A motion prevailed to approve these appointments.

Rev. J. Wesley Adcock was introduced to the Conference.

A motion prevailed that the Conference take a love offering for Bro. Wilson. Bro. Wilson expressed his appreciation of this and for the kindness extended to him during the Camp and Conference.

Rev. P. F. Elliott spoke to the Conference on the Pilgrim Pension Plan.

A motion prevailed to recess until the Council returns with further business.

The Conference convened with the singing of "Blessed Assurance," followed by a few testimonies.

In Memoriam

GRACE McCrORY

Grace McCrory was born near Tyner, Indiana, March 14, 1886 and finished life's journey May 10, 1952. She was converted in a tent meeting in Tyner in 1903 and received local minister's license in 1905. She was a charter member of the Tyner Pilgrim Holiness Church. She preached her first sermon in a Wesleyan Methodist Church near North Liberty in the fall of 1904 and preached for the church for some months through the winter.

Her first pastorate was the Bass Lake church where she filled out the unexpired term of a pastor. With her husband James McCrory, pastorates were filled at Clark's Hill, Rushville, Hartsville, Tyner, College Corner, Connersville, Concord and Noblesville.

She was instrumental in the organizing of the church at Walkerton and at South Bend.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

With gratitude to Almighty God for His mercy and grace and with appreciation to the ministers and laymen, I submit this report to the 49th Annual Conference of the Northern Indiana District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Just one year ago the great Indiana Conference divided, placing 88 churches in the Southern District and 68 churches in the Northern District. It seems the sanction of the Divine upon the division is reflected in the two great Camp Meetings. Perhaps twice as many were in attendance than formerly attended the one camp.

It has been blessed to work with our people, my Assistant, Rev. R. E. Nibarger, and the Council. The Zone chairmen as well as laymen have been co-operative and God has given us a gracious year. It certainly is a joy to labor in the harvest field with so many good people.

Our church is engaged in world-wide evangelism and I have endeavored to acquaint our people with this fact and most churches have stood by with prayer and finance. A few churches have failed to support the District with the District budget. In some places this may be excusable but in others I feel the church could do better. I have taken this matter up with some of the churches and have written others. Perhaps another year every church will pay the District budget. This item is important in that it is divided to the different interests such as the District, Frankfort Pilgrim College, Old Peoples' Home, and District Home Missions.

There is one thing that has greatly distressed me—the apathy and unconcern on the part of some pastors about reporting. If these brethren were employed by some business concern and manifested such indifference, they would be discharged immediately. The Sunday School Committee has done well in sending out reports, but it can only publish the reports it receives.

The Young People under Rev. Robert Addington have done real well. The District Youth Rally was spiritual and practical.

I carried on a three-month daily broadcast on a small Radio station at Warsaw and received many favorable comments for the same. It was through Radio mail that we contacted some good people and as a result have organized a new work at Columbia City. I feel the District should have a broadcast that would cover the entire Northern part of Indiana.

Churches Organized

BELMONT CHURCH IN MUNCIE. The Independent Gospel Tabernacle in Muncie united with our church. This work was started by Rev. Paul Mansfield. They have a splendid church building and have 25 charter members. Rev. Mansfield, desiring to do evangelistic work, resigned and the new church called Rev. John Rice as pastor. They have an average of 51 in Sunday School.

SUNSHINE GARDENS, INDIANAPOLIS. We have had an unorganized group in Sunshine Gardens for several years. They worshipped in a small basement church. Rev. John Eastburn accepted the challenge of this needy field and as a result we dedicated a new church building and organized a church with 7 adult members.

NORTH JUDSON. One of our local ministers, Rev. Mac Allen, with a burden to advance the interests of the church, started prayer meetings in North Judson. Later with the help of a Bro. Harvison, they rented a nice hall in a good location. They are averaging 40 in Sunday School and we organized with 12 members.

COLUMBIA CITY. In Columbia City, Rev. Harold Colen is digging in. We organized with 7 fine members and others are looking our way. We have

leased the second floor of a downtown building and the prospects are bright for a good church in Columbia City. They are averaging 33 in Sunday School.

STRINGTOWN. Rev. Lewis Stroud has been shelling the woods, and we have organized with 8 members and others are looking our way. Rev. G. W. Noel organized this work for me. They have an average of 35 in Sunday School.

Home Missionary Prospects

We have purchased a nice brick church with a small parsonage in Veedersburg. There is no other Holiness Church in this town and under the leadership of Rev. Roy Wilson and with the help of a small but earnest group we hope to establish a good work. The Sunday School averages 28.

At Burlington, Raymond Gamlin and Glen Raney are holding services in a leased building. These young men are making inroads on Satan's territory.

We have prospects for other new works but need much prayer, consecrated and talented workers and money to help erect buildings. It will be remembered that a small percent of our money goes to Home Missions and it is our desire that it be spent where it will do the most good for God's glory.

New Church Buildings and Parsonages

NAPPANEE purchased an eleven room parsonage just before last Conference which has proven a great blessing to the Jewell family.

CRAWFORDSVILLE. A new parsonage is now in process of construction. The pastor and family have been living in the upstairs of the building being used for services but due to the needs of the Sunday School it has become necessary for them to vacate these rooms.

MUNCIE. The Pilgrims here have dedicated a church building which is adequate for the needs of a growing church. This church cost approximately \$40,000. It was started under the leadership of Rev. Angus Jeffers and finished under the present pastor, Rev. Lindley Arnett.

LOGANSPOUT. Here we dedicated a building which cost around \$58,000. This is a beautiful church. Much credit goes to Rev. Carl Reed who pastored here for nine years and Rev. Roy Phillips who labored here for one year. Rev. Ernest Carroll is the present pastor.

UPLAND. The new group of Pilgrims at Upland under the leadership of Rev. Carl Sager has erected a small but impressive church. The work was largely donated and the church cost about \$5,000.00.

GREEN TOWNSHIP. Here the saints decided to move heavenward so they are out of the basement church and are worshipping in a nice frame church building. Rev. Elton Call did much of the work in building the church.

INDIANAPOLIS, WEST. The West Indianapolis church has purchased a nice six room parsonage and is now in need of providing for increased church and Sunday School attendance.

SUNSHINE GARDENS. As I have indicated in my report of new churches, the Sunshine Gardens Church has been dedicated. God bless John Eastburn for his labors of love.

KNIGHTSTOWN. The Pilgrims at Knightstown have erected a beautiful church. This building is meeting a pressing need, and the prospects are good for advancement. Rev. Lincoln Lehue is the aggressive pastor.

It is my earnest desire that this conference make plans to develop a District Home Missionary Loan Fund. Perhaps it will be some years before it is of sufficient strength to meet the demands, yet it is a step in the right direction.

Then it seems plans should be made and a fund developed to build a new tabernacle. You will remember that even after the division of the Conference and the loss of 88 patronizing churches, the tabernacle was still inadequate to hold the crowds.

My Personal Report

Calls on Churches—202, 12 of which were annual meetings and 12 were to Zone Meetings. I have preached 191 times, had 7 funerals, 2 weddings, made 43 business trips or trips in interest of Home Missionary projects. I have baptized 4. I have attended all Camp Board, Council and School Board meetings as well as the meetings of the Zone Chairmen, Sunday School Committee and Youth meetings. I attended two General Board Meetings and one District Superintendent Conference as well as presiding at the District Ministerial Convention. I made one trip East with Rev. Paul Elliott giving a week in the interest of the Program of Evangelism. I have traveled in all approximately 38,000 miles.

My earnest desire is that the Northern Indiana Conference "Go Forward," Spiritually, Financially, and Numerically.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

The Sunday School Committee wishes to submit the following report to the 49th annual conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of Northern Indiana:

The Sunday Schools got off to a good start with a gain in the September general Sunday School Rally with a total attendance of 7,808. This shows a conference gain of 763. This is an encouraging report considering there was only a gain of 9 last year.

Sunday School Conventions were held in the following churches: Indianapolis Central, New Castle, Elwood, Frankfort First, Wabash, and South Bend. Most of these conventions were well attended.

Average based on the sixty-one churches reporting, our yearly average attendance was 5,041. This shows a gain of 172, which is a percentage gain of 3.5%.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

Church Government

1.

Whereas many of our members are not familiar with the actions of the Conference, therefore

Be it resolved that the Pastor shall have a special meeting of his church at the earliest possible date, for the purpose of familiarizing his people with their responsibilities for the Conference year.

2.

We recommend that the annual business of the church be closed on June 30 of each year.

Inasmuch as it is impossible for the local church to send Conference funds to the Conference Treasurer by June 30, we recommend that the Treasurer hold his books open until July 15.

4.

We recommend that each church provide a parsonage with telephone and if possible, other utilities also be furnished as recommended by the Local Church Board.

5.

We recommend that where parsonages are not equipped with heating facilities, window shades, kitchen and bathroom floor coverings that provisions be made for the same by the Local Church.

6.

We recommend that where churches and parsonages are located in cities that the location of the church and parsonage appear in our Minutes. We further recommend if possible, that where parsonages are equipped with phones, that the name of the Pastor and Pilgrim Holiness Church be listed in the phone book.

7.

We recommend that no Local Church Board endorse for Conference license anyone who is not willing to give full time to the ministry of God's Word. We further recommend that the Examining Board pass no candidate for Conference license who fails to give evidence of a Divine Call to the ministry or a willingness to give full time to the same.

8.

Whereas, we have many able-bodied licensed and ordained ministers, who are employed in other than ministerial work, and seldom if ever preach, we recommend that the Examining Board be instructed to draw the lines closer on such individuals and that no one who is not active in the ministry be recommended for ordination.

9.

We recommend that the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper be observed at least once each quarter by our local churches.

10.

We recommend that the Conference Council consist of 9 members comprised of the District Superintendent, the Assistant, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, 5 Advisory members from the District.

11.

Whereas in many of our building projects there seems to be poorly formulated plans due to incompetent committees which has resulted in some poorly constructed buildings, therefore

Be it resolved that before constructing church buildings or parsonages that plans and specifications be approved by the conference council or by a committee appointed by same.

12.

We recommend that the time of voting of the church on its pastor be May 15 to June 15.

14.

Inasmuch as the Resolutions Committee has been approached with the matter of the use of lantern slides and motion pictures in our churches, therefore

Be it resolved that the Northern Indiana Conference go on record as opposed to the use of the same.

16.

Whereas there are some of our churches that are failing to meet their financial requirements, therefore

Be it resolved that the District Superintendent, as he visits his District, shall give this matter careful consideration with each local church board.

17.

We recommend that our District have a Ministerial Convention.

18.

We recommend the questionnaire be continued for our licensed ministers, one copy to be given to the District Superintendent and one to be kept on file by the Examining Board.

19.

We recommend that the District Superintendent with his Assistant together with the Zone Chairmen shall be responsible for the promotion of Home Missionary Work.

Sunday School

1.

The duties of the Conference Sunday School Board in harmony with the manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church shall be as follows:

1. The Conference Sunday School Board, together with Zone Presidents and District Superintendent shall arrange for Sunday School Conventions to be held in respective Zones during the year.

2. To promote and encourage the Sunday School work throughout the Conference.

3. To present an annual report to the Conference which shall include the following:

- a. A statement of the work accomplished during the year.
- b. A statement of the general condition of the Sunday School work in the Conference.

4. The Council shall direct the Conference Treasurer to take care of all expense incurred by the Conference Sunday School Board.

5. The Conference Sunday School Board shall be amenable to the Council.

6. The Council shall have the right to remove, or cause to be removed, any member of the Conference Sunday School Board, who in the judgment of such Council, is not in harmony with the teaching of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

7. If for any reason there is a vacancy on the Conference Sunday School Board, the Council, by a majority vote, may fill the vacancy.

8. The Conference Sunday School Board shall work in conjunction with the General Sunday School Secretary in promoting the annual Rally Day, etc.

9. To have published each quarter a Conference Sunday School sheet showing the attendance of each Sunday School in the Conference for the quarter, this sheet to be sent to each pastor and Sunday School Superintendent in the Conference.

10. We recommend that where possible each local church conduct a summer Vacation Bible School.

Conference

1.

We recommend that only ministers, their wives and unmarried dependent children and lay delegates be given entertainment during Conference. All entitled to this entertainment shall be duly registered and given cards of recognition. For all other entertainment the same rate shall prevail as during Camp Meeting.

2.

We recommend that there be a Publishing Committee composed of the Conference Secretary and two appointee members. It shall be the duty of this committee to publish the Conference Minutes.

3.

We recommend that the Conference Council be responsible for providing needed help for the kitchen and dining room during Conference.

4.

We recommend that the Conference Secretary, at his earliest convenience inform the Chairman of the Special Committees of their respective duties.

We further recommend that within three months said Committee and Boards be required to formulate plans to meet the desires of this Conference.

5.

We recommend that caution be taken to not over-estimate the values of Church property in our Annual Reports.

6.

We recommend that the Conference go on record as interpreting 1 Peter 3:3, where it speaks of the wearing of gold, to mean all rings including wedding and class rings.

7.

We recommend that where a man is advertantly placed on more Boards and Committees than he can well serve that the Conference Council be authorized to make proper adjustment in such Committees.

8.

We recommend that upon the death of a Conference Minister or his wife, that the conference secretary be notified at once, who shall notify all conference pastors by telephone or telegraph.

9.

Whereas the Conference Council has considerable business to care for between conferences and such business is important and more or less unknown to the members of the Conference, therefore

Be it resolved that the Conference Secretary read in review to the assembled Conference the major actions of the Council during the preceeding year.

10.

We recommend that any Minister, who fails to get his annual report to the Conference Statistician by July 31st, shall be referred to the Examining Board.

11.

Inasmuch as we have an active Memorial Committee therefore

Be it resolved that we have a brief memorial service instead of the morning Devotional Service on the second day of Conference.

We further recommend that the Conference Secretary gather the needed information of each of our Ministers by sending out a Questionaire. This information is to be kept up to date by making the needed additions at the close of each conference.

12.

We recommend that the dates of major activities of the Conference and School be in the hands of the Pastors by October 15, 1952.

13.

We recommend that all auditing material be brought to the Auditing Committee by the first Monday of the Camp Meeting.

14.

Whereas in time past much of the work of the Resolution and Ways and Means Committees has had to be done during the conference

We therefore recommend that the proposed resolutions be in the hands of the committees not later than the last Friday of Camp Meeting.

We further recommend that said resolutions and recommendations be mimeographed to be placed in the hands of all delegates.

15.

Whereas the Manual outlines the duties and prerogatives of the Educational and Examining Boards, and whereas commitments to candidates embarrass candidates and embarrass and hinder these Boards in the performance of their duties, be it therefore resolved that no such commitments be made.

16.

Whereas in the past there has been a definite financial need to aid in the erecting of buildings for newly organized churches and whereas, the District Home Missionary financial program is inadequate to meet this need; therefore be it resolved that the following program be adopted:

1. A drive shall be conducted under the direct supervision of the District Superintendent among the churches of the Northern Indiana Conference for the purpose of obtaining pledges for aid in the erection of, or purchase of, church buildings for the newly-organized churches.

2. Pledges shall be taken for \$1.00 or more for each new building erected or purchased. Not more than one call shall be made during any one quarter of the year; all such calls shall be authorized by the conference council.

3. One-half of the amount raised by each call shall be an outright gift to the church for which the call is made; the other half shall be given as a loan which will be repaid to the conference. The payments made on the loan shall go into a loan fund which shall be established and administered by the conference council. The rate of interest on the loans shall be 4%.

Pastoral

1.

We recommend that each pastor be granted a two weeks vacation with pay.

2.

We recommend that pastors of deceased members of our District Conference bring to the Committee on Memoirs a copy of the obituary of the deceased and any other information that is available.

3.

We recommend that no pastor call an evangelist outside of our church without the approval of the District Superintendent.

4.

We recommend that each Pastor keep a record of all names and addresses of the subscribers to the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate in the vicinity of his pastorate and shall endeavor to secure the renewal of each subscription before the date of expiration, and shall secure as many subscriptions as the membership of his church.

5.

We recommend that each church give their pastor the privilege of conducting one revival each year.

6.

We recommend that a Pastoral Call made in a home regardless of the number present be considered as one call.

Young People

1.

We recommend that the Young People's Executive Council, Young People's Zone Chairmen, and the District Superintendent make plans for the District Young People's rally.

Inasmuch as youth work of our district is growing in proportion and increased interest and whereas the preparation for the youth convention entails considerable work, time, and expense, therefore:

We recommend that we have a youth convention to begin on Thursday night and continue through Friday and Saturday, and the election of officers shall be held on Saturday afternoon. The Camp Evangelist shall have the services Friday and Saturday nights.

Zone Work

1.

Inasmuch as the Zone Meetings have been beneficial in advancing the spiritual, educational, and doctrinal interests of the Conference, we recommend they be continued.

We further recommend that the Zone Chairmen be elected by secret ballot by the Ministers and lay delegates.

2.

We recommend that the ministerial convention be responsible for meals (as in former years) and that the committee be given authority to solicit help from the zones of the conference before the convention.

3.

We recommend that the zone chairmen constitute a standing committee to determine the boundaries of the zone, any changes made shall be ratified by the conference.

Miscellaneous

1.

We recommend that immediately following the Conference the Secretary mail to each pastor an itemized postal notice of the financial requirements of the church for the year including general church assessments.

2.

We recommend that 700 copies of the Conference Minutes be provided within 30 days after the Conference adjourns. Each church must send in the money with its order.

3.

We recommend that we have a Thanksgiving Harvest day for the School. Such day shall be set aside for the various zones to bring in canned goods and produce for the School.

4.

We recommend that the Ways and Means Committee and the Resolutions Committee meet at the call of the Chairman of said committees prior to the next Annual Conference. The District Superintendent may also meet with these committees.

5.

Whereas Television programs are a definite hinderance to the spirituality of our people, bringing evil influence into the home

Be it resolved we go on record as opposing the same.

6.

Whereas in the past there has been negligence on the part of some of our ministers in sending in their reports and whereas in section 158 of the manual all licensed or ordained ministers and deaconesses, whether acting as pastors or otherwise, or without regular employment shall make a quarterly report to the District Superintendent of the conference.

We therefore recommend that this ruling of the manual be strictly observed in our conference and all those failing to do so, unless super-annuated, shall forfeit their seat in the conference bar. We further recommend that a yearly report be given to the Examining Board by each candidate appearing before them and those failing to furnish the Examining Board with the yearly report shall forfeit his or her right for ministerial advancement as well as their seat in the Conference bar.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

Local Church Financial

1.

We recommend that the Conference budget consist of 10% of all money raised by the local church, Sunday School and 5% from the Young People's Society, except that raised for Missions, General Budget, building funds, and all funds raised for specified Conference interests. Building fund purposes shall be interpreted to include rent on parsonages and churches and money paid on contracts of the same.

2.

We recommend that the Conference Budget be prorated as follows: Conference Fund, 60%; Old People's Home, 5%; Frankfort Pilgrim College, 17%; Home Missions, 16%; and General Conference, 2%.

3.

We recommend that each church raise five cents per member per month for Home Missionary Work and Church Extension, money to be paid to the Conference Treasurer.

4.

We recommend that each church pay the Frankfort Pilgrim College at the rate of 1% of the annual gross receipts of the local church treasury up to and including \$3,000.00, and 2% for all churches with an annual income over \$3,000.00. Said amount to be paid monthly through the Conference Treasury.

District Financial

1.

We recommend that our Conference stenographer be paid \$30.00 and that the Secretary be authorized to secure additional helpers at the same rate.

2.

We recommend that our District Superintendent be paid a salary of \$85.00 per week, plus mileage at the rate of four cents per mile not to exceed \$1,250.00 for the Conference year.

3.

We recommend that our Assistant Superintendent be paid at the rate of \$12.50 per day plus mileage for each day's service, also District telephone expense.

4.

We recommend that the Conference Secretary be paid \$150.00 for his services for the year.

5.

We recommend that the Conference Treasurer be paid \$300.00 for his services for the year.

6.

We recommend that the Conference Statistician be paid \$75.00 for his services for the year.

7.

We recommend that the standard mileage rate be fixed at four cents per mile.

8.

We recommend that each church raise fifty cents per member per year for the operating expense of the Old People's Home.

9.

Inasmuch as the Pension Plan would entail considerable expense to make it fully operative in our District, we recommend that our District go on record as favoring the plan; We further recommend that the matter be left on a voluntary basis, both as to ministers becoming members and churches desiring to participate in the Pension Plan.

10.

We recommend that our District Superintendent be enrolled in the Pilgrim Pension Plan, if he desires.

Young People's Work

1.

We recommend that each Young People's Society be requested to send an offering for the Young People's Rally to the Conference Young People's Treasurer; also that Churches without organized Societies be invited to send an offering for same.

We further recommend that said offering be sent in at least 30 days prior to the Conference Young People's Rally.

2.

We recommend that each Young People's Society send ten per cent of all money raised in the regular offering to the Conference Young People's Treasurer to finance the work of the Conference Young People's Organization.

2.

Special Sections from the Manual

Section 210, paragraphs 2, 3 and 4:

Those entering a ministerial office shall immediately enter upon the prescribed course of study and pursue same until completed. To this end they shall place themselves under the direction of the District Educational Board, which has charge of this work, unless the same course, or its equivalent, is taken in school.

Examinations required by the District Educational Board shall be submitted in writing and shall be conducted at the time and place of the annual

conference or during the year upon completing of a book or subject either personally or through the mails.

The passing grade of any study shall not be less than an average of 70 per cent.

Section 154:

No person shall be eligible for ordination until first having served at least two years in active ministry.

Section 155:

The licentiate who has held his license at least three years, and has successfully completed the required course of study, shall be eligible for ordination as a minister of the Gospel, unless the district council will have deemed it wise to have ordained before the expiration of the three year period.

Section 149, paragraph 1:

All licensed ministers failing to complete and report on at least two subjects a year in their required Course of Study, for two consecutive years, will automatically forfeit their license, unless in the judgment of the educational board an exception shall be made. The district council shall have power to review and pass upon such action when it deems advisable (Section 109, paragraph 2). With such forfeiture the minister must make his own appeal to the Council without the recommendation of the Educational Board.

The following recommendations were brought in by the Resolutions Committee:

1.

We recommend that at each annual Camp Meeting on the last Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, there shall be one daily session of the Educational and Examining Boards for the purpose of the examination of ministers. All ministers knowing themselves due to appear before these boards are urged to be present.

We further recommend that the time of each session shall be announced from the platform.

Educational Board

Every licentiate sending to any instructor for the 100 study questions is to send in fifty cents for same.

Every licentiate sending to their instructor for examination questions on any books is to send fifty cents for same.

REPORT OF THE CAMP MEETING BOARD

1.

Inasmuch as the State Fire Marshal has required that all wiring must meet the State Code, therefore

We recommend that all buildings on the Camp ground be wired accordingly and that the expense be prorated to the cottage owners.

2.

Any person accepted as a worker by the Camp committee shall be required to pay a registration fee for the camp meeting of \$1.00.

3.

We recommend that conference ministers, their wives, and their dependent children be granted workers tickets for their meals during camp meeting.

We further recommend that those physically able be assigned their respective duties and all failing to fill their assignment shall have their workers tickets forfeited.

4.

We recommend that the camp meeting secretary issue no workers tickets to laymen except such as are authorized by the department superintendents.

5.

We recommend that the camp meeting board pass on all improvements or construction not entailing an expense of more than \$1,000.

6.

We recommend that the camp meeting begin on the second Friday of August each year.

7.

We recommend that all bills for camp meeting purchases be given to the camp meeting treasurer at the close of the camp meeting.

8.

We recommend that all who rent rooms during the camp be advised to bring their own bedding.

9.

We recommend that no lease be bought or sold without the sanction of the proper agent signing the same and that a carbon copy of this contract be kept in the agent's file, the same to be the property of the camp meeting board.

We further recommend that no person be allowed to own two leases and that any person who buys a lease must build within three years or the camp board, at its discretion, may reposses the lot by refunding the purchase price.

10.

We recommend that water and sewer service be installed under the direction of the camp meeting board.

11.

We recommend that the camp meeting board appoint a committee to see that there are but two blue prints made; one showing the plumbing and sewer system, the other showing the wiring of the camp ground and buildings.

12.

Whereas there are new cottages being built and others being remodeled, And whereas there has been no set of rules formulated to govern the same, Therefore be it resolved that a committee of three, composed of the conference secretary, the electrician, and the plumber, formulate a set of rules governing the construction, plumbing, wiring, and remodeling of all privately owned cottages, trailers, etc.

We further recommend that a written permit must be secured from this committee before construction is started;

We further recommend that all cottage owners be notified of this recommendation and that anyone failing to meet the requirements shall be required to make the necessary changes or have their lease forfeited.

(Note—see item 17.)

13.

We recommend that there shall be a fee for each house-car, car, or trailer which is on the camp ground for three months or more during the year, this fee shall be used for the maintenance of roads.

14.

Whereas there is need of improved roads on the camp grounds, we recommend a fee of \$5.00 be collected from all persons owning a car who live on the camp grounds for a period of three months or more during each conference year, said funds collected shall be used exclusively for the improving of the roads, and an equal amount shall be paid by the camp meeting treasurer for this purpose.

15.

We recommend that the camp meeting board appoint an inspector for the camp grounds and buildings. He shall make periodic inspections and shall have the authority to enforce such regulations as may be delegated him by the camp meeting board.

16.

Whereas there is a growing number of cottages being constructed upon the camp grounds, and whereas these cottages and buildings are helping to meet the housing needs of the school, and whereas our properties are part of a non-profit organization, and whereas there is the possibility that some are not aware of the limitations of such an organization and hereby may make charges for the use of cottages which are out of harmony with our organization; Therefore be it resolved that an appraisal committee be appointed by the camp board for the purpose of appraising the camp cottages and trailers, said appraisal to determine the maximum amount of remuneration to be received from the same during the school year.

17.

We recommend that the ground west of the tabernacle which has been designated for camp meeting purposes be sowed in grass, laid off in lots, and leases be sold for the lots.

We further recommend the following rules for construction.

I. CONSTRUCTION

1. All cottages shall be of single story, standard 2x4 frame, tile, or block with 8 foot ceiling height. The roof shall be of gable or hip construction.
2. All cottages shall have a uniform front line, said line to be determined at the time the lots are laid out.
3. No cottage shall be built closer than 3 feet to either side line or to the rear line of the lot.
4. Written permission shall be obtained before any construction is started.
5. Trailers shall not be permitted on lots for permanent use.

II. PLUMBING

1. All plumbing shall conform to the local code and shall be inspected by a person authorized by the camp meeting board.

III. ELECTRIC WIRING

1. All electric wiring shall conform to the National Code and to the rules of the local power company. No connections shall be made to any service line until permission is obtained for such connection from the person authorized by the camp board to grant such connection.

18.

Whereas there is great difficulty in providing rooms for many who desire to attend the camp meeting, and,

Whereas there are some rooms vacant for many days of the camp meeting but which cannot be used because the room superintendent has not been notified as to the time of their occupancy,

Therefore be it resolved that each person having a deposit on a room notify the room superintendent by the first day of the camp meeting of the date of their arrival, and that the room superintendent shall have the right to rent out the room during the time it will not be occupied by the one making the deposit.

We further recommend that the room superintendent shall notify all persons who have deposits made, of the above recommendation and anyone who fails to comply with said recommendation shall forfeit the deposit and room.
