DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the 16th annual Conference of the Pacific Northwest District, convened at Salem, Oregon, August 8, 1955: Greetings in Christ!

It is with a deep sense of loss that we come to this conference in the absence of our beloved former general superintendent, Dr. L. W. Sturk, whose recent home-coming has made us all conscious of the need to be ever ready for that last great move. While the church has lost a great and noble leader and we all feel it keenly, God has raised up another outstanding man of unusual abilities of highest and finest qualities to lead us as our general superintendent in the person of Rev. Wm. H. Neff.

Turning now to the work of the district, let us praise God for His great mercy to us this year, by which our workers have all been spared and our work has been blessed with spirtiual and temporal progress. There is hardly a church but what has been engaged in some type of construction, remodeling or in paying for that recently done. Of necessity reference to this work must be brief.

SPIRITUAL PROGRESS

Practically all our churches have experienced revival and spiritual uplift this year. There have been gains in some places in Sunday school and church membership, while others have not faired so well. But as a whole the general tenor of our people's devotional life, the attendance at services and the spiritual atmosphere so far as I have been able to judge it, is improving. Thank God for this manifestation. Financially, we have lost some ground this year, but it seems according to late reports to have pulled up so that we closed the year better than we thought we would be able to do.

Rev. H. James Kreider, Executive Secretary of Youth Work, has done a good work this year with the young people. The societies in general are to be commended for what they have accomplished. More information

will appear in Brother Kreider's report concerning this work.

Rev. Sherman Moore has served us well as Sunday School Promotional Secretary. The loss in average Sunday School attendance which we must be prepared to accept this year is not his fault. Explanation will be made when the report is given. But our Sunday Schools must pull up this coming year. We are determined to show gain next year.

TEMPORAL PROGRESS

Aurora has built a lovely five room parsonage onto the rear of their church building . . . Central Point has re-roofed the church and redecorated it inside; painted the parsonage and made other repairs . . . Clatskanie has re-roofed their church and redecorated it as well as part of the parsonage ... Eugene has almost completed its new basement church which is 36x70feet and will make a fine plant when finished . . . Klamath Falls has installed a new furnace, redecorated the church and made other repairs . . . Marysville has redecorated part of the parsonage . . . Medford is purchasing property on which to build a new church . . . Portland (Alberta) has purchased a lovely four bed room parsonage . . . Portland First has completed a parsonage remodeling job and added two new rooms . . . Port Angeles has made some repairs and painted the church outside . . . Raymond has completed five new S. S. rooms and remodeled the interior of the church . . . Salem has finished some S. S. class rooms . . . Seattle had a mortgage burning service. They were out of debt until they started a new three bedroom parsonage which is well on toward ready for occupancy . . . Silverton has finished some S. S. class rooms and redecorated the parsonage . . . Svenson has purchased a four room building, for a parsonage, moved it onto the lot near the church and built utility and bath rooms onto it . . . Tacoma has made considerable improvement on their church building and repainted it . . . and Vancouver's new church is well on its way toward the day when it will be ready for services to be opened in it.

In addition to these many thousands of dollars of improvements considerable improvement has been made on the camp grounds this year also.

HOME MISSIONS

After prayerful consideration and trying to prove what was the best it seemed wise to close the Sunday School at Ruch, inasmuch as we were not making a success there. No one is to blame for this. It is simply one of those instances where we appeared to have a start but it did not come through and survive.

Grants Pass now has a neat little block building as the first unit of what is planned for a larger church. The struggle there has been difficult and our workers need prayer.

Roseburg has purchased a building which is being remodeled. It has a nice parsonage quarters in the back and a very nice auditorium. The people are responding well and the \$45.00 monthly payments are being met by them as well as other bills.

A splendid new Sunday School has been started at Keizer near Salem and a nice 26x40 foot chapel is in the process of being built. It looks as if there may be an opportunity here for a new church.

You will notice that names of pastors and workers have been omitted in all cases, but may we say here that we most deeply appreciate every worker and what he has done to make this good year possible.

MY PERSONAL REPORT

Personally, I have enjoyed my work this year with the pastors and churches very much. I regret that the nature of my work, having to hold extra revivals and camps for help in securing support, causes me to have less time to spend with the churches than I would like but hardly know how to remedy it. My heart is burdened for this work. We have prayed and written to many people and have done our best to secure more workers and open more new work. But so far we have not succeeded this year in opening any new place, except the new work at Keizer. But we hope this year to see more accomplished along this line.

Mrs. Deal and Evangeline join me in thanking everyone of you as pastors and churches for your gracious hospitality, your loyal support and your ardent prayers. Continue to pray for us, that we may prove the blessing which God has intended our lives to be.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

1. Be it resolved that no minister, evangelist or Christian worker in any realm be permitted to hold special services on the District who is not in sympathy and harmony with the doctrine and teaching of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, nor without the advice and consent of the District Superintendent.

2. Be it resolved that all money be sent to the District Treasurer by the 10th of the month.

3. Be it resolved that each church be responsible for the salary or offering for the pastor during the Camp-meeting and Conference. 4. We recommend that there be a zone meeting every two months, in

5. Be it resolved that we have a Camp Meeting Board composed of: District Superintendent as Chairman; the following to be appointed by the District Council, Secretary, Treasurer, Purchasing Agent, Dining Hall Manager, Registrar and Housing Manager, Property and Pro Manager, Registrar and Housing Manager, Engineer and Plumber, and Manager of Ground and Buildings.

We recommend that the local Sunday School count as present those

from it who are attending annual Camp Meeting.

7. Be it resolved that there shall be suitable advertising signs of the local church on the highway or highways approaching and on the nearest through street to the church building.

8. Be it resolved that the retiring pastor of the local church shall make available to his successor an up-to-date record of the names and addresses

of the members and friends of the local church.

We recommend that the partition of "Pilgrim Park," bounded by William Avenue on the east, and Stortz Street on the north, shall be set aside for our people to build cottages upon, which cottages shall revert to the District at time of decease of the builders. Be it further resolved that said cottages be utilized for general housing by the Camp Association in event of absence of builder. Be it further resolved that said cottages be occupied only with consent of the Camp Association.

We recommend that the donations and free will offering plan for

meals, instituted in 1955, be continued.

- 11. We recommend that whenever possible that the local churches build a cabin at Pilgrim Park and that the same shall for the use of its pastors during Camp Meeting and Conference.
- We recommend that those who are unable to pay for their entertainment at Camp Meeting shall be given the privilege of working for the same as the opportunity affords and food donations be credited to meals account under the supervision of the Purchasing Agent, and camp donations through local churches be credited to the pastor's expense.

We recommend that there be one zone chairman in each zone, who shall be appointed by the District Council. He shall promote all zone

interests.

- 14. We recommend that the Purchasing Agent shall be empowered to work out a plan for food and equipment donations in advance for each Camp Meeting and it shall be of such a nature as to include all friends and members of each church.
- 15. We recommend that there shall be a District Youth Board, composed of the District Superintendent, District Youth Executive Secretary, District Youth Treasurer. The purpose of this board is to co-ordinate the youth work on the District.
- 16. We recommend that there shall be a District Bulletin published quarterly and it shall be called "The Northwest Pilgrim" and that this bulletin shall comprise all the departments of the departments of the District, namely: General Church, Youth, Sunday School and Missionary Department. We further recommend that the representative head of each department shall be responsible for the publishing material; and that the means of promotion of the bulletin shall be by subscription of ten cents per copy; also that the District Superintendent shall be the Editor of the bulletin.

We recommend that those who use utilities or appliances at Pilgrim Park, except the District Superintendent and the caretaker, must

receive permission and shall pay the required assessment.

18. Inasmuch as there is a need to schedule our annual Camp and Conference so as to accommodate our General Superintendent and to better cooperate with the Idaho-Washington District, we recommend that the Conference shall grant the District Council the privilege of arranging and scheduling the Camp and Conference to the best advantage of all concerned.

19. Whereas there is need of promoting the work of our missionary societies on the district, we recommend that the Conference shall elect a missionary president and a missionary secretary-treasurer. We further recommend that two or more names for each office shall be nominated by the District Council.

20. Whereas the Pacific Northwest District is yet a young district, Be it resolved that those other than the delegates and workers at the

Conference shall pay for meals the same as during camp. Ministers and their families shall be exempt.

Whereas the constitution of the United States provides for freedom of worship, Be it resolved that this Conference go on record as being opposed to any school system which violates the conscience of our children by any anti-Christian requirements which are contrary to the teachings of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

22. Whereas there is a good opportunity for promoting the Camp interest by the formation of an association, and whereas the ministers and laymen at this recent Camp voted to recommend to the Conference that such an association be formed; Therefore be it resolved:

That this Conference authorize the formation of a Camp Association; Be it further resolved that this association shall be known as the "Pilgrim Park Camp Meeting Association."

That it shall be under the direction of the District Council of this District, which body shall make the rules governing the camp;

That membership of this association shall be open to any Christian who believes in and wishes to help promote the doctrine and experience of holiness as this Camp stands for it;

That the membership fee shall be \$1.00 per year, to be paid annually at the Camp Meeting time or prior thereto;

The secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of sending Camp Meeting literature, advertising, etc., to all members of the Association not less than 30 days prior to the Camp, together with the request that all members pay their \$1.00 fee of membership at this time; and other camp publicity;

That all monies coming from membership fees shall be used to promote the Camp interests;

That the Treasurer shall be charged with the responsibility of all Camp funds.
