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JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

FIRST SITTING

The Fifty-Fourth Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the North Carolina Conference opened at 10:00 a.m., July 30, 1964 in the tabernacle on the beautiful campus of Southern Pilgrim College, Kernersville, North Carolina, with the singing of "Faith Is The Victory".

District Superintendent Page read a Scripture lesson from Titus the second chapter. Rev. W. A. Way, one of our senior and retired ministers, led our hearts to God in prayer.

Superintendent Page presented Dr. Melvin H. Snyder, our Area General Superintendent, who will preside over the conference.

Superintendent Snyder greeted the conference and brought reports of very fine Conferences and Camps over the area thus far this summer.

He brought a challenging message based on Matthew 8:5-14, the story of the centurion approaching our Lord in behalf of his servant who was seriously ill. He emphasized the miracle of faith the centurion showed. Also our attention was called to the testimony that Jesus gave concerning his faith. Though Jesus often marvelled at the unbelief of some, he marvelled at the faith of this man. In testimony of his faith, Jesus said, "I have not found so great faith, no, not in Israel.

He suggested four facts about this man's faith; namely -

1. The centurion exercised his faith in a deep spirit of humility.

2. His faith was exercised in a profound love, as seen in his concern for his servant.

3. His faith also recognized constituted authority.

4. He had a faith that exercised constituted authority.

The secretary called the roll of Ministerial and Lay-delegates to this conference.

The report of the District Superintendent, Rev. W. F. Page, was read; also he spoke extemporaneously a few words of concern to his heart. A motion prevailed that with grateful hearts we accept his report.

Rev. H. B. Barger, of the the Examining Board, read a recommendation from the board that this conference ordain to the ministry Rev. Bill Poole, Rev. Bobby Freeman, and Rev. Leon Thompson. A motion was made and carried that these men be ordained.

After a few announcements, the sitting stood adjourned by expiration of time.

SECOND SITTING

The second sitting of the conference convened at 2:00 p.m., and was opened with the singing of "There Shall Be Showers Of Blessing". The prayer was offered by one of our conference evangelists, Rev. Kermit Farlow.

The secretary read the minutes of the first sitting, and they were approved as read. The annual reports again became the order of the day.

Assistant District Superintendent, Rev. R. S. Shelton read his report and was accepted.

The Chairman of the Auditing Committee, Rev. F. W. Henry, read their report and was accepted.

The District Treasurer, Rev. L. L. Lange, presented his well-prepared and mimeographed report of the finances of the conference for the past year. A motion carried that with gratitude to God, the people who made the report possible, and the fine work of the treasurer, we receive the report.

The District Statistician, Rev. W. R. Phillips, read the statistical report and was accepted.

The Camp Meeting Secretary and Treasurer, Rev. James Denny, read the report of the camp meeting of 1963. A motion prevailed to accept it.

The report of President Miller concerning Southern Pilgrim College was read by the Dean of the College, Rev. James Smith. Dean Smith also gave his personal observations and report of the school. A motion carried that we accept both the President's report and the excellent report of Dean Smith.

Superintendent Snyder gave words of appreciation for our good schools. He also warned of the falling morals, the dangerous teachings etc. that modern education is giving today. Concluding his remarks, he challenged us to support our colleges with our prayers, finances, and youth, and to press forward to greater things ahead.

The Reception Committee presented visiting guests, Rev. Don Richardson and Brother Dick Whipple. A motion carried they be given seats within the conference bar.

A motion also was made and carried that at this time we receive into our conference Rev. Don Richardson as an ordained minister.

The President of the District Missionary Societies, Rev. Mrs. D. R. Saunders, gave a very fine report of the societies activities during the year. A motion carried that we gladly receive the report.

The District Missionary Societies Treasurer, Mrs. Bradley Russell, read a report of the finances of the missionary work of the conference during the year, and was thankfully received.

A motion carried that by a rising vote we express our appreciation to Brother Dick Whipple for his fine labors of love in our conference during this last year in our conference in the field of promoting Lay-evangelism.

The District Youth President, Rev. J. B. Stutts, read his very interesting and encouraging report of the work done with our youth during the year. A motion carried to thankfully receive the report.

The District Sunday School Promotional Secretary, Rev. U. N. Freeman, read his report of our district schools. A motion carried that we accept the good report.

The next order of business became that of hearing the pastors read their reports to the conference.

By expiration of time, the session stood adjourned, and was dismissed with prayer by Rev. H. B. Barger.

THIRD SITTING

The third sitting of the conference convened at 7:00 p.m. with the ordination service. The conference joined in singing "A Charge To Keep I Have." Prayer was offered by Rev. J. A. Grout, Sr. The Scripture was read by Rev. E. T. Houston, Rev. H. B. Barger, and Rev. R. S. Shelton.

Superintendent Page presented to the General Superintendent Bill Poole, Bobby Freeman, and Leon Thompson as candidates for ordination.

Superintendent Snyder then proceeded to bring the ordination message. He read from II Chronicles 16:7-11. He directed our attention to the ninth verse, and emphasized that God is looking for men; and that to such he will show himself strong. He then followed with the thought of the type of men that God is looking for. He said that many years ago he read an outline that Dr. Vance Havner used on "The Preacher That God Is Looking For", and said he would borrow the main divisions of his message, namely....

1. God wants men who will be quiet enough to hear what God has to say to this age.

2. God wants men with courage enough to preach His message.

3. He is looking for men honest enough to live the message.

Following the message the General Superintendent Snyder, assisted by the ordination committee, ordained Rev. Bill Poole, Rev. Bobby Freeman, and Rev. Leon Thompson to the ministry.

The secretary read the minutes of the last sitting, and they were approved.

The Reception Committee presented guests, Rev. and Mrs. E. C. Swanson of Fort Lauderdale, Florida. A motion prevailed to grant them seats within the conference bar.

The Memoirs Committee presented a beautiful service in tribute to our sainted dead who have been called of God during the past year. Rev. Barger led in prayer.

Rev. Holmes feelingly sang "The Day Without A Cloud", and Rev. Mrs. F. W. Henry read the fitting tribute and the names of the departed loved ones.

Rev. R. J. Hobbs of the Resolutions Committee presented four resolutions. . . . Number 1 was ruled out of order. Number 2 was said to be the work of the Ways and Means Committee.

Due to expiration of time, we adjourned. Rev. Charles Stout pronounced the benediction.

FOURTH SITTING

The fourth sitting of the conference opened Friday at 9:00 a.m. with the singing of "Oh How I Love Jesus." The prayer was led by Rev. E. T. Houston.

Several favorite passages of Scripture were quoted from the floor.

Motion carried that we dispense with the calling of the roll.

The secretary read the minutes of the third sitting and were approved as read. The Resolutions Committee again brought resolution Number 3 back to the floor, and it carried. Resolution Number 4 was referred back for the committee for redrafting. Resolution Number 5 carried, as did Number 6.

Next a number of pastors read their reports.

A five minute recess was given.

The secretary read the council's recommendation for directors of C. Y. C. and P. E. L. T. . . . for C. Y. C. Mrs. R. S. Shelton was nominated, and for P. E. L. T. Rev. Fred Hill was nominated. The names of both of these were approved. Both of these gave a few words concerning the work.

The Ways and Means Committee presented two resolutions, both of which carried. Several announcements were made, and the conference sitting was adjourned by expiration of time. The dismissal prayer was given by Rev. George Farah.

FIFTH SITTING

The fifth and final sitting of the conference opened at 2:00 p.m. with the singing of "At the Cross". Prayer was offered by Rev. Kenneth Taylor.

The secretary read the minutes of the morning sitting, and were approved as corrected.

Rev. H. B. Barger reported the recommendation of the Education and Examining boards as to proposed ministers standings in the conference. Said report was accepted by the conference.

The Resolution committee brought in the redrafted resolution Number 4, and also resolutions Number 7 and 8.

Number 4 carried, as did the others, Numbers 7 and 8.

The next matter of business became the election of officers. This resulted in the following elections....

A motion was carried that we give Rev. H. B. Barger a rising vote of thanks of our deep appreciation for his forty-three years of continuous service to the District Council.

A motion carried that the secretary send greetings from this conference to ministermembers of this conference who were unable to attend due to sickness. It was suggested he send greetings to Rev. and Mrs. J. W. Covington, Rev. Mrs. M. H. Russell, Rev. Charles Williams, Rev. T. A. Wyrick, and Rev. Alexander Brown.

A motion prevailed that by a rising vote we express our appreciation to our presiding Chairman, Dr. Melvin H. Snyder, for his service to this conference.

A motion carried that we express our appreciation to Rev. McCray Holmes for his splendid service as Editor of the Carolina Pilgrim this year, and that we shall pray God's rich blessings to be upon him as he leaves our conference to take up the pastorate at Easton, Maryland.

In the closing moments of the conference, Dr. Snyder gave words of appreciation for the reports that showed progress and Christian endeavor. He also mentioned the places where we were rather weak and lagging behind, and urged that we strive to advance in these places in the new conference year.

Superintendent Snyder dismissed the conference after the motion to adjourn.

I am not pleased with the facts and figures which our statistician's report contains. This will show that we have suffered some losses in all departments. I am personally grieved over these losses. Temporal Progress

Asheboro Foster Street has done an extensive job of remodeling and adding Sunday School rooms. They have also purchased a beautiful parsonage.

Burlington has done a major job of improvements on their church and parsonage. Dan River has acquired a tract of land adjoining their church property on which they hope to build a parsonage.

Erlanger has painted the parsonage and installed a Hammond Organ. They have also bought some lots adjoining the church property.

High Point is in the process of erecting a lovely new church.

Kernersville has added several rooms to their parsonage, along with other valuable improvements.

Mt. Zion (Davidson) has purchased a twelve acre tract of land across the road from their new church, which will enhance the beauty and value of their property tremendously.

Robbins has done quite an extensive job of redecorating and adding much needed facilities.

Staley has built a lovely parsonage.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

To the fifty-fourth annual conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Greetings in Jesus Name!

The opportunity to serve you in the capacity of Sunday School Promotional Secretary through the past year, has been most gratifying. For the fine spirit of interest and co-operation shown by the great host of pastors and laymen alike, I am indeed grateful.

The faithful Sunday School Board have served well and worked hard, and surely were deserving of the reappointment for another year. Without their untiring efforts, my load would have been much heavier.

The Annual District Convention was held on August 3, 1963, here under the spacious Tabernacle. The attendance was excellent, the program most interesting and helpful. Many ribbons, certificates, and trophies were awarded. All is in readiness for another such gathering here on Saturday, August 1, at 2:30 P.M.

Our District Wide "March To Sunday School In March" Contest was of great benefit to many of our Churches. Siler City and Bethlehem were the two Award winners with very large gains.

Without a doubt, the highlight of the year was the Sixth Annual District Sunday School Workshop, held at Senior High School, High Point, North Carolina on February 23, 1964. It was truly a splendid example of co-operation. The editor of the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate, Rev. A. D. Peisker, surely expressed our views in his editorial, just simply that it was a great success. A large crowd attended the thirty-two excellent workshops. Plans are now being made for the Seventh Annual Workshop in 1965, if Jesus tarries. Your Sunday School Board solicits your continued support, prayers, and full co-operation of all its program throughout the year that lies ahead. As your Promotional Secretary, I represented the North Carolina Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church at the N.S.S.A. Convention in Buffalo, New York, last October. I have conducted several Board Meetings, and participated in three Zone Rallies. I have prepared the monthly reports every month during the year, and have handled all correspondence related to District Sunday School work. I have seriously endeavored to fulfill the duties of this office to the best of my knowledge and ability.

STATISTICAL REPORT

Twenty-seven of our Sunday Schools reported gains totaling 250 while 27 reported loses of 265. Therefore we have a net loss of 15 throughout the district this year. However, this loss could be absorbed in the fact that we lost three Churches during the year, namely, Atlantic, Eureka, and Seagrove. These Churches had an average attendance of 124 last year.

REPORT OF NORTH CAROLINA DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

Dr. Snyder, Brother Page, Ministers, Delegates, and Friends, Greetings in Jesus Name!

This has been one of the greatest years in the history of the Pilgrim Youth of the North Carolina Conference. It is a year that will be long remembered. It was in this year, 1964, that God led us to a beautiful piece of property consisting of 102 acres located in the Piedmont of North Carolina which was purchased in the interest of our Pilgrim Youth. Certainly this was an answer to prayer.

It was this year that over 500 people were present at the Thomasville Armory in Thomasville, North Carolina for the Second Annual Watch Night Service – but, about 470 of these people were present in spirit and not in body. They would liked to have been there, but "Ole Man Winter" covered the ground with about three inches of ice and wrecked their plans. The 34 of us who made it had a wonderful time.

It was in this year that a large host of youth leaders, pastors, and friends gathered at Southern Pilgrim College for the District Youth Leaders Conference. The inspiring messages by Rev. Tom Weir, District Superintendent of the Southern-Eastern U. S. Church Extension Area, will be remembered – especially the "2-4-6-8," Who do we appreciate? – The Pilgrim Holiness Church! The workshops were enjoyed by all.

This year, 1964, will certainly be remembered for the launching of a new activity for our graduating youth – the Senior Banquet! This was held in Huey's Steak House in Burlington, North Carolina on May 4 at 6:30 P.M. for our graduating youth along with the pastors and wives. There were about 150 in attendance. After the steak dinner, a well-planned program, and a variety of jokes, Rev. Bob McCluskey brought a challenging message. We shall remember this year for the chalk-artist drawings and inspiring messages which Rev. Edwin Wallace of Florence, New Jersey presented at our District Youth Convention. The convention which convened on June 5-6 at Southern Pilgrim College in Kernersville spirited all of us to serve our Lord better. This year will be long remembered because of the packed-out Youth Camps. The Boys Week, July 6-10, and Girls Week, July 13-17, were held at the Wm. B. Umstead Park with an overflow crowd for both weeks. The camp capacity is 119 weekly and we were filled to capacity. Best of all was the spiritual blessings. Every boy at camp went home knowing Christ as his personal Saviour and almost every girl at the Girls Camp. Our Senior Camp, ages 14-20, will be held in conjunction with District Camp Meeting, July 31-August 9. We are expecting a good Senior Camp.

This year will best be remembered by those who found Christ as their personal Saviour. We rejoice for the good reports of youth revivals which we have received from many of our churches this year, and for those who found Christ at Youth Camp. Yes, this year will be remembered for these things and many, many more which we shall not be able to mention, but let us look forward to the coming conference year. By God's help it can be even a greater year to "remember" than last year if we obey God throughout the year.

I would like for us to set some guide posts for this coming year which I feel will make it a year blessed of God and to be long remembered.

1. Development of District Property. Now that our district property has been purchased, there is much hard work to be done. The land must be cleared, road built, buildings constructed, etc. before we can have youth camps. I call on you – each of you – to give of your time, energy, and money to help develop our youth camp site as speedily as possible.

2. More Well-Planned Youth Zone Rallies in which our youth are taking active part. To my knowledge, none of our zones had four rallies. The lowest in number was one and the highest was three. Let's have at least four in each zone this year.

3. Launching of the New C.Y.C. Program in Every Pilgrim Church in the North Carolina District. This is one of the greatest programs ever presented by our church for our young people ages 6-14. Mrs. R. S. Shelton has been appointed as director of the North Carolina District. I trust you will contact her and start this program this year in your local church.

4. Continuation and Expansion of District Youth Program. Let us continue our activities such as New Year's Service, Youth Leaders Conference, and Senior Banquet. At the same time, let us investigate other needed areas where we may influence our youth for God.

5. Large Attendance at the National Youth Convention. North Carolina should be well represented at the national Youth Convention in June 1964 in talent as well as numerically.

6. Every Society Faithfully Supporting Financial Program. Every youth society must support our youth program with its finance and prayers if we are to continue to go forward.

7. A Revival Among Our Youth In Every Church.

8. Every Society 100% Behind The District Youth Program.

If we follow these guide posts through the coming year I'm sure it will be another year to be long remembered. RESOLUTIONS

Resolution on the Recognition of God in our Public Institutions

1. Whereas the historic attitude of the United States Government toward the worship of God has been one of friendliness, as may be substantiated by any number of evidences, and

Whereas the American citizenry today, of whatever creed, is overwhelmingly characterized by faith in God and a recognition of our national and personal dependence upon Him, and

Whereas the intent of our founding fathers in forbidding the establishment of religion in the First and Fourteenth Amendments of our Constitution was manifestly not to remove all vestiges of our theistic faith from government-sponsored premises and activities, and

Whereas in recent years there has been a determined effort by an atheistic minority, having every personal privilege of disbelief, to secure judicial decisions purportedly based upon the Constitution to shield themselves from reminder of their minority status by the banishment of all theistic traces from publicly sponsored activities and premises, notably from our public schools, which, because of compulsory attendance requirements, affect the lives of the vast majority of our children, thus undermining the historic foundation of our moral and ethical value system, and

Whereas successive actions of the Supreme Court, occasioned by the persistent appeals of atheists and agnostics, seem to indicate a growing inclination to ban from public life all worship of God, in however broad terms, and all recognition of Him,

Therefore Be It Resolved that this North Carolina Conference of The Pilgrim Holiness Church assembled in its fifty-fourth annual conference at Kernersville, North Carolina, July 30-31, 1964 respectfully petitions our legislative leaders to discover for us and for the great God-fearing majority of our people some adequate lawful redress from the above-described disability. We presume that such may require a Constitutional Amendment recognizing the sovereignty of Almighty God for our nation (while granting freedom of conviction and propagation to those who choose not to recognize Him), reaffirming the doctrine that units of the government are to avoid acts and policies involving the support or establishment of organized religion, but declaring the principle that it is not deemed a contravention of this doctrine that the Name of God be honored in state and civic life and that men be encouraged to read the Bible in its various versions and to worship God in accordance with the dictates of their own conscience, not excluding the incidental occurrence of such activities even from premises built or financed in whole or in part by public moneys, that this nation may indeed be a nation under God. (Such an amendment would encourage God-fearing peoples in America that the public recognition of God, the creator of all men, who is revealed fully through His Son Jesus Christ, be not destroyed from among us.)

2. Whereas, the Home Missionary Committee is concerned about the problems of organizing new churches, therefore, be it resolved that the Home Missionary Committee study and present to the next conference a suitable program to meet the needs of this present day.

3. Whereas the work of lay visitation, under the leadership of Mr. Leonard Whipple has been a great success in our local churches in the District of North Carolina, and

Whereas there has been much enthusiasm on the part of our lay people to carry out this great task of witnessing for Jesus Christ as commanded in His word, and

Whereas, this work needs to be continued in our district and needs to be coordinated under one department head, and

Whereas, a report sent in monthly would help encourage participation in the lay visitation program of soul winning,

Therefore, be it resolved that the District Council appoint a competent person within the district who shall receive all monthly reports from the chairman of the local visitation program in each church, and that a quarterly report be printed in the North Carolina Pilgrim as to the number of calls, new families contacted, souls won to Jesus Christ through personal witnessing, and any other pertinent information which may be necessary. The official name of the appointee by the District Council shall be, Chairman of Lay Visitation and Evangelism of North Carolina District. The chairman shall make a report concerning the work and the souls won to Christ at the Annual District Conference.

4. Whereas it is being well recognized by all denominational leaders that there is an acute shortage of ministers to fill the Protestant pulpits, and,

Whereas the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has been suffering for lack of ministers, and,

Whereas the District has been unable to start new churches because of being unable to staff them, and

Whereas it takes years to prepare and equip a young man for this vital office, and, Whereas there is presently no district ministerial program, and,

Whereas District Superintendent Page has related to us the serious need in the North Carolina district for ministers, and has asked this conference to take up this matter in a serious way,

Be it resolved that this conference now in session, set in motion plans to help meet this oncoming ministerial shortage by the following method:

Appoint a Steering Committee of five (5) ministers to set up a Ministerial Program for ministers that will include the following approaches: . . .

A. Co-ordinate the ministerial program with the promotion program of Southern Pilgrim College. The Chairman of said Committee shall make contact with the President of the College in the developing of this program.

B. Set in motion a promotional program across the district to alert the pastors and laymen of this critical ministerial shortage. (This promotion to include brochures, posters, and setting up conferences.)

C. Co-ordinate this program with the district Youth Program, working through the district youth council. . . .

D. The committee shall work with the College in making personal contact with prospective ministers, and church workers on the district... These representatives shall point out the need, and future opportunities of God's work.

The Steering Committee shall submit their proposed programing for consideration to the district council. The first draft of the proposal of the program to be submitted not later than November 1. The committee in full shall meet with the council.

When fully prepared to the satisfaction of the council, a special call session for Pilgrim pastors shall be sent out for the purpose of orientation of this program.

The Chairman of this committee shall give a detailed report of their progress to the 1965 Conference of the Pilgrim Church.

The appointments to this committee shall be made by the district council.

5. Whereas God has greatly blessed our youth camps in the North Carolina Conference, and,

Whereas there is no adequate camp available that will accommodate the large number of boys and girls who desire to attend our Pilgrim Youth Camps, and,

Whereas the district has purchased a 102-acre tract of property which is to be developed for our district youth camp to adequately take care of our needs,

Therefore, be it resolved that this district conference go on record as favoring the very swiftest development of our camp site as possible under the direction of the appointed committee.

WAYS AND MEANS

1. Whereas the cost of operating our North Carolina District Camp Meeting (in keeping with everything else today) tends to increase rather than decrease, and,

Whereas the actual income from Camp Association dues and from the offerings received during the camp services is not keeping pace with the cost of operation and upkeep of the camp, and,

Whereas there seems to be strong objection to the little results from any pressure used in raising offerings during the camp services, and, Whereas the following proposed plan has worked well for other church groups such as ours,

Therefore be it resolved that all the churches of North Carolina District be divided into four categories according to total receipts for the year, and asked to contribute a specific amount for the support and maintenance of the District Camp Meeting as follows:

Churches with \$5,000 or less in total receipts contribute . . . \$5.00 annually.

Churches with \$5,000 to \$10,000 in total receipts contribute ... \$10.00 annually. Churches with \$10,000 to \$20,000 in total receipts contribute ... \$25.00 annually.

Churches with more than \$20,000 annual receipts contribute ... \$40.00 annually.

2. Whereas the cost of travel has greatly increased, therefore be it resolved that the district officials receive eight cents (.08) per mile for traveling in district business.

STANDING RULES

CONFERENCE

1. Churches are asked to give their pastor a two-week vacation with pay. (1941)

2. Churches should see that their delegates to conference conform to standards of the manual. (1945)

3. Local church officers assume their duties the first of July. (1946)

4. Local ministers licenses to be renewed are to be sent to the District Superintendent at conference with a recommendation of the local church. (1947)

5. Our District Budget shall be 15% of all regular offerings, with the breakdown as follows: District Budget 8%, Bible School 5%, Loan Fund 1%, and Home Missions 1%. (1949)

6. District officials shall receive 8ϕ per mile for traveling in district business. (1964)

7. To help support the District Sunday School work, churches with 50 members and over shall pay \$5.00 annually, and churches with less than 50 members shall pay \$3.00 annually into the Sunday School Board's treasury. (1952)

8. Whereas, the conference has established a \$3.00 per member budget for the support of Southern Pilgrim College; and whereas, there is need for additional revenue for operation of said school; therefore, be it resolved: that this conference take action that each church put the Bible School in their budget; and be it further resolved that the churches allow the school representatives to conduct one service in the interest of the school, and that they be allowed to raise a cash offering. (1952)

9. The Assistant District Superintendent shall receive \$10.00 for each business meeting held in churches. (1952)

10. Every church in the district is requested to pay the pastor's utilities. (1953)

11. The first night session of conference shall be designated for the ordination service of ministers, and the certificate of ordination shall be formally presented at said service. (1954)

12. Churches changing pastors have the privilege of contacting any minister in the district. (1954)

13. Since actively engaged ministers and wives are entertained free at conference and camp, be it resolved that their children under 18 and unemployed shall also be entertained free. (1954) Licensed song evangelists and Bible school teachers shall be entertained free at camp meeting. (1956)

15. All conference licensed ministers shall meet the Educational and Examining Boards the day previous to conference; meeting starts at 10:00 a.m. (1955)

16. The District Treasurer shall mail a monthly financial report to each pastor and church treasurer which is to be posted in the church. (1956)

17. Each church desiring to nominate a lay delegate for General Conference, should do so at their annual meeting preceding the last District Conference before the General Conference. (1956)

18. The salary of the District Treasurer shall be \$500.00 a year, and the secretary shall receive \$250.00 a year.

19. Whereas, our camp meeting now starts Friday before the first Sunday of August, the pastors who change pastorates, shall preach their farewell sermon the first Sunday after camp meeting, and move that week. (1958, council action.)

20. Whereas, we are running a deficit in our General Conference Delegate Fund, therefore, be it resolved that the fund be set at 20ϕ a member. (1958)

21. The conference bar shall include the platform and the first 15 rows of seats in the tabernacle, excepting the section at the right which shall be reserved for visitors.

Also, the time of sittings on opening day shall be: 10:00 a.m. until 11:45 a.m., 2:00 p.m. until 4:45 p.m., and 7:00 p.m. until 9:30 p.m. The second day shall be the same except that the conference shall open at 9:00 a.m. (1958)

22. In case of death among our ministers' families, the District Superintendent shall notify all Sunday school zone chairmen, who in turn shall notify all pastors in their zone. (1959)

23. Due to the heavy load of the District Superintendent, the Assistant Superintendent shall be chairman of the Home Missionary Committee. (1959)

24. Each church or employee agency shall pay \$2.35 per month to cover part of the members' insurance; the participating member shall pay the cost of all dependents' coverage. (1959)

25. Since there is much expense to churches for moving pastors, and since it is done now by the pound; and since it would be a big savings to all concerned; therefore, be it resolved, that we request each church to furnish their parsonage with stove and refrigerator. (1960)

26. Be it resolved that we have four zones for both Sunday school and youth, and that the names of the churches in each zone be printed in the minutes. (1963)

27. Whereas our conference ends June 30, be it resolved that July 10 be the deadline for: (1) money to be counted on the Treasurer's annual report; (2) reports accepted by the Statistician; and (3) names be accepted by the Committee on Memoirs. Such coming after July 10 shall not be entered. (1961)

28. Be it resolved that where possible the local church pay for their minister's district insurance, and send it in with other monthly payments to the district treasurer. (1963)

29. The 1% emergency fund used to pay for the district parsonage shall be used to help finance the purchase of a Youth Camp site. (1962)

30. The Secretary of district Sunday schools shall be paid \$100.00 per year. (1962)

31. The President of the District Youth shall be paid \$100.00 per year. (Council action 1962)

32. Resolved that the district pay all district insurance of any minister of the North Carolina conference who has reached 65 years of age, and has ceased full-time service, provided he or she has been insured for five years prior to the age of 65, and has given as much as ten years of active service to the North Carolina conference or General church.

33. The editor of the North Carolina Pilgrim shall receive two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00) annually for his services. (Council action 1964)

34. To help meet the need of the financial load of our camp our churches are asked to contribute according to their financial receipts as follows:

Churches with \$5,000 total receipts contribute . . . \$5.00 annually.

Churches with \$5,000 to \$10,000 receipts, contribute . . . \$10.00 annually.

Churches with \$10,000 to \$20,000 receipts, contribute . . . \$25.00 annually.

Churches with more than \$20,000 receipts, contribute . . . \$40.00 annually.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

1. Our District Superintendent shall have a two-week vacation with pay. (1941)

2. The District Superintendent is the Chairman of the Camp Meeting Board. (1943)

3. The District Superintendent, in his annual report, shall list the office salary received plus his traveling expenses. (1958)

4. The District Superintendent shall be permitted to conduct two revivals a year other than the home missionary work in his district. (1958)

5. The District Superintendent's salary shall be set at \$5,500.00 a year. (1962)

CAMP MEETING

1. The conference shall annually elect the Secretary-Treasurer of the camp. (1941)

2. There shall be eight members on the Camp Meeting Board; they shall be elected for a term of four years. (1941)

3. The camp Secretary-Treasurer shall read his report at each conference. (19)

SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

1. The District Council shall elect the Sunday School Board of five members.

2. They shall be amendable to the District Council.

HOME MISSIONS

1. The Home Missionary Board shall give a copy of the Manual and a one year's subscription to the Advocate to each charter member family of new churches.

2. The source of the board's finances shall be: (a) District Home Missionary Fund: (b) public offerings in the service held on the field; (c) personal donations; (d) an appeal to the established church once a year; (e) the board shall have access to the missionary funds of the district; and (f) the expenses of the board may be collected from the home missionary fund. (1955)

YOUTH STANDING RULES

1. A 1.00 registration fee will be charged those receiving entertainment at the youth convention. (1952)

The registration fee for all children under eight years of age, who are accompanied by their parents, will be \$1.00, and those under three years of age will be admitted free. (1961)

2. The district shall be divided into four zones for youth work. (1963)

3. A district Youth Camp shall be an annual meeting. (1953)

4. Offerings received for the Youth Home Missionary Project shall be sent directly to the District Youth Treasurer. (1954)

5. The Executive Youth Secretary shall receive \$100.00 a year. (1957)

6. Banners at the Youth Rallies shall be given: (a) for the society with the largest percentage of enrollment present; and (b) for the society having the largest number present. No society may receive both banners, but should a church qualify for both banners, they may choose the banner they prefer. (1959)

7. The District Youth Project shall be supported by a liberal offering from each church once a month. The District Youth Operational Fund shall consist of the offerings from Youth Zone Rallies, one special offering per quarter from each church and income from the annual Youth Conference. The Youth Conference income shall consist of a special offering from each church (\$10 from churches of 50 or more members, and \$5 from churches of less than 50 members), registration fees and offerings taken during conference. The National Youth Project shall be supported by 5% of all regular offerings of the Youth Society. The National Youth Week offering is to be taken during Youth Week. (1964)

8. The attendance cup shall be awarded at the Youth Convention to the church having the largest number of points; points shall be counted for the total attendance for all services, except the business session (when 500 points are to be given to each church represented) multiplied by the miles traveled to the convention, plus points to each person registering, equal to miles traveled from registering church to convention. (1960)

There shall be a second attendance cup awarded to the church with the highest attendance percentage figured on their Sunday School average attendance. The count shall be taken at all the services except the business. (1961)

The Pastor or responsible person appointed by him shall have the count from his church ready to give as the group stands when the roll of the churches is called. (1962)

9. Each Zone shall have a minimum of four rallies annually, to be held on the fifth Sunday afternoons. The place and time of said rallies shall be the responsibility of the Zone Chairman, who shall give 30 days notification of where and when the rally is to be held. (1962)

10. The business session of the annual Youth Convention shall be regularly held at the Friday afternoon service, the first session of the Convention. (1962)

ANNUAL YOUTH CONVENTION

BUSINESS SESSION

On June 5-6, 1964, Pilgrim youth of North Carolina assembled at Southern Pilgrim College in the Chapel of Olsen Hall for the annual Youth Convention.

The first service of the convention was a business session which convened at 2:00 P.M. Mr. JeWarren Bunting led the congregation in several choruses. God's presence was felt from the beginning of the convention. Youth President, Rev. J. B. Stutts, gave a hearty welcome and expressed his desire for a good convention. Rev. Bill Poole read from Matt. 9:36-38 and led the congregation in prayer. Rev. Stutts introduced our District Superintendent, Rev. W. F. Page, who presided over the business session in the absence of Rev. O. D. Emery. Rev. Page brought a brief message of encouragement and inspiration.

The roll of churches was called and 20 churches were represented. The conference bar was set to consist of the first five rows of seats in both sections.

Reports were given by Youth President, Rev. J. B. Stutts; Treasurer, Rev. H. A. Lewis; and from the Zone Chairmen. These reports were accepted.

Representatives from several Youth Societies gave reports. Societies reporting were the following: Albemarle, Archdale, Burlington, Dan River, Erlanger, Gold Hill, Kannapolis, Mebane, Mt. Zion (D), Randleman, Sawyersville, and Winston-Salem. A motion was made that these reports be accepted and the motion carried.

Rev. Page gave a report on recent action of the District Council. The District Council formed a Youth Camp Planning Committee. The members are: Rev. Charles Stout, Chairman; Rev. Charles Apple; Rev. J. B. Stutts; Rev. James Denny; Rev. H. A. Lewis and Rev. Ronald Thompson. He outlined the duties of this committee as being: (1) to study and survey our needs (2) to study the needs of buildings and etc. on the property (3) to investigate possibility of getting assistance from groups such as The North Carolina Department of Conservation and Development and others.

The Resolutions Committee presented one resolution and it was accepted. The resolution read as follows:

Be it resolved that the 1964-1965 district youth project, which consists of one offering a month for the youth camp, be specified to apply on the first permanent building. This building would be an all purpose building. The motion carried.

The Ways and Means Committee presented the following resolution:

Be it resolved that the Youth Recording Secretary be given the authority to correct any errors in the Standing Rules. The motion carried. The next order of business was the election of officers. Officers for the coming year are:

SATURDAY MORNING SERVICE 10:00 A.M.

Service opened with singing "In My Heart There Rings A Melody" led by Mr. Je Warren Bunting. Rev. R. L. Prendergrast led in prayer. The Buntings sang "In The Shadow Of The Cross". Rev. Carroll Upton reported the results of the Friday night count and proceeded with the morning count.

Rev. Wallace gave an inspirational and instructive talk concerning the opportunities for young people in the field of art.
