JOURNAL OF CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

FIRST SITTING

With thankful hearts to God for His continuing mercies, the Pilgrims of the North Carolina Conference gathered under the spacious tabernacle on the campus of Southern Pilgrim College in Kernersville, North Carolina, August 1, 1962, for the Fifty Second Annual Conference.

Rev. Jim Sheets led the conference in the singing of the prayer of our hearts, "Iesus Keep Me Near The Cross."

After Superintendent Page reminded us to remember in our prayers our afflicted ministers who are unable to meet with us, we were led in prayer by our senior minister in terms of service, Rev. O. L. Ruth.

Superintendent Page introduced our new Area General Superintendent, Dr. Paul W. Thomas, who is our presiding officer for this conference.

Dr. Thomas greeted the conference and called the sitting to order.

Brother Page read the scripture lesson from the thirty fourth division of the Psalms.

The secretary called the roll of ministers and lay-delegates to the conference.

The next order of the day became the hearing of reports.

District Superintendent Page read his report and was accepted.

Assistant District Superintendent, Rev. R. S. Shelton, read his report and was accepted.

The Statistician, Rev. W. R. Phillips, read the report of the work of the conference and was accepted.

The State Director of Missionary Societies, Rev. Mrs. D. R. Saunders, read her report of the work of the various societies, and was accepted.

The Camp Meeting Secretary-Treasurer, Rev. U. N. Freeman, read the report of the 1961 camp meeting, and was accepted.

The Chairman of the Home Missionary Committee, Rev. R. S. Shelton, read the report of this department, and was accepted.

The District Youth President, Rev. J. B. Stutts, read the report of the work done by the youth of the conference, and was accepted.

The Reception Committee presented Rev. J. F. Scalf from Kentucky who is to be associated with the Theological Department of Southern Pilgrim College. A motion carried to grant him an honorary seat within the conference bar.

After several announcements, the meeting was adjourned with prayer by Rev. R. S. Shelton.

SECOND SITTING

The second sitting of the conference opened at 2:00 p.m. with the singing of "Showers Of Blessing".

Dr. Thomas gave an inspirational and challenging message to make the Holy Spirit welcome in our presence and hearts.

Prayer was led by Rev. Richard Prendergrast.

The secretary read the minutes of the first sitting of the conference, and were adjudged correct as read.

The matter of completing the roll of delegates was taken care of quickly.

The Auditors, Rev. and Mrs. F. W. Henry, gave their report of checking the Treasurers books, and was accepted.

The Treasurer, Rev. L. L. Lange, had the mimeographed report of the conference finances passed out to the delegates, and then read the report. A motion carried that with thankful hearts to God and all the fine folk who made such a report possible, we accept this report.

Dean Phillip Birchall of Southern Pilgrim College read the very encouraging report of Southern Pilgrim College as prepared by President Miller. A Motion carried to accept the report.

Dean Birchall was granted and honorary seat within the conference bar.

The Executive Secretary of Sunday Schools, Rev. E. T. Houston, read a report of the work of the Sunday schools over the conference, and was accepted.

The Examining Board gave its report of names recommended for ordination, Rev. Fred Hemrick, Rev. Don Ledbetter, Rev. Garland McDowell, Rev. John L. Sheets, and Rev. Forbis Kivett. Also they read their recommendations for conference standing of licensed ministers. Both of their recommendations were accepted by the conference.

The Resolutions Committee presented five resolutions. Number 1 carried as amended: Number 2 carried; Number 3 was referred to the committee for redrafting. Number 4 lost. Number 5 was ruled out of order.

A motion prevailed that we have a ten minute recess.

The Ways and Means Committee presented one resolution and it was accepted. The election of officers became the next matter of business, and resulted in the following election:

Assistant District Superintendent: Rev. R. S. Shelton.

Conference Secretary: Rev. J. A. Grout, Sr.

Conference Treasurer: Rev. L. L. Lange.

Also a ballot was cast to elect five advisory council members. The report of this vote will be given at the evening sitting.

The Treasurer, Rev. L. L. Lange, presented a report on a new Group Insurance for the ministers as offered by the Liberty Life Insurance Company. A motion carried that Rev. Lange have the representative of this company meet with the council, and if the council deems it advisable, the group insurance shall be changed.

A motion carried to adjourn; this was done by the singing of the doxology.

THIRD SITTING

The third sitting opened at 7:00 p.m. with the very impressive ordination service in which five men were ordained to the ministry. They were John Sheets, Donald Ledbetter, Ray Hemrick, Garland McDowell, and Forbis Kivett.

The ordination charge was given by General Superintendent P. W. Thomas. He read for a scripture lesson I. Corinthians 4:1, 2 and Revelation 2:12, 13 and took as his theme, "FAITHFUL MINISTER". Faithfulness, he said, is a principle that is to permeate all of our life. Faithfulness is one of the characteristics of our God.

He stated that we are to be faithful to-

1. The Triune God.

4. True Righteousness.

2. The Truth of God.

5. The Church Ordaining You.

3. The Tasks Appointed. 6. Death.

The Memoirs Committee presented a most fitting and beautiful memorial to our precious Pilgrims who heard the call of God during the past conference year to "Come Home."

The memorial was received by a standing vote.

The Reception Committee presented Mrs. Paul W. Thomas of Indianapolis, and Rev. and Mrs. J. D. Smith of Easley, South Carolina. These were all granted honorary seats within the conference bar.

Reporting on the ballots cast in the afternoon sitting for five Advisory Council Members, it was found that Rev. Clyde Parker, Rev. Charles Stout, Rev. E. T. Houston, were elected. In the next ballot Rev. Charles Apple was elected.

For members to serve on the Board of Directors of Southern Pilgrim College, Rev. McCray Holmes, and Brother L. B. Gallimore were elected.

A motion carried to adjourn. The dismissal prayer was pronounced by Brother Page.

FOURTH SITTING

The fourth sitting of the conference was opened at 7:00 p.m. with Rev. J. B. Stutts leading in the singing of "Amazing Grace."

Prayer was led by Rev. Ager Lee Vanderburg.

Dr. Thomas spoke on the Pilgrim Pension Plan for ministers, and passed out a few

packets of advertising material concerning the pension.

Dr. Thomas also mentioned some of the things he had personally appreciated in his time with us;—such things as the fine class of ministers ordained to the ministry; the fine improvements of Southern Pilgrim College, and also the good participation of this conference in supporting the General Work of the denomination. He beautifully illustrated how our dollars are causing the work of God to go forward around the world.

Reading from Zachariah 4:6, and Acts 4: he mentioned many of the prevailing world conditions today, but reminded us that nothing takes the Lord by surprise, as long ago He foresaw and foretold such coming events.

Also, he urged us to remember the strengthening promise "I will never leave thee nor forsake thee." He exhorted us to keep the Spirit of God in His proper place in our lives and churches—which is foremost and first.

He stated that with man's indescribable talents and forces and resources indwelt by the Holy Spirit of God, man can tackle and accomplish the seeming impossible.

Concluding his remarks he spoke of the availability of the Spirit's power to do for us what we cannot do for ourself.

The secretary read the minutes of the second and third sitting and were approved. A motion carried to set aside the regular rules and by voice acclamation vote upon. Rev. Carl Hightower to succeed himself as member of the Board of Education.

Rev. L. L. Lange to succeed himself as District Trustee.

Rev. E. T. Houston to succeed himself on the Examining Board.

Voting upon the Camp meeting Secretary and Treasurer resulted in the election of Rev. U. N. Freeman.

Elected to the Home Missionary Committee was Rev. James Denny.

Elected to the Camp Meeting Board was Rev. T. C. Vaughn.

A motion carried that the secretary send a letter of greeting to our disabled ministers from this conference.

A motion carried that the District Council continue the present system of Missionary work with its society director for this one more year.

The resolution committee presented resolution Number 3 which had been referred for redrafting, and it was accepted.

The Ways and Means committee presented three resolutions, all of which carried.

A motion carried that by a standing vote we express our deep appreciation for the kind, fair, businesslike and spiritual manner in which our Area General Superintendent, Dr. P. W. Thomas has presided over this conference.

Also by a rising vote, appreciation was expressed for the work of the Conference Secretary, J. A. Grout.

A motion carried that the minutes of this last sitting shall be checked by the District Council.

A motion carried that this conference be adjourned, and the dismissal prayer was offered by Brother P. W. Thomas.

REPORTS TO CONFERENCE

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

To our newly elected General Superintendent, Dr. P. W. Thomas, fellow ministers, delegates and friends of the Fifty-second annual conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church: Greetings.

As I give this report I am tremendously concerned about several things which vitally affect our blessed ${\rm Zion.}$

1. I am concerned about this pall of spiritual lethargy and laxity which seems to be invading the church in many places.

- 2. I am concerned about our inability to kindle revival fires which would burn out and consume away these hinderances to spiritual progress.
- 3. I am concerned over the tragic fact that we are not producing and training enough ministers to pastor our present churches, nor to dig out new ones. Our failure here perhaps lies in the fact that we are not having revivals which would save and bring young people into the Church, many of whom no doubt would be called into the ministry. Let us "Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest that he will send forth labourers into his harvest."

For the faithful labors of the dedicated pastors and laity of the North Carolina District we shall be eternally grateful. Through your works of faith, labors of love and patience of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ we have made some progress the past year.

According to our efficient statistician, Rev. W. R. Phillips, there has been a gain in offerings in all departments. The gain in Church membership and Sunday School attendance is approximately three and one half percent. A slight loss was noted in attendance of our Youth Services. We praise God for the progress made and trust the coming year will show a larger growth in all areas of our work. Brother Phillips will be giving a complete report to this conference.

Temporal Progress

I shall only report new buildings and major improvements in this column. Albemarle has purchased some adjoining land on which they are developing much needed parking space. Asheboro, Foster Street has added to their church, enlarging their facilities considerably. Bryson City has made quite a number of improvements on their church and parsonage. Denton has purchased a lovely new parsonage. Elkin has bought another lot joining their property. Kernersville has redecorated their parsonage and also installed an air conditioning system in the church. Mt. Olive has built much needed Sunday School rooms. Mt. Zion (Davidson) is in the process of building a beautiful new church. Siler City has done considerable work on their church and parsonage and also installed new church furniture. Spray is in the process of erecting an educational building. Thomasville is progressing nicely on their lovely new edifice. Troy has built a very beautiful and adequate addition to their church.

New Work

Through the hard and efficient work of Brother and Sister Richard Prendergrast and others we were able to organize this year the largest church ever organized in our district. This Church which was formerly known as the Dan River Baptist Church voted overwhelmingly to become the Dan River Pilgrim Holiness Church. This group is composed of 48 charter members, 26 probationary members, and 14 Junior members, with a property valuation of approximately fifty thousand dollars. We welcome this fine group into our connection and we shall strive to help them grow in the rich things of God.

Sunday School Work

Brother E. T. Houston has done a superb job again this year as promotional secretary. He and his fine staff have given to this district an aggressive and progressive program for which we are grateful. He will give a detailed report to this conference.

Youth Work

Brother Stutts along with his youth board have proven themselves again this year, to be young sons of thunder indeed in giving to the youth of this district, incentive and impetus in the right direction. He will give a detailed report to this conference of the splendid work done among the youth this year.

REPORT OF THE HOME MISSIONARY COMMITTEE

To the Fifty-second Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church: Greetings.

The activities of the Home Missionary Committee have been rather limited this year due to the small amount of money allocated. We wish to express our appreciation to all those ministers and churches that as of now have not reached the place of selfsupport. This past year the money on hand was used to supplement some of the weaker churches and some was given to the Taylorsville work for their new building. The Taylorsville group is ready to begin a basement church at once. This is largely due to the sacrifice of the Rev. Miss Bertha Deal. They have enough money in their building fund to complete a basement church. To God we give thanks!

Last year we reported the work at Leaksville was coming into our Conference. This has been realized. The church has been organized this year with 48 members taking the covenant; 26 joining as probationary members and 14 as junior members. It has a property evaluation of 75 thousand dollars, with only a small debt remaining. This work was brought about largely through the faithful efforts of Rev. and Mrs. R. L. Prendergrast whose labors are deeply appreciated.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

To the fifty-second annual conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim

Holiness Church: Greetings.

It is with a real feeling of gratitude for the measure of success that has been realized that we present this report. To all who have helped to make it possible we say a sincere, "Thanks."

Thirty-five of our Sunday schools reported attendance gains for the year. Six of them had a gain of 25% or better, three had a gain of 20% or better, three had a gain of 15% or better, six a gain of 10% or better, and four a gain of 5% or better. They will receive honorable recognition at the District Sunday School Convention. Because of the

gains shown by these schools we are able to report an increase of 247 for the district. The active program initiated by the Sunday school board for the year consisted of a number of Zone Sunday school rallies, one district Sunday school convention, a district workshop, a district wide Sunday school attendance campaign, along with the standard of excellence and the Decade of Progress programs.

We have been much concerned regards the lack of participation in some of these programs. Only one-half of the district Sunday schools participated in the attendance campaign even though materials were supplied them without cost. Only 17 Sunday schools mailed in a standard of excellence report. And only 14 Sunday schools are participating in the Decade of Progress program. Brethren it is my sincere opinion that participation in these programs will pay dividends in increased attendance and effectiveness in the teaching ministry of your school. We hope to see an increase in participation in these programs during the coming year.

We are happy to report that the District Convention and the District Workshop

were not only well attended but we believe they were sincerely appreciated and truly

As your Promotional Secretary I represented this district of the Pilgrim Holiness Church at the N.S.S.A. Convention held in Detroit, Michigan. I attended and conducted a workshop in the National Sunday School Convention held in Allentown, Pennsylvania and attended the Sunday school and Youth Leaders Conference while there. REPORT OF DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

Mr. Chairman, Delegates to the Annual Conference and Pilgrims of the North Carolina Conference:

Greetings in Jesus' Name!

Certainly the Lord has done great things for us, whereof we are glad! Another year has passed but not without many blessings being bestowed upon the Pilgrim Youth of the North Carolina District from our gracious Lord.

Our Youth Zone Rallies have been the best attended in many years. I think this is partly due to the vocal and instrumental contest which was launched last fall. Much talent has been discovered among our youth which we were unaware of before. The winners for the District Youth Contest were chosen June 9 at our District Youth Convention which convened here at S.P.C. They were: Instrumental Division: Janie Farlow of High Point; Winston-Salem Instrumental Group; Dean Chandler of Albemarle; Vocal Division: Clarence Hathcock of Albemarle; Rebecca Smith and Phyllis Saunders of Troy; Girls Sextet of Albemarle. It is my firm belief that we should sponsor more contests such as this, It should also be extended to include readings, essays, art, etc.

The large attendance of young people at the District Youth Convention was encouraging. Rev. Wm. S. Deal brought some soul inspiring messages for our young people. We congratulate the Albemarle and Kernersville churches for winning the attendance cups. Their young people were well represented along with many other churches.

With the money received for our district project we have purchased a nice Speed-O-Print Addressing Machine with 500 cards, 2 card files, a wheel-dex file, and filing cabinets. There are a few more items which we still plan to purchase. This project was a great success.

God gave us the best youth camps I believe I have ever witnessed. The results of the two camps held at the William B. Umstead Park in Raleigh were that every boy and girl went home knowing Jesus Christ as their personal Saviour. The results of the Senior Camp at Kernersville, under the direction of Rev. McCray Holmes, were also gratifying. Our total enrollment this year was down because of the limited facilities at the Raleigh camps. Publicity could not be stressed for fear we would exceed the limit. Our maximum quota is 119 persons per camp. We had 100 boys week and 96 girls week. At our Senior Camp there was a total of 83. This gives us a grand total of 289 in all three camps including workers.

Last year this conference empowered the Youth Board to secure a permanent Pilgrim Youth Camp Site with the ratification and approval of the District Council. (1961 Minutes, Page 22.) This year we have been working at the job. I have met with the District Council to present the sites which we have found. We have entered bids on at least two pieces of property. I believe the time has come when our district must purchase a permanent youth camp for the further expansion of God's work among our youth. I trust that this conference will make some financial appropriation to let the young people know you are interested and backing them all the way. I know that there are giants in the land which would try to defeat us. But by God's help, and with your prayers and tireless giving, we can achieve our goal. Let us not stop short of the best for our Pilgrim Youth.

In closing, I want to thank you for your support and cooperation this past year. But most of all, I want to thank God for every spiritual blessing which he has given the Pilgrim Youth of the North Carolina District. Truly, we are marching on with Him—the Conquering Christ!

REPORT OF SOUTHERN PILGRIM COLLEGE

The following will constitute a brief report of Southern Pilgrim College for the past conference year.

We have just completed our first year in our new Olsen Hall, and it is needless to say that this new building was greatly appreciated by our faculty and student body. We wish to thank our wonderful Lord for His goodness to us in making it possible for us to have this most adequate building.

I am sure that it is known to everyone that after completion of this building it was necessary for us to borrow the amount of \$60,000 from the Bank of Kernersville. We started repayment of this loan in July 1961, and we are happy to report that in one year we paid back \$13,800.00 on principal and \$3,459.00 on interest. This was made possible by our entire school zone participation. I am happy to report to the North Carolina Conference that the other districts of our zone are interested and are backing Southern Pilgrim College and its program financially and student-wise.

I am sure the Conference is aware of the improvements that have been made upon the campus. The new front on the girls dormitory certainly adds much to the appearance of our campus, also the removal of the white house that was directly in front of it.

The dean of men's apartment between the boys and girls dormitory has been completely remodeled inside and out. It is now a comfortable dwelling. One of the major improvements on the campus is the new President's Home.

This home was occupied last October, and to our knowledge is one of the nicest homes in Kernersville area and built for an unbelievable figure. In order for the school to keep up sanitation regulations it has been necessary for us to add a hot water booster to our dishwasher. This is involving a great deal of expense as we are having to rewire most of our older buildings. The outcome will be that every building on the campus will have a separate meter. The approximate cost for this changeover will be \$3,000.

Last October Southern Pilgrim College was admitted as an Associate member of the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges. We are hoping to be able in a short period of time to become a full member. To date we have met the serious criteria. There are just a few areas that we need to take care of—namely, more volumes in our library.

Our plans for the future are:

- 1. To become fully accredited by Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges.
- 2. To seek accreditation for the Junior College by State of North Carolina.
- 3. To improve instruction.
- 4. To strive for larger student body.

In closing may I say that I deeply appreciate everything that the North Carolina Conference has done for Southern Pilgrim College. Without you we cannot go forward.

RESOLUTIONS

Resolution Committee

1. Whereas the recent Supreme Court ruling concerning prayer in public schools seems to be another step in the dangerous trend of bowing to the ungodly forces in America, therefore, Be it Resolved, that this conference go on record as being opposed to the dangerous trend, and contrariwise that we go on record as favoring the strengthening of the Christian principles upon which this great nation was founded.

Also, that the District Secretary make up a news release with copies to be sent to pastors of local churches for hometown papers, and also send a copy to our State Senators and Congressmen.

- 2. Resolved that each church pay the amount of twenty five cents per copy for the District Minutes to help defray a part of the expense of their publication; minutes to be sent to local church as ordered.
- 3. Resolved that a committee of seven be appointed by the district council to make a study relative to dividing the district and bring a recommendation to the next annual conference, and be it further resolved, that the chairman of the church extension board be one of the members of said committee along with two others who are not members of the council.

Ways and Means

- 1. Whereas the need for a permanent site for a Youth Camp is increasing each year, and whereas the finance for such a project is limited, be it resolved that the remaining debt of the District Parsonage be paid out of the district funds, and the 1% now being used for this purpose, shall be used to help finance the purchase of such a site.
- 2. Since the cost of living has taken an atomic rise, and since it has been years since the district superintendent has had an improvement in salary, be it resolved that this conference set our superintendents salary at fifty five hundred dollars a year.
- 3. Since our district promotional secretary of Sunday schools works long and hard at the work of monthly reports, and whereas we pay other district officers, be it resolved that we pay him one hundred dollars per year.

STANDING RULES

CONFERENCE

- 1. Churches are asked to give their pastor a two-week vacation with pay. (1941)
- 2. Churches should see that their delegates to conference conform to standards of the manual. (1945)

- 3. Local church officers assume their duties the first of July. (1946)
- 4. Local ministers licenses to be renewed are to be sent to the District Superintendent at conference with a recommendation of the local church, (1947)
- 5. Our District Budget shall be 15% of all regular offerings, with the breakdown as follows: District Budget 8%, Bible School 5%, Loan Fund 1%, and Home Missions 1%. (1949)
 - 6. District officials shall receive 6¢ per mile for traveling in district business. (1955)
- 7. To help support the District Sunday School work, churches with 50 members and over shall pay \$5.00 annually, and churches with less than 50 members shall pay \$3.00 annually into the Sunday School Board's treasury. (1952)
- 8. Whereas, the conference has established a \$3.00 per member budget for the support of Southern Pilgrim College; and whereas, there is need for additional revenue for operation of said school; therefore, be it resolved: that this conference take action that each church put the Bible School in their budget; and be it further resolved that the churches allow the school representatives to conduct one service in the interest of the school, and that they be allowed to raise a cash offering. (1952)
- 9. The Assistant District Superintendent shall receive \$10.00 for each business meeting held in churches. (1952)
 - 10. Every church in the district is requested to pay the pastor's utilities. (1953)
- 11. The first night session of conference shall be designated for the ordination service of ministers, and the certificate of ordination shall be formally presented at said service. (1954)
- 12. Churches changing pastors have the privilege of contacting any minister in the district. (1954)
- 13. Since actively engaged ministers and wives are entertained free at conference and camp, be it resolved that their children under 18 and unemployed shall also be entertained free. (1954) Licensed song evangelists and Bible school teachers shall be entertained free at camp meeting. (1956)
- 15. All conference licensed ministers shall meet the Educational and Examining Boards the day previous to conference; meeting starts at 10:00 a.m. (1955)
- 16. The District Treasurer shall mail a monthly financial report to each pastor and church treasurer which is to be posted in the church. (1956)
- 17. Each church desiring to nominate a lay delegate for General Conference, should do so at their annual meeting preceding the last District Conference before the General Conference. (1956)
- 18. The salary of the District Treasurer shall be \$500.00 a year, and the secretary shall receive \$250.00 a year.
- 19. Whereas, our camp meeting now starts the last Friday of July, the pastors who change pastorates, shall preach their farewell sermon the first Sunday after camp meeting, and move that week. (1958, council action.)
- 20. Whereas, we are running a deficit in our General Conference Delegate Fund, therefore, be it resolved that the fund be set at 20¢ a member. (1958)
- 21. The conference bar shall include the platform and the first 15 rows of seats in the tabernacle, excepting the section at the right which shall be reserved for visitors.
- Also, the time of sittings on opening day shall be: 10:00 a.m. unil 11:45 a.m., 2:00 p.m. until 4:45 p.m., and 7:00 p.m. until 9:30 p.m. The second day shall be the same except that the conference shall open at 9:00 a.m. (1958)
- 22. In case of death among our ministers' families, the District Superintendent shall notify all Sunday school zone chairmen, who in turn shall notify all pastors in their zone. (1959)
- 23. Due to the heavy load of the District Superintendent, the Assistant Superintendent shall be chairman of the Home Missionary Committee. (1959)

- 24. Each church or employee agency shall pay \$2.35 per month to cover part of the members' insurance; the participating member shall pay the cost of all dependents' coverage. (1959)
- 25. Since there is much expense to churches for moving pastors, and since it is done now by the pound; and since it would be a big savings to all concerned; therefore, be it resolved, that we request each church to furnish their parsonage with stove and refrigerator. (1960)
- 26. Be it resolved that we have five zones for both Sunday school and youth, and that the names of the churches in each zone be printed in the minutes. (1960)
- 27. Whereas our conference ends June 30, be it resolved that July 10 be the deadline for: (1) money to be counted on the Treasurer's annual report; (2) reports accepted by the Statistician; and (3) names be accepted by the Committee on Memoirs. Such coming after July 10 shall not be entered. (1961)
- 28. Resolved that we recommend the local church deduct the premium for the ministers' group insurance from pastor's salary, and send it in monthly with other payments to the District Treasurer. Be it further resolved, that where possible the local church pay for their minister's insurance. We recommend that all ministers join. (1961)
- 29. Each church shall pay the amount of twenty-five cents per copy for the district minutes to help defray the expense of publishing; minutes are to be sent as ordered by the local church. (1962)
- 30. The 1% emergency fund used to pay for the district parsonage shall be used to help finance the purchase of a Youth Camp site. (1962)
- 31. The Secretary of district Sunday Schools shall be paid one hundred dollars per year. (1962)

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

- 1. Our District Superintendent shall have a two-week vacation with pay. (1941)
- 2. The District Superintendent is the Chairman of the Camp Meeting Board, (1943)

The District Superintendent, in his annual report, shall list the office salary received plus his traveling expenses. (1958)

- 4. The District Superintendent shall be permitted to conduct two revivals a year other than the home missionary work in his district, (1958)
 - 5. The District Superintendent's salary shall be set at \$5,500.00 a year. (1962)

CAMP MEETING

- 1. The conference shall annually elect the Secretary-Treasurer of the camp. (1941)
- 2. There shall be eight members on the Camp Meeting Board; they shall be elected for a term of four years. (1941)
 - 3. The camp Secretary-Treasurer shall read his report at each conference. (19)

SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

- 1. The District Council shall elect the Sunday School Board of five members.
- 2. They shall be amendable to the District Council.

HOME MISSIONS

- 1. The Home Missionary Board shall give a copy of the Manual and a one year's subscription to the Advocate to each charter member family of new churches.
- 2. The source of the board's finances shall be: (a) District Home Missionary Fund; (b) public offerings in the service held on the field; (c) personal donations; (d) an appeal

to the established church once a year; (e) the board shall have access to the missionary funds of the district; and (f) the expenses of the board may be collected from the home missionary fund. (1955)

ANNUAL YOUTH CONVENTION

BUSINESS SESSION

The business session was held at the opening of the Youth Convention, on June 8-9, 1962, on the campus of Southern Pilgrim College.

The congregation was lead in the Pilgrim Youth Chorus and He Lives. Rev. Charles Stout lead in prayer. Rev. J. B. Stutts introduced Rev. R. S. Shelton who presided. Rev. Shelton spoke briefly from I Tim. 4:12.

The conference bar was set to consist of the first ten rows of two sections of pews. Reports were given by our Youth President, Rev. J. B. Stutts; Treasurer, Rev. James Smith and from four of the Zone Chairmen. These reports were accepted.

Several encouraging reports were given from our Youth Societies. Reports were given from the following churches: Albemarle, Archdale, Guilford, Greensboro I, Kannapolis, Kildee, Liberty (Davie County), Mt. Zion (Davidson County), Randleman, and Troy. The reports were accepted.

The Resolutions Committee presented five resolutions that were accepted. The resolutions were as follows:

- 1. Whereas the present system of setting the date for Zone Rallies has proven to be inadequate in that dates are too indefinite and the Saturday date bars too many young people from attending because of work and conflicts with revival meetings; be it resolved that Zone Rallies be held on the fifth Sunday afternoons.
- 2. Whereas the present system of attendance points includes only two services of the youth convention, specifically Friday and Saturday afternoons, bars anyone who is working second shift from attending either service and whereas, as this year, Saturday morning will probably be well attended and no credit given; be it resolved that attendance points count toward the cup at every service (except the business session when 500 points are to be given to the churches represented) and that in order to save time the pastor or responsible person appointed by him have the count from his church ready to give as the group stands when the roll of the churches is called.
- 3. Be it resolved that the District Youth Project for this year be the supplementing of the Youth Camp program.
 - 4. Be it resolved that our 1963 Youth Convention be set for June 21-22, 1963.
- 5. Be it resolved that the business session of the Youth Convention be held regularly on Friday afternoon, the first session of the Convention.

The Ways and Means Committee presented the following resolution which was accepted:

Pilgrim Youth Financial Program:

- I. District Youth Project.
 - A. The Project is to be supported by a liberal offering from each church once a month.
- II. District operational Fund.
 - A. This covers the operational expense of the District work.
 - B. The fund is to be provided by:
 - 1. The offerings from Zone Rallies.
 - 2. One special offering per quarter from each church.
 - 3. Income from the annual Youth Conference.
 - a. Special offering from church.
 (Ten dollars from churches with 50 or more members)
 (Five dollars from churches with less than 50 members)
 - b. Registration fees.
 - c. Offering taken during conference.

- III. The National Youth Project.
 - A. This offering is to be taken once per month.
 - B. The offering of the National Youth project are alternated between the Foreign and Home Missions project as directed by the General Secretary.
- IV. The National Youth Week Offering.
 - A. To be taken during Youth Week.

YOUNG PEOPLE

1. A \$1.00 registration fee will be charged those receiving entertainment at the youth convention. (1952)

The registration fee for all children under eight years of age, who are accompanied by their parents, will be \$1.00, and those under three years of age will be admitted free. (1961)

- 2. The district shall be divided into five zones for youth work, (1953)
- 3. A district Youth Camp shall be an annual meeting. (1953)
- 4. Offerings received for the Youth Home Missionary Project shall be sent directly to the District Youth Treasurer. (1954)
 - 5. The Executive Youth Secretary shall receive \$100.00 a year. (1957)
- 6. Banners at the Youth Rallies shall be given: (a) for the society with the largest percentage of enrollment present; and (b) for the society having the largest number present. No society may receive both banners, but should a church quality for both banners, they may choose the benner they prefer. (1959)
- 7. The District Youth Project shall be supported by a liberal offering from each church once a month. The District Youth Operational Fund shall consist of the offerings from Youth Zone Rallies, one special offering per quarter from each church and income from the annual Youth Conference. The Youth Conference income shall consist of a special offering from each church (\$10 from churches of 50 or more members, and \$5 from churches of less than 50 members), registration fees and offerings taken during conference. The National Youth Project offering is to be taken once per month. The National Youth Week offering is to be taken during Youth Week. (1962)
- 8. The attendance cup shall be awarded at the Youth Convention to the church having the largest number of points; points shall be counted for the total attendance for all services, except the business session (when 500 points are to be given to each church represented) multiplied by the miles traveled to the convention, plus points to each person registering, equal to miles traveled from registering church to convention. (1960)

There shall be a second attendance cup awarded to the church with the highest attendance percentage figured on their Sunday School average atendance. The count shall be taken at all the services except the business. (1961)

The Pastor or responsible person appointed by him shall have the count from his church ready to give as the group stands when the roll of the churches is called. (1962)

- 9. Each Zone shall have a minimum of four rallies annually, to be held on the fifth Sunday afternoons. The place and time of said rallies shall be the responsibility of the Zone Chairman, who shall give 30 days notification of where and when the rally is to be held. (1962)
- 10. The business session of the annual Youth Convention shall be regularly held at the Friday afternoon service, the first session of the Convention. (1962)
