In Memoriam

JAMES E. KERBY

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

FIRST SITTING—WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON—AUGUST 10, 1960

SECOND SITTING—WEDNESDAY, 7:00 P.M., AUGUST 10, 1960

The Second Sitting opened with Rev. William Smith in charge of devotions. Rev. Elvin Powers led the congregation in singing "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms," "When the Roll is Called Up Yonder," and "Whisper a Prayer."

FIFTH SITTING—THURSDAY, 7:00 P.M., AUGUST 11, 1960

The opening of the Fifth Sitting was devoted to the foreign missionary activities of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, and was under the direction of Rev. Charles Lewis. Rev. Rev. Lewis then introduced Mrs. C. G. Keith who spoke briefly of the effectiveness of carrying out the command "Go ye into all the world." Unless we go literally, or through others, we cannot claim "Lo, I am with you always."

Rev. Snyder called for the members of the District Council and the missionaries present to lay hands on the outgoing missionaries, Rev. and Mrs. Robert Smith. Prayer for Mrs. Smith was offered by Mrs. C. G. Keith, and for Rev. Smith, by Rev. Melvin Snyder.

Rev. R. E. Nibarger admonished the Conference to share the burden of getting the Gospel to the foreign lands.

The bar was cleared and General Superintendent Melvin H. Snyder took the chair.

Due to the lateness of the hour, a motion prevailed to defer the reading of the minutes of the Fourth Sitting until tomorrow.

The Ways and Means Committee continued its report.

Resolution No. 4 and Substitute Resolution No. 2 were read. Motion prevailed to discuss the Youth Resolution No. 4.

A motion was made and carried to extend the time until this Resolution is taken care of.

Motion made and seconded for previous question. Motion carried.

Motion to accept the Youth Resolution was seconded. The vote was questionable and the Chair asked for a count vote. The count was taken and the motion lost.

The Sitting adjourned after various announcements were made. Dismissal prayer was offered by Mr. Richard Fletcher.

SIXTH SITTING—FRIDAY, 8:30 A.M., AUGUST 12, 1960

The Sixth Sitting was called to order by Rev. William Smith, in charge of the devotions. Rev. Wayne Preusz led the Conference in singing "There Is a Fountain Filled With Blood," and "I Will Praise Him." God showered His blessing upon the Conference, and several rose to give praise to God.

Rev. Walter Daugherty led in prayer, bringing a number of special requests to the Throne of Grace.

Rev. J. C. Williams read the 23rd Psalm for the Scripture lesson. The District Superintendent placed the burden of the District Council before the congregation and asked that Rev. R. K. Storey lead the Conference in prayer. The volume of prayer was followed by shouts of victory and praise for answered prayer, as hearts were lifted in singing " 'Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus."

General Superintendent Snyder took the chair. Rev. R. E. Nibarger requested Rev. Mrs. Bertha Schoeff, who has attended 50 Conferences of this District, to testify.

The Reception Committee presented Rev. Harold Colen, Rev. Lee Mattox, and Rev. Edgar Marshall, who were introduced to the Conference.

Since Harold Colen and Lee Mattox were members of the conference, a motion prevailed that Edgar Marshall be granted honorary seat within the Conference bar.

A motion carried to dispense with the roll call.

Minutes of the Fourth Sitting were read. Motion to approve the Minutes as corrected was carried.

Minutes of the Fifth Sitting were read and approved.

General Superintendent Snyder introduced the following evangelists to the Conference:

The Ways and Means Committee presented a resolution under District Finance, recommending that the Secretary-Treasurer of the Insurance program be paid \$75.00 for the work done the past year.

A motion was made and carried that we delete No. 3 under "Young People's Work."

The Resolutions Committee presented Resolution No. 11 of the Youth Conference, and motion was carried that it be adopted.

The order of the day being the election of officers, the following tellers were appointed by the District Superintendent:

Rev. Robert Biberstine, Rev. Creston Eckart, and Rev. Ray Martin, Jr., Rev. Wayne Preusz, and Rev. Elvin Powers.

Substitute tellers were appointed for Rev. Ray Martin, Jr., and Rev. Biberstine respectively.

Ballots were cast for the office of Assistant District Superintendent. Rev. D. W. Lacy was elected on the first ballot.

The District Secretary read the nominees of the District Council for the office of District Secretary, as follows: Rev. E. C. Gafford, and Rev. Carl R. Reed. Rev. Carl Reed was elected on the first ballot.

The District Secretary read the following names as nominees of the District Council for the office of District Treasurer: Rev. Lester Henry, Rev. G. W. Noel. The balloting resulted in the election of Rev. Lester Henry on the first ballot.

The Memoirs Committee report was read by Mrs. Ernest Carroll. The report was received with a hearty "Amen."

The General Superintendent urged the Conference to be careful in the coming national election, that our vote not close the doors to the spreading of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

The report of the tellers revealed that Rev. Ernest Batman and Rev. Paul Isgrigg were elected to the Educational Committee for terms of three years each.

A motion authorizing the District Council to read and approve the minutes of the last Sitting of the Conference, was carried.

A motion prevailed to authorize the District Council to take care of any unfinished business of this Conference.

Invitations for the Ministerial Convention were offered by Bethany Church, Indianapolis, Logansport, and Marion First Church. The invitation from the Bethany Church was accepted by standing vote.

The District Secretary presented the nominees of the District Council for Trustees of Pilgrim Bible College, as follows: Rev. O. D. Williams, Rev. Ernest Carroll, Rev. Carl Roark, Rev. D. W. Lacy, Rev. Lester Henry, and Rev. Chester Wilkins. Three persons to be elected. It was agreed the election to be by plurality vote.

Due to the expiration of time, a motion prevailed to extend the time until the ballots were cast.

The tellers reported the following advisory members were elected to the District Council: Rev. O. D. Williams, Rev. Ernest Carroll, Rev. G. W. Noel, and Rev. T. J. Preusz.

A motion was carried to vote on the next three highest names to elect the fifth Advisory member of the District Council. Names thus nominated were Rev. Guy Mowery, Rev. R. K. Storey, and Rev. Russell Wooten.

A motion prevailed that the Sitting be adjourned and a brief sitting be reconvened at 1:30 p.m.

The sitting was dismissed with prayer by Rev. T. J. Preusz.

SEVENTH SITTING—FRIDAY, 1:30 P.M., AUGUST 12, 1960

The Seventh Sitting was called to order by General Superintendent Melvin H. Snyder, and Rev. Elvin Powers led the conference in singing "Deeper, Deeper." Prayer was offered by Rev. Vard Van Briggles.

Minutes of the Sixth Sitting were read. A motion carried to approve the Minutes as read and corrected.

The tellers reported on the balloting for the fifth advisory member of the District Council, that there was no election. A motion made that the vote be on the two highest names—Rev. Guy Mowery and Rev. R. K. Storey. The motion carried.

Ballots were cast for the advisory member of the Council.

The tellers reported the election of trustees of Frankfort Bible College, as follows: O. D. Williams, D. W. Lacy, Rev. Lester Henry, elected on the first ballot.

District Superintendent Nibarger reported the placing of pastors for ensuing year.

The Sunday School Board as appointed by the District Council was named by the District Secretary: Rev. Ray Martin, Jr., Chairman and Promotional Secretary; Rev. Walter Daugherty, 1 year; Rev. Raymond Street, 2 years; Rev. William Babb, 3 years.

Report of the balloting for the fifth advisory member of the District Council stated Rev. Guy Mowery as elected.

District Superintendent Nibarger made the following appointments of committees for the ensuing year:

Reception: Rev. R. K. Storey, Rev. Landis Bradford.

The tellers read the results of the original balloting of advisory members of the District Council, as requested.

A motion prevailed to re-elect the trustees of the Northern Indiana Conference.

Revs. R. E. Nibarger, F. J. Goins, E. V. Halt.

Inasmuch as our next Conference is the time when we vote on Memorials to the General Conference, a motion was made and seconded that the District Superintendent appoint four persons to serve with him as a committee to present Memorials to the Conference of 1961. The motion carried.

It was suggested by the Chairman that the various zones meet immediately after the adjournment of this Sitting and elect their new Zone Chairman.

Words of appreciation for all those who have helped to make this Conference accomplish its goals, were given by District Superintendent Nibarger. He spoke particularly of the fine leadership of General Superintendent Melvin H. Snyder. A rising vote of thanks including a resounding "God bless you," expressed the sentiment of the Conference.

After various announcements, the Conference adjourned with prayer by General Superintendent Melvin H. Snyder.

JOURNAL OF THE DISTRICT YOUTH CONFERENCE

SATURDAY, JULY 23, 1960

The Pilgrim Holiness Youth Conference of the Northern Indiana District convened on Saturday, July 23, 1960, at 9:30 A.M. Congregational singing, conducted by Rev. Elvin Powers, was followed with prayer led by Rev. William Babb. Rev. Wayne Preusz introduced Rev. J. D. Abbott, the General Secretary of Sunday Schools and Youth, to the Conference, who then addressed the Conference briefly concerning the "Demands of Today's Youth." These demands, as Rev. Abbott pointed out, are honesty, a good conscience, virtuous language, and youth who pray.

Rev. Abbott then presided over the Conference.

The roll call was taken. Present were Rev. R. E. Nibarger, District Superintendent, 23 pastors, 14 local youth presidents, one local vice-president, and 30 delegates.

The voting bar was established as the two middle sections of seats in the front of the tabernacle.

The minutes of the 1959 Youth Conference were read and accepted.

The District Youth Treasurer's report was not given due to the absence of the treasurer. This report is to be presented to the District Youth Council and subsequently posted with the minutes of this Conference.

Reports of the year's activities were given by the zone youth leaders of Zones 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7.

Motion carried to accept these reports.

Reports were given by the local youth presidents concerning their individual societies.

Rev. Elvin Powers, secretary, read the resolutions presented by the Policy Committee. The following resolutions were accepted:

1. Be it resolved; that the District Youth Council appoint a committee, which shall formulate plans for our Youth Camps, such plans to be approved by the District Youth Council. The chairman of this committee shall be the Director of these camps. Final approval of the plans is to be given by the District Council.
2. Be it resolved; that we have two Youth Camps, a Junior Boys and Girls Camp, (ages 9 to 12) and a Teenage Camp, (aged 13 to 19). The Junior Camp shall be the week preceding the Teenage Camp.

Be it further resolved that a Youth Rally and Conference follow the Teenage Camp on Friday night and Saturday.

3. Be it resolved; that there be an annual clean-up of the camp grounds preceding the youth camps, to be financed by the District Youth.

4. Be it resolved; that this Youth Conference go on record as urging all pastors and youth presidents to co-operate with the District Youth President by striving for an organized society in each church.
5. Be it resolved; that the Zone Youth Leaders shall be responsible for sending material for the Pilgrim Youth Voice to the District Youth President.
6. Be it resolved; that item number 6, reading that there shall be a Youth Convention Board composed of the District Youth Officers and the Youth Zone Leaders, be deleted.
7. Be it resolved; that we recommend that the District Youth Council appoint a committee to investigate and adopt, if practical, a district youth radio broadcast using the tapes supplied by the General Youth Office.
8. Be it resolved; that we recommend that the District Director of Youth Camps attend a youth camp institute, if possible, with all expense paid.
9. Be it resolved; that there be three youth leaders' institutes with Muncie First, Frankfort First, and Nappanee as suggested locations. The times of these institutes shall be determined by the District Youth Council.
10. Be it resolved; that each zone make provision for a spring rally in the interest of District Youth promotion.
11. Be it resolved; that this youth conference requests permission to change the time of the youth service during the district camp from 1:15 to 6:00, beginning with the 1960 camp.
12. Be it resolved; that we request that the District Conference set aside a section in the District Minutes for all Youth Conference legislation, said section to be entitled, "Youth Conference Minutes."
13. Be it resolved; that each zone recommend nominees for Zone Youth Leader to the District Council.
14. Be it resolved; that the Zone Youth Committee be made up of the Zone Officers, pastors, and local youth presidents of the particular zone.

Report of the Ways and Means Committee was read by Rev. Elvin Powers, secretary. The following resolutions were accepted:

1. Be it resolved; that item number 1 reading, "We recommend that each Young People's Society be requested to send an offering for the Young People's Rally to the Conference Young People's Treasurer; also, that churches without organized societies be invited to send an offering for same" be deleted.
2. Be it resolved; that we recommend that the District Youth Officers be paid six cents per mile while traveling for District Youth business, the same to be paid out of the District Youth Treasury.
3. Be it resolved; that we recommend that the Youth Conference budget be paid according to church membership as follows:

25 members or under	\$.50 per month
26-50 members	1.00 per month
51-75 members	1.50 per month
76-100 members	2.00 per month
101 or more	2.50 per month

We further recommend that said payments be made quarterly through the Conference Treasury.

4. We recommend that whenever the finance of the District Youth Work is not sufficient for the Young People's Convention, etc., that the district underwrite the youth work not to exceed \$250.00.

5. Be it resolved; that the District Youth Project for the coming year to be provide refrigeration and a shelter for the water fountain.

Statistical report by Rev. David Smith, District Youth Statistician, was read and accepted.

Tellers were appointed by Rev. Wayne Preusz preceding the election of officers. Those elected are as follows:

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

To General Superintendent, Dr. Melvin Snyder, Pastors, Evangelists, Delegates and Friends of the Tenth Annual Conference of the Northern Indiana District.

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Through another year I have found that the promises of God have been a source of unflinching strength. While in many places over the district the flu was a great hindrance, God has kept me free from it all, to God be our praise.

I am certainly glad for the group of workers on the District, who on the whole have accepted the challenge of their charge. They have been able, under God, to go forward. As I have traveled from place to place I have found a general atmosphere of spiritual progress. In many churches God has given outstanding revivals. Naturally I have found pastors with heart-rending burdens because of certain conditions, but pressing forward never-the-less.

The enrichment of my own life through the fellowship with our many pastors, evangelists and local churches, cannot be placed in writing. Many of us seem to sense the forces of opposition pressing upon the "True Church" today and are praying for God, not only to continue to help as He has in the past, but visit us with a revival that will stir us to more forceful action against sin and all wrong doing.

I am glad for the many reports, not only of revivals as I mentioned above, but for the many times that pastors have reported spontaneous praise and testimony services ending in a good altar service. We need mighty outpourings into our souls privately, and into our churches publicly, if we survive and gain in this conflict. We are living in wonderful, yet fearful days, because of the deadening and blighting effects the world and modernistic trends are having on holiness churches. However, we must realize that if we are to continue to make spiritual and numerical gains, we must exhibit a greater sacrificial spirit than ever before. I have not reached all the goals that I desired to reach this year, but I thank God and the faithful Pilgrims and friends for whatever progress has been made.

Temporal Improvements

Since last conference there has been considerable work done by the various churches and reported.

ANDERSON, NORTH, purchased a new parsonage and installed a new gas boiler, also are finishing the church basement into Sunday school rooms.

BEECH GROVE, installed a new automatic heating system and excavated and finished the basement of the church.

BROWN'S CHAPEL, installed new furnace, redecorated the church and tiled the floor of the new annex.

DELPHI, completed the new church, finished the inside and stoned the outside. They had a beautiful dedication service.

FRANKFORT FIRST, installed a new heating system and has remodeled with new rest rooms and a beautiful nursery. Also put paneling around the wall of auditorium.

HAMMOND, completely remodeled the interior, installed Sunday school rooms and a new heating system.

HUNTINGTON, has planned an addition to their church and are moving the parsonage across the street to a new lot.

INDIANAPOLIS PROSPECT and SECOND have decided to unite their efforts and sell their present property and have already contracted for a beautiful church on Shelby Street, owned by the Bethany Evangelical Lutheran Church. This will be a great boost to the south part of Indianapolis.

INDIANAPOLIS RIVERSIDE, sold the church property at 21st and Gent Streets and are now building a new church in Eagle Dale Addition where there is approximately four thousand new homes.

INDIANAPOLIS, EVANSTON AVE. They are about to finish construction on the new stone church, which will grace the northern part of the city.

INDIANAPOLIS, NORTH CENTRAL, has installed a new furnace and completely redecorated the interior of the auditorium and remodeled the platform.

INDIANAPOLIS, WARREN PARK. They have repainted the church and done additional work upon the building making it a bright spot in their section.

KOKOMO PURDUM STREET. They are now building a much needed and planned addition to their church, which will present itself as an entire new and large place to worship the Lord.

LAPEL, has built a new platform and tiled their church floor, giving it a new appearance throughout.

MARION SOUTH, has of late began to go forward with their building program by pouring a new floor and installing new aluminum windows in the new annex.

MICHIGANTOWN. Built a new kitchen onto the parsonage and two new rest rooms onto the church, making it a modern plant.

NEW CARLISLE. Bought a new parsonage, next to the side of the church and using the old parsonage for a Sunday school annex.

NORTH JUDSON, has begun to pull over the hill, which has been a long struggle, by installing steel arches and a new insulate roof decking and roof. They are happy because of the progress. God bless the faithful folk.

TYNER. This church has caught a new vision and has installed new entrance and two splendid Sunday school rooms.

NEW CHURCH SIGNS and BULLETINS have been erected at Lafayette, Delphi, Indianapolis, Warren Park; Elwood, Frankfort, Woodside; Hammond, and Marion, First.

Youth

I wish every person here could have visited the Youth Camps. The behavior and spiritual interest was very good. The Youth Council and leaders did a splendid job and the speakers and teachers and all were enjoyed and appreciated.

Church Extension

With the recommendation from the local churches, District Council, and General Superintendents, efforts have been made to merge some of our works and relocate some others in fields with greater and riper harvests, time has been given to this field of thought and labor.

Two new parsonages have been bought and a new church is being built and another bought in Indianapolis.

No new churches have been organized this year. However, three or four places seem feasible in the future. I am tremendously concerned for this phase of the work and am praying that we shall be able to set up a more energetic and fruitful program for digging out new works.

Recommendations

I would like to recommend that we take steps to build a new lunch stand and formulate definite plans for future need of our great camp, including much needed rest rooms and accommodations for those attending the camp.

I would like to also recommend that every pastor and pastor's wife guard themselves against the modern trend of our day, regarding our appearance as leaders, praying and believing God for a real spiritual awakening until revival fires will be kindled and burning in every congregation.

Lastly, but not to be forgotten, I would like for every church, pastor and board earnestly endeavor to meet their financial obligations to the General church, District obligations and to Frankfort Pilgrim College.

It has been a great pleasure to work with Rev. D. W. Lacy, Assistant Superintendent, and the District Council. Also the School board of F.P.C. and the various committees including the Zone leaders, Youth leaders, and Sunday school committee.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

The Conference Sunday School Board submits the following report to the Tenth Annual Conference of the Northern Indiana District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

At the outset of the year the Sunday School Board met and laid plans for visiting each zone of the District, presenting the needs of the Sunday School as were revealed by the Standard of Excellence, which came to us from the General Department of Sunday School and Youth.

The visits to each of our zones were very gratifying, as well as very revealing. On these visits we shared with those who were present our present weaknesses as were revealed by the Standard of Excellence, and encouraged each school to work on these deficiencies and bring them up to par. Also, we were able to introduce new literature for the high school students, as well as the nursery group, which are coming to us now from our own general church headquarters.

Along with keeping records of the Sunday School for the year, the Promotional Secretary has also compiled a graph listing the progress of each Sunday School over a period of years, beginning with 1946-1947 up to this present conference year, 1959-1960. Also, a graph has been made revealing

the progress of our District over that period of years. The graph shows that the Northern Indiana District in the last 15 years has had a steady growth year after year with no declines, and producing a 51% gain over the last 15 years.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTION COMMITTEE

Church Government

1.

The pastor shall meet with his church at the earliest date after the close of conference, for the purpose of familiarizing his people with the actions of this conference.

2.

The annual business of the local church shall close on June 30 of each year and the district treasurer shall hold his books open until July 10.

3.

Each church shall provide a parsonage with telephone and, if possible, other utilities also shall be furnished as recommended by the local church board.

4.

In case the parsonage is not equipped with heating facilities, window shades, kitchen and bathroom floor coverings, provision shall be made for the same by the local church.

5.

Where churches and parsonages are located in cities the location of the church and parsonage shall appear in the Minutes, and where parsonages are equipped with phones, the name of the pastor and Pilgrim Holiness Church shall both be listed in the phone book.

6.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper shall be observed at least once each quarter by our local churches. We further recommend that each church shall have a baptismal service each Conference year for those who qualify and desire the rite of baptism.

7.

Inasmuch as there seems to be considerable confusion in the placing and calling of pastors due to the diversity of methods and procedures being used and insisted upon by the churches, therefore be it resolved that a form of procedure to serve as a guide for the calling of pastors be established as follows:

- a. Let all of the meetings pertaining to the recalling of a pastor be held during the last full week in May.
- b. If the pastor resigns, or is not recalled, the result of the meeting should immediately be forwarded to the superintendent by the church secretary.
- c. If the pastor is recalled he can have the legal time established by the manual to accept or reject the call and he shall then immediately inform the superintendent of his decision.
- d. In the event the pastor is leaving, whatever the circumstances, the superintendent shall present either in person, writing, or through an authorized representative the list of available ministers with recommendations that naturally fall within the jurisdiction of the superintendent.
- e. It shall be the privilege of the local board and the church to immediately call a man on the basis of the superintendent's recommendation without having a trial message.
- f. In the event the board and church desire a trial message, the board shall make a choice of a candidate. If two or three candidates are chosen, they should be designated as first, second, and third choice.
- g. After the trial message of the first candidate, there shall be a vote on the candidate within a reasonable length of time, preferably immediately.
- h. If the first candidate is not called, or refuses to accept the call, the same procedure shall be followed with the second and third candidate.
- i. In no case shall a second candidate be called to preach a trial message until a vote has been taken by the board and the church on the first candidate.
- j. Let all ministers leaving their present charge consider their ministry to a church as ending according to the manual—the Sunday following conference or camp, and all moving shall take place the following week.

8.

Before new construction or major remodeling of church buildings or parsonages is begun, plans, specifications, and financial appraisalment must be approved by the District Council or by a committee appointed by the same.

9.

Due to an increasing tendency toward religious entertainment, this conference goes on record as opposed to the use of lantern slides and movies in our churches.

10.

The District Ministerial Convention shall convene on the third Thursday in April at 9:00 a.m. and continue through Friday.

11.

Any church calling a minister for a trial sermon shall pay, at least, his traveling expense.

13.

Any local church wishing to do so may pay from unspecified foreign missionary money that part of the United Stewardship Fund which pertains to foreign missions which is 20% of the entire fund. Furthermore, any local church wishing to do so may pay from unspecified general church extension funds that part of the United Stewardship Fund that pertains to General Church Extension which is 14% of that fund.

This is to be made effective only when the local church has made up the balance of the United Stewardship Fund for the current month.

14.

All funds raised by the local church for district and general interests are to be sent to the District Treasurer. These said funds are to be specified for the particular interests for which they are raised.

15.

Whereas there has been no official method of tabulation of attendance of branch Sunday Schools and the mother churches, be it resolved that this method be adopted:

- a. The attendance at the mother church should be recorded in the usual manner.
- b. All persons attending the branch Sunday School shall be counted, including the members of the mother church.
- c. These figures of attendance shall be reported separately.

16.

Whereas the district records indicate that several of our church properties are not deeded according to the manual, be it resolved that this conference request each local church board of the district to check the wording of their property deed and urge those churches whose deeds are faulty to have them recorded according to the requirements of the 1958 manual.

17.

Whereas the minister's wife makes a vital contribution to her husband's work, therefore we recommend that the wife of a candidate for ordination be given an honorary seat with the candidate during the ordination service.

18.

Whereas we recognize the value of the Minister's Institute, as offered by the college, for training the licensed ministers of our church, we recommend that if the college states credit shall be granted by the educational board; that they work in co-operation with the board when the plans for the institute are formed.

Conference

1.

Only ministers and lay delegates shall be given entertainment during conference. Ministers' wives and children will be issued worker's tickets. For all other entertainment the same rates shall prevail as at Camp Meeting.

2.

This conference goes on record as interpreting I Peter 3, where it speaks of the wearing of gold, to mean all rings, including wedding and class rings. (See Manual: Section 77; Paragraph 1-4).

3.

Upon the death of a conference minister or his wife the conference secretary shall notify the zone chairman, who shall inform the pastors of his zone.

4.

We shall have a brief memorial service instead of the morning devotional service on the second day of conference. We further recommend that we have a picture of each deceased with a brief account of his ministerial activities in the subsequent issue of the Conference Journal.

The Conference Secretary shall gather needed information of each of our ministers by sending out a questionnaire. This information is to be kept up to date by making the needed additions at the close of each annual conference.

5.

All auditing material shall be sent to the Auditing Committee by the Monday preceding conference.

6.

When a man is inadvertently placed on more boards and committees than he can well serve, the conference council shall make proper adjustments in such committees.

7.

The conference secretary, at his earliest convenience shall inform the chairman of the special committee of their respective duties.

Within three months said committees and boards are required to formulate plans to meet the desires of this conference.

8.

The minister who fails to get his annual report to the conference statistician by July 25th shall be referred to the examining board.

9.

A Thanksgiving Harvest Day for the school shall be observed. Such day shall be aside for the various zones to bring in canned goods and produce for the school.

10.

Our district conference shall convene on Wednesday at 1:30 p.m. preceding our district camp.

The Educational and Examining Boards shall meet for the purpose of examining all candidates for conference license Monday prior to conference.

The candidates shall appear as follows:

- a. Monday, 1:30 p.m.—First Year Ministerial, Deaconesses, and Song Evangelists. (Names from A to M).
- b. Monday, 7:00 p.m.—First Year Ministerial, Deaconesses, and Song Evangelists. (Names from N to Z).
- c. Tuesday, 8:00 a.m.—Second Year Ministerial.
- d. Tuesday, 1:30 p.m.—Third and Fourth Year Ministerial.
- e. Wednesday, 8:00 to 10:00 a.m.—Final Meeting.

Any candidate who fails to appear on schedule will automatically have his license suspended for the ensuing year, unless in the judgment of the educational and examining boards an exception should be made.

According to the ruling of General Superintendent, Rev. R. G. Flexon in 1959 Conference, all candidates who fail to appear according to schedule

and who have not been excused by the Educational and Examining Boards will cease his ministerial standing at 10:00 a.m. Wednesday and will thus not have voice or vote in the conference.

11.

The pastor who fails to meet his district budget shall be requested to appear before the District Council giving an explanation.

12.

Whereas the Manual outlines the duties and prerogatives of the Educational and Examining Boards, and whereas commitments to candidates embarrass candidtes and embarrass and hinder these Boards in the performance of their duties, be it therefore resolved that no such commitments be made.

13.

Each Church shall send the names of its lay delegates to the District Secretary not later than July 15th.

14.

The Conference Council shall continue the publication of the "Pilgrim Voice."

15.

The District Council shall present six names from which three trustees of Frankfort Pilgrim College may be elected. The District Superintendent by virtue of his office shall be the fourth member of the Board of Trustees.

16.

Every church board and pastor shall be more careful about the recommendation of candidates for conference license. All candidates who may be in question, if in the judgment of the local board such candidate has possibilities, the recommendation shall be made with reservations.

All recommendations shall be mailed to the chairman of the Examining Board.

17.

Each pastor shall inform his people that legislation protects their employment rights and also protects them against discrimination in their place of employment when they refuse to work on Sunday. The Conference also goes on record as opposed to the growing tendency of Sunday shopping and we will do all within our power to encourage legislation against same.

18.

This conference goes on record as being opposed to the legalizing liquor traffic in all its forms. We recommend that our ministers and lay members lend their support to encourage legislation in favor of prohibition by returning such questionnaires as they receive to proper legislators.

19.

Whereas it is difficult to grasp the full meaning of the propositions of the Resolutions and Ways and Means Committee when they are read from the platform and whereas much time is lost because of delegates debating under a misunderstanding of the proposition, therefore be it resolved that these committees prepare mimeographed copies to be given to the delegates prior to their report.

20.

Inasmuch as most ministers and pastors are present for Conference and the same responsible for the church's response to such appeals, and inasmuch as the Conference evening crowds, as a rule, are larger than the afternoon crowds during the departmental days of Camp: The departmental days (Foreign Missions, and Church Extension) are to be held on Wednesday and Thursday nights of Conference, and Frankfort Pilgrim College Day is at 2:30 p.m., the last Saturday of Camp.

21.

The questionnaire prepared by the Examining Board must be filled in by each applicant for conference license, the same to be sent to the chairman

of the Examining Board along with his recommendation for license. A duplicate copy is to be sent to the District Superintendent.

22.

The District Treasurer shall be a member of the Ways and Means Committee.

23.

Whereas the district council generally lacks the proper and necessary information relative to ministers of other districts and denominations desiring membership in our district, be it resolved that the same be required to answer a questionnaire supplied by the district council.

24.

Inasmuch as the responsibility for the execution of all conference action rests primarily on its entire ministry, be it resolved that this conference instruct its examining board to recommend for their first district license only those who give evidence of intentions to take a permanent place in our ministry.

Pastoral

1.

Each pastor shall be granted a two weeks vacation with pay, and the pastor's salary shall be continued during Camp Meeting and while busy with other district duties.

2.

No church shall call an evangelist outside of our church without the approval of the District Superintendent.

3.

Each pastor shall keep a record of all names and addresses of the subscribers to the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate in the vicinity of his pastorate and shall endeavor to secure subscriptions equivalent in number to his membership roll.

4.

Each pastor shall prepare carefully a calling list of all homes connected with the church and Sunday School, listing addresses by city, street, and number, and he shall give such calling list to his successor on the field.

Zone Work

1.

Inasmuch as the Zone Meetings have been beneficial in advancing the spiritual, educational, and doctrinal interests of the Conference they shall be continued.

The Zone Chairman shall be elected by secret ballot by the ministers and lay delegates of the Zone.

2.

The Zone Chairman shall constitute a standing committee to determine the boundaries of the zone, any changes made shall be ratified by the Conference.

3.

Each zone shall elect its own youth secretary and treasurer.

Camp Meeting

1.

Conference ministers, their wives, and their dependent children shall be granted workers tickets for their meals during camp meeting and those physically able shall be assigned their respective duties and all failing to fill their assignment shall have their workers tickets forfeited.

2.

The camp meeting secretary shall issue no workers tickets to laymen except such as are authorized by the department superintendents.

3.

The camp meeting shall begin on the second Friday of August in 1960. Thereafter, be it resolved that it begin on the first Friday of August.

4.

No lease is to be bought or sold without the sanction of the proper agent signing the same and a carbon copy of this contract to be kept in the agent's file, the same to be the property of the camp meeting board.

Furthermore, no person is allowed to own two leases and any person who buys at least must build within three years or the camp board, at its discretion, may repossess the lot by refunding the purchase price.

5.

All who have a deposit on a camp meeting room must notify the Rooms Superintendent of the date they intend to arrive not later than the first Friday of August. Those failing to do so will forfeit their room rights. Each must bring his own bedding.

Anyone who leaves the District forfeits his rights to hold a room.

6.

The Camp Meeting Board shall prepare workers tickets with proper rules printed on the back of the same.

7.

The Camp Meeting Board shall appoint a Cottage Committee, which shall be in charge of the erection of cottages. All cottages must be erected according to blueprints and approved by said committee.

8.

The Camp Meeting Board shall be authorized to secure a part-time caretaker for the Camp Grounds.

9.

The Chairman of the Cottage Committee shall be in charge of all contracts concerning lots and cottages, and all correspondence concerning the same shall be directed to the Cottage Committee Chairman.

10.

We recommend that the conference council study the problem of moving the cottages from the college campus to the campground, and make a report to the next conference.

Sunday School

1.

The duties of the Conference Sunday School Board in harmony with the manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church shall be as follows:

1. The Conference Sunday School Board, together with Zone Presidents and District Superintendents shall arrange for Sunday School Institutes to be held in the respective zones during the year.

2. To promote and encourage the Sunday School work throughout the Conference.

3. To present an annual report to the Conference which shall include the following:

a. A statement of the work accomplished during the year.

b. A statement of the general condition of the Sunday School work in the Conference.

4. The Council shall direct the Conference Treasurer to take care of all expense incurred by the Conference Sunday School Board.

5. If for any reason there is a vacancy on the Conference Sunday School Board, the Council, by a majority vote, may fill the vacancy.

6. The Conference Sunday School Board shall work in conjunction with the General Sunday School Secretary in promoting the annual Rally Day, etc.

7. To have published each month a Conference Sunday School Sheet showing the attendance of each Sunday School in Conference for the month, except August, this sheet to be sent to each pastor and posted on the bulletin board.

8. Where possible each local church conduct a summer Vacation Bible School.

Miscellaneous

1.

Immediately following the Conference the Secretary shall mail to each pastor an itemized postal notice of the financial requirements of the church for the year including general church assessments.

2.

Six hundred copies of the Conference Minutes shall be provided within 30 days after the Conference adjourns. Each church must send in the money with its order.

3.

Since our General Conference has gone on record against obscene literature and has strongly urged all Pilgrims to use all possible legal and moral persuasion to curb this vicious traffic.

And since this conference believes that certain television programs are certainly promulgators of vulgarity and obscenity, and a definite hindrance to the spirituality of our people, bringing evil influences into the home:

Be it resolved we go on record as opposing television.

4.

Each individual shall feel a responsibility, during Camp and Conference, for the protection of personal and camp property, and each is to be a committee of one to help keep all conduct in an orderly manner.

5.

The camp property shall be posted with signs offering a \$25 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of anyone who unlawfully defaces, damages, or enters camp property without proper authority.

6.

Whereas, the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized the Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc., to make loans of pension funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches under such conditions as require active participation on the part of the Pilgrim Holiness Districts.

Therefore, Be it resolved by the Annual Conference of this district that the District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials be, and they are hereby authorized, to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in said Resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans.

7.

Be it resolved that the name of the Riverside Pilgrim Holiness Church be changed to the Eaglesdale Pilgrim Holiness Church, and

Be it further resolved since the merger of the Indianapolis Second Holiness Church and the Prospect Pilgrim Holiness Church, the same shall be Bethany Pilgrim Holiness Church subject to the approval of the Lutheran Bethany Church of Indianapolis, Indiana.

School Zone

1.

We recommend that Frankfort Pilgrim College be deeded to the school zone, provided that at any time it ceases to operate as a theological school, at the present location, it must be deeded back to said conferences or said conferences be paid for their assets as at the time of deeding to the Zone.

The Northern Indiana Conference requests the Camp Meeting rights as herefore provided in the division of the conferences.

Be it further resolved that the above paragraphs shall be included in the deed and charter.

Personal Evangelism

1.

Whereas a program for lay visitation and personal soul-winning is greatly needed in our district, be it resolved that we adopt the following plan, to be known as "Personal Soul-Winning and Lay Visitation Plan":

a. That a committee of not more than three be appointed by the District Superintendent whose work will be:

1. To lay out a course of study.
2. To appoint committees and instructors in each zone and advise in organizing classes.
3. To gather information and give reports on progress and accomplishments.

b. Be it further resolved that:

1. There be an intense effort on the part of the pastor to attend all classes, and that he enlist as many of the laity of his church as possible.
2. A certificate of accomplishment be given to all who finish the course.

2.

Be it resolved that at some time during the period of instructions or immediately thereafter, the pastor of each church will organize in his or her church a group of soul-winning and lay visitation and set up files and records recommended by the committee, and that these be kept as permanent records of the church.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

Local Church Financial

1.

We recommend that the Conference budget consist of 10% of all money raised by the local church and Sunday School and 5% from the Young People's Society, except that raised for missions, general budget, revivals, buildings funds, and all funds raised for specified conference interests. Building fund purposes shall be interpreted to include rent on parsonages and churches and money paid on contracts of the same.

2.

We recommend that the conference budget be prorated as follows: Conference Fund, 60%; Old People's Home, 2%; Frankfort Pilgrim College, 17%; Home Missions, 16%; General Conference, 4%; and Evangelists' Pension Plan, 1%.

3.

We recommend that each church raise five cents per member per month for Home Missionary Work and Church Extension, money to be paid to the Conference Treasurer.

4.

We recommend that each church pay the Frankfort Pilgrim College at the rate of 1% of the monthly gross receipts of the local church treasury where said gross receipts are less than \$250.00 per month, and those churches with a monthly gross income of \$250.00 or more shall pay an amount equal to 2% of such gross income. Said payments to be made each month through the Conference Treasury.

District Financial

1.

We recommend that our conference stenographer be paid \$40.00 and that the secretary be authorized to secure additional helpers at the same rate.

2.

We recommend that our District Superintendent be paid a salary of \$100 per week plus utilities, not to exceed \$400 per year and traveling expense at the rate of six cents per mile.

3.

We recommend that our Assistant Superintendent be paid at the rate of \$12.50 per day plus mileage for each day's service, also District telephone expense.

4.

We recommend that the Conference Secretary to paid \$200.00 for his services for the year.

5.

We recommend that the Conference Treasurer be paid \$600.00 for his services for the year.

6.

We recommend that the Conference Statistician be paid \$100.00 for his services for the year.

7.

We recommend that the editor of the Pilgrim Voice be paid \$125.00 for his services for the year.

8.

We recommend our Secretary-Treasurer of our Group Insurance Program be paid \$75.00 for his services for the year.

9.

Inasmuch as we have a Home Missionary Loan Fund to aid with the establishing of new churches and aid to needy older churches and interest in this fund seems to be lagging we urge those churches that have loans to bring their payments up to date and that each pastor endeavor to secure new pledges of \$1.00 or more per call. These pledges are to be secured and new ones added by the District Superintendent upon his first yearly visit. One-half of the amount raised by each call shall be an outright gift to the church for which the call is made; the other half shall be given as a loan which will be repaid to the conference. The payments made on the loan shall go into a loan fund which will be established and administered by the Conference Council. The rate of interest on the loans shall be 4%.

When such call is made each pastor shall call his people to prayer and give the congregation an opportunity to give an offering toward such call in addition to the pledges which are paid on the call.

10.

We recommend that our Sunday School Promotional Secretary be paid \$100.00 for his services for the year.

11.

We recommend that the standard mileage rate be fixed at six cents per mile.

12.

We recommend that each church raise fifty cents per member per year for the operating expense of the Old People's Home.

13.

We recommend that the District Council continue the drive in our churches to raise money for the indebtedness of the new tabernacle.

14.

We recommend that an offering be taken on Rally Day for General Sunday School and Youth Work.

15.

We recommend that the Treasurer's report, that is sent to the pastors, be a complete report of the giving of the local church, and shall include Departmental offerings.

Camp Meeting

1.

We recommend that the District Superintendent appoint a committee of three, one of whom shall have a knowledge of real estate values to appraise each cottage to be rented, and to set up an equitable schedule of rental fees.

Be it further resolved that in the setting of a fair rental fee for each cottage, the committee will take account the current value, the cost of upkeep, interest on investment, insurance, depreciation, and consideration if furnished.

Be it further resolved that the rental fees set by the committee will go into effect at the beginning of the next rental schedule on th part of the cottage owner.

Be it further resolved that any cottage owner who charges rent in excess of the ceiling price set by the committee will automatically forfeit his right to rent the cottage.

Be it further resolved that the cottage owner shall have the right to appeal to the district council in case he feels that the rental fees set by the rental committee is unfair to his interests.

2.

We recommend that any person accepted as a worker by the camp committee shall be required to pay a registration fee for the camp meeting of \$1.00

3.

We recommend that the Camp Meeting Board pass on all improvements or construction not entailing an expense of more than \$1,000.00.

We further recommend that any improvement or construction amounting to over \$1,000.00 be passed upon by the Camp Meeting Board and District Council.

4.

Inasmuch as provision has been made to secure a caretaker for the camp meeting ground and due to the cost of maintaining roads, sewer and utility service, we recommend a system of charge be made to help cover the cost.

We recommend a charge of \$5.00 a year for each person keeping an automobile on the camp grounds. We also recommend a fee of \$12.50 a year be paid by all persons renting or living in their own cottage three months or longer throughout the year.

We further recommend that all persons who use cottages during camp-meeting only pay a fee of \$1.00 a year.

We also recommend a charge of \$25.00 a year be made for all House Cars and Trailers parked over a period of three months on the camp ground. In case anyone fails to comply with these regulations the Camp Board is to see that their utilities are cut off. These fees shall be paid to the caretaker not later than January the first of each year.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS

We are thankful for the privilege of having our General Superintendent, Rev. Melvin H. Snyder to preside at our Conference. His stirring messages have challenged us to put forth a greater effort to win souls to Christ.

Words cannot express our appreciation of our District Superintendent, Rev. R. E. Nibarger, for his leadership and untiring efforts in the work of the District, going far beyond the line of duty.

Again we want to praise the Lord for the gains that were shown by the Statistician's report in church membership and Sunday School attendance and especially are we grateful for the reports of the good revivals over the District.

May the Lord reward all who have had a part in the improvements in the appearance of our Camp Ground. The beautiful flowers and the well kept lawn speak of labors of love.

In the wise providence of God we have enjoyed the freedoms that have been gained through the blood and sacrifice of our forefathers. For this we thank God. We are faced with the loss of these freedoms and we must be alert to the danger before us. We therefore urge that every Christian should be informed of the danger which would exist if a Roman Catholic should be elected as President, and further, we should realize our responsibility as Christians to prevent such by the use of our ballot.
