JOURNAL OF CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS**FIRST SITTING**

With joyful and grateful hearts to Almighty God, the Pilgrims from over the great and beautiful state of North Carolina, gathered in the spacious tabernacle on Southern Pilgrim College campus, August 2, 1961, for the Fifty-first Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

The District Superintendent, Rev. W. F. Page, called the conference to order at 10:00 a.m.

Rev. Jim Sheets led in the singing of "What A Friend We Have In Jesus." Rev. R. S. Shelton, Assistant District Superintendent, lifted our hearts to God in prayer.

The General Superintendent, Dr. Wm. H. Neff, presiding officer for the conference, was introduced. After bringing greetings, he read various rulings of the church manual relative to the District Conference. He also mentioned various attitudes and work of the delegates in a conference. He concluded by saying that if we could have (1) hard work and clear thinking, (2) the disposition of Christ, and (3) the overshadowing of the Holy Spirit on our conference, it would run smoothly and successfully.

Due to the incompleteness of the delegates enrollment, the calling of the roll was postponed until the afternoon sitting.

All delegates were asked to be seated within the conference bar which includes the first 15 rows of pews.

The District Superintendent, Rev. W. F. Page, read his report and was thankfully accepted.

The Assistant District Superintendent, Rev. R. S. Shelton, read his report and was accepted.

The Auditing Committee read their report and was accepted.

The Treasurer, Rev. L. L. Lange, read the fine report of the conference finances for the year. With thanks to God, the fine folk of the district, and our able treasurer, the report was accepted.

By expiration of time, the conference stood adjourned.

SECOND SITTING (2:00 p.m.)

The second sitting of the conference opened with the singing of an old hymn and was followed with prayer by Rev. Wm. R. Phillips.

Dr. Neff brought some inspiring remarks upon the tremendous phrase "But God . . ." He emphasized the thought that irrespective of conditions what may beset us, our God is the answer and solution.

The Secretary called the roll of ministers and lay delegates.

The matter of hearing of reports was again taken up.

The Statistician, Rev. W. R. Phillips, read the statistical report and was accepted. A serious discussion followed concerning the littleness of our progress as a church. A motion prevailed that we ask the Resolution Committee to present a resolution pertaining to our working towards a revival. Said motion was carried as amended. A good season of prayer followed that as a conference we might have an increase of vision, a deepening of our devotion, and an advance in God's great work.

The Director of Missionary Societies, Mrs. W. F. Page, gave the report of the work of the various missionary societies of the district and was accepted.

The report of the Secretary of Sunday Schools, Rev. Edward T. Houston, was read and accepted.

The District Youth President, Rev. J. B. Stutts, read his report of the state youth work and was accepted.

The Chairman of the Home Missionary Committee read his report and was accepted.

Rev. Shelton presented to the conference the Dan River Baptist Church which was received into the conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Rev. R. L. Prendergrast is the pastor and Brother Christman the delegate. Said church shall be known as the Dan River Pilgrim Holiness Church.

The Camp Meeting Secretary-Treasurer, Rev. U. N. Freeman, read the report of the camp of 1960 and was accepted.

The sitting stood adjourned by expiration of time.

THIRD SITTING

The third sitting of conference opened with the singing of "A Charge To Keep I Have." Prayer was lead by Rev. R. L. Prendergrast.

Three ordained ministers were received into our fellowship. They were Rev. R. E. Strickland, Florida; Rev. Robert Rogers, California; and Rev. Lloyd Edge, Virginia.

The Committee on Memoirs presented a beautiful memorial in honor of our fellow Pilgrims who passed on to their reward this last year.

The Examining Board presented their recommendations relative to the conference licensed ministers standings and were accepted.

The Resolutions Committee presented seven resolutions; five of which were carried and two of which were rejected.

The proposed Memorials to General Conference were read.

A motion carried that the election of officers be the first matter of business at the next sitting.

The meeting adjourned by expiration of time.

FOURTH SITTING

The fourth sitting of conference opened with the singing of "Down At The Cross." Prayer was offered by Dr. W. L. Surbrook.

The secretary read the minutes of the first three sittings and were approved.

Mrs. Wm. H. Neff was presented by the Reception Committee and was granted an honorary seat within the conference bar.

Meeting adjourned by expiration of time.

FIFTH SITTING (2:00 p.m.)

The fifth sitting of the conference was opened with a song. Rev. W. L. Cockman offered the prayer.

The election of district officers was again taken up.

Lay Delegates to Conference were: Bob Loman, John Lain, L. B. Gallimore, Mary Smith, Mrs. W. H. Scott, Wendell Blake, Mrs. Max Gallimore, and Mrs. Lessie Winslow.

Alternate Lay Delegates were: Allen Wooten, Walter Allen, Paul Harris, Clarence Lamar, and Odell Burrow.

Final member to Camp Meeting Board elected was Rev. R. J. Hobbs.

The Committee on Memorials to General Conference read proposed memorials. The first four were carried as written and the fifth carried as amended.

By common consent the District Treasurer was asked to send a notice to all pastors and treasurers about the condition of our General Conference Delegate Fund.

The matter of the ministers group insurance was again brought to the floor by the Resolution Committee and was passed as presented.

The conference minutes are to again be sent out on the same basis as before; that is, one minutes to each member family.

Dr. Neff spoke on the dangers of Roman Catholicism that are prevailing today. He noted how that they had once again defeated Federal Aid to Education because they could not get their hands in the pot to support parochial school.

He exhorted concerning the "Need of Revivals" in our churches and how they might be brought about.

He further stated that every church, large or small, should participate in the **total life of the church, and the overall program of the denomination**, both general and district. He urged that we reach out and try to begin new churches. He said that people will give to open new church doors much quicker than to old places that have never grown any at all.

Finally, he challenged us to go out and reach the people for Christ.

A motion carried that by a rising vote of thanks, we express our sincere appreciation to Dr. Neff for his kind, fair, and Christian manner in which he presided during the conference.

A motion carried that Dr. W. L. Surbrook write up a resolution in regards to our conference stand concerning aid to parochial schools and that said resolution be placed in our minutes.

The District Superintendent read the Pastoral Appointments for this year.

A motion carried that we send letters of greetings to Rev. and Mrs. J. W. Covington and Rev. and Mrs. M. H. Russell, ministers with years of faithful service who are now shut away by affliction.

With the singing of "When The Roll Is Called Up Yonder," the conference was brought to a close. Dr. Wm. H. Neff offered the closing prayer.

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

To our esteemed General Superintendent Dr. William H. Neff, fellow ministers, delegates, and friends of the Fifty-first Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church: Greetings.

As I write this report I am keenly aware of the fact that we are living in a very critical period of world history. War clouds are hanging low and we are in great danger of having our blessed way of life swept away in one sudden and colossal attack by our enemies.

We Pilgrims have a precious heritage. Our church fathers left us a great foundation on which to build. Shall we be true to the trust they left us or shall we settle on our lees, trail our oars, drift with the tide, take the way of least resistance and fail? Surely the words in Isaiah 52:1 apply to us today: "Awake, awake, put on thy strength, O Zion." Let us be diligent in our labors and work while it is yet day. Truly all of us can say with the poet:

"A charge to keep I have, a God to glorify,
A never dying soul to save and fit it for the sky.
To serve this present age my calling to fulfill.
Oh, my it all my powers engage to do my Master's will."

For the progress which has been made in the district this year, we humbly thank our Heavenly Father and you dear saints who have worked so hard and co-operated so graciously to make these forward steps possible. I believe the statistician's report will show that we have made some gains in each department of the district work this year. Let us strive for greater gains next year.

Temporal Progress

I shall only report new buildings and major improvements in this column. Archdale and Brown's Chapel have erected lovely and adequate parsonages. Draper has developed a much needed parking lot. Durham has added a nice addition to their church. Elkin has purchased land and developed a parking lot.

Franklinville has made considerable improvements on their parsonage and church, including a vestibule on the church. Kernersville has purchased a nice house adjoining their church property which they are using for their parsonage. Lenoir has built a beautiful and much needed church for an almost unbelievable figure. Mt. Zion (Moore County) has built a lovely Sunday school department. Randleman has erected a spacious educational building. Siler City has built a nice fellowship hall.

New Work

We were not able to organize any new churches this year. Since the beginning of the new conference year the Dan River Baptist Church near Leaksville has voted to join our connection. Rev. Richard Prendergrast, one of our fine men, has been pastoring this group and is due much credit for bringing about this union.

Sunday School Work

Our promotional secretary and his fine staff have done a great job in their department. The workshop at High Point was the highlight of the year. The attendance and interest were very gratifying.

Youth Work

Brother Stutts and his fine corps of workers have done a superb job in the youth department again this year. The youth camps went beyond any we have ever had in many ways. Over three hundred boys and girls attended the two camps. I believe this work with our youth in these annual camps is one of the greatest steps we have ever taken in our district. I feel we are already beginning to reap dividends and the end is not yet. Brother Stutts will give a complete report.

Recommendations

1. I should like to recommend that ministers pastoring the stronger churches in the district give at least one revival to the smaller and weaker churches when requested to do so.
2. I should like to recommend that all pastors and ministers in the district strive to co-operate with the district program.
3. I should like to recommend that we continue the same budget system for Southern Pilgrim College which we have had the past year.

RESOLUTIONS

1. Recognizing the great and urgent need of a revival of old-time, heart-felt salvation, therefore, be it resolved that each pastor get this need on his heart, talk it, and preach it to the church. Be it further resolved that the churches be urged to conduct a prayer meeting for the express purpose of praying for a revival.

2. Whereas the missionaries of the Pilgrim Holiness Church are serving the church in the vital call of "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel," and whereas these God-called ones go and serve with small salaries, making it difficult to secure adequate finances to educate their children; therefore, be it resolved that the Board of Education of Southern Pilgrim College be requested to extend as many missionary children as the board deems wise, a 100% tuition scholarship for the purpose of aiding these deserving children.

3. Whereas the Pilgrim Youth Camp has prospered with great success numerically with 350 total attendance this year, and had tremendous spiritual success, and whereas there are few youth camps available large enough for our increased attendance, and whereas it has proven to be one of our greatest arms of reaching our youth, therefore, be it resolved that the North Carolina District Youth Board be empowered to secure a permanent Pilgrim Youth Camp site with the ratification and approval of this District Council.

4. Whereas our school has become a zone school, and whereas a number of our camp meetings of this zone come at the same date; and whereas, an inter-mingling of our people from one of these district camps to the other would be a means of good public relations for our school, as well as for the districts of this zone, therefore be

it resolved that a suitable date be worked out for our camp that would be in least conflict with the other camps of our zone.

5. Whereas our conference year ends June 30, therefore, be it resolved that July 10 be the deadline for: (a) money to be counted on the treasurers annual report; (b) reports accepted by the statistician; and (c) names to be accepted by the Committee on Memoirs. Such coming after July 10 shall not be counted.

6. Resolved that we recommend the local church deduct the premium for the ministers' group insurance from the pastor's salary and send it in monthly with other monthly payments to the District Treasurer. Be it further resolved, that where the church is able that they pay their minister's insurance. We further recommend that all ministers join this group insurance.

STANDING RULES

CONFERENCE

1. Churches are asked to give their pastor a two-week vacation with pay. (1941)
2. Churches should see that their delegates to conference conform to standards of the manual. (1945)

3. Local church officers assume their duties the first of July. (1946)

4. Local ministers licenses to be renewed are to be sent to the District Superintendent at conference with a recommendation of the local church. (1947)

5. Our District Budget shall be 15% of all regular offerings, with the breakdown as follows: District Budget 8%, Bible School 5%, Loan Fund 1%, and Home Missions 1%. (1949)

6. District officials shall receive 6¢ per mile for traveling in district business. (1955)

7. To help support the District Sunday School work, churches with 50 members and over shall pay \$5.00 annually, and churches with less than 50 members shall pay \$3.00 annually into the Sunday School Board's treasury. (1952)

8. Whereas, the conference has established a \$3.00 per member budget for the support of Southern Pilgrim College; and whereas, there is need for additional revenue for operation of said school; therefore, be it resolved: that this conference take action that each church put the Bible School in their budget; and be it further resolved that the churches allow the school representatives to conduct one service in the interest of the school, and that they be allowed to raise a cash offering. (1952)

9. The Assistant District Superintendent shall receive \$10.00 for each business meeting held in churches. (1952)

10. Every church in the district is requested to pay the pastor's utilities. (1953)

11. The first night session of conference shall be designated for the ordination service of ministers, and the certificate of ordination shall be formally presented at said service. (1954)

12. Churches changing pastors have the privilege of contacting any minister in the district. (1954)

13. Ministers' children under 18, and unemployed, shall be entertained free at the District Conference. (1954)

Also, licensed song evangelists and Bible School teachers. (1956)

14. A temporary District Parsonage Fund shall be established by a special assessment of 1% of all regular church and Sunday school offerings. (1955)

15. District Minutes shall be given at the rate of one per church member family; said number must be in Secretary's hand not later than two weeks after camp if minutes are to be received. (1955)

16. All conference licensed ministers shall meet the Educational and Examining Boards the day previous to conference; meeting starts at 10:00 a.m. (1955)

17. The District Treasurer shall mail a monthly financial report to each pastor and church treasurer which is to be posted in the church. (1956)

18. If tabernacle is used during winter, and furniture disarranged, the benches must be numbered and replaced in proper places before conference. (1956)

19. Each church desiring to nominate a lay delegate for General Conference, should do so at their annual meeting preceding the last District Conference before the General Conference. (1956)

20. The salary of the District Treasurer shall be \$500.00 a year, and the secretary shall receive \$250.00 a year.

21. Whereas, our camp meeting now starts the last Friday of July, the pastors who change pastorates, shall preach their farewell sermon the first Sunday after camp meeting, and move that week. (1958, council action.)

22. Whereas, we are running a deficit in our General Conference Delegate Fund, therefore, be it resolved that the fund be set at 20¢ a member. (1958)

23. The conference bar shall include the first 15 rows of seats in the tabernacle, excepting the section at the right which shall be reserved for visitors.

Also, the time of sittings on opening day shall be: 10:00 a.m. until 11:45 a.m., 2:00 p.m. until 4:45 p.m., and 7:00 p.m. until 9:30 p.m. The second day shall be the same except that the conference shall open at 9:00 a.m. (1958)

24. In case of death among our ministers' families, the District Superintendent shall notify all Sunday school zone chairmen, who in turn shall notify all pastors in their zone. (1959)

25. Due to the heavy load of the District Superintendent, the Assistant Superintendent shall be chairman of the Home Missionary Committee. (1959)

26. Each church or employee agency shall pay \$2.35 per month to cover part of the members' insurance; the participating member shall pay the cost of all dependents' coverage. (1959)

27. Since there is much expense to churches for moving pastors, and since it is done now by the pound; and since it would be a big savings to all concerned; therefore, be it resolved, that we request each church to furnish their parsonage with stove and refrigerator. (1960)

28. Be it resolved that we have five zones for both Sunday school and youth, and that the names of the churches in each zone be printed in the minutes. (1960)

29. Whereas our conference ends June 30, be it resolved that July 10 be the deadline for: (1) money to be counted on the Treasurer's annual report; (2) reports accepted by the Statistician; and (3) names be accepted by the Committee on Memoirs. **Such coming after July 10 shall not be entered.** (1961)

30. Resolved that we recommend the local church deduct the premium for the ministers' group insurance from pastor's salary, and send it in monthly with other payments to the District Treasurer. Be it further resolved, that where possible the local church pay for their minister's insurance. We recommend that all ministers join. (1961)

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

1. Our District Superintendent shall have a two-week vacation with pay. (1941)
2. The District Superintendent is the Chairman of the Camp Meeting Board. (1943)
3. The District Superintendent's salary shall be set at \$100.00 per week. (1958)
4. The District Superintendent, in his annual report, shall list the office salary received plus his traveling expenses. (1958)
5. The District Superintendent shall be permitted to conduct two revivals a year other than the home missionary work in his district. (1958)

CAMP MEETING

1. The conference shall annually elect the Secretary-Treasurer of the camp. (1941)
2. There shall be eight members on the Camp Meeting Board; they shall be elected for a term of four years. (1941)
3. The camp Secretary-Treasurer shall read his report at each conference. (19)

SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

1. The District Council shall elect the Sunday School Board of five members.
2. They shall be amendable to the District Council.

HOME MISSIONS

1. The Home Missionary Board shall give a copy of the Manual and a one year's subscription to the Advocate to each charter member family of new churches.

2. The source of the board's finances shall be: (a) District Home Missionary Fund; (b) public offerings in the service held on the field; (c) personal donations; (d) an appeal to the established church once a year; (e) the board shall have access to the missionary funds of the district; and (f) the expenses of the board may be collected from the home missionary fund. (1955)

YOUNG PEOPLE

1. A \$1.00 registration fee will be charged those receiving entertainment at the youth convention. (1952)

The registration fee for all children under eight years of age, who are accompanied by their parents, will be \$1.00, and those under three years of age will be admitted free. (1961)

2. The district shall be divided into five zones for youth work. (1953)

3. A district Youth Camp shall be an annual meeting. (1953)

4. Offerings received for the Youth Home Missionary Project shall be sent directly to the District Youth Treasurer. (1954)

5. The Executive Youth Secretary shall receive \$100.00 a year. (1957)

6. Banners at the Youth Rallies shall be given: (a) for the society with the largest percentage of enrollment present; and (b) for the society having the largest number present. No society may receive both banners, but should a church qualify for both banners, they may choose the banner they prefer. (1959)

7. The District Youth Project shall be supported by each church sending a liberal monthly offering to the District Treasurer. The District Youth Operational Fund shall consist of the offerings from the Youth Rallies, and a special offering from each church for the support of the Youth Conference. This special offering shall consist of at least \$10.00 from churches of 50 or more members, and at least \$5.00 from churches of less than 50 members. An offering is to be taken the first Sunday of each quarter for administrative expense. (1961)

8. The attendance cup shall be awarded at the Youth Convention to the church having the largest number of points; points shall be counted for the total attendance for Friday night service and Saturday afternoon service, multiplied by the miles traveled to the convention, plus points to each person registering, equal to miles traveled from registering church to convention. (1960)

There shall be a second attendance cup awarded to the church with the highest attendance percentage figured on their Sunday school average attendance. The count shall be taken on Friday evening and Saturday afternoon. (1961)

9. Each Zone shall have a minimum of four rallies annually. The place and time of said rallies shall be the responsibility of the Zone Chairman, who shall give 30 days notification of where and when the rally is to be held. (1959)

MEMORIALS TO GENERAL CONFERENCE

1. Whereas the District Council is charged with the jurisdiction and administration of the total district program within the bounds of the Manual and the actions of the District Conference, and

Whereas it is increasingly evident that the youth and Sunday school work in the

denomination demand the best planning, guidance, and promotion possible, and

Since the district leaders in both of these responsible and important areas are nominated or appointed by the District Council,

Therefore, be it resolved that the District Youth President and District Sunday School Promotional Secretary, upon nomination by the District Conference and election by the District Conference, shall by virtue of office be members of the District Council.

2. Whereas, our entire church seems to have been operating under a pressing financial shortage during the past quadrennium, and whereas, but few of our local churches and districts have been able to pay their budgets, and, whereas, our major departments of the general church have been forced to operate in the red for many months, thus hindering and retarding the work of soul-saving which is the major work of the church; and, whereas, all of our living and operating costs are constantly going higher, and there is nothing in sight to indicate that they will ever be less, or that we shall be able to raise any more money than we are now giving, and, whereas, the above facts indicate that we must take steps to lessen our overhead in order to save ourselves from future embarrassment, therefore be it resolved that we shall return to the former practice of electing only one General Superintendent with two assistants as set up in the 1954 Manual. The assistants shall be remunerated only for services rendered to the general church plus their traveling costs. The amount they shall be paid for their services shall be set by the General Board.

3. Whereas there seems to be a growing dissatisfaction with the present method of raising the United Stewardship Fund, and, whereas church membership is no true indication of the financial strength of a church, and, whereas the wage scale varies throughout the nation, and, whereas there is some reason to believe assessment on basis of church membership may have a tendency to hinder membership increase, therefore be it resolved that a committee of not less than five be appointed from the General Board to make a study of the feasibility of raising the United Stewardship Fund by assessment of a percentage of each dollar of revenue received in each church through the regular offerings. This committee after completion of its study shall recommend the exemption of such offerings from the assessment as it deems wise (such as the November Self-Denial Offering and the Easter Church Extension Offering, Local Building Fund, etc.).

This committee shall recommend the approximate percentage of revenue required to raise the United Stewardship Fund in full. They shall report to the General Board the results of their study, their recommendations if this change of method in raising the United Stewardship Fund is adopted, and their suggestions as to how this change can best be put into effect and operated.

The General Board upon receiving the report of the committee shall either approve or reject the proposed change. If approved, they shall work out in detail the new method of raising the United Stewardship Fund, and shall be empowered by this General Conference to adopt and effect same throughout the church at the earliest date possible.

4. Whereas tensions around the world are increasing which make for great strain on our missionaries, and whereas our present term of requirement for a missionary on the more distant fields is seven years, which is much longer than most denominations require, and whereas many of our missionaries have physical breakdown because of extended time element and being over-taxed because of personal shortages and thereby in many cases hindering their return to the mission field, therefore, be it resolved, that the term for a foreign missionary be cut from seven to five years, and said action to be retroactive to cover missionaries already under contract by the Foreign Missionary Department of the church.

5. Whereas only two-thirds of a vote separated the Pilgrim Holiness Church and the Wesleyan Methodist Church from merger, and whereas there is much activity in the Wesleyan Methodist Church on the matter of merger, and whereas our General Conference meets one year before the Wesleyan Methodist Conference; therefore, be it resolved that the Pilgrim Holiness proposal of uniting be continued through 1963, or to such a time as they are able to confirm their action by their conference and churches.

ANNUAL YOUTH CONVENTION

MINUTES

The Annual Youth Convention was conducted June 23-24, 1961, in the tabernacle on the campus of Southern Pilgrim College.

The convention opened with Rev. Jim Sheets leading the congregation in singing several choruses. The Youth President, Rev. J. B. Stutts, expressed greetings to all, Rev. H. J. Olsen offered the opening prayer.

The High Point Pilgrim Youth Choir sang "Sunlight, Sunlight," directed by Rev. Jim Sheets.

Rev. Stutts introduced the convention speaker Dr. J. D. Abbott, General Secretary of Sunday School and Youth. Dr. Abbott spoke from I Timothy 4:1-8, and he gave some interesting facts concerning the youth of our times.

The Friday afternoon service closed with prayer by Rev. Stutts.

The Friday night service began with congregational singing led by Rev. Forbis Kivett. Rev. W. L. Cockman led in prayer.

Special songs were rendered by the Ramseur Choir, the Kildee Trio, and Rev. Forbis Kivett.

Rev. W. F. Page, District Superintendent, spoke briefly to the convention.

Dr. Abbott spoke from Mark 12:28 on the kingdom of God and the realm of His saving grace.

The service closed with prayer.

The Saturday afternoon service opened with group singing. Rev. R. J. Nifong led in prayer.

Special songs were sung by the Archdale Choir and Mr. and Mrs. Windall Blake and family.

Rev. Stutts presented the Attendance Cup to the Albemarle Pilgrim Church. The Ramseur Pilgrim Church was in second place for the cup.

Dr. Abbott brought the last message of the convention from Matthew 26:22. His subject was "Talents": (1) the talent of time, (2) the talent of heart, and (3) the talent of Jesus Christ.

The convention closed with prayer.

BUSINESS SESSION

The business session began by the congregation singing our Pilgrim Youth Chorus. Rev. J. B. Stutts called the meeting to order. Rev. W. F. Page offered the opening prayer.

Rev. J. B. Stutts presented Dr. J. A. Abbott who presided. Dr. Abbott spoke briefly on the subject of "Our Denominational Youth." He said: "Our church will be no stronger than its youth. Our young people and youth societies have an obligation to our church to defend it, to expend ourselves for it, to comment our church by being an example, and to extend the gospel to the lost."

The bar was set to consist of the first eight rows of all three sections of seats.

The order of business began with reports from our Youth President, Rev. J. B. Stutts; our Treasurer, Rev. James Smith; and all of the Zone Chairmen. These reports were accepted by a voice vote from the conference.

Verbal reports were given from several of our Youth Societies: Albemarle, Archdale, Asheboro, Brown's Chapel, Burlington, Durham, Erlanger, Gold Hill, Guilford, Greensboro Second, Kannapolis, Kernersville, Kildee, Mebane, Mt. Olivet, Mt. Zion (Davidson), Ramseur, Randleman, and Winston-Salem. These reports were highly received.

The Resolutions Committee presented six resolutions that were accepted. The resolutions were as follows:

1. Be it resolved that this resolution be added to Standing Rule Number Eight because the present system of awarding the attendance cup at the Annual Youth Conventions makes it almost impossible for many of the smaller churches to win this

award; therefore, be it resolved that a second attendance cup be awarded to the church with the highest attendance percentage figured on the average Sunday school attendance. The count shall be taken on Friday evening and Saturday afternoon.

2. Whereas, each year the Youth Conference approves a project for the ensuing year, and whereas there is increasing need for office equipment in the District Youth Office, such as an addressograph, filing cabinets, mimeographing equipment, etc., therefore, be it resolved that our project for the 1961-62 conference year be the selection and purchase of such necessary office equipment under the direction of the Youth Council. And that we finish paying the pledge made on the new Administration Building at Southern Pilgrim College.

3. Be it resolved that we request the North Carolina District Conference to send the following memorial to the 1962 General Conference: Whereas the District Council is charged with the jurisdiction and administration of the total district program within the bounds of the Manual and the actions of the District Conference, and

Whereas, it is increasingly evident that the youth and Sunday school work in the denomination demand the best planning, guidance and promotion possible, and

Since the district leaders in both of these responsible and important areas are nominated or appointed by the District Council; therefore, be it resolved that the District Youth President and the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary upon the nomination by the District Council and election by the District Conference and thus by virtue of their office shall be members of the District Council.

4. Be it resolved, that our District Youth Convention for 1962 be set for June 8-9, 1962.

5. Whereas, there has been some misunderstanding about the registration fee for children at the District Youth Convention and whereas the convention must have the registration fee in order to pay the expense of the convention, be it resolved, that all children under eight years of age who are accompanied by their parents pay \$1.00, and those under the age of three be admitted free.

6. Whereas, there is a growing need for and a growing interest and participation in our Youth Camps, therefore, be it resolved that a committee be appointed by the Youth Council to investigate the possibility of a permanent Youth Camp site and to take any reasonable and plausible actions to this end in conjunction with the Youth Council and the District Council.

The Ways and Means Committee presented one resolution which was accepted.

1. Be it resolved that our Operational Fund be derived from the same source as last year by all churches complying with Standing Rule Number Seven. Further, be it resolved that an offering be taken on the first Sunday of each quarter for administrative expense.

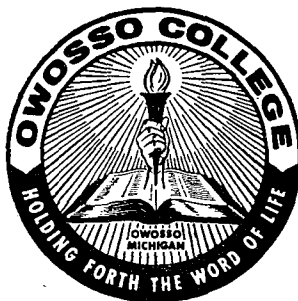
