JOURNAL OF PROCEDURES

FIRST SITTING

The fifty-fifth annual conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 10:00 a.m., July 29, 1965 on the beautiful campus of Southern Pilgrim College. Rev. J. B. Stutts led the conference in the singing of "Showers of Blessings," and Rev. O. L. Ruth, our senior minister, led us to the throne of grace in prayer.

District Superintendent Page presented our area General Superintendent Dr. Melvin

H. Snyder who will preside over the conference.

Dr. Snyder brought greetings and expressed his joy in once again being present in the great old North State.

He read a portion of the Word from Revelation 3, and directed our minds to various truths concerning the seven churches of Asia. He reminded us how these letters show God's concern for the churches, the commendation that He gave for their good points, and His correction of faults that he saw.

Dr. Snyder further drew our attention to four things that each of these seven churches had in common -

- 1. There was SPIRITUAL PERCEPTABILITY. "He that hath an ear, let him hear."
- 2. There was SPIRITUAL CONFLICT. "He that overcometh."
- 3. There was SPIRITUAL ACCOUNTABILITY. "I know thy works."
- 4. There was MINISTERIAL RESPONSIBILITY. "Unto the angel of the church." The hearing of reports was the next order of business.

The secretary called the roll of ministers and lay delegates to the conference.

Superintendent Page read the report of the work of our conference, and of his own personal labors for the past year. A motion carried that by a standing vote we show our deep appreciation for his faithful work.

Next an opportunity to make announcements was given, and then the sitting was adjourned by expiration of time.

SECOND SITTING

The second sitting of the conference opened with Brother Bob Loman leading the conference in singing "The Rock That Is Higher Than I."

Prayer was offered by Rev. H. B. Barger.

The secretary read the minutes of the first sitting and they were approved as read. The report of the Assistant District Superintendent, Rev. R. S. Shelton, for the services he rendered this past year was read and gratefully received.

The chairman of the Auditing Committee, Rev. F. W. Henry, read their report and it was accepted.

The District Treasurer, Rev. L. L. Lange, read the splendid mimeographed report of the finances of the conference for the last year. A motion carried that we receive the report.

The District Statistician, Rev. Wm. R. Phillips, read a very illuminating report of the record of our conference during the last year, and a motion prevailed that we accept the report.

The Camp Meeting Treasurer, Rev. J. L. Denny, read the report of the 1964 camp meeting; a motion carried that we receive the report.

The report of Southern Pilgrim College by President Miller was read by Dean James Smith. Rev. Smith also gave some very fine additional verbal reports. The report was gladly accepted.

The Reception Committee presented Rev. and Mrs. Fred Sumwalt of the Florida District. A motion was made that they be given a voice and vote in the conference as they are returning to North Carolina to pastor the Winston-Salem church.

A recess was given for ten minutes.

The Home Missionary Committee presented a new master plan for this important work of the church, and a motion prevailed to accept the recommendation in its entirety.

The president of the District Missionary Societies, Rev. Mrs. D. R. Saunders, gave a very fine report of their work, and it was gratefully received.

The Examining and Educational Boards made their recommendations as to ministers standings and it was accepted. This included the recommendation to ordain Rev. Larry Freeman, Rev. Larry Shelton, and Rev. Joney Phillips.

The District Youth President, Rev. J. B. Stutts, read his report of the District Youth work and his proposed goals. A motion carried to accept the report.

Announcements were made, and the sitting stood adjourned by expiration of time.

THIRD SITTING

The third sitting of the conference opened at 7:00 p.m. with a very sacred and inspiring ordination service in which Rev. Larry Freeman, Rev. Larry Shelton, and Rev. Joney Phillips were ordained as ministers of the Gospel.

The ordination charge was given by General Superintendent Snyder. He based his message on I Timothy 4:16. He called our attention to—

- 1. A WORD OF WARNING. "Take heed unto thyself and to thy doctrine."
- 2. A WORD OF EXHORTATION. "Continue in them."
- A WORD OF PROMISE. "In doing this thou shalt save they self and them that hear thee."

The Reception Committee presented guests – Rev. and Mrs. Horace Maness, and Rev. Nelson Silvers. A motion was made and carried that they be given honorary seats within the conference bar.

The Memoirs Committee presented a lovely service. Prayer was offered by Rev. F. W. Henry; Rev. and Mrs. Jim Sheets sang "Beyond The Sunset" and Mrs. Eugene Smith read the memoirs report.

The Ways and Means Committee presented a recommendation that in appreciation of the eleven years of service that our retiring superintendent has given, we not only express our appreciation for his labors of love, but also show our appreciation by a liberal love offering.

Superintendent Page gave words of appreciation for the Pilgrims and their love and loyalty to him.

A motion carried that the next order of business be the election of our District Superintendent. The voting resulted in the election of Rev. R. S. Shelton.

While the ballots were being counted, the secretary read the minutes of the second sitting and they were approved.

The Treasurer of the District Missionary Societies, Mrs. Bradley Russell, read the report of their work, and a motion was carried to receive the report.

The Director of C.Y.C., Mrs. R. S. Shelton, presented the report of their work during the year and it was accepted.

The meeting adjourned with the singing of the Doxology.

FOURTH SITTING

The fourth sitting of the conference was opened at 9:00 a.m. Friday with Rev. Jim Sheets leading in the singing of "'Tis So Sweet To Trust In Jesus."

A beautiful message in song, "Jesus Lover Of My Soul" was rendered by Rev. and Mrs. Sheets.

Rev. H. J. Olson presented the Scripture lesson. He read from Exodus 28:9-13, and spoke to us of "What Jesus means to this world, and what He desires to do for the people."

Following his very inspiring meditation, Dr. Snyder presented Rev. H. J. Olson a citation from the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church bespeaking the denomination's great appreciation of his long life of valiant service to God and the church. The citation read—

CITATION

Henry John Olson began writing for the Pilgrim Holiness Sunday school literature as early as 1910, and since 1930 has written comments for every lesson through those covering June 1966.

All the while Rev. H. J. Olson has been busy with many noteworthy activities in the Pilgrim Holiness Church. He has served as pastor for 35 years, and as district superintendent for 12 years. He has served as instructor and lecturer in three Pilgrim Holiness Colleges covering a period of 17 years.

He has enjoyed fruitful seasons of ministry in evangelism through the Caribbean Area on two occasions.

Brother Olson served as Editor of the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate and member of the Executive Council of the General Board from the General Conference of 1934 to that of 1946.

To give due recognition for the untiring and unparalleled ministry in the Pilgrim Holiness Church and to show appreciation for his godly influence in many channels of the church, the General Board presents this citation.

The Resolutions Committee presented the resolution concerning the Christian Action League and it carried.

A motion carried that we ask the council to fill Rev. R. S. Sheltons place on the Examining Board.

A motion was made that we have the secretary to send greetings to our ministers who were unable to attend conference due to sickness. These were Rev. and Mrs. J. W. Covington, Rev. Mrs. M. H. Russell, and Rev. J. Byron Crouse.

A motion also carried that we send Rev. W. C. Lovin a letter expressing our sympathy in the loss of his wife.

The Ways and Means Committee presented resolution number 00 relative to the Youth Planning Committee and a special offering. Said motion carried. It was also asked that the secretary rewrite the standing rule relative to the 1% of District Budget being applied to the purchase of the Youth Camp.

A motion carried that this conference express their sincere appreciation to our presiding officer, Dr. Melvin H. Snyder, for the kind, courteous and efficient manner in which he has presided throughout this gathering.

A motion carried that the council be authorized to take care of all unfinished business, including the hearing of the minutes of the last sitting.

The conference was brought to a close with the benediction being pronounced by Dr. Snyder.

REPORT OF DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

Dr. Snyder, Brother Page, ministers, delegates, and friends of Pilgrim Youth, Greetings in Jesus' Name!

This has been another great year for the Pilgrim Youth of the North Carolina Conference. We haven't won as many victories as we would have liked, but the Pilgrim Youth of North Carolina are still marching forward.

One of the many highlights of the year was the Senior Banquet which was held in Huey's Steak House at Burlington, North Carolina on Monday evening, May 17, at 7 o'clock. At first we had decided not to have the banquet this year. Then our plans were changed due to the many requests which came in from the pastors and youth. The banquet proved to be a great success. There were approximately 115 people present. Everyone enjoyed themselves. The success of this banquet is due largely to Rev. Tommy Holshouser who did the planning of the entire program.

Another highlight of the year came in the Randleman High School on February 16 at the "kick-off" meeting for the development of our new district property located near Flint Hill. Rev. Charles Stout, chairman of the planning committee, has done an excellent job this year. He will be making a report to this conference. The program of the evening at Randleman was very interesting. Our camp planner, Professor Charles Stott from the University of North Carolina, gave an interesting talk and showed slides on the camping program as it is related to the future development of our district property.

The Assistant District Superintendent, Rev. R. S. Shelton, made a brief talk and received pledges for the further development of our property. Approximately \$2500.00 was pledged in this first meeting of an estimated 300 persons. Everyone left with the feeling that God has helped, is helping and will continue to help the Pilgrim Youth of the North Carolina District in the further development of our youth camps.

Speaking of youth camps, this has been another successful year for our junior camps. The camps were again conducted at the William B. Umstead Park in Raleigh, N. C. Counting the workers, there were 110 campers for boys' week and 115 for girls' week. This barely came within the capacity of the camp. If all who registered had come, we would have been filled. Better than the good attendance was the spiritual results. As far as we know, every camper went home knowing Jesus as his personal Saviour. Isn't that wonderful!

What does youth camp mean to these boys and girls? I would like to read to you a few of their unedited letters:

"Youth Camp has meant the world to me. I learned to love, work and worship the Lord, and I want to go home and spread the joy I have gotten from camp."

"Youth Camp has meant a lot to me. I would think that Youth Camp is learning to stay a week without being homesick away from your parents. If there wasn't a Youth Camp, I might not be a Christian now. I have been saved before in my home-

town, but I just couldn't live a good Christian life. Since I have been to Youth Camp, I am a new person again."

"Youth Camp has meant a lot to me. Before I came here my heart was loaded. The first night I got saved I felt wonderful. The last night I got sanctified. I feel wonderful now, and I will go home as a Christian girl and will stay a Christian girl and that He will keep me and guide me always."

Why have these youth camps been so successful? I think there are 3 reasons. (1) Because of the dedicated camp staff who sacrifice each year in order to teach and train our boys and girls. (2) Your cooperation and prayers. (3) The outpoured blessing of God on youth. As long as we have these factors our camps will continue to be successful.

This year we introduced the CYC material into the camping program. It proved to be a great asset. I trust that by next year our 2 junior camps can be completely converted to CYC Camps. This does not mean however that other boys and girls who are not CYC'ers cannot attend. It means that the program would be governed entirely by CYC program. The Senior Youth Camp will be held here at Southern Pilgrim College August 2-6 in conjunction with the District Camp Meeting. The young people, ages 14 and up, certainly enjoyed the youth camp program with the camp meeting last year. They expressed their desire to meet here again this year. Fee for each camper is \$12.00.

Last year in my annual report to the conference, I set 8 guide posts for us to follow for this year. Let us examine them for a moment and see if they have been followed.

- (1) Development of District Property. This has previously been mentioned in my report, however, I call upon each of you again to give of your time, energy, and money to help develop our youth camp site as speedily as possible. It is a must for our youth of the North Carolina Conference.
- (2) More Well-Planned Youth Zone Rallies. Out of the 16 zone rallies that were to be held, only 8 were carried through. I want to commend Rev. H. R. Helms of the Salisbury one for having 4 rallies. The High Point Zone had 3 rallies. The Asheboro one had 1 rally and the Burlington one did not have any rallies. I might state that Don Richardson had to resign as chairman of the Burlington one and circumstances did not permit us to have any rallies in that one. I trust that we can have at least 4 rallies in each zone this year. The new zone chairmen for the coming year are: Asheboro, Rev. Bobby Freeman; Burlington, Rev. Charles McHargue; High Point, Rev. Eldon Holtle; and Salisbury, Rev. H. R. Helms.
- (3) Launching of New CYC Program in Every Pilgrim Church in the North Carolina District. The district CYC director, Mrs. R. S. Shelton, has done an excellent job in this field. In North Carolina we have 265 CYC'ers in 9 registered chapters. We're leading the way for our denomination. If your church hasn't started this program, please see that it does this year.
- (4) Continuation and Expansion of District Youth Program. The District Watch Night Service was held December 31 at the Thomasville Armory in Thomasville and proved to be another highlight for our young people again this year. There were approximately 300 people who came to see the old year out and the new year in. This, along with our Senior Banquet, Youth Leaders Conference, Youth Camps, and Youth Convention, are all proving to be a great blessing to our youth. Yet we must have an everexpanding program.
- (5) Large Attendance at National Youth Convention. The National Youth Convention was conducted in Anderson, Indiana on June 23-27. I am happy to announce that we had three National Youth winners from North Carolina in the talent contest. They are: Debbie Maness, Troy Pilgrim Church, vocal solo in group A; Annette Smith, Albemarle Pilgrim Church, vocal solo in group AA; and Richard Chandler, Albemarle Pilgrim Church, instrumental group AAA. In addition to being proud of our winners, I was proud of the large delegation from North Carolina attending the convention.

- (6) Every Society Faithfully Supporting our Financial Program. Every Youth Society must support our youth program with its finance and prayers if we are to continue to go forward.
 - (7) A Revival Among Our Youth in Every Church.
 - (8) Every Society 100% Behind the District Youth Program.

As we look back at these guide posts, we realize we've come a long way. We've reached a number of our goals, but we must keep climbing. The late President of the United Nations, Dag Hammarskjold, was a mountain climber. He had a mountain climbing pick over his fireplace with these words inscribed beneath it, "To Climb to Higher Heights." May this be our goal, under God, for the coming year for our youth. Not to be content where we are, but through prayer, witnessing, and giving to climb to higher heights in Him!

As District Youth President, I want to thank you for your fine cooperation during the past year. I want to reassure you of my love, concern, and prayers for our youth. There is no greater concern of my life than our youth. I ask an interest in your prayers for the further leading of God concerning our youth work in North Carolina.

REPORT OF DISTRICT CYC DIRECTOR

Dr. Snyder, Brother Page, members and friends of the fifty-fifth North Carolina District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, I bring greetings in the name of Him who said, "Suffer little children, and forbid them not to come unto me for of such is the kingdom of heaven."

My work this past year as District Director of the Christian Youth Crusaders, better known as CYC, has been most satisfying.

Since this was the inaugural year of CYC in North Carolina, it seems fitting to record a little of its history. In September of 1962, I organized a chapter at the Albemarle church and continued to hold meetings in 1963 under the Wesleyan North Carolina Director, Mrs. Bullard of Burlington, making Albemarle the first Pilgrim Holiness Church to organize a CYC chapter.

In the summer of 1964, CYC material became available through the Sunday School Department of the Pilgrim Publishing House and I was appointed District Director.

Randleman, under the direction of Mrs. Celia Kidd, organized the first official Pilgrim Holiness CYC chapter in North Carolina. Kannapolis, organized in March, 1965, by Mrs. R. L. Prendergrast, had the largest membership, 51, and fourteen directors, 11 of them certified.

The following 9 churches have registered chapters during the conference year 1964-65, thus becoming charter chapters of the North Carolina District:

Last September the District CYC membership was 30. As of July 1, 1965 it totalled 265, a gain of 235 members. Gold Hill and Foster Street are now meeting and plan definitely to register in September.

By way of a personal report, I have served as Director of the Albemarle chapter, conducted 5 hours of district training classes during camp last year with an attendance of 25 each day, conducted 2 workshops during the Sunday School Convention Workshop, and participated in 3 workshops at the General Youth Convention in Anderson, Indiana. I have visited 5 chapters at regular meetings, met with directors in 3 chapters, visited 2 churches to present the program, contributed "CYC Corner" for each issue of the "North Carolina Pilgrim," written an article for the Sunday school issue of "The Pilgrim Holiness Advocate," helped plan curricula and ordered materials for Junior Youth Camps, and promoted gatherings of CYC'ers at the Sunday School Workshop and the Youth Convention. I have traveled approximately 370 miles with the district paying mileage for 2 of my visits.

My sincere thanks to all who have cooperated in the launching of this wonderful program for our Pilgrim children.

Since its inception in October of 1964, the Lay Visitation Program of our district has by the help of the Lord, made good strides. Of the 58 churches in our district, approximately 20 of these churches have active Lay Visitation Programs. For this we praise the Lord!

The reports that are received from these churches monthly are greatly uplifting and inspirational. Since October of last year the active churches involved in Lay Visitation have put some 575 teams into their respective communities and have witnessed for Christ and the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Over 1700 homes have been visited, 467 prayers have been offered and approximately 700 pieces of literature have been distributed. For this statistical report we thank God!

Yet there remains much to be done! We would like to see every church in the conference support and maintain a Lay Visitation program. If, as pastors and laymen, we could only catch a glimpse of God's working through this program I am sure you would want to begin a Lay Visitation program in your church immediately!

I trust that God will create such a desire to see this type of spiritual revival in your church that you will go from this camp determined to be a part of district Lay Visitation.

I have traveled some 200 miles and have spoken in various assemblies in relation to the Lay Visitation work. If I can be of service to you feel free to call upon me.

RESOLUTIONS

- 1. Having to do with the Church Extension Policy . . . see rule Number 3 under Home Missions.
- 2. Whereas the N. C. Conference has been suffering from a lack of ministers, and whereas the limited financial resources of some of the smaller churches has prevented the full financial support of their ministers with the result that some of the pastors have been forced to supplement their salaries with secular work, thus dividing their time and energies between the work of God and their secular occupations, and whereas God has called these men into the full-time ministry, be it resolved that we take action to give these men full-time service in the Kingdom of God by uniting some of our smaller churches into circuits where such an arrangement is deemed necessary and practical by the district superintendent and the district council.
- 3. Whereas rule 12 under standing rules, Page 24, conference minutes of 1964 has been misinterpreted and therefore misapplied which has resulted in confusion and delay in the calling of pastors for several churches . . . therefore be it resolved that no

pastor leaving a charge shall make recommendations to the church board in regards to a successor, and no church board shall contact any minister in regards to the pastorate until they have first met with the District Superintendent and heard his recommendations. All contacts regarding the pastorate shall be made by the superintendent or by someone having his permission to make such contact.

- 4. Whereas there is a continuing need for the Youth Camp Planning Committee, therefore be it resolved that the District Council appoint this committee annually, which is to consist of two members from the District Council, and the Youth President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer.
- 5. Be it resolved that since the different departments of our district work, such as Sunday School, Youth, Missionary Departments, CYC, etc., have a difficult time trying to keep an up-to-date mailing list, and since this would be the most reasonable and economical way to obtain the needed names and addresses for various departments, therefore be it resolved that when the District Secretary mails out the annual report blanks, that he include a blank to be returned with the report giving the names and addresses of the Sunday School Superintendent, Secretary, Treasurer, Youth President, Missionary President, CYC Director, etc.
- 6. Whereas the Christian Action League is a Christian organization to fight legalized liquor and the evils of alcohol in all forms, and whereas all major denominations who are against liquor belong to the Christian Action League, and whereas, the district representative of these denominations are appointed by their conference to serve in this capacity to represent their denomination, and whereas, Rev. J. B. Stutts was asked by the league to represent the Pilgrim Holiness denomination in North Carolina, and whereas, he has been elected to the Executive Committee of this organization, therefore, be it resolved that Rev. Stutts be appointed to be our official representative on this organization.

Ways and Means

Be it resolved that the Youth Planning Committee be permitted to promote one special offering each year in each church in interest of the Youth Camp Development. This special offering is in addition to the 1% offering for our Youth Camp program. The type of offering will be left to the discretion of the local church.

GENERAL CONFERENCE MEMORIALS

1. WHEREAS, our 1962 General Conference seems to have acted hastily and without due consideration in the matter of reducing our ministerial delegates to General Conference, and increasing the number of laymen in both our district and general conferences, and

WHEREAS, this reduction in ministerial delegates and increase in lay delegates has not had a satisfactory reaction in our church, as so many of our loyal faithful ministers, whose hearts and lives have been wrapped up in the church and whose sacrificial labors have made our church what it is today, will have neither a voice nor vote in our General Conference and as a result will have nothing to say in formulating its laws, which seems to border on "taxation without representation," and

WHEREAS, it is common knowledge among us that many of our best laymen are unable to get off from work to attend a General Conference, thus weakening our voice and strength in constructive leadership both as to ministers and laymen, and

WHEREAS, it has been the practice and policy of our denomination from its very beginning to select its leading ministers as delegates to our General Conference to help make the laws they are to serve under, and

WHEREAS, this new set-up is adding to the unrest and discontentment in our ranks at a time when we cannot afford it, and

WHEREAS, this impractical representation is contrary to the practice of the New Testament Church whose minsters made the laws from them Under the Holy Spirit's leadership (see Acts 15th chapter); therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED that Section 106 Paragraph 2 in the 1962 Manual be rescinded and that for the sake of harmony, progress and growth we shall return to Section 116, Paragraph 2 of the 1958 Manual for our lay and ministerial representation in both General and District conferences.

- 2. WHEREAS, there seems to be a growing dissatisfaction with the present method of raising the United Stewardship Fund, and WHEREAS, church membership is no true indication of a church's financial strength, and WHEREAS, the wage scale varies throughout the nation, and WHEREAS, there is some reason to believe assessment on basis of church membership may have a tendency to hinder membership increase; THEREFORE, be it resolved that we change the method of raising the United Stewardship Fund to that of an assessment of a percentage of each dollar of revenue received through the regular offerings of Sunday school and church. The yearly assessment to be based on the preceding year's receipts.
- 3. WHEREAS, thre is no published history of the Pilgrim Holiness Church available; be it resolved that the General Board take immediate steps to secure the services of a competent author and that such a work be published as soon as possible. This publication shall include the general development of the church, its missionary program, its educational institutions, biographical sketches of the leaders who have served the church, and other pertinent materials. And be it further resolved that a permanent office of Church Historian be set up.

STANDING RULES

CONFERENCE

- 1. Churches are asked to give their pastor a two-week vacation with pay. (1941)
- 2. Churches should see that their delegates to conference conform to standards of the manual. (1945)
 - 3. Local church officers assume their duties the first of July. (1946)
- 4. Local ministers licenses to be renewed are to be sent to the District Superintendent at conference with a recommendation of the local church. (1947)
- 5. Our District Budget shall be 15% of all regular offerings, with the breakdown as follows: District Budget 8%, Bible School 5%, Loan Fund 1%, and Home Missions 1%. (1949)
 - 6. District officials shall receive 8¢ per mile for traveling in district business. (1964)
- 7. To help support the District Sunday School work, churches with 50 members and over shall pay \$5.00 annually, and churches with less than 50 members shall pay \$3.00 annually into the Sunday School Board's treasury. (1952)
- 8. Whereas, the conference has established a \$3.00 per member budget for the support of Southern Pilgrim College; and whereas, there is need for additional revenue for operation of said school; therefore, be it resolved: that this conference take action that each church put the Bible School in their budget; and be it further resolved that the churches allow the school representatives to conduct one service in the interest of the school, and that they be allowed to raise a cash offering. (1952)
- 9. The Assistant District Superintendent shall receive \$10.00 for each business meeting held in churches. (1952)
 - 10. Every church in the district is requested to pay the pastor's utilities. (1953)
- 11. The first night session of conference shall be designated for the ordination service of ministers, and the certificate of ordination shall be formally presented at said service. (1954)
- 12. No pastor leaving a charge shall make recommendations to the church board in regards to a successor, and no church board shall contact any minister in regards to the pastorate until they have first met with the District Superintendent and heard his recommendations. All contacts regarding the pastorate shall be made by the Superintendent or by someone having his permission to make such contact. (1965)

- 13. Since actively engaged ministers and wives are entertained free at conference and camp, be it resolved that their children under 18 and unemployed shall also be entertained free. (1954) Licensed song evangelists and Bible school teachers shall be entertained free at camp meeting. (1956)
- 15. All conference licensed ministers shall meet the Educational and Examining Boards the day previous to conference; meeting starts at 10:00 a.m. (1955)
- 16. The District Treasurer shall mail a monthly financial report to each pastor and church treasurer which is to be posted in the church. (1956)
- 17. Each church desiring to nominate a lay delegate for General Conference, should do so at their annual meeting preceding the last District Conference before the General Conference. (1956)
- 18. The salary of the District Treasurer shall be \$500.00 a year, and the secretary shall receive \$250.00 a year.
- 19. Whereas, our camp meeting now starts Friday before the first Sunday of August, the pastors who change pastorates, shall preach their farewell sermon the first Sunday after camp meeting, and move that week. (1958, council action.)
- 20. Whereas, we are running a deficit in our General Conference Delegate Fund, therefore, be it resolved that the fund be set at 20¢ a member. (1958)
- 21. The conference bar shall include the platform and the first 15 rows of seats in the tabernacle, excepting the section at the right which shall be reserved for visitors.

Also, the time of sittings on opening day shall be: 10:00 a.m. until 11:45 a.m., 2:00 p.m. until 4:45 p.m., and 7:00 p.m. until 9:30 p.m. The second day shall be the same except that the conference shall open at 9:00 a.m. (1958)

- 22. In case of death among our ministers' families, the District Superintendent shall notify all Sunday school zone chairmen, who in turn shall notify all pastors in their zone. (1959)
- 23. Due to the heavy load of the District Superintendent, the Assistant Superintendent shall be chairman of the Home Missionary Committee. (1959)
- 24. Each church or employee agency shall pay \$2.35 per month to cover part of the members' insurance; the participating member shall pay the cost of all dependents' coverage. (1959)
- 25. Since there is much expense to churches for moving pastors, and since it is done now by the pound; and since it would be a big savings to all concerned; therefore, be it resolved, that we request each church to furnish their parsonage with stove and refrigerator. (1960)
- 26. Be it resolved that we have four zones for both Sunday school and youth, and that the names of the churches in each zone be printed in the minutes. (1963)
- 27. Whereas our conference ends June 30, be it resolved that July 10 be the deadline for: (1) money to be counted on the Treasurer's annual report; (2) reports accepted by the Statistician; and (3) names be accepted by the Committee on Memoirs. Such coming after July 10 shall not be entered. (1961)
- 28. Be it resolved that where possible the local church pay for their minister's district insurance, and send it in with other monthly payments to the district treasurer. (1963)
- 29. The 1% emergency fund formerly used to pay for the district parsonage shall be used to help finance the purchase of a Youth Camp site, and its development. (1965)
 - 30. The Secretary of district Sunday schools shall be paid \$100.00 per year. (1962)
- 31. The President of the District Youth shall be paid \$100.00 per year. (Council action 1962)
- 32. Resolved that the district pay all district insurance of any minister of the North Carolina conference who has reached 65 years of age, and has ceased full-time service, provided he or she has been insured for five years prior to the age of 65, and has given as much as ten years of active service to the North Carolina conference or General church.

- 33. The editor of the North Carolina Pilgrim shall receive two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00) annually for his services. (Council action 1964.)
- 34. To help meet the need of the financial load of our camp our churches are asked to contribute according to their financial receipts as follows:

Churches with \$5,000 total receipts contribute . . . \$5.00 annually.

Churches with \$5,000 to \$10,000 receipts, contribute . . . \$10.00 annually.

Churches with \$10,000 to \$20,000 receipts, contribute . . . \$25.00 annually.

Churches with more than \$20,000 receipts, contribute . . . \$40.00 annually. (1964)

- 35. Whereas there is a continuing need for the Youth Camp Planning Committee, therefore be it resolved that the District Council appoint this committee annually. It is to consist of two members from the District Council, the Youth President, the Youth Vice president, and the Youth Secretary, and Youth Treasurer. (1965)
- 36. Be it resolved that when the District Secretary mails out the annual report blanks, that he also include a blank to be returned with the reports giving the names of the Sunday school superintendent, Secretary, Treasurer, Youth president, Missionary society president, and the C. Y. C. director.
- 37. The Youth Planning Committee shall be permitted to promote one special offering each year in each church in interest of the Youth Camp Development. The type of offering shall be left to the discretion of the local church. (1965)

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

- 1. Our District Superintendent shall have a two-week vacation with pay. (1941)
- 2. The District Superintendent is the Chairman of the Camp Meeting Board. (1943)
- 3. The District Superintendent, in his annual report, shall list the office salary received plus his traveling expenses. (1958)
- 4. The District Superintendent shall be permitted to conduct two revivals a year other than the home missionary work in his district. (1958)
 - 5. The District Superintendent's salary shall be set at \$5,500,00 a year. (1962)

CAMP MEETING

- 1. The conference shall annually elect the Secretary-Treasurer of the camp. (1941)
- 2. There shall be eight members on the Camp Meeting Board; they shall be elected for a term of four years. (1941)
 - 3. The camp Secretary-Treasurer shall read his report at each conference. (19)

SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

- 1. The District Council shall elect the Sunday School Board of five members.
- 2. They shall be amendable to the District Council.

HOME MISSIONS

- 1. The Home Missionary Board shall give a copy of the Manual and a one year's subscription to the Advocate to each charter member family of new churches.
- 2. The source of the board's finances shall be: (a) District Home Missionary Fund: (b) public offerings in the service held on the field; (c) personal donations; (d) an appeal to the established church once a year; (e) the board shall have access to the missionary funds of the district; and (f) the expenses of the board may be collected from the home missionary fund. (1955)

CHURCH EXTENSION POLICY

Section I - Objectives

The objectives of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, as stated in the Manual, are: First, to glorify God our Father, exalt Jesus Christ, our Saviour, and to honor the Holy Spirit. Second, to carry out the great commission of our heaven-ascended Head by publishing the full gospel to every nation. Third, to conserve the holiness work by forming churches and aiding in placing over them Spirit-baptized pastors, who will feed the flock and in every way possible help to get souls ready for the coming of our Lord.

In carrying out this objective, the Church Extension Committee of the District shall work for the establishment of new churches and the strengthening of weaker churches according to the policy setforth herewith.

Section II - Basic Goals

- 1. Our primary goal shall be the establishment of new churches in communities where the need and potential for a Pilgrim Holiness Church exists.
- 2. To strengthen existing church extension churches with proper assistance and counsel.
- 3. To study the potential of other small churches of the N. C. District and to strengthen them with proper assistance and counsel when it is deemed necessary and practical.

Section III - General Procedures

As soon as possible following the District Conference, the Church Extension Committee shall initiate the basic goals by thorough study and analysis and shall present recommendations to the District Council. After approval or revision by the District Council, the Church Extension Committee in cooperation with the District Superintendent shall be authorized to implement its plans and recommendations.

Section IV - Administrative Procedures

- 1. The Church Extension Committee shall at all times work in cooperation with the District Council, the District Superintendent, and any local pastor involved.
- 2. The Church Extension Committee shall be authorized to have its own treasury for the church extension projects, but any expenditure involving more than \$500.00 shall be approved by the District Council.
 - 3. Planning for new churches should proceed according to the following outline:

I. A THOROUGH SURVEY

- 1. Contacting Chamber of Commerce, Mayor, City Planning Commission, Utility Companies, etc.
- 2. Survey of city-county population.
- 3. Determination of Protestant, Catholic, and non-denominational population.
- 4. Consideration of the holiness potential of the Protestant population. (Over the nation the holiness potential is generally 10% of the Protestant population. The total membership of churches already established should be subtracted from the potential.)

II. LONG-TERM PLANNING IS NECESSARY

- Locations should be selected 5 to 10 years in advance.
 (a) Check with Planning Commissions, Utilities, Chambers of Commerce, Ministerial Associations, and big-time contractors.
- 2. Decision as to most appropriate type of building or buildings.
 - (a) Parsonage, Sunday School unit, or Sanctuary.
 - (b) Priority of buildings.
 - (c) Architect and contractors.

III. CONSIDERATION OF FINANCING

- 1. District Church Extension Budget.
- 2. Special Gifts.
- 3. Investments.
- Loans on signatures of local men or District Trustees.

IV. SELECTING A PASTOR

- 1. Plan 2 to 5 years ahead.
- 2. Select from one of our schools or the active pastorate.
- 3. Select men who give evidence of evangelistic gift as well as certain pastoral qualifications, and who are completely consecrated.
- 4. Keep under close supervision of District Superintendent and Church Extension Committee.
- 4. The Church Extension Committee shall make recommendations to the District Superintendent concerning remedial actions necessary for the strengthening of weak churches.
- 5. The Church Extension Committee shall sponsor and promote an annual District Church Extension service in the District Camp Meeting.
- 6. The Church Extension Committee shall make a report of its activities to the annual District Conference and to the District Council when necessary or requested.

Section V - Committee Members

The Church Extension Committee shall consist of 5 members elected by the District Conference. One member shall be elected annually for a 5-year term from nominations presented by the District Council. The District Superintendent and District Treasurer shall be a member by virtue of their office. One of the elected members shall be appointed Chairman by the District Council.

Section VI - Amendments

The Church Extension Policy shall be amended by the District Conference upon the recommendation of the District Council, the Church Extension Committee, or the District Resolutions Committee.

YOUTH STANDING RULES

1. A \$1.00 registration fee will be charged those receiving entertainment at the youth convention. (1952)

The registration fee for all children under eight years of age, who are accompanied by their parents, will be \$1.00, and those under three years of age will be admitted free. (1961)

- 2. The district shall be divided into four zones for youth work. (1963)
- 3. A district Youth Camp shall be an annual meeting. (1953)
- 4. Offerings received for the Youth Home Missionary Project shall be sent directly to the District Youth Treasurer. (1954)
 - 5. The Executive Youth Secretary shall receive \$100.00 a year. (1957)
- 6. Banners at the Youth Rallies shall be given: (a) for the society with the largest percentage of enrollment present; and (b) for the society having the largest number present. No society may receive both banners, but should a church qualify for both banners, they may choose the banner they prefer. (1959)
- 7. The District Youth Project shall be supported by a liberal offering from each church once a month. The District Youth Operational Fund shall consist of the offerings from Youth Zone Rallies, one special offering per quarter from each church and income from the annual Youth Conference. The Youth Conference income shall consist of a

special offering from each church (\$10 from churches of 50 or more members, and \$5 from churches of less than 50 members), registration fees and offerings taken during conference. The National Youth Project shall be supported by 5% of all regular offerings of the Youth Society. The National Youth Week offering is to be taken during Youth Week. (1964)

8. The attendance cup shall be awarded at the Youth Convention to the church having the largest number of points; points shall be counted for the total attendance for all services, except the business session (when 500 points are to be given to each church represented) multiplied by the miles traveled to the convention, plus points to each person registering, equal to miles traveled from registering church to convention. (1960) An additional 500 points are to be given to those churches who have paid their special Youth Convention offering (\$10 from churches of 50 or more members, and \$5 from churches of less than 50 members) according to Standing Rule Number 7. (1965)

There shall be a second attendance cup awarded to the church with the highest attendance percentage figured on their Sunday School average attendance. The count shall be taken at all the services except the business, (1961)

Th pastor or responsible person appointed by him shall have the count from his church ready to give as the group stands when the roll of the churches is called. (1962)

- 9. Each Zone shall have a minimum of four rallies annually, to be held on the fifth Sunday afternoons. The place and time of said rallies shall be the responsibility of the Zone Chairman, who shall give 30 days' notification of where and when the rally is to be held. (1962)
- 10. The business session of the annual Youth Convention shall be regularly held at the Friday afternoon service, the first session of the Convention. (1962)
- 11. The church who wins an attendance cup for five consecutive years may keep the cup. After 10 years, if no church has won the attendance cup for five consecutive years, then the church that has won the cup the largest number of years, of the 10-year period, may keep the cup. (1965)

ANNUAL YOUTH CONVENTION

Business Session

Pilgrim youth from across North Carolina assembled on June 4-5, in Olsen Hall on the campus of Southern Pilgrim College, for the 1965 annual youth convention.

The business session was the first service of the convention, which convened at 2:00 p.m. Rev. Larry Shelton led the group in singing, "Jesus Is The Sweetest Name I Know". Prayer was offered Rev. James Denny. Rev. J. B. Stutts welcomed everyone to the convention and introduced Rev. O. D. Emory, General Secretary of Sunday School and Youth, who presided. Rev. Emory spoke to the convention from Acts 2:16-18. He also gave a special invitation to all to attend the national youth convention.

The roll call was made by the secretary and 22 churches were represented. The conference bar was set to consist of the first five rows of seats in both sections. Rev. cup. After 10 years, if no church has won the attendance cup for five consecutive years, then the church that has won the cup the largest amount of years, of the 10 year period may get the cup.
