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
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

#### JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

#### FIRST SITTING

Through the providential mercies of our glorious God, the Fifty Sixth annual conference was called to order at 10:00 a.m., August 4, 1966 by Superintendent R. S. Shelton in the spacious tabernacle on Southern Pilgrim College campus, Kernersville, North Carolina.

Rev. Jim Sheets led the conference in the singing of "Where He Leads I'll Follow." Prayer was offered by Rev. O. L. Ruth.

Superintendent Shelton presented our area General Superintendent, Dr. Paul F. Elliott who will preside during this conference.

Dr. Elliott brought greetings from the Board of General Superintendents and the general church, and expressed his pleasure at being appointed to this eastern area. The secretary called the roll of ministerial and lay-delegates.

Next came the matter of the hearing of reports:

Superintendent R. S. Shelton gave his splendid report, and was thankfully received by a rising vote of appreciation.

Dr. Clyde Parker, Assistant Superintendent gave his report and was accepted. Rev. Byron Crouse was recognized by the chair, and gave his testimony of God's goodness to him through his extended illness.

Rev. L. L. Lange, Conference Treasurer, presented his very fine mimeographed report of the financial work of our district, and was accepted with appreciation.

Superintendent Shelton appointed Rev. Eldon Hotle as District Auditor.

Rev. Shelton expressed special appreciation for the many years of service to God and the Church that Rev. Wm. R. Phillips has given. The conference, by a standing vote expressed their appreciation for his life. Our warmest greetings and love are to be expressed to him by one of the members of the family, Dr. Clyde Parker. Secretary Grout led the congregation in prayer for Rev. Phillips.

Rev. L. L. Lange read the statistical report in the absence of statistician, Rev. W. R. Phillips.

Announcements were made, and the sitting was recessed. The benediction was pronounced by Dr. Wm. S. Deal of California.

#### SECOND SITTING

The second sitting of the conference opened at 2:00 p.m. with Rev. J. B. Stutts leading the congregation in the singing of "Tis so sweet to trust in Jesus".

Superintendent Shelton introduced Rev. Dewey Miller, President of the North Carolina Wesleyan Methodist Conference who brought greetings from their church, and then led the conference in prayer.

A motion carried that Rev. Miller be granted an honorary seat within the conference bar.

The Reception Committee introduced Dr. and Mrs. W. S. Deal of California, and they were granted an honorary seat within the conference bar.

The secretary read the minutes of the first sitting and they were approved as read. Rev. James Denny, Secretary-Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Association read the report of the year of 1965, and it was accepted.

Rev. Jim Sheets, Sunday School Promotional Secretary, read the report of the Sunday schools of our conference, and was received. He also read the financial report of the Sunday School Board and was accepted.

Rev. Mrs. D. R. Saunders, President of the Missionary Societies of the conference read the report of their work and was accepted.

Mrs. Bradley Russell, District Treasurer of the Missionary Societies of the conference, read the report of their financial work and was accepted.

A verbal report of Southern Pilgrim College was given by Prof. Gordon H. Miller, and was joyfully accepted. By a rising vote, the conference expressed their deep

thanks to him for his years of successful leadership as President. Also our new President of S. P. C., Dr. Clyde Parker, spoke from his heart concerning the challenge of the future and of his faith in the accomplishment of our goals.

Rev. J. B. Stutts, District Youth President gave a very fine report of the varied activities and work of our youth, and was accepted.

Dr. Fred Hill, Director of PELT gave his report and was accepted.

Rev. Leon Thompson, District Director of Lay Visitation reported on the work that is being accomplished in this department, and the report was accepted.

The report and recommendations of the Education and Examining Boards was given by Rev. H. B. Barger, and was accepted.

Also the conference to receive Dr. Wm. H. Neff, and Rev. Roy Dorsett as ordained minister into our conference.

Rev. James Denny presented three resolutions from the Resolution Committee, all of which carried.

Dr. Clyde Parker presented the resolutions from the Ways and Means Committee. All four resolutions passed, however number 3 had a substitute motion change.

The election of officers became the order of the day, and resulted in the following elections.

- District Superintendent, Rev. R. S. Shelton
- Examining Board member, Rev. D. R. Saunders
- Educational Board, Dr. Fred Hill, Dr. Clyde Parker

The session was closed by expiration of time.

#### THIRD SITTING

The third sitting of the conference opened with the singing of the great consecration hymn "I'll Go Where You Want Me To Go Dear Lord."

General Superintendent Emeritus, Dr. W. L. Surbrook, led our hearts to God in prayer.

General Superintendent Elliott spoke to the conference upon the them "I am Ready To Preach . . ." and based his thoughts upon Paul's words as recorded in Romans 1:15. He spoke of the call to preach as being the greatest of all callings because I. Of the One who calls to preach 2. Because of what is involved in this calling. 3. Because of the reward given for faithful preaching.

He further stated that there are three periods in a ministers life. 1. His time of preparation. 2. His active years. 3. His Retirement. In all this time there must be a total committment to God, and to full obedience in love. As a result of such a committed life, he stated that one can be with Paul, Ready to Preach the Gospel Of Christ. This of course, comes as a result of truly touching the Master personally.

He portrayed Paul facing imperial Rome with its pleasure, power, prestige, and awful pollution, but facing it in sure confidence and faith that God's power could meet and conquer all opposing powers of darkness. He concluded by saying that the same power is offered to God's servants today and that in Him we can meet the opposition of this our age.

Mrs. Eugene Smith presented the Memoirs report which honored our fellow Pilgrims who have this past year finished their earthly race, and entered into their rest.

Mrs. R. S. Shelton, Director of Christian Youth Crusaders of the conference, read a thrilling report of the growth of this great new arm of the church. The report showed a doubling of the organizations, and almost a doubling of the membership. A motion carried to received her report with much appreciation.

A motion carried that the conference secretary write the various stations who have taken a stand against the Beetles who made the statement of "their popularity being greater than that of Jesus Christ" etc. and commend them for their stand.

#### FOURTH SITTING

The fourth and last sitting of the conference convened at 9:00 a.m., Rev. Jim Sheets led the congregation in the singing of the grand old hymn, "My Faith Looks Up To Thee", and Rev. W. F. Page led us in prayer.

The secretary read the results of the balloting on the Advisory Members of the District Council which showed the election of Rev. Charles Apple, Rev. E. T. Houston, Rev. Charles Stout, and Rev. D. R. Saunders.

A motion carried that we take the four highest names as nominees for the other council member to be elected, as these four names were so close together in the balloting. No election resulted from this ballot.

The District Auditor, Rev. Eldon Hotle, read his report of the auditing of the District Treasurers books, and also the District Treasurer of World Missions, and a motion carried to accept his report.

A motion carried after revoting on a council member to take the two names having the highest number of ballots.

Further voting showed elections as follows:

- District Council member: W. F. Page.
- Advisory Members to Camp Meeting Board: H. R. Helms, J. B. Stutts.

A motion carried that we send greetings from this conference to our ministers who are sick: Rev. J. W. Covington, Rev. Wade Linebarrier, Rev. Mrs. M. H. Russell, Rev. W. R. Phillips, and Rev. C. A. Brown; also to the wife of Rev. H. F. Donnelly.

A motion carried that this be a standing rule of the conference that the secretary send greetings annually from our conference to any minister who is sick.

The resolutions committee presented four more resolutions which numbered 4, 5, 6, and 7. Number 4 was to be redrafted. Number 5 was to be rewritten and turned in.

Number 6 was carried. Number 7 was carried.

A motion carried that we send the N. C. Wesleyan pastors a copy of our district minutes, and their conference, in turn, will do the same for us.

A motion carried that by a standing vote we express our sincere appreciation for the kindness, swiftness, and orderly fashion in which our General Superintendent presided through out this conference.

A motion carried that all unfinished business be taken care of by the district council.

Superintendent Shelton presented words of appreciation for the retiring Rev. and Mrs. Frank Henry who have served our church as pastors for forty years. He mentioned the many pastorates they have held, the churches and parsonages they have built, and the goodwill that they have built for our church wherever they have served. A motion was made, seconded and carried that as a conference we express our appreciation for their life of service to God and the Church.

General Superintendent Elliott gave the closing words of exhortation to the conference. He encouraged us to continue planning our work in faith and purpose, and expressed appreciation for the work that has been done.

A motion carried that the conference stand adjourned.

#### DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

It is a pleasure to have with us our new General Superintendent, Dr. Paul F. Elliott. In an age that demands leadership with courage, we meet in the name of our Lord to report our victories, and get set for the battles ahead. Victory comes only to those who pay the price it demands. No battle is ever won by merely weeping over tragedy, so let's unfurl our banners and press onward, working with each other in order to get more souls and more victories won, as many of you did last year.

Burlington has redecorated the church auditorium, including the addition of lights and other minor repairs.

Dan River has liquidated its debt and purchased land on which to begin a new parsonage at once.

Durham has enlarged the auditorium and added a new stained glass front vestibule which gives it a beautiful "new look."

Erlanger is in the process of building a lovely new church, adequate to meet the needs of its growing congregation.

Fayetteville has redecorated the church and parsonage.

High Point has been enjoying a magnificent edifice since its consecration last fall. This is the largest church structure in our Pilgrim denomination.

Kannapolis is in the midst of a very large Sunday School expansion building program.

Mebane has completed one of the most beautiful and spacious parsonages in the District.

Guilford's beautiful new sanctuary is in the final steps of completion.

Mount Olive has also provided a nice new parsonage for its pastor.

Randleman Pilgrims moved into their new sanctuary last spring. It is one of the most beautiful in the denomination.

Sawyersville has remodeled and brick veneered the parsonage.

### REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA DISTRICT SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

To the Fifty-sixth Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, greetings!

As Sunday School Promotional Secretary, it has been my responsibility to note the losses and gains reported by the various churches. In doing so, we have rejoiced with those reporting gains and shared the burden of those reporting losses. The total average Sunday School attendance was 6,815. This reveals a loss of 28 for the District.

The duties of this office have been varied and conscientious effort has been made to execute them. The 1965 District Sunday School Rally was conducted July 31. The monthly reports of Sunday School attendance were edited and included in the North Carolina Pilgrim. The \$100.00 salary has been paid in full.

The year ahead reveals the Sunday School Rally, August 6, The National Sunday School Association Convention, September 21, 22, 23, in Boston, Massachusetts, the District Sunday School Workshop in February, and an unlimited challenge of expansion and growth for the honor and glory of our Lord.

With your help and prayers, the blessing of God, and the anointing of the Holy Spirit, North Carolina Pilgrim Sunday Schools can be a dynamic force for good in our modern society.

#### REPORT OF DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

Dr. Elliott, Rev. Shelton, delegates and friends of Pilgrim Youth, Greetings in Jesus' Name!

The Pilgrim Youth of the North Carolina Conference are still marching forward with Christ.

Let us review a few of the events of this past year which prove this fact.

Senior Banquet: Our District Senior Banquet proved to be one of the best we have ever had. It was conducted April 19, 1966 in the Red Carpet Room in Greensboro. There were 150 people present for the occasion. An excellent program was planned by Rev. and Mrs. Bobby Freeman. They are to be commended for their hard work which contributed to the success of the banquet.

Zone Rallies: To my knowledge, this is the first year every zone in the district has conducted a minimum of four rallies. The Zone chairmen are to be commended. One of the highlights of our rallies was the Talent contest again this year. This has proven to be a great blessing to our Youth. The final contest was conducted in Olsen Hall, Saturday, June 4, at which time the District winners were chosen.

Rev. H. R. Helms and Rev. Bobby Whitfield, who will be retiring from the Youth Council this year, have done an excellent job along with the other council members.

The District Youth Council officers, which were elected at the youth conference to serve the coming year are: Rev. J. B. Stutts—President, Rev. J. L. Denny—Vice President, Rev. Ronald Thompson—Recording Secretary, Rev. Leon Thompson—Treasurer. Youth Zone Chairmen: Asheboro—Rev. Bobby Freeman, High Point—Rev. Eldon Hotle, Burlington—Rev. Frank Kernodle, Salisbury—Rev. R. L. Prendergrast, These men must have your help and co-operation to further the cause of Christ among the youth in the North Carolina Conference.

Youth Camp: This has been another successful year for our two Junior Youth Camps. The camps were filled to capacity. There were 227 campers and workers at the William B. Umstead Park in Raleigh for the two weeks, July 11-15 and July 18-22. Only eternity can reveal all of the good seed that was sown during these two weeks. Much credit for the success of these camps goes to our dedicated workers who sacrificially gave of their time and energies to make these camps possible. As I expressed in my report last year, it is my desire that these two camps be converted entirely to C. Y. C. Camps and regulated as the manual states by the District C. Y. C. director.

Our Senior Camp will be conducted in conjunction with the District Camp Meeting again this year. The camp activities start next Monday, August 8, and continue through Friday, August 12. However, the campers may stay the entire Camp Meeting period for only \$12.00. The camp is for both boys and girls, age 14 and up.

The District wide Youth Camper's Rally will be conducted Saturday, August 13 at 2:30 P.M. here under the Southern Pilgrim College tabernacle. Campers from all three

camps along with parents and friends are expected for this big Rally.

District Youth Property: Much has been accomplished toward the development of our new Youth Camp site, but there is much more which I trust shall be accomplished in the near future. Rev. Charles Stout, chairman of the Planning committee, will give a full report on this.

Watch Night Service: On Thursday, December 31, 1965, one of the largest crowds ever to attend our Watch Night service was present at the Thomasville Armory in Thomasville, North Carolina. The time of the gathering was changed from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. Our District Superintendent, Rev. R. S. Shelton, brought a very inspiring message to our youth. The New Year was ushered in with an impressive candle light service at 12 o'clock. The Watch Night program was planned and directed by our District Vice President, Rev. Jim Denny, who deserves much praise for a job well done.

I have reviewed only a few of the outstanding events of this past year in our district. Time will not permit to call to remembrance others. You will have to agree with me that all those I have mentioned have been a great success. We give God the glory and praise for all that has been accomplished. However, there is one matter to which we must give our attention if we are to continue this type of program and especially if we are to have a continual expanding program for our Youth. The matter to which I refer is finance. Practically all of the programs to which I have referred in my report are supported by a deficit to our District Youth treasury. For example — the finance for the Senior Banquet was taken from the District Youth treasury. The only item that the church was asked to pay is the meal. In addition to the meal the expense of of decoration, programs, printing, musical instruments, etc. was approximately two hundred dollars (\$200.00). So you can readily see we must have more offerings to liquidate this deficit if we are to continue our programs. How can you help? By systematically sending your monthly and quarterly offerings to our District Youth Treasurer. This is a must if our work is to continue to expand.

In closing, let me make it clear as District Youth President, I shall be satisfied with nothing less than total victory for the Pilgrim Youth of the North Carolina Conference in every field. I believe that under the leadership of the Holy Spirit and through the prayers of God's people this is possible. I see nothing on the horizon of time but what the grace of God can make our Youth more than conquerors. It is our duty not merely to service but to prevail, not merely to exist, but serve. As your leader I challenge you "Let us not lay at anchor in the harbor at this critical time in history, but let us set sail for our Lord." Thank you for your faithful cooperation this past year.

#### REPORT OF DISTRICT CYC DIRECTOR

Dr. Elliott, members and friends of the fifty-sixth conference of the North Carolina District, I bring greetings in the name of Him who "increased in wisdom, stature, and in favor with God and man." This is the basic scripture upon which our Christian Youth Crusader program is founded.

I have thoroughly enjoyed my work this year. Being able to visit each church with my husband gave me an excellent chance to present CYC where the churches desired. Last year on July 1, 1965, we had nine organized CYC Chapters with 265 members. On July 1, 1966, we have 18 Chapters and 480 members, exactly a double in chapters and a gain of 215 members which nearly doubled the membership. Praise the Lord for His help, for the churches who were willing to adopt the program, for the dedicated workers who have given so unstintingly of their time to accomplish this gain!

I have visited most of the churches twice and, because of sickness, I failed to visit one church. I found in every instance where the church had a really active CYC that children were more interested in the Sunday School and church services, and that many more Junior members were being received into the church. I made about twenty-five public presentations, fifteen of them in unorganized churches. Last camp I conducted five hours of training classes, with an average attendance of ten, conducted two workshops at the February Sunday School Workshop, (with the help of Mrs. Bullard, Wesleyan Director) one church training class (during revival), spoke at one Honor Council, wrote twelve "CYC CORNERS" for the Carolina Pilgrim, planned a CYC Rally to coincide with the Sunday School Rally, CYC Round-Up Picnic, and CYC Program at the District Youth Service all to be held Saturday, August 6, 1966. I don't know how many miles I've traveled (enough to give me a heart attack), but there's only one trip charged to the District.

The following statistical report, based on registrations July 1, 1966, in Indianapolis, shows that Mrs. Prendergrast's chapter at Kannapolis is still in the lead with fifty members, just one less than last year. They have purchased a CYC bus which has been such a help to them for trips. One of our newest chapters, High Point, is a close runner-up with 42 registered members. This was accomplished under the capable leadership of their director, Mrs. Ray Warner. Other new chapters are listed in the statistical report.

#### CYC STATISTICAL REPORT

Congratulations to Mrs. Helms' Erlanger chapter for having the first John Wesley Award Winner in North Carolina (Wesleyan or Pilgrim)! She is also the first winner of this award throughout the Pilgrim Church. Miss Joyce Hartman, ninth grader from the Erlanger church earned this highest of all CYC awards in two years.

Mrs. Dale Emery, wife of our International CYC Secretary, writes in a recent letter, "Your district CYC sets the pace throughout the denomination."

My very special thanks go to the Rev. Ronald Thompson who planned, and the staff of workers who conducted, the CYC Camps at William B. Umstead Park. To all directors, workers, pastors and church boards who have backed this program, remember "A little child shall lead them."

#### **RESOLUTIONS**

- 1. Whereas there is much variation in the book-keeping systems of our local churches with some being very adequate, and some very inadequate, and, whereas each local church is supposed to give uniform quarterly and yearly reports to the District Superintendent, and the District Conference, and whereas many of our local church treasurers are in need of help and would welcome a uniform system and assistance from qualified persons in setting up their books, there, be it resolved that as soon as possible, our District Council shall engage a certified public accountant or other qualified person and appoint a committee to work with him in setting up a uniform book-keeping system for our District. The system chosen by the committee shall be approved by the District Council. The Council shall then set a date for an instructional workshop with all local church treasurers to implement the new system and a date for its inauguration in the churches. Carried.
- 2. Whereas several of the District officers are now elected by the District conference from nominees submitted by the District Council, and whereas every elective office on the District Board or Committee is vitally important to the progress of the District, and whereas the District Council is in position to know something of the requirements of each office and the qualifications of possible candidates, therefore be is resolved, that prior to conference time each year, the District Council shall nominate two or more qualified persons as candidates for each vacancy on the District Boards and Committees whose members are elected by the annual Conference. Carried.
- Due to the nature of questions and discussions involved, be it resolved that the District Treasurer be an ex-officio members of the Ways and Means Committee. Carried.
- 4. Be it resolved that standing rule number 13, page 28 in the 1965 conference minutes, be changed to form two stand rules as follows:
  - a. All actively engaged ministers, their wives, and their children who are under 18 years of age and unemployed, shall be entertained free at the District Conference and Camp Meeting, provided the minister and his wife are paid up members of the Camp Meeting Association.
  - b. All licensed song evangelists and Bible School teachers shall be entertained free at the District Camp Meeting, provided they are paid up members of the Camp Meeting Association.
- 5. Whereas there was emphasis laid upon perpetuating our heritage at the 1966 International Conference, and whereas the North Carolina Conference has a goodly heritage, and in view of the fact that merger with the Wesleyan Methodist Church seems almost certain, therefore be it resolved that a committee be appointed by the District Council to compile and edit, for publishing, a history of the North Carolina District. An asset to this work will be found in the fact that some of the early leaders are still with us, and could give valuable assistance in such a compilation of our history.

6. Whereas the cost of sending delegates to the International Conference is so increased, and whereas we have a heavy deficit in this fund, therefore be it resolved that each church receive a special offering during the month of February for this need.

And be it further resolved that the annual per member delegate assessment be set at thirty cents.

#### WAYS AND MEANS RESOLUTIONS

- 1. WHEREAS, there is a growing sentiment among some of the ministers that the cost of printing the North Carolina Pilgrim exceeds its value to the district; Be it resolved that we take the following actions to reduce its cost and improve its worth;
  - (1) Set the 5th day of each month as a deadline for all articles to be published in that months publications except the report of the Sunday School Promotional Secretary which shall be mailed to the editor as soon as possible after the fifth. Any articles received by the editor after the fifth shall be held over for the next publication.
  - (2) That we charge each church the cost of all engravings required to print pictures that accompany its articles.
  - (3) That we grant the College the privilege of using the back page of the North Carolina Pilgrim for its monthly promotional interests, providing it will pay one-fourth the cost of printing that month, plus the cost of engravings.
  - (4) Request all minister and churches to send current news items to increase interest in the papers content, and that we limit such articles to 150 words if possible at least keep them brief as possible in order to relate the information intended.
- 2. WHEREAS, the treasurers report shows a minus figure of \$3,256.55 in General Conference Delegate funds, and

WHEREAS, potential plans call for a special General Conference in two years, Be it resolved that the district council be empowered to set one Sunday during the 1966-1967 conference year, at which time a special General Conference Delegate Fund Offering shall be received to meet this urgent need.

- 3. WHEREAS, the 20¢ per member per year for General Conference Delegate Fund has proven to be insufficient to meet the need, BE IT RESOLVED that the rate be set at 30¢.
- 4. BE IT RESOLVED that the financial structure of the N. C. District continue as set forth in the conference Standing rules with the exception of the above resolutions.
- 5. WHEREAS, it is the responsibility of each local church board to review and adjust the Pastor's salary in the light of his work and his needs and the financial status of the local church, and

WHEREAS, the relationship of the District Superintendent and the District Council is a parallel of the relationship of the Pastor and church board in many respects, THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED, that this annual conference of 1966 give the District Council authority to review and adjust the District Superintendent's salary as the Council may deem it wise in fairness to our Superintendent and in the best interest of our District.

#### STANDING RULES

#### CONFERENCE

- 1. Churches are asked to give their pastor a two-week vacation with pay. (1941)
- 2. Churches should see that their delegates to conference conform to standards of the manual. (1954)
  - 3. Local church officers assume their duties the first of July. (1946)
- 4. Local ministers licenses to be renewed are to be sent to the District Superintendent at conference with a recommendation of the local church. (1947)
- 5. Our District Budget shall be 15% of all regular offerings, with the breakdown as follows: District Budget 8%, Bible School 5%, Loan Fund 1%, and Home Missions 1%. (1949)

- 6. District officials shall receive 8¢ per mile for traveling in district business. (1964)
- 7. To help support the District Sunday School work, churches with 50 members and over shall pay \$5.00 annually, and churches with less than 50 members shall pay \$3.00 annually into the Sunday School Board's treasury. (1952)
- 8. Whereas, the conference has established a \$3.00 per member budget for the support of Southern Pilgrim College; and whereas, there is need for additional revenue for operation of said school; therefore, be it resolved: that this conference take action that each church put the Bible School in their budget; and be it further resolved that the churches allow the school representatives to conduct one service in the interest of the school, and that they be allowed to raise a cash offering. (1952)
- 9. The Assistant District Superintendent shall receive \$10.00 for each business meeting held in churches. (1952)
  - 10. Every church in the district is requested to pay the pastor's utilities. (1953)
- 11. The first night session of conference shall be designated for the ordination service of ministers, and the certificate of ordination shall be formally presented at said service. (1954)
- 12. No pastor leaving a charge shall make recommendations to the church board in regards to a successor, and no church board shall contact any minister in regards to the pastorate until they have first met with the District Superintendent and heard his recommendations. All contacts regarding the pastorate shall be made by the Superintendent or by someone having his permission to make such contact. (1965)
- 13. Since actively engaged ministers and wives are entertained free at conference and camp, be it resolved that their children under 18 and unemployed shall also be entertained free. (1954) Licensed song evangelists and Bible school teachers shall be entertained free at camp meeting. (1956) Provided that the minister and wife, the song evangelists and the Bible school teachers are paid up members of the Camp Meeting Association. (1966)
- 15. All conference licensed ministers shall meet the Educational and Examining Boards the day previous to conference; meeting starts at 10:00 a.m. (1955)
- 16. The District Treasurer shall mail a monthly financial report to each pastor and church treasurer which is to be posted in the church. (1956)
- 17. Each church desiring to nominate a lay delegate for International Conference, should do so at their annual meeting preceding the last District Conference before the General Conference. (1956)
- 18. The salary of the District Treasurer shall be \$500.00 a year, and the secretary shall receive \$250.00 a year.
- 19. Whereas, our camp meeting now starts Friday before the first Sunday of August, the pastors who change pastorates, shall preach their farewell sermon the first Sunday after camp meeting, and move that week. (1958, council action.)
- 20. Whereas, we are running a deficit in our International Conference Delegate Fund, therefore, be it resolved that the fund be set at  $30\phi$  a member. (1966)
- 21. The conference bar shall include the platform and the first 15 rows of seats in the tabernacle, excepting the section at the right which shall be reserved for visitors.
- Also, the time of sittings on opening day shall be: 10:00 a.m. until 11:45 a.m., 2:00 p.m. until 4:45 p.m., and 7:00 p.m. until 9:30 p.m. The second day shall be the same except that the conference shall open at 9:00 a.m. (1958)
- 22. In case of death among our ministers' families, the District Superintendent shall notify all Sunday school zone chairmen, who in turn shall notify all pastors in their zone. (1959)
- 23. Due to the heavy load of District Superintendent, the Assistant Superintendent shall be chairman of the Home Missionary Committee. (1959)
- 24. Each church or employee agency shall pay \$2.35 per month to cover part of the members' insurance; the participating member shall pay the cost of all dependents' coverage. (1959)
- 25. Since there is much expense to churches for moving pastors, and since it is done now by the pound; and since it would be a big savings to all concerned; therefore, be it

resolved, that we request each church to furnish their parsonage with stove and refrigerator. (1960)

- 26. Be it resolved that we have four zones for both Sunday school and youth, and that the names of the churches in each zone be printed in the minutes. (1963)
- 27. Whereas our conference ends June 30, be it resolved that July 10 be the deadline for: (1) money to be counted on the Treasurer's annual report; (2) reports accepted by the Statistician; and (3) names be accepted by the Committee on Memoirs. Such coming after July 10 shall not be entered. (1961)
- 28. Be it resolved that where possible the local church pay for their minister's district insurance, and send it in with other monthly payments to the district treasurer. (1963)
- 29. The 1% emergency fund formerly used to pay for the district parsonage shall be used to help finance the purchase of a Youth Camp site, and its development. (1965)
  - 30. The Secretary of district Sunday schools shall be paid \$100.00 per year. (1962)
- 31. The President of the District Youth shall be paid 100.00 per year. (Council action 1962)
- 32. Resolved that the district pay all district insurance of any minister of the North Carolina conference who has reached 65 years of age, and has ceased full-time service, provided he or she has been insured for five years prior to the age of 65, and has given as much as ten years of active service to the North Carolina conference or General church
- 33. The editor of the North Carolina Pilgrim shall receive two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00) annually for his services. (Council action 1964.)
- 34. To help meet the need of the financial load of our camp our churches are asked to contribute according to their financial receipts as follows:

Churches with \$5,000 total receipts contribute . . . \$5.00 annually.

Churches with \$5,000 to \$10,000 receipts, contribute . . . \$10.00 annually.

Churches with \$10,000 to \$20,000 receipts, contribute . . . \$25.00 annually.

Churches with more than \$20,000 receipts, contribute ... \$40.00 annually. (1964)

- 35. Whereas there is a continuing need for the Youth Camp Planning Committee, therefore be it resolved that the District Council appoint this committee annually. It is to consist of two members from the District Council, the Youth President, the Youth Vice president, and the Youth Secretary, and Youth Treasurer, (1965)
- 36. Be it resolved that when the District Secretary mails out the annual report blanks, that he also include a blank to be returned with the reports giving the names of the Sunday school superintendent, Secretary, Treasurer, Youth president, Missionary society president, and the C. Y. C. director.
- 37. The Youth Planning Committee shall be permitted to promote one special offering each year in each church in interest of the Youth Camp Development. The type of offering shall be left to the discretion of the local church. (1965)
- 38. The District Secretary shall annually send greetings from this conference to all ministers who were absent due to serious illness.

#### DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

- 1. Our District Superintendent shall have a two-week vacation with pay. (1941)
- 2. The District Superintendent is the Chairman of the Camp Meeting Board. (1943)
- The District Superintendent, in his annual report, shall list the office salary received plus his traveling expenses. (1958)
- 4. The District Superintendent shall be permitted to conduct two revivals a year other than the home missionary work in his district. (1958)
- 5. The District Council shall have authority to review and adjust the District Superintendents salary as it may deem wise, and in the best interest of our District. (1966)

#### CAMP MEETING

1. The conference shall annually elect the Secretary-Treasurer of the camp. (1941)

- 2. There shall be eight members on the Camp Meeting Board; they shall be elected for a term of four years. (1941)
  - 3. The camp Secretary-Treasurer shall read his report at each conference. (1941)

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

- 1. The District Council shall elect the Sunday School Board of five members.
- 2. They shall be amendable to the District Council.

#### **HOME MISSIONS**

- 1. The Home Missionary Board shall give a copy of the Manual and a one year's subscription to the Advocate to each charter member family of new churches.
- 2. The source of the board's finances shall be: (a) District Home Missionary Fund: (b) public offerings in the service held on the field; (c) personal donations; (d) an appeal to the established church once a year: (e) the board shall have access to the missionary funds of the district; and (f) the expenses of the board may be collected from the home missionary fund. (1955)

#### YOUTH STANDING RULES

1. A \$1.00 registration fee will be charged those receiving entertainment at the youth convention. (1952)

The registration fee for all children under eight years of age, who are accompanied by their parents, will be \$1.00, and those under three years of age will be admitted free. (1961)

- 2. The district shall be divided into four zones for youth work. (1963)
- 3. A district Youth Camp shall be an annual meeting. (1953)
- 4. Offerings received for the Youth Home Missionary Project shall be sent directly to the District Youth Treasurer. (1954)
  - 5. The Executive Youth Secretary shall receive \$100.00 a year. (1957)
- 6. Banners at the Youth Rallies shall be given: (a) for the society with the largest percentage of enrollment present; and (b) for the society having the largest number present. No society may receive both banners, but should a church qualify for both banners, they may choose the banner they prefer. (1959)
- 7. The District Youth Project shall be supported by a liberal offering from each church each quarter. The District Youth Operational Fund shall consist of the offerings from Youth Zone Rallies, one liberal offering each month from each church and income from the annual Youth Conference. The Youth Conference income shall consist of a special offering from each church (\$10.00 from churches of 50 or more members, and \$5.00 from churches of less than 50 members), registration fees and offerings taken during conference. The National Youth Project shall be supported by 5% of all regular offerings of the Youth Society. The National Youth Week offering is to be taken during Youth Week. (1966)
- 8. The attendance cup shall be awarded at the Youth Convention to the church having the largest number of points; points shall be counted for the total attendance for all services, except the business session (when 500 points are to be given to each church represented) multiplied by the miles traveled to the convention, plus points to each person registering, equal to miles traveled from registering church to convention. (1960 An additional 500 points are to be given to those churches who have paid their special Youth Convention offering (\$10.00 from churches of 50 or more members, and \$5.00 from churches of less than 50 members) according to Standing Rule Number 7. (1965)

There shall be a second attendance cup awarded to the church with the highest attendance percentage figured on their Sunday School average attendance. The count shall be taken at all the services except the business. (1961)

The pastor or responsible person appointed by him shall have the count from his church ready to give as a group stands when the roll of the churches is called. (1962)

- 9. Each Zone shall have a minimum of four rallies annually, to be held on the fifth Sunday afternoons. The place and time of said rallies shall be the responsibility of the Zone Chairman, who shall give 30 days' notification of where and when the rally is to be held. (1962)
- 10. The business session of the annual Youth Convention shall be regularly held at the Friday afternoon service, the first session of the Convention. (1962)
- 11. The church who wins an attendance cup for five consecutive years may keep the cup. After 10 years, if no church has won the attendance cup for five consecutive years, then the church that has won the cup the largest number of years, of the 10-year period, may keep the cup. (1965)

#### ANNUAL YOUTH CONVENTION

#### **Business Session**

The business session assembled on June 3 in Olson Hall, on the campus of Southern Pilgrim College, which was the first service of the 1966 Youth Convention. A good group of our fine North Carolina youth were present.

The session began with Mr. David Griffith leading the congregation in singing, "Stand Up For Jesus." Rev. J. B. Stutts youth president brought words of welcome. Rev. Bobby Freeman lead in prayer. Rev. Stutts read greetings from Rev. O. D. Emery, General Secretary of Sunday School and Youth.

The roll call was made by the secretary and there were twenty-seven churches represented. The conference bar was set to consist of the first five rows of seats in both sections.

Rev. Stutts presented Rev. R. S. Shelton who presided over the session. Rev. Shelton first expressed appreciation for all those who had prayed for Mrs. Shelton during her hospitalization and serious time of illness. He then brought a timely message from I Tim. 4:1-15, concerning Paul's advice to Timothy. Paul advised Timothy to be such a young man that no one will dispise you. Be an example of discipline, courage and meditation.

Our youth president then gave his annual report. He mentioned that the youth rallies have improved in quality and attendance. Progress was reported on our youth camp property, such as, a new road, plans for a new building and a loan. Goals for the coming year were stressed in the report. The report closed with this statement: "It is not our duty to merely to survive but to prevail and serve." The report was accepted.

Rev. L. L. Lange reported that he had audited the youth treasurers books and records and found them to balance and adjudged them to be correct. The treasurer Rev. Leon Thompson gave his report, which was accepted.

Reports from the Zone Chairmen were then heard, which showed an increase in the number of zone rallies for the year. The reports were accepted.

There were thirteen local youth societies that gave reports. Reports were given by delegates from the following churches: Archdale, Asheboro First, Bethlehem, Brown's Chapel, Burlington, Dan River, Draper, Greensboro Second, Mt. Zion (Davidson), Randleman, Ramseur, Thomasville, and Winston-Salem. At the end of the reports, a motion was made and seconded that the following statement be included in the minutes: "Be it resolved, that a motion be recorded in the minutes, that the 1966 Youth Convention appreciated the fine reports from the local youth presidents and delegates and the fine quality of the youth who made the reports, and all the wonderful youth of our district.

The Resolutions Committee presented one resolution which carried: Be it resolved that since Mrs. R. S. Shelton has been so faithful and helpful to our youth, a letter of greeting and appreciation be sent by the Recording Secretary to her, a patient at the

N. C. Baptist Hospital. And that a flower also be sent to her to further express our appreciation, for her love and loyal service to the youth of the North Carolina District.

The Ways and Means Committee presented two resolutions that carried: (1) Be it resolved that since the Senior Banquet has not paid for itself and making it necessary to pay the deficit out of the treasurer, that the District Youth Board set the fee for the banquet, in order that, the cost be equally shared by those attending. (2) Be it resolved that Youth Standing Rule No. 7, be changed to read: The District Youth Project shall be supported by a liberal offering from each church each quarter. The District Youth Operational Fund shall consist of the offerings from Youth Zone Rallies, one liberal offering each month from each church and income from the annual Youth Conference. The Youth Conference income shall consist of a special offering from each church (\$10.00 from churches of 50 or more members, and \$5.00 from churches of less than 50 members), registration fees and offerings taken during conference. The National Youth Project shall be supported by 5% of all regular offerings of the Youth Society. The National Youth Week offering is to be taken during Youth Week. (1966).
