JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

With grateful hearts to God for His continuing mercies and overruling providences, the Pilgrims gathered from all over the great state of North Carolina to the tabernacle on the conference grounds at Kernersville, North Carolina for the forty-sixth annual conference.

District Superintendent W. F. Page called the conference to order at 10 a.m., Aug. 15, 1956. He extended greetings to all, and expressed thanksgiving to God for safely bringing us to another conference.

Rev. Fred Sumwalt led the conference in singing the great hymn of Christian experience, "Blessed Assurance".

Assistant District Superintendent Wray J. Smith, led our hearts to the throne of grace in prayer.

Superintendent Page presented our capable first Assistant General Superintendent, Rev. Melvin H. Snyder, who shall be our presiding officer during this conference.

After bringing greetings to the conference from the general church, Rev. Snyder spoke concerning "The Forward Movement" of our church on the theme of "Gather Together — Scatter Abroad."

He stated that even as in the early church, there needs to be a "gathering together" today. This togetherness of the early church produced a close relationship, one to the other. They were of one heart, and one accord. As the Trinity is one, even so, by the indwelling of the Holy Ghost, believers should have a oneness.

God's children are also noted for their steadfastness. It is seen in their regularity of attendance at the means of grace; their steadfastness to doctrine also, and such doctrine is "Christ-centered".

In this togetherness, there was a faithfulness to one another in true Christian fellowship. We, too, should value fellowship, and never allow faults peculiarities and personal ideas to break fellowship. He stated that only wilful sin should cause a severance of fellowship, and then, only after we have endeavored as outlined by Jesus to restore them, should fellowship be withdrawn.

Also, in their being gathered together, they enjoyed true social fellowship as seen in the "breaking of bread" together, and made of it a spiritual sacrament, even unto God.

Such a gathering together will truly fit us then for effective praying. And such praying will be found a great privilege and power in our lives.

Under the second division of his message he said that as sure as it is necessary to gather together, even so there must be a "Scattering Abroad." We are saved to serve! If we are to influence this world for God, we must go out among them — out into the highways and hedges, and in love to bring the lost to God. God shall hold us accountable for our opportunities just as much as He shall call us to accounting for our attitude towards worldly things.

The secretary called the roll of ministers and lay delegates.

A motion carried that the conference bar be set to include the first fifteen rows of the tabernacle, excepting the section on the right which is for visitors. The time of sittings shall be at 9:00 a.m. to 11:45 a.m., 2:00 p.m. to 4:45 p.m., and 7:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m.

A motion carried that we accept the councils nine proposed nominees for ordination. They are Horace Maness, Tracey Maness, George Fraley, Ronald Thompson, Carroll Upton, Richard Prendergrast, Coyte York, Charles Williams and Howard Barefoot.

The session was adjourned by expiration of time. The secretary dismissed the session with prayer.

SECOND SITTING – WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

The second sitting of the conference opened at 2:00 p.m. with the singing of “Leaning on Jesus” led by Rev. J. B. Stutts.

Prayer was led by Rev. C. C. McMasters.

Rev. Snyder presented our beloved general superintendent, Rev. Wm. H. Neff who spoke to the conference.

Our hearts were deeply stirred as he told of God’s precious presence with him as he has been neath the chastening rod of affliction. His presence and word, that God is helping him up the hill of recovery rejoiced the hearts of all.

Speaking about the “Forward Movement” of our church he stated that he felt God had definitely led in the General Board’s appointment of Rev. Melvin Snyder as the head of this great movement. He further stated that the forward movement must get beyond the blueprints as planned and laid down by the church leaders; – it must become the burden of the ministers and laymen in the local fields so that together we shall see the church advance for God.

Referring to the great heritage of the past, he challenged us to carry forward the banner of full salvation, and prove to be a spiritual and Bible-directed church.

The secretary read the minutes of the morning sitting and were adjudged correct as read.

Our good district superintendent gave a splendid report of his labors of love for Christ and our church. The report was very gratefully received.

The assistant district superintendent, Rev. Wray J. Smith gave his report of work in the district and was accepted.

The district treasurer, Mr. L. B. Gallimore, read his report of our financial work during the passed year; printed copies were given to all delegates. The very fine report was thankfully received.

The report of Pilgrim Bible College was presented by President John S. Dean. His report was encouraging and challenging. Said report was gladly accepted.

The camp meeting association treasurer, Rev. U. N. Freeman, read the report and was accepted.

The chairman of the district missionary societies, Mrs. W. F. Page, gave a splendid report of the great work the societies are doing, and was joyfully received.

The work of the District Sunday School Promotion Secretary, Charles L. Stout, was read and accepted.

The Executive Secretary of the District Young People's Societies gave the report of their work and was accepted.

Meeting adjourned by expiration of time.

WEDNESDAY NIGHT – THIRD SITTING

The third sitting of the conference opened at 7 p.m.

A very sacred and impressive ordination service was conducted in which nine men were ordained to the ministry. They were Coyte York, Horace Maness, Tracy Maness, Carroll Upton, Richard Prendergrast, Ronald Thompson, George Fraley, Howard Barefoot, and Charles Williams.

Rev. Snyder gave a most effective and timely ordination charge, basing his message on I Timothy 4:16. He spoke on Paul's three-fold admonition to the ministry.

First he brought to our attention, THE WORD OF WARNING: "take heed unto thyself and unto thy doctrine." He said a minister's first duty is unto himself; he is to be a living, glowing, pulsating example for others to follow. The minister's responsibility is staggering, as he is ordained to the highest calling God has given unto man.

We should take heed, he said, to our private life, for what a man is, is far more important than what he knows, for people will remember you for what you are more than for what you say.

Again the minister is exhorted to take heed to his public life. Not only will there be hours of depression to tempt the soul, but also will come hours of popularity which also greatly tempt men's soul. A minister should stay close to men, but still be free of all men. He should be God's-man among men.

The minister also must take heed to his doctrine. As we mature, basic convictions never change, but often our emphases does. In one's ministry, he must stick with the cardinal doctrines of the Word. Surely he is to preach on standards, but his chief ministry should be those great doctrines which cause one to live in a Godly manner. Always the ministry should be Christocentric.

Paul also presents a word of EXHORTATION: "continue thou in them." A minister has a holy horror of settling down. One who keeps step with God never looks back upon the yesterdays as "the better days." His true goal is ever "Onward and Upward."

In conclusion he gave Paul's GREAT WORD OF PROMISE to the minister: "in doing this thou shalt both save thyself and them that hear thee."

The minister recognizes that this is not pay-day, and believes that if he will be "faithful unto death, he shall receive the crown of life."

Here is the promise which causes true rejoicing; "shalt save thyself and them that hear thee."

Closing the ordination hour, the conference came forward and greeted these fine men of God who were ordained to the ministry.

The next matter of business, and that which lasted to the closing of the service, was a spirit of hallowed praise unto Him who loved us and gave Himself to redeem us. Showers of refreshing from the heavenly world fell in blessing upon all hearts.

The session closed with a fervent spirit of prayer around the altar of mercy.

The doxology was sung in the closing moment.

THURSDAY MORNING – FOURTH SITTING

The fourth sitting opened at 9:00 a.m. Thursday, with Rev. M. M. Holmes leading the conference in singing "Rescue the Perishing".

Rev. S. M. Stikeleather led the prayer.

The reception committee presented our highly esteemed friends, Rev. and Mrs. S. M. Stikeleather of Kingswood, Kentucky. Bro. Stikeleather successfully served this district for many years as district superintendent; also he served our general church for many years as General Secretary. A motion carried that we give them an honorary seat within the conference bar.

The secretary read the minutes of the second and third sittings, and they were adjudged correct as read.

The statistician, Rev. Wm. R. Phillips presented the detailed report of the work of our conference for the past year; he also showed our progress by a comparison with the report of the former year. A motion carried to accept the report.

After the report, Chairman Snyder urged that the churches give our evangelists a better consideration financially. He suggested that a fair rule to pay the evangelist is to pay them twice the per week salary of the pastor.

The resolution committee presented two resolutions. Resolution #1 was tabled until the Ways & Means committee presented their resolutions; one of which bears on this resolution. Resolution #2 carried.

The ways and means committee presented 7 resolutions. Number 1 was tabled. Number 2 lost. Number 3 was referred to the committee. Number 4 was read, but due to expiration of time was not discussed.

The benediction was pronounced by Rev. Paul Uhrig.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON – FIFTH SITTING

The fifth sitting of the conference opened at 2:00 p.m. with Rev. Stutts leading the conference in singing of "He Abides".

Prayer was offered by Rev. O. L. Ruth.

The secretary read the minutes of the last sitting and were adjudged correct as read.

The Ways & Means Committee took from the table resolution number 3, and it was discussed, and then voted down.

Number four which had been referred to the committee was again presented and passed as amended.

Resolution number 5 lost. Resolution number 6, and 7 carried.

The Resolution Committee again presented resolution #1, and it was amended and carried.

Resolution number 3 carried. Number 4 was amended and carried.

Resolutions number 5, 6, and 7 carried; number 7 was amended.

The Ways & Means committee lifted resolution #1 from the table and it was carried as amended.

A motion carried that the conference send an expression of our sympathy to the family of the late Rev. A. H. Wilson.

A motion carried that we receive into conference membership as ministers, Rev. Eldon Hottle from the Tennessee district and Rev. Floyd Miller from the W. Va. District, and as first year license ministers vey Hammer, J. M. Foster, Leonard Conner, and Ray Easter.

The election of officers became the business of the afternoon. Said election of officers resulted in the election of

Rev. Mrs. F. W. Henry presented the Memoirs service: a beautiful and fitting tribute to those of our number who heard the call of God this past year to lay down their armour and enter the haven of rest.

In closing, Chairman Snyder exhorted the ministry to be studious so that they may be true ministers of the Word. Ministers are to be educated men—knowing intellectually and experimentally the great doctrines of salvation.

Rev. Snyder reminded the conference that licensed ministers who do not complete two books of their study course each year, and who do not appear before the examining boards, or send a good reason why they did not appear, are to be dropped from the conference rolls.

A motion carried that all unfinished business be turned over to the council.

A motion carried that we adjourn the conference. The conference came to a close with the singing of the Doxology and the benediction.

REPORT OF PILGRIM BIBLE COLLEGE

To the forty-sixth Annual Conference of the North Carolina District Christian Greetings.

It is with praise and gratitude to God that we are privileged to meet in this conference and I can bring to you a report of your college.

I can say this has been a busy year with many problems to solve but God has been gracious and has given us a wonderful year with his sweet spirit manifested in the school.

SPIRITUALLY

God has blessed Pilgrim Bible College with a good year spiritually. The school term started with a good spiritual tide and three day revival with Rev. P. O. Carpenter. Throughout the year God broke through in our chapel services without any preaching or pressure. I can truly say that God has honored the prayers of the staff of P.B.C. Even at the very close God's sweet presence was manifested. Many young people testified that their stay at P.B.C. helped them to become established.

STUDENT BODY

School opened with 96 students the first week. Our total enrollment finally reached 123 counting our night classes and new students the second semester.

I was happy for this number but not satisfied. I realize that we must reach a total enrollment of 150.

Prospects for this fall are good and our enrollment should be on the increase.

IMPROVEMENT

I am sure we can not take space or time to list all the improvements on the campus but I will mention some. Three apartments have been completely remodeled and modernized and the fourth one is in the process of remodeling at the present time. Five rooms in the girls dorm and one in the boys dorm have been remodeled. The girls parlor has been enlarged and completely remodeled. The exterior of the administration building and girls dorm have been painted. Some landscaping and fixing of the entrance to campus and administration building has helped to beautify the campus. The kitchen, chapel, and main hall has been painted; and bathroom in boys dorm has been remodeled.

God has helped us to add some much needed equipment such as a deep freeze, dishes, silverware, and table cloths, ½ ton truck, desks, file cabinets, dressers, adding machine, electric typewriter, tools. The school has purchased and placed in some of the teachers apartments some furniture including two stoves and a refrigerator.

Our furnaces had to be brought up to standard to meet State inspection. A new hot water system has been installed in President's home, teacherage, and two apartments.

OUR NEED

I certainly want to thank the good Pilgrims and faithful pastors of this district for their support and prayers for Pilgrim Bible College. In these days when the tide seems to be away from God and the leaders of other Holiness churches are trying to redirect their direction certainly we should build stronger schools.

We are seemingly at a cross road where we must have some new class rooms and go forward or struggle along. The day is past when you can successfully hold classes in the dining room, hallways, or even the out of doors. A new administration building is much needed.

God has given us a staff for this year which is the best Pilgrim Bible College has ever had. I believe God is trying to encourage us on in the challenge that lies ahead.

I would like to suggest that this conference take action to increase the \$3.00 per member budget for indebtedness, insurance, and maintenance to

4.00. And also take positive action to get plans under way for some new class rooms.

Financially God has helped us this past year. We are thankful for His many blessings on the school. If we are to continue our progress and have leadership in our church for tomorrow we must train our young people today. Your prayers and loyal support is needed to make this coming school year the best in the history of Pilgrim Bible College.

REPORT OF YOUNG PEOPLE'S EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

To the Forty-sixth Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church:

Following is the report of the Youth work of the North Carolina District.

We are happy to report the blessings of God upon our local societies and zone rallies during the past year. A number of churches reported good youth revivals with souls praying through to definite victory.

ZONE RALLIES: Inspite of a number of complications we are able to report 13 rallies were held in the district last year. These were well attended and well-planned with varied programs. The co-operation and work of the zone chairmen have contributed immeasurably to the success of the youth work.

YOUTH CAMP: God has continued to smile upon and bless our youth camps from year to year. Each year we have seen the camp grow in number, in quality of work, and in Spirit. This year we had the largest registration ever with 214 registered during the two weeks camp. Our teachers and workers are to be commended for their fine work in helping to make it such a success. The most thrilling report of the youth camp, of course, concerns the spiritual achievement. Our hearts were made to rejoice as we saw some 85 to 90 young people from all across our district kneel in confession and consecration to Christ and stand with faces beaming and tears of joy streaming down their faces as they came to know our wonderful Saviour. As the camp closed the last week I felt that surely we were "In Conquest with the Conquering Christ." I believe that the District Youth Camp is the greatest thing we have offered our youth in this district. The pastors would do well to urge their young people to attend our camp each year.

DISTRICT CONVENTION AND RALLY: Our district convention and rally (held the first two days of the district camp) have been well attended and each convention reveals increased interest in the district youth work. Our young people are learning through practice to carry on the program of the church which is the greatest business in the world.

OUR PROJECT: This could perhaps be designated as "North Carolina Youth and the Forward Movement." Two or three years ago we decided as a group to sponsor a home missionary project. This has been a costly and time consuming project. We built a trailer church and during the past year finished paying for its indebtedness. This year we are happy to report that we have completed plans to launch our first home-missionary project in the very near future.

The plan will be presented to the Youth Convention for their approval on Saturday. North Carolina Youth are moving forward with an aggressive spirit. We hope and pray that our efforts will be blessed of God in helping to build His Kingdom.

I have traveled 1,100 miles on the district in the interest of our Youth work.

Besides this I made two trips to Indianapolis: One for the Sunday School and Youth Leaders Conference the other to meet with the planning committee for the National Youth Convention.

I wish to thank the members of the Youth Board, the local society officers and pastors for their cooperation and prayers this year.

RESOLUTIONS

1. Since actively engaged ministers and their families are entertained free at our annual camp meetings and since evangelistic singers and Bible school teachers have to pay their own way if they attend the camp; — therefore be it resolved that our licensed song evangelists and Bible school teachers be entertained at our camp meetings free, beginning with this years camp.

2. Whereas, some of our churches are bearing much of the financial load of our district, and whereas, since this carelessness of some make it difficult for the district to meet its obligations: — therefore be it resolved that this conference request the district treasurer to mail each church and pastor a monthly financial report to be posted in the church giving the amount paid by each church.

3. Since Rev. Charles L. Stout is an ordained minister in our conference, and since he has given his entire life to date as a Pastor, Youth and Sunday school worker, and since God has blessed him in erecting two of the most beautiful churches in our District, namely Asheboro and Second Church at Greensboro; and since he is leaving us to take the pastorate of the Roanoke Pilgrim Holiness Church in Virginia, be it resolved that we as a conference express to him and his family our sincere appreciation and gratitude for his faithful and untiring labors, praying that God will bless him in his new field of labors; also, that this resolution be spread on our minutes.

4. Inasmuch as so many days of hard labor are involved each year in setting up the tabernacle before conference and camp, and so few to do the work, therefore be it resolved that if the school use the tabernacle in such a way as to require moving of benches, they must number them, and replace them in proper places before school is out; if cars are parked under tabernacle, it can only be if it is not contrary to insurance requirements.

5. Whereas the present plan of selecting lay-delegates to the General Conference creates some confusion at the district conference, therefore, be it resolved that each church desiring to do so may nominate one or more persons from which the district conference shall make its selection. Said nomination is to be made at the annual church meeting proceeding the district conference that preceeds the General Conference.

6. Whereas a number of our Colleges are changing their names to designate their location, and whereas all our Colleges are actually Pilgrim Bible Colleges, therefore, be it resolved that our college change from Pilgrim Bible College to SOUTHERN PILGRIM COLLEGE.

7. Whereas our present method of calling pastors is not satisfactory as to time, therefore be it resolved that each church call a pastor the last week-end in May. The pastor and Board shall appoint some competent person to preside in this call meeting, in the absence of the district superintendent. The results of the vote shall be mailed to the district superintendent at once.

The District Council shall work out all the details of this change in calling of pastors.

WAYS AND MEANS RESOLUTIONS

1. We recommend that the district council authorize the district trustees to secure a loan on the district parsonage in order that the money may be made available in the loan fund, provided such action does not hinder the securing of a loan on the new building to be erected.

2. (4) Be it resolved that this conference authorize the district council and school Board to meet jointly in the October meeting to elect committees to form plans to raise finance and to erect an administration building and to empower them to build same providing the total debt when completed does not exceed \$60,000.00, and provided the proper financing can be arranged.

3. (6) In order that we might take care of a matter long overdue, we recommend that we pay our district treasurer \$500.00 a year, and our district secretary \$250.00 a year.

4. (7) We recommend that the salary of the district superintendent be placed at \$4,500.00.

STANDING RULES

1. Churches are asked to give pastors a two week vacation with pay. (1941)

2. Churches should see that their delegates to conference conform to standards of the manual. (1945)

3. Local church officers assume their duties the first of July. (1946)

4. Local ministers licenses to be renewed are to be sent to the district superintendent at conference with a recommendation of the local church. (1957)

5. Our District Budget shall be 15%, with the breakdown as follows: District Budget 7%, Bible School 5%, Loan fund 1%, and Home Missions 2%. (1948)

6. The Youth Convention shall convene on the first Friday night of the Camp meeting and continue all day Saturday, running in conjunction with the Camp Board. (1951)

7. District officials shall receive 6c per mile for traveling in district business. (1955)

8. To help support the District Sunday school work, churches with fifty members and over shall pay five dollars a year, and churches with less than fifty members shall pay three dollars into the Sunday school Boards treasury. (1952)

9. Whereas, the Conference has established the \$3.00 per member budget for Southern Pilgrim College to be broken down as follows: \$1.50 for indebtedness, \$1.00 for maintenance, \$.50 for insurance; and whereas, there is need for additional revenue for operation of said school; therefore, be it resolved: that this Conference take action that each church put the Bible School in the Budget; and be it further resolved that the churches allow the school representatives to conduct one service in the interest of the school, and that they be allowed to raise a cash offering. (1952)

10. Pastoring changing to a new field shall terminate their labors the last Sunday in July and move to their new field and take up their work the first Sunday in August. (1952)

11. The Assistant District Superintendent shall receive \$10.00 for each business meeting held in churches. (1952)

12. All Youth and Sunday school attendance banners be awarded on percentage basis. (1952)

13. Delegate fund for General Conference be set at 15c per member. (1953)

14. Every church of the District is requested to pay the pastor's utilities (1953)

15. The first night session of conference shall be designated for the ordination service of ministers, and that the certification of ordination be formally presented at said service. (1954)

16. Churches changing pastors have the privilege of contacting any minister in the District. (1954)

17. Minister's children under 18, and unemployed, be entertained free at the district conference. (1954)

18. Resolved that a temporary District Parsonage Fund be established by a special 1% assessment on all regular church and Sunday school offerings. (1955)

19. District minutes shall be given at the rate of one per church-member family; said number must be in secretary's hand not later than two weeks after Camp if minutes are to be received. (1955)

20. All conference licensed ministers shall meet the Educational and Examining Boards the day previous to conference. (1955)

21. All church public servants who tender a resignation shall vacate said office within 60 days. (1955)

22. Since actively engaged ministers and their families are entertained free at our annual camp meeting, be it resolved that our licensed song evangelists and Bible school teachers also be entertained free. (1956)

23. The District Treasurer shall mail a monthly financial report to each pastor and church treasurer which is to be posted in the church. (1956)

24. If tabernacle is used during winter, and furniture disarranged, the benches must be numbered and replaced in proper places before conference. (1956)

25. Each church desiring to nominate a lay-delegate for General conference, should do so at their annual meeting proceeding the last District conference before the General conferenc. (1956)

26. Our Bible school shall be called Southern Pilgrim College. (1956)

27. Churches are to have their pastoral relations meeting the last week-end in May. The Board shall appoint a competent person to preside. The results of voting shall be mailed to the District Superintendent at once.

28. The salary of the District Treasurer shall be \$500.00 a year, and the secretary shall receive \$250.00 a year.

STANDING RULES – DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

1. Our District Superintendent shall have a two weeks vacation with pay. (1941)
2. The District Superintendent is Chairman of the Camp Meeting Board. (1943)
3. The District Superintendent has the privilege of conducting four revivals a year, and retaining all offerings from same. (1950)

STANDING RULES – COLLEGE

1. Members of the Board of Directors shall be elected for two-year terms. (1946)
2. There shall be two laymen on the Board of Directors. (1953)

STANDING RULES – CAMP MEETING

1. The Conference shall annually elect the Secretary-Treasurer of the Camp. (1941)
2. There shall be 8 members on the Camp Meeting Board; they shall be elected for a term of 4 years. (1941)
3. The Camp secretary-treasurer shall read his report at each conference.

STANDING RULES – SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

1. The District Council shall elect the Sunday School Board of four.
2. They shall be amendable to the District Council.

STANDING RULES – HOME MISSIONS

1. The Home Missionary Board shall give a copy of the Manual and a one year's subscription to the Advocate to each Charter-member family of new churches.
2. The source of the Boards finances shall be: 1. District Home Missionary fund. 2. Public offerings in the services held on the field. 3. Personal donations. 4. An appeal to the established church once a year. 5. The Board shall have access to the Missionary Funds of the district. 6. The expenses of the Board may be collected from the Home Missionary fund. (1955)

STANDING RULES – YOUNG PEOPLE

1. A \$1.00 registration fee will be charged those receiving entertainment at convention. (1952)
2. The district shall be divided into five zones for youth work. (1953)
3. The Executive Youth Secretary shall receive \$75.00 a year. (1955)
4. A District Youth Camp shall be an annual meeting. (1953)
5. Offerings received for the Youth Home Missionary Project be sent directly to the District Youth Treasurer. (1954)

6. Banners at Youth Rallies shall be given as follows:
 1. For the largest percentage on the enrollment of society present.
 2. For the society having the largest number present.
 3. No society may receive both banners.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL YOUTH CONVENTION

The business session of the tenth annual Young People's Convention was held at 2:30 p.m. August 18, 1956 at the large tabernacle on the district camp grounds at Kernersville. Presiding at the business session was District Superintendent, Rev. W. F. Page.

The Convention opened with a group singing the Pilgrim Youth Song led by Rev. Geo. Farah. Executive Secretary, Rev. McCrary Holmes led in prayer.

Rev. W. F. Page gave an exhortation on Bible reading from II Timothy 2:15 "Study to show thyself approved unto God". The Youth were exhorted to study the Bible to know what it says and to help establish well balanced Christians.

A motion was made and seconded that the conference bar consist of first ten rows in the two center sections.

The minutes of the previous meeting was read and approved.

Reports from Executive Secretary, Rev. McCrary Holmes, and District Treasurer, Rev. James Smith, were read and approved.

The Committee on Resolutions presented the following resolutions.

1. Whereas: Plans are being constructed toward the opening of a new work at Archdale; Therefore be it resolved that this Youth conference adopt this as a project for the year, and also appropriate funds for this work. CARRIED.

2. Whereas there has been some dissatisfaction with the method of awarding attendance banners at our rallies; Therefore, be it resolved, that we change standing Rule No. 6 to read that no church will receive both banners at the rallies, therefore we should award the banners on percentage basis first, and that the percentage be based on the enrollment in the minutes, and the one for the largest number be presented last. CARRIED.

The Ways and Means committee presented the following resolutions.

Therefore, be it resolved: that the following plan be adopted for the next year:

1. Offering taken at each Zone Rally and District convention.
2. Request a special offering from each church: Large \$10.00 and the small \$5.00.
3. District Youth Week: request at least \$5.00 from each local society or group to be sent monthly to the District Youth Treasurer. CARRIED
4. Whereas many of our young people would like to come and stay for camp meeting, but don't because they don't know how to plan for finance,

Therefore be it resolved that this convention ask the camp meeting board to allow our young people between the ages of 10 and 25 to pay a registration fee of \$12.50 to cover their room and board from the first Saturday night through the last Sunday of the camp.

This will allow many young people to plan ahead and save for the camp. (The individual will still pay \$1.00 registration fee on the first Friday in order to receive free entertainment during the Youth convention. Total cost: \$13.50.) CARRIED.

5. A Motion was made and carried that we speak of the Young People's project as the North Carolina Young People's Forward Movement Project. CARRIED.
