DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the 13th annual conference, Pacific Northwest District, Pilgrim Holiness Church, held at the Conference grounds, August 18, 1952, Christian greetings.

We have much for which to praise the Lord at this time. He has graciously spared all our workers this year, helped us to make progress in the work and added new workers to our number.

OUR SPIRITUAL PROGRESS

Special revival services have been conducted in all our churches this year. A good many have sought God for pardon and purity and the saints have been edified greatly. The Hamiltons, the Pratts and Brother Penny have rendered invaluable service as

evangelistic workers in our district this year. We are grateful to them for their ser-

vice. Quite a number of new people have been reached and new members have joined our ranks.

There are signs of deepening spirituality among our people. It is quite evident among our younger people especially. And this is one of our chief aims. If we are to win men to Christ, we must be a spiritual church.

TEMPORAL GAINS

We shall be brief here, as our Northwest Pilgrim has kept most of you informed of these gains.

Clatskanie has purchased a five room parsonage this year . . . Eugene has purchased extra lots and is raising money for a new church building some day. . . . Klamath Falls has done a remarkable interior redecorating job of their Sunday School department and made other outside repairs. . . . Medford has added a Sunday School room and madde other improvements. . . . Portland Alberta has made outside improvements on their church and have some money toward a parsonage. . . . Salem has just completed and installed a most beautiful set of pews, valued at about \$3,500.00, had they been factory made. . . . Seattle has done excellent landscaping and gone far toward liquidating their indebtedness this year. . . . Silverton is in process of adding about eight new Sunday School rooms. . . They have purchased the church at Svensen and they have already gaid almost \$200.00 of the price of the building. . . Vancouver is in a building program which when completed will aford them a new auditorium and several Sunday School rooms. Some of the other churches have made minor improvements on their property also.

We are grateful to all our pastors and their wives for their hard labors and sacrificing spirit in this forward move. We also are deeply indebted to our consecrated laymen who have made this progres spossible.

OUR CONFERENCE GROUNDS

Considerable change has been made on these grounds this year. After thorough discussion the District Council decided that due to the fact that our tall trees were dying and being blown over during the winters, it would be best to remove them before further damage was done. The task was committed to Brother V. G. Story and the writer. Accordingly, about 23,500 feet of timber was taken from the grounds for which we received approximately \$1,000.00. Most of this was spent for the felling and hauling of the timber and for the stump removing and preparations of the grounds in general as they are today. The work is not yet complete, for it is our hope to set tees in the area across the road from the tabernacle and to plant grass in this area all about the tabernacle. All the grounds are now free from stumps and ready for the master plan for the overall development and ready to be presented to this Conference for approval.

The erection of a new building to house our lunch stand, book room and information office has also added materially to the grounds. While this is not completed and not yet all paid for, we are sure that it will be carried through in the near future.

It is our hope to make these grounds a great spiritual center for Christ's cause and for our church's advancement in this district. We wish to here express our deepest gratitude to all the men who have labored so long and hard, especially this year, in helping toward a realization of this goal.

OUR LOSSES

We have appreciated the splendid work done, both spiritually and materially, by Rev. Parker Husselton and family at our Portland First church. During the past four years of labors there they have made a great contribution to our work. We regret to lose such good workers from our district. But the Church Extension Department has chosen Brother Husselton to take the superintendency of our newly formed Texas District, to which work he will be going soon after Conference. While we shall miss all of them from our midst, we nevertheless bid them Godspeed, and send with them every good wish for success in this new field of labor.

Rev. Arthur Comer, pastor of our Svensen church for one year, has found it necessary to return to Michigan it seems due to conditions beyond his control. We regret to lose these good workers. They have done a very good work this year at Svensen. May God bless them as they go from us.

NEW RECRUITS

Rev. and Mrs. E. W. Burton, Fredonia, Kansas, are coming to take the pastorate of the Portland First church. They are a fine family, quite talented, and will be an asset to our work there and in the ditsrict as well. He was formerly secretary of Kansas district.

Rev. and Mrs. D. H. Nettleton, El Monte, California, are taking the Svensen church this year as pastors. Rev. Bruce Chamberlain, a recent graduate of Upland College in southern California and the son of our missionary to the West Indies and Pereu, So. America, has been selected as pastor of the Aurora church. Brother Woodruff is retiring from active ministry at the present because of his health. Rev. Sherman Moore of the Idaho-Washington district is coming to take the pastorate of our church at Medford. Rev. John Price, former pastor, is going to school this year.

OUR GAINS

Portland First Church topped the list with 20 members being received into membership this year. Eugene folowed with 15 new members, while Portland Alberta followed closely with 13 new members. Portland Alberta also headed the list with a Sunday School gain of 24 over last year's average.

Statistics will show that we have made a good gain in district wide Sunday School average attendance this year. There have also been gains in other departments of the work as will be indicated by the reports.

Rev. Parker Husselton, S. S. Promotional Secretary for the district, and his board have done an excellent piece of work this year. We all appreciate it I am sure.

Rev. John R. Price, District Ex. Secretary of young people, has also done a good work this year. We have had a gracious youth camp and he has done fine work in youth services duirng the camp.

Our missionary societies likewise are to be commended for their noble work this year. They have contributed considerable to our work this year, as well as to foreign missions.

NEW WORK

At long last God has sent us workers or our Port Angeles, Wash., work. The Densmores from Junction City, Colorado, moved there this spring. Rev. Paul A. Bedinger, Georgetown, Illinois, and family have just come to take the pastorate of the work. On my last visit to the churches just before camp, we organized the work there as provided for in the Manual p. 28, pa. No. 2. This is not a full organization and will not be received into conference this year. However, we look forward to receiving into conference next year a good church at this place. Plans are now under way for the erection of a building there soon. Our lots there are all paid for except about \$139.00.

In June of this year Mr. and Mrs. Don Little of the Medford church asked for permission to start a Sunday School about 15 miles from hat city. Recent reports show that this Sunday School at Ruch has averaged about 20 per Sunday. They are using a rented building. It is being operated entirely without cost to the district. We trust that it may develop into a church.

We have also been working with an interdepominational group at Gleneden Beach, Oregon. Brother Don Johnson is the S.S. superintendent. We have supplied a pastor for several months. This work has showed marked spiritual development, but we cannot predict what its future will be yet. This work is not ours and should not be classed with the two above referred to.

Rev. George R. Hobson has been sent to Grants Pass to open a new work, if God opens the way.

PERSONAL REPORT

I have been grateful for the help of our good asisstant district superintendent, Rev. Ivan G. Canary, this year, and for the gracious and loyal support of all the pastors and churches.

I have visited all the churches at least three times, except Klamath Falls, where I was hindered by a snow storm. I have held all the annual business meetings; many board meetings; attended the annual superintendents' conference and have worked many ways on the camp grounds. I have edited four issues of the Northwest Pilgrim and have put out 513 pieces of district mail at a cost of only \$11.21.

S. S. PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

To the Ministers, Delegates and Sunday School Workers of the Pacific Northwest District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church; Greetings:

When we try to report the work of the church in any of its functions we realize that what can be, and many times reports are, far from the real picture. This is true of the Sunady School.

In some cases a report of numbers fail to depict the true condition of the school, while in other cases an increase in numbers means real spiritual advancement and progress.

The past year reveals that the Sunday Schools of our District have, with only a few exceptions, made some numerical gains. God has answered prayer and the people have a mind to work. Beginning last January of this year the Sunday Schools of this District engaged in a very wholesome and beneficial contest for attendance. The results of this contest were reported as total number attending our schools, and the total number of invitations given as follows:

Total attendance in all District Sunday Schools 10,161

Total number of invitations given by workers 93,253

This three months revival effort in the Sunday Schools, resulted not only in many new people being contacted for the church and the Sunday School, but in some of our churches numbers were for the first time brought under the influence of the Gospel. stany of ticse children found the Lord in the pardon of their sins.

The report of the Finances of the Camp was read by the District Treasurer and accepted.

The Revs. Laubaugh, Pratt, Swinney, and Finney from the Idaho-Washington Distrint were introduced to the Conference.

It was moved and seconded to grant these men an honorary seat in the Conference Bar. Carried.

Rev. Sturk was requested to sing and favored the Conference with "He'll Understand and Say 'Well Done' ".

2. Whereas we have been privileged to enjoy and profit by the efforts and the presence of our district superintendent, Rev. Deal, be it resolved that we express our thanks by a standing vote of appreciation.

3. Whereas Rev. H. K. Busby, Rev. B. Ivan Williams, and the Clifton Bergs have contributed so much to our Camp this year, be it resolved that we respond by a standing vote of thanks.

4. Whereas Mr. and Mrs. Totten, Mrs. Hunt, and their loyal assistants have worked so faithfully and efficiently in the kitchen and dining room be it resolved that we give them a rising vote of thanks.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

1. Be it resolved that no minister, evangelist or Christian worker in any realm be permitted to hold special services on the District who is not in sympathy and harmony with the doctrine and teaching of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, nor without the advice and consent of the District Superintendent.

2. Be it resolved that all money is to be sent to the Disrict Treasurer by the 10th of the month.

3. Be it resolved that each Church shall conduct a special Pilgrim Holiness Advocate subscription campaign and that a gold star recognition shall be given to each church that attains a hudnred percent family membership subscription, and that the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall be empowered to execute this in the month of December each year.

4. Be it resolved that each Church be responsible for the salary or offering for the Pastor during the Camp Meeting and Conference, and that this resolution shall be read to the Church by the Church Secretary at the annual church meeting or sixty days before the Conference.

5. Be it resolved that united quarterly Zone Meetings of the Young People and District Zones be conducted under the direction of the District Superintendent, Young People's, and District Zone Chairmen, and Sunday School Promotional Secretary.

6. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent shall appoint a committee of three to prepare and present to the Conference a drawn plan showing position of tabernacle, dining room, Superintendent's home, rest rooms, utility room, lots according to number, tent houses, cabins, tent and trailer space, as well as any other contemplated buildings, water system and permanent wiring, and that general precautionary measures be taken for said buildings and grounds. Also that a copy of said plan be posted on the Camp Grounds.

7. Be it resolved that we have a Camp Meeting Board composed of the following: Camp Meeting Treasurer, Camp Meeting Secretary, Department of Purchasing, Department of Entertainment, Department of Buildings and Grounds, Registrar, Department of Kitchen, Department of Labor, and Department of Dining Room, and that this Board shall meet at least once a year to formulate and execute plans in each department to aid in the functioning of the Camp.

8. Be it resolved that there shall be suitable advertising signs of the local Church on the highway or highways approach and on the nearest through street to the Church building, and on the Church building.

9. We recommend that the local Sunday School shall count as present those from the local Sunday School who are attending the Annual District Camp Meeting—the attendance to be counted only when a card is signed by the proper camp meeting authority.

10. Be it resolved that the retiring pastor of the local Church shall make available to his successor an up-to-date record of the names and addresses of the members and friends of the local church.

11. Be it resolved that immediate steps be taken to minimize the fire hazard to Pilgrim Park and buildings. Be it further resolved that a committee shall be appointed and empowered by the District Council to do this.

12. We recommend that the partition of "Pilgrim Park" bounded by Williams Avenue on the cast and Stortz Street on the north, shall be set aside for our people to build

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a cottage on, and the cottage shall revert to the Disrict at time of decease of the builders.

13. We recommend that whenever possible that the local Church build a cabin at Pilgrim Park, and that the same shall be for the use of its pastors during Camp Meeting and Conference.

14. We recommend that an adequate charge for meals shall be made to cover the dining room expenses. And that the charge shall be made per dish or serving, and that a cashier shall collect for each meal, and that a committee composed of the purchasing Agent, the Cook and one active pastor appointed by the Council shall determine the charge per dish or per serving.

15. We recommend that those who are unable to pay for their entertainment at Camp Meeting shall be given the privilege of working for same as the opportunity affords, and food donations be accredited to meals' account under the supervision of the Purchasing Agent.

16. We recommend that a quarterly report from the District Treasurer be sent to each Church, and that a concise report shall be posted in a conspicious place at the Annual Conference.

17. We recommend that the Zone Chairman shall be appointed by the District Council.

18. We recommend that the Purchasing Agent shall be empowered to work out a plan for food and equipment donations in advance for each camp meeting, and it shall be of such a nature as to include all friends and members of each Church.

19. We recommend that each Thursday, Friday, and Saturday of the first week of each Camp Meeting shall be devoted exclusively to a District Youth Convention. And that suitable workers shall be engaged who shall be sponsored by the District Young People.

20. We recommend that wherever feasible no one member of the Conference shall serve on more than one conference committee or board.

21. We recommend that there shall be a District Youth Board composed of the District Superintendent, District Youth Executive Secretary, District Youth Treasurer and the Youth Zone Chairman. The purpose of this board is to-ordinate the youth work on the District.

22. We recommend that there shall be a District bulletin published quarterly and that it shall be called "The Northwest Pilgrim": and that this bulletin shall comprise all the departments of the dis'rict, namely: General Church, Youth, Sunday School and Missionary Departments. We further recommend that the representative head of each department shall be responsible for the publishing material: and that the means of promotion of the bulletin shall be by subscription of ten cents per copy; also that the District Superintendent shall be the Editor of the bulletin.

23. We recommend that those who use utilities or appliances at Pilgrim Park, except the District Superintendent and the caretaker, must receive permission and shall pay the required assessment.

24. Inasmuch as the annual ministerial reports are not read at the annual Conference, we recommend that each minister shall be permitted to give an oral report not to exceed five minutes.

25. Inasmuch as there is a need to schedule our annual Camp and Conference so as to accommodate our General Superintendent and to better cooperate with the Idaho-Washington District, we recommend that the Conference shall grant the District Council the privilege of arranging and scheduling the Camp and Conference to the best advantage of all concerned.

26. Whereas there is need of promoting the work of our missionary societies on the district, we recommend that the Conference shall elect a missionary president and a missionary secretary-treasurer: We further recommend that two or more names for each office shall be nominated by the District Council.

27. Whereas the General Conference of the Pi'grim Holiness Church has set as objectives for the next four years that of bringing our membership up to 50,000, and the Advocate subscription up to 15,000: And whereas we as a Conference should strive mightily under God to fulfill our obligations to this great program: Therefore be it resolved that the Conference set as our objectives:

(1) To triple our Sunday School attendance,

(2) To double our church membership,

(3) To quadruple the Advocate subscriptions,

(4) To advocate and to teach loyalty to the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

28. Whereas the Pacific Northwest District is yet a young district, Be it resolved that those other than the delegates and workers at the Conference shall pay for meals the same as during camp. Ministers and their families shall be exempted.

29. Whereas the constitution of the United States provides for freedom of worship, Be it resolved that this Conference go on record as being opposed to any scohol system which violates the conscience of our children by any anti-Christian requirements which are contrary to the teaching of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

30. Whereas there is a good opportunity for promoting the Camp interest by the formation of an association, and whereas the ministers and laymen at this recent Camp voted to recommend to the Conference that such an association be formed; Therefore be it resolved:

That this Concrence authorize the formation of a Camp Association;

Be it further resolved that this association shall be known as the "Pilgrim Park Camp Meeting Association."

That it shall be under the direction of the District Council of this District, which body shall make the rules governing the Camp;

That membership in this Association shall be open to any Christian who believes in and wishes to help promote the doctrine and experience of holiness as this Camp Meeting stands for it;

That the membership fee shall be \$1.00 per year, to be paid annually at the Camp Meeting time or prior thereto;

That there shall be a Secretary-Treasurer of this Association, who shall be a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church;

That said Secretary-Treasurer shall be elected by the Conference annually upon nomination of one or more persons for this office by the District Council;

That said officer shall be charged with the responsibility of sending Camp Meeting literature, advertising, etc., to all members of the Association not less than 30 days prior to the Camp, together with the request that all members pay their \$1.00 fee of membership at this time.

That all monies coming from membership fces shall be used to promote the Camp interests, and shall be turned over to the District Treasurer at Camp time, for this purpose.

31. Whereas many of our churches pay their pastors by a free-will offering method, and this method often works a handicap upon the pastor both in raising his church finances and in his personal plans: Therefore be it resolved: That each Church of our District begin to pay the pastor a stated amount per week.

32. Whereas our young people play an important part in our District work, and whereas, for the best interests of the promotion of our youth work, we need district gatherings;

Therefore be it resolved: That we have one or more Disrict-wide Young People's Rallies during each Conference year. (One of them may be the Fourth of July if desired.)
