grim Park camp grounds, Salem, Oregon, August 9, 1951, greetings in Christ. We come with rejoicing and praise to God for His love and watchful care over us during this year. While some of our number have gone to be with Christ, all our workers have been spared us; however, Revs. Goss and Mansfield have gone to other fields of labor.

Spiritual Progress

Our churches have been blessed this year with revivals and times of spiritual refreshings from on high throughout the District. A good number of people have sought pardon or sanctification at our altars. There is a spiritual deepening going on among us. There are signs here and there over the conference of progress in the spiritual realm, for which we are most grateful. On the whole, we are spiritually progressive, our people are loyal and on the march for higher and better things in spiritual living. This is one of the most important phases of our work. Above all, we must have a spiritual work if we are to win men to Christ and build up His kingdom.

Temporal Success

On this line there is considerable evidence of progress. Many of the Churches have made excellent gains in this realm. Since our news bulletin, "The Northwest Pilgrim", has kept you informed, my report on this line will be brief.

Central Point, under Brother Stanley Weber's leadership, has made improvements in the Sunday School department and on the grounds; Clatskanie, where Brother C. R. Bennett labors, has added several rooms for a parsonage, thus releasing the former parsonage for Sunday School rooms: Eugene, under Miss Miller's leadership, has caught a vision to enlarge the quarters and are raising money; At Klamath Falls Brother O. D. Weaver has made considerable repairs and improvements; Marysville, where Brother E. L. Larson pastors, has made considerable improvement on the parsonage; Brother John Connor installed rest rooms and added a Sunday School room at Medford; Brother Parker Husselton has witnessed the completion of the new church and its dedication at Portland First Church; Brother A. T. Williams has labored faithfully at Raymond, and has seen the Church debt there paid off; At Salem, Brother V. G. Story has seen the Church through to completion of the auditorium's interior, a furnace installed and the Church dedicated this year; Brother Floyd Morgan has reduced the indebtedness considerable on the Seattle Church and added greatly to the value of the property by building a house—the sale of which all indebtedness can be cleared from our property; At Silverton, Brother A. L. Watrous has worked hard to wipe out the indebtedness on the property—this has been accomplished; At Vancouver, Brother Goss began a building fund during the year and some money has been raised, looking toward a new building for the Church there.

Conference Grounds Improvements

On the Conference grounds we have made considerable improvements. During and since last Camp our District parsonage has been finished inside, a septic tank and bath room facilities have been installed. Lovely cabinets have been installed in the kitchen by the Women's Missionary Societies of the District. Also an electric range for the kitchen and an oil heater have been installed at District expense.

We have built the long needed rest rooms and put in a very large septic tank at a cost of approximately \$700.00. A pump house has also been built. Our streets have been greatly improved by having them graveled, oiled and covered thanks to a friend who donated the money for this. Brother Clark has donated a 16x16 tent house with a good tent and Sister Gault also has donated a very nice tent house.

Our New Church

Last year just prior to camp time, Brother I. G. Canary began services in a home in North Portland. The District Council backed this project in agreement with our First Church in Portland, as it was felt that in that city we needed more than one Church The story of this Church is remarkable, but can be told here only in brief. Brother Canary went to work to help support the work. Early in the fall he began to look for a Church building and soon found one for sale in the Alberta section of North Portland. The price was \$6,000.00. We did not have it! Rev. R. A. Beltz, our good Secretary of Church Extension, came to our rescue by offering to aid us with a gift of \$1,000 and a loan of \$3,000.00 from the Department of Church Extension, provided we would raise the other \$2,000.00 by May 1, 1951.

Brother Canary and his faithful band got busy. By May 1st this spring our \$2,000.00 had all been raised and paid. In addition to this, the local group has put a new roof on the building, installed a new lighting system in the auditorium and completely finished the overhead and redecorated it at a cost of approximatly \$700.00.

There has been a steady growth in the attendance and spirituality of the Church as the months have passed. Beginning with only a small group, they have grown to where the yearly average for their Sunday School shows 32, with the all time high attendance record standing at 75. The financial report at the recent organizational meeting showed that the local group has raised over \$5,000.00 for all purposes this year.

During the year, since the neucleus organization by appointment last fall, new members have constantly been added to the number. On Wednesday night, July 25, the church was fully organized with 37 charter members. Two have since joined, making

39 in all. 28 of these are members of voting age, with a number of good families with one or both parents members.

On Sunday, July 29, the board met and voted to give the pastor a regular salary and rent. Although this is not sufficient yet for full support, Brother Canary has quit work and expects to give full time to the Church this year. We are certainly happy for this new church which we are able to present to this conference for acceptance.

Our Young People

As the year has passed I have become better acquainted with our young people over the District. As Executive Secretary for this year, Mrs. Deal has often traveled with me and assisted in youth work over the District. We have been made very happy as we have watched the progress of our youth work. We have seen our young people increase in spirituality. This is the finest thing that we can report for them. In several of our churches the young people have also increased in number this year. We hope that this will be true in every Church this coming year.

Several of them have gone to Pilgrim Bible Institute at El Monte, California and made good progress. The report for the most part given to me by President Thomas for their work and deportment was very satisfactory. Several are returning for this year.

The Missionary Societies

The Women's Missionary Societies have done excellent work. Most of the churches now have such societies and we trust all will during the coming year. Money for various purposes has been raised and a healthy spiritual and missionary atmosphere seems to pervade them.

The Northwest Pilgrim

Our news bulletin has been well received this year and we believe that it has contributed very substantially to the unity of our people. It serves to keep us all informed as to what is going on and what to expect.

Church Extension

We regret that due to circumstances beyond our control the work at Waldport was closed during the year.

During this year we have had our attention called to the city of Port Angeles, Washington. Mrs. Alice Norris has lived here for several years. She has felt for sometime that we should have a work there. This spring the District Council appointed Brother Morgan and the Superintendent to investigate, and if it deemed advisable, to purchase lots persuant to building a church in this city. After considerable investigation, we felt that we should venture to open a new work there. Accordingly, after bargaining as best we could we were able to purchase two lots with a total footage of 100 feet front by 150 feet depth on a corner. The total cost was \$850.00. \$400.00 down payment has been made and the small group of Pilgrims which we now have there has assumed the regular monthly payments of \$25.00 on the balance due.

Rev. R. W. Birch now plans to move to this field and start work about September 1, the Lord willing. Pray for this new work. This will be our project for this year. We trust that during the year we may see other openings for new work; however, for this time, please concentrate your prayers on this project of church extension. We are also happy to announce that Brother Beltz has again come to our aid by offering to help us with Church Extension funds.

Our Finances

Our churches have stood by the district work very nobly this year. Most of them have sent in their budget monthly, our treasurer reports, for which we are happy. There has been some increase in our over-all financial picture; however, this is not sufficient to meet the absolute necessities of our district expense. But the progress of our churches in this field of endeavor is certainly commendable. Our churches as a whole have reduced their indebtedness noticeably. This year we have been able to pay \$500.00 on our district grounds debt, and hope to do the same this year.

New Workers

It is a pleasure to welcome into our midst as new workers this year: Rev. and Mrs. John Price, from the California-Arizana District, who are taking the pastorate of the church at Medford: Rev. and Mrs. Arthur Comer, from the Michigan District, who are the new pastors at Svensen: and Rev. and Mrs. Omar K. Biddlingmeir, who come to us from the Southern Methodist Church, Greenville, S. C., and are accepting the pastorate of the Silverton Church. We are thankful to God for these fine, capable workers which He has sent us in irect answer to prayer. We want them to know that we shall do

our best as a district to stand by them and help them in every way possible to promote the work they have come to do.

Our Sunday Schools

Rev. Parker Husselton has been our efficient and hard working Promotional Secretary of Sunday Schools. He has worked faithfully at the task during the year. The district wide drive to promote the Sunday School attendance has met with very good success, for which we are thankful. If we work at the task faithfully during the coming year, we may be assured of very definite gains for the year.

My Personal Report

I wish to express my deepest appreciation for the fine cooperation which I have had this year from both the ministers and laymen and our churches in general. It has been a delight to work with you. You have reveived our family most graciously and have made us happy among you.

During the year I have visited all the churches at least three times and some of them four or five times as occasion arose in an official capacity. I have held all the annual business meetings and many other board meetings during the year as I visited the churches. I have held a number of week-end revivals in the churches and several of longer duration. I have also spent several weeks working on the district parsonage and conference grounds.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

To the Ministers and Delegates and S. S. Workers of the Pacific Northwest District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Greetings in Jesus' name!

We praise God for His blessings and favor on the Sunday Schools of our District. While we have not accomplished all that we had desired or expected to accomplish, yet God has blessed us and this branch of the Church has been strengthened and advanced; to God be all the glory.

Several of our Sunday Schools have reported special times of blessing when children and young people have sought and found the Lord in the special Revival services as well as the regular Sunday School sessions.

We wish to thank our District Superintendent and his good wife, the latter being a member of the Sunday School Committee, for their splendid advice and cooperation in the work of promting the S. S. in this needy field.

Special mention should be made and appreciation shown to all the faithful pastors, their wives, and all the consecrated S. S. officers and laymen for their fine cooperation and labors of love in carrying on the work of the S. S. in the past year.

Our records show 100 percent of the churches reporting, and the District annual average attendance gain of 36.

One item of District-wide interest was the Sunday School Crusade which was introduced January I, 1951 by the S. S. Committee. This S. S. Crusade was an effort to increase attendance in all our S. S. and create a wholesome system of competition. The S. S. of the District were divided into two groups known as the Portland group and the Salem group.

The results are as follows: The total attendance from the Salem group was 8510. The total attendance from the Portland group was 8324. The Salem group leads by 186.

Something else new in our District is the classification of our Sunday Schools:

Diamond Sunday School - 125 to 150 (total attendance any one Sunday).

Gold Sunday School - 100 to 125 (total attendance any one Sunday). Silver Sunday School - 75 to 100 (total attendance any one Sunday). Bronze Sunday School - 50 to 75 (total attendance any one Sunday).

FOURTH SITTING

The Conference reconvened at 1 p.m. with Rev. Birch leading in singing "We'll Work Till Jesus Comes" and Mrs. Canary was at the piano.

Prayer was given by Rev. E. L. Larson.

Rev. Beltz spoke to us about the work among the Pueblo Indians in New Mexico. He gave an interesting account of the purchasing of new land and buildings and told of the needs for the proposed school.

Minutes of the previous sittings were read and accepted.

The resolutions Committee continued their report. Resolution No. 16 was amended that "Council set the date". Carried. Resolution lost. Resolution No. 17 carried. Resolution No. 18 amended "Bible centered programs." Carried.

The report as amended was accepted.

The Educational and Examining Board reported and was accepted.

Report of Ways and Means Committee was read. No. 1. Carried; No. 2. Lost; No. 3. Carried; No. 4. amended to read "all profits this year", Carried; No. 5. Carried; No. 6. Carried.

A motion was made to have the District Council make provisions for a District Loan Fund and to make by-laws to govern the same. Carried.

The District Superintendent appointed Revs. Price, Comer, Birch, and DuVall to act

Rev. Beltz presented the nomination from the Executive Council of Rev. Deal as District Superintendent.

Revs. Comer and Birch were appointed to count the votes. Rev. Deal was unanimously re-elected. He thanked the Conference for their vote of confidence.

Rev. Canary was elected as Assistant District Superintendent.

Rev. Morgan was elected as District Secretary.

The Secretary read the Council's nomination for Treasurer.

Rev. Story was elected District Treasurer.

Revs. Connor, Husselton and Weaver were elected to the District Council.

It was moved and seconded that the Secretary cast the ballot for the present Trustees: Rev. John Connor, Dr. E. P. Dixon, and Don Johnson. Carrid.

Nominations for the Examining Board were: Rev. Connor - 3 years, Rev. Husselton -2 years, Rev. Weaver - 1 year. They were elected.

Rev. C. R. Bennett was elected for a 3 year term on the Educational Board.

It was moved to extend the time for thirty minutes. Carried.

Doris Willis was elected for the Camp Meeting Association Secretary-Treasurer and Registrar.

The Council was excused from the Conference floor to prepare nominations for the Women's Missionary Society. Their nominations were as follows: Mrs. Deal and Betty

Mrs. Deal was elected President of the W.M.S.

Nominations for Sec.-Treas. were Mrs. Story and Mrs. Biddlingmeier.

Mrs. Story was elected Secretary-Treasurer of the W.M.S.

Page Fourteen

The report of the Young People's Tresurer was read. Accepted.

It was moved and seconded that the Chairmen of the District Zones be appointed by the District Council, Carried.

Rev. Deal read the Pastoral Appointments.

The appointments for the following committees were read by Rev. Deal: Resolutions, Ways and Means, Editing, Statistical, Reception, Auditing, Memoirs.

The Special Resolutions of the Resolutions Committee were read and accepted.

A motion was made to print Rev. Deal's "Challenge" in the Advocate as soon as possible. Carried.

Rev. Beltz closed the Conference urging that this District add new churches in the coming three years.

A motion was made that the unfinished business be referred to the District Council.

A motion was made to adjourn, Carried.

The Conference was closed with prayer by Rev. Connor.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

1. Be it resolved that no minister, evangelist or Christian worker in any realm be permitted to hold special services on the District who is not in sympathy and harmony with the doctrine and teaching of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, nor without the advice and consent of the District Superintendent.

2. Be it resolved that all money is to be sent to the District Treasurer by the 10th

of each month.

3. Be it resolved that each Church shall conduct a special Pilgrim Holiness Advocate subscription campaign and that a gold star recognition shall be given to each church that attains a hundred percent family membership subscription, and that the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall be empowered to execute this in the month of December each year.

4. Be it resolved that our young people be given a prominent part in our District

Ministerial Convention.

5. Be it resolved that each Church be responsible for the salary or offering for the Pastor during the Camp Meeting and Conference, and that this resolution shall be read to the Church by the Church Secretary at the annual church meeting or sixty days before the Conference.

6. Be it resolved that united quarterly Zone Meetings of the Young People and District Zones be conducted under the direction of the District Superintendent, Young People's, and District Zone Chairmen, and Sunday School Promotional Secretary.

7. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent shall appoint a committee of three to prepare and present to the Conference a drawn plan showing position of tabernacle, dining room, Superintendent's home, rest rooms, utility room, lots according to number, tent houses, cabins, tent and trailer space, as well as any other contemplated buildings, water system and permanent wiring, and that general precautionary measures be taken for said buildings and grounds. Also that a copy of said plan be posted on the Camp Grounds.

8. Be it resolved that we have a Camp Meeting Board composed of the following: Camp Meeting Treasurer, Camp Meeting Secretary, Department of Purchasing, Department of Entertainment, Department of Buildings and Grounds, Registrar, Department of Kitchen, Department of Labor, and Department of Dining Room, and that this Board shall meet at least once a year to formulate and execute plans in each department to aid in the functioning of the Camp.

9. Be it resolved that there shall be suitable advertising signs of the local Church on the highway or highways approach and on the nearest through street to the Church building, and on the Church building.

10. Be it resolved that each Church make plans for an active Missionary Society. This society shall function for Home and Foreign Missions and both men and women shall participate.

- 11. We recommend that the local Sunday School shall count as present those from the local Sunday School who are attending the Annual District Camp Meeting—the attendance to be counted only when a card is signed by the proper camp meeting authority.
- 12. Be it resolved that the retiring pastor of the local Church shall make available to his successor an up-to-date record of the names and addresses of the members and friends of the local church.
 - 13. Be it resolved that immediate steps be taken to minimize the fire hazard to

Pilgrim Park and buildings. Be it further resolved that a committee shall be appointed

and empowered by the District Council to do this.

14. Inasmuch as the Brotherhood Insurance Company of Fort Wayne, Indiana, is state accredited and a Mennonite sponsored, non-profit Insurance Company for churches, and inasmuch as this Insurance Company has made available to the Pilgrim Holiness Church its fire, wind, etc., insurance at one-half State listed cost, be it resolved that the Pacific Northwest District take advanage of this insurance in the local and district properties.

15. We recommend that the partition of "Pilgrim Park" bounded by Williams Avenue on the east and Stortz Street on the north, shall be set aside for our people to build a cottage on, and the cottage shall revert to the District at time of decease of the

builders.

16. We recommend that whenever possible that the local Church build a cabin at Pilgrim Park, and that the same shall be for the use of its pastors during Camp Meeting

and Conference.

17. We recommend that an adequate charge for meals shall be made to cover the dining room expenses. And that the charge shall be made per dish or serving, and that a cashier shall collect for each meal, and that a committee composed of the purchasing Agent, the Cook and one active pastor appointed by the Council shall determine the charge per dish or per serving.

18. We recommend that those who are unable to pay for their entertainment at Camp Meeting shall be given the privilege of working for same as the opportunity affords, and food donations be accredited to meals' account under the supervision of the

Purchasing Agent.

19. We recommend that a quarterly report from the District Treasurer be sent to each Church, and that a concise report shall be posted in a conspicious place at the Annual Conference.

20. We recommend that the Zone Chairman shall be elected by the delegates and

ministers of his Zone at each Conference.

21. We recommend that the Purchasing Agent shall be empowered to work out a plan for food and equipment donations in advance for each camp meeting, and it shall be of such a nature as to include all friends and members of each Church.

- 22. We recommend that each Thursday, Friday, and Saturday of the first week of each Camp Meeting shall be devoted exclusively to a District Youth Convention. And that suitable workers shall be engaged who shall be sponsored by the District Young
- 23. We recommend that wherever feasible no one member of the Conference shall serve on more than one conference committee or board.
- 24. Be it resolved that the Conference invite the General Secretary of the Young People's Work and the Sunday School, Paul Elliott, to promote a Regional Youth

Rally in the Northwest, preferably during Christmas vacation.

25. We recommend that the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary promote 1. Bible Study or teacher's training this fall and winter in each Sunday School on the District. 2. Special services for children in the regular Sunday School services or church services emphasizing Salvation. 3. Vacation Bible Schools-Bible centered with emphasis on scripture memorization.

26. We recommend that there shall be a District Youth Board composed of the District Superintendent, District Youth Executive Secretary, District Youth Treasurer and the Youth Zone Chairmen. The purpose of this board is to co-ordinate the youth

work on the District.

- 27. We recommend that there shall be a District bulletin published quarterly and that it shall be called "The Northwest Pilgrim"; and that this bulletin shall comprise all the departments of the district, namely: General Church, Youth, Sunday School and Missionary Departments. We further recommend that the representative head of each department shall be responsible for the publishing material; and that the means of promotion of the bulletin shall be by subscriptions of ten cents per copy; also that the District Superintendent shall be the Editor of the bulletin.
- 28. We recommend that those who use utilities or appliances at Pilgrim Park, except the District Superintendent and the caretaker, must receive permission and shall pay the required assessment.
- 29. Inasmuch as the annual ministerial reports are not read at the annual Conference, we recommend that each minister shall be permitted to give an oral report not to exceed
 - 30. Inasmuch as there is a need to schedule our annual Camp and Conference so

as to accomodate our General Superintendent and to better cooperate with the Idaho-Washington District, we recommend that the Conference shall grant the District Council the privilege of arranging and scheduling the Camp and Conference to the best advantage of all concerned.

31. Whereas there is need of promoting the work of our missionary societies on the district, we recommend that the Conference shall elect a missionary president and a missionary secretary-treasurer: We further recommend that two or more names for each

office shall be nominated by the District Council.

32. Whereas the General Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has set as objectives for the next four years that of bringing our membership up to 50,000, and the Advocate subscriptions up to 15,000; And whereas we as a Conference should strive mightily under God to fulfill our obligations to this great program: Therefore be it resolved that the Conference set as our objectives:

(1) To triple our Sunday School attendance, (2) To double our church membership,

(3) To quadruple the Advocate subscriptions,

(4) To advocate and to teach loyalty to the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

33. Whereas the Pacific Northwest District is yet a young disrtict, Be it resolved that those other than the delegates and workers at the Conference shall pay for meals the same as during camp. Ministers and their families shall be exempted.

34. Wheres the constitution of the United States provides for freedom of worship, Be it resolved that this Confernce go on record as being opposed to any school system which violates the conscience of our children by any anti-Christian requirements which

are contrary to the teaching of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

35. Whereas there is a good opportunity for promoting the Camp interest by the formation of an association, and whereas the ministers and laymen at this recent Camp voted to recommend to the Conference that such an association be formed; Therefore be it resolved:

That this Conference authorize the formation of a Camp Association;

Be it further resolved that this association shall be known as the "Pilgrim Park Camp Meeting Association."

That it shall be under the direction of the District Council of this District, which

body shall make the rules governing the Camp;

That membership in this Association shall be open to any Christian who believes in and wishes to help promote the doctrine and experience of holiness as this Camp Meeting stands for it;

That the membership fee shall be \$1.00 per year, to be paid annually at the Camp

Meeting time or prior thereto;

That there shall be a Secretary-Treasurer of this Association, who shall be a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church;

That said Secretary-Treasurer shall be elected by the Conference annually upon nomination of one or more persons for this office by the District Council; That said officer shall be charged with the responsibility of sending Camp Meeting

literature, advertising, etc., to all members of the Association not less than 30 days prior to the Camp, together with the request that all members pay their \$1.00 fee of membership at this time.

That all monies coming from membership fees shall be used to promote the Camp interests, and shall be turned over to the District Treasurer at Camp time, for this

36. Whereas many of our churches pay their pastors by a free-will offering method, and this method often works a handicap upon the pastor both in raising his church finances and in his personal plans; Therefore be it resolved: That each Church of our

District begin to pay the pastor a stated amount per week.

37. Whereas the Camp Grounds must be prepared for the Camp Meeting; Therefore be it resolved: That we have a District-wide "Fourth-of-July Cleanup Day" at the Camp Grounds, and that this day be climaxed with a Young People's Rally. We recommend further that, when possible, the young people come prepared to remain over the fifth in order to put the grounds in proper condition for Camp.

38. Whereas our young people play an important part in our District work, and whereas, for the best interests of the promotion of our youth work, we need district

gatherings;

Therefore be it resolved: That we have one or more District-wide Young People's Rallies during each Conference year. (One of them my be the Fourth of July Rally if desired).

DISTRICT FINANCIAL

Standing

1. Be it resolved that all birthday offerings be used for Home Missions.

2. Be it resolved that each church take a special offering each month to be divided equally between Home and Foreign Missions.

3. Be it resolved that all unstationed ministers and evangelists pay 50 percent of their ministerial tithes to the District Treasurer.

4. Be it resolved that each Church send to the District Treasurer the equivalent of 25c per member per year for General Conference expense.

5. Be it resolved that we have a call card plan for the district which shall be for the purpose of united help of \$1.00 per call, not more than two calls per year, same to be used for District interests.

6. Be it resolved that each Church treasurer be authorized to send 10 percent of the regular Church offerings by the tenth of each month to the District Tresurer for District expenses, which 10 percent includes pastor's tithe. Be it further resolved that churches paying pastor's salaries use the same procedure, exempting property payments, missionary, and building fund offerings.

Special

1. Be it resolved that the District pay the District Superintendent \$200.00 per month plus \$25.00 per month for tryeling expense. Be it further resolved that he be allowed three or four revivals per year, either on or off the District, from which he may keep the offerings.

2. That since we need a lunch stand, book room and information booth, and whereas our young people have petitioned the District Council for the privilege of building same, we therefore recommend that each young people's group in the District send \$10.00 this year for this purpose, and that we give the total proceeds of the lunch stand this year for this fund.

3. Whereas our young people want to support a church extension project during the year, we recommend that each young people's group send in \$10.00 per year for our new work in Port Angeles, Washington.

4. Be it resolved that the District Treasurer be paid \$35.00 per year salary plus stationary and postage.
