JOURNAL OF CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

FIRST SITTING

Through the gracious mercies of our wonderful Lord, the Pilgrims from over the great State of North Carolina gathered together for another great conference, and this time we shall gratefully celebrate our Golden Anniversary as a conference. With humble hearts we can truthfully say "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us."

District Superintendent Page called the conference to order at 10 a.m. August 3, 1960. Rev. Jim Sheets led the congregation in the singing of "Take Time To Be Holy."

Dr. W. L. Surbrook, General Superintendent Emeritus, lifted our hearts to God in prayer as he thanked God for past blessings, and implored the Divine presence and guidance to be given to our assembling.

Brother Page presented our Area General Superintendent, Dr. Wm. H. Neff to the conference.

Brother Neff greeted the conference, and reminded us that our Great Two-Fold Business as a church is that of Winning Souls to Christ, and of Worshipping Jesus Christ. He exhorted that we seek to have the Spirit of Christ upon us and a good baptism of common sense as we proceed with business for the Master.

The secretary called the roll of ministers and lay-delegates.

The new Foster Street Pilgrim Holiness church of Asheboro was presented to the conference. Rev. Wm. Brady is the pastor, and Mr. Darrell Albertson the delegate. A motion carried that we receive this church into the conference.

The next matter of business was the hearing of reports.

Our good District Superintendent, Rev. W. F. Page, read his annual report and was gratefully accepted.

The Assistant District Superintendent, Rev. R. S. Shelton read his report of services rendered the district during the year, and was accepted.

The District Treasurer, Rev. L. L. Lange read his well-prepared and mimeographed report of the finances of the district for the past year and was accepted.

The Director of Missionary Societies of the Conference, Mrs. W. F. Page, read the report of the work accomplished by said societies and was accepted.

The Chairman of the District Home Missionary Work, Rev. R. S. Shelton, read the report of the work done this past year, and was received by a rising vote of appreciation to all who helped make this possible.

Following announcements, the sitting was adjourned by expiration of time.

SECOND SITTING 2:00 p.m.

The second sitting of the conference opened at 2:00 p.m. with Rev. J. B. Stutts leading in the singing of "Showers Of Blessing."

Rev. O. L. Ruth, the only minister present who attended the first annual conference in 1910, fervently asked God's help in this sitting, and blessings upon our work in general.

Dr. Neff read a portion of the eighty-first Psalm. He emphasized the fact that a holy, obedient, and godly people will bring the enemies of God to defeat, and God's cause to victory. He further stated that very basic is our faith and love for God's Way and Will; naught else is so powerful to bring the lost to God as a spirit-filled life.

The matter of reports to conference were again heard.

President Gordon E. Miller presented a very encouraging financial report of the Southern Pilgrim College for the year of 1950-1960, and was accepted.

The Statistician, Rev. Wm. Roy Phillips, gave a very enlightening report, and was accepted.

The District Youth President, Rev. J. B. Stutts, gave a report of the work of Youth through-out our conference, and was accepted.

The Camp Meeting Secretary-Treasurer, Rev. U. N. Freeman, read his report for the camp meeting of 1959, and was accepted.

The Secretary of Sunday Schools, Rev. Edward T. Houston, read the report of the work of the Sunday schools of the district, and was accepted.

The Auditor of the Treasurers books, Rev. F. W. Henry, read his report of the examining of the treasurers books, and was accepted.

The secretary read the council's recommendation to receive several ministers into our conference from other districts, and was accepted.

The Examining Committee reported on the standing of various ministers who had come before their board, and was accepted. They also recommended that all those ministers who had failed to appear before the committees remain in the same standing, except for some about whom there were some questions to be answered. This recommendation was also accepted.

The Resolutions Committee presented three resolutions, all of which were accepted.

A motion carried that our publicity man get the motion relative to our stand concerning a Roman Catholic being elected to the Presidency, to the various papers in nearby cities.

The Committee On Memoirs presented a very fitting memorial to those of our number who have heard the call of our Lord to come higher, during the past year.

After announcements, the sitting was adjourned by expiration of time.

THIRD SITTING OF CONFERENCE

The third sitting of the conference had as it's first matter of business a very sacred ordination service in which Rev. Gordon E. Miller, Rev. Mrs. Gordon E. Miller, and Rev. Leonard W. Connor were ordained to the ministry.

The service was opened with the singing of "A Charge To Keep I Have." This was followed with prayer by Rev. Page.

General Superintendent Neff delivered the ordination charge. His theme was "The Kind Of A Man Our Church Needs". He stated that the Pilgrim Holiness Church needs a man with a warm heart and wholly dedicated to God. His spiritual life will be known not merely by outward abstentions from evil, but by his devotion to Christ Jesus.

The minister our church needs is a man of the Book. It must become his very meat and drink, and his preaching have the stamp of the Word in all it's contents.

The minister our church needs is one of a prayerful spirit; one who not only keeps his own soul atune by the breath of prayer, but faithfully intercedes for his people. Not one who feverishly prays at the last moment of the week for help on Sunday, but who lives in daily communion with God.

Our church needs a man who can get along with his people, and handle them skillfully. He further stated that if he will practice three things; namely, 1. Have a sincere love for, and interest in his people. 2. Look always for the best, and not the worst in the flock, and 3. Recognize each person must be dealt with differently, he will go a long ways towards succeeding in human relations.

Our church needs men who are skillfull in the handling of money. He must be careful how he secures and spends it.

The minister our church needs is a minister that is loyal to the church. Such is fundamental to the life of the church or any organization. Such loyalty will be given to all departments and work of the church.

Finally, we need men who put the kingdoms interest first in their life, and who with the patience of love, toils ever onwards in sure and certain faith that God's cause shall triumph in His time.

The secretary read the minutes of the second sitting, and were approved as read.

A motion carried that we send greetings to Rev. and Mrs. J. W. Covington, and Rev. and Mrs. M. H. Russell who due to extended illness are unable to attend the conference.

A motion carried that by a standing vote we express our sincere appreciation for efficient and kindly manner in which our beloved General Superintendent, Dr. Wm. H. Neff, has so ably conducted this conference.

The District Superintendent read the appointments for the coming year.

A motion carried that any unfinished business be turned over to the council.

A motion carried that we adjourn. We were dismissed with prayer by Brother Neff.

REPORTS TO CONFERENCE

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

As we are assembled here today on these sacred Conference grounds to hear reports and formulate plans and programs for the future futherence of the blessed Church of Jesus Christ, whose primary philosophy is "Peace on Earth and good will toward all men." The world reels recklessly on towards a rendezvous with the greatest holocaust in her history, namely her baptism of fire.

Mad men at the head of some of the great world powers are not only rattling sabers, but atomic and hydrogen bombs, along with all the other fearful and devastating nuclear weapons. I know that I sound like a prophet of doom, but I fear the hour is later than we think. So let us look up and lift up our heads for our redemption draweth nigh.

In our labors for the Master this year we have not accomplished all we desired but thank the Lord we have worked at the job and striven to be faithful.

Temporal Progress

I shall only report new buildings and major improvements in this column.

Albemarle has erected a beautiful addition to their church which gives them more room in their auditorium and substantially enlarges their Sunday School department.

Browers has built one of the most beautiful parsonages in the district.

Brown's Chapel is in the process of erecting a lovely parsonage.

Harkers Island has done a wonderful job of remodeling and redecorating their church.

Kannapolis has purchased a large house and lot across the street from their church which they plan to use for a Sunday School annex.

Mt. Zion, Moore county, is in the process of erecting an educational building.

Reidsville has purchased a lovely parsonage and also a tract of land on which they plan to build a new church.

Siler City has redecorated their parsonage, installed an air conditioning system in their church and are in the process of erecting a fellowship hall.

We are indeed grateful to all who have prayed and given of their means and labors to make these additions and improvements possible.

Financially and Numerically

Our total financial receipts are twenty six thousand dollars above last years receipts. We suffered a slight loss in church membership and Sunday School attendance. The district youth work shows a ten percent gain in attendance. I strongly urge that we all work together for gains in these areas rather than loss this year.

New Work

We have organized one new church this year in the city of Asheboro. Much credit should be given to Brother Farah and the wonderful people of the First Church for their willingness to allow this fine group to go out of their number to form the nucleus for this new work. This new organization has chosen the name of Foster Street Pilgrim Holiness Church. They called Brother William Brady to be their first pastor.

Brother Shelton along with the church extension board deserves considerable credit for their faithfulness in helping this church to get going.

Sunday School and Youth Work

Brother George Farah and Brother J. B. Stutts have done a splendid job in these departments again this year.

A full report of their fine work will be given to this conference. We regret that Brother Farah has accepted work outside of our district. He has already gone from us and will not be here to give his report. We appreciate the faithful service this good man has given to the North Carolina District. Our prayers and best wishes go with him to his new field of labor. The District Council has appointed Brother Edward T. Houston to succeed Brother Farah as executive secretary of district Sunday Schools. He will give a report to the conference.

Recommendations

1. I should like to recommend that each church in the District strive to cooperate with the General Church Program of lay visitation. I believe that this is the most effectual method we can use today to bring revivals to our churches.

2. I should like to recommend that we continue the same budget system for Southern Pilgrim College which we have had the past year.

3. I should like to recommend that we go on record as a conference as being opposed to the election of a Roman Catholic for President of the United States.

REPORT OF THE HOME MISSIONARY COMMITTEE

To the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church-Greetings. In behalf of the Home Missionary Committee we present the following report.

During this past year it has been our privilege to launch a Home Missionary church in Asheboro.

The committee was contacted by the church board of our First Church there. After a committee meeting it was decided to organize a second church.

A beautiful location was purchased in South Asheboro on Foster Street. This property is located one block off Highway 220. It consists of a corner lot on Foster Street and 3rd Avenue. It has a 225 ft. frontage on Foster and 175 ft. on 3rd Avenue 100 ft. of this frontage is 400 ft. deep. On this property a 3 room cottage is located which is rented at present for \$35.00 per month.

To provide a place of worship a fellowship hall was purchased from a city church and moved to this location where it was completely remodeled. We have a beautiful chapel that provides for our present congregation which is about 40.

The group was organized in the First Church with 11 charter members by our District Superintendent in the presence of a large group of Pilgrims and pastors from our district. Rev. Wm. Brady was called to pastor the group.

This property is valued at \$12,000. It has a present indebtedness of less than \$8,000, which is assumed by the local congregation. We wish to express our appreciation to Rev. George Farah and the Asheboro Board for their assistance along with all the District Pilgrims who helped to make this possible.

To the Fiftieth Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Greetings!

It doesn't seem possible that another year has passed—but it has! There are many things which indicate to me that God has been with the Pilgrim young people of the North Carolina District and that they are still marching forward.

Our District was well represented at the National Youth Convention at Winona Lake, Indiana, June 8-12. We are very proud of our Teenage Bible Quiz Team from Albemarle, Larry Shelton, Gary and Wayne Chandler, who won the National Quiz Contest. Also, we are grateful to the Randleman Adult Team for representing us at the convention although they didn't win tip honors. The singing of the Ramseur Choir and the host of youth from our District made us feel at home.

Thirteen Youth Zone Rallies were conducted this year. This is seven below our minimum. The Burlington zone under the leadership of Rev. Don Richardson was the only zone to conduct four rallies. I believe our young people want and deserve good Christian fellowship together. May we strive to have more and better youth zone rallies this year.

Our District Youth Convention was held here at Southern Pilgrim College, June 24-25. Dr. W. L. Surbrook of Troy, N. C., was our speaker. Everyone went away inspired to march forward with the Conquering Christ.

RESOLUTIONS

1. "Whereas the large number of members serving on the District Board of Trustees was set up to meet an emergency, and whereas, this emergency is now past, and whereas many of our districts have but three trustees, and whereas, the trustees function only under the authority of the district council, therefore be it resolved, that we revise the number of trustees to be three, and declare all present trustees offices vacated.

Also, that in electing the new board of trustees by one ballot, the one receiving the highest number of votes shall serve for three years; the second highest shall serve two years, and the third highest shall serve one year.

2. WHEREAS, the religious issue has again injected itself into the National Political picture; and

WHEREAS, our nation under God has led the world in religious freedom under Protestant leadership; and

WHEREAS, Protestants are suffering a systematic curbing of the free exercise of religion in countries where the Roman Church has the unrivaled predominance; and

WHEREAS, there is abundant evidence that a Roman Catholic public official is bound by the dogmas and demands of his church which are strongly opposed to the separation of church and state; and

WHEREAS, a public official should be free from all sectarian pressures in making decisions, and it is our opinion that a Roman Catholic candidate for the Presidency is not free to make such decisions; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that we as a conference go on record as being conscientiously opposed to the election of a Roman Catholic as President of the United States; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that for the sake of our future Christian liberties, we shall prayerfully urge our people to think seriously, and to pray earnestly over the coming election of the President of the United States.

3. Since there is much expense to churches for moving, and since it is done now by the pound, and since it is quite expensive to pastors, and would save a tearing up and upsetting the kitchens, therefore, Be it resolved, that each church furnish their parsonage with stove and refrigerator. This is a recommendation.

4. Be it resolved that Conference Standing Rules, numbers 10, 18, 22, and 29 be deleted from the conference minutes.

5. Whereas we have five Youth Zones and only Four Sunday School Zones, therefore, be it resolved, that we have Five Zones for both, and that the zones with their respective churches be printed in the minutes.

CONFERENCE STANDING RULES

1. Churches are asked to give their pastor a two week vacation with pay. (1941)
2. Churches should see that their delegates to conference conform to standards of the manual. (1945)

3. Local church officers assume their duties the first of July. (1946)

4. Local ministers licenses to be renewed are to be sent to the District Superintendent at conference with a recommendation of the local church. (1947)

5. Our District Budget shall be 15% of all regular offerings, with the breakdown as follows: District Budget 8%, Bible School 5%, Loan Fund 1%, and Home Missions 1%. (1959)

6. District officials shall receive 6c per mile for traveling in district business. (1955)

7. To help support the District Sunday School work, churches with fifty members and over shall pay \$5.00 annually, and churches with less than fifty members shall pay \$3.00 annually into the Sunday School Board's treasury. (1952)

8. Whereas, the Conference has established a \$3.00 per member budget for the support of Southern Pilgrim College; and whereas, there is need for additional revenue for operation of said school; therefore, be it resolved; that this conference take action that each church put the Bible School in their budget; and be it further resolved that the churches allow the school representatives to conduct one service in the interest of the school, and that they be allowed to raise a cash offering. (1952)

9. The Assistant District Superintendent shall receive \$10.00 for each business meeting held in churches. (1952)

10. Every church in the District is requested to pay the pastor's utilities. (1953)

11. The first night session of conference shall be designated for the ordination service of ministers, and the certificate of ordination shall be formally presented at said service. (1954)

12. Churches changing pastors have the privilege of contacting any minister in the district. (1954)

13. Ministers' children under 18, and unemployed, shall be entertained free at the district conference. (1954) Also, licensed song evangelists and Bible school teachers. (1956)

14. A temporary district parsonage fund shall be established by a special assessment of 1% of all regular church and Sunday School offerings. (1955)

15. District Minutes shall be given at the rate of one per church-member family; said number must be in secretary's hand not later than two weeks after Camp if minutes are to be received. (1955)

16. All conference licensed ministers shall meet the Educational and Examining Boards the day previous to conference; meeting starts at 10:00 a.m. (1955)

17. The District Treasurer shall mail a monthly financial report to each pastor and church treasurer which is to be posted in the church. (1956)

18. If tabernacle is used during winter, and furniture disarranged, the benches must be numbered and replaced in proper places before conference. (1956)

19. Each church desiring to nominate a lay-delegate for General conference, should do so at their annual meeting preceeding the last District conference before the General conference. (1956)

20. The salary of the District Treasurer shall be \$500.00 a year, and the secretary shall receive \$250.00 a year.

21. Whereas, our camp meeting now starts the last Friday of July, the pastors who change pastorates, shall preach their farewell sermon the first Sunday after camp meeting, and move that week. (1958, Council action)

22. Whereas, we are running a deficit in our General Conference Delegate fund, therefore be it resolved that the fund be set at 20¢ a member. (1958)

23. The conference bar shall include the first fifteen rows of seats in the tabernacle, excepting the section at the right which shall be reserved for visitors.

Also, the time of sittings shall be 10:00 a.m. the opening day, until 11:45 a.m., 2:00 p.m. to 4:45 p.m., and 7:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. The second day shall be the same except that the conference shall open at 9:00 a.m. (1958)

24. In case of death among our ministers' families, the District Superintendent shall notify all Sunday school Zone chairmen, who in turn shall notify all pastors in their zone. (1959)

25. Due to the heavy load of the district superintendent, the assistant superintendent shall be chairman of the Home Missionary Committee. (1959)

26. Each church or employee agency shall pay \$2.35 per month to cover part of the members insurance; the participating member shall pay the cost of all dependents coverage. (1959)

27. Since there is much expense to churches for moving pastors, and since it is done now by the pound; and since it would be a big saving to all concerned, therefore, be it resolved, that each church furnish their parsonage with stove and refrigerator. (1960)

28. Be it resolved that we have Five Zones for both Sunday school and Youth, and that the names of the churches in each Zone be printed in the minutes. (1960)

STANDING RULES—DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

1. Our District Superintendent shall have a two weeks vacation with pay. (1941)

2. The District Superintendent is the Chairman of the Camp Meeting Board. (1943)

3. The District Superintendent's salary shall be set at One Hundred Dollars per week. (1958)

4. The District Superintendent, in his annual report, shall list the office-salary received plus his traveling expenses. (1958)

5. The District Superintendent shall be permitted to conduct two revivals a year other than the Home Missionary work in his district. (1958)

STANDING RULES—CAMP MEETING

1. The Conference shall annually elect the Secretary-Treasurer of the Camp. (1941)

2. There shall be 8 members on the Camp Meeting Board; they shall be elected for a term of 4 years. (1941)

3. The Camp Secretary-Treasurer shall read his report at each conference.

STANDING RULES—SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

1. The District Council shall elect the Sunday School Board of five.

2. They shall be amendable to the District Council.

STANDING RULES—HOME MISSIONS

1. The Home Missionary Board shall give a copy of the Manual and a one year's subscription to the Advocate to each Charter-member family of new churches.

2. The source of the Boards finances shall be: 1. District Home Missionary fund. 2. Public offerings in the service held on the field. 3. Personal donations. 4. An appeal to the established church once a year. 5. The Board shall have access to the Missionary Funds of the district. 6. The expenses of the Board may be collected from the Home Missionary fund. (1955)

STANDING RULES—YOUTH PEOPLE

1. A \$1.00 registration fee will be charged those receiving entertainment at the youth convention. (1952)

2. The district shall be divided into five zones for youth work. (1953)

3. A district Youth Camp shall be an annual meeting. (1953)

4. Offerings received for the Youth Home Missionary Project shall be sent directly to the District Youth Treasurer. (1954)

5. The Executive Youth Secretary shall receive \$100.00 a year. (1957)

6. Banners at the Youth Rallies shall be given (1) For the society with the largest percentage of enrollment present. (2) For the society having the largest number present. No society may receive both banners, but should a church qualify for both banners, they may choose the banner they prefer. (1959)

7. The District Youth project shall be supported by each church sending a liberal monthly offering to the District Youth Treasurer.

The District Youth Operational Fund shall consist of the offerings from the Youth Rallies, and a special offering from each church for the support of the Youth Conference. This special offering shall consist of at least \$10.00 from church of 50 or more members, and at least \$5.00 from churches of less than 50 members. (1959)

8. The attendance cup shall be awarded at the Youth Convention to the church having the largest number of points; points shall be counted for the total attendance for Friday night service and Saturday afternoon service, multiplied by the miles traveled to the convention, plus points to each person registering, equal to miles traveled from registering church to convention. (1960)

9. Each Zone shall have a minimum of four rallies annually. The place and time of said rallies shall be the responsibility of the Zone Chairman, who shall give 30 days notification of where and when the rally is to be held. (1959)

BUSINESS SESSION OF ANNUAL YOUTH CONVENTION

10:00 A.M.—JUNE 24, 1960

The business meeting opened with the congregation singing our Pilgrim Youth Chorus with the familiar words, "Pilgrim Youth Keep Marching On". Prayer was offered by Rev. Leo Record.

Rev. J. B. Stutts called the meeting to order and Rev. W. F. Page presented Dr. W. L. Surbrook who presided. The Bar was set to consist of the first fifteen rows of the center and right sections of seats.

Reports by our President, Rev. J. B. Stutts; our Treasurer, Rev. Smith and Zone Chairmen were given and graciously received.

Reports were given by several Youth Presidents from the following churches: Albemarle, Archdale, Brown's Chapel, Burlington, Durham, Erlanger, Franklinville, Gold Hill, Mebane, Mt. Zion (Davidson County), Ramseur, Robbins, and St. Paul. These reports were encouraging and highly received.

Rev. Stutts gave words of appreciation to the Teen-Age Quiz Team, Wayne and Gary Chandler, and Larry Shelton, from Albemarle, who won the National Quiz Contest at the National Youth Convention. Appreciation was also expressed to the Adult Quiz Team from Randleman who represented North Carolina.

The Resolutions Committee presented four resolutions that carried. The resolutions were as follows:

1. Since Dr. Elliott has resigned as Secretary of Sunday School and Youth, therefore, be it resolved, that a letter of appreciation be sent to him for his leadership and service to Pilgrim Youth.
2. Be it resolved that this Youth Convention send words of greeting to Rev. John Abbott and an invitation to our next Convention.
3. Be it resolved that the 1961 North Carolina Convention be held June 23-24.
4. Be it resolved that Standing Rule 8 be changed to read as follows:

The Attendance Cup shall be awarded at the Youth Convention to the church having the largest number of points; points shall be counted for the total attendance for Friday night service and Saturday afternoon service, multiplied by the miles traveled to the convention, plus points to each person registering, equal to miles traveled from registrants church to the convention.

The Ways and Means Committee presented two resolutions that were carried:

1. Since our project for this year was a pledge for Southern Pilgrim College new Administration Building, which was \$750 and since we have only paid \$200, therefore, be it resolved, that we borrow the remaining \$550 from the District Loan Fund and that this action be approved by the District Conference.
2. Be it resolved that our Operational Funds be derived from same source as last year, by all churches complying with Standing Rule 7, that we might effectively carry on our District Youth work and project.
