Revised 1953 That we elect a Board of seven members, the Superintendent being chairman, and the School President an additional member; there shall always be three laymen on the Board. (See Rule 8 of this section.)
- (c) That the Bible School opening in the fall of 1946 carry a minimum of four years high school and two years of Bible.
- (d) That a Building Committee be elected to draw up plans for additional buildings to meet our requirements; said Committee be made up of two members from the Camp Meeting Board and two members from the Bible School Board. The Committee shall report to the District Council and they shall have the final vote before any work is started.

2. We recommend to the District Conference a plan whereby our Bible School Board will be expanded to include a representation from all the Districts of our Zone. The recommendation to the District Conference is as follows:

Whereas Pilgrim Bible College is a fully recognized and accredited institution of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, having been authorized by the General Church, and

Whereas the General Board has allotted a definite patronizing zone for Pilgrim Bible College, and

Whereas we are grateful that the following Districts are comprehended in this Zone, namely, South Carolina, the Gulf States and Tennessee,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we, the North Carolina Conference, upon recommendation of the College Board of Directors, urgently request that each of the above named Districts should have one official representative on the College Board, and further that said representative be the District Superintendent; Be It Further Resolved: That when, and if, the General Board should annex other territory as a patronizing zone the same courtesy should be granted to each District. (1946)

3. Whereas we face the grave danger of too great a change in our College Board of Directors in any one year,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the two receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected for two years and the other two shall be elected for but one year.

Be It Further Resolved: That from this year on we shall elect but two each year to serve two years. (1946)

DUTIES AND POWERS OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE PIL-GRIM BIBLE COLLEGE AS PASSED UPON BY THE N. C. DISTRICT COUNCIL ON NOVEMBER 11, 1947

1. Whereas Pilgrim Bible College, located near Kernersville, N. C., is owned and largely financed by the N. C. District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the Board of Directors of the Pilgrim Bible College shall be empowered with the responsibility of operating said College under the direction of the N. C. Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Said Board is to carry out the rules and policies of said Conference.

2. The College Board of Directors shall employ the President, set his salary, and term of employment, subject to the approval of the District Council.

- (a) The College Board shall outline his duties and services to be rendered.
- (b) The President shall be amenable to the College Board of Directors.

3. All faculty members, workers, and employees who are employed by the College shall be employed by the College Board of Directors.

- (a) Such workers may be recommended to the College Board by the Executive Committee.
- (b) The President may recommend such workers to the Executive Committee.
- (c) No member of the faculty may be dismissed except by a two-thirds vote of the College Board.
- (d) The President shall not be dismissed during his tenure of office except by a two-thirds vote of the College Board and the approval of the N. C. District Council.
- 4. There shall be two regular meetings of the Board of Directors annually. The Board shall set the dates.
- (a) A special meeting of the Board may be called by the Chair, or by the President requesting the Chair to call such a meeting, or by a request of the majority of the Board members.

- (b) Due to the distance of some of the out-of-state Board members be it resolved that business needing attention between the semi-annual meetings shall be handled by the members of the N. C. section of said Board.
- 5. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be:
- (a) To handle all matters of minor nature concerning the operation of the College between meetings of the College Board.
- (b) To make recommendations to the College Board concerning any and all matters pertaining to the welfare of the College.
- (c) To make recommendations as to faculty members as in Rule No. 3, Paragraph a.
- (d) To secure speakers for special occasions of the school; to issue any special advertising for such services.

6. A financial report by the Operating Fund Treasurer for Pilgrim Bible College shall be given at the semi-annual meetings of the Board and the same shall be submitted to the District Treasurer.

7. The College Board of Directors shall authorize the issuance of a catalogue and other printed advertising and publicity for the College, except student publications which shall be under the direction of the President and faculty.

(This action was authorized by the Conference of 1947. See Resolution No. 6, 1947 Minutes.)

8. The Executive Committee shall be elected by the College Board of Directors (Minutes, 1948, p. 30, par. 9). It shall also elect its Chairman (Resolution No. 4, 1949 Minutes).

9. Whereas a resignation by a public servant may take place any time, and since a notice of said resignation might cause misunderstandings and divisions to occur, therefore, be it resolved that the time of said resignation shall take effect within 60 days or less. (1955)

STANDING RULES

CAMP

1. Be It Resolved: That this Conference organize a Camp Meeting Association by electing a Secretary-Treasurer and secure members who shall pay \$2.00 each for the first year, and \$1.00 per year thereafter. The duty of the Secretary-Treasurer shall be to keep a correct record of the membership, finances, etc., and disburse same as directed by the District Council. He shall make a report at each District Assembly. He shall also write to each member of the Association before the Camp opens, advising them of the date of the Camp, the evangelist and singers, and ask them for their dues. (1941)

2. Be It Resolved: That this Conference set a date for the Camp Meeting. (The Conference set the date for the Camp to begin on Friday night before the last two Sundays in August.) (1941)

3. Be It Resolved: That this Conference elect a Camp Meeting Board by secret ballot, said Board to have authority to secure workers, and raise and disdisburse money and promote the interest of the Camp Meeting. The District Superintendent shall be Chairman of said Board. Since there is no stated time when the term of the Camp Meeting Board expires, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That a Camp Meeting Secretary and Treasurer be elected by this Conference and that his term shall expire at the next Annual Conference. Be It Further Resolved: That the eight additional members be elected as follows:

Two members for a period of four years

Two members for a period of three years

Two members for a term of two years

Two members for a period of one year

and thereafter each year we are to elect two members for four years as the terms of the two members expire.

4. Be It Resolved: That each pastor solicit each of his members to join the Camp Meeting Association and that he collect or appoint one of his members to collect and send the money collected to the Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Association.

5. Whereas the report of the Camp Meeting Secretary-Treasurer cannot be completed in time to report to the conference, therefore be it resolved, that said report be given to the conference following the Camp.

STANDING RULES SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

1. Be It Resolved: That the District Council elect a Sunday School Board of four, including the Sunday School Secretary. The duties of the District Sunday School Board, in harmony with the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, shall be as follows:

- 1. The District Sunday School Board shall arrange an Annual Sunday School Convention to be held some time during the year.
- 2. To promote and encourage the Sunday School work throughout the District.
- 3. To present an annual report to the District Conference which shall include the following:
 - (a) A statement of the work accomplished during the year.
 - (b) A statement of the general condition of the Sunday School work in the District.
 - (c) To recommend to the District Conference through the Ways and Means Committee the amount considered necessary to finance the District Sunday School work.
- 4. The District Sunday School Board shall be amenable to the District Council.
- 5. The District Council shall have the right to remove, or cause to be reremoved, any member of the District Sunday School Board who, in the judgment of such Council, is not in harmony with the teaching of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- 6. If for any reason there is a vacancy on the District Sunday School Board, the District Council, by a majority vote, may fill the vacancy.

7. To have published each quarter a District Sunday School sheet showing the attendance of each Sunday School on the District for the month, the preceding month, and the attendance for the same quarter a year ago, as well as the average attendance for the year—this to be sent to each pastor and Sunday School Superintendent in the District. (1943)

2. Whereas there is no uniform method of revising the Sunday School enrollment.

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That each church revise their Sunday School roll each quarter, and be it further resolved that no one be dropped from the roll until they have missed at least five consecutive Sundays and have been visited by Sunday School officials. (1947)

STANDING RULES

HOME MISSIONS

1. We recommend that the birthday offering be used for the purpose of Church Extension, and that each pastor explain, encourage and push the offerings; however, we still retain the call card. (1942)

2. A Home Missionary Association shall be formed, made up of members to be secured by the District Superintendent as he makes his rounds. Each member is to pay \$1.00 when called upon, and not more than two calls per year. (1940)

3. Whereas, the established churches are requested to give a year's subscription to the Advocate and a copy of the Manual to each new member-family joining the church, and since no provision is made for new churches,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the District Home Missionary Department furnish a copy of the Manual and one year's subscription to the Advocate to each family represented in the Charter membership of newly organized churches. (1946)

4. Resolve that a strong Church Extension Board of five men be elected by this Conference from a list of ten or more nominees submitted by the District Council. Said Board shall elect its own officers, with the exception that the District Superintendent shall be the Chairman by the virtue of his office. Said Board shall be subject to the District Council.

The duties of said Board are to study the field, select appropriate locations, provide facilities, secure workers, launch campaigns, give guidance, and work toward organizing churches.

The financial resources shall be: 1. District Home Missionary Funds. 2. Public offerings in the services held on the field. 3. Personal donations. 4. An appeal to the established churches once a year. 5. The Board shall have access to the Missionary Funds of the district. 6. The expenses of the Board in connection with this work may be collected from the Home Missionary fund. (1955)

STANDING RULES YOUNG PEOPLE

1. Whereas it is desirable to have identification of those attending our Youth Conventions, Be It Resolved: That a \$1.00 registration fee be charged of all who desire entertainment at our convention. (1952)

2. Whereas, our young people are one of the greatest assets of our church, and to better serve the interest of their work, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the North Carolina District be divided into five zones, and officers appointed for each zone by the Council upon recommendation by the Executive Secretary and District Superintendent. Details of organization, officers, meetings, etc., to be worked out by the Executive Secretary and Superintendent under the Council's direction. (1953)

3. Whereas the expense of the Executive Youth Secretary involves more than merely travel, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we pay said Secretary \$75.00 per year. (1955)

4. Whereas our first Youth Camp has proven to be a grand success, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That a District Youth Camp be an annual event in our District, and that the planning and program of this camp be supervised by our District Youth Board subject to the approval of the District Council. The purpose of this Camp will be spiritual instruction, supervised recreation, and the salvation of our youth. (1953 Conference action.)

5. Resolved that the offerings taken for the Youth Home Missionary project be sent direct to our District Youth Treasurer. (1954)

6. Whereas there has been some dissatisfaction with the method of awarding attendance banners at our rallies, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we award two banners: one for the largest number present, and the other on the percentage basis of the young peoples enrollment. (1955)

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL YOUTH CONVENTION

The Ninth Annual Y. P. S. Convention business session was held at 2:30 p.m., August 19, 1955, at the large Tabernacle on the campus of Pilgrim Bible College, Kernersville, N. C., by our District Superintendent, Rev. Fred Page.

Rev. Clyde Parker led the youth in singing "He Brought Me Out" and several choruses, "Step and Let Me Tell You What The Good Lord Has Done," "If You Want Joy" and "Pilgrim Youth Are Marching On."

Prayer was offered by Rev. Fred Sumwalt.

Rev. Fred Page addressed the youth from the sayings of the Apostle Paul. He quoted the following sayings, "Let no man despise thy youth; but be thou an example of the believers", "In all things shewing thyself a pattern of good works" and "that that may adorn the doctrine of God in all things."

The conference bar was set and all the delegates were seated.

The following reports were given:

The report of the Executive Secretary, Rev. George Farah, was given of his year of activity among the youth. His report revealed good progress and it was gratefully received. The report of District Treasurer, Rev. Clyde Parker, was given and accepted. The Zone Chairmen gave fine reports of rallies held in their zones. Rev. James Smith, Secretary of Missionary Committee, gave a report of the youth project, the building of the portable Chapel which is to be used in missionary work.

The Resolutions Committee presented the following resolutions:

1. Carried. Whereas the District Church Extension Board has requested the use of the Portable Chapel for the purpose of getting a new Church started at Concord; the period of time is to expire in the spring of 1956 unless there are further negotiations; the Church Extension Board has agreed to equip the chapel with chairs and wire it for lights, with the understanding that the youth will pay for one-half of cost when they have sufficient funds. It is also understood that the other one-half of the cost of chairs and wiring will be given to the youth for the use of the chapel. Also a committee from the Church Extension Board and the Youth Board shall meet to select the chairs and electrical devices.

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we accept this plan and that our missionary project be continued and include the equipping of our chapel.

2. Carried. Whereas there has been some dissatisfaction with the method of awarding the attendance banners at our zone rallies. Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we award two banners—one to the largest number present and the other on the percentage basis of the young people's enrollment.

3. Carried. Whereas the expense of our Executive Youth Secretary involves more than merely travel, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That we pay said Secretary \$75.00 per year.

The Ways and Means Committee presented this resolution:

Whereas, our financial set-up for the past year has proved satisfactory,

Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the following plan be adopted for the next year:

- 1. Offering taken at each Zone Rally and District Convention.
- 2. Request a special offering from each church: Large \$10.00 and small \$5.00.
- 3. Missionary project: An offering each month from local society or group to be sent to District Treasurer. Carried.
