The Twenty-second Annual Conference of the Pacific Northwest District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church opened at Pilgrim Park in Salem, Oregon, July 20, 1961 at 9:00 a.m.

The Conference opened with the singing of "He Hideth My Soul", led by Lee Sorenson, accompanied by Mrs. Bill Parker.

Rev. John Connor called us to and led us in prayer. Rev. Connor, District Superintendent, introduced our presiding General Superintendent, R. G. Flexon, to the Conference.

Hagaii 1:8 was the text used by Dr. Flexon for his stirring address. This verse was applied to a group of people and to the individual churches. The outline in brief is:

God is glorified in the church.

- 1. When the services start and end on time.
- 2. When the services are cheerfully and regularly attended.
- When the public knows where the church is because of good advertising.
- 4. When its spiritual walls are not daubed with untempered mortar (misplaced emphasis)
 - A. Misplaced emphasis on Holiness (as a finality)
 - B. Misplaced emphasis on demonstration
 - C. Misplaced emphasis on finance
 - D. Misplaced emphasis on numbers
 - E. Misplaced emphasis on education
- 5. When our zeal to be tolerant does not cause us to lose our sense of moral values.
- 6. When the preacher has something to feed those who attend the meetings.
- When the church stops trying to save itself and goes out to save others.

8. When the church has a venturing faith.

The delegate list was read.

The platform and the first five seats on each side of the auditorium were designated as the conference bar.

The sessions of the conference were set at 9-12 a.m., 2-5 p.m., 7-9 p.m., or until finished.

Rev. Verlie Arnett, pastor, and Mrs. Jarvis, delegate of the new Hazen Chapel church were introduced to the conference. Rev. Connor told of the beginnings of this new church and the progress it has made since that time. The church was then presented to and received into the conference. Sister Jarvis then took her place in the conference bar.

By common consent the churches that have not paid their General Stewardship Fund were seated in the conference. The manual states they should be denied conference rights if such is not paid. Dr. Flexon stated this rule is to be deleted from the manual because it cannot be logically enforced.

Rev. John Connor read the District Superintendents' report. It was received by a standing vote of thanks.

Rev. Walter Cole read the assistant District Superintendent's report which was received by a unanimous vote of the conference.

The auditing committee report was read by Mrs. John Connor. It was accepted.

Rev. V. G. Story presented a very gracious District Treasurer's report. It was moved we receive it. Carried.

The District Statistician's report was read by Rev. Donald Mack. It was approved by vote of the conference.

Rev. Donald Goss stated that the Sunday School Promotional Secretary was not ready to report.

Mrs. Donald Goss read the District Youth Secretary's report in the absence of Mrs. A. E. Yoder. The report was unanimously received.

The Resolutions Committee read its recommendations. One resolution was presented which placed the annual conference after the camp meeting. It was passed by vote of the conference.

Rev. Vernon Story read the Ways and Means Committee report. Dr. Flexon recommended that the committee study Resolution number 8, page 22 of the 1960 District Minutes. This referred to \$60.00 for District Superintendent's traveling expense.

The committee of memorials to General Conference had nothing to present to the conference. Dr. Flexon then commented on a few memorials that other Districts are presenting.

It was moved and seconded to adjourn to allow committees to meet. It was carried.

Rev. V. G. Story dismissed with prayer.

Second Sitting

The second sitting of the conference opened with the singing of "I Know Whom I Have Believed". Rev. Walter Cole led, and Mrs. Butler accompanied.

The conference stood for prayer which was offered by Rev. Clarence Jackson.

The minutes of the morning session were read, corrected, and approved. Rev. Donald Goss presented the Sunday School Promotional Secretary's report which was approved as read.

The joint report of the Educational and Examining Committees was given by Rev. Walter Cole. It was moved and seconded that we accept the report. Carried.

Mrs. Clara Weaver read the Memoirs Committee report. A number of dear saints departed to meet the Lord during this past year. The report was accepted as read. The Conference stood for a fitting prayer offered by Dr. R. G. Flexon.

Dr. Flexon urged the pastors and officers of the district to be prompt and faithful in sending in their reports to the proper officials.

The Ways and Means Committee returned the proposal which was referred to them by Dr. Flexon. The new resolution presented provided for an increase for the District Superintendent's traveling expense from the present \$60.00 per year to \$70.00 per month. It was carried by vote of the conference.

Rev. John Connor appointed John Larson, Philip Wiley, Don Mack, and James Rockholt as the tellers for the election of officers which followed.

The following officers were elected: District Superintendent Rev. John Connor Assistant District Superintendent . Rev. Walter Cole District Secretary Rev. Roy Dworschak District Treasurer Rev. V. G. Story Council Members: Rev. Harley Briggs Rev. Clarence Jackson Rev. Martin Swinney Two year term - Rev. Walter Cole Examining Board: " - Rev. It was moved and seconded we vote for the ministerial delegates to General Conference by a plurality vote. The four highest to be the delegates and the next highest the alternates. It was carried.

The conference was recessed ten minutes to allow for the counting of ballots.

The ministerial General Conference delegates are Rev. Clarence Jackson, Rev. Harley Briggs, Rev. Martin Swinney, and Rev. Verlie Arnett. The alternates are Rev. James Rockholt, Rev. Clifford Hacker, Rev. Donald Mack, and Rev. Lee Sorenson in that order.

Mrs. Martin Swinney was elected the lay delegate. Mr. E. W. Callar, alternate.

The council was excused to make committee appointments, then agreed to appoint these prior to the evening service. Such appointments to be read and approved at that service.

It was moved and seconded that the Secretary wire conference greetings to the John Price family now serving the church in Africa. It was carried.

It was moved and seconded that the council be granted authority to finish and care for all unfinished conference business. Carried.

Rev. Dean Felker, Dean of Central Pilgrim College, was introduced to the conference by Rev. Clarence Jackson, a member of the Reception Committee. He was granted an honorary seat in the conference bar.

A church roll call was taken. Each pastor designated the number of district minutes required for his congregation and the number of Pilgrim Holiness Advocate subscriptions he will attempt to secure.

A motion for adjournment was received and passed. Rev. John Connor prayed the dismissal prayer.

Since the conference business was completed during the afternoon session, we enjoyed a very blessed service in the evening with Dr. Flexon as the speaker.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To our General Superintendent Dr. R. G. Flexon, Pastors, Delegates and Friends. Greetings in Jesus Name to this Twenty Second Annual Conference of the Pacific Northwest District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, now in session at Salem, Oregon.

To God we give thanks for His great mercy toward mankind. I am thankful for His help spiritually, physically and mentally; surely He has given protection in travel, many times guidance in our work for Him, and comfort in doing His will.

Some of our churches report good revivals with souls being saved and sanctified, yet we need still a greater soul stirring among us. In this material world with mass production, big business, confusion and contention, yet with so many living in the cult of the comfortable, satisfied, and don't want to be molested; I make my appeal to this conference and to the whole District to be loyal to God with a loyalty that will establish you so there will be no shrinking, drawing back or quitting the army, while the battle is on, having a never die spirit that God can bless and help for He can't help a quitter. There are far too many saying I guess I might as well quit. This gives glory to the devil and no one else.

Temporal Progress

Marysville has purchased oak pews and have installed new windows.

Seattle has rebuilt part of the front of the parsonage which had settled and pulled away from the building, and painted the parsonage inside.

The roof on the Raymond church has had a much needed repair job, church floor was painted, a new pulpit added. The parsonage has been redecorated and much needed plumbing done in the bath room.

Tacoma painted the outside of the church and purchased oak pews.

Vancouver continues to work at the completing of their building and have added a two car cement garage.

Svensen has built new steps, platform to the front of their church which adds to the appearance of their building; they are working toward the completion of their Sunday School rooms.

Roseburg added an addition to the back of their living quarters.

Grants Pass continues to work on their new building. The roof is on and the windows are in; they are also using two of their classrooms.

Medford has been finishing their classrooms, also the basement in their church.

Klamath Falls has bought a three bedroom parsonage near the church.

Portland Alberta has painted their parsonage inside, painted their church inside, putting on exit lights and have done a thorough cleaning job.

Portland first church put in new furnaces in the church and

parsonage.

Salem painted their auditorium.

Silverton is painting their church building outside.

Aurora has started an addition on their church building and added a new sink in the kitchen, and the bathroom is equipped with a new tub.

Corvallis started services Easter Sunday in a remodeled building, with it is an attractive chapel, but needs more work to finish it into a workable Sunday School unit.

The View church near La Center, Washington was organized this spring, the 28th of May with 14 members and 4 junior members. The church building was offered by the community free of charge and they are now building a Sunday School unit on the side.

A new clothes closet with sliding doors and a lot of drawer and storage space has been finished in the District parsonage.

A working space room has been built to the back of the kitchen and a gas stove was donated to the camp.

A sub floer was put in the upstairs of the dormitory which will give space for sleeping quarters. The tabernacle has been painted on both sides and the rest rooms painted outside.

The grounds north of the dining room as well as the strip along Williams Avenue has been leveled and seeded.

A new sign has been painted and erected at the entrance of Pilgrim Park.

The Marysville church gave us their seats when they got their pews which add to the appearance of the platform in the tabernacle.

Our Losses

The work at Clatskanie has been without a pastor or services the past year and it seems best to close the work there which we regret but with memories of the past. However to sell the property and invest elsewhere seems best now.

The Roseburg work has been without a pastor for some time due to the illness of the pastor's wife.

The Tacoma church has been disrupted but continues to have Sunday School. Pray for this work.

Personal Report

I have preached 102 times, held four revivals - Svensen, Grants Pass, Aurora and View. Preached at three Holiness association meetings. Had or helped with three funerals. Spoke at three zone rallies. Helped with three communion services. Dedicated two babies.

There were 31 seekers, 19 to be saved, 12 to be sanctified, with forty four who held their hand to be prayed for, denoting a spiritual need.

Have prayed with 10 for healing. I have dealt with many personally about their souls needs.

I have raised money to buy one of our pastors a car.

Held 15 annual meetings, met with church boards 22 times, attended the school board meeting at our school in Bartlesville, Oklahoma and another meeting in the interest of schools at Sacramento, California.

I have travelled 25,000 miles on the District in interest of District work, 6,000 miles in interest of schools, which makes 31,000 miles.

Worked 550 hours on the District camp grounds, Grants Pass or Corvallis, and enjoyed every minute of it. Thank the Lord He has given strength to accomplish what I have; my only regret is that I wasn't able to do more.

Conference

- Be it resolved that no minister, evangelist or christian worker be engaged without approval of the District Superintendent.
- 2. Be it resolved that all District and General funds be sent to the District Treasurer by the tenth of each month.
- 3. Be it resolved that the pastor's salary or offerings be paid during camp and conference.
- 4. We recommend where possible that suitable signs of the local church be placed along the highway or highways approaching the city and at the nearest through street.
- 5. Be it resolved that the retiring pastor shall give to his successor an up-to-date record of the names and addresses of members and friends of the local church.
- 6. Be it resolved that the quarterly bulletin, "The Northwest Pilgrim", be edited by the District Superintendent. The Bulletin shall comprise new items from each department head. Be it further resolved that means for the publishing of the bulletin be by subscription, the price to be set by the District Council.
- 7. Whereas the constitution of the United States provides for freedom of worship, be it resolved that this conference go on record as being opposed to any school system which violates the conscience of our children by any anti-christian requirements which are contrary to the teaching of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- 8. Whereas some of our churches pay their pastors by the free will offering method and as this often is a handicap in raising finances; therefore we recommend that each church pay their pastor a salary.
- 9. Be it resolved that in the event of the death of a district minister or his wife, the District Secretary be notified at once and he shall notify the pastor of each church.
- 10. We recommend that the editing committee date all standing resolutions in their respective years -- from 1952.
- 11. Be it resolved that no one be elected or appointed to more than one major board or committee, where possible. 1955
- 12. Whereas, the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized the Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc., to make loans of Pension Funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches under such conditions as require active participation on the Pilgrim Holiness Districts.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Annual Conference of this district that the District Council, District Trustees, and all District officials be and they are hereby authorized, to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in said Resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans. We further recommend that foresaid limitations and conditions be on file with the District Superintendent. 1955 13. We recommend that each church grant their pastor a two week

- vacation, with salary paid. 1956
- 14. Be it resolved that each pastor send the annual reports to the District Statistician by July 10. 1956
- 15. We recommend that all district committees and boards, ministerial delegates, and all those needing to meet the district committees, be at the camp ground Friday night, July 27. 1959
- 16. Be it resolved that the pastoral recall be conducted the first two weeks in April, and the reports of the vote to be reported immediately to the District Superintendent. 1959
- 17. Be it resolved that all new resolutions or proposed resolution changes be written out and delivered to a member of the Resolutions Committee by the day before conference. 1960
- 18. Whereas the District Superintendent's program will be to a degree governed by his knowledge of district finances; be it resolved the District Treasurer submit a report to him quarterly. 1960

Camp

- I. Be it resolved that Pilgrim Park Camp Meeting Association be governed by the following:
 - 1. The association shall be amenable to the District Council, who shall make the rules governing the camp.
 - 2. Membership in the association shall be open to any Christian who believes in and wishes to help promote the doctrine of entire sanctification.
 - 3. A membership fee of one dollar per year is to be paid during camp or prior thereto; said fees shall be used to promote camp interests.
 - 4. The Treasurer shall be charged with the responsibility of all camp funds.
 - 5. The Secretary shall provide all camp publicity and shall send proper advertisement to each pastor and to the membership of the association not less than thirty days prior to the camp, along with a request urging members to send in their dues at that time.
 - 6. The Secretary shall act as Camp Registrar.
 - 7. The Camp Meeting Board shall be composed of: District Superintendent as chairman; the following to be appointed by the District Council: Secretary, Treasurer, Purchasing Agent, Dining Hall Manager, Housing Manager, Electrician and Plumber, and Manager of Grounds and Buildings.
 - 8. Be it resolved that each church board appoint a local camp association steward to promote camp interest. 1958
 - 9. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent on his first call enlist each church to provide or underwrite a substantial amount of one or more of the following categories: produce, canned goods, meat and poultry. 1958
- II. Be it resolved that the portion of Pilgrim Park fronting Williams Avenue be for the building of cottages. The District Council shall determine a uniform lot size and shall

provide a uniform lease contract, said contract to include these provisions:

- A uniform building code of type and size of buildings, adequate wiring and necessary considerations for plumbing shall be observed.
- Cottages shall not be occupied, except for camp and conference, without the permission of the District Council.
- 3. Leases shall not be transferred to another party without approval of the District Council.
- 4. If the lease contract be broken, the leasee shall forfeit all rights; and the lot, or lots, with existing improvements, shall revert to the Camp Meeting Association.
- 5. In event the owner shall be absent from the camp, he shall notify the Camp Meeting Secretary and the cottage or cottages shall be utilized by the Housing Manager during camp and conference.
- III. Be it resolved that the District Council care for the landscaping and maintenance of Pilgrim Park and secure a caretaker on contract.
- IV. Be it resolved that the District Council shall schedule the annual camp and conference; be it further resolved that the camp start on a Thursday night providing that the Youth Camp is on a separate date. 1958
- V. Be it resolved that those other than ministers and their dependent families, delegates, and workers shall pay for their entertainment at conference the same as during camp.
- VI. Be it resolved that the Bible School Meeting be held at another time than Sunday afternoon.
- VII. Be it resolved that the District Council be empowered to negotiate a loan, if necessary, to finish the camp dormitory project.

Sunday School

- 1. Be it resolved that each Sunday School of the District count as present those who are attending the camp.
- 2. We recommend that time during the camp be given to the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary to present the Sunday School work. 1954
- 3. Be it resolved that the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall arrange and superintend the camp Sunday School sessions; these sessions to start at 9:30. 1958
- 4. Be it resolved that each zone devote one zone meeting each year to Sunday School promotion. 1958
- 5. We recommend that the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary be invited to conduct the zone Sunday School Promotion meeting if possible. 1958
- 6. Be it resolved that each pastor send to the Promotional Sunday School Secretary on Monday, following the last Sunday of the month, a report of his Sunday School attendance with that of the same month of the preceding year. The Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall send a monthly report of the same to each pastor. 1956

Zone

- 1. Be it resolved that there be one Zone Chairman in each zone appointed by the District Council; he shall promote all zone interests. Be it further resolved that this appointment be made prior to the last Saturday of camp and that the District Youth Executive Secretary and District Sunday School Promotional Secretary be informed of the same. 1958
- 2. We recommend that at least six zone meetings be conducted during the conference year under the direction of the Zone Chairman.

Youth

- 1. Be it resolved there be a District Youth Board, composed of the District Superintendent, District Youth Executive Secretary and District Youth Secretary-Treasurer; the purpose of this Board is to promote District Youth work.
- 2. Whereas the young people have an important part in our District, therefore to promote youth activity, be it resolved that a District Youth Rally be held during the year; the District Youth Board shall have charge of arrangements.
- 3. Be it resolved that the District Youth Society project for the year be to provide suitable recreational facilities at the Pilgrim Park Camp Ground. Same to be decided upon by the District Youth Board and approved by the District Council. 1958
- 4. Be it resolved that a District Youth Camp be conducted at a suitable location. Be it further resolved that the date and place for the camp be set by the District Youth Board, with the approval of the District Council. 1958
- 5. Be it resolved that the annual Youth Conference be conducted on the first Saturday of camp meeting and that delegates be selected from each church. These delegates shall be the pastor, youth society president and one other young person from each church.

<u>Missionary</u>

- Whereas there is a need of promoting the work of our missionary societies on the district; Be it resolved that a District Missionary President and a Secretary Treasurer be elected. Two or more names shall be nominated for the offices by the District Council.
- 2. Be it resolved that the Missionary Society be permitted to send pledge money to be applied upon shower stalls for the camp grounds. 1958

Educational and Examining Boards

- 1. We recommend that all candidates who are to come before the Educational and Examining Boards shall do so before conference convenes, if possible.
- 2. Be it resolved that a library composed of books pertaining to required study courses be collected. Fersons pursuing said courses shall be permitted to rent these books. The Library shall be housed and administered at the discretion of the District Council. 1959

NEW RESOLUTIONS

 Whereas the time of our Pacific Northwest District Conference was placed at the beginning of camp to permit the same general official to preside over it as presided over the Idaho-Washington Conference occurring earlier in the same week, and whereas the Idaho-Washington Camp has been moved up to a date earlier in the summer making such cooperation impossible:

Be it resolved that the Pacific Northwest District Conference be held the day following the close of regular camp services.

 Be it resolved that plans for all new buildings and all major repairs on buildings of and on the district be authorized and approved by the District Council.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE'S REPORT

- 1. Be it resolved that all stationed ministers on the district send their ministerial tithe to the District Treasurer for district expense.
- 2. That 10% of the Sunday School offering be used for general conference expense.
- 3. That 10% of the regular church offerings be sent to the District Treasurer for district expense.
- 4. That birthday offerings be used for district church extension.
- 5. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent and evangelists pay three-fourths of their ministerial tithe into the district budget and the district pay their 4% pension when desired.
- 6. Whereas the United Stewardship Fund is \$8.00 per voting member; Therefore be it resolved that the Church Treasurer be instructed to send that amount to the District Treasurer. The same to be raised at the discretion of the Pastor and local Church Board.
- 7. Be it resolved that we continue the call card plan of \$1.00 per call for District interests.
- 8. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be paid \$225.00 per month plus \$70.00 per month traveling expense. Be it further resolved that he be allowed five revivals per year either on or off the district from which he may keep the offerings.
