#### JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

Northern Indiana Conference

#### FIRST SITTING-MONDAY MORNING

The Fourth Session of the Northern Indiana Conference convened at Frankfort, Indiana at 9:00 a. m., August 23, 1954. Rev. Gilbert Baker led in singing "Count Your Blessings." Prayer was requested for Mrs. Sturk, wife of General Superintendent L. W. Sturk. Rev. Paul Isgrigg led in prayer. Rev. Wilbur Pottenger read the scripture lesson from the 37th Psalm. In the absence of Rev. Sturk, Rev. F. J. Goins was introduced as Chairman of the Conference for the morning session.

A motion prevailed to establish the Conference Bar as the two center rows of seats back to the third post, six seats on south side, and the platform.

The secretary called the roll.

Rev. Bertha Haas, Rev. and Mrs. D. W. Lacy, Rev. Chester Swayzee and Rev. Gilbert Goins were introduced to the Conference and each testified briefly. A motion prevailed to give these visitors honorary seats within the conference bar with the exception of Rev. and Mrs. D. W. Lacy who are already members of the Conference.

A telegram was received from Mrs. A. H. Wilson stating that Rev. Wilson was in the hospital at Albany, N. Y. in a critical condition. The Conference went to prayer in behalf of this request. A motion prevailed to send word to Rev. and Mrs. Wilson that this conference is remembering them in prayer.

A motion prevailed that the hours of the Conference session be the same as last year: 8:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.; 1:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. and from 7:00 p. m. to 9:00 p. m.

Rev. Floyd Goins, District Superintendent, read his report, which was accepted.

The report of the Conference Statistician was read and accepted. A motion prevailed that whereas the Statistician is moving to another Conference that a hearty "God Bless You" be said in appreciation of his labours.

A partial report of the Auditing Committee was read and accepted.

Consent was given to the Superintendent to add to his report regarding the church improvements at Kokomo First, New Castle, and New Carlisle.

The report of the District Young People's Treasurer was read and accepted.

While waiting for further reports, a number testified and Rev. and Mrs. Gilbert Baker sang "A Little Bit of Heaven Came My Way." More testimonies followed.

The report of the Conference Sunday School Board was read and accepted.

Motion prevailed to recess until 1:30 p. m.

Dismissed with prayer by Rev. E. J. Clem.

#### SECOND SITTING-MONDAY AFTERNOON

The second sitting opened with Rev. Ernest Batman leading the Conference in singing "Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus." Rev. Wallace Marshall read 1st John 3:1-3. Rev. Fay Locke led in prayer.

The minutes of the first sitting were read and approved.

Rev. Ralph Nibarger, Assistant District Superintendent, read his report which was accepted.

Rev. Melvin Snyder, Assistant General Superintendent, spoke briefly to the Conference. Appreciation for Bro. Snyder was expressed by a hearty "Amen."

A partial report of the Examining Board was read and accepted.

The Resolutions Committee distributed copies of its report and a motion prevailed to adopt No. 2 under "Church Government."

A motion prevailed to refer Resolution No. 2 under "Miscellaneous" back to the Committee for further study.

A motion prevailed to delete Resolution No. 1 under "Conference" in 1953 Minutes.

A motion prevailed to adopt Resolution No. 10 under "Conference" with the deletion of Paragraph 1.

A motion prevailed to adopt Resolution No. 2 under "Miscellaneous" in the present Minutes, to be placed under "Conference," and to read "700 copies" instead of "800."

A motion prevailed to adopt Resolution No. 1 under "Young People."

A motion prevailed to table Resolution No. 2 under "Young People."

A motion prevailed to adopt Resolution No. 1 under "Miscellaneous."

A motion prevailed to adopt Resolution No. 1 under "Camp Meeting."

A motion prevailed to adopt Resolutions Nos. 1, 5, and 6 under "Church Government," and place the same under "Standing Rules."

The Resolution under "Sunday School" was amended as follows: That Paragraphs 5 and 6 in the 1953 Minutes be deleted and that Paragraph 9 be changed to read: "To have published each month except July and August a Conference Sunday School sheet, etc." A motion prevailed to place this under "Standing Rules."

A motion prevailed that Resolutions Nos. 5, 6, 7 and 8 under "Conference" be placed under "Standing Rules."

A motion prevailed that Resolution No. 1 under "Miscellaneous" be placed under "Standing Rules."

A motion prevailed that Resolutions Nos. 2, 3, and 4 under "Camp Meeting" be placed under "Standing Rules."

A motion prevailed that Resolution No. 4 under "Conference" be placed under "Standing Rules."

The following Resolution was brought before the Conference by the Resolutions Committee: We recommend that the Chairman of the Educational and the Examining Board meet with two appointed members of each Board, the appointments to be made by the District Council to meet with the Resolutions Committee to work out a proper schedule for the ministerial candidates who are to appear before the Educational and Examining Boards.

A motion was made to amend to read: "the appointment to be made by the District Superintendent."

A motion prevailed to adopt as a substitute motion, "the appointment to be made by the Chairman of these respective boards."

The recommendation as amended was adopted.

The following were appointed by the Chairman of the Examining Board: F. B. Dunn, and Ernest Carroll.

The following were appointed by the Chairman of the Educational Board: Donald Washburn and O. D. Williams.

The Ways and Means Committee distributed copies of its report.

A motion prevailed that Resolution No. 10 under "District Finance" be deleted from the Conference Minutes.

A motion prevailed to adopt the following Resolution under "District Finance" as amended to read: We recommend the publication of the PILGRIM VOICE if continued, the cost of the same to be paid by the district treasurer.

A motion prevailed to delete Resolution No. 5 under "Camp Meeting."

A motion prevailed to adopt Resolutions Nos. 1 and 2 under "Young People."

A motion prevailed to adopt Resolutions Nos. 4 and 5 under "District Finance."

A motion prevailed to pay Bro. Goins the amount of money he has placed in the publishing of the PILGRIM VOICE.

The following were introduced to the Conference: Rev. John R. Bradford of Westfield, Indiana and Rev. William McFarland. Each testified briefly and a motion prevailed to give these visitors honorary seats within the Conference Bar.

Rev. Helen Hammer, returned missionary from Haiti spoke briefly on the missionary work there. Bro. Ralph McCrory testified and Sis. Hammer repeated in Creole.

A motion prevailed to adjourn.

Rev. Ralph Nibarger dismissed with prayer.

#### THIRD SITTING-MONDAY EVENING

The third sitting opened with Rev. Jack Adams leading the Conference in singing "We'll Work Till Jesus Comes." Rev. John R. Bradford led in prayer.

Rev. F. J. Goins introduced Rev. L. W. Sturk, General Superintendent, to the Conference. He spoke briefly.

The minutes of the second sitting were read and approved.

Rev. and Mrs. Angus Jeffers, Rev. and Mrs. Fred Atkinson, Rev. Willis Clock, Rev. and Mrs. J. D. Sturk, and Rev. and Mrs. Gilbert Baker were introduced to the Conference. Each testified briefly and they were given honorary seats within the Conference Bar.

The Auditing Committee gave its final report which was accepted.

The report of the Camp Meeting Treasurer was read and accepted.

The Conference Treasurer read his report and it was accepted.

The following Resolution was presented to the Conference: "We recommend that our District Conference convene on Wednesday, 1:30 p. m. preceeding our District Camp. We further recommend that the Educational and Examining Boards meet for the purpose of examining all candidates for Conference Monday, prior to our Conference. These candidates shall appear as follows: (a) Ist Year Ministerial, Deaconesses, and Song Evangelists, Monday, 9:00 a. m., (b) 2nd Year Ministerial, Tuesday, 9:00 a. m., (c) 3rd and 4th Year Ministerial, Wednesday, 9:00 a. m. We further recommend that any candidate who fails to appear on schedule will automatically forfeit his license for the ensuing year, unless in the judgment of the Educational and Examining Boards an exception be made."

By common consent wording was changed "will automatically have his license suspended for the ensuing year."

A motion prevailed to divide the Resolution into the two following parts: (1) regarding the time of the Conference, (2) regarding the dealing with the candidates for license.

A motion prevailed to adopt the first part of the Resolution, regarding the time of the Conference.

A motion prevailed to adopt the second part of the Resolution, regarding the candidates for license.

The Ways and Means Committee gave its report and a motion prevailed to adopt Resolution No. 2 under District Finance in 1953 Minutes to read "\$90.00" instead of "\$85.00."

A motion prevailed that Conference go into "Committee as a whole."

A motion prevailed to dissolve "Committee as a whole."

A motion carried to extend time to 9:30 p. m.

The report of the Educational Board was read and accepted.

A motion prevailed to delete Paragraphs 1 and 2 under Recommendation 1 (Pg. 42 of the 1953 Minutes.)

A motion prevailed to adopt the following Resolution: "All candidates desiring credit on their course of study must have examination papers in the hands of the instructor by August 1."

A motion prevailed to set time for election of officers to be the order of the day at the beginning of the Tuesday afternoon session.

Conference adjourned by expiration of time.

Rev. L. W. Sturk dismissed with prayer.

#### FOURTH SITTING—TUESDAY MORNING

The fourth sitting opened with a Memorial service for those ministers who had died during the year. Rev. Walter Daugherty led in singing "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms." Rev. E. E. Crowder led in prayer. Rev. James Pursley read the scripture lesson from Revelation, 21:1-7, and 22:1-14. Rev. A. M. Ewing spoke a few words in memory of Rev. G. C. Middleton. Rev. Area Montgomery spoke in memory of Rev. C. G. Taylor and Mrs. Frank Brown. Rev. F. J. Goins spoke in memory of Mrs. Elvin Hotle. Mr. Earl Good, Mrs. Charles W. McHenry and Mrs. Lloyd Montgomery were also included in the Memorial service.

Rev. L. W. Sturk spoke to the Conference on the subject "We are labourers together with Him." He spoke on (1) Our Great Objectives as a Church, (2) Our Controlling Motivation, (3) Our Basic Qualifications. Appreciation for this message was expressed by a hearty "Amen."

A motion prevailed to dispense with the roll call for the remainder of Conference.

The minutes of the third sitting were read and approved.

The following were introduced to the Conference: Rev. Rudolph Moore, Rev. Marvin Young, Rev. Ivan Settles, Rev. James Miller and Rev. E. V. Halt. Each testified briefly. The Conference sang "We'll Work Till Jesus Comes." A motion prevailed to give those who were not already members an honorary seat within the Canference Bar.

The report of the treasurer of the Old People's Home was read and accepted.

The report of Frankfort Pilgrim College was read and accepted.

A motion prevailed that Resolution No. 4 under Church Government be adopted to read: We recommend that our district have a Ministerial Institute, the date to be February 14-18.

A motion prevailed to adopt the following Resolution: We recommend that the time of the ordination service be held Thursday, 7:00 p. m. during Conference.

A motion prevailed to table Resolution No. 4 under Miscellaneous.

A motion prevailed to adopt the following Resolution: We recommend that the Camp Board prepare workers' tickets with proper rules printed on the back of same."

A motion prevailed to delete Resolution No. 7 under Conference.

The following Resolution was adopted: Inasmuch as the time of the Conference has been changed to precede Camp instead of following Camp, be it resolved that the pastors who are changing remain on their present pastorate through the first Sunday after the close of the Camp Meeting.

The report of the joint committee regarding the new camp meeting area was read:

"Item 1. (Minute of the meeting of August 20, 1954.)

A motion was made and seconded that a new camp meeting area be developed on the conference property just north of the West Freeman Road. The motion carried.

Item 2. (Minute of the meeting of August 23, 1954.)

R. E. Nibarger reported to the joint committee for the committee which was appointed to present a tentative plan to the joint committee. The tentative plan proposed (1) that a roadway be constructed around the area, (2) the area be platted for lots for the construction of cottages, and (3) that the tabernacle be located at least 100 feet from the Freeman road. A motion was made and seconded that this report given by R. E. Nibarger be accepted by the joint committee and presented to the conference. The vote was put and the motion carried."

A motion was made that the conference adopt this report of the joint committee. The vote was put and the count showed 142 in favor and 5 opposed. The motion carried and the report was adopted by the conference.

The sitting adjourned by the expiration of time.

#### FIFTH SITTING—TUESDAY AFTERNOON

The fifth sitting opened with Rev. Walter Black leading the Conference in singing "What a Friend We Have in Jesus." Rev. Joseph Miller led in prayer. Rev. Carl Roark read the scripture lesson from Psalms 42:1-8.

The minutes of the fourth sitting were read and approved.

A report of the Examining Board was read and approved.

The District Superintendent appointed the following as tellers for the election: Donald Washburn, Ralph McCrory, William Babb, Thurman Preusz, Estel Eckart, Fay Locke, Robert Addington, and Floyd Gookins.

Before the ballots were cast, the Conference prayed for Divine Guidance, led by Rev. Area Montgomery.

Ballots were cast for the office of District Superintendent. Rev. Floyd Goins was elected on the first ballot.

The following were introduced to the Conference: Rev. E. E. Wells, Rev. Mrs. Luna Leab, Rev. and Mrs. O. W. Barnes. Each testified briefly. A motion prevailed that these visitors be given honorary seats within the Conference Bar after the election of officers.

Ballots were cast for the office of Assistant District Superintendent and Rev. Ralph Nibarger was elected.

Ballots were cast for the office of Conference Secretary and Rev. Carl Reed was elected.

Ballots were cast for the office of Conference Treasurer and Rev. Lester Henry was elected.

The General Superintendent appointed two additional tellers: Walter Daugherty and Carl Sager.

Ballots were cast for members of the District Council and four of the tellers were excused to count the ballots.

A motion was made and seconded that the same men be retained as trustees of the Northern Indiana Conference, namely: F. J. Goins, E. V. Halt, and Ralph Nibarger. The vote was taken and the motion carried.

The following were nominated by the Council to serve on the Examining Board for three years: Ernest Carroll, D. W. Lacy and Guy Mowery.

Ballots were cast and tellers were excused to count.

The following were nominated by the Council to serve on the Educational Board for four years: Ray Martin, Sr., Ernest Batman, and Carl Sager.

The following were elected: Carl Sager and Ray Martin, Sr.

The following were nominated by the Council to serve on the Board of Trustees of Frankfort Pilgrim College: R. E. Nibarger, Carl R. Reed, Lester Henry, G. W. Noel and E. O. Howell. A motion prevailed that the District Superintendent be a member of the Board of Trustees of Frankfort Pilgrim College by virtue of his office.

The tellers reported for the balloting for the Examining Board and the following were elected to serve three years: Ernest Carroll and D. W. Lacy.

The tellers reported on election for Board of Trustees of Frankfort Pilgrim College and the following were elected: G. W. Noel, Carl Reed and R. E. Nibarger.

The following were nominated by the Council to serve on the Sunday School Board: Robert Addington, Fay Locke, Walter Daugherty, Ernest Batman, and R. E. Nibarger.

Ballots were cast and the following were elected: Fay Locke (3 years), Robert Addington (2 years), and Walter Daugherty (1 year).

The tellers reported on the election for member of the District Council and the following were elected: G. W. Noel, Ernest Carroll, E. O. Howell, F. B. Dunn, and Area Montgomery.

Conference recessed until 4:00 p. m.

The time and place was set for various zones to elect Zone Chairmen and Young People's Chairmen.

The following were appointed to the Ordination Committees by the General Superintendent: F. J. Goins, R. E. Nibarger, E. V. Halt, F. B. Dunn and E. O. Howell.

The sitting adjourned.

#### SIXTH SITTING—TUESDAY EVENING

The sixth sitting opened with the Ordination Service. The candidates were Delbert Fletcher, Ray Martin, Jr., Ernest Batman and Edward Kirkpatrick. The congregation sang "I Love to Tell the Story" led by Rev. Gilbert Baker. Rev. Lloyd Montgomery led in prayer. The congregation sang "Take the Name of Jesus With You" and "A Charge to Keep I Have." Fev. F. B. Dunn read 2nd Timothy 4:1-8. Rev. R. E. Nibarger read 1 Timothy 3:1-10. Rev. F. J. Goins led in prayer. Rev. L. W. Sturk addressed the Conference on "The Preacher's Price of Success." The candidates knelt at the altar and Rev. Sturk with the Ordination Committee ordained them to the ministry by the laying on of hands and the ordination charge by the General Superintendent. The congregation sang "We'll Work Till Jesus Comes."

A brief service for the dedication of ministers babies was held. Rev. F. J. Goins read Matthew 18:1-6. Rev. and Mrs. Gilbert Baker sang "Jesus Loves Me." Rev. Sturk, Rev. Goins and Rev. Nibarger dedicated the babies to the Lord.

Because of the illness of Mrs. Sturk, wife of the General Superintendent, he asked to be excused and have Rev. Floyd Goins act as Chairman for the remainder of the Conference. This desire was granted and a love offering of \$45.29 was given to Rev. Sturk.

The District Superintendent read the Committee appointments.

Wilbur Pottenger was appointed as Conference Statistician.

The following were appointed to serve on the Resolutions Committee: Gilbert Noel, Guy Mowery, Broadus Deal, Chester Wilkins and Ray Martin, Sr.

The following were appointed to the Ways and Means Committee: Carl Roark, Paul Isgrigg, Landis Bradfield, Ralph McCrory and Marvin Jewell.

The following were appointed to serve on the Committee on Memoirs: Mrs. Ernest Carroll, Mrs. E. O. Howell and Mrs. Dale Williams.

The following were appointed to the Auditing Committee: Robert Addington, John Sheets, and Ernest Batman.

The following were appointed to the Reception Committee: Eugene Schenck, Elton Call and J. C. Brillhart.

The following were appointed to serve on the Devotional Committee: Estel Eckart, Clyde Moreillon and John Mosier.

The minutes of the fifth sitting were read and approved.

The Committee on Memoirs read its report and it was accepted.

The Ways and Means Committee gave a report and the following Resolution was adopted: We recommend that the District Council launch a drive in our churches to raise money to build the new tabernacle.

A motion prevailed to adopt the following Resolution: Inasmuch as the Rally Day offerings were instituted at such time as the General Sunday School Department was not included in the General Budget, and since the General Sunday School Department is now supported through the General Budget, we therefore recommend that one-half of the Rally Day offerings be given to District Sunday School expense.

The following Resolution was presented to the Conference: That the two Sundays of Camp Meeting not be counted by any Sunday School of the Conference in the annual average attendance.

A motion prevailed to adopt a substitute motion as follows: "All that attend the Sunday School session at Camp be counted in their Sunday School attendance for that Sunday."

The following were appointed by the District Council to the Campmeeting Board: F. J. Goins, Fay Locke, Chester Wilkins, O. D. Williams, John Eastburn, Broadus Deal, Lester Henry, Gilbert Pegg, Floyd Gookins, G. W. Noel, R. E. Nibarger, T. J. Preusz, Raymond Street, Clarence Klopfenstein, Carl Roark and Ray Martin, Sr.

A motion prevailed to reconsider the action taken regarding the Ministerial Convention, namely: "We recommend that our District have a Ministerial Institute, the date being February 14-18."

There was a lengthy discussion.

A motion prevailed to cease discussion.

The vote was taken and the matter was brought up for reconsideration.

A motion prevailed to consider the Resolution in two parts, namely: (1) regarding the method and (2) regarding the date.

A motion prevailed to have the Convention on the 3rd Tuesday of April beginning at 10:00 a.m. and closing following the Thursday afternoon session.

A motion prevailed to have a Ministerial Institute instead of a Convention.

A report of the action of the Council on ministers that failed to meet educational requirements for the year was read and accepted.

A motion prevailed to recess for a short time.

The Conference reconvened and the report on the placement of pastors was read and accepted.

A motion prevailed that each individual shall pay for his own meals at the Ministerial Institute.

A motion prevailed that the District Council shall decide the place for the Ministerial Institute.

A motion prevailed that the Burlington Pilgrim Holiness Church be received into the Northern Indian Conference.

A motion prevailed that the Council take care of all unfinished business. The Conference sang "Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow."

The minutes of the sixth sitting were read and approved by the District Council.)

(Rev. Ray Martin, Sr. was appointed to the Resolutions Committee and the Council substituted Gilbert Pegg because Brother Martin had been elected to the Examining Board.)

## In Memoriam

#### G. C. MIDDLETON

Green Clay Middleton was born October 13, 1862 and finished his earthly ministry Feb. 13, 1954. He was converted at Okawville, Illinois in 1888 and united with what is now the Pilgrim Holiness Church in 1897. His first sermon was preached in Okawville from Romans 6:23. Conference license was granted in 1897 and he was ordained as a minister in the Holiness Christian Church at the conference of 1899.

During his ministry he served the following pastorates: Noblesville, New London, Frankfort, First, Leisure, Merom, Orleans, Shoals, Hope, Hartsville and Greensburg. While at Shoals he constructed the present church building. Twenty-one years were spent in active evangelism. He also served as Presiding Elder in the Holiness Christian Church for three years and was Chairman of the Examining Board for 16 years.

Failing health caused him to cease full time ministerial work in 1933

and he came to the Shoemaker Memorial Home, where he spent the rest of his life. However he was far from inactive during those closing years but took every opportunity to preach offered. His zeal for God and the interests of the kingdom never wavered or waned and his final testimony at conference carried a blessed note of victory.

#### CARY G. TAYLOR

Cary G. Taylor was born June 12, 1870 and ended life's journey January 24, 1954. He was converted in December of 1891 at New London and united with the church in 1896. His first sermon was preached at New London in 1895 and he was ordained to the ministry in 1897.

He served as pastor of the Courtland Avenue Friends Church, University Church at Olivet, Kingswood, Ky., and Georgetown, Ill. His greatest contribution to the cause of the kingdom was no doubt made in the field of education. He served as teacher and president of Bible Schools for 39 years. In the Indiana District he served on the District Council, as a District trustee, as chairman of the Educational Committee for many years.

In the General Church he served as a member of the General Board, as a member of the Board of Education, and as the secretary of the Publishing Board. For a time he was editor of "Gleams of Truth" and the "Advocate."

The church will long reap the benefits of the far-reaching influence of this versitile man of God. Many christian workers are in the field today whose lives have been molded under the spiritual leadership of Brother Taylor.

#### STANDING RULES

#### Church Government

1

The pastor shall meet with his church at the earliest possible date after the close of conference, for the purpose of familiarizing his people of the actions of this conference. 2

The annual business of the local church shall close on June 30 of each year and the Treasurer shall hold his books open until July 15.

3.

Each church shall provide a parsonage with telephone and, if possible, other utilities also be furnished as recommended by the Local Church Board.

4.

In case the parsonage is not equipped with heating facilities, window shades, kitchen and bathroom floor coverings, provision shall be made for the same by the Local Church.

5.

Where churches and parsonages are located in cities the location of the church and parsonage shall appear in the Minutes, and where parsonages are equipped with phones, the name of the Pastor and Pilgrim Holiness Church both be listed in the phone book.

6.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper shall be observed at least once each quarter by our local churches.

7.

The time of voting of the church on its pastor shall be May 15 to June 15.

8

We recommend that before new construction or major remodeling of church buildings or parsonages that plans, specifications, and financial appraisements be approved by the conference council or by a committee appointed by the same.

9.

We recommend that the questionnaire prepared by the examining board be filled in by each applicant for conference license, one copy to be given to the examining board, and one copy to the district superintendent.

10.

We recommend that the district superintendent with his assistant together with zone chairman shall be responsible for the promotion of home missionary work.

#### CONFERENCE

1.

Only ministers, their wives and unmarried dependent children and lay delegates are to be given entertainment during Conference. All entitled to this entertainment shall be duly registered and given cards of recognition. For all other entertainment the same rate shall prevail as during Camp Meeting.

2.

There shall be a Publishing Committee composed of the Conference Secretary and two appointee members. It shall be the duty of this committee to publish the Conference Minutes.

3

This Conference goes on record as interpreting I Peter 3:3, where it speaks of the wearing of gold, to mean all rings including weddings and class rings.

4.

Upon the death of a Conference Minister or his wife the Conference secretary shall notify the Zone Chairman, who shall inform the pastors of his zone.

5.

We shall have a brief memorial service instead of the morning Devotional Service on the second day of Conference.

The Conference Secretary shall gather the needed information of each of our Ministers by sending out a Questionnaire. This information is to be kept up to date by making the needed additions at the close of each annual conference.

6.

All auditing material shall be brought to the Auditing Committee by the first Monday of the Camp Meeting. (This item overlooked in change of conference date.)

7.

When a man is inadvertantly placed on more Boards and Committees than he can well serve the Conference Council shall make proper adjustment in such Committees.

8

We recommend that the Conference Secretary, at his earliest convenience inform the Chairman of the Special Committees of their respective duties.

We further recommend that within three months said Committee and Boards be required to formulate plans to meet the desires of this Conference.

0

We recommend that any Minister, who fails to get his annual report to the Conference Statistician by July 31st, shall be referred to the Examining Board.

10.

We recommend that the Conference Secretary inform the pastors of the dates of major activities of the Conference and School by October 15, 1954.

11.

We recommend that we have a Thanksgiving Harvest Day for the School. Such day shall be set aside for the various zones to bring in canned goods and produce for the School.

12

We recommend that the Ways and Means Committee and the Resolutions Committee meet at the call of the Chairman of said committee prior to the next Annual Conference. The District Superintendent may also meet with these committees.

#### PASTORAL

1.

Each pastor shall be granted a two weeks vacation with pay.

2.

No pastor shall call an evangelist outside of our church without the approval of the District Superintendent.

#### CAMP MEETING

1.

Conference ministers, their wives, and their dependent children shall be granted workers tickets for their meals during camp meeting and those physically able shall be assigned their respective duties and all failing to fill their assignment shall have their workers tickets forfeited.

2.

The camp meeting secretary shall issue no workers tickets to laymen except such as are authorized by the department superintendents.

3.

The camp meeting shall begin on the second Friday of August each year.

4.

All bills for camp meeting purchases shall be given to the camp meeting treasurer at the close of the camp meeting.

5

We recommend that no lease be bought or sold without the sanction of the proper agent signing the same and that a carbon copy of this contract be kept in the agent's file, the same to be the property of the camp meeting board.

6.

We further recommend that no person be allowed to own two leases and that any person who buys a lease must build within three years or the camp board, at its discretion, may repossess the lot by refunding the purchase price.

We recommend that water and sewer service be installed under the direction of the camp meeting board.

0

Whereas there are new cottages being built and others being remodeled, And whereas there has been no set of rules formulated to govern the same, Therefore be it resolved that a committee of three, be appointed by the camp meeting board and that said committee formulate a set of rules governing the construction, plumbing, wiring, and remodeling of all privately owned cottages, trailers, and other buildings.

We further recommend that a written permit must be secured from this committee before construction is started.

We further recommend that all cottage owners be notified of this recommendation and that anyone failing to meet the requirements shall be required to make the necessary changes or have their lease forfeited.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL

1.

The duties of the Conference Sunday School Board in harmony with the manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church shall be as follows:

- 1. The Conference Sunday School Board, together with Zone Presidents and District Superintendent shall arrange for Sunday School Institutes to be held in the respective zones during the year.
- To promote and encourage the Sunday School work throughout the Conference.
- 3. To present an annual report to the Conference which shall include the following:
  - a. A statement of the work accomplished during the year.
- b. A statement of the general condition of the Sunday School work in the Conference.
- 4. The Council shall direct the Conference Treasurer to take care of all expense incurred by the Conference Sunday School Board.
- 5. If for any reason there is a vacancy on the Conference Sunday School Board, the Council, by a majority vote, may fill the vacancy.
- 6. The Conference Sunday School Board shall work in conjunction with the General Sunday School Secretary in promoting the annual Rally Day, etc.
- 7. To have published each month a conference Sunday School Sheet showing the attendance of each Sunday School in the Conference for the month, except July and August, this sheet to be sent to each pastor and posted on the bulletin board.
- 8. We recommend that where possible each local church conduct a summer Vacation Bible School.

#### MISCELLANEOUS

1.

We recommend that immediately following the Conference the Secretary mail to each pastor an itemized postal notice of the financial requirements of the church for the year including general church assessments.

#### DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the 1954 Conference of the Northern Indiana District, I submit the following report. It has been a pleasure and privilege to serve the church in the capacity of a District Superintendent. I keenly feel my inability to adequately fill the office, yet I have enjoyed working with you. I have appreciated the Assistant Superintendent, Council Members, Camp Board Members and other committees with whom I have counseled and labored.

OUR YOUTH. The young people over the District have responded graciously to proper leadership and have given evidence of cooperation and progress.

THE DISTRICT YOUTH RALLY was a blessed event. Due to a conflict I was forced to be away. Rev. Nibarger, my able assistant who carried my part of the Convention informs me the Convention was a grand event.

YOUTH CAMP. Perhaps this Conference will make provision for a Youth Camp next year. Our children are worth all we can invest in them.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL. We are not too happy about the fact, "Our gain was poor in 54." Yet it will be remembered we had a 11% gain last year. Our percentage gain in Sunday School this year was only 2%, and we merely held our own in church membership.

OUR HOME MISSIONARY PROGRAM. Elsewhere in this report I will mention the new church buildings and parsonages. We must keep the Home Missionary Loan Fund growing, and in another year a number of new churches should be launched. This year one church was organized, at Burlington, Indiana. A building has already been purchased and regular services are being held. This church will be received into this Conference.

PROPORTIONATE SUPPORT. There are many urgent appeals for money that come to the pastor as well as members of the church. These are all worthy of support, in fact, we are under obligation to proportionately support each department and institution. The pastor should help the church realize the need of supporting the whole program.

The report will indicate that more churches neglected the District Budget than any other item. While this is called District Budget, a part of it goes to our Zone School and a part to the Old Peoples Home. It is hoped that another year every church will pay its District Budget. No church should make large pledges to any interest unless it is able to carry a part of its District responsibility.

NEW TABERNACLE. Due to the decision of the District Council the Penny-a-meal plan was not launched last year. I feel the time is ripe to launch an all-out drive to raise the necessary money and build the tabernacle this year. Our facilities are altogether inadequate for our growing Camp and this matter has been postponed until we are getting unfavorable reaction.

OUR PROGRESS IN BUILDING PROGRAMS. From the standpoint of new church buildings and new parsonages this has been my best year.

HOWARD'S CHAPEL. The Pilgrims at Howard's Chapel began building a new church last year. It is completed at a cost of near \$20,000.00 and was dedicated shortly after last Conference. Bro. Ralph Hamilton, the pastor, is happy over the fact they are nearly out of debt.

MONON. Bro. Estel Eckart was reluctant to stay longer in Monon due to limited church facilities, but he accepted the challenge. A new church is completed with new pews and automatic gas furnace at a cost of about \$15,000.00. There is a total indebtedness on church and parsonage of \$12, 000.00. Part of this is financed by a Monon Bank and we need to borrow some to finance the balance.

LA PORTE. It was almost winter when construction was begun on the new building at LaPorte. But now the building is near completion. It is built in front of the present building and the old building will be used for a Sunday School annex. This church was built at a cost of \$6,000.00, and a total indebtedness of \$5,450.00 remains. God bless Bro. Babb for his faithfulness.

LA GRANGE. Perhaps here is the most unusual building in that they have a nice new church 30x60 and had paid as they builded. The attendance is small and much of the money was prayed in or given sacrificially. Much credit goes to Bro. Tarner who worked incessantly on the project.

COLUMBIA CITY. Following last Conference Columbia City, under the direction of Bro. Colen also started to build. They completed a nice basement and have been worshipping in it since the first of the year. Harold Colen and his family have now gone to St. Kitts and Wallace Marshall and his wife are carrying on the work there.

INDIANAPOLIS, WEST. After last Conference, with great faith in God, Bro. Street and his people dug a basement and started to build. They have a splendid basement church, fireproof in every respect. While worshipping in the basement they are continuing the erection of the Church proper. Chester Wilkins is giving them worthwhile assistance in that he is doing the masonry work.

INDIANAPOLIS, NORTH. In addition to the new church buildings, the Indianapolis Northside Pilgrims have nearly doubled the size of their church. They held the cost down to less than \$10,000.00. The pastor, Carl Sager, and the members did much of the work.

WABASH. The church at Wabash has extended their church and basement some 20 ft., installed new windows, new plastering, new hardwood floor and then brick veneered the entire building. In fact, they practically have a new church. This work was under the oversight of the good pastor, Rev. Guy Mowery.

ELWOOD. At this time Rev. Fay Locke is just finishing laying the stone on the new addition to the Elwood church. When completed they will have a church 87x50 ft.

FRANKFORT, FIRST. Under the leadership of Bro. Preusz the Frankfort First Church has been completely redecorated and during this Camp new furniture and pews are being installed. This is a much needed improvement.

KOKOMO, PURDUM STREET. The Purdum Street Church has taken steps to enlarge its facilities by the purchase of the property next to the church. This property is being used for a Sunday School annex and the church looks forward to a building program to enlarge the church building.

NEW CASTLE. The New Castle Church has installed a new heating plant and new pews.

NEW CARLISLE. The New Carlisle Church has, in fact, been made over. The ceiling has been lowered, the church has been rewired, new floor installed, and completely redecorated. This work has been under the direct supervision of the good pastor, Rev. Clarence Klopfenstein.

PARSONAGES. We have added four new parsonages to the District, Noblesville, Swayzee, Green Township and Fort Wayne. Then both Winches-

ter and Lafayette have sold their old parsonages and have bought nice homes adjoining their churches. The Winchester church has also carpeted the entire church auditorium at a cost of \$2,200.00. The church at Lebanon is in the process of remodelling the old building into a nice modern parsonage. They have completed a new basement and have moved the church building back on the basement.

OUR NEED OF NEW BUILDINGS. We have at least eight churches that need a new building or expansion program, Grant St., Marion, South Marion, Alexandria, McCarty St., Indianapolis, Prospect St., Indianapolis, Valley View, Anderson North and North Judson. Let us hope the District Loan Fund will grow rapidly.

PERSONAL ACTIVITIES. I have made 217 visits to churches, 16 of which were for Zone meetings and 21 for Annual meetings. With few exceptions I have met with each Advisory Board one or more times. I have preached 203 times, made 34 business trips. I have attended 4 Council Meetings, 2 Camp Board Meetings, 3 School Board Meetings, 1 Meeting of Zone Chairmen, 2 Meetings of the Joint Trustees, 4 Meetings of the Tabernacle Committee, 3 times with Ministerial Institute Committee, 2 General Board Meetings, 4 Meetings of the Committee on General Conference, the Superintendent's Conference, the District Sunday School Institute, the Regional Sunday School Institute, the District Ministerial Institute, and the General Conference. I have met with the Youth and Sunday School Committees and served as Chairman of the Old Peoples Home Board with general oversight of the Home. I preached one funeral and assisted in five others. I held one Camp and two Ministerial Meetings. I dedicated two churches and two parsonages. I have visited each church two times and 38 of them three times and have been able to give each church a Sunday visit.

I pray God to bless this Conference as you chart the course we will follow next year. Perhaps our greatest need is a revival of Old Time Religion in each local church. May we carry the spirit of the 1954 Campmeeting which is now history to each of our churches and give ourselves to prayer and fasting as well as labors of love and believe God for the greatest year in our history.

#### REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

The Conference Sunday School Board desires to submit the following report to the Fourth Annual Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of Northern Indiana.

Looking back, it seems that the trend for the entire year was set in the fall Rally Day. Our numerical successes were not so great as the previous year. No pep sessions or conventions were held prior to Rally Day.

In January the Sunday School Committee with our District Superintendent, Rev. F. J. Goins and Sister Lynn as convention speakers, covered the district with a convention in each Zone. These conventions were well attended and the speakers well received. Their messages were both inspirational and challenging.

Our General Secretary of Youth and Sunday School, Rev. P. F. Elliott, challenged our hearts the first Sunday of Camp and Rev. F. J. Goins spoke with vigor and enthusiasm the second Sunday, urging the Sunday School personnel of this great conference to do greater things for the Lord this conference year.

40 schools, out of 72, showed a gain. 26 of these 40 enjoyed a gain of ten percent or more and were awarded a "10% Blue Ribbon."

"Achievement Awards" were given to two schools—Lebanon—highest numerical gain, and Swayzee—highest percentage gain.

Numerical gains for the first three are as follows:

There were 72 schools reporting with an average attendance of 6,201—a 2% gain. All schools have reported. If every school above 75 had at least held their own, the gain would have been 5 or 6%.

#### REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

#### Church Government

7

Whereas there is an increasing tendency to cheapen the gospel by way of religious entertainment, we recommend the conference go on record as opposed to the use of lantern slides and movies in our churches.

2.

Whereas there are some of our churches that are failing to meet their financial requirements, therefore:

Be it resolved that the District Superintendent, as he visits his District, shall give this matter careful consideration with each local church board.

3.

We recommend that our District have a Ministerial Institute, the date to third Tuesday in April at 10:00 a.m. and close after the afternoon session on Thursday.

#### Conference

1

We recommend that our district conference convene on Wednesday at 1:30 p. m. preceding our district camp.

We further recommend that the educational and examining boards meet for the purpose of examining all candidates for conference license Monday, prior to our conference.

These candidates shall appear as follows:

- First Year Ministerial, Deaconesses, and Song Evangelists, Monday 9:00 a. m.
- b. Second Year Ministerial, Tuesday 9:00 a. m.
- c. Third and Fourth Year Ministerial, Wednesday 9:00 a. m.

We further recommend that any candidate who fails to appear on schedule will automatically have his license suspended for the ensuing year, unless in the judgment of the educational and examining boards an exception should be made.

2.

We recommend that the Pastor who fails to meet his District Budget be requested to appear before the District Council giving an explanation why.

3

We recommend that the present home missionary Loan Fund continue and that the district superintendent encourage persons to make pledges as follows:

- 1. Pledges shall be taken for \$1.00 or more for each building erected or purchased. Not more than one call shall be made during any one quarter of the year; all such calls shall be authorized by the Conference Council.
- 2. One-half of the amount raised by each call shall be an outright gift to the church for which the call is made; the other half shall be given as a loan which will be repaid to the conference. The payments made on the loan shall go into a loan fund which shall be established and administered by the Conference Council. The rate of interest on the loans shall be 4%.

4

Whereas the Manual outlines the duties and prerogatives of the Educational and Examining Boards, and whereas committments to candidates embarrass candidates and embarrass and hinder these Boards in the performance of their duties, be it therefore resolved that no such committments be made.

5

Whereas there has been some misunderstanding concerning the sending of funds collected by the missionary societies and whereas the Manual provides the proper procedure to be followed:

Therefore, be it resolved that all funds collected by the missionary societies be sent through the local church treasury to the District Treasurer, said funds to be specified for the particular interest for which it was raised.

#### **Pastoral**

1.

We recommend that each pastor keep a record of all names and addresses of the subscribers to the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate in the vicinity of his pastorate and shall endeavor to secure subscriptions equivalent in number to his membership roll.

#### Young People

1.

We recommend that the youth committee formulate plans for a young people's gathering, separate from the District Camp, and that said plans be submitted to the District Superintendent and Council for ratification.

#### Zone Work

1.

Inasmuch as the Zone Meetings have been beneficial in advancing the spiritual, educational, and doctrinal interests of the Conference, we recommend they be continued.

We further recommend that the Zone Chairmen be elected by secret ballot by the Ministers and lay delegates of the Zone.

2.

We recommend that the zone chairmen constitute a standing committee to determine the boundaries of the zone, any changes made shall be ratified by the Conference.

#### Miscellaneous

1

Inasmuch as the name of the street in front of Valley View Pilgrim Holiness Church, Indianapolis, Indiana, has been changed and inasmuch as the church has requested a change in their name to conform to said street, be it resolved that this conference authorize the church to change to the Evanston Avenue Pilgrim Holiness Church.

2.

We recommend that 700 copies of the Conference Minutes be provided within 30 days after the Conference adjourns. Each church must send in the money with its order.

3.

Whereas television programs are a definite hinderance to the spirituality of our people, bringing evil influence into the home:

Be it resolved we go on record as opposing the same.

#### Camp Meeting

1.

We recommend that all who have a deposit on a camp meeting room notify room superintendent of the date they will arrive. We further recommend that all renters bring their own bedding.

2.

We recommend that the camp board prepare workers tickets with proper rules printed on the back of same.

3

We recommend that the ground west of the tabernacle which has been designated for camp meeting purposes be sowed in grass, laid off in lots, and leases be sold for the lots.

We further recommend the following rules for construction.

#### I. CONSTRUCTION

- All cottages shall be of single story, standard 2x4 frame, tile, or block with 8 foot ceiling height. The roof shall be of gable or hip construction.
- 2. All cottages shall have a uniform front line, said line to be determined at the time the lots are laid out.
- 3. No cottage shall be built closer than 3 feet to either side line or to the rear line of the lot.
- Written permission shall be obtained before any construction is started.
- 5. Trailers shall not be permitted on lots for permanent use.

#### II. PLUMBING

 All plumbing shall conform to the local code and shall be inspected by a person authorized by the camp meeting board.

#### III. ELECTRIC WIRING

 All electric wiring shall conform to the National Code and to the rules of the local power company. No connections shall be made to any service line until permission is obtained for such connection from the person authorized by the camp board to grant such connection.

#### REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

#### Local Church Financial

.

We recommend that the Conference budget consist of 10% of all money raised by the local church, Sunday School and 5% from the Young People's Society, except that raised for Missions, General Budget, building funds, and all funds raised for specified Conference interests. Building fund purposes shall be interpreted to include rent on parsonages and churches and money paid on contracts of the same.

2.

We recommend that the Conference Budget be prorated as follows: Conference Fund, 60%; Old People's Home, 5%; Frankfort Pilgrim College, 17%; Home Missions, 16%; and General Conference, 2%.

١.

We recommend that each church raise five cents per member per month for Home Missionary Work and Church Extension, money to be paid to the Conference Treasurer.

We recommend that each church pay the Frankfort Pilgrim College at the rate of 1% of the monthly gross receipts of the local church treasury where said gross receipts are less than \$250.00 per month, and those churches

with a monthly gross income of \$250.00 or more shall pay an amount equal to 2% of such gross income. Said payments to be made each month through the Conference Treasury.

#### District Financial

1

We recommend that our Conference stenographer be paid \$30.00 and that the Secretary be authorized to secure additional helpers at the same rate.

2

We recommend that our District Superintendent be paid a salary of \$90.00 per week plus utilities, not to exceed \$350.00 per year and traveling expense at the rate of four cents per mile, not to exceed \$1,250.00 for the Conference year.

We recommend that our Assistant Superintendent be paid at the rate of \$12.50 per day plus mileage for each day's service, also District telephone expense.

We recommend that the Conference Secretary be paid \$175.00 for his services for the year.

We recommend that the Conference Treasurer be paid \$520.00 for his services for the year.

We recommend that the Conference Statistician be paid \$75.00 for his services for the year.

We recommend that our Sunday School Promotional Secretary be paid \$50.00 for his services for the year.

8.

We recommend that the standard mileage rate be fixed at four cents per mile.

9.

We recommend that each church raise fifty cents per member per year for the operating expense of the Old People's Home.

10.

We recommend that our District Superintendent be enrolled in the Pilgrim Pension Plan, if he desires.

11.

We recommend that if the publication of the "Pilgrim Voice" be continued, the same to be paid by the district treasurer.

12.

We recommend that the District Council launch a drive in our churches to raise money to build the new tabernacle.

13.

Inasmuch as the Rally Day offerings were instituted at such a time the General Sunday School Department was not included in the General Budget, and since the General Sunday School Department is now supported through the General Budget, we therefore recommend that half of the Rally Day offerings be given to District Sunday School expense.

#### Young People's Work

1.

We recommend that each Young People's Society be requested to send an offering for the Young People's Rally to the Conference Young People's Treasurer; also that churches without organized societies be invited to send an offering for same.

39

We further recommend that said offering be sent in at least 30 days prior to the Conference Young People's Rally.

We recommend that the district Young People's Officers be paid four cents per mile while traveling for district Young People's business, the same to be paid out of the Young People's treasury.

We recommend that all Young People's Societies send 10% of all money raised in the regular offerings to finance the work of the Conference Young People's Organization; we further recommend that all money raised be paid through the local and district treasurer.

#### Camp Meeting

Ľ.

We recommend that the District Superintendent appoint a committee of three, one of whom shall have a knowledge of real estate values, to appraise each cottage, to be rented and to set up an equitable schedule of rental fees.

Be it further resolved that in the setting of a fair rental fee for each cottage, the committee will take account the current value, the cost of upkeep, interest on investment, insurance, depreciation, and consideration if furnished.

Be it further resolved that the rental fees set by the committee will go into effect at the beginning of the next rental period immediately following the receipt of the notification of the rental schedule on the part of the cottage owner.

Be it further resolved that the District Superintendent cause each property owner to be notified as to the ceiling rental fee he may charge for his cottage.

Be it further resolved that any cottage owner who charges rent in excess of the ceiling price set by the committee will automatically forfeit his right to rent the cottage.

Be it further resolved that the cottage owner shall have the right to appeal to the district council in case he feels that the rental fees set by the rental committee is unfair to his interests.

2

We recommend that any person accepted as a worker by the camp committee shall be required to pay a registration fee for the camp meeting of \$1.00.

We recommend that the camp meeting board pass on all improvements or construction not entailing an expense of more than \$1,000.00.

We further recommend that any improvement or construction amounting to over \$1,000.00 be passed upon by the camp meeting board and District council.

Whereas, there is a need of improved roads on the camp grounds, we recommend that a fee of \$5.00 be collected from all persons owning a car or mobile home, who live on the camp grounds for a period of three months or more during each conference year, said funds collected shall be used exclusively for the improving of the roads, the same to be collected by the Frankfort Bible College treasurer.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS

As a Conference, we are thankful to God for a glorious camp meeting and for our evangelists, Rev. G. R. Castevens and Rev. Wm. Hannan, who gave such good scriptural messages under the annointing of the Holy Spirit. We are rejoicing over the many souls who found God.

The inspirational songs and competent work done by the Singing Chatfields was a real blessing and all enjoyed the organ music by Miss Marilyn Noel and Mrs. R. K. Storey.

Thanks be unto God for Sister Lynn, her excellent work with the children, and the enjoyable program which they gave in the tabernacle.

The entire camp appreciates the faithful service of Brother Clem who has had charge of the Ring Meeting for the last forty-one years.

We would suggest that our Conference Secretary be authorized to send letters of appreciation to Station WCBC for their courtesy in extending to us the privilege of broadcasting our Sunday morning services, to Mr. Fox, of the Lafayette Journal Courier, and to the Frankfort Morning Times for their good coverage of the camp meeting.

We thank the Farnkfort Pilgrim College for allowing the Camp to use the lovely new furniture which the Alumni Association purchased for the school.

We want to recognize the District Council, the Camp Meeting Board, the faithful workers in the dining room and the police force, and for the cooperation of everyone which made for the fellowship and sweet spirit which prevailed.

We praise God for the privilege of having our General Superintendent, Dr. L. W. Sturk, to preside over our Conference and for our District Superintendent, Rev. F. J. Goins, who presided until the arrival of Dr. Sturk.

# SEE SPECIAL SECTIONS FROM THE MANUAL

All licensed ministers failing to complete and report on at least two subjects a year in their required Course of Study, for two consecutive years, will automatically forfeit their license, unless in the judgment of the educational board an exception shall be made. The district council shall have power to review and pass upon such action when it deems advisable (Section 108, paragraph 2.) With such forfeiture the minister must make his own appeal to the Council without the recommendation of the Educational Board.

The following recommendations were brought in by the Resolutions Committee:

1.
