## JOURNAL OF CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

### FIRST SITTING

With words of gratitude to God for continued mercies through another year, District Superintendent Page greeted the delegates to the fifty-third annual conference of the North Carolina District at 10:00 a.m., August 1, 1963.

Rev. McCray Holmes led the congregation in the singing of "Glory to His name."

Rev. Page read the thirty-fourth Psalm for our scripture lesson.

After several spoken requests for prayer, Rev. Carroll Upton led our hearts to God in prayer.

Superintendent Page presented Area General Superintendent, Rev. Dr. P. W. Thomas who brought greetings and declared the fifty-third annual conference now in session.

The secretary called the roll of ministerial and lay-delegates to the conference.

A motion carried to receive as ordained ministers three brethren who are transferring to this conference. They were Rev. Carroll Upton, Rev. Kenneth Taylor, and Rev. Homer Smith.

A motion carried that Rev. Jesse Tucker, supply pastor at our Seagrove church be given an honorary seat within the conference bar.

The matter of annual reports next became the order of the day.

Superintendent Page read his report of the work of the past year, and also made several recommendations for the future progress of our conference. His report was accepted by a standing vote of appreciation.

Assistant Superintendent, Rev. R. S. Shelton gave his report and was accepted.

Rev. F. W. Henry read the report of the auditing committee and was accepted.

The Conference Treasurer, Rev. L. L. Lange, after having a very fine printed report passed through the congregation, read the report of the finances, and was accepted.

The Campmeeting Secretary and Treasurer, Rev. U. N. Freeman, read the report of the 1962 campmeeting and was accepted.

The Conference Statistician, Rev. Wm. R. Phillips, read his report and was accepted.

The President of the Conference Missionary Society, Rev. Mrs. D. R. Saunders, read a report of the work of the societies, and was accepted.

Superintendent Page made a couple of substitutions on the reception committee, due to the absence of two of these brethren. He asked Rev. Forbis Kivett, and Rev. Richard Prendergrast to serve with Rev. Byron Whittley.

After announcements were made, the sitting was adjourned with Rev. O. L. Ruth pronouncing the benediction.

### SECOND SITTING

The second sitting of the conference opened with the singing of "In The Sweet By and By." Prayer was offered by Rev. H. B. Barger.

The roll call was completed, and a motion carried that we dispense with any further calling of the roll.

President Gordon Miller read a report of the progress of Southern Pilgrim College during another year, and also challenged each one to renewed co-operation. A motion carried that we gratefully receive the report.

The reception committee presented Mrs. Homer Smith, wife of the new pastor at Bagley Swamp, and by a motion she was granted an honorary seat within the conference bar. Also Rev. George Farah and Rev. Robert W. Darsch, ordained ministers recently transferred into this conference, were presented.

The Examining Board presented their recommendations for Rev. H. W. Lewis to be ordained to the ministry. Also they presented recommendations for the standing of various conference ministers. A motion carried that their recommendations be accepted.

The Home Missionary chairman, Rev. R. S. Shelton, read a report of the work of Church Extension in our conference during the last year, and was accepted.

District Youth President, Rev. J. B. Stutts read the report of the work done over the district last year by youth; also he made several recommendations for future advancement. A motion carried that we accept his report.

District Sunday School Promotional Secretary, Rev. E. T. Houston, read the report of the Sunday schools during the year, and was accepted.

The Resolutions Committee presented seven resolutions. Resolutions number 1, 2, 3, were passed. Number 4 was carried as amended. Number 5 was ruled out of order by the chair. Number 6 was a recommendation to stir our hearts to new zeal in winning the lost to Christ, and was heartily approved by all. Number 7 concerning the purchase of Richies Lake property carried. (Riches Lake property consists of about 225 acres of beautiful wooded lands and 32 acres of lakes fed by about 40 springs. It is near Gold Hill, and the property adjoins Pfeiffer College.)

A motion carried that we have a ten minute recess.

A motion carried that we ask the Ways and Means Committee to bring in some resolution relative as to how we would handle the financial end of the purchase of said property. The Ways and Means Committee requested the District Council meet with them, and help in working out the financial plan.

The Ways and Means presented three resolutions. Number 1 was referred back to the committee for redrafting. Number 2 lost. Number 3 carried.

A motion carried that we adjourn. The dismissal prayer was offered by Brother Sam Eury.

### THIRD SITTING

With the singing of "A Charge To Keep I Have" and prayer, the third sitting of the conference opened with a very sacred ordination service in which the Rev. Mr. Henry Albert Lewis was ordained to the ministry.

General Superintendent Thomas brought the ordination charge. He based his message on Acts 27:20-25, especially verse 25. From this thrilling record of Paul's trip to Rome, especially the shipwreck, he lifted some very timely truths.

First he mentioned THE REALITY OF THE STORM. As real as was the storm that tried to engulf the ship on the troubled sea, so are the storms which are sweeping our world today. One crowd surrenders to the hysteria of fear. But like Paul, we shall not surrender to the psychology of defeat and fear. We do not believe that God, the Church, nor His children are going down, and like Paul, we affirm "wherefore sirs, be of good cheer, I believe God."

Secondly he spoke of PAUL'S SPIRITUAL LEADERSHIP, and what spiritual leadership is, and can do. He stated that spiritual leadership comes from a right relationship with God. How meaningful and helpful was his faith and courage in inspiring and encouraging others.

Thirdly, he stated that PAUL'S SPIRITUAL LEADERSHIP AROSE FROM THE FACT THAT HE HAD A MESSAGE FROM GOD AND HE FAITHFULLY DELIVERED IT. . . . Though not seen at the time, God caused the storm to drive the ship nearer and nearer to Paul's destination. Our God had His eye upon him all through the storm and time of darkness. And such a care He still has for His own in our day.

Following the ordination the reception committee presented to the conference Mrs. P. W. Thomas, wife of our General; and also Brother Dick Whipple who will be working this year in our conference in Lay-Visitation and Evangelization. A motion carried that both be given honorary seats within the conference bar.

The committee on Memoirs presented a beautiful and loving tribute to our departed Pilgrims of the past year. A motion carried that we accept the report. The conference stood in silent meditation and prayer.

The Ways and Means Committee presented two resolutions which carried.

An offering of cash and sixty day pledges was taken which amounted to twenty-six hundred (\$2,600.00), which with the monies on hand now earmarked for the Richies Lake project, made a total of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) on the down payment for said property.

The matter of the election of officers was the next matter of business, but before any were elected the session stood adjourned by expiration of time. The benediction was pronounced by Rev. U. N. Freeman.

#### FOURTH SITTING

The fourth sitting of the conference opened at 9:00 a.m. with a devotional of singing, scripture, and prayer.

Chairman Thomas spoke of the appreciation of the General Church for the North Carolina conference for its work, contributions, etc. Also he urged the sending in of reports regularly, and on time.

The business of election of conference officers became the order of the day, and resulted in the elections as follows:

District Superintendent—Rev. W. F. Page.

Assistant Superintendent—Rev. R. S. Shelton.

Secretary—Rev. J. A. Grout, Sr.

Treasurer—Rev. L. L. Lange.

Five Advisory Members—Rev. E. T. Houston, Rev. Charles Apple, Rev. Charles Stout, Rev. Clyde Parker, and Rev. H. B. Barger.

The sitting was adjourned by expiration of time, and was dismissed by Rev. Page.

#### FIFTH SITTING

With the singing of "Trust and Obey" the fifth sitting of the conference was opened with singing and the Rev. Kermit Farlow offering the prayer.

The business of election of officers was again taken up, and resulted in the following elections—District Missionary Societies President: Rev. Mrs. D. R. Saunders.

The Council appointed as her assisting committee, Secretary, Mrs. John Sheets, Treasurer, Mrs. L. B. Gallimore, Advisory members; Mrs. Verlin Busick, and Mrs. U. N. Freeman.

Secretary-Treasurer of Camp Meeting: Rev. James Denny.

Members of Camp Meeting Board: Rev. Charles Apple, 1967. Rev. H. B. Barger, 1967.

Member of Home Missionary Committee: Rev. L. L. Lange.

A motion carried that the District Minutes be given to the churches free, and that the number printed and distributed be the same as this year.

The Resolutions Committee presented three resolutions, number 4 which had been sent back to the committee for redrafting, and numbers 8 and 9. All of these carried.

The Reception Committee presented Rev. and Mrs. Earl Wilson and family, Evangelist to the Camp Meeting. A motion carried to give them an honorary seat within the conference bar.

A motion carried that the Secretary send greetings from the conference to all of our shut-in ministers.

A motion carried that all unfinished business be turned over to the council; also the hearing of the minutes of this last sitting of conference.

A motion carried that we express our deep appreciation for the able and godly manner in which our General Superintendent has presided at this conference. The congregation stood to express their thanks.

A motion carried that the Fifty-third conference stand adjourned. . . . The secretary pronounced benediction.

## REPORTS TO CONFERENCE

### REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

To our esteemed General Superintendent, Dr. P. W. Thomas, faithful ministers, delegates and friends of the fifty-third annual conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church: Greetings.

How blessed and comforting it is in this age of fear and uncertainty, crumbling kingdoms and empires to assemble as a body of true Christian believers, whose God is the Lord and whose faith is immovable. Knowing that the foundation of our God standeth sure and that He knoweth them that are His.

The mills of time have ground out another year. It is our duty now to evaluate our work for the past year and strive to plan a sound and progressive program for the future.

Usually when we fail to reach our goal or accomplish that which we desired, we seek to find excuses and make alibis for our failure. I am not going to do this, however I do feel that I did the very best I could with what I had to do with.

I believe our statistician's report will show that we have suffered slight losses in church membership, Sunday schools and youth. The financial department is the only place we have made a gain over last year, which shows a thirty per cent increase. I am sure those pastors where the greatest losses occurred strove to do their best for God and the upbuilding of the church. In many instances circumstances over which they had no control entered in and hindered the work. So I'm not going to seek to place blame nor reprimand, but am going to pray for God to help our churches with their problems.

### Temporal Progress

I shall only report new buildings and major improvements. Burlington has installed air conditioning and made other needed improvements. Bryson City has erected a fellowship hall. Dan River is in the process of erecting a fellowship hall. Draper is putting the finishing touches on a lovely new parsonage. Elkin has added a steeple to their church and done paving and other improvements on their property. Guilford has acquired a new organ which was largely donated by the Crouse family in memory of their Mother, Mrs. J. L. Crouse. Greensboro First has purchased property on which they plan to erect a church in the near future. Greensboro Second has bought two adjoining properties which will enhance the value and usefulness of their facilities. High Point has acquired a beautiful tract of land on which they plan to build a new church. Mt. Zion, Davidson County has completed and are now worshipping in one of the most beautiful churches in our connection. Spray has finished their fine educational unit. Thomasville has erected and occupied a very beautiful and spacious new church. Mt. Zion, Moore County has added rest rooms and other needed improvements. Taylorsville has built a basement church with Sunday School rooms.

I am deeply grateful for the many kindnesses and considerations shown me in my many visits to the churches and parsonages the past year. May God richly bless you all and reward you for being so good to His servant.

### Recommendations

1. I should like to recommend that all pastors put forth a special effort to cooperate on General and District levels.

2. I should like to urge all pastors and churches to do everything possible to encourage and help train young people who feel a call to the ministry. We are suffering a dire shortage of ministers which is handicapping us tremendously.

3. I should like to recommend that we as a district go all out in securing a property on which to develop a much needed youth camp and other district facilities as needed.

4. Since Mr. Leonard Whipple has been engaged to work in our District during this conference year, I should like to urge all of our Churches where he will be laboring to cooperate fully with his program of lay visitation and evangelism.

### REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY COMMITTEE

To the North Carolina Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church: Greetings!

During the past year the church extension program has been limited to supplementing some of our smaller churches. The basement church at Taylorsville has been completed. This was a much needed building. Miss Bertha Deal has done a remarkable job at Taylorsville. This building was supervised largely by Rev. C. H. Pendergraft who spent much time helping in this needy field. The future for Miss Deal and her congregation looks much brighter since they have secured a building.

The work of church extension demands three phases to be successful. These are:

1. Selecting the field.

This is now problem in North Carolina. We have the message and the harvest field is waiting.

2. Securing the workers.

This phase of church extension in North Carolina is perhaps the most perplexing, since we do not have enough qualified workers to care for our organized churches. The call of church extension is thus left unanswered.

3. Financing the work.

With one of the most important arms of our district program given one per cent of the budget to supplement small churches and to finance new projects, the work of church extension is placed in a position of merely existing instead of going forward.

It is with a deep sense of appreciation for the cooperative spirit and the brotherly fellowship we have shared with the Sunday school board, and the many pastors and lay members of our Sunday schools through the three years we have served as your Promotional Secretary that we present this our final report. We pray God's continued blessings upon the Sunday schools of our district and upon Brother U. N. Freeman our capable and efficient successor.

Twenty-five of our Sunday schools reported gains totaling 208 and thirty-one reported losses of 225. This means we have suffered a net loss of 17 on the district level this year.

The active program this year consisted in a number of Sunday school rallies, one district Sunday school convention, a district workshop, a district wide Sunday school attendance campaign, the Standard of excellence and the Decade of progress programs. The lack of participation in these programs has been a disappointment but where there has been actual participation the rewards have been gratifying.

As your Promotional Secretary I represented the district in the Sunday school and Youth Leaders meeting at Indianapolis, Indiana. I have spoken in two different churches in special Sunday school services. I have prepared the monthly reports and handled all correspondence relative to this office.

#### REPORT OF NORTH CAROLINA DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

Dr. Thomas, Rev. Page, Fellow Ministers, Delegates to the Annual Conference and Friends, Greetings in Jesus' Name!

It doesn't seem possible that another year has past, but it is true. Nevertheless, it has been another victorious year for the Pilgrim Youth of the North Carolina District. God's blessings have been evident in many of our activities.

One of the highlights of the year was a District Watchnight Service for our young people which was held on December 31 at the Thomasville Armory. This was a new venture on the part of the District Youth Council but they were well rewarded when approximately 500 people came to the gathering. The program consisted of games, a meal, singspiration, a religious film, an address by Attorney Beauford T. Henderson of Winston-Salem, and a candlelight service as the old year became history and we pledged our love to Christ in "63". Everyone present thought it was a profitable service. Plans are being made for another one this year.

**District Youth Convention.** Our District Youth Convention convened here at S. P. C. on June 21 and 22 with Dr. P. F. Elliott of Owosso, Michigan as our guest speaker and also serving as the presiding officer. His messages were both challenging and heart-warming. There was a note of disappointment in the convention in the fact that from the 63 churches in the North Carolina Conference only 21 of them were represented. Was your church represented?

**Zone Rallies.** Some of our Zone Rallies were better attended this past year than in previous years, while others reported less in attendance. Overall the attendance was less. For this reason, the Youth Conference voted to permit each zone to set the time and day for the fifth Sunday weekend rally in their respective zones. This will also give your District Youth President an opportunity to attend more of the zone rallies and represent your district. The conference also gave permission for the churches in the Elkin Youth Zone to merge with the High Point and Salisbury zones. This means there will be four zones in our district instead of five. The attendance cups at the convention were awarded to the Albemarle and Kernersville churches.

**Talent Contest.** The discovery of exceptional talent among our young people in the vocal and instrumental field has proven to be a great blessing in our district. Next year our talent contest winners will not stop at the district level, but will go to the National Youth Convention.

**Youth Camps.** Our youth camps are one of the strongest arms of our youth work. We must do all we can to preserve them, and not only preserve them, but see to it that they continue to grow from year to year. To do this, every pastor, young person and member of the district must feel his responsibility.

The results of the two camps held at the William B. Umstead Park in Raleigh last summer was that every boy and girl went home knowing Jesus Christ as their personal Saviour. Practically the same was true this year. Do you know anything that pays that kind of dividends? No. Then we must invest in our boys and girls—now!

The time has come to step out by faith and face the challenge which has been set before us. Without adequate facilities we have been unable in past years to accommodate our boys and girls at our youth camp. Our highest enrollment which was year before last was 381. Since then our number has decreased. This year we were able to secure only one week for camping at the William B. Umstead Park in Raleigh. The other two camps had to be conducted here on the S. P. C. Campus. The total enrollment for all three camps was only 184 plus workers. In my opinion, the main reason for the decrease in attendance is the lack of having a large enough camp where true camping can be enjoyed. Can we afford to neglect our Pilgrim boys and girls any longer?

I call on you—all of you—to help promote our project of a permanent youth camp. It is a must if our youth camps are to survive. Our District Council has met with us (District Youth Council) to investigate the possibilities of buying a piece of property (namely Richies Lake) which joins the Pfeiffer College property near Misenheimer, North Carolina. There is only one problem—money! But I believe you, the ministers, delegates, and the members of this district are interested enough in the Pilgrim Holiness Church and souls, that you will pass the proper legislation and then support it so our dream may become a reality. This is the burden of my heart—our youth.

In closing, I want to thank you—the supporters of the Pilgrim Youth work of the North Carolina District—for your fine cooperation this past year. But this coming year let us pray more and work hard that we may continue to be “in Conquest with the Conquering Christ.”

## REPORT OF SOUTHERN PILGRIM COLLEGE

To the fifty-third annual conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Greetings!

I consider it a great privilege to represent the educational branch of the Southern Zone of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

We are about to enter our 18th year of operation and all we need to do is to look about the campus and see that much progress has been made since our opening day in 1946. This progress has been made possible through the goodness of our Lord and the generosity of His people.

We are continually building for the future as many demands are being made upon our church schools. We as a zone and denomination realize that we must give our young people quality education if we are to get them. In being able to give this type of education there are several factors involved: First we must have qualified faculty—both spiritually and academically. Second factor involved is adequate physical plant. This has been a needy area on the campus of S. P. C. but the Lord is helping us, and much progress has been made the last few years. Olsen Hall has been a great asset to our general operation the past two years.

With the re-examining of the State Accrediting Association of Secondary Schools this coming fall it has become necessary for the Board of Directors to sanction the building of a Science Building in order to meet state requirements. This building is under construction at the present time and will be completed soon after the opening of school. The dimensions of this building is 40 x 60 feet and will house science laboratory and two lecture rooms. The construction price plus equipment will be approximately \$13,000.00.

### Finance

Since July 1961 we have paid to the Bank of Kernersville \$21,600 on the principal of \$60,000 loan plus \$6,228 interest.

We closed our fiscal year with all current bills paid and with a small balance in the treasury of general operation.

### Faculty

God has blessed us with a well qualified faculty. This coming year we are adding four more to our staff. Dr. W. L. Surbrook will be teaching in the Theological Department. Rev. James C. Smith will be serving in the capacity of Dean of College. Mr. Edwin Wiles, who has been away on a year's leave of absence attending Wake Forest College and working on a Master of Science degree will be teaching in the science department. Miss Lola Martin will be coming as Dean of Women. We feel very fortunate in being able to obtain the services of these individuals.

We are anticipating a good enrollment this coming year and covet your prayers that God will keep His blessing upon us and that we might see many young people brought to Him.

May I take this opportunity of saying thank you to the North Carolina Conference for your prayers, young people, and finance in behalf of Southern Pilgrim College.

# RESOLUTIONS

1. Whereas the Elkin Zone consists of only four participating churches being Beulah, Liberty (Davie), Elkin, and Lenoir, and whereas it has been a difficult matter to have an enthusiastic Youth or Sunday school zone meeting with so few churches involved.

Therefore be it resolved that the Elkin Zone of the Youth and Sunday school be consolidated into the Salisbury and High Point Zones giving each one of the said churches their choice of Zone as would best meet their geographic standpoint.

2. Whereas, there has often been confusion and misunderstanding when awarding the banners at Sunday school and Youth Zone rallies; therefore be it resolved, that the rules and regulations for awarding said banners be included in the Conference Standing Rules in the District minutes.

3. Whereas action was taken in the District Conference last year providing for a committee to study the possible division of the North Carolina Conference, and since that committee feels that more time is needed for thorough study of this important matter:

Be it resolved that this conference extend the time another year to give the committee time to complete the study and prepare a thorough report.

4. Whereas it has been recommended by the District Conference and placed in the standing rules that the churches pay all of the pastor's district insurance whenever possible, and whereas our retired ministers are at present bearing this expense personally, and whereas they have given years of service to the building of the conference: therefore, be it resolved that the district pay all of the district insurance of any minister of the North Carolina Conference who has reached 65 years of age, and has ceased full-time service; provided he (or she) has been insured for five years prior to age 65, and has given as much as ten years of active service to the North Carolina Conference or the general church.

5. Whereas there is and should be a great and vital concern over the decline in number of souls saved and sanctified in our churches, and, whereas revival is vitally important to our local, district and general church, and to our nation; therefore be it resolved that each minister and church put forth special effort in the coming year to bring God's blessing upon us in a great spiritual stirring and a real soul-saving revival.

6. Whereas the future hope of our church and the most fertile and productive field lies with our youth, and whereas the district youth program has been definitely curtailed due to lack of adequate facilities, and further delay threatens to greatly deteriorate the work of our district youth, and, whereas the district youth council has spent two years in surveying prospective sites for a North Carolina District Youth Camp and has covered the field quite thoroughly and has found that the Richies Lake Property would be the most suitable and economical after considering all factors involved, therefore be it resolved that we purchase the said property for a youth camp and other future district interests, and that all factors involved in the purchasing of the property and the raising of money be left in the hand of the district council.

7. Whereas, there is so much confusion involved in the compiling of the annual district Sunday school reports and planning for the annual Sunday school convention whenever there is a change of either Sunday school promotional secretary or Sunday school board members, because of the fact that they are appointed for the conference year which ends some 30 days before the convention is to be held . . . therefore, be it resolved that the appointment of the Sunday school promotion secretary and Sunday school board members continue through the annual convention each year, and be it further resolved that this be placed in the standing rules.

8. Whereas we believe an informed people are more united and better able to support the interests and work of the church; therefore, be it resolved that a district paper be published monthly under the direction of the council to inform the people of activities and work of the North Carolina district. Be it further resolved that the monthly Sunday school report, monthly treasurer's report, and youth news be published regularly in said paper.

#### WAYS AND MEANS RESOLUTIONS

1. Be it resolved that the dividend received by the North Carolina Conference from the Pilot Life Insurance Company be retained in the insurance fund.

2. We recommend that rule 28 be changed to read as follows: "Be it resolved that where possible the local church pay for their minister's district insurance and send it in monthly with other payments to the district treasurer."

3. Whereas we have approximately \$7,400.00 (from the 1% district budget and the sale of some church property) earmarked for the Youth Camp, and since we need

approximately \$7,600.00 more for the down payment on the Youth Camp, be it resolved that this amount be raised in the following manner. . . .

1. Receive an offering on the conference floor.
  2. Each church shall receive a special youth camp offering on the second Sunday after camp meeting. This offering shall consist of 60 day pledges, and cash.
- The yearly payments shall be met by the 1% already stipulated in the budget.

## STANDING RULES

### CONFERENCE

1. Churches are asked to give their pastor a two-week vacation with pay. (1941)
2. Churches should see that their delegates to conference conform to standards of the manual. (1945)
3. Local church officers assume their duties the first of July. (1946)
4. Local ministers licenses to be renewed are to be sent to the District Superintendent at conference with a recommendation of the local church. (1947)
5. Our District Budget shall be 15% of all regular offerings, with the breakdown as follows: District Budget 8%, Bible School 5%, Loan Fund 1%, and Home Missions 1%. (1949)
6. District officials shall receive 6¢ per mile for traveling in district business. (1955)
7. To help support the District Sunday School work, churches with 50 members and over shall pay \$5.00 annually, and churches with less than 50 members shall pay \$3.00 annually into the Sunday School Board's treasury. (1952)
8. Whereas, the conference has established a \$3.00 per member budget for the support of Southern Pilgrim College; and whereas, there is need for additional revenue for operation of said school; therefore, be it resolved; that this conference take action that each church put the Bible School in their budget; and be it further resolved that the churches allow the school representatives to conduct one service in the interest of the school, and that they be allowed to raise a cash offering. (1952)
9. The Assistant District Superintendent shall receive \$10.00 for each business meeting held in churches. (1952)
10. Every church in the district is requested to pay the pastor's utilities. (1953)
11. The first night session of conference shall be designated for the ordination service of ministers, and the certificate of ordination shall be formally presented at said service. (1954)
12. Churches changing pastors have the privilege of contacting any minister in the district. (1954)
13. Since actively engaged ministers and wives are entertained free at conference and camp, be it resolved that their children under 18 and unemployed shall also be entertained free. (1954) Licensed song evangelists and Bible school teachers shall be entertained free at camp meeting. (1956)
15. All conference licensed ministers shall meet the Educational and Examining Boards the day previous to conference; meeting starts at 10:00 a.m. (1955)
16. The District Treasurer shall mail a monthly financial report to each pastor and church treasurer which is to be posted in the church. (1956)
17. Each church desiring to nominate a lay delegate for General Conference, should do so at their annual meeting preceding the last District Conference before the General Conference. (1956)
18. The salary of the District Treasurer shall be \$500.00 a year, and the secretary shall receive \$250.00 a year.

19. Whereas, our camp meeting now starts Friday before the first Sunday of August, the pastors who change pastorates, shall preach their farewell sermon the first Sunday after camp meeting, and move that week. (1958, council action.)

20. Whereas, we are running a deficit in our General Conference Delegate Fund, therefore, be it resolved that the fund be set at 20¢ a member. (1958)

21. The conference bar shall include the platform and the first 15 rows of seats in the tabernacle, excepting the section at the right which shall be reserved for visitors.

Also, the time of sittings on opening day shall be: 10:00 a.m. until 11:45 a.m., 2:00 p.m. until 4:45 p.m., and 7:00 p.m. until 9:30 p.m. The second day shall be the same except that the conference shall open at 9:00 a.m. (1958)

22. In case of death among our ministers' families, the District Superintendent shall notify all Sunday school zone chairmen, who in turn shall notify all pastors in their zone. (1959)

23. Due to the heavy load of the District Superintendent, the Assistant Superintendent shall be chairman of the Home Missionary Committee. (1959)

24. Each church or employee agency shall pay \$2.35 per month to cover part of the members' insurance; the participating member shall pay the cost of all dependents' coverage. (1959)

25. Since there is much expense to churches for moving pastors, and since it is done now by the pound; and since it would be a big savings to all concerned; therefore, be it resolved, that we request each church to furnish their parsonage with stove and refrigerator. (1960)

26. Be it resolved that we have four zones for both Sunday school and youth, and that the names of the churches in each zone be printed in the minutes. (1963)

27. Whereas our conference ends June 30, be it resolved that July 10 be the deadline for: (1) money to be counted on the Treasurer's annual report; (2) reports accepted by the Statistician; and (3) names be accepted by the Committee on Memoirs. Such coming after July 10 shall not be entered. (1961)

28. Be it resolved that where possible the local church pay for their minister's district insurance, and send it in with other monthly payments to the district treasurer. (1963)

29. The 1% emergency fund used to pay for the district parsonage shall be used to help finance the purchase of a Youth Camp site. (1962)

30. The Secretary of district Sunday schools shall be paid One Hundred Dollars per year. (1962)

31. The President of the District Youth shall be paid One Hundred Dollars per year. (Council action 1962)

32. Resolved that the district pay all district insurance of any minister of the North Carolina conference who has reached 65 years of age, and has ceased full-time service, provided he or she has been insured for five years prior to the age of 65, and has given as much as ten years of active service to the North Carolina conference or General church.

#### DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

1. Our District Superintendent shall have a two-week vacation with pay. (1941)

2. The District Superintendent is the Chairman of the Camp Meeting Board. (1943)

The District Superintendent, in his annual report, shall list the office salary received plus his traveling expenses. (1958)

4. The District Superintendent shall be permitted to conduct two revivals a year other than the home missionary work in his district. (1958)

5. The District Superintendent's salary shall be set at \$5,500.00 a year. (1962)



### CAMP MEETING

1. The conference shall annually elect the Secretary-Treasurer of the camp. (1941)
2. There shall be eight members on the Camp Meeting Board; they shall be elected for a term of four years. (1941)
3. The camp Secretary-Treasurer shall read his report at each conference. (19 )

### SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

1. The District Council shall elect the Sunday School Board of five members.
2. They shall be amendable to the District Council.

### HOME MISSIONS

1. The Home Missionary Board shall give a copy of the Manual and a one year's subscription to the Advocate to each charter member family of new churches.
2. The source of the board's finances shall be: (a) District Home Missionary Fund; (b) public offerings in the service held on the field; (c) personal donations; (d) an appeal to the established church once a year; (e) the board shall have access to the missionary funds of the district; and (f) the expenses of the board may be collected from the home missionary fund. (1955)

### YOUNG PEOPLE

1. A \$1.00 registration fee will be charged those receiving entertainment at the youth convention. (1952)

The registration fee for all children under eight years of age, who are accompanied by their parents, will be \$1.00, and those under three years of age will be admitted free. (1961)

2. The district shall be divided into four zones for youth work. (1963)
3. A district Youth Camp shall be an annual meeting. (1953)
4. Offerings received for the Youth Home Missionary Project shall be sent directly to the District Youth Treasurer. (1954)
5. The Executive Youth Secretary shall receive \$100.00 a year. (1957)
6. Banners at the Youth Rallies shall be given: (a) for the society with the largest percentage of enrollment present; and (b) for the society having the largest number present. No society may receive both banners, but should a church qualify for both banners, they may choose the banner they prefer. (1959)
7. The District Youth Project shall be supported by a liberal offering from each church once a month. The District Youth Operational Fund shall consist of income from the annual Youth Conference. The Youth Conference income shall consist of a special offering from each church (\$10.00 for churches of 50 or more members, and \$5.00 from churches of less than 50 members); registration fees and offerings taken during conference. The National Youth Project shall be supported by 5% of all regular offerings of the Youth Society. The National Youth Week offering is to be taken during Youth Week. (1963)

9. Each Zone shall have a minimum of four rallies annually, to be held on Friday or Saturday night preceding the fifth Sunday afternoon, whichever the zone desires. The place and time of said rallies shall be the responsibility of the Zone Chairman, who shall give 30 days notification of where and when the rally is to be held. (1963)

10. The business session of the Annual Youth Convention shall be regularly held at the Friday afternoon service, the first session of the Convention. (1962)

## ANNUAL YOUTH CONVENTION

### BUSINESS SESSION

Pilgrim youth of North Carolina gathered on June 21-22, 1963 for the first service of the Youth Convention, in the chapel of Olsen Hall on the campus of Southern Pilgrim College for their business session.

The congregation was led in the "Pilgrim Youth Chorus" and "Jesus Saves" by Rev. McCray Holmes. District Superintendent, Rev. W. F. Page offered prayer. Rev. J. B. Stutts introduced Dr. P. F. Elliott, who presided over the business session and was speaker for the convention.

Dr. Elliott brought greetings from Rev. S. I. Emory, General Secretary of Sunday Schools and Youth. Dr. Elliott brought a challenging message. One statement from the message that shall be remembered was, "the heritage of the past, is the seed that brings forth the harvest of the future."

The conference bar was set to consist of the first five rows of seats in both sections. The roll of churches was called and 21 churches were represented.

The next order of business was the giving of reports. Reports were given by our Youth President, Rev. J. B. Stutts; Treasurer, Rev. James Smith; and from the Zone Chairmen. These reports were accepted.

Reports were given from several Youth Societies. Churches reporting were the following: Albemarle, Archdale, Burlington, Dan River, Guilford, Kannapolis, Kernersville, Kildee, Mebane, Mt. Zion, Randleman, and Winston-Salem. The reports were accepted.

The Resolution Committee presented four resolutions that were accepted. The resolutions were as follows:

1. Whereas the Elkin Zone consists of only four participating churches being Beulah, Liberty (Davie County), Elkin, and Lenoir, and whereas it has been a difficult matter to have an enthusiastic Youth Zone meeting with so few churches involved:

Therefore, be it resolved that the Elkin Zone be consolidated in the Salisbury and High Point Zone giving each of the said churches their choice of which Zone would best meet their need from a geographic standpoint.

2. Whereas there has been some complaint concerning fifth Sunday afternoons as the set time for Zone Rallies.

Therefore, be it resolved that Rallies be held on either Friday, or Saturday night preceding fifth Sunday afternoon or the fifth Sunday afternoon, whichever the zone desires.

3. Be it resolved, that the old and faded banners now being used in some zones be replaced where necessary.

4. Be it resolved that our 1963-64 District Youth Project continue to be the supplement of the Youth Camp program.

The Ways and Means Committee presented the following resolution which was accepted:

I. Be it resolved that section III (A) of the Pilgrim Youth Financial Program be changed to read:

A. The National Youth Project shall be supported by 5% of all regular offerings of the Youth Society.
