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JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

FIRST SITTING

From the majestic, towering mountains to the beautiful Atlantic ocean, the Pilgrims of the North Carolina conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church assembled in the spacious tabernacle on the beautiful campus of Southern Pilgrim College at Kernersville, North Carolina, July 29th, for the Forty-ninth Annual Conference.

At 10:00 a.m. the District Superintendent, Rev. W. F. Page, called the conference to order. Rev. U. N. Freeman led the congregation in the singing of "Down At The Cross". Prayer was offered by Assistant District Superintendent Rev. Wray J. Smith.

Rev. Melvin H. Snyder, General Superintendent over the Eastern area of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, was presented to the conference.

Rev. Mr. Snyder brought greetings from the general church, and encouraging reports from other conferences already conducted this summer.

He addressed the conference from God's message to the seven churches of Asia. The lesson read was from Revelation three, the letter to the church of Philadelphia. He said that he believed the messages to the seven churches are a picture of the condition of the church in various conditions and periods.

He stated that there are three points of similarity in the message to all of the seven churches, namely—

1. "Unto the angel of the church . . ."
2. "I know thy works . . ."
3. "He that hath an ear, let him hear what the Spirit saith . . ."

Using the last point first, he drew attention to the importance of our "hearing what the Spirit saith unto the churches". The prime importance of this conference should be to hear what the Spirit would say to us. Such an hearing includes the idea of being willing to do what the Spirit saith.

He said that some seem to feel that to save the church we must continue stacking up legislation upon legislation, but that the solution to the churches' problems today is to be Spirit-filled; a condition which causes the heart to wholly follow His leadings and will.

The Spirit will reveal the difference between our being in a rut, and in following "the old paths", and will lead us to press forward in the Divine pattern. The church will be successful only in the proportion that it keeps in step with the Spirit.

Second, he reminded us that the Spirit knows our works. In this conference we have gathered to hear reports, but the Spirit has the absolute report and record of our activities, attitudes, and all that concerns us.

The Spirit is well acquainted with the quantity and quality of our works. He knows when our work is done out of a sense of duty to God, rather than from the throbbing heart of love and devotion.

Third, the salutation, "Unto the Angel of the church", he said, is a statement showing that the stirring messages are sent directly to the ministers. The minister is the human agent for the Almighty God. As such, he should always go to the pulpit with God's message for the particular need of the hour and place.

He charged the minister to recognize his tremendous responsibility to God and the laymen. Also, he said the laymen must recognize their responsibility to God's servant. They should honor, pray, and stand by the pastor whom God has sent to help them.

The report of the District Superintendent, Rev. W. F. Page was read and accepted.

The report of the Assistant District Superintendent, Rev. Wray J. Smith, was read and accepted. Due to physical conditions, he asked that his name should not be considered further for the office of Assistant District Superintendent.

By a rising vote of thanks, the conference expressed their deep appreciation for his years of service to the district.

The sitting was adjourned with prayer by J. A. Grout.

SECOND SITTING

The second sitting of the conference opened at 2:00 p.m. with the singing of "We'll Work Till Jesus Comes". Prayer was led by Rev. O. L. Ruth.

Rev. Dewey O. Miller, Vice-President of the North Carolina Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church brought fraternal greetings. He emphasized our unity of experience, purpose and goals as churches. He also stated his personal hope that the amalgamation of our two denominations may yet become a reality.

A motion carried that Rev. Mr. Miller be granted an honorary seat within the conference bar.

The secretary read the minutes of the first sitting and they were approved.

The President of Southern Pilgrim College, Prof. Gordon E. Miller, gave a report of the work of the past year and it was accepted.

A motion carried that we express, by a standing vote, our deep appreciation to him for his consecrated and wise directing of the school that has made such wonderful steps forward, and for his pulling the school out of debt, and running it in the black.

The Auditors, Rev. and Mrs. F. W. Henry, read their report and it was accepted.

The Treasurer, Rev. L. L. Lange, read his report and it was accepted.

A motion carried that by a rising vote we express our heartfelt thanks to Brother L. B. Gallimore for the efficient service he has rendered to the district for years as treasurer.

The Director of District Missionary Societies, Mrs. W. F. Page, read her report and it was accepted.

The Sunday School Promotional Secretary, Rev. George Farah, read his report and it was accepted.

The District Youth President, Rev. J. B. Stutts, read his report and it was accepted.

The Camp Meeting Secretary and Treasurer, Rev. U. N. Freeman, read his report and it was accepted.

The Statistician, Rev. Wm. R. Philips, read his report and it was accepted.

The Secretary read a recommendation from the district council which the conference accepted and passed. "Having considered the reports of the 'blue sheets':—the reports of the various churches as to whether they had 1. Paid all their District and General Budgets; 2. Or paid a part of their budgets; 3. Or whether they had failed to pay anything; and, having tried sincerely to understand the ability of the local church to pay, we, the district council recommend that all delegates and ministers be seated within the conference bar this year.

"We do feel that many are to be highly commended for their loyal support; others should be strongly urged to bring up their budgets next year; and that no church shall be seated within the conference bar next year which has totally ignored their obligation to the General and District budgets."

Several ministers were received into conference, contingent upon their transfers coming through from their present districts. They were: Ordained ministers, Charles Stout and Richard Prendergrast from Virginia District; Leo Record from Alabama; and Hayes Johnson from Tennessee. Licensed ministers: Jim Sheets, 4th year, from Oregon; Ronald Robbins, first year.

After several announcements the meeting was adjourned by expiration of time, and the benediction was pronounced by Brother L. B. Gallimore.

THIRD SITTING

The third sitting of the conference opened at 7:00 p.m. with the singing of "There Shall Be Showers Of Blessings". Prayer was offered by Rev. Kermit Farlow.

The secretary read the minutes of the second sitting and they were approved.

The reception committee introduced to the conference Rev. Ager Lee Vanderburg, Rev. Charles Stout, Rev. Hayes Johnson, Rev. Leo Record, and Rev. Jim Sheets.

The Committee on Memoirs presented a lovely memorial in memory of those of our conference who during the past year have left us to be with the Lord. A motion carried to accept this memorial.

The Resolutions Committee presented three resolutions. Numbers one and two carried; and number 3 carried after being amended.

The Ways and Means Committee presented two resolutions which carried.

The election of officers resulted in the following elections:

While ballots were being counted, the General gave a very interesting report on his visit to Africa.

The meeting adjourned with prayer by Rev. U. N. Freeman.

FOURTH SITTING

The fourth sitting of the conference opened at 9:00 a.m. with the singing of "He Abides". Prayer was led by Rev. Charles L. Stout.

Many joyous words of praise to God were expressed for His merciful dealings in helping in our every need.

A motion carried that we dispense with the calling of the roll.

The secretary read the minutes of the third sitting and they were approved.

Whereas, Rev. W. A. Way is retiring from active ministry at this conference, be it resolved that by a rising vote of thanks we express our appreciation to him for his 54 years of faithful and efficient service to the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

A motion carried that the secretary send greetings from this conference to three of our ministers who are not able to be with us due to sickness: Rev. J. W. Covington, Dr. W. L. Surbrook, and Rev. M. H. Russell.

A motion carried that we express our appreciation for the manner and work of our beloved General Superintendent, Rev. Melvin Snyder, in conducting our Forty-ninth Annual Conference.

Motion carried that we adjourn. The benediction was pronounced by Rev. Mr. Page.

REPORTS TO CONFERENCE

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

To the Forty-ninth Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church now in session at Kernersville, N. C. Greetings in the wonderful name of our risen Lord.

As we are assembled here to transact the business which God has entrusted to us as Christians and conference leaders, we are surrounded by an unsettled and uncertain world groping in the blackness of despair with no light and no salvation. We, as a Christian body, know that "the foundation of God standeth sure". Our bulwarks are in Him.

We have not reached all the goals set for this conference year, but we thank God and the faithful Pilgrims and friends for whatever progress has been made.

Temporal Progress

I shall only report new buildings and major improvements in this column:

Asheboro has done a major job of remodeling and redecorating the church.

Bethel has erected a beautiful and adequate parsonage.

Bethlehem has built a lovely new church near where their old one burned a few months ago. It was my happy privilege to dedicate this church on Sunday afternoon, July 19th.

Durham is in the process of remodeling and adding to their church.

Gold Hill has added a much needed educational building.

Lenoir has purchased a valuable piece of property on which to build a new church.

Salisbury has also done a major job of remodeling and adding to their facilities.

Siler City has added a beautiful addition to their church.

The young **Seagrove** church has erected a beautiful and spacious edifice.

Guilford has done a nice job of remodeling and redecorating.

Thomasville has purchased a beautiful site on which to build a church.

Browers has had a tract of land given them on which to erect a parsonage.

We thank God for the sacrifices and labors of love which have made these improvements possible.

Financially and Numerically

We have not progressed as much in these areas as we should have but some gains have been made along with a slight loss. We have approximately a thirty-thousand-dollar gain in the financial picture. A four percent gain in Sunday school attendance and to my regret a one percent loss in church membership. The church membership loss can be attributed in a large measure to the removing of much driftwood in order to better meet the financial obligation of the United Stewardship Fund.

New Work

We have not organized any new churches this year. There is a place or two where it seems we may be able to bring in a new church in the near future. I am tremendously burdened and concerned for this phase of the work and am praying and hoping that we shall be able to set up a more energetic and fruitful program for digging out new work.

Sunday School and Youth Work

Brother George Farah and Brother J. B. Stutts have given unstintingly of their time and labors to make the progress which has been made in these departments. They will be giving a full report to this conference of the work done and the results accomplished in these fields.

Recommendations

I should like to repeat a part of the recommendations I made last year. First: That each pastor and church pray and believe God for a real spiritual awakening until revival fires will be kindled and burn in every congregation. Second: I would like to recommend that we strive again for a six percent gain in church membership and Sunday school attendance. Third: I would like to recommend that each pastor and church earnestly endeavor to meet their financial obligation to the General Church, Southern Pilgrim College and every phase of District work.

REPORT OF SOUTHERN PILGRIM COLLEGE

To the Forty-ninth Annual Conference of the North Carolina District.

Since our last meeting many things have happened pertaining to the future of the General Church. As a denomination we are going to have to press forward as never before in the educational field. Many of us thought that by the merger of the Wesleyan Methodist and Pilgrim denominations our educational problem would be solved, but due to the outcome of their vote I believe that God expects us to launch forward and build our schools so we can continue to prepare young people for God's work.

By the authority given to a committee at the last District Conference in reference to incorporating Virginia, Kentucky, and West Virginia, we can state that the Charter and By-Laws for this incorporation have been completed. We are hoping that all necessary work has been finished so this organization can start functioning immediately. Plans have been made to visit all the district camps of said districts and later in the year all the churches.

Following is a brief report for the school year 1958-59. For the entire year we enrolled 110 students. The prospects for the coming year appear to be equal with last year's enrollment. Several improvements have been made in the past year on our campus. Two bathrooms in the Administration Building have been remodeled. The Alumni Association helped to finance a portion of this. The ceiling in the chapel has been recently plastered. This work was done by Rev. Ed. Easter. New furniture has been placed in many of the rooms of the girls and boys dormitories. This project was made possible by the Women's Missionary Societies. In appreciation for this fine contribution we are placing plaques on each door signifying which church furnished the room.

Late last fall we finished modernizing and remodeling our student apartments. We also have the complete building underpinned with six-inch cement blocks.

Since the last camp meeting we have installed a pump in the spring house and since that time we have been using spring water. This has been a big savings to the school financially. We have recently purchased two new electric typewriters for classroom use.

Sidewalks have been poured between the Girls Dormitory and Administration Building. A new water fountain for the Administration Building was purchased during the school year.

With the financial end of our school we got along exceptionally well this past year; we want to give God the glory for His goodness to us.

A report of finances of the college will be given by the District Treasurer.

We have filed application with the Federal Student Loan Fund; however, to date we do not know what benefits we will be able to receive. But as the school grows these benefits will increase.

We are working on another loan fund that is being sponsored by interested friends of the school. This loan fund will be in operation this coming school year.

We are aware of the fact that the success of a church or school is not through the efforts of one individual but through team-work of the entire constituency.

The success of last year is due to many factors, namely: faculty, churches of North Carolina District, prayers of God's people, gifts of individuals that are interested in the school.

As we are about to begin a new school year we covet your prayers and your support. It is only through God's help that we can go forth with the work. In St. Mark 10:27 we read: "And Jesus looking upon them saith, with man it is impossible, but not with God: for with God all things are possible."

REPORT OF DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

To the forty-ninth Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Greetings! It has been my pleasure to serve as your District Youth President for the past year. God has blessed the young people of our district and under his leadership I believe we are still going forward. Some of the activities of the past year follow:

1) The District Youth Leaders Conference held at Kernersville on October 18, 1958. There were sixty (60) persons registering.

2) Youth Fellowship Services. These services were held during Youth Week in each Youth Zone. The purpose of the service was to launch the youth program for the coming year. Rev. and Mrs. Jim Sheets from Aurora, Oregon were our workers. We feel that these services were a great success.

3) New Chartered Societies. Under the new legislation passed by the 1958 General Conference we only have 10 societies in the North Carolina Conference which have become chartered. It is very important that all of our societies become chartered. I trust that this year we will put forth a special effort to get all of our societies chartered under the new legislation.

4) Youth Rallies. According to the reports sent to me there have been only eleven (11) zone rallies. Each zone is requested to have 4 rallies each year. This would make an overall total of twenty (20) rallies. I trust that this coming year we shall be able to report 4 rallies in each zone. In addition to these zone rallies I have conducted a Bible Quiz in two zones.

5) Youth Convention. Our Youth Convention was held here at Southern Pilgrim College, June 26-27. Dr. P. F. Elliott, General Secretary of Sunday School and Youth, presided over our conference. The majority of people present were young people. Since we have our new youth legislation I feel that the Youth Convention is going to be one of the strongest aspects of our work.

6) Youth Camps. God honored our Youth Camps this year. We conducted two separate camps at the William B. Umstead Park, one camp for the boys and one for girls. We had around 98 boys and girls seeking spiritual help. This should prove to us that Youth Camps pay big dividends. Our goal is to have every church represented at the camp.

Personal Report

It was my privilege to attend the National Sunday School and Youth Leaders Conference in Indianapolis, Indiana last September. I have traveled 2,476 miles in visiting zone rallies, youth camps, and in the interest of the district youth work. I want to say one big "thank you" to those who have contributed in any way to the progress that the young people have made this year. Let us continue to march forward with the "Conquering Christ."

RESOLUTIONS

1. Whereas, Southern Pilgrim College is a vital organ of the North Carolina district, and the progress of the said institution is being hampered by inadequate facilities, be it resolved that an agency be authorized by this conference to solicit funds from the churches; and, that such funds are to be applied to the new administration building. Such agency shall be decided upon by a joint meeting of the District Council, College Board of Directors, and the Alumni Association.

2. Whereas Southern Pilgrim College has become a Zone School, we therefore request that the School Board shall ask each conference of the school zone area of Southern Pilgrim College to give authorization for the solicitation of funds for the building program.

3. Whereas we have no system of informing our district ministers of the passing of our ministerial brethren, therefore be it resolved that district superintendent shall notify all Sunday School Zone Chairmen, who in turn shall notify all the ministers in their respective zone.

4. Since the District Superintendent is loaded with many duties, therefore be it resolved that he be relieved from serving as chairman of the Home Missionary Board, and that the Assistant Superintendent shall serve as chairman.

5. Whereas the conference is to recommend evangelists whose slate is to be carried in the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate, therefore be it resolved, that no pastor be recommended for the evangelists slate, and that no pastor's name be carried as evangelist in the Advocate.

WAYS AND MEANS

1. Whereas our Group Life and Hospital Policy has proven very beneficial to a number of our Conference and church employees, be it resolved that since the State of North Carolina has notified us that our payment requirements do not fully comply with the State Law, be it further resolved that each church or employee agency pay \$2.35 per month to cover part of their members' insurance, and the participating member will be required to pay the cost of a dependent's coverage.

2. We recommend that the District Budget be 15%, and broken down as follows: District budget 8%, Bible School 5%, Home Missions 1%, and Loan Fund 1%.

CONFERENCE STANDING RULES

1. Churches are asked to give their pastor a two week vacation with pay. (1941)
 2. Churches should see that their delegates to conference conform to standards of the manual. (1945)

3. Local church officers assume their duties the first of July. (1946)

4. Local ministers licenses to be renewed are to be sent to the District Superintendent at conference with a recommendation of the local church. (1947)

5. Our District Budget shall be 15% of all regular offerings, with the breakdown as follows: District Budget 8%, Bible School 5%, Loan Fund 1%, and Home Missions 1%. (1959)

6. District officials shall receive 6c per mile for traveling in district business. (1955)

7. To help support the District Sunday School work, churches with fifty members and over shall pay \$5.00 annually, and churches with less than fifty members shall pay \$3.00 annually into the Sunday School Board's treasury. (1952)

8. Whereas, the Conference has established a \$3.00 per member budget for the support of Southern Pilgrim College; and whereas, there is need for additional revenue for operation of said school; therefore, be it resolved; that this conference take action that each church put the Bible School in their budget; and be it further resolved that the churches allow the school representatives to conduct one service in the interest of the school, and that they be allowed to raise a cash offering. (1952)

9. The Assistant District Superintendent shall receive \$10.00 for each business meeting held in churches. (1952)

10. All Youth and Sunday School attendance banners shall be awarded on the percentage basis. (1952)

11. Every church in the District is requested to pay the pastor's utilities. (1953)

12. The first night session of conference shall be designated for the ordination service of ministers, and the certificate of ordination shall be formally presented at said service. (1954)

13. Churches changing pastors have the privilege of contacting any minister in the district. (1954)

14. Ministers' children under 18, and unemployed, shall be entertained free at the district conference. (1954) Also, licensed song evangelists and Bible school teachers. (1956)

15. A temporary district parsonage fund shall be established by a special assessment of 1% of all regular church and Sunday School offerings. (1955)

16. District Minutes shall be given at the rate of one per church-member family; said number must be in secretary's hand not later than two weeks after Camp if minutes are to be received. (1955)

17. All conference licensed ministers shall meet the Educational and Examining Boards the day previous to conference. (1955)

18. All church public servants who tender a resignation shall vacate said office within 60 days. (1955)

19. The District Treasurer shall mail a monthly financial report to each pastor and church treasurer which is to be posted in the church. (1956)

20. If tabernacle is used during winter, and furniture disarranged, the benches must be numbered and replaced in proper places before conference. (1956)

21. Each church desiring to nominate a lay-delegate for General conference, should do so at their annual meeting preceeding the last District conference before the General conference. (1956)

22. Our Bible school shall be called Southern Pilgrim College. (1956)

23. The salary of the District Treasurer shall be \$500.00 a year, and the secretary shall receive \$250.00 a year.

24. Whereas, our camp meeting now starts the last Friday of July, the pastors who change pastorates, shall preach their farewell sermon the first Sunday after camp meeting, and move that week. (1958, Council action)

25. Whereas, we are running a deficit in our General Conference Delegate fund, therefore be it resolved that the fund be set at 20c a member. (1958)

26. The conference bar shall include the first fifteen rows of seats in the tabernacle, excepting the section at the right which shall be reserved for visitors.

Also, the time of sittings shall be 10:00 a.m. the opening day, until 11:45 a.m., 2:00 p.m. to 4:45 p.m., and 7:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. The second day shall be the same except that the conference shall open at 9:00 a.m. (1958)

27. In case of death among our ministers' families, the District Superintendent shall notify all Sunday school Zone chairmen, who in turn shall notify all pastors in their zone. (1959)

28. Due to the heavy load of the district superintendent, the assistant superintendent shall be chairman of the Home Missionary Committee. (1959)

29. No pastor shall have his name carried in the evangelists slate of the Advocate. (1959)

30. Each church or employee agency shall pay \$2.35 per month to cover part of the members insurance; the participating member shall pay the cost of all dependents coverage. (1959)

STANDING RULES—DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

1. Our District Superintendent shall have a two weeks vacation with pay. (1941)
2. The District Superintendent is the Chairman of the Camp Meeting Board. (1943)
3. The District Superintendent's salary shall be set at One Hundred Dollars per week. (1958)
4. The District Superintendent, in his annual report, shall list the office-salary received plus his traveling expenses. (1958)
5. The District Superintendent shall be permitted to conduct two revivals a year other than the Home Missionary work in his district. (1958)

STANDING RULES—CAMP MEETING

1. The Conference shall annually elect the Secretary-Treasurer of the Camp. (1941)
2. There shall be 8 members on the Camp Meeting Board; they shall be elected for a term of 4 years. (1941)
3. The Camp secretary-treasurer shall read his report at each conference.

STANDING RULES—SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

1. The District Council shall elect the Sunday School Board of four.
2. They shall be amendable to the District Council.

STANDING RULES—HOME MISSIONS

1. The Home Missionary Board shall give a copy of the Manual and a one year's subscription to the Advocate to each Charter-member family of new churches.
2. The source of the Boards finances shall be: 1. District Home Missionary fund. 2. Public offerings in the service held on the field. 3. Personal donations. 4. An appeal to the established church once a year. 5. The Board shall have access to the Missionary Funds of the district. 6. The expenses of the Board may be collected from the Home Missionary fund. (1955)

STANDING RULES—YOUTH PEOPLE

1. A \$1.00 registration fee will be charged those receiving entertainment at the youth convention. (1952)
2. The district shall be divided into five zones for youth work. (1953)
3. A district Youth Camp shall be an annual meeting. (1953)
4. Offerings received for the Youth Home Missionary Project shall be sent directly to the District Youth Treasurer. (1954)
5. The Executive Youth Secretary shall receive \$100.00 a year. (1957)
6. Banners at the Youth Rallies shall be given (1) For the society with the largest percentage of enrollment present. (2) For the society having the largest number present. No society may receive both banners, but should a church qualify for both banners, they may choose the banner they prefer. (1959)
7. The District Youth project shall be supported by each church sending a liberal monthly offering to the District Youth Treasurer.
The District Youth Operational Fund shall consist of the offerings from the Youth Rallies, and a special offering from each church for the support of the Youth Conference. This special offering shall consist of at least \$10.00 from church of 50 or more members, and at least \$5.00 from churches of less than 50 members. (1959)
8. The attendance cup shall be awarded at the Youth Convention to the church having the largest number of points; points shall be counted for the total attendance for both night services, multiplied by the miles traveled to the convention, plus 5 points per person registering for the convention. (1958)
9. Each Zone shall have a minimum of four rallies annually. The place and time of said rallies shall be the responsibility of the Zone Chairman, who shall give 30 days notification of where and when the rally is to be held. (1959)

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL YOUTH CONVENTION

The Annual Youth Convention was conducted in the tabernacle on the campus of Southern Pilgrim College, June 26, 1959.

The Convention opened with Youth President, J. B. Stutts giving a hearty welcome to all.

Rev. Jim Sheets led the group in singing, "Love Lifted Me." Miss Joyce Cox led in prayer.

A trio from the Thomasville Church sang, "Jesus Will Walk With Me."

The offering was received after which the Ramseur Young People's Choir favored us with a song, "The Ninety and Nine."

Youth President, Rev. Stutts, introduced our speaker, Dr. Paul Elliott.

May God bless each and every one of the contestants, and our congratulations to the winners, Albemarle and Randleman.

BUSINESS SESSION OF ANNUAL YOUTH CONVENTION

1:30 P.M.—JUNE 27, 1959

The meeting opened with congregation singing, "I Know In Whom I have Believed."

Prayer was offered by Rev. Ronald Thompson. Dr. Elliott presided. The Bar was set to consist of the first ten rows of the two left sections of seats.

Reports by our president, Rev. Stutts, our Treasurer, Rev. Smith, and our Zone Chairmen were given and highly received.

Each youth president submitted a verbal report, and we were encouraged to know our Youth Societies are progressing so well.

The Ways and Means Committee reported as follows:

Be it resolved that Standing Rule 7 be changed to read as follows:

1. The District Youth Project shall be supported by each Church sending a liberal monthly offering to the District Youth Treasurer.

2. The district youth operational fund shall consist of the offerings from the youth rallies and a special offering from each church for the support of the Youth Conference. This special offering shall consist of an offering of at least Ten (10) Dollars from Churches of 50 or more members and at least Five (5) Dollars from Churches of less than 50 members.

These resolutions were carried.

The Resolutions Committee presented the following resolutions:

1. Be it resolved that the N. C. District Youth Convention be held June 10, 11, 1960 to avoid conflict with National Youth Convention.

Carried.

2. Standing Rule 6 amended to read as follows:

Banners at the Youth Rallies shall be given (1) For the largest percentage of society enrollment present. (2) For the society having the largest number present. No society may receive both banners. (Amendment) If a Church should qualify for both banners, they may choose the banners they prefer.

Carried.

3. Be it resolved that this Conference empower the District Youth Council with the responsibility of the activities of placing the portable tabernacle.

Carried.

4. Whereas our present procedure of having rallies on the Saturday nights before the fifth Sundays has been unsatisfactory, be it resolved that the time and place of said rallies be the responsibility of the Zone Chairman with a minimum of four (4) rallies annually, and that a thirty days notification in advance must be given when a rally is to be held.

Carried.

5. Whereas Christian education is extremely important in these days; we recommend the following projects for the coming year.

1. That this Conference go on record as favoring the earliest possible erection of a new Administration Building for Southern Pilgrim College with a concrete donation of \$750.00.

2. That we appropriate \$50.00 per team for each of the two teams who will represent our district at the National Youth Convention in 1960.
